

Dr. KIYOSE: "Here another book must be introduced into the Proceedings, Mr. President, and this is by this Japanese, HIYASHIDE, Kenjiro, a travelogue which he wrote as a member of the Emperor of Manchukuo's entourage. In this book the Manchukuo Emperor's words are quoted as follows: "After my return to Manchukuo I shall have a rescript issued in which I wish to give directions to my people, and I also wish to order my government to see to it that these directions are carried out giving directions for the future of my people."

THE PRESIDENT: "Did you say that, Witness, as the book states?"

THE WITNESS (FU YI): "Well, during the time we were traveling, the Japanese Director of the General Affairs Bureau had already told me what I should say when I got into Japan."

CHINESE MONITOR: "Told me that there will be an Imperial Rescript after I got back to Manchuria."

THE WITNESS(FU YI): "At that time, whatever statement I was about to make was told to me by YOSHICKA. I had absolutely no freedom of speech."

PU YI was not permitted to visit his ancestral tombs by order of UMEZU (Record p. 4.147); he was ordered to visit Japan (Record p. 4.157-4.158). As to the establishment of the National Foundation Shrine, it was not a voluntary act either. UMEZU and other Japanese insisted that Shintoism be introduced into Manchukuo in accordance with the fixed policy of Japan. (Record pp. 4.169-4.175). YOSHICKA supervised PU YI during the trip to Japan and explained to him the SHINTOISM. (Record pp.4.270-4.277)

I. Subposens subject of testimony - The witness was an interpreter attendant on the Ex-Emperor PU-YI and will testify regarding the attitude of the Ex-Emperor toward Japan.

II - Information from the Investigative Division - The Curriculum Vitae indicates that the witness is a career diplomat, having served throughout his life in the service of the Foreign Ministry. The pertinent listings from the Curriculum Vitae, according to the subject of testimony, are the following:

Feb. 26, 1932 - Appointed to serve on the Staff of the Delegates to the League's China Investigation Committee (Cabinet)

June 18, 1932 - Appointed Consul.

Promoted to the Fourth Rank of the Higher Civil Service (Cabinet)

Granted Second Grade Salary.

Ordered for duty at Mukden (Foreign Ministry)

Aug. 20, 1932 - Appointed Second-Class Embassy Secretary

Promoted to the Fourth Grade of the Higher Civil Service (Cabinet)

Appointed to the staff of the Envoy Extraordinary and Ambassador Plenipotentiary to Manchukuo. (Cabinet)

Granted Second Grade Salary. (Foreign Ministry)

In accordance with Article 1 of Imperial Ordinance No. 228 issued in 1932 the matter of the application of the Rules for Official employees was reported to the Throne. (Cabinet)

Ordered for duty in Manchukuo. (Foreign Ministry)

Nov. 30 and 31,1932 - Concurrently appointed Consul.

VI - Reference in evidence to witness or to the subject matter of his testimony. - There is no reference in the evidence to this witness by name.

The witness may testify to the strength of PU-YI in conducting the administration of Manchuokou or to other matters indicating that Manchuokou was independent. In such event, the matters attached hereto dealing with the administration of Manchuokou will be pertinent.

VII - Summary of the testimony given - This witness has not yet testified.

VIII - Decorations - There is no reference to this witness in the memorandum of March 11, 1947 relating to decorations.

IX - Non-listed investigation - None.

PROSECUTION EVIDENCE ON AUMINISTRATION IN MANCHURIA

- Phase of the Defense case will testify, according to the information supplied by the Defense in their application for the production of the witness, regarding the pupper character of Manchuria and the administrative set up within this area. There is practically no reference to these witnesses by name in the evidence which has gone before. However, there has been considerable evidence on the subject matter of their intended testimony placed in the record by the Prosecution. In order to make available this vital source of information and put it in a concise able this vital source of information and put it in a concise which can be attached to the report of those witnesses who form which can be attached to the report of those witnesses who will testify regarding this particular aspect of the Manchurian Phase, we have prepared this paper.
- 2. The evidentiary material which we think will be helpful in cross-exemination and the reference to the record page or pages upon which it appears follows:
 - a. Record 2277-2279 A letter from NIBBIO, Chief of Staff of the Eventung Army to FURUSO, Vice-Minister of War, dated December 9, 1935, contains the Evantung Army's propaganda plan which should be carried out in parallel with military activity in North China. It provided that propaganda for Manchuria should be that the appearance of the Independent Covernment in North China was nothing but a concrete manifestation of the Manchurian Government.
 - b. Record 2754-2784 The Lytton Report was quoted in part showing the Japanese participation in the formation of the Government of Manchuria after the September 18th Incident and the predominate position taken by the Japanese Government in the formation taken by the Japanese Government in the formation and administration of the New State. The conclusions of the Lytton Committee to this effect are found on pages 2779 to 2780.
 - c. Hacord 2784 Excerpts from the Interrogation of ARAKI, Sedao, February 21, 1946, were introduced in swidence. In these ARAKI states that a cabinet meeting was held in February or March 1932, to form the Administration Committee to set up the Independent Administration Committee to set up the Independent State of Manchoukuo. The Commander-in-Chief of the State of Manchoukuo. The Commander-in-Chief of the State of Manchoukuo. First requested that an independent ent state be set up with Henry MI-YI as its head.

