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

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Summary of the conference between leading Lithuanian political personalities abroad and the members of the Lithuanian underground momenent.

A conference was held on July 7-9 1948 in Baden-Baden, Germany between leading Lithuanian political personalities abroad and the members of the Lithuanian underground movement, regarding the progress of the latter in enemy-occupied country.

- The political movement at the conference was represented by:

 1. Professor Mykolas RRUPAVIOIUS, leader of the inthushism Christian-Democratic Party and chairman of the Suprese Committee of Lithuanian Liberation, leading Lithuanian Political Body abroad.
 - Mr. Vaclovas BIDZIKAUSKAS, leader of the Lithuanian Peasant Party and chairman of the axecutive Council of the 8.0. or b.L.
 - Professor Juoses KANINSKAS, leader of the Lithmanian Social-Democratio Party and deputy-chairman of the keoutive Council.
 - 4. Professor Juoses BRAZAITIS, leader of the Young Christian Democratic Movement and Director General of the Lithuanian Information Service Abroau.

The Lithuanian Underground Movement was represented by:

- Mr. Jonas DEKSHYS, the representative of the Lithuanian Underground Movement Abroadi sember of the Supreme Committee of Lithuanian Restoration, the supreme legislative organ of the Lithuanian Resistance Movement, and mamber of the presiding of the Joint Lithuanian Democratical Resistance Movement, chief executive body of the Lithuanian Resistance Movement.

a The conference was opened by Professor M. KRUPAVICIUS. Mr. E. KAMINSKAS, by virtue of seniority, was appointed chairman of the conference. Professor J. BRAZAITIS and Mr. SAMPAJAUJIS, who attended the nonference as guest from Stootholm, were called up to the secretariship war mare Badin Brain Chiquest -

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It was agreed that the conference was to be fully represented by authorised representatives of both the Lithusnian political movement abroad and the Lithuarian underground movement. All agreements reached at the conference must be presented ad referendum to both parties concerned.

II Internal Information

The following conclusions were arrived at after the reading the reports by Mr. J. DEESHYS and Mr. SERAJUHAS:

- Strong passive and armed resistance against the enemy continues in the occupied countries.
- The resistance movement receives the moral and practical support of no less than 90% of the whole population.
- The Lithuanian Resistance Movement is well centralised. It is controlled by the presidium of JDLRM (in Lithuanian, it is the BDPS.
- The principal task of the Lithuanian Resistance meanwhile is to conserve the moral, physical and economical power of the nation.

Further conclusions were madet

- 1. The Communist occupation engenders great loss to the Lithuanians.
- 2. The time factor does not favor the Lithusnians.
- 5. Of a certainty there exists high resolve, national unity and a strong pro-Western feeling.

the SO of LL and its executive council and its successful achievement of political unity among all Lithuanians abroad; its ecoperation with the Lithuanian diplomatic representatives, particularly those in the U.S., Great Britain and the Vatioan, as well as home Lithuanians in the United States who are acting through the lithuanians in the United States who are acting through the lithuanians in the United States who are acting through the lithuanians. Mr. DEKSHYS agreed in principle re the necessity of united leadership. The resistance movement might recognize political organs abroad but would retain the right to reorganise all organs of the free Lithuanian State when the time arrived.

Apropos of the world situation, Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS made the following observations re Lithuania's role:

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- 1. The first objective had been to discredit the Lithuanian annexation and prevent its recognition by the Western Democracies. This is felt to have been successfully achieved.
- 2. Secondly, we must attempt to obtain recognition of the Lithuanian Government-in-exile.
- 5. In the tense situation of the world, we must be prepared to work actively and with a singleness of purpose, both at home and abroad, for the liberation of our nation.

The chairman asked Mr. Dekenys and Mr. Skrajunas for their views on the world situation as seen from the Lithuanian point of view. There is a strong leaning towards the western powers. In the country the oppressed people naturally hope for quick and radical changes. However, the resistance leaders endeavor to prepare the nation for longer occupation, but at the same time keep them in readiness for all emergencies.



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1. Relationship with Gen. PIECHAVICIUS: On the 25th and 26th of July, PIECHAVICIUS informed us that in compliance with our request for two suitable couriers (Ref: MGM-A-1382 Part IV Para 1), he had been successful in locating such individuals. At the same time the General stated that unless proper arrangements were made by the 9th of August, for his family's emigration, with the understanding that he remains to work with us, he would be forced to concentrate on his own individual problems pertaining to emigration to the URA. Our numerous telegrams requesting additional data on the two possible couriers brought negative results, and finally on 12 August FIECHAVICIUS informed us that he was at IRO Transit Camp near Epemen, with departure imminent from day to day. (Note: A check through the Munich Consulate revealed that PIECHAVICIUS' ID status was being examined and that if allowed to proceed with emigration there would be at least a two week delay. We did not, however, inform the General of this.) Upon establishing telephone contact with the General at the eamp, PIECHAVICIUS stated that in view of the circumstances he could not see how the couriers could be contacted at this late date as the individuals concerned were "personally loyal to me and would accept no orders from the politicians". By the "politicians" the General was referring to Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS. As the situation appeared to be rather hopeless we agreed that the General proceed with his emigration and that we would contact him in the USA at the residence of his sponsor, Pijus/ZIURIS, 32160 West Lege Road, Avon Lake, Oleveland, Ohio. The Individual contacting him would introduce himself as, "A friend of Mr. Hans SCHMIDT of Munich".

August the undersigned and I proved the Tuebingen for a conference with SIDZIKAUSKAS. This was the case officer's initial meeting with SIDZIKAUSKAS, the first contact having been established by Merrill (Ref: MGM-A-1415). SIDZIKAUSKAS made a very favorable impression and it is our opinion that we would encounter no difficulties in our planned cooperation. SIDZIKAUSKAS is apparently fully aware of the fact that propaganda and clandestine political activity in Lithuania is entirely dependent upon the development of operational lines of communication as well as the penetration of Soviet security organs for the protection of such operations. SIDZIKAUSKAS was accompanied at the interview by Prof. Juozas BRAZAITIS, Chief of the Propaganda Section, and, under the proposed reorganization of the Executive Committee, Consultant on Foreign Affairs. Pertinent facts of the conference are summarized below:

a. Successor to PLECHAVICIUS: SIDZIKAUSKAS stated that PLECHAVICIUS was invited to attend a meeting of the Executive. Committee on 8 August, but was unable to come from Bremen. SIDZIKAUSKAS did not believe, however, that PLECHAVICIUS was nabbolutely essential to the planned operations, and discounted any references to the General's absolute personal hold over any individuals or over the Lithuanian underground. VLIK is the government-in-cliff recognized by practically all Lithuanians abroad as well as by the underground, and no one individual could be considered as indispensible.

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to such an organization. As to the possible return of PLECHAVICIUS from the States, SIDZIKAUSKAS preferred to leave the question open he was about to interview a likely successor. Lithuasian opened Staff Col. Antines MUIOVA (BOVA) who is presently residing in a camp at Mittenwalden. Until such time as a suitable successor is found, our operational talks will continue to be with SIDZIKAUSKAS personally.

b. Couriers: The two couriers to which PLECHAVICIUS
apparently made reference have been lessted by SIDZIKAUSKAS.
SIDZIKAUSKAS had a chance to interview only one of them at this
time. Subject is Kestutin'MICKAYICIUS, a former MOO of the
Lithusnian army, approximately 28 years of age, now employed by a
Lator Compuny at Mohringen, near Stuttgart. During the war
MICKAYICIUS received a wound which incapacitated him sexually, and
which may partially explain his motivation for offering his life
for his country, if meed by. The other prospect is one Antanas
SIEPAMAYICIUS, a Uwenty-eight year old bachelor currently Employed
by a Labor Company at Bamberg. Both individuals are now being
investigated by SIDZIKAUSKAS and upon the successful conclusion of
their investigation will be made available to us. It was made
clear that though we will conduct an independent investigation of
any individuals recommended by VIIK, we will hold the Executive
Committee directly responsible for the trustworthiness and security
of such individuals. BIDZIKAUSKAS promised to bring additional
details on the two couriers for our next schefuled meeting. It is
now obvious that such couriers could not possibly be adequately
trained for any operations scheduled to take place this September
or October. As for the three couriers now in France, we informed
SIDZIKAUSKAS that we were willing to accept them for future use if,
in his opinion, the individuals concerned would continue allegiance
to VLIK rather than to the Franch IS who trained them. BIDZIKAUSKAS
said that he had no doubt as to their loyalty to VLIK and agreed
to make a trip to Paris, sometime during September, for the purpose
of recovering these couriers. He was told that in view of the fact
this was definitely an operational trip for our mutual benefit, we
would reimburse his legitimate expenses. SIDZIKAUSKAS was most

- c. Feorganization of the Executive Committee: In order to cut down on VLIK's overall expenses, it was proposed by Lithusnian leaders that the Executive Committee be reduced from the present 16 members to five, or six. This matter was presented in a macting of the Committee which was held on 9 August. A tentative agreement was reached with the appointment of the following:
 - (1) Monseignetr Mykoles ERUPAVICIUS, Chairman both of the Executive Committee and of the VLIK.
 - (2) Vacys SIDZIKAUSKAS, Chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee with KRUPAVICIUS and BRAZAITIS as the

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other two members. SIDEIXAUSKAS will also be Chief of the Secret Section, i.e., Col. SHOVA, PLECHAVICIUS's probable successor; will be made Pesponsible to BIDZIXAUSKAS.

- ()) Prof. Juoses BRAZAITIS, Chief of Propaganda Sestion and member of the Spreign Affairs Committee.
- (4) Prof. Juozas KANTERKAR, Chief of Planning for Recognic Reconstruction of Lithuania.
- (5) Belys CAIDZITHAS, Information and Propaganda.
- (6) Bronius/BIELIUKAS, Financial Section.

The above is only a provisional agreement made within the Executive Committee and must be submitted to the VLIK assembly for confirmation, BIDZIKAUSKAS, himself, does not appear to be too happy about the arrangement. He believes that due to his previous service, as well as his recent services in going to Washington, he should be given a greater role than Chairman of Foreign Affairs Committee together with ERUPAVICIUS and BRAZAITIS. The problem appears to be to keep the Executive Committee as representative as possible of all elements and at the same time cut/it down to five or six individuals.

d. Position of LOZORAITIST From a lengthy conversation with SIDZIKAUSKAS on the subject of the position occupied by LOZORAITIS, we have a definite impression that between the Executive Committee of VLIK and LOZORAITIS there is somewhat of a feud and a certain amount of jockeying for power. According to SIDZIKAUSKAS, the former Presiden of Lithuania, Mr. (SMETON), while on his way to the United States and exile, delivered a letter to LOZORAITIS in Bern maming him Prime Minister of the Lithuanian Government—in—Exile, in case something happened to SMETONA. As this appointment was made in exile and not submitted to the Lithuanian Congress, it was rejected by the majority of the VLIK representatives. Nevertheless LOZORAITIS is held in a "special category" for the possible eventuality that a day might come when one of the great powers would call for the restoration of the "legitimate constitutional power". LOZORAITIS' aspirations are supported in VLIK by the extreme rightist Nationalist Perty which under SMETONA was actually a dictatorship and which SIDZIKAUSKAS believes would be rejected by the majority of the Lithuanian people. In the United States LOZORAITIS is sup orted by the Nationalist Perty elements within the American—Lithuanian Council with headquarters in Chicago. LOZORAITIS has been invited to come to Germany and take an active part in the VLIK; he has, however, consistently refused to emigrate from his rather comfortable life in Rome, where he holds no official position since his former post is now occupied by Stasys (GIRDVAINIS, the Lithuanian Minister

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to the Vatican. Within the past few months, LOZORAITIB, on his nown initiative and outside of VLIK channels, contacted Jones of initiative and persuaded him to take a message to the Elimuanian underground requesting their confirmation of EMETONA's appointment of LOZORAITIB as Prime Minister of Lithuania. According to the "most recent communication requived from Lithuania", as reported by DEKSNYS' fellow courier MAUDRONIS! MEMBNYB failed in his mission for LOZORAITIS, and the underground leaders took a very dim view of his efforts to bypass VLIK on behalf of LOZORAITIS.

recollection is that SIDZIKAUSKAS said the information same from the Lithuanian underground radio via Sweden. SIDZIKAUSKAS further said that the couriers who are now in Paris reported that LOZORAITIS is unknown in Lithuania and consequently has no following there.

