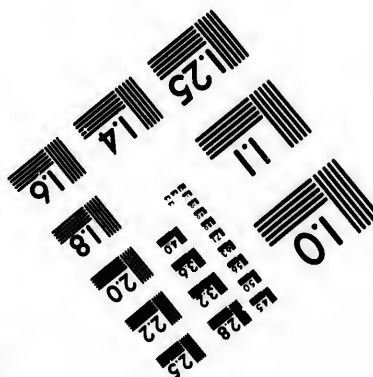
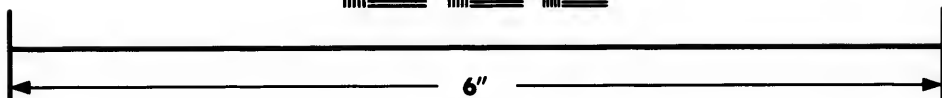
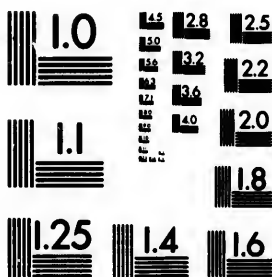


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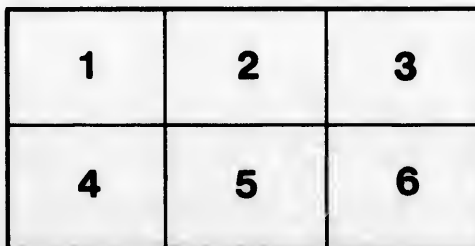
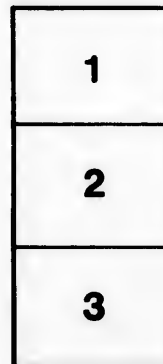
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Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite pppe River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the east side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43,39, N. long. 66, 10, W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

An Iron Bell Buoy (painted red) was laid down off this Harbour on the 28th September, 1852, similar in all respects to the Bell Buoy of the Port of Liverpool, G. B. It bears from Partridge Island Light House S. S. W. by compass 1½ miles.

The Buoy is anchored in 7½ fathoms, low water, spring tides. The Bell is 19 feet above the water.

SIGNALS.

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

- One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel
- One ball half hoisted for two ditto
- Two Balls close, for three Vessels
- Two Balls separated, for four ditto
- A Pendant of any colour, for five ditto
- A ditto under a Ball, for six ditto
- A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, or seven ditto
- A ditto under two Balls close, for eight ditto

- A ditto between two Balls separate, for nine ditto
- A Flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto
- The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their use can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order:
- A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
- “ with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker
- “ with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate
- “ with a white ditto, for a small rmed vessel
- Blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship
- Red ditto, for a Merchant Brig
- White and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel
- White ditto, [without a ball,] for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop
- Blue Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
- A Red Flag pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby
- A Red Flag with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston.
- A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

The above to be paid each trip, and if any such Vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 2s. 6d. to 5s. daily, according to the burthen. Other Boats and Vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all Scows, to pay 1s. 6d. each trip and 1s. 6d. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

RATES OF FERRIAGE FOR THE FERRY AT INDIAN TOWN.—Every town person, 3d.; child under twelve years of age, 1 1-2d.; horse, 1s.; ox or other large animal, 1s.; calf, swine, sheep, or goat, 1 1-2d.; waggon, cart, sled, carriage, sleigh, or other vehicle, 3d.; waggon, cart, or sled, loaded with hay, oats, or potatoes &c., 3d.; handcart, handsled, or wheelbarrow, 2d.; barrel, 1d.; bag, containing two bushels, 1d.; firkin, keg, or box not larger than a firkin, 1d.; cask of lime, 3d.; pipe, hogshead, or puncheon, 9d.; hundred weight of iron, steel, copper, lead, &c., 1 1-2d. All other articles not enumerated, to be charged in the same ratio.

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES.