 ARAKI approved the plan.

(Prosecution Swidence on Administration in Manchuria, (Contd))

- d. Record 2792 KABAGI, Ryomei states in his testimony that, at the time he was associated with the Helf-Government Guiding Board in Manchure, there were 120 members of the Hoard, of which approximately fifteen were Chinese or Manchurian, and the money to support the organization came from the Ewantung Army with which they operated in close cooperation.
- Record 2817-2823 Minutes of the Cabinet Conference
 Meeting of March 1st, 1932, at which time matters
 relating to the foreign relations of the New State
 of Manchuckuo and policies creating it independent
 were discussed. On page 2818, the statement is
 made that Japan should grasp real power by gradually
 enlarging the number of Japanese in powerful positions
 in the Government of Manchuria.
- f. Hecord 2826-2827 Minutes of the Cabinet Council Meeting of April 11, 1932 This stated that the Hew State of Manchuria shall employ authoritative advisors from Japan and "make them the highest advisors in connection with the financial, aconomic and general political problems" and "the New State shall appoint competent Japanese Nationals to the leading posts in the Privy Council, the Central Bank, and other organs of the New State". The reilroads shall also be in the central of Japan.
- G. Record Pages 2827-2829 Minutes of the Cabinet Council Meeting of May 3, 1932. This set up the policy concerning construction of the Kirin-Tunghus Railway Extension line, providing that the Tein-Tu Railway shall be purchased by Manchuria and the funds for this purpose credited by the South Manchuria Railway Company. The management of both lines is entrusted to the Bouth Manchurian Railway Company.
- h. Record 2831-2833 Minutes of the Cabinet conference meeting dealing with the development of aviation in Manchuria, which provided for establishing and acquiring rights in Manchuria and Mongolia, and, at the same time, insuring communications between Ewantung same time, insuring communications between Ewantung army units. By this council meeting the Military Air Ervice was given permanentay and was to be administered under the leadership and supervision of the Imperial Jepanese Covernment.

- i. Record2838-2847 Two telegrams, one from the Gommander-in-Chief of the Ewantung Army to the Vice-Minister of Mar, dated June 4, 1932, requesting that the Ewantung Army take over the customs houses, including that at Dairen and suggesting that the independence of Manchuria be recognized, and the other, a reply telegram from the Mar Minister, dated June 10, 1932, stating that it was not yet time to recognize Manchuria, or to discuss the questions of administrative rights in the South Manchurian Railway zone and the question of the Ewantung leased territory.
- Hecord 2851-2855 An excerpt from the lytton
 Report giving the conclusions regarding the Government of Manchuria. On page 2953, it states "as
 regards the "government" and the public services,
 although the tituler heads of the departments are
 Chinese residents in Manchuria, the main political
 and administrative power rests in the hands of Japanose officials and advisors".
- k. Hecord 2899-2902 February 13 and March 8, 1946.
 Interrogations of ARAKI, Sadao, in which he states
 that he agreed with the Fereign Minister that
 Manchuria should be recognized as an independent
 state. He stated that the Ewantung Army requested
 this and that all the Cabinet members agreed on it.
- 1. Record 2903-2911 A message from the Chief of Staff of the Kwantung Army, KOISO, Kunaiki, to Vice-Minister of Mar, YAHAGANA, Heisuke, dated Movember 3, 1932, which contained an outline for guiding Manchuokuo. The jist of it was that Hanchoukuo should be developed as an independent state, should closely cooperate with Japan, should be directed and controlled by the Commander of the Kwantung Army, should be a unit in an economic "block" between Japan and Manchuokuo, should enter into a defense system with Japan and should not be allowed to support political parties or bodies but the Manchurian people should "follow blindly".
- m. Record 2919-2924 The Cabinet decision of 9 December, 1932 showed Japanese extension of the plan to dominate Manchuria by deciding to control the communication system of that country. This document shows that a telegraph, telephone and broadcasting company was to be formed to control this business in Manchuria. It was to be under the supervision of the Japanese and Manchurian Covernments.
- n. Record 2927-2932 This document is a cabinet decision, dated August 8, 1933, and was the guiding

policy toward Manchuria. In short, it provided that Japan and Japanese officials were to be the guiding hands in the administration of Manchuria, and all of the military, economic, and business enterprises were to be coordinated under Japanese control.