In fact there is a possibility that DEKSNYS will consequently not be ellowed to leave Lithuania. SIDZIKAUSKAS states that he considers this latest development to be a "serious incident" between VLIK and LOZORATTIS. As for DEKSNYS action in accepting the message without informing VLIK, SIDZIKAUSKAS believes that DEKNYS was playing both ends against the middle, i.e., if the underground escepted LOZORAITIS, that would be fine, but if they refused, he would be still a VLIK man. SIDZIKAUSKAS firmly believes that the underground would not accept any man not identified by VLIK, and therefore excludes the possibility that LOZORAITIS could engage im any successful operational activities of his own.

e. Current Procurement of Information on USSR: This rather delicate question was put to SIDZIKAUSKAS in an "innocent manner" and without any great expectations, at this early stage, of receiving any detailed answer. BIDZIKAUSKAS stated that a great deal of their information about Lithuania has been coming from their subordinate units in Sweden, which, however, are so distant from VLIK headquarters in Germany that they can not be supervised efficiently. They are therefore engaged in many "on the spot" deals with representatives of Swedish, British, and American I.S. It would be preferable to establish direct communications, by-passing Sweden entirely. Highly important information has been reaching VLIK "vie diplomatic Ohannels from Moscow and Warsaw". A few weeks age word has been received that a courier for the first time in years arrived in warsaw from Lithuania. The courier is now in Warsaw and they do not know exactly how to get him to the U.S. Zone of Occupation in Cermany. They received news of the courier's arrival also "through diplomatic channels". SIDZIKAUSKAS claims that the underground has successfully penetrated the Central Committee of the Lithuanian SSR, and even have a good "friend in Moscow". These matters, however, SIDZIKAUSKAS preferred to discuss at a later time. He has no doubt that with a future expansion of operations and the ability to offer greater

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Resume:

This memorandum reviews and brings up-to-date our negotiations with Gen. PLECHAVICIUS Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS and Prof. BRAZAITIS! PLECHAVICIUS imminent emigration to the States brings to an end our immediate relationship with him, and the question of his successor has been discussed with SIDZIKAUSKAS and is outlined below. Pertinent facts covered in our conference with SIDZIKAUSKAS and BRAZAITIS, Chief of the Propaganda Section and member of the Foreign Affairs Committee, are summarized in the memorandum, and refer to the following topics:

- Possible appointment of Col. SHOVA (SOVA) as PLECHAVICIUS' successor;
- 2. Availability of couriers;
- Reorganization of the Executive Committee; 3.
- Position of LOZORAITIS;
- Current procurement of information;
- 6. Financial arrangements;
- Designation of cover names for overt correspondence; 7.
- Movement of the committee to the U. S. Zone; 8.
- And the request for initiation of Political Propaganda Work.



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- 1. Relationship with Gen. PLECHAVICIUS: On the 25th and 26th of July, PLECHAVICIUS informed us that in compliance with our request for two suitable couriers (Ref: MGM-A-1382 Part IV Para 1), he had been successful in locating such individuals. At the same time the General stated that unless proper arrangements were made by the 9th of August, for his family's emigration, with the understanding that he remains to work with us, he would be forced to concentrate on his own individual problems pertaining to emigration to the USA. Our numerous telegrams requesting additional data on the two possible couriers brought negative results, and finally on 12 August PLECHAVICIUS informed us that he was at IRO Transit Camp near Eremen, with departure imminent from day to day. (Note: A check through the Munich Consulate revealed that PLECHAVICIUS' DP status was being examined and that if allowed to proceed with emigration there would be at least a two week delay. We did not, however, inform the General of this.) Upon establishing telephone contact with the General at the camp, PLECHAVICIUS stated that in view of the circumstances he could not see how the couriers could be contacted at this late date as the individuals concerned were "personally loyal to me and would accept no orders from the politicians". By the "politicians" the General was referring to Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS. As the situation appeared to be rather hopeless we agreed that the General proceed with his emigration and that we would contact him in the USA at the residence of his sponsor, Pijus ZIURIS, 32180 West Lake Road, Avon Lake, Cleveland. Ohio. The individual contacting him would introduce himself as, "A friend of Mr. Hans SCHMIDT of Munich".
- 2. Meeting with SIDZIKAUSKAS and Juozas RAZAITIS: On 18 D proceeded to fuebingen August the undersigned and for a conference with SIDZIKAUSKAS. This was the case officer's initial meeting with SIDZIKAUSKAS, the first contact having been established by Merrill (Ref: MGM-A-1415). SIDZIKAUSKAS made a very favorable impression and it is our opinion that we would encounter no difficulties in our planned cooperation. SIDZIKAUSKAS is apparently fully aware of the fact that propaganda and clandestine political activity in Lithuania is entirely dependent upon the development of operational lines of communication as well as the penetration of Soviet security organs for the protection of such operations. SIDZIKAUSKAS was accompanied at the interview by Prof. Juozas BRAZAITIS, Chief of the Propaganda Section, and, under the proposed reorganization of the Executive Committee, Consultant on Foreign Affairs. Pertinent facts of the conference are summarized below:
- a. Successor to PLECHAVICIUS: SIDZIKAUSKAS stated that PLECHAVICIUS was invited to attend a meeting of the Executive. Committee on 8 August, but was unable to come from Bremen. SIDZIKAUSKAS did not believe, however, that PLECHAVICIUS was not absolutely essential to the planned operations, and discounted any references to the General's absolute personal hold over any individuals or over the Lithuanian underground. VLIK is the government-in-exile recognized by practically all Lithuanians abroad as well as by the underground, and no one individual could be considered as indispensible





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other two members. SIDZIKAUSKAS will also be Chief of the Secret Section, i.e., Col. SHOVA, PLECHAVICIUS's probable successor, will be made responsible to SIDZIKAUSKAS.

- (3) Prof. Juozas BRAZAITIS, Chief of Propaganda Section and member of the Foreign Affairs Committee.
- (4) Prof. Juozas KAVINSKAS, Chief of Planning for Economic Reconstruction of Lithuania.
- (5) Balys GAIDZIYNAS, Information and Propaganda.
- (6) Bronius/BIELIUKAS, Financial Section.

The above is only a provisional agreement made within the Executive Committee and must be submitted to the VLIK assembly for confirmation. SIDZIKAUSKAS, himself, does not appear to be too happy about the arrangement. He believes that due to his previous service, as well as his recent services in going to Washington, he should be given a greater role than Chairman of Foreign Affairs Committee together with KRUPAVICIUS and ERAZAITIS. The problem appears to be to keep the Executive Committee as representative as possible of all elements and at the same time cut/it down to five or six individuals.

Position of LOZORAITIS From a lengthy conversation with SIDZIKAUSKAS on the subject of the position occupied by LOZORAITIS, we have a definite impression that between the Executive Committee of VLIK and LOZORAITIS there is somewhat of a feud and a certain amount of jockeying for power. According to SIDZIKAUSKAS, the former Presiden of Lithuania, Mr. SMETONA, while on his way to the United States and exile, delivered a letter to LOZORAITIS in Bern naming him Prime Minister of the Lithuanian Government-in-Exile. in case something happened to SMETONA. As this appointment was made in exile and not submitted to the Lithuanian Congress, it was rejected by the majority of the VLIK representatives. Nevertheless LOZORAITIS is held in a "special category" for the possible eventuality that a day might come when one of the great powers would call for the restoration of the "legitimate constitutional power". LOZORAITIS' aspirations are supported in VLIK by the extreme rightist Nationalist Party which under SMETONA was actually a dictatorship and which SIDZIKAUSKAS believes would be rejected by the majority of the Lithuanian people. In the United States LOZORAITIS is supported by the Nationalist Party elements within the American-Lithuanian Council with headquarters in Chicago. LOZORAITIS has been invited to come to Germany and take an active part in the VLIK; he has, however, consistently refused to emigrate from his rather comfortable life in Rome, where he holds no, official position since his former post is now occupied by Stasys GIRDVAINIS, the Lithuanian Minister

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to the Vatican. Within the past few months, LOZORAITIS, on his own initiative and outside of VLIK channels, contacted Jonas DEKSNYS in Stockhoms and persuaded him to take a message to the Lithuanian underground requesting their confirmation of SMETONA's appointment of LOZORAITIS as Frime Minister of Lithuania. According to the "most recent communication received from Lit uania", as reported by DEKSNYS' fellow courier, AUDRONIS, DEKSNYS failed in his mission for LOZORAITIS, and the underground leaders took a very dim view of his efforts to bypass VLIK on behalf of LOZORAITIS.

Comment: C recollection is that SIDZIKAUSKAS said the information came from the Lithuanian underground radio via Sweden. SIDZIKAUSKAS further said that the couriers who are now in Paris reported that LOZORAITIS is unknown in Lithuania and consequently has no following there.

In fact there is a possibility that DEKSNYS will consequently not be allowed to leave Lithuania. SIDZIKAUSKAS states that he considers this latest development to be a "serious incident" between VLIK and LOZORAITIS. As for DEKSNYS' action in accepting the message without informing VLIK, SIDZIKAUSKAS believes that DEKNYS was playing both ends against the middle, i.e., if the underground accepted LOZORAITIS, that would be fine, but if they refused, he would be still a VLIK man. SIDZIKAUSKAS firmly believes that the underground would not accept any man not identified by VLIK, and therefore excludes the possibility that LOZORAITIS could engage in any successful operational activities of his own.

Current Procurement of Information on USSR: This rather delicate question was put to SIDZIKAUSKAS in an "innocent manner" and without any great expectations, at this early stage, of receiving any detailed answer. SIDZIKAUSKAS stated that a great deal of their information about Lithuania has been coming from their subordinate units in Sweden, which, however, are so distant from VLIK headquarters in Germany that they can not be supervised efficiently. They are therefore engaged in many "on the spot" deals with representatives of Swedish, British, and American I.S. l. In accordance with our previous arrangements, SIDZIKAUSKAS and BRAZAITIS arrived in Munich on Thursday, 25 August, and were billeted at ABACUS 2, as our guests. On the next morning, Col. SHOVA, the proposed successor to Gen. PLECHAVICIUS, was invited to ABACUS 2 for a general conference. Pertinent facts of both conferences are summarized below:

a. Couriers: Since our last meeting, BRAZAITIS completed a trip to Lithuanian DP camps at Mohringen and Bamberg where he personally interviewed the three prospective couriers now under investigation. They are as follows:

- WICKEVICIUS Kestutia, Currently employed by the Baltio Labor Company at Mohringen.
- STEPANAVICIUS. Antanas. Employed by the Baltie abor Company at Bamberg.
- KLEVINSKAS. Antanas. Residing at the Lagardeskaserne, Bamberg.

A name sheek of the above individuals has been requested. Their biographies will be submitted after the next scheduled meeting.

b. SIDZIKAUSKAS stated that an official VLIK courier dispatched by the underground in Lithuania has been stranded in . Warsaw, Polend for the past three months (Ref: MUNI-696). This individual was dispatched overland from Lithuania, was wounded three times by novet frontier guards, but nonetheless succeeded in reaching warksw. VLIK headquarters received naws of his arrive received news of his arrival in

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Warsaw through "diplomatic channels", i.e., the French Embassy, and the French promised to evacuate the courier as promptly as possible. In view of our newly established relationship, SIDZIKAUSKAS believes that it would be essential for us to facilitate the courier's evacuation directly to the American Zone of Occupation. If this is feasible, SIDZIKAUSKAS will inform us of the courier's exact location, and direct him to accept orders from the individual appointed by us, by-passing (if, indeed, this is possible) the French entirely. If on the other hand we are unable to evacuate the courier's evacuation.

e. Other Diplometic Relationships: This subject has been broached at this time only in the most general terms but we feel that it will have to be discussed in a specific manner in the very near VLIK's diplomatic relations are naturally mixed with, VLIK's international standing in foreign affairs, as well as with its intelligence utilization. Apparently they are being put to good use in facilitating VLIK's communications with Warsaw, Moscow, and Lithuania. Of the many references SIDZIKAUSKAS makes to "diplomatic channels" the indications are that the main channel is the French which includes the use of the French Embassy in Moscow, for the transmission of information from Lithuania. BIDZIKAUSKAS expressed the wish that we, too, may be able to offer an equivalent "diplomatic channel" service. This approach was discouraged and emphasis placed on the development of channels without counting on At the same time it was agreed that State Department assistance. the French, as well as any other diplomatio channels now being utilized by VLIK, should be held and developed with the clear understanding, however, that.it is we who are subsidizing the VLI It is interesting to mote that the word "subsidizing" committee. and the inference that "we know who the boss is" was volunteered by SIDZIKAUSKAS without the case officer's prompting. It is dur feeling that our relationship has now progressed far exough to start a more pressing revelation of VLIK's "diplomatic channels".

d. Initial Payment: In accordance with the authorization contained in MGK-W-2574 para 8, the case officer chose an epportuns time to turn over to SIDZIKAUSKAS the sum of \$300.00. While on the subject of couriers and the preparation of certain reports from currently available material, SIDZIKAUSKAS was about to mention the fact that all these investigations and preparations require a great deal of time and certain expenditures. The ease officer chose this moment to present SIDZIKAUSKAS with the above mentioned amount. We believe that the initial amount was sufficient and created the desired impressive effect. both SIDZIKAUSKAS and BRAZAITIS apparently pleased over this "real display of support". It was a this incident that SIDZIKAUSKAS referred to our "subsidication" and their awarness of it in operational matters. SIIZIA SKAS informed that the \$300.00 should be used to cover initial operations of the purposed of locating, organizing and actions



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needed personnel to begin the accumulation and processing of available information and the gathering of additional operational data.

