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

Raising Tree Seeds.

A Mobile, Alabama, correspondent says: "I find myself much in want of information on the vitality of tree seeds and the time required for their sprouting after being placed under ground. I readily raised plants of Taxodium distichum a year old, finding them to sprout a month or so after sowing. With the White Cedar, Chamœcyparis thuyoides, and the Red Cedar, Juniperus Virginiana, I never had such success."

There is no rule in regard to the germination of tree seeds. A quantity may be gathered from the same tree, be all preserved alike, and sown at the same time. Most of them may sprout the following spring; but a large number of plants will appear the following year, and often many will be found coming up the third year. No explanation has been given of these vagaries. A remarkable feature in tree-seed growing is, that most seeds have a period in spring in which they seem to love to sprout. If for any reason they do not germinate within that period, nothing will induce them to grow till the following Spring. They seem to have intelligence that they cannot mature the young plant, unless they start in good time during the Spring season. Seeds that have somewhat hard coatings are difficult to get to grow the same season when sown in Spring. Such seeds cannot usually be obtained till after the ground has frozen up in Autumn. In this case the method is to save the seeds till the growing season in Spring has passed, and then mix them with earth and sow the next Fall or Spring. This is termed, in the language of the seed-growers, putting the seeds in the rot heap. Such seeds as holly, hawthorn, and one of those inquired about by our correspondent, the Red Cedar, Juniperus Virginiana, are of this class. Most coniferous seeds grow easily the same season of sowing, though the harder-shelled ones, such as the Deciduous Cypress, Taxodium distichum, will have a few lie over till the second year .-Meehan's Monthly.

Free Seed Distribution.

The limited free seed distribution voted by congress will now be made at once. Those who wish any of these seeds should apply at once direct to their senator or representative at Washington, D. C.

Our Surplus stock offered in box lots at St. Louis and Rochester were more difficult to sell than usual, showing that there was an over-supply of Kieffer Pears and Cherries on the market. Owing to the great freeze South in the Spring of 1894 we were obliged to cut our crop of Kieffers to the ground and let a new shoot This brought us in two large crops at once. The depression in the financial affairs of the country had its influence also in reducing prices. There is now quite an improvement. manifested in better collections and better sales by agents operating for fall sales than for the past two years. Our supply of Kieffer Pears and Cherries will be light for Fall and Spring, as will be also our supply of Cherries, compared with the season just passed.

We have a fine stock of Red June and Wickson Plums, one year, for Fall and Spring use. The Red June promises to be the great early market plum among the Japanese sorts.

The Milton Plum is decidedly earlier than Wild Goose, and equal to it in every other respect. This is a good sort for market men to plant and for agents to handle.

The Koonce is growing in demand as it becomes better known. It is earlier than Early Harvest, and has been well tested in market orchards in Southern Illinois. We can supply one and two year old trees for Fall.

The Canner's Japan is not a good pear to eat; but it is so prolific and so beautiful on the tree and makes such good preserves that everybody who has a tree is glad of it. The tree is very hardy and bears in unfavorable seasons when other sorts do not.

We sold during the Winter and Spring over 25,000 Sneed June Buds. This indicates the demand to be expected for this variety the coming season. We have a large stock of it to sell.

THE TRIUMPH PEACH.—The colorotype of the Triumph Peach, given in the April number of the Practical Nurseryman, is a faithful likeness of this famous sort. PEACH TREES -- On Peach, Leading Varieties

Our Peach Trees are budded on seedlings, grown from Tennessee and Alabama pits. They are free from Aphis or Root-Knots, and have fewer borers than those from most nurseries.

Terms and Conditions Governing Quotations in the Price hist of the Huntsville Wholesale Nurseries.

RATES .- As we send this list to the trade only, MATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uniformly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filled at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March.

We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buyt rees to sell again. You can depend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit direc-tions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given. we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants after a proper shipment by us.

RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the classification, and we will assume it to be proper-to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the con-trary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows: Boxes 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

If shipment is required in the Fall for Spring use, a note is to be given upon receipt of the trees. We do not allow any discount for cash, but we make our prices low to discount for eash, but we make our prices low to command eash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum must be paid on over due accounts. Should prices be changed, either higher or lower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time the order is made, are expected to

FORMS OF PAYMENT.—All bills are payable at the office of the seller, and remittances should be made by drafts on New York, Chicago or St. Louis, or by money orders on some Express Company, or by postal orders. We will, however, accept checks from those of our customers who may be located at places having no bank-

who may be located at places having no banking, express or postal facilities, provided they make them in every case payable "with exchange", or add ¼ of one cent. to the amount of the bill for the cost of collection.

Grades.—We grade very carefully, in some cases by caliper, in others by height. When graded by both caliper and height, the caliper must govern, as the height then named is only to be considered approximately. When graded by height or caliper, we include the lower number and exclude the higher. Instance: in a grade of 4 to 5 feet trees, the 4 feet trees are included, but not the 5 feet trees. If 5 feet trees are wanted, the 5 to 6 feet grade must be ordered. GUARANTEE OF GENUINENESS.—While we exceed the greatest diligence and care to have all

ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by telegraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever cause, will receive consideration only when made 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING.—Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS.—We do not require customers to take an assortment they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substitution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission.

CAUTION.—We accept all orders upon the condition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control

TERMS.—Cash. When desired, we will allow 30 to 60 days from date of shipment, to responsible.

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
