AN OPEN LETTER.

The "Peace" Offered by Germany.

60 Wall St., New York.  
December 13, 1916.

Dear Sir:

The word "peace" is put forward by Germany that it may serve to cover a multitude of crimes — beginning with the original crime of forcing this war upon the world and down to the latest crime of reducing the remnant of Belgium's population to slavery. The first iniquity, the declaration of war upon Serbia, is to be covered by obliterating Serbia as a nation, thus so to speak doing away with the corpus delicti; and the same device is to be adopted in another form as regards Poland, which Germany has reduced to condition almost as appalling as that which her ally Turkey has brought about in Armenia, to cover which Turkey is to be maintained in the status of a European power, long used to such good advantage for purposes of ruthlessness — all this in the name of peace.

The martyrdom of Alsace-Lorraine is to be continued, covered by the simple means of forgetting it — this too in the name of peace, which is further invoked to cover the torturing of the civil populations of Belgium and northern France; no reparation is to be made — not even to the extent of returning the loot.

Not only are all these crimes to remain unpunished but their perpetrators are to be rewarded both in territory and in the fruits of pillage; the oppressors are to be left stronger and are to hold sway over greater numbers.

Crying peace, Germany actually seeks a truce during which armaments are to be piled up as never before in preparation for postponed "tag", the day to which her sons drank in the champagne cellars of Rheims on their way "nach Paris" and which suddenly turned into night at the Marne. This she aims to achieve with the aid and comfort of neutrals fascinated by her "peace" shipwreath and led — such is her hope — by the United States of America.

And to think that the Germans really expect this to come about. Was there ever such madness in the world?