Gomment: It is recommended that no accounting of this sum be requested and that it be accepted as the OSO token payment, intended to get the operation started. In view of SIPZIKAUSKAS' favorable reaction to the \$300.00 payment, it is also recommended that OPC adopt a "spoon-feeding" formula and does not "turn their heads" by carrying out the proposed \$5,000.00 immediate token payment: (See WASHF 8919)

e. Col. Antenas SHOVA (SOVA): On Friday, 26 August, Col. SHOVA was invited to attend the conference at ABACUS 2. Prior to SHOVA's arrival, SIDZIKAUSKAS informed the undersigned that SHOVA was not au courant of VLIK operational activity, but was a trusted individual of long standing whom they would properly brief on all developments once we agree that he would be a suitable candidate for PLECHAVICIUS' former position. From the point of personality, experience, and ability to inspire others, SHOVA certainly does not come up in stature to old PLECHAVICIUS. We previously pointed out that PLECHAVICIUS was unique among the Lithuanian circles, and that it was doubtful if an equivalent replacement could ever be found. SHOVA was born in Lithuania on 5 February 1902, and from the earliest age started his formal military education, graduating in 1930 from the Czech General Staff School in Prague, to which he was ordered by the Lithuanian General Staff. Upon returning from Prague, SHOVA served with various armored units until his assignment to the General Staff in 1934, where he served as Chief of the Mobilization and Organization Section. SHOVA remained at his General Staff post after the arrival of the Russians in ptember, 1940, and served as a Red Army Colonel with the Limunian Territorial Corps. In February, 1941 he was demobilized and arrested in March of the same year. In June, 1941, while being transported to a concentration camp inside the USSR, the German advance panicked the Soviet train guards, and SHOVA, together with 60 other Lithuanian officers, were taken out in the woods and "shot". The guards' unsteady aiming gave SHOVA a chance to escape, however, and he made his way back to Lithuania where he became a member of the VLIK underground. After the entrance of the German forces in Lithuania ERBVA received orders in January, 1944, to report to Gen PPIECHAVICIUS! Home Guard Division and he became Chief of the Mobilization and Covil Organization Section on PLECHAVICIUS! staff. On 15 May 1944, PLECHAVICIUS! General Staff was arrested by the Germans, and two days later while they were being transported in a truck, SHOVA escaped and returned to join the underground. As the Russian advance began into Lithuania, SHOVA escaped into Germany where he found employment as a forest worker under the alias LACATIS [""] At the end of the war SHOVA was working as a forest worker near Marienbad, and in May, 1945 entered the DP camp at Bamberg. At the DP camps, SHOVA served in various camp administrative positions, including his oferent one as Emigration Officer at the Garmisch DP Camp. EHOVA was not a

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
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member of PLECHAVICIUS' OF nets because the camps in which he served were not composed solely of Lithuanians, but those of mixed nationalities. Complete biographical data on Col. SHOVA will be forwarded after our next meeting.

Comment: It is apparent that SHOVA is the only suitable replacement that VLIK can offer for PLECHAVICIUS. There is no doubt that SHOVA has his feet electly on the ground to a point of emberrassing SIDZIKAUSKAS and BRAZAITIS. When his job, that of developing lines of communication with Lithuania, was explained to him by SIDZIKAUSKAS SHOVA frankly stated that he obviously saw why the "Political Department of VLIK" was interested in developing such lines, but he questioned whether the "politicians" realized all that this simple statement involved. He further stated that he could make no promises until such time as the Executive Committee completely briefed him on just what has been dome and what is available to start operations with. After receiving such briefing, SHOVA promised to prepare an estimate of the situation and a proposed plan of operations. Though lacking many of PLECHAVICIUS qualities, SHOVA appears to be much more practical and business-like, without any He accepted the initial investigation work like a pretensions. military problem which a General Staff officer was expected to work out and report on according to his findings. It was mutually agreed out and report on according to his findings. It was mutually that SHEVA be given a chance as Chief of the Operations Unit. undersigned then discussed the possibility of still utilizing PLECHAVICIUS, if the scale of operations warrant, as Chief of the unit with SHOVA as his executive officer and Acting Chief in the General's as Chief of the unit absence. According to SIDZIKAUSKAS, a matter of internal VLIK politics has entered the question of PLECHAVICIUS' future utilization. It appears that the Catholic Democratic Party, represented on the VLIK Executive Committee by Monsignor KRUPAVICIUS' and Prof. BRAZAITIS, are opposed to PLECHAVICIUS' future utilization on the grounds that the General represented an extreme rightist point of view which would not be supported by the Lithuanian people, and that PIECHAVICIUS was formerly closely associated with the late President SECTONA's rightist nationalist dictatorship. Naturally if we insisted on the point, PLECHAVICIUS would be given his former command. As fer as SIDZIKAUSKAS was concerned, and the other members of the Peasant Party, they had no objections to the General. In view of the above, the PLECHAVICIUS question was left open pending future developments and SHOVA's ability to handle them.

- f. Salaries: As of 1 September 1949, we have agreed to pay a regular monthly salary to the following individuals:
 - (1) Col. Antonas SHOVA, Chief of the VLIK Operations Section. . . 450. DM per month.
 - (2) Lt. Julius BUTENAS, General Secretary, Translator, and typist. . . 350. DM per month. Lt. BUTENAS was formerly Gen PLECHAVICIUS' aide de camp and will translate all VLIK reports into the English language.

1. Since it is believed that Lithuanian eireles in Germany are of some interest to MOB, we would like to pass on the following information which has been volunteered us by QDEUM.

2. BRAZAITIS: whose weel name is AMBROZKVICIUS has related that he has contast to an American intelligence office in Munich; he maintains that this office is "CIA". It is not clear to ODEUM whether BRAZAITIS' contact to the American "chief" is direct or through a cutout, and ODEUM believes that it is more thance that BRAZAITIS and not some other Lithmanian is the one contacted by the Americans. However, BRAZAITIS clings to this contact and admits himself that he can earn well thereby.

- 3. Ascording to ODEUM, the other members of VLIE are envious of this development, and with BIELIUMAS as their spokesman, demand that VLIE as a whole should have this contact, that BRAZAITES is in ne way their plenipotentiary. BRAZAITES in turn has explained that the American office would reject dealing with a committee of ten in such "sensitive" questions.
- 4. The motivation of BIRLIUKAS' demand is not clear. It is stated that his wife is at present in Lithmania and that she has an excellent position in the Communist administration. It is claimed that BIRLIUKAS himself does not want to emigrate and is therefore trying to establish contact for himself with western intelligence agencies.

Tirralirra does not maintain this report is all inclusive in scope and detail on this phase of id thusnian affairs abroad, but does claim it sets forth briefly and accurately the developments responsible for the lack of cooperation between the two Lithuanian groups. We, of course, campt assume complete responsibility for the statements and allegations made herein, but present it as received from source -- for your interest and future reference, Tirralizra believes that the failure of the Lithuanians abroad to achieve a cooperative effort is due principally to WIIK, their uncompromising attitude, and their ambition to become the id thuanian Government-in-exile -- despite the opposition of the BDPS abroad and the Lithuanian diplomatic representatives still representing the Lithuanian Republic. Tirralirra has reiterated his willingness to cooperate with us on any reasonable basis and claims his sole interest continues to be the performance of his duties in support of the Lithmanian Registance Movement. 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Since the inception of the first Lithuanian resistance activity in 19401941, this activity has developed and expanded through numerous organizations, and with many individuals and party feetiens imposing their opinions as to the fundamental objectives and needs of the Lithuanian Resistance. The first resistance organization was founded by the former Lithuanian Minister to Germany, Colonel Skirpa. This organization continued in existence until 1944. During the German occupation, numerous other resistance organizations were also formed. Of these, the oldest, strongest and most uncompromising toward the Nazis was the LLES (Union) of the Fighters for the Freedom of Lithuania). This organization was lead by Valiulis, alies Drumgs, Tilestone, Tirralization and Dr. Algiredae Voliateitis, and supported by many others. This was the only resistance organization which sent its representatives abroad to Sweden, at the same time kept constant contacts with the Estonian, Letvian and Folish resistance organizations, maintained a clardestine broadcasting station, and currently sent its information with Antenas Wallukanas in Serlin to Driffernits in Sweden. The return of Vokietaitis to Lithuania in January 1944 and his subsequent attempt to return to Sweden is an indication of the effort being made to keep the contacts abroad informed on the situation inside Lithuania.

Another of the stronger resistance movements was the democratic organization known by the name "Independent Lithuania", which was in fact a development of the Liberal-Peasants party lead by Beshius Bieliukas, There was also the "Lithuanian Front" organization headed by Frotessor Brassitis.

In the early period of the resistance the greatest single weakness was the lack of a coordinating center. To offset this situation, the Supreme Lithuanian Committee was formed in 1942-1943, but despite the necessity only token cooperation was accomplished, as the Lithuanian Front" organization refused to subordinate itself to the orders of the committee. Only in November 1943, after very lengthy and painful negotiations, was the Supreme Lithuanian Committee of Maberation (VLIK) formed. In VLIK, for practical significance, all elements of the resist ance effort were represented. The LLA (Lithuanian Liberation Army), a strong clandestine military organization which led the resistance during the beginning of the second Russian occupation, did not at any time subordinate itself to the authority of VLIK. In practice, VLIK was only the coordinating body, and all the tasks and objectives were carried out by the respective resistance organizations to whom the duties were to be delegated. Officially VLIK began to function on 16 February 1944, at which time its authority was published in the underground newspapers and leaflets. From the outset VLIK did not in reality represent all parties or organizations, although an effort was made to make this the case; instead, some groups were represented only in name. From the beginning the organization was known to be cumbersome, inefficient, and without real authority. Nevertheless it was at that time felt to be a step in the right direction, with the intention for early amendment provided for in the original draft of the organizational document.

After only a few months of existence, in April-May 1944, most of the members of VLIK were arrested by the Gestapo. This development was the direct result of

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the arrest of Colonell Ambress jus, a VLIK representative, who on his way to Finland was cought by the destapo in Estonia. His almost immediate confession resulted in the arrest of a large number of members of the organisation. (It was remarked that the representatives for the "Fighters for Freedam" objected strongly to the appointment of Colonel Ambrasejus, but were overruled for political considerations.) Others arrested at this time included Remnius Bieliukas, leader of the Liberal Peasants Party: Colonel Vebra, one of the Manney leaders of the "Li thuanian Front" organization; Engineer Brunius, leader of the Nationalist Party: Galdziunas, leader of the National Union; Valiulis (alias Drungs), and Tilestone, leadens of the Free Fighters group — all of whom were at that time members of the VLIK. Other resistance leaders arrested included persons identified as Budginas, Eurklietis, Mildaria, Turkstas, Virsilas, Zickus, Gintautas, Bolokast, and others. (* Died later in German prisons)

After the arrests in April and May 1944, a provisional VLIK with three members was formed, but this group could not control the situation, and in July 1944, at the time the Russians were rapidly occupying Id thuania, it coased to exist. Two of its members succeeded in escaping to Germany.

In June 1944 Timralirra was asked by Bielinia, chairman of Yilk, and the Secretary for Foreign Affairs to form a Delegation of Vilk abroad. At the same time a fermer member, Professor Kaminakas, was selected by Vilk to escape to Sweden. This part of the plan was to have been executed by Vokietaitis, but on their return they were captured and returned to a prison at Liepaja and subsequently removed to Germany. Kaminakas was not recognized and he was released, but Vokietaitis was black in the prison camp at Stutthof.

At the time indicated above Tirralirra formed the secret VLTK delegation abroad in Berlin and became one of its members. Tirralirra and Valiukenas tried to make arrangements to secape to seeden through the help of the Swedish Military Attache in Berlin, Colonel Canfeld. (The contacts with Danfeld were established by Colonel Skirns and maintained by his secretary, Valiukenas). The Danish Resistance organization had also volunteered their services in effecting the escape but circumstances prevented the implementation of the plan.

The VLIK delegation abroad was in Wurzhurg at the time that city was eccupied by the American Army - in April 1945. At the time the Lithuanian political prisoners were liberated at Bayreuth, a decision was made to dissolve the delegation abroad and restore VLIK in emigration. Several former members of VLIK - namely Bieliukas, Tilestone, Gaidziunas, Brunius and Damusis - were among those liberated.

The original VLIK organization inside Lithuania ceased to exist in July 1944. The VLIK organization was begun enew, with the following principal members: Professor Kaminskas of the Social Democratic Party; Tirralirra and Damusis of the 1d thuanian Front group; Brinius, Gaidziunas, Krupavigius of the Christian Democrats, plus two representatives of the practically non-existent Peasants Party.