Every Load not exceeding 1000 lbs. weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional cwt.; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES.—For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, 1s.; and for every passenger exceeding one, 6d. additional; and if any driver of any Carriage or other vehicle, shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passengers by the hour, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz:—For any time not exceeding half an hour, 1s. 3d.; and in that proportion for every half hour that such Carriage, or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the Ferry to Charlestown, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferrriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

MARKET TOLLS.—Beef, per quarter, 2d.; Calf, Sheep, Hog, Goat, Lamb, Kid, or Shoat, 2d.; Tub, Pail or Jar of Butter, 1½d.; Firkin, 3d.; every 10 lbs. of Roll Butter, 1d.; Cheese, ½d.; load of Potatoes under 15 bushels, 3d.; ditto over 15 bushels, 6d.; load of Oysters in shell or tub, 6d.; Turkey, Goose, or dozen of Pigeons, ½d.; pair of Ducks, Fowls or Partridges, ½d.; bag of Flour, Meal, Oats, Peas, or Beans, ½d.; Ham or Shoulder, ½d.; Eggs, per 10 dozen, ½d.; and all other articles in like proportion.

FISH-MARKET DUES.—For every Salmon, 1½d.; Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each ½d.; Halibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 1d.; exceeding 20 lbs. and for every 20 lbs., 1d.; every Lobster, ½d.; dozen of Haddock, 1½d.; every 100 of Gaspereaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 1½d.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS—(near St. John.)

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

AGRICULTURAL.

AGRICULTURE IN NEW-BRUNSWICK.—During the year 1851, there was raised in this Province no less than 225,033 tons of hay; 206,635 bushels of wheat; 74,300 bushels of barley; 1,411,164 bushels oats; 689,001 bushels buckwheat; 62,225 bushels Indian corn; 42,663 bushels pease and beans; 589,803 bushels turnips; 2,792,394 bushels potatoes, and 47,880 bushels of other roots.

APPLYING MANURE.—The following excellent practice is described by a correspondent of the Journal of Agriculture. We have often insisted on the importance of thorough intermixture with the soil, and are glad to see it reduced to practice. "I take much pains to spread the manure as evenly as possible, and harrow it thoroughly with a heavy iron-tooth harrow, first lengthwise and then crosswise the furrow, until the soil is well pulverized and the manure thoroughly incorporated with it." The same writer also remarks, "My manure is under cover during winter, and I am satisfied it is worth nearly double for being housed."

GUANO.—It is said that the amount of guano annually consumed in Great Britain for the last five years, has cost two millions sterling, or about ten millions of dollars—more than equal yearly, to the cost of the Erie canal till its first completion. In addition, great quantities of lime, bones, shells, and immense piles of yard manure have been applied to the land.

"GENTLEMEN," said Lord Palmerston at the Royal Agricultural dinner, "I have heard a definition of dirt. I have heard it said that dirt is nothing but a thing in the wrong place. (Hear, and laughter.) Now, the dirt of our towns precisely corresponds with that definition. (Hear.) The dirt of our towns ought to be upon our fields, and if there could be such a reciprocal community of interest between the country and the towns—that the country should purify the towns, and the towns should fertilize the country—(laughter)—I am much disposed to think the British farmer would care less than he does, though he still might care something, for Peruvian guano."

MOISTURE BY DEEP PLOUGHING.—P. Morris says in the Farm Journal, that he broke up a stiff sod for corn, with a heavy plough drawn by four oxen. A subsoil plough followed, running down six or seven inches deeper. The whole work was so thoroughly performed, that a stick could be thrust down into the loose earth in almost any part of the field, to a depth of fifteen inches. The summer was excessively dry, pastures were burnt and bare, and tillage crops suffered severely. But the corn on the subsoiled land continued green and luxuriant throughout the season.

FOOD FOR SICK ANIMALS.—The American Vet. Journal states that an excellent diet for sick animals, is simply *scalded shorts*. When a horse has taken cold, with discharge from the nostrils, the *mash* may be put into the manger while hot, with a view of steaming the nasal passages.

TO KILL APHIDES IN A GREEN-HOUSE.—The Gardener's Chronicle gives the following:—Take a sheet of touch paper, roll an ounce of tobacco in it, light it at both ends, put it in the house, leave it there, remain out-side with your hands in your pockets, and the job is done. "In the morning all the green flies will be dead."

LARGE EGG.—We frequently see notices of large eggs, and doubts expressed of the production of equals in weight and size. The largest measure from $6\frac{1}{2}$ to $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches in circumference, none rivalling the egg laid by a hen of Mr. Hough, of this town, which, although not perfectly formed, measured $8\frac{1}{2}$ by 9 inches, besides containing a perfect one of about the same dimensions given of other eggs. This hen excites the jealousy of the whole tribe.—*Westfield Standard.*

A PRACTICAL WRITER—Every intelligent farmer knows perhaps that one of the best and most complete books ever written on agriculture, is Stephens' Book of the Farm. The reviewer of this work in the English Journal of Agriculture, gives a little insight into the reason of this superiority, by informing us that besides his eminent scientific knowledge and a remarkable facility for popular writing, the author has been in the habit of sowing, stacking, feeding the threshing mill, sowing grain and grass seed, grooming his own horse, guiding the plough, all with his own hands; and that in fact "the only operation that a farm laborer has to do, that Mr. Stephens cannot do well, is riddling corn."

