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GLENDALE-TROPICO POULTRY SHOW ATTRACTS

FIRST EXHIBITION OF LOCAL ASSOCIATION IS ALREADY AN ASSURED SUCCESS—MANY BREEDERS OF POULTRY AND PET STOCK MAKE ENTRIES—LIST OF WINNERS IN ALL CLASSES

Have you been to the Glendale-Tropico poultry show yet? If you haven't, you are missing a rare treat. Two hundred and fifty feathered fowls, the cream of the poultry yards and pigeon lofts of the San Fernando valley, are gathered together, and it is beyond question one of the greatest shows that has ever been held in this section of California. Of course, it does not compare in size to the Los Angeles show, which just closed, but as to quality and varieties it is second to none. Almost every variety of poultry and pigeons may be seen on exhibition. The barred Plymouth Rock variety is represented by forty-two birds, being the largest number of any one variety, and competition for prizes are very keen.

The string of white Orpingtons entered by Mr. R. H. Whitten is one of the finest displays ever made in this part of the state. This is an exhibit that is worth going miles to see, yet these fowls are bred and raised right in our midst. Mr. Whitten has never shown his stock before and is even surprised himself at the good showing of his birds.

Another great attraction that will soon catch one's eye after entering the show-room is the string of light and speckled Sussex, exhibited by Charles E. Patterson of Tropico. These birds are from a shipment of two hundred birds of the Sussex variety recently imported from England and are drawing considerable attention, as they are the only ones of their kind in this part of the state. MAYOR RICH FUNERAL

PROMINENT TROPICO MAN LAID TO REST—OTHER ITEMS FROM SISTER CITY

Beautiful and impressive were the services conducted by Visor lodge, Knights of Pythias, Monday afternoon at K. of P. hall, when they paid the last rites to their deceased brother and one of Tropico's most prominent citizens, James Rich. The honorary pallbearers were the city officials, Daniel Webster, Dr. A. O. Conrad, Charles H. Henry and Allen E. Boyce, city council; N. C. Burch, city clerk, and S. C. Brown, city treasurer. The active pallbearers were A. F. Davis, J. J. Burke, E. F. Betten, C. E. Nichols, Samuel Brown and H. A. Jennings. As escort to the cortege, were J. Will Gould, Edward Fairfield, Claude Hill, Julius Moniot, David Lovell, Albert Jones, Wayne Frank and Robert Danner, members of the fire department.

Samuel Brown delivered the beautiful eulogy. A quartet from the Methodist Episcopal church rendered several selections. Mr. Harry Marple sang a solo, accompanied by Miss Katherine Hobbs, and the audience sang "Nearer My God to Thee." It was a long cortege that slowly wended its way to Forest Lawn cemetery. At the entrance over one hundred school children met the funeral train and marched to the mound, which was entirely hidden by the many beautiful floral tributes.

Over thirty members of Visor lodge in full uniforms and the Uniform Rank, Knights of Pythias, of Los Angeles, also escorted the remains of this good man, and there as the evening sun sank in the west all that was mortal of James Rich was laid to rest.

The remains of Henry Bailey Burbank, who ended his life at his home, 307 Blanche avenue, Monday morning, are at the undertaking parlors of Scovern-Letton-Frey on West Cypress street, awaiting messages from relatives in San Diego and Ohio. A married sister of Mr. Burbank resides in New Hampshire.

Ill health is given as the cause of Mr. Burbank taking his life. His mother, Mrs. E. W. Burbank, is the only relative in this community and with her son has resided in Tropico the past four years. Early Monday morning, after unusual sounds were heard in the room of Mr. Burbank, the aged mother summoned Mr. S. E. Brown and J. H. Hutt, near neighbors, to come and ascertain if her son was the cause of so much confusion. When these men entered the room they found Mr. Burbank hanging in a closet. He had tied a rope four times around a rafter through the ventilator of the clothes closet, and then tying the other end of the rope around his neck, while standing on a chair, had kicked the chair from under him, thus permitting his body to drop the required distance to break his neck and cause death by strangulation.

The coroner was notified and ordered the body removed to the Scovern-Letton-Frey parlors to await an inquest. The aged mother is prostrated over the sad and tragic ending of her son.

MOVING PICTURE CONTROVERSY BEFORE BOARD

INTERESTING ISSUE DISCUSSED AT LENGTH, PRO AND CON, AT REGULAR MEETING OF BOARD—TRUSTEES TO CALL ELECTION ON QUESTION—REGULAR BUSINESS TRANSACTED

The regular meeting of the board of trustees of the city of Glendale was held in the city hall Monday evening, January 18th, 1915. Present: O. A. Lane, president of the board, and Trustees Charles Grist, J. S. Thompson, A. W. Tower, George Williams. Also present: T. W. Watson, city manager; J. C. Sherer, city clerk; W. E. Evans, city attorney; H. B. Lynch, manager of the public service department; Edw. M. Lynch, city engineer; G. B. Hoffman, city treasurer, and G. H. Herald, city marshal.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read by the clerk and the same were approved.