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From the very beginning the new VLIK organization began to lose its resistance character and became more and more an emigré political organ. Some of the original members soon resigned and were replaced by others with little experience or knowledge of the real resistance objectives and with no interest in that phase of the activity. They became members merely to avail themselves of the political position and status which membership would give them. Former VLIK members, who had been released from prison, were not entirely in favor of the establishment of VLIK abroad; they felt it should have its headquarters inside Lithuania. Two lines of policy became evident, with one group interested in supporting the resistance element inside the country and the other to consider the resistance for the time being "written off"; the latter's efforts were directed toward memouvering into a favorable political position should the day of liberation arrive.

Two former members of VLIK, who had been imprisoned by the Germans, namely Tilestone and Enumius, refused to consider themselves emigres, and cooperating with Bieliukas and Tirrelirra, they began to prepare a return to Lithuania. As the maintenance of any degree of security within VLIK had become impossible by this time, they informed only the VLIK chairman, Professor Kaminskas, who had also been the chairman of the original VLIK organization in Lithuania. Tilestone and Brunius departed during September 1945. At the same time, Tirralirra proceeded to the British Zone, his object being to reach Sweden and become a VLIK representative there, and attempt to reestablish contact with Lithuania from Sweden.

In December 1945 Tirralirra was at Libeck when he discovered that Vokietaitis was alive and also trying to reach Sweden. He was informed also that Tilestone and Drunga (the latter had been liberated in Berlin), had succeeded in returning to Lithuania and were now returning to Germany. At this time the VLIK established itself in the French Zone of Germany through the assistance of General Schmittein.

The information brought back by Tilestone and Drumga constituted the first definite and reliable information received from Lithuania since July 1944. Although at this time Tilestone and Drunga formally and individually requested VLIK not to use the information supplied without their consent, VLIK completely disregarded this request and the information was used very indiscreetly. All the information (including photographs) was published in American newspapers and Lithuanian publications abroad, with no consideration for the danger this caused the resistance forces still alive inside Lithuania. Also at this time VLIK showed no consideration for either Tilestone or Drungs, both of whom were original VIIK members, and who had some directly from Lithuania with first-hand information and experience, plus established contacts with the remaining resistance. Neither was invited to attend a special meeting called for the purpose of reviewing the situation inside Lithuania, the problems of resistance, the measures to be adopted, etc. (However, this circumstance later proved to be fortunate, as the one-time VLIK secretary, identified as simonaltyte, later (in 1948) repatriated to Lithuania, confessed that she had contacts with the German Communist Party in Tubingen. Subsequent newspaper articles which appeared in the Lithuanian Communist press proyed beyond a doubt that she had

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revealed the activities of VLK and the identities of its members,) A second security break occurred when a mysterious and suspicious character (identified as Kyaracaius) appeared at Tubingen, Germany, claiming to have come from the resistance forces in Lithuania. His entire story was suspicious but he was nevertheless interviewed by VLK chairman H. Krupavicius. Kvaracejus subsequently returned to Lithuania, and the Resistance later discovered that he had been sent as a Russian agent. In addition to the generally suspicious circumstances, Lyaracejus claimed to have contacted a Lithuanian (identified as Chiberkis) living in Poland. A subsequent check by VLK revealed that the individual Evaracejus was unknown to Ciuberkis. After Evaracejus' return to Lithuania, the Communist press published articles which left little doubt of the purpose of his mission. Although Erupavicius denied revealing any information in his interview with Evaracejus, the resultant press articles revealed much indiscretion on the part of Erupavicius.

Hemseforth the plans of Tilestone, Drungs, Tirralirra and Bieliukas were for obvious reasons kept secret. At this time Tilestone and Vrianta Literative (leader in the small resistance movement VS) "Movement of Unity", decided to return to Lithuania, Staneika had come secretly to Germany from Poland after his release following three years' imprisonment at Stutthof. Their plans were discussed only with Professor Kaminskas, who approved of their action. Contacts were also made with the Lithuanian Minister in London, and General Plechavicius was informed. Vokietaitis, who was aided by the Swedes, arrived to confer with Tilestone, Staneika and Tirralirra prior to their departure. The principal message to be taken back to Lithuania was advice to the Lithuanian remistance leaders that it was imperative that contact be established with their representatives abroad, preferably in Sweden. They were also to be advised that liberation would not be forthcoming in the immediate future and that the registance must take a more passive form. Staneika and Tilestone departed on 1 May 1946, Disguised as Polish citizens, they proceeded first to Poland.

In July 1946 Stansika left Lithuania and succeeded in making his way to sweden. In September Tilestone followed him on orders of the resistance organisation, as they had received rumors that Stansika had been killed an route. Upon his return to Lithuania, Tilestone found the resistance work already underway and took an active part in it. One single resistance organization had been formed - the Joint Democratic Resistance Movement ("Bendrojo Democratinio Pasipriesinimo Sajudis" or "BDPS"). At this time the importance of passive resistance only was reemphasized. At this time also the political organ, the Supreme Committee of Restoration of Lithuania, was organized. Wokietaitis was named as the individual responsible for the contacts between the delegates abroad and the BDPS in Lithuania.

At this time the resistance organisation inside Lithuania, namely BDPS, refused to make VLIK its representative abroad because they were of the opinion that the political authority should be in a component part of the BDPS, namely the Supreme Committee of Restoration of Lithuania. The BDPS also bitterly

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posented the fact that VLIK did nothing to prepare for the second Russian occupation and left the country at the most difficult moment -- referring to the period of June-July 1944, Antipathy between these persons ran very high. Therefore individuals were chosen to the delegation abroad because of their resistance record and personal reputation rather than for previous party allegiance. Almost all were former members of VLIK, namely, Professor Kaminskas (Social Democrat), Krupaviqius (Christian Democrat), Bieliukas (liberal Peasants Party), Tirralirra, Professor Brazaitis, Professor Padalakis, Staneika and Vokietaitis. To the BDPS delegation abroad, formed entirely for resistance purposes, were appointed Tirralirra, Professor Brazaitis, Professor Padalakis, Vokietaitis and Staneika. Tilestone came abroad as a member of the political and resistance authorities inside Lithuania - the BDPS. His purpose was to explain the situation existing inside Lithuania and to supervise the effective reorganization of the organization abroad and then return to Lithuania. Vokietaitis and Staneika, with the help of the Swedes and the Danes, met Tirralirra at Copenhagen in October 1946, and there Tirralirra presented his credentials.

During this time VLIK is characterized as merrily going on its way, continuing to busy itself with political intrigues, fanciful positions, etc. In the summer of 1946 a conference, composed of VLIK people and some of the Lithuanian ministers abroad, convened in Bern. Locaraitis represented the Lithuanian Ministers abroad. Drungs, at this time, was one of the first victims of the VLIK political intrigues, and consequently was prevented from attending the conference.

When Tirralirra first came to Tubingen he was confronted with great difficulties. For example, Krupavicius and Professor Kaminskas recegnised the extreme importance of what was being accomplished in Lithuania, but they still did not wish to face the facts. Professor Kaminskas refused to accept Tirralirra's credentials; Krupavicius accepted them only conditionally; Professor Brazaitis refused to consider seriously any of the information received or the capability of BDPS to do the job; Bieliukas was the only one who accepted the credentials and supported the efforts being made by BDPS. Some even questioned the fact that Tilestone and Staneika had ever been in Lithuania. The greatest opponent to the organization of effective resistance work was Professor Brazaitis. VIIK generally declared that it would not believe that resistance was possible until a confirming report had been received from within Lithuania. Tilestone, Staneika, Tirralirra and Vokietaitis at this time were called agents of a foreign power, forgers of documents, adventurers; etc. - the intent being to thoroughly discredit them and their efforts.

In a further effort to seek a solution and enlightenment to the problem, Staneika, Tilestone and Vokietaitis traveled to Germany in January of 1947. At this time a conference was held at Kirchheim between the persons above listed and VLIK members - Kaminskas, Tirralirra, Bieliukas, Krupavicius and Brazaitis. (Padalakis was in the U.S. at the time.) No real solution to the problem was reached. Strangely enough, the people who considered themselves responsible

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political leaders indicated to interest in clarifying the situation inside Lithuania or in finding ways and means of aiding and supporting the resistance leaders. Only three persons were interested in this matter, Kaminskas, Tirralirra and Bieliukas, Krupavisius and Brassitis came to the conference only at the insistence of Kaminskas. It was clear the VLIK desired to go on considering itself the supreme political authority abroad without assuming any of the responsibilities of support to the resistance within Lithuania. VARK obviously did not consider the resistance of importance at this time, and would do nothing to disturb the satisfactory party politics maintained at this time.

This situation existed until July 1948, and needless to say did much harm. It prevented dispatching moral support to the underground, which was of such necessity; it was directly responsible for the lack of organization and the development of passive resistance at an earlier date.

In the spring of 1947 Tilestone secretly not representatives of the ld thuanian Resistance in Poland; thereafter he conferred with Minister Lozaraitis, the chief Afthuanian diplomatic representative abroad. The latter had no reason to disbelieve Tilestone, promised him his full cooperation and gave great moral support and valuable advice to the resistance leaders in Idthuania.

In the summer of 1947 a conference of VLIK members and Lithuanian ministers was held in Paris. Prior to this conference, Bieliukas had requested that Tilestone, Vokietaitis or Stanbike be invited to attend. VLIK voted against extending an invitation to them. At this conference the Lithuanian diplomats, particularly those still in office, refused to recognize VLIK an arreventual government-in-exile. It had long been the aspiration of certain VLIK members to be recognized as the government-in-exile and probably accounts for much of the discredit and non-cooperation shown other Lithuanian leaders and particularly those engaged in resistance activity. The conference had no paractical or positive results. The entire question of support and recognition to the underground was ignored.

In September 1947 Volistaitis and Tilestone traveled to Switzerland to meet Minister descritis. Lossraitis again promised his support, and agreement was reached on the cooperation to be received.

In the spring of 1948 Tilestone again went to Poland to meet the representative of the resistance and came back with two delegates of the BDPS, namely Adomaitis, alias Skrajunas, and Vithauskas, alias Audronis. Tilestone's eredentials were confirmed by the information he furnished; all the material brought by them was addressed to the BDPS delegation abroad, namely Tilestone, Staneika, Vokietaitis and, recently, Tirralirra. Tomas A. Greimas, the BDPS representative in Paris was also requested to join the delegation abroad.

At the time Adomaitis met Tilestone and Staneikm in Stockholm en 20/21 March 1948, it was officially declared that the resistance in Lithuania was well aware of the identities of their benefactors and that they looked critically upon VLIK with its personal ambitions and political quarrels.

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Oredit was, however, extended also to the work of the Lithuanian diplomate abroad for their siving and encouragement.

Prior to the fusion of all resistance organizations into the BDPS.

Adomaitis had been a member of the Lithuanian Front group. Upon his arrival in Sweden Adomaitis located and made contact with the former leaders of the Lithuanian Front, who it is understood were at that time in VLIK. The VLIK learned that representatives of the BDPS had come to Sweden their attitude suddenly changed to one of interest and sympathy for the BDPS and the Lithuanian Resistance. Apparently by political maneuvering the VLIK representatives were able to bring Adomaitis into their camp and thus isolate him from the Tilestone group and the ministers abroad, all of whom the BDPS had instructed him to contact and advise. Adomaitis also refused to see Bieliukas and Tirralirra — for reasons which are now all too clear.

Tirralirra, in an effort to end the diagreements abroad, suggested that Tilestone arrange for a general conference to be held in Paris er London, to which Minister Lozaraitis would invite all factions. The conference would be open and constructive, devoid of political intrigues and propaganda, and the general objectives, to aid the Lithuanian Resistance (or more specifically the BDPS) inside Lithuania, would be outlined. Tilestone's recommendation was agreed to by Minister Lozaraitis and the latter attempted to get the disagreeing parties together over a conference table. VLIK at first refused to participate but after persuasion reluctantly agreed to send their representatives. Tilestone and Adomaitis proceeded to Germany and the conference was held at Baden Baden during July 1948. The following VLIK members participated: Bidsikauskas. Krupavicius, Kaminskas and Bragaitis. Bieliukas and Gaidsiuhas vere not invited to attend due to their pro-BDPS views — another triumph for the political intrigues of VLIK.

At the Baden Baden conference Tilestone participated as a member of the presidium of the BDPS in Lithuania. At this time no one contested his status; he was no longer referred to as a foreign agent, a forger of documents, etc.; he was recognized as the representative responsible for the establishment of contacts with the resistance inside Lithuania. On the other hand, he and Adomaitis agreed to cooperate and to recognize in VLIK a supreme political authority abroad (eventually a government-in-exile), although their credentials gave them no authority for such recognition. This particular action was protested by other members of the BDPS delegation abroad. Minister Leseraitis and Minister Saulys expressed the opinion of the Lithuanian diplomats and functioning accredited ministers that this agreement, arrived at without their knowledge and content, did not concern them; that the constitution of the still formally existing independent Lithuanian Republic could not be changed, and that the status of the accredited Lithuanian ministers abroad was in no way affected.

