The act to suppress gambling houses and banking debates on it were chiefly about questions of formality of verbal alterations-no speaker denying the necessity of passing such a law, it may be necessary to give only the enactments of the law, as it was adopted after its see nd reading. It promises that from and after the passage of this act, all gambling houses and banking games shall be suppressed; that any persons convicted of keeping such houses or games, aiding or abetting in the same, or playing in or at them, shall for the first offence, be fined in a sum not less than 1,000 and not more than 5,000 dollars; and for the second not less than 5,000 and t' e per itentiary not less than I year, and not more than owners of the houses are considered accessaries, and are s bjected to the same penalties;-that public officers and private persons are privileged to enter such houses, arrest couse playing, seize what property and money they may fin i, and bring all before a magistrate, who must commit the offenders for trial by jury ;- that the captors are competent witnesses against the offenders-that the fines Their e equally divided between the prosecuting attor. mays and the captors; -that any persons occupying stations of trust, lionor, or profit, who shall be convicted of gambling or gaming, shall be adjudged guilty of high misdemeanor, and be disqualized in future from holding any odice in the state; -that those persons who have alxeady obtained licences to keep gambling houses are exempted from the penalties of this act, till their period of being licensed shall expire; but no licenses shall be renewed or issued after the passage of this act;-that the Louses in which banking games are played, shall in all cases of incompetency to pay the penalties exacted by offenders, be legally amenable for the fines; and that hereafter all alleatory contracts (or bets of mutual agreement indde on contingencies) shall not be valid or oblitory on either party, except those recognized in th 2352d and 2953d articles of the civil code, which may be read by those curious in these matters.

Mr 'loa presented a report from the joint committee appointed to visit and examine the Commercial Bank . Now Orleans. The report states that the committee visited the city water works, which were injoined as a state bonus from the company, and that probably in June or July next, the city may have a sufficient supply of water from those works; but the members of the committee state that they were politely and positively refused hy the president and directors of the bank to examine the books or accounts of the institution. 