- o. Record 2933-2936 The Cabinet Council Meeting of December 22, 1932, provided for the creation and enforcement of monerchy in Manchuria.
- P. Record 2972-2982 This is the proceedings of the Privy Council with reference to the signing of the protocol between Japan and Manchoukuo of September 13, 1932. ARAKI and HIRANUMA were present. This mosting agreed to the recognition of the State of Manchoukuo by Japan and provided for the control of Manchoukuo by Japan and provided for the control of Manchoukuo administration and sconomics by Japan. This protocol was approved unanimously. (Record 2994).
 - q. Record 2939-2944 The Subinet decision of March 20, 1934, related a plan for the development of principal industries of Manchuria. It stated that these industries will be developed and will be under the protection and supervision of the Japanese empire.
- r. Record 2949-2959 This is a supplamentary agreement attached to the treaty with Manchoukuo of June 10, 1936. This agreement provided special privileges in Manchuria for Japanese Mationals, such as, reduced in Manchuria for Japanese Mationals, such as, reduced taxes, reduced punishments for law violations, that violations were to be handled by the Japanese consular officials until Manchuriau officials could take over, and certain rights of taxation within the South Manchuria Railway Zone. It further provided that the scope of laws of Manchuria which covered Japanese subjects should be previously agreed upon through consultation between the Japanese Embaseador Extracridinary and Flenipotentiary to Manchoukuo and the Minister for Foreign Affairs to Manchoukuo.
- s. Record 2962-2966 The decision of the Cabinet Council of October 22, 1937, provided for the establishment of a company to control heavy industry in Manchuria, said company to be controlled by the governments of Japan and Manchuria. The management of the company was directed to be AYEKAWA, Gisuke, the then President of the Japanese Missen Company.

(Prosecution Evidence on Administration in Manchuria (contd))

- t. Hecord 2967-2971 This is a latter from Minister, to Toshizo, Chief of Staff of the Eventung Army, to FURUSO, Mikio, Vice-Wer Minister, dated October 25, 1935, concerning plans for controlling the press and public opinion in Manchuria. This provided for the consolidation into one company, controlled by the Japanese Government, the Manchoukuo Government and Ispanese Government, the Manchoukuo Government and the Manchurian Mailway Company, of twelve newspapers and information bureaus in Manchoukuo.
- u. Record 29 7-3001 Three telegrams, one from the Commander of the Ewantung army to the Vice-Winister of War and Vice-Chief of the General Staff, dated Movember 13, 1937, one from the Chief of the General Staff of the Ewantung army to the Vice-Chief of the Seneral Staff, dated May 14, 1938, and one from the Vice-Winister of War to the Chief of the General Staff of the Ewantung Army, dated May 24, 1938, dealing with foreign affairs in Manchoukuo. The first expressed the opinion that it would be timely for Manchoukuo to enter the Asti-Genintern Sect, by the side of Japan, Germany and Italy. The second stated the desire that this be accomplished. The third stated that Japan will assist Manchoukuo to enter the pact on favorable op ortunity.
 - W. Record 3001-3003 A telegram from the Chief of Staff of the Kwantung Army to the Vice-Minister of Mar and the Vice-Chief of the Army General Staff, dated December 16, 1940, requested whether negotiations for trade part between Japan, Danchoukun and Germany would be entered into and expressed the opinion that this would be in accordance with the spirit of the Tripartite alliance, which had just been signed.
 - W. Record 3004-3005 Two telegrams, one from the Chief of Staff of the Ewantung Army to the Vice-Minister of War, dated Hovember 5, 1940, and the reply thereto, which dealt with the suggestion of changing the Manchoukup Embassador to Japan and the approval thereof by the Vice-Minister of War.
 - N. Record 3023-3024 WORTSETMA, Morito, the Vice-Consul-General at Mukdan from 1930 to 1932

Manchuria for the establishment of any independent government. This movement was sponsored and inspired by the Ewantung army and the Belf-Government Guiding Board, which was created by the Ewantung army. All of the important and controlling positions in the puppet government were filled by Japanese selected by the Ewantung army.

"Upon the establishment of the puppet Government, the Province of Jehol in Inner-Mongolia was declared to be within its sphere of influence. This move proved ineffectual because it did not have the support of the government nor the people of Jehol. When the Ementung Army realized this situntion, and the continued existence of the exiled Covernment of Chang Hameh-Liang in Jehol, the Army proceeded to occupy Jehol and make it a part of the puppet regime by force. This puppet government continued to be dominated and controlled by the Ementung Army until 1945. Japan officially recognized the independence of this Government in September 1932. This gesture in nowise altered the control and domination of the Government by the Ewantung Army."