At this time Tilestone again tried to take up the discussion of the important problems of the resistance inside Lithuania and abroad, and the future plans to be developed for the reinforcement and support of the BDPS. The attempt was again doomed to failure, as the VLIK representatives showed no interest and

did not support this program. Also, centrary to Tilestone's request, a communique was published making known the Baden Baden meeting between VLIK and representatives of the Lithuanian Resistance.

It is difficult to say whether any good resulted from this meeting. It did not help clarify VLIK's stand in its illusionary struggle for recognition as an eventual government-in-exile. It did much harm in disclosing facts which should have remained secret. Minister Lowersties very rightly pointed out the fact that information on resistance activities inside id thuania should not be used for propaganda purposes, as such action was not reconcilable with underground activities; that in every case the meetings with representatives of the resistance must be kept secret, and that indiscreet propaganda abroad concerning the resistance activity could only bring disaster to the entire nation.

Although VLIK pretended to recognize Tilestone as the representative of the resistance and the individual solely responsible for resistance matters abroad, many things were done without his approval and knowledge. Adomaitis left for Paris, whence he expected to depart soon for Lithuania. From the cutset, this was recognized as an idle gesture and it is doubtful that the contact with the French was necessary or even advisable for security reasons. It is also highly doubtful that any help could be expected from the French for the Lithuanian Resistance.

On the other hand, it is not yet known how the chairman of the executive council, Sidzikauskas, presented the whole support problem to the Americans on his trip to the U.S. in 1949. In all events, according to Sidsikauskas' own opinion, this presentation should not have been undertaken by him alone. It is obvious that Tilestone or some other member of the delegation of the BDPS abroad, who from long experience were cognizant of all facts involved, were the only responsible people to make either the formal or the practical presentation to the Americans. There was never any indication that resistance matters were to be entrusted to VLIK. Resistance matters were to be left in the hands of the BDPS and its representatives abroad, with some means of cooperation worked out to achieve the best results for both groups. The inadequacy of Sidzikauskas was well illustrated by the fact that at the time of his departure from the U.S. he made an open statement to the effect that contacts were being maintained between the resistance groups in Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia; yet at this very time Tilestone and his compatriots were making their way through this particular area.

Due to the confused picture of circumstances inside Lithuania, Tilestone decided to return. He felt that the resistance program being followed was wrong, that it was based on the premise that war was just around the corner, with too much importance placed on support in the way of arms and munitions. He also had many doubts concerning the information brought earlier by Adomaitis and Vitkauskas.

In the spring of 1948 Tilestone requested Colonel Skirpa, then in Ireland,

to come to Speakholm to assume his (Tilestone's) duties. Colonel Skirpa was unable to accept this position. Tilestone then requested Tirraligra to take ever his duties. Tilestone, as a recognised member of VLIK, in addition held credentials authorizing him to appoint members of the BDPS delegation abroad, and felt he had the right to make the above appointment. Tirraligra had however already been appointed a member of the BDPS in Lithuania in 1946.

It is quite clear that all efforts to organize the resistance abroad on a coalition basis have failed. Experience has shown that no delegation could function successfully with party politics playing a major role in its activity; in addition there was the handloap resulting from its members being dispersed over most of Burope. Furthermore, conspirative autivity is a primary function in resistance work either inside Il thusnia or abroad. There were many delicate bontasta to be minimized and many subjects which could not be discussed even in a small collective group, and particularly not by open correspondence. On the other hand Tilestone understood only too well that internal politics should be put aside and that the resistance abroad should avoid controversies between the various political factions, political committees, etc. Therefore, after careful consideration, instead of reorganizing a delegation of BDPS, Tilestone decided, temporarily at least, to appoint only one representative of the resistance abroad; this representative to have full power to choose his collaborators, take up only problems directly related to the resistance movement, and to avoid insofar as possible any controversies. Tirralirra, as aforementioned, had already been appointed a member of the BDPS in Lithuania; he was also a former member of VLIK, and had left Lithuania in 1944 at the request of VLIK to organize its delegation abroad. Audronis, one of the delegates of BDPS, countersigned the decision of Tilestone. Audronis returned to Id thuenia together with Tilestone, and the mission of Audronis and Adomaitis was considered elemed. Minister Logoraitis was informed about it; he acknowledged Tirralirra's appointment and gladly signed to cooperate and to inform his colleagues when it became necessary.

After Tirralirra was assured there was no longer any danger to Tilestone and Audronis - from indiscretion or leakage - he took up contact with Adomaitis in Paris on 11 May 1948, and laid the ground for the expected forthcoming mutual cooperation. He also wrote to Krupavicius, the chairman of VLIK, and to Sidnikauskas, the chairman of the executive council. He received no reply from Krupavicius. Adomaitis, aware that Tilestone and Audronis were out of reach, answered Tirralirra by requesting the latter to subordinate himself to his (Adomaitis') direction. This would have been impossible even if Tirralirra had been willing, as Adomaitis was located in Paris, was without personal contacts, and unable to render support to the operation. On the other hand, Adomaitis and Tirralirra, as delegates of BDPS, had equal rights, but both were subordinate to Tilestone, who was a member of the supreme recipience authority inside Lithuania. As Tilestone and Vitkauskas had returned to Lithuania, Adomaitis could not possibly hope to invalidate Tilestone's decision, Tirralirra, on the other hand, could not disregard his instructions and subordinate himself to Adomaitis. Tirralirra, however, still thied to find a solution,

and pointed out to Adomaitis that their duties did not conflict; that he was replacing Tilestone, and Adomaitis was a temporary delegate of EDFs abroad. However, no solution could be reached without a personal meeting, which might perhaps have resulted in the clarification of many of the troublesome questions. The chairman of the executive council, Sidsikauakas, agreed to cooperate, however, and aided by sending money to Sweden to cover the debts (totalling 350 dellars) left by Tilestone on 23 June 1949.

In July of 1949 Tirralirra traveled to Germany where he met Midsikauskas and Professor Kaminskas, and an exchange of information and mutual scoperation was agreed upon. Tirralirra at this time avoided controversial subjects, but pointed out the danger of running different lines of communication into lithuania. Further arrangements could not be made because VLIK at that time was passing through an acute crisis and no one apparently had the power to make a decision.

Upon his return to sweden on 4 September 1949, Tirralirra sent Sideikauskas all the information he had obtained on the situation inside id thuania. A reply from Sideikauskas on 14 November 1949 advised that he no longer had anything to do with the matter. In the meantime Tirralirra received an invitation from VLIK, dated 18 October 1949, to come to Germany. He agreed and in his reply on 28 October 1949 asked assistance for travel expenses in advance. When his letter was received by VLIK, its sponsoring member and secretary Gaidsiunas had already immigrated to the U.S. In a private letter to Bieliukas, Tirralirra pointed out that the presence of Minister Lozoraitis would be extremely advisable, as great care should be taken at this time to reach positive results, and that a proper agenda should be prepared in advance of a meeting. There was no reply from VLIK. Apparently, with the help promised by the Americans, VLIK was of the opinion that they would be able to handle matters and consolidate their position without the cooperation of the active EDPS representative abroad. (As individual identified as A. Sovai is reportedly maintaining the link between VLIK and the Americans.)

It was at this time that peculiar, baseless rumors began circulating about Tilestone - his personal insecurity, loyalty, etc. -- another obvious smoke screen tactic by VLIK and a last effort to attain its ambition of becoming the foremost Lithuanian organization abroad.

Recent information from Lithuania indicates that the active resistance units are slowly but surely liquidating themselves. To curtail this useless sacrifice and self-liquidation, all effort must be placed upon passive or moral resistance, with the establishment of an intelligence-gathering organization rather, than active partisan activity. All propaganda abroad concerning partisan activity, the soming liberation, etc. must also sease - as this provides leads to the Soviets and eventually results in the liquidation of other resistance personalities. By continuing this propaganda, the resistance leaders without a doubt are playing directly into the hands of the Russians.

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In January, Tirralirra met Minister Lororaitis in London for the purpose of discussing the problems of support to the Lithuanian Resistance and the manner of implementation. The Minister again went on record to approve the line of action adopted by Tilestone and Tirralirra, and promised his full moral support. After enumerating the difficulties and the danger and inadequacy of separate efforts. Tirralirra requested him to call a conference and made one last effort to find a solution to the problem. Minister Losoraitis agreed to this proposal but admitted that he was not hopeful of the results.

Meanthile VLIK and the baliber of its representatives has grown steadily weaker. The following is a list of the individuals who for one reason or another have left the organization or have refused to actively participate any longer. Brief background date on each is included:

- a. VOKIETAITIS
- Regigned as VLIK representative in Sweden in late 1946 or early 1947.
- b. DRUNGA
- A representative of the Free Fighters group, an experienced resistance worker, and an efficient organizer. Resigned from VLIK in 1947 and joined the BDPS abroad.
- e. BRUNIUS
- An active resistance leader since 1940; leader of the Nationalist Party. He was arrested in 1947 upon his return to Lithuania. Since that time the Nationalist Party has been without membership in VLIK.
- 4. STANBIKA
- Organizer of the "Movement of Unity"; qui-time member of VLIK. Resigned some time ago and has been an active supporter of BDPS.
- 4. VILBISIS
- Immigrated to the U.S.
- f. Dr. EBBRA
- The most prominent leader of the Lithuanian Front, well known and respected both in scientific and military circles (a colonel in the army); a capable resistance leader; now a member of the BDPS.
- E. Col. SKIRPA
- Former Lithuanian Minister to Germany, leader of eriginal resistance organization, formerly member of VLIK. Highly respected, an excellent organizer; now, a member of the BDPS. Presently in the USA.
- h. (Gen) PLECHAVIOTUS.
- Appointed by VLIK as commander-in-chief of the Lithuanian armed forces. Resigned as a result of tactics employed by VLIK.
- 1. QUIDERLIA
- General Secretary of the National Movement, Resigned from VLIE as a result of political intrigues which originated there. Now in the USA.
- J. GAIDZIUNAS
- Resigned from VLIK and immigrated to the USA.

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- k. RIBLIUKAS
- . Leader of the Idberal Peasant Party; active in resistance activity during the German occupation. Resigned recently from membership in VLIK.
- 1. M. MACKEVICIUS
- Disagreed with VLIK policy and resigned in 1949. Now in the USA.
- A KINYADISKAS
- A Resigned from VLIK and joined the BDPS. Now in Great Britain.
- B. Prof. ENVIOLA
- Resigned from VLIK in 1949; proceeding to the

The VIIK organization is now principally represented by Chairman Krupavicius, Professor J. Kaminskas and Professor J. Brazaitis. The first two are now elderly individuals who do not appreciate the need for a resistance movement. Brazaitis, leader of the Lithuanian Front, is one of the bitterest opponents of the BDPS abroad. He is largely personally responsible for the political intrigues within VLIK since its formation in Germany.

Excerpt from a report prepared and written by Adomaitis alias jumes, dated 20/21 March 1948 and presented to Tilestone and Staneika in Stockholm: . . . The resistance at home (meaning Lithuania), except through you, have received nothing from any Lithuanian organization abroad . . . Some of the published declarations of VLIK and especially its executive council are offending us directly and indirectly. They are not helping the struggle of the resistance and are actually jeopardizing our existence by attempting to discredit our BDPS representatives abroad . . . our aims are directly opposite at this time - we are fighting for freedom and they (VLIK) are fighting for government position The leadership in Lithuania appreciates very positively the attitude of the plenipotentiary ministers, namely, Lororaitis, Skirpa, Balutis and Saulys toward the resistance, their sincere understanding as well as wish to help actively in the struggle. The leadership at home accepts it sincerely with great confidence and best hope for the future collaboration " DECLASSIFIED Authority

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

Under spparate cover we are forwarding background information on a contact of this Office who is a former member of the Lithuanian underground and who is now teaching economics and acting in an advisory capacity to the Lithuanian Information Center, New York City. Please forward to us any requirements which you may wish to have considered in connection with our interrogation of him.

- 2. This contact states that he has access to many of the sources used by Constantin Jurgela, head of the Lithuanian Information Center (Room 5012, 238 Broadway, New York City). He also states that Jurgela's main source of information is Professor Juosas Brasaltis, Goethestrasse 16 Pfullingen, French Zone, Germany. Our contact believes that Brasaltis and two of his informers are in contact with US Intelligence. He is fairly certain that Brasaltis is also in contact with British Intelligence.
 - 3. This information is forwarded as of possible interest to your office.