A communication was read from the Elks' Patrol, requesting the board of trustees to allow the use of the streets of the city for the conducting of an automobile road race on Saturday, January 30th, from 1 to 5 p. m. Mr. J. W. Lawson, a prominent member of the Elks' lodge, addressed the board on the subject, stating that it is the purpose of the Patrol boys to arrange for a real professional road race. It will not be a race in which only amateurs will participate, but the best drivers in Southern California will be present and give the public of Glendale a first-class race. The grandstand will be on Sixth street near Brand boulevard, and the race will start at Sixth and Brand, going down Sixth to Glendale avenue, up Glendale avenue to Second, down Second to Brand, and south on Brand to Sixth street, making a distance of about two and a half miles. The request made by the Elks' Patrol was unanimously granted by the board.

The time having arrived for the taking up of the hearing of the closing of picture shows on Sunday, Chairman Lane announced that the board would not tolerate any personal remarks to be made in the discussion, and he also requested that the speakers adhere strictly to the question under consideration.

Rev. Bede A. Johnson of the First Methodist church, acting as a representative of the Ministerial association, presented a petition of more than seven hundred names, asking that the moving picture shows be closed on Sunday. Rev. Johnson followed the presentation of this petition by a lengthy discourse. He said: "The trustees are not the ones to fix a moral standard for a town, nor are moving picture men the ones to fix the moral standard of a town, and now, since this question is up, the only fair way to have it decided is to let the people decide it. The showing of pictures on Sunday is right or it is wrong. If it is right, do not grant our petition; if it is wrong, you should grant our petition. The whole moral standard of the government is founded on the Bible. There is not a lawyer but will tell you that all laws of the United States as well as England are based upon the principles found in the Bible. The minute that holy book is thrown aside, we are no longer the United States. The Bible says that one day shall be observed as sacred. Keep away from that day all that is not sacred. My opponents will argue that if moving picture shows are not open in Glendale the boys and girls will go to Los Angeles. The same argument might be made in reference to saloons. There are some people who go from Glendale to Los Angeles to visit saloons, but that would be no argument in favor of opening saloons in Glendale." Rev. Johnson closed his address by making a strong plea to the board to pass the ordinance for the closing of the picture shows on Sunday.

Rev. W. E. Edmonds, also a member of the Ministerial association, stated that he was present only that he might not be understood as being indifferent upon the subject. He stated that he has been advocating to his church people the folly of the open picture show on Sunday. He emphasized the stand that the teachers of the public schools have taken in opposition to the moving picture shows, and made special mention of Professor Howe of the high school, who had some months previously appeared before the board of trustees asking that censors be appointed, whose duty it would be to have eradicated any objectionable features of the pictures to be exhibited in Glendale. Rev. Edmonds also mentioned the firm stand the Federated Brotherhood is taking against the moving picture shows being open on Sunday.

A letter from Mrs. Mattison B. Jones was read by Rev. Willisford. The letter conveyed the idea that Sunday is the minister's business day and nothing should be tolerated on that day that will interfere with the business of the ministers. That the ministers were here first and the

moving picture shows have no right to interfere with the ministers' Sunday work, and that "no man liveth unto himself and no man dieth unto himself." The writer went on to say that "the pool-room will follow the opening of moving picture shows on Sunday. You say people who do not care to attend the picture shows on Sunday may stay away. The same argument might be used if there were saloons in Glendale. Glendale is first, last and all the time a home town, and does not need to pattern after Los Angeles."

Rev. J. H. Troy, a member of the Ministerial association, spoke on the subject, putting forth the claim that the opening of moving picture shows on Sunday is the beginning of an open Sunday in Glendale. He criticized some of the members of the board of trustees for giving the new theater building the undeserved recognition that they have given it. And he said that some people who favor moving picture shows would favor the public dancing hall, pool-rooms and saloons.

Rev. E. E. Francis stated that he is opposed to the moving picture shows being open on Sunday, mainly because of the fact that it is impossible for a church to prepare a program that will be as attractive to children as the moving pictures, and therefore it is difficult for the children to be kept in the church.

Rev. H. J. Hartsell of the West Glendale Methodist church said that he was not talking on the opposition so much from the standpoint of a minister as from that of a business man, as he had been a business man before he entered the ministry. He thinks it a great mistake to allow a moving picture show to be open on Sunday, as it is the entering wedge to an open Sunday. He cited what had happened in Seattle some years previously.