WATER IN BEETS.—According to Dr. Salisbury's analysis, the fresh roots of the turnip-beet contain about 98 per cent. of water, or thirteen-fourteenths, and the fresh tops about 80 per cent. This is a larger proportion than is found in the parsnip or carrot.

REDUCING BONES FOR MANURE.—The American Farmer gives the following method of reducing crushed bones without sulphuric acid. Mix two bushels of ashes and one of salt, with each bushel of crushed bones; moisten the bones first, and leave the whole in pie four or five weeks before using the mixture, shovelling it over two or three times during that period.

SALT AS MANURE.—The Editor of the American Farmer, says he has tried lime and salt, broadcast, upon part of a field of corn, the remainder of the field being treated with lime alone. Both parts had been well manured; and yielded well: but the part salted continued moist throughout the season, the other suffered much from drouth. He does not state the quantity applied. He thinks it would be an excellent dressing for grass lands.

On the last evening of the old year, among the Chinese, all tradesmen's bills and small debts are paid: This is perhaps the reason why it is called—*Choo Seih*—the evening of dismissal.

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RURAL AXIOMS.—It is as cheap to raise one ton of grass or clover, as a ton of burdocks or pig-weeds.

It costs no more to raise a hundred bushels of Baldwins than a hundred bushels of cider apples; or ten barrels of Virgalieus or Bartlett's than the same quantity of choke pears.

An axe costing two dollars, with which a laborer may cut fifty cords a month is a cheaper tool than an axe costing but one dollar, and with which he can cut only forty cords.

A "cheap plough" at five dollars, costing in one season three dollars in repairs, and three more in lost time to teams, men, and by retarding crops, is a dearer plough than one at ten dollars requiring no repairs.

A cow bought for ten dollars, whose milk but just pays her keeping, affords less profit than one at thirty dollars, giving double the value of milk afforded by the former.

A common dasher churn at two dollars, used one hundred times a year, is not so economical a purchase, as a Kendall churn at four dollars, requiring but half the labor to work it.

A ten-acre field, costing fifty dollars, per acre, and ditched, manured, and improved at fifty dollars more, so as to give double crops, is much more valuable and profitable than twenty acres unimproved, costing the same money.

The laborer who wastes half his strength in working all day with a dull saw, because he cannot give a shilling or afford half an hour to get it sharpened, will waste at least twenty-five cents per day, or \$6 or \$7 per month.---The man who loses half an hour of time, worth one shilling,—and wears his wagon and team equal to two shillings more, by going over a long and rough road, to avoid a plank-road toll of sixpence loses just two shillings and sixpence by the operation. This does not apply to the loaded wagon, where the loss is much greater from the smaller loads.

CARROTS FOR HORSES.—Horses that have a hard, dry cough, or that have the heaves, are remarkably relieved by moderate and regular feedings of carrots. A horse of our own had once caught such a cold, that his cough might be heard half a mile; he was fed on carrots and green clover, kept sufficiently blanketed, never heated, and in six weeks was entirely well.

LICE ON COLTS ---It is said that horses become lousy from hens, when the roost is too near the stable. It is worthy of inquiry whether they are infested by other species of lice, requiring different treatment. A skilful agricultural friend informs us that he has found two remedies effectual for this difficulty; the first, washing the animal in a decoction of tobacco, which needs repeating two or three times to be complete; and secondly rubbing dry ashes all through the hair, and then turning the animal out in a rain storm; this is a rather sharp remedy, destroying a part of the hair. Cole, in his "Diseases of Animals," says that horses badly infested have been at once relieved by soaking all over in "new rum." The removal of all litter which may contain lice, whitewashing, washing and oiling harness, must not be overlooked, in connection with the remedies.