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
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

It works for the reestablishment of an independent Lithuania on the political and representative level and by maintaining relations with similar groups of other nationalities: VLIK-as was initially organized in Lithuania in 1943 as an anti-German and anti-Soviet movement. By 1944 it was fully organized. The Soviet advance in 1944 forced VLIK-as to flee westward, leaving some of its members behind in Lithuania and in Sweden. The anti-Communist underground in Lithuania continues to report to VLIK-as, whose headquarters is now in Western Germany. Birsiska states he does not know the exact location, but that it is in a small town near the border of the UB-French Zones of Occupation, near the town of Fellach. Birsiska believes Fellach is in the French Zone.

3. Three men are the chief leaders of VLIK-as at present.

(a) The headis (Prelate) Mykolas Krunavioius, a leader of the conservative Catholic or Christian Democratic Party. Now about 60, he was previously a member of the Seim (free Lithuania's parliament) and Minister of Agriculture. He became chief of VLIK-as in Lithuania in 1944. He suffers from tuberculosis and occasionally has to undergo treatment. He tends to adopt an authoritarian attitude toward his subordinates.

(b) J. Brasaitis, also a Christian Democrat, is in charge of foreign relations for VLIK-as. He is about 50 and is a former prefessor of literature. Brasaitis is mpt his real name.

(e) J. Kamingha is officially hear of the Maticual Fund for VLIK-as. He is purposely less publicised than the other two sen, but is definitely one of the three policy makers. Now over 70, he was the leader of the Squial Democrats, The most leftist group represented in the organisation. He engages in liaison work with

KAUTHISKAS. Juosas: Born 1878 in Paliepiai, Lith. Studied at the high school in Roscow. Worked as an engineer in Vilnius and Kaunas. Active in the Social-Democratic Lovement. Member of the Lithuanian Council which declared the independence of Lithuania in Vilnius on 16 February 1918. Number of the Lith. Farliament. Frofessor at the U. of Kaunas. 1943 Chairman of VLIK. 1944 arrested, but soon released. Since 1945 member of VLIK in Germany and also later head of the Finance Section in the Executive Committee. Participated in the European Social-Democratic Conference.

EMPLYICHES, Mykolas: born 1885 in Parbieriskis, Lith. Studied theology in Seinal and Petersburg, later social and commonic sciences in Touleuss, France. Professor in the Seminary in Vilkaviskis. Number of all democratic parliaments, Chairman of the Christian Democratic Party, Minister of Agriculture and pioneer of land reform in Lith. Twice condemned to death by the Bolshevists. 

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

A new Lithuanian Ex-Servicemen's Association was formed in Faris on the 11th May'as a result of the recent negotiations to create a Federation of Ex-Servicemen from behind the Iron Curtain, who are at present in exile in France. This new Federation, the A.C.E.C.O.F. (Federation des Anciens Combattants exiles de l'Europe Centrale et Crientale en France) groups together Lithuanians, Poles Ukrainians, Bulgarians and Hungarians and envisages the eventual inclusion of the other emigre nationalities. Up to now the Lithuanians have been represented by Collanskor-onskis and Jonas Clasuilis, both of whom stated that they could only join the Federation as individuals as they were not representative of any Lithuanian Association of former servicemen.

This new Lithuanian Association, known as "Lietuviu Kovotoju Sajunga" (Union of Lithuanian Reservicemen) was therefore flormed in order to give Lanskoronskis and Masiulis a proper backing in the Federation, and in order to assist them in organising a Lithuanian representation in the regional and district branches of the Federation, which are planned for the future. Lists of names of ex-servicemen in the provinces are to be compiled to give some indication where suitable material can be found at short notice in the event of a future ware

Recent Developments in V.L.I.K.

- The Executive Committee of V.L.I.K. has made no further progress in organising its move to Paris. A flat has been rented for them near the Place Pigalle and appropriate comments has appeared in the press about the unusual choice of locality. Nothing, however, can be done as yet, as Prof. I Aminskas is seriously ill in the U.S.A. and no decisions can be taken in his absence.

This joint-meeting was sponsored by the Most important Lithuanian social organisation in France. No decision was, however, reached about developing the P.L.B. movement.

Interview with Mr. Juozas BRAZAITIS

Lithuanian magazine Lietuvių Dienos, in Les Angeles, Calif., publishes an interview with Professor J. Brazaitis, President of the Lithunian Front (December, 1953).

Question. During 50 years of your life you have followed the political life of Lithunian nation and you took active part in the decisions on vital problems of Lithuania. What is your opinion on national political maturity?

Answer. If by political maturity is understood what our nation is seeking and by which means, and the evaluation of its own problems, Lithuanian political maturity during the days of its independence and now must be regarded as high. It seems to me, however, that this maturity has been better shown by the "lower" part of the nation — villagers, farmers and workers. The youth was the part of the nation which was most sensitive about the ideals of the people.

This It seems that the sound instinct was better judge of the situation than the enlightened reason. The idealism of younger generation was better stimulant for action in the field where calculated realism of older generation suggested silence or even the path of opportunism.

Question. Which government, that of Tautininkai (the Nationalist party) or the provisional government of 1941, must be regarded as the last government of Lithuania, both from jux legal and practical viewpoint?

Answer. The provisional government was the last government of Lithunia. In various memoranda to foreign governments we have considered the provisional government as an expression of genuine aspirations of the people for independence, for its own state and government. By uprising and constitution of provisional government not only the sovereignity of Lithuania was restored, but also dispelled the Soviet propaganda myth that Lithuania had joined the Soviet Union of its own will... This was our important political argument. We cannot reject the facts we want others to believe.

Question. What are the activities of the Lithuanian Front for liberation after it withdrew from the VLIK (the Supreme Committee for Liberation of Lithuania)? Does it have the backing in the resitance movement at home?

Answer. There are three fields in which the emigre resistance activities may find their expression: the propaganda-diplomatic field, by emphasizing our cause among foreign powers, the field of cultural activities, by preserving emigre groups in within the framework of national traditions, and there are some special problems.

At the beginning, the most important activities of our liberation were in the first field. We had to fight against the ebstacles everywhere. This required mobilization of all our forces and funds.

Now the minimum situation has become much better. In various ways the foreign countries are coming to help us. The situation is more critical in the second field. There is increasing danger that we might lose the younger emigre generation. Without abandoning the propaganda field of liberation throughout the with foreign powers, the Lithuanian Front is concentrating most of its

activities in the field of preservation of those living in the free world.

As for backing from homeland, the members of the Lithuanian Front are active in the resitance movement there. When in 1944 VLIK urged all who were able to dom so to stay at home, the representative of the LF was the only memeber of VLIK who pobeyed to this order. The military and information leaders of the Lithuanian Front have fellowed his example. They joined the fate of many combatants for freedom. J. Daumantas in his book Partisans behind the Iron Curtain has enumerated the resistance organizations which had joined their efforts in common fight under one leadeship. Among those organizations you will also find the Lithuanian Front (p. 238). To the members of Lithuanian Front here, in exile, those fighting at home are moral support . We want wish to remain true to this movement for freedom; we wish to preserve this fidelity, especially among the younger generation, we wish the faithfulk execution of the obligations, given to the resistance movement at home.

Question. Does Lithuanian Front consider that after the liberation of Kithuania Lithuania it will wind up its activities as a resistance movement?

Answer. This problem will be solved after the liberation. Besides, it will be decided by these living over there, not by us.

Question. You were present at the Lithuanian Front conference in Europe on September 5-8, 1953. People wonders why this conference had not sent greeting telegramms to VLIK and to the chief of

alities not by their titles but by their contribution to the Lithunian cause. Thus greeting telegrams should be decided not "to whom" but for what deeds." A whole series of personalities and institutions were greeted by the conference in appreciation of their respective contributions.

Question. Does the Lithuanian Front want to return to Vlik, and if so, on what conditions?

Answer. The Lithuanian Front was and still is for a united and common leadership of liberation. The Lithuanian Front had much contributed in building up such leadership in Lithuania. After VLIK was constituted, the Lithuanian Front took an active part in its activities. Later on these activities became impossible, and many efforts to improve internal status of VLIK were unsuccessful. Then the Lithuanian Front walked out of VLIK. By this act it tried to put ther political groups which constitute VLIK and public opinion on guard and to foster the idea of renovation of VLIK. The statement. issued after withdrawal from VLIK, says among other things: "In order to improve (VLIK) these things are needed: a) the reform of personnel, i.e. that the parties and resistance movements should assign to VLIK politically experienced and capable representatives; b) the political reform, i.e. that the clear and undoubtful character of VLIK, as an institution of resistance, be restored and that all its activities be concentrated on liberation and not on the interests of particular groups and blocks; c) the moral reform, i.e. that discrimination, slander be rooted out, and trust and solidarity be restored among the members of VLIK: d) the economic reform, i.e. that the funds, VLIK is getting from the society, be justified by real and clearcut deeds (Darbininkas , Oct. 7, 1952).

The Lithuanian Front understands that those are the conditions under which VLIK might be revived , and also the conditions, under which the Lithuanian Front jake might rejoin VLIK in activities one way or another. Unfortunately, the conference in Europe came to the conclusion that during the last year VLIK had deteriorated and practically ceased to be leading factor in liberation activities. Question. What are the felations between the Lithuanian Front and the Christian Democratic Party (the KEEx KDP)? Does the Lithuanian Front cooperate with the Lithuanian Resistance Alliance (the IRS) ? Principally we reserve are ready to cooperate with any group, and especially with the resistance movements. There are no basic obstacles for such cooperation in exile, as there were no such obstacles for cooperation between, say, political groups and the Riflemen's Association. No secret, however, that such obstacles do exist and they worsen the relations. In each cooperation there are two sides. I can speak and about the Lithuanian Front. The Lithuanian Front would like to take the position which would, at least, acknowledge and respect the freedom of action to all groups and to ourselves, even if the genuine cooperation were impossible.

There is no direct cooperation with the IRS .

Question. There were many charges against you personally. What do you think about those charges and their authors?

Answer. I would not like to be the judge. They must judge it by themselves, according to their conscience. In my opinion, it is past. Better is to look ahead.

Question. Whether you intend to concentrate yourself on political, or scientific activities during the next 50 years of your life?

Answer. Are we able to do what we like? Do you think such a choice will exist in Lithuania? Our duties will be assigned to us, and we will act accordingly in assonscientious manner as possible.

Mr. Sidsikauskas on Lithuanian Conference.

In an interview with the correspondent of Naujienos Mr. V. Sidzikauskas, chairman of the COMMITTEE FOR A FREE LITHUANIA, explained, among other things, his epinion on the Lithuanian conference which should take place in the future (Naujienos, Jan. 13, 1954).

He said:

"Such a conference would be useful; much had been thought and talked about it. The Committee for a Free Lithuania (the LIK) has prepared a detailed program for such conference and sent it to those who are concerned with it. In my opinion, the changing international situation urges that all factors of liberation be concerned with it. The Committee for a Free Lithuania was and still is in favor of such a conference. Under present conditions the best place for it would be the United States".

Mr. Sidzikauskas also expressed his hope that in 1954 the United Center of Information which was formed by the Supreme Committee of Liberation (VLIK), American Lithuanian Council (the ALT) and the Committee for a Free Lithuania (LKK), will perform better job.

In conclusion, Mr. V. Sidzikauskas expressed his opinion that the newly adopted atomic strategy will somewhat delay the liberation of Eastern and Central Europe. Therefore he urged a long-term policy which will finally bring about freedom to Lithuania.



I visited a Mr. Balys ARUNAS, 395 Pertle Street, Toronto, Canada, on 22 February11954. Maving established rapport with him and waiting until we remained alone, I asked what news he had regarding our mutual acquaintance, Jonas DEKSNYS. He related the following facts to me:

The Circumstances under Which JONAS DEKSNYS Was Met

In the middle of October 1953 (I didn't attempt to establish the exact date since it does not have much bearing on the course of events, and ARUNAS doesn't remember it anyway), there was held a Lithuanian, Latvian and Estonian concert. During intermission, ARUNAS left the hall and was standing not far from the men's room door. Suddenly, the men's room door opened and a man came out. ARUNAS, a bit surprised, said to the man, "Good evening, Mr. DEKSNYS."

Taken by surprise, the man extended his hand and said, "Good evening, Mr. ARUNAS."

ARUNAS asked, "Have you been in Canada long, Mr. DEKSNYS?"

He answered, "Long enough to have 'Canadianized' somewhat."

ARUNAS asked further, "Perhaps you came here from the U.S.?"

DEKSNYS answered, "The U.S. and Canada--aren't they about the same? What's the difference?"

For his own part, DEKSNYS queried ARUNAS, "And where do you live?"

ARUNAS, somewhat angered by DEKSNYS' fuzzy answers, also answered fuzzily,
"If you're referring to the geography of Toronto, then I live in the western
part of the city."

