Britain Ready to Give Some Warships to Canadian People

Light Cruiser, Four Destroyers, Eight Patrol Boats, One Flotilla Leader, Eight Submarines and Four Mine-Sweepers Are Included.

Ottawa, March 19.- (Canadian Press)-Examination of the re port of Admiral Lord Jellicoe, recently tabled in the House of Commons, shows that the British Government is prepared to present to Canada a number of ships, which at pre-war prices would be worth \$16,500,000 and at present prices would have a much higher value.

These vessels, indicated in table No. 4 of the Admiral's report. are as follows:

Victoria and Saanich should experience no real difficulty in composing their differences in connection with the smaller municipality's proposal to operate a motor bus service in and out of its own territorial borders. It is obvious that the larger and more important community cannot be expected to accept a superior authority such as that which the bill now before the Legis lature seeks to impose in behalf of the Corporation of Saanich. If a motor vehicle conveying passengers from the neighboring municipality into the City of Victoria is permitted virtually to ply for hire on our streets no serious contention can be advanced against the imposition upon that service of such regulations as govern traffic originating and conveyed within the city limits themselves. It will be remembered that The London Daily Herald published a dispatch from Moscow a few weeks ago chronicling the impressions of life under Soviet Government as experienced on the spot by Mr. George Lansbury, the well-known Laborite who presides over the destinies of the journal in question. Presumably the former parliament ary representative for Bow and Bromley has returned from his sojourn by this time, although very little prominence appears to have been given to an extended narrative from which the general public might form a more accurate conception of life in the late Czar's former kingdom.

In the event of the Allied countries deciding to send a commission to Russia, however, it should be possible to place in the hands of both sceptical and convinced reliable information as to the advantages--if any--and disadvantages of the newly-born proletariat dictatorship. In the meantime the Bolsheviki Government apparently is mindful of the services rendered to its cause by The Daily Herald, since a dispatch from Stockholm indicates that the local Norwegian agent of the Lenine regime has been instructed to furnish the London journal with five hundred tons of newsprint paper at the expense of the Soviet Government.

Is this the quid pro quo sequel to the nice things Mr. Lansbury said about conditions in Moscow ? And how will the average British workingman subscriber to The Daily Herald-a Trades Unionist but a long way from a Bolshevist-look upon the transaction? If Mr. Lansbury is wise he will endeavor to get along without the assistance of this form of Bolshevik support; the funds behind The Daily Herald, with which It meets its heavy weekly loss, already are badly compromised.



According to a belated dispatch from Cairo to London the Egyptian Nationalists are endeavoring to mould popular sentiment in support of resolutions, adopted by fifty-two members of the Executive Assembly, proclaiming the independence of Egypt and the Sudan. There is nothing particularly alarming in this announcement for the simple reason that it is directly in line with former pronouncements which have been made by prominent Nationalists in recent months.