TO FARMERS—A HINT.—The writer of these remarks was once a farmer's boy, and speaks from experience when he recommends all farmers' sons to keep a daily register of every thing interesting coming under their observation, relative to their business. The time of planting or sowing crops, with the results of late or early planting appended; the effects of any peculiar mode of manuring; the benefit or detriment from thick or thin sowing; the kind of seed; the time and manner of harvesting; the results of draining, of deep or shallow ploughing, and of numerous other matters, and especially including the cost and profits of each crop, if accurately recorded, would not fail to yield a great deal of interest as well as usefulness. The time of the appearance of birds, insects, the flowering and fruiting of trees, or anything else in relation to nature and its productions, would assist very much the acquirement of knowledge on these subjects, if made a matter of record. I am sure it would be a delightful employment, both at the time, and by its examination afterwards.

Now, all that is necessary is to get a small blank book, with a flexible leather cover, which may be had for a little at any book or stationary store, and rule each page into two columns, the first for the record of planting, sowing, and all other operations during their earlier stages; and the second column for the registry of the results, directly opposite, on the same page. By comparing these results with the operations which produced them, a great deal of valuable practical knowledge would soon be obtained.

Another advantage might result from this practice. When any operation was deferred till too late, and loss was occasioned thereby, make a memorandum of this fact at the proper place in the second column, by the examination of which, the second year, this difficulty might be avoided. Many failures occur from a want of seasonable attention; such a journal would therefore leave an excellent memorandum book to refer to daily the second year, or any other year afterwards, to remind one of what must be done at the time.

Would not this be worth a thousand times its cost, by way of making accurate, intelligent, practical and successful farmers, of lads and young men in the country, besides improving their knowledge of writing?

MULCHING POTATOES ---For the purpose of directing attention to the subject in season, and inducing the trial of experiments, we give the substance of a mode of raising potatoes described in the *Plough, Loom and Anvil*, as performed by three different farmers, by mulching copiously with straw. The land, prepared as usual, having a level surface, and straw then applied six inches deep. The straw kept the surface moist and mellow throughout a prolonged drouth, and the crop was 300 bushels per acre, the tubers being of the finest quality, although potatoes were generally nearly destroyed by rot. "What struck us as a peculiarity," says the editor, "was their singular smoothness, being quite as much so as apples. Mr. Sommers laid his potato cuttings upon unploughed, unprepared ground, merely covering them with straw, and his crop we are informed, was fully equal to Mr. Skinner's."

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SAVING MANURE.—The Michigan Farmer gives the practice of a Scotch farmer, in the saving and management of his manure, which we cannot but regard as eminently economical of its fertilizing qualities, and worthy of general adoption except in the depth of winter, when it may be delayed. To prevent dissipation by evaporation and washing, he draws it away as fast as it is thrown from the stable, piles it up in some convenient place on the farm, first placing a layer of the fresh manure, to a depth of 8 or 10 inches, then a layer of common soil about four inches thick, which presses the course down to about the same thickness, then another layer of manure, which in like manner is followed by another layer of earth, and so on till the pile is completed. In this way the volatile portions are preserved, and he asserts the manure is of double value to what it would have been lying in the yard.

RECLAIMING SWAMPS.—The Editor of the Michigan Farmer, says, that the application of 25 loads of clay per acre, to drained swamp, produced a wonderful effect in fitting it for wheat, in an experiment he witnessed in England. Clayed and unclayed, were both treated with guano; but while the clayed portion was as high as his head, stood thick, with long heads, the other presented only the appearance of ordinary wheat.

BORERS.—*A Sure Prevention against their Injuring Trees.* Take a sheet of common brown paper and pass it round the tree, quite down to the ground; this must be done by the 15th or 20th of June, before the eggs are deposited; draw up a little earth so the insect cannot deposit eggs below the paper, and if the tree is rough, scrape off the rough bark. No danger of injuring the tree, as in good time the paper will drop off of itself. I have used this prevention for years, and I have never known it to fail to keep the borer from injuring the tree. One foot width of paper is sufficient.—*New England Farmer.*

GARDEN WALKS.—The growth of weeds in gravel walks has been securely prevented, by forming a solid bottom beneath the gravel, of marl and coarse gravel or small stones, rammed down hard, and through which no weeds or grass can penetrate.

MAXIM FOR THE YOUNG.—Keep good company or none.