It became rather uncomfortable for both and, to obviate an embarrassing silence they started talking about the singers in the concert. DEKSNYS "knocked" the Latvian soloist. At that time, a relative of ARUNAS joined the two men. ARUNAS asked his relative, "Well, do you recognize this man?"

He replied, "Well, I'll be darned, it's Mr. DEKSNYS," and he greeted DEKSNYS,

(ARUNAS; relative lad seen DEKSNYS only once in Stockholm at a social event.)

After talking awhile along unimportant lines, the intermission drew to a close,
and ARUNAS returned to the hall through one side down, DEKSNYS through another,
closer by. That was about 9:00 p.m.

Whether DEKSNYS actually entered the hall, ARUMAS does not know! During the next intermission, ARUNAS looked for DEKSNYS; however, he did not find him, Leaving the concert, ARUNAS waited by the exit, but did not see DEKSNYS there time either.

ARUNAS doesn't remember whether it was the first day after the concert, or the second day, that he, riding on a streetcar to work one morning, saw DEKSNYS standing and waiting for a bus. DEKSNYS also saw ARUNAS, but quickly turned around and walked away from the bus stop.

When DEKSNYS was seen at the concert, he was well dressed. His phaymini physical appearance was also godd--much better than it had been in Stockholm. When seen at the bus stop, he was holding a briefcase, as is customary.

ARUNAS' Impressions and Opinions

I asked ARUNAS, "What do you think about DEKSNYS, having seen him at the concert?"

He answered, "I was very surprised since I knew that since 1949 he had been in Lithuania. I had also heard that he fell into the Soviets' hands there. I therefore would have never expected to meet him."

(The report continues giving additional unimportant details. It also says that DEKSNYS had a mill drop in D Toronto, at which drop a letter was received on 20 September 1953! Details of ARUNAS' earlier relationship with DEKSNYS was given to show that ARUNAS knew DEKSNYS well enough not to have been mistaken.)

Pertraukos metu Artnas išėjo iš salės ir stovėjo netoli tualeto durų. Staiga tualeto durys atsidarė, ir išėjo žnogus. Arunas nustebęs pirmas pratarė: " Labas vakaras, ponas Deksny". Gerokai sumišęs tas padavė ranką ir pasakė: "Labas, Ponas Arunai". Arunas paklausė: "Ar seniai jau Kanadoje, ponas Deksny?" Tas atsakė: "Tai jau spėjau sukanadėti". Arunas toliau klausė: "Tai gal tamsta iš Jungtinių Valstybių čia atsiradai?" (Mat ta dieną į koncertą lietuvių dainininkai- Motekaitienė ir kt. buvo atvykę iš Chicagos). Tas atsakė: "Jungtinės Valstybės ir Kanada ar ne tas pats, koks čia skirtumas". Ir savo ruožtu paklausė Artna: "O kur tu gyveni?" Arunas atsakė, supykintas Deksnio miglotais pasakymais, taip pat neaiškiai ir apie save: "Jei jau orientuojiesi Toronto geografijoj, tai gyvenu vakariniame Toronte". Abiem pasidarė nesmagu ir, kad nereiktų tylėti, ėmė kalbėti apie koncerto dainininkus. Deksnys peikė latvių solistą. Tuo metu priėjo Aruno švogeris. Arunas kreipėsi į savo švogerį: "Na, ar pažįsti?" Tas atsakė: "Na kaip gi, juk tai ponas Deksnys" ir pasisveikino (švogeris Deksnį Stockholme tik sykį buvo matęs- drauge praleido vakara vienose vaišėse). Trumpai pasikalbėjus nereikšmingom frazėm, pertrauka baigėsi, ir Arunas nuėjo į sale pro vienas, šonines

duris, Deksnys pro kitas, priešakines. Tai buvo apie 9 val. vak.

Ar Deksnys tikrai įėjo į salę, Artnas nežino. Kitos pertraukos

metu Arunas dairės Deksnio ir norėjo jį pamatyti, bet nepasisekė. Išeinant iš koncerto Arunas laukė prie durų, bet taip pat nematė.

Arunas neatsimena tikrai, ar rytojaus dieną po koncerto ar antrą dieną, važiuodamas iš ryto į tarnybą tramvajum ir sėdėdamas jame pro langą pamatė Deksnį stovintį ir laukiantį autobuso. Deksnys Aruną taip pat pamatė, staiga apsisuko ir nelaukdamas autobuso nuėjo.

Koncerte matytas Deksnys buvo gražiai apsirengęs. Iš veido atrodė taip pat gražiai; daug gražiau nei Stockholme. Prie autobuyo sustojimo vietos turėjo portfelį, kaip paprastai.

Aruno ispudžiai ir samprotavimai

Artha klausiau: "Ka pagalvojot apie Deksnį, pamatęs jį koncerte?"

Atsakė: "Buvau labiausiai nustebintas, nes žinojau, kad nuo 1949 pavasario jis buvo išvykęs į Lietuvą. Buvau taip pat girdėjęs, kad jis ten pakliuvęs į bolševikų rankas. Tad man jo sutikimas buvo nelauktas".

"Ar kilo kokis įtarimas tada Jums dėl De Zksnio?"

"Iš pradžių buvo džiaugsmo jį pamačius, ir maniau, kad mudu išsibučiuosim. Tik tada, kai jis išsisukinė jamai atsakinė jo į mano
klausimus, man kilo pyktis ir apie savo gyvenamą ją vietą jam atsakiau taip pat neaiškiai. Kai koncerte likau vienas, tik tada kilo įtarimas, ir gailė jausi, kad nepasakiau jam savo telefono nr.,
kad patirčiau ką daugiau iš jo. Per eilę dienų vis dairiausi
prie autobuso sustojimo vietos, kur mačiau Deksnį, nes galvojau,

Papildomos žinios apie Deksnio ryšininka Toronte.

Apie savo susitikimą su Deksniu Artnas pasakė savo draugam, tarp jų ir Kanados berdruomenės lietuvių pirmininkui J. Matulioniui (kuris yra Artno giminė), Rozenblatui (kuris yra atvykęs iš Stockholmo, vedęs min. Balučio dukterį). Su Rozenblatais Stockholme labai bičiuliavosi Jonas Deksnys ir lankydavosi pas juos labai dažnai. Išgirdęs dabar iš Artno apie Deksnio pasirodymą Toronte, Rozenblatas pasakė: Jeigu Jono sąžinė švari, tai negalimas daiktas, kad jis pas mus neužeitų. Rozenblatas taip pat papasakojo Artnui, kad esąs girdėjęs, jog Deksnys Toronte turėjęs ryšininką, kuris iš Deksnio gaudavęs laiškus, rašytus iš Lietuvos. Paskutinis toks laiškas buvęs datuotas 1953 rugsėjo 20 (N.B. pats Deksnys Toronte buvo tų pat metų spalių vidury!).

Vasario 22 21 Toronte buvo atsilankęs Deksnio draugas iš Stockholmo laikų V.Staneika, dabar gyvenąs Chicagoje. Kai jam pasakė apie Deksnio pasirodymą Toronte, labai nustebęs.

Balys Arunas kiles iš Lietuvos nuo Skapiškio. Gimnaziją baigė Kaune 1932, paskui karo mokyklą. ‡944 pabėgo į Svediją. Ten dirfo fabrike, paskui Amerikos pasiuntinybės informacijos tarnyboje (American Information Service) ekspedijuojant biuletenius.

Iš Stockholmo atvyko į Kanadą 1950. Politikoje nedalyvavo. Tik šiek tiek bend ryomenės gyvenime. Labiau linkęs rašinėti feljetonus ir protarpiais bend radarbiauja "Tėviškės Ziburiuose".

Su Deksniu susitikdavo Arunas pas Rozenblatus; Deksnys ateidavo į informacijos tarnybą atsiimti biuletenių. Kelis kartus Deksnys buvo pas Arunus, vaišinosi. Pora kartų skolinosi iš Aruno pinigų ir išvykdamas į Lietuva 1949 skolos 50 kronų neatidavė.

Aranas daro simpatingo, sažiningo ir nuoširdaus žmogaus įsptdį. Tokias informacijas apie jį suteikė Toronte ir kiti.

I did not have any difficulty whatsover in understanding the Lithuanian. Although I cannot write Lithuanian very well, I can understand just about everything.


Since the report is now in my hands. I do not believe there is an immediate need for use to see each other. Consequently, your visit to Washington would not be so desirable now.

Vakar iš ukrainiečių gavau Londone leidžiamą "ABN Correspondence"— The Anti-Bolshewik Block of Nations biuletenį ir vienam nr. 7/8 July-August 1953 skaičiau "Authentic Report on the Ukrainian Underground". Aprašo kovas, nurodo žuvusių pavardes, organizacijų vardus. Savo parodyme aš buvau santuresnis. Kalbėjau tik apie 1940/41 m. pogrindį Lietuvoje ir tik bendrybėmis, kurios ir kvailiausiam NKVDistui žinomos. Apie mano parodymus gali gauti tikslesnių žinių pas Jurgelą. Jis gali spręsti, ar mano parodymai pasiekė neatsakingumo lygi".

Tiek paaiškino Dr. Padalis. Dabar aš pats pasitikrinau jo parodymus iš "Baltic States Investigation Hearings" knygos. A Įsitikinau, kad Padalis teisybę sakė, o spauda, dariusi jam priekaištus, labai prasilenkė su tiesa.

Su šiuo laišku siunčiu Jums Dr. J. Kazicko Questionaire.Kitus atsiųsiu šiom dienom. Jusų informacijai siunčiu skyrium taip pat "Aidų" žurnalą, iš kurio patirsit, kaip mes žiurim į ateitį.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Meeting with AEPOLE/8

- 1. I met AEPOLE/8 in New York, New York, on 9 July 1954, to explore the possibility of his spotting recruits for Lithuanian REDSOX operations. (A covert security clearance to use him for such purpose was recently received from the Security Office.) During the course of a three-hour luncheon, the following topics were discussed with the results indicated.
- 2. Recruitment of Agents. Referring back to our last conversation, I asked AEPOLE/8 if he was willing and able to assist us in the spotting and recruitment of suitable agent candidates for dispatch into Lithuania. AEPOLE/8 said he was able and willing, but that he'd first like to discuss the following questions which had arisen in his mind.
 - a. The first question, he said, was whether there was, in fact, any need for dispatch of agents to Lithuania at this time. AEPOLE/8 emphasized he didn't believe in sending in agents just for the sake of sending them in. I answered his question by rephrasing his question and posing it to him. He thought for a moment, and then said he believed there was need for such work and that maintaining contact with the homeland alone was sufficient justification for dispatch of agents.
 - - (1) He would not be able to see any technical messages or messages which concerned intelligence matters.
 - (2) He would be furnished the gist of all other messages.
 - (3) If the agent concerned requested that a message be passed to AEPOLE/8, we would pass the exact text of such message.

AEPOLE/8 was satisfied with the above proposals and avowed he understood the need for limiting access to messages as a security measure.

c. AEPOLE/8's last question was not a question, in fact, but a

request. He said that recently a member of the "Lithuanian Front," Professor Zeonas IVINSKIS (presently working in the Vatican Archives at Vatican City), requested a visitor's visa from the American Consul in Rome. The visa was not issued on the grounds that the Consul was hesitant to grant visas to "DP's" since many of them, once having entered the U.S., make no effort to leave the country and, in fact, attempt to remain permanently! AEPOLE/8 said that IVINSKIS wanted to visit the U.S. in connection with a conference of the Lithuanian Front being held in New York the latter part of August 1954. AEPOLE/8 wanted to know whether we could aid IVINSKIS in obtaining the visitor's visa. AEPOLE/8 indicated he and his organization would be deeply appreciative of such an effort on our part. told AEPOLE/8 that it was not within my purview to decide whether or not IVINSKIS could be admitted to the country or even whether my organization should make an effort to secure the necessary visa. I also stated that I, however, would discuss the matter with my superiors and personally urge them to authorize intercession with the proper officials. I also indicated that, even though intercession might be authorized by my superiors, there may not be enough time left to insure issuance of the visa before the end of August 1954, in view of the time required for routine investigation of the visa applicant, etc. AEPOLE/8 promised to send me IVINSKIS' PRQ Part I by mail for our use in the event we are able to assist in this matter. (It was obvious to me that, although AEPOLE/8 did not so state, he felt that h<u>is assisting</u> us in recruitment of agents warranted a return favor of this sort from us.)

After the above points were discussed, AEPOLE/8 agreed to start work immediately to locate prospective agent candidates. He felt confident he could furnish the necessary men in the near future. He indicated that he even recently received a letter from a Lithuanian residing in Canada who indicated he might be amenable to recruitment for intelligence work.