Mr. F. H. Lowe, who is connected with the Majestic theater, gave a brief review of the Sunday opening of the moving picture show last February, and stated that at that time he was walled upon by members of the Ministerial association and had agreed to discontinue Sunday opening. He said: "I am not personally in favor of Sunday shows, but I am ready to give the people of Glendale what they want, and it has come to my knowledge that there is a good class of people in Glendale who wish the privilege of attending moving picture shows on Sunday, and now, since this question is up, the only fair way to have it decided is to let the people decide it."

James W. Horne, director of the Kalem Film company, addressed the board, saying that it is not his desire to have the moving picture shows detract from the church services, and that if he really thought one soul could be saved by closing the shows on Sunday, he would favor the closing. He thinks the only fair way to decide the question is by a vote of the people.

Rev. E. H. Willisford, in speaking upon the subject, said that if this question is submitted to a vote of the people, it should be definitely understood that both sides will remain by the decision as declared by the vote.

Mr. J. C. Beldin spoke in favor of the moving picture shows being open on Sunday, and advocated that the people be given a chance to rule. He said the existence of moving picture shows on Sunday does not mean that there will be saloons in Glendale. He said: "Personally I am opposed to saloons in Glendale, and I do not know that you could find a man in Glendale who would vote in favor of having saloons here." Mr. Beldin said that since making his speech a week ago on the moving picture question that he had received many compliments from good citizens upon the stand which he had taken, even the people of Burbank had complimented him upon the good work he is doing.

Mr. E. H. Kerker thinks the people should be allowed to decide whether there shall be moving picture shows in Glendale on Sunday, and he said "Is it not true that many of the seven hundred names on the petitions presented are the names of children who are not of an age to determine just what is best for a community?"

Mr. Frederick O'Brien, in a brief talk, emphasized the importance of putting this question before the people, stating that to his mind it was the only fair way to have it decided. H. Courtney called the attention of those present to the fact that there is a very respectable class of people residing in Glendale who observe Saturday for their Sabbath, and that those who are attempting to have strict rules enforced as to Sunday observance should not neglect the rights of others who believe differently.

MOVING PICTURE CONTROVERSY

(Continued from Page 1)

There were now two questions placed before the trustees for their consideration; one by the Ministerial association that an ordinance be passed prohibiting the opening of picture shows on Sunday; and the other a request by the moving picture sympathizers that the question whether there shall be moving picture shows on Sunday be left to a vote of the people.

The discussion being closed, motion was made by Trustee Thompson and seconded by Trustee Tower that the question under discussion be submitted to the vote of the citizens of Glendale. The motion carried without a dissenting vote.

The hearing of protests concerning Orange street was taken up. City Engineer Lynch recommended in a communication that since as many property owners on that street opposed the opening and improving of Orange street from First to Milford, he would recommend to the board that the proceedings be abandoned. The recommendation was concurred in by the board.

Hearing of protest was taken up concerning the opening of Seventh street. Upon motion the protest was denied.

Hearing of protest concerning the opening of Chestnut street was taken up and the protest denied.

Hearing of protest against the opening and improvement of Seventh street east of Adams street was taken up. G. H. Barager, who resides within the assessment district for that street, spoke at length on the question, thinking it unfair that he be assessed, as the opening and improving of that street would be of no benefit to him, and he believed that the ones who were advocating the opening and improvement should be the ones to pay the cost. Protest was denied.

Hearing of protest against the opening and laying out of Adams street north of First street was taken up. The protest was denied.

A resolution was presented by Mrs. Charles H. Toll, T. W. Watson and Mrs. Frank Grosvenor, members of the Glendale City Beautiful association, asking that ten dollars be appropriated by the city for the purchasing of flower seeds to be distributed among the children. The request was granted.

On account of there being so many daylight robberies, and because of the presence of so many suspicious characters in Glendale, a petition was presented by the Tuesday Afternoon club, requesting that the board appoint extra deputy marshals to better insure the safety of the citizens. The petition was referred to the city manager.

The bids for doing street work on Patterson avenue and Burchett street were opened and read and referred to the city engineer. Later in the evening he recommended that the contract be awarded to F. R. Sinclair, who was the lowest bidder. The bidders for the work were F. R. Sinclair, Peter L. Ferry and Thomas G. Brightenster.

The city attorney and manager of the public service department reported that there had been no bids received for the purchase of the water bonds. The suggestion was made that City Attorney W. E. Evans communicate with a prospective purchaser who had stated that he would take \$50,000 of the bonds.

Protests against installing the standard lighting system on Kenwood street were taken up for consideration. Out of a total of 6000 feet frontage, there were 1300 feet protested. On motion the protest was denied.

A communication from Winifred Marr, asking the amount of the proposed assessments against her property, that she might be able to consummate a certain business deal, was read and the same was referred to the city engineer, who was requested to make answer to Miss Marr's question.

Resolutions were adopted for the improvement of Doran street and a portion of Eighth street. These resolutions appear in another column of this issue.

The board adjourned to meet on Wednesday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.