WEANING AND REARING CALVES.—An English farmer weaned and reared on his farm of ten cows, ten heifer calves, by the following method:—At three days old, they were taken from the cows, put into a shed and fed with skimmed milk, allowing three quarts to each calf, morning and evening. When they were a month old, they were fed with a like quantity of milk and water, morning and evening, with hay to feed on in the day-time; at noon, they were fed with a little oats and bran equally mixed, allowing half a peck to a dozen calves. At two months old, they were fed only in the morning with milk and water; they had hay to feed on in the day-time; and at evening instead of noon, had the same quantity of bran and oats, with water to drink. They were fed in this manner until the middle of April, when they were turned to grass all day, and taken into a shed at evening, and fed with hay until there was plenty of grass and the weather grew warm. Such of the calves as were weaned in March, were confined to be fed with milk and water every morning until midsummer. All of them were in good health and condition; and the society allowed the premium offered on that head the year before.

LIVE AND DEAD WEIGHT OF HOGS.—Samuel Linn, of Ohio, states in the Patent Office Report, that he thinks one-sixth, (instead of one-fifth, the common rule,) is about the true estimate of the difference between live and dead weight. A hog weighing alive 242 lbs., weighed when dressed, 202 lbs., a loss of one-sixth. Doubtless the breed would affect the result; a big-headed, heavy-legged race, might give a different result from those specimens of neatness, the Suffolks and Berkshires.

HEN ROOSTS IN CONNEXION WITH HORSE STABLES.—The practice of allowing fowls to roost in the same apartments with horses, though followed by some farmers, ought to be discontinued. A correspondent states in the *Rural New Yorker*, that he had a horse become covered with "hen lice" from fowls roosting near the stall. The animal was seriously injured before the cause of the trouble was ascertained. He rubbed out his mane and tail, and was continually biting himself, to obtain relief. The lice may be killed by tobacco water, sulphur, or oil.

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MISCELLANEOUS.

LAW OF HEALTH—Children should be taught to use the left hand as well as the right.

Coarse bread is much better for children than fine.

Children should sleep in separate beds, and should not wear night caps.

Children under seven years should not be confined over six or seven hours in the house, and that time should be broken by frequent recesses.

Children and young people must be made to hold their heads up and their shoulders back while sitting, standing or walking.

The best beds for children are of hair, or in winter, of hair and cotton.

Young persons should walk at least two hours a day in the open air.

Young ladies should be prevented from bandaging the chest. We have known three cases of insanity terminating in death, which began in this practice.

Every person, great and small, should wash all over in cold water every morning.

The more clothing we wear, other things being equal, the less food we need.

From one to one pound and a half of solid food is sufficient for a person in the ordinary vocations of business. Persons in sedentary employments should drop one third of their food, and they will escape dyspepsia.

Young people and others cannot study much by lamplight with impunity.

The best remedy for eyes weakened by night use, is a fine stream of cold water frequently applied to them.—*London Lancet.*

A DOG STORY.—The following dog story will do to pass around. We find it in a country paper, without credit:

Pat is just one of the greatest dogs out: strong as a lion, but gentle as a lamb. He leaves nothing alive upon which he is fairly "set," but he would not ruffle the feathers of the smallest chicken unbidden, for his right paw. He will draw the children in a cart, as long as he can drag himself, and never utter a word of complaint; but woe betide the being who comes within his reach when duty calls him to a sterner mood. He will carry and fetch anything entrusted to him, and make himself generally useful in the way of errand going. He divides his time between one of our neighbors and a farm a mile off, and he saves many a journey back and forth to those who would make more fuss about it. The other day he was sent to the farm for a basket of eggs; it was observed that he did not come home as promptly as usual, but the circumstance excited no special attention. He came in at last, looking as if nothing at all had happened. He was glad to see the folks, and appeared much at his ease, and perfectly satisfied with himself, with no goad of conscience to mar his happiness. In the midst of his apparent happiness, however, he was inter-

rupted with the inquiry, "Pat, where are your eggs?" His tail fell sixty degrees instantly, and with a look perfectly intelligible, he turned away, and was off. Going to a pile of timber not far from the place, he found his basket of eggs, and bringing them home, made the best apology a dog could make, and gave them into the hands of his mistress.

On inquiry, it was ascertained that on his way home he met some other dogs, and feeling a little social, he put his eggs in a safe place, and stopped for a social chat with his friends, and finally went home, forgetting his basket of eggs. We believe this is the first instance in which a dog has been known to have forgotten anything.

