ANOTHER CUT IN PRICES. Latest Move by American Sugar Re-fining Company Against Beet Sugar Industry.

(Associated Press.)

San Francisco, Oct. 8.—Another aggressive move has been made by the American Sugar Refining Co. in the campaign it has begun against the beetsugar industry. The cut-in the price of granulated sugar to all Missouri river points, which was announced last week, las been followed by a reduction in the price of cane sugar in all states from Colorado to California. The reduction,

price of cane sugar in all states from Colorado to California. The reduction, as announced by the Western Sugar Refining Company, amounts to 30 cents a hundred on cane sugar, and 20 cents a hundred on cane sugar.

Bobert Oxnard, vice-president of the American Beet Sugar Association, in speaking about the latest reduction, said: "It is a fact that the Western Sugar Refining Company has made a decline of 20 cents per hundred on their cane sugars and 30 cents on their beet sugars. This makes the difference in their price between cane granulated and beet granulated 20 points instead of 10 points, as heretofore. The cut affects all markets from California to Colorado inclusive. A writer points out that it is not known precisely when or where they originated; but the annals plainly show that in ancient times the priests in Egypt and Rome, who practiced as physicians and surgeons, made artificial eyes, hands, arms, and legs—the Egyptians as early as 500 R.C.

Their method of eye-making is thus described; On the centre of a piece of flesh-colored prepared linen, two and a quarter, the flat side of a piece of (earthenware, modelled life-size and painted to represent, the human eye and eyelids, was cemented; and this linen, coated on the other side with an adhesive substance, was placed over the eye and pressed down.

These artificial, eyes were therefore worn outside the cavity, and, though not strictly artistic in design or detail, wern no doubt fully uppreciated and worn with pride by the monocular Egyptian and Roman 'toffs.' It is chronicled that one of these artificial eyes was picked up in the ruins of Pompleii, which was destroyed in 79 A. D.

The enflest known mention of modern artificial eyes—that is, eyes worn inside the orbit—occurs in an exceedingly rare illustrated work on surgery, written—by a French surgeon named Ambrose Pare, and published in Paris in 1561.

Pare invented three artificial eyes, The first was a wonderful contrivance, It consisted of a thin metal spring band, which passed half way round the wear er's head, having on one end a small oval plate, which evered the orbit of the eye, and the other end pressed against the back of the head.

The oval plate was covered with smooth soft leather, on which an eye was painted! It would, perhaps, be difficult to devise anything more inclegant or uncomfortable.

The second device was a hollow globe of rold, eye-shaped and enamelled, which

comfortable.

The second device was a hollow globe of gold, eye-shaped and enamelled, which was worn inside the socket—the first recorded artificial eye thus worn.

The third contrivance was simply a "shell-pattern" eye, exactly similar in shape to those now used, but made of gold and enamelled. Except that they were made of gold and enamelled, the two latter were practically of the same design as the "globe" and "shell" glass eyes of the present day.

TWO WERE PASSED BY THE TUGBOAT LORNE

Those now, with one exception, come from the Copper island coast, and brought no news of the fleet in the Sea.