PUNCTUALITY.—Few are aware how much time is lost by a want of punctuality. Twenty men meet together for business, detained fifteen minutes by the slack-twisted habits of one, lose in all no less than *five hours* of time—a donation which they have to make usually with no thanks, or a very faint and flippant apology. A celebrated Frenchman, employed in arduous official duties, found that his wife was habitually ten minutes too late in coming to dinner. He found the difficulty incurable; and therefore determined to write a book. "He fixed on his subject, thought of it during his walk to and from home, wrote during these ten minutes every day and no longer, and in the course of a couple of years published one of the most able books of the age."

GUARDING AGAINST VULGAR LANGUAGE. There is as much connexion between the words and thoughts, as there is between the thoughts and words; the latter are not only the expressions of the former, but they have the power to react upon the soul, and leave the stain of their corruption there. A young man who allows himself to use one profane or vulgar word, has not only shown that there is a foul spot on his mind, but by the utterance of that word he extends that spot and inflames it, till, by indulgence, it will soon pollute and ruin the whole soul. Be careful of your words, as well as your thoughts. If you can control the tongue, that no improper words are pronounced by it, you will soon be able to control the mind and save that from corruption. You extinguish the fire by smothering it, or by preventing bad thoughts bursting out in language. Never utter a word any where which you would be ashamed to speak in the presence of the most refined female or the most religious man.

INORDINATE EXPENDITURE is the cause of a great share of the crime and consequent misery which devastate the world. The clerk who spends more than he earns, is fast qualifying himself for a gambler and a thief; the trader or mechanic who overruns his income, is very certain to become in time a trickster and a cheat. Wherever you see a man spending faster than he earns, there look out for villainy to be developed, though it be the furthest thing from his present thought.

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NUTRIMENT OF FOOD.—The parts of food, whence nourishment is derived, consist of gelatine, albumen, and the saccharine matter. Duvy has pointed out from his own analysis, the quantity of nutritive matter contained in various seeds, roots and grasses, used as food for man and beast. It appears from this, that the best wheat contains ninety-five parts of nutritive matter in one hundred; good barley, ninety-two; rye, seventy-nine; oats, seventy-four; peas and beans, fifty-seven; potatoes, twenty-five; beets, fourteen; carrots, nine; turnips, from four to six; clover, four; flurin, six; and, other grasses from two to five. Wheat weighs sixty pounds to the bushel, and turnips about forty. Thus, it would seem, that as much nourishment is to be derived from one bushel of wheat, as from about twenty-seven of turnips. This however, is not the case. For what is called the *stimulous*, produced by distension, must be taken into the account, in forming a proper estimate of the effects produced, in supporting life, by any kind of food; and it is on this account that, perhaps, fourteen bushels of turnips, particularly when boiled, would sustain life as long, or fatten as much, as one bushel of wheat.

RAILROADS IN GREAT BRITAIN.—The total length of Railroads open and in use in Great Britain, on the 1st of January, 1851, was 6,621 miles; authorized and in course of construction, 5,382 miles; giving a total of 12,003 miles. Total number of persons employed on Railroads, open and unopen, 11,859. Number of passengers conveyed on railroads in the half-year ending December 30, 1850, 41,087,919.

RAILROADS IN THE UNITED STATES.—The number of Railroads in operation in the United States, on the first of January, 1852, was 263, measuring 11,565 miles in length, and constructed at an estimated cost of more than \$300,000,000. The number of Railroads in course of construction was 74, measuring 11,228 miles. Total number of Railroads 337, and total number of miles in operation, and in course of construction, 22,893.

POST OFFICE IN GREAT BRITAIN.—The gross receipts of the year ending January 5, 1851, was 11,323,420 dollars; net cost of management, 7,303,925 dollars; net revenue 4,019,490 dollars. The estimated total number of letters in 1850, was 348,069 orders; number of letters, 4,439,713, and the amount of them, 42,472,490 dollars.

A TABLE
For Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year forever.

FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the *wind* is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good *vane*, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

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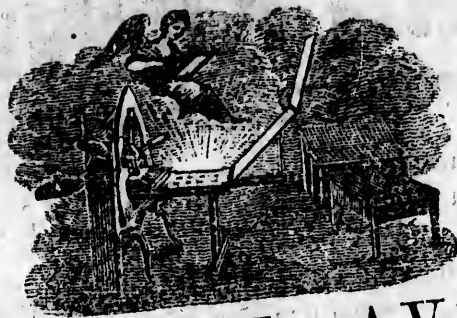