- 3. The Controversy. AEPOLE/8 asked me how the difficulties between Controversy. Were coming along. I told him I didn't know too much about the matter personally, but that I was sure that, if there were difficulties, that each side of the controversy was probably guilty to some extent and that the problem could be resolved readily if each party really wanted to do so and put its mind to it.
- 4. REDSKIN Lead. AEPOLE/8 said that Juozas KAZICKAS, a member of the Lithuanian Front who is in the import-export business in New York, returned recently from a business trip to Western Europe. AEPOLE/8 said that KAZICKAS contacted many people engaged in international commerce in Europe. He mentioned one man in Paris--an American--who KAZICKAS said recently completed a deal to sell some goods to an Iron Curtain country to an intermediary. (I'm going to get more details regarding this matter in my next meeting with AEPOLE/8.)

Žemiau skelbiamas tautininkų pirmininko instrukcinis laiškas tautininkų atstovui Vlike yra būdingas tuo, kad atvirai atskleidžia tautininkų politikos arivistinius metodus, nesimpatingus, nemoralius ir nelietuviškus.

Apie vienos tautininkų šakos - voldemarininkų - nelietuviškus metodus neseniai skaiteme spaudoje dokumentus. Skaiteme, kad voldemarininkai naudojosi geštapo talka prieš savaji krašta. Redakciju stalčiuse "marinuojama" medžiaga apie voldemarininku - tautininku talka gestapui 1941 m.prieš to meto Lietuvos vyriausybę. Ir štai vėl pats tautininkų pirmininkas prašo vienminčius "pasidarbuoti" ir skubiai pateikti jam medžiagos prieš savo politinį priešininką, medžiagos ne bet kam, "ne spaudai, os svarbesniam reikalui", medžiagos "panaudoti

efektyviau, nes turim tam šiek tiek TALKININKY".

Kad Paleckis, Gedvilas ir jiems panašūs garsinasi savųjų talkininkų padedami užgrobė Lietuvą ir naikina jos žmones, tai iš bolševiko ko doresnio ir laukti netenka. Bet kai toj pačioj plotmėj, svetimų jų talkos plotmėj, pasirodo tautininkų vadovybė, tai jau me apmaudas, o tik skausmas ir liúdesys suima. Šiaip ar taip tautininkų vadovybė turi tam tikra músu visuomenėje užnugarį. Antai, tautininkų pirmininkas tariasi į tautininkų "židinį" búsiant galima įtraukti be laisvės kovotojų, voldemarininkų ir santarvininkų, dar úkininkų partiją (Sidzikausko), karių "Ramove", studentų "Santara", "Šviesa" ir tt. Ir štai ši músų visuomenės dalis yra daugiau ar mažiau įrankis arivistinių metodų, neišskiriant kerštavimo, veidmainiavimo ir net svetimųjų talkos. Pirmajį atsikirtimą skaitėme pirmadienį, įvykusiame mūsų keturių grupių (vad koordinacininky) posédyje Visi priéjome išvados, kad iš esmés gerai prieita prie reikalo. Kiek kitais žodžiais bet tie patys dalykai ir mano juodraštyje jau buvo projektuoti. Sugestija, apie kuria minėjau telegramoje, bútų tik tokia:

K. Žalkaus kas savo teigimu, kad Šidiškis nėra vertas netgi eilinio " padoraus piliećio vardo, tikrai padaré veiksma, numatyta Baudžiamajame Statute.Tiksliai negaliu čia nustatyti, kurisme Lietuvos B. St. straipsnyje toks dalykas yr: kvalifikuotas (turi bū . Kužkur upie 530 - 53)

straipsnius, neturėdamas B.St.teksto, neturiu iš ko patikrinti; gal JB, kai ilgiau praktikavęs, atsimena – ar gal ten kartais ir B.St.turi). Kiekvienu atveju tai yra pažeminimas, įžeidimas išreikštas raštu, adresuotu tretiesiems asmenims, arba net ir ne tretiesiems, nesgi tai toks raštas, kuris yra skirtas ir pačiam asmeniškai gauti. Taigi čia yra šmeižto ir tiesiosim o įžeidimo mišinys. O įasakyti, kad asmuo yra žemiau padoraus piliečio lygio, yra pavadinti jį nedorėliu visokiais požiūriais.

Todél mano mintis ir buvo, kad ši momenta reiktų pabrėžti ir jei nepagasdinti, tai bent nurodyti, kad šiam jo pasielgimui vertinti yra kompetentingas toks ir toks Reutlingeno teismas, remiantis tokiu ir tokiu vokiečių Strafgesetzbuch straipsniu. (Neturiu teksto, irgi nežinau straipsnio numerio, bet žinau, kad tokie dalykai Strafgesetze yra tik-

sliau kvalifikuoti, ret negu músu B.St.

Kitas mano įspūdis iš visų atsikirtimų – vartoji, pasakyčiau, kiek nervinga polemikos stilių, paprastai vartojama asmeninėj, ne pareiškimuose teisminio pobūdžio organui. Manau JB sutiktų su tuo, kad apeliacijų ir kasacijų skunduose atsikirtimų forma vartojama kiek kitokia (santūresnė, labiau sachlich), negu čia vartoji. Bet visi priėjom išvadų, kad šiuo atveju tas stilius nekenkia, nes l. Spec. Komisija nėra teismas, 2 anot Nemicko, "tokia kalba Vlike geriau suprantama"...

Taigi nei nesiunčiu savo jau surašytu juodraštyje projektu, kadangi

iś esmés tai yra tas pats, tik tonas kiek skirtingesnis.

Nei netelegrafavau jokio "OK", nes telegrafuoti siúlei, jeigu mes čia atsikirtima vetuotumém. Gal kiek klaidino anksčiau išsiusta telegrama, bet vis tiek skirtumo nesudarys, kadangi, jeigu 22 jau įteikei pirma atsikirtima, tai jau įteiktas, o jeigu savaitę užvilkinsi, tai ir šį laišką búsi gavęs.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Meeting with SIDZIKAUSKAS

- 2. Subject explained that his visit to Washington was connected with the activities of the Assembly of Captive Mations. The chairmen of the delegations of the nine nations participating in the Assembly have come to Washington to acquaint members of Congress and government officials with the work of the Assembly and its future plans. Subject further stated that he expects to be in Europe in May in connection with a planned conference of the Assembly to be held in Strasbourg, France. At that time he will visit VLIK Headquarters, as well as London.
- 3. With regard to the controversial problem of moving VLIK to the U.S., subject stated that the six non-clerical parties represented in VLIK had a meeting recently and decided in favor of such a move. They are now negotiating with the Christian Democratic bloc in VLIK (four parties) to make the decision unanimous. Subject added that he had spoken to ZADEIKIS, Lithuanian Minister in Washington, on 19 January concerning the VLIK problem. ZADEIKIS stated he has no objection to VLIK's moving to the United States. He only has some personal objections as regards Monsignor KRUPAVICIUS' coming here. Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS explained that this objection will probably be overcome by a decision of the political parties to leave KRUPAVICIUS in Europe as chairman and to elect a Deputy Chairman who will be at VLIK Headquarters in the U.S.
- 4. Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS made additional explanations as to the reason why the representative of Lithuania Minor in VLIK (SIMONITIS) supported the Christian Democrats in opposing the move of VLIK to the U.S. According to SIDZIKAUSKAS, Simonaitis informed BRAKAS (Representative of Lithuania Minor in the U.S.) that KRUPAVICIUS gave him to understand that if VLIK is moved or the present chairman is not reelected, "the American friends may discontinue their support."
- 5. The participants of the meeting authorized Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS to tell the representatives of the political parties in New York confidentially that, according to his unofficial information, the Americans will regard favorably a move of VLIK to the U.S. and that American support of VLIK does not depend on the geographic location of VLIK Headquarters. Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS indicated that the political

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parties will meet on 5 February 1955, at which time the American position will have a definite bearing on the solution of the problem.

- 6. With regard to the intercepted letter of SIDISKIS, Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS explained that SIDISKIS has made no charges against any individual members of VLIK. He only asked the police to establish who tampered with the letter. The latest information is that the German police have found fingerprints on the envelope and are now trying to establish the identity of the person involved. Mr. SIDZI-KAUSKAS reiterated his previous statement that, despite repeated efforts on his part, RASTENIS (Chairman of the Mationalist Party) has been reluctant to order SIDISKIS to withdraw the complaint.
- 7. In view of the above situation, Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS was authorized to tell RASTENIS that the Americans regard with great displeasure the involvement of VLIK with the German police and therefore desire to have RASTENIS instruct SIDISKIS to withdraw his complaint.
- RAZAITIS in the Assembly of Captive Nations as a representative of FRONTAS. SIDSIKAUSKAS explained that the reason BRAZAITIS had not been appointed was because of the strong objections of VLIK against his candidacy. SIDZIKAUSKAS promised to see whether the omission can be rectified. However, he failed to give any definite promise to do so.

SUBJECT: Meeting with Professor Juozas BRAZAITIS

- 1. I met Professor BRAZAITIS on 26 January 1955 in New York, N.Y. to discuss his recruitment of REDSON agents for us. BRAZAITIS had earlier advised us that he was hesitant about committing members of the Lithuanian Front for such purpose since the Americans have not given the Lithuanian Front any overt political support. This was contrasted with the support VLIK is receiving. BRAZAITIS intimated that if he or another member of his group were appointed to the Crusade for Freedom-sponsored Assembly of Captive Nations that he would aid us in recruitment.
- 2. I told BRAZAITIS that we would take steps to include his organization in the Lithuanian representation of the Assembly of Captive Nations. Although I said that inclusion cannot be guaranteed, it is nevertheless probable. This satisfied BRAZAITIS and he revealed that he had two persons who would be willing to go on a mission to Lithuania. One of these resides in Canada, the other in Amsterdam, New York. BRAZAITIS will obtain biographical information regarding both men within two weeks.
- 3. Itold BRAZAITIS that when the biographical data was in his hands, that perhaps he could deliver it to us in Washington. At the same time, I said, BRAZAITIS could probably meet my new superior, " , well-known to BRAZAITIS. BRAZAITIS expressed pleasure for such opportunity. recalling, with satisfaction, his earlier relationship with " .
- 4. I also briefly explored BRAZAITIS' interest in participating in an independent, apolitical Lithuanian information or radio unit. (Since this was done in a hypothetical way, no intention of ours was, I am sure, revealed to BRAZAITIS.) BRAZAITIS said that although an independent propaganda-information unit would be difficult to set up, he believed that, with the U.S. Government behind it, it could be done and that he would be willing to participate in it.
- 5. In closing, BRAZAITIS mentioned the fact that he recently received a letter from a friend of his named CIBIRAS, residing in South America. (CIBIRAS is being cleared by us for a position, possibly that of chief, in the Madrid Radio Unit.) CIBIRAS says that VLIK has invited him to join its Radio Section, and CIBIRAS solicited BRAZAITIS' opinion as to whether he should accept the job. When queried by me, BRAZAITIS said he was planning to advise CIBIRAS to reject the offer in view of the uncertainty of tenure of VLIK employment. BRAZAITIS then hinted that it would be wise for us to "guarantee" (i.e., recruit and contract) CIBIRAS in the same way we had GALVA. In that case, BRAZAITIS said, CIBIRAS would have sufficient guarantee of employment and BRAZAITIS would advise him to accept the job. I told BRAZAITIS the matter would be considered and BRAZAITIS would be advised as to what to write CIBIRAS. BRAZAITIS agreed.

SUBJECT: Meeting with Vaclovas SIDZIKAUSKAS

1. I met Mr. SIDZIKAUSKAS in New York on 25 January 1955 for the following purposes:

a. To be introduced to Vincas RASTENIS, leader of the

Nationalist Party and member of the Committee for a Free Lithuania, in order to discuss the situation caused by interception of a letter of his to Tomas SIDISKIS in DECLASSIFIED AND RELEASED BY Germany, and subsequent investigation of the matter by CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY the German police. We had requested, through SIDZIKAUSKAS, SOURCES METHODS EXEMPTION 3B26 that RASTENIS urge SIDISKIS to withdraw his complaint with the German police in interests of Lithuanian unity and NAZI WAR CRIMES DISCLOSURE ACT the U.S. Government's concern lest its covert relationship with VLIK be uncovered.

- b. To learn any new developments in the move of VLIK From Germany to the United States.
- 2. The following is a resume of the conversation with SIDZIKAUSKAS:
 - a. RASTENIS appears willing to cooperate in requesting the German police to drop the investigation, but would want to discuss the matter with me first. SIDZIKAUSKAS claimed that RASTENIS would use the opportunity to justify his stand on all other Lithuanian emigre disputes. A meeting was arranged for later in the day.
 - b. SIDZIKAUSKAS believes that the movement of VLIK will be approved at the meeting of the party leaders scheduled for 5 February 1955. He believes some method will be worked out to make it appear that the move is sponsored and initiated by VLIK itself, rather than the party centers.
 - c. I again reiterated our earlier request that Professor J. BRAZAITIS be placed in the Assembly of Captive Nations. SIDZIKAUSKAS said he would try to do so at the next meeting of the Lithuanian delegation. However, even though he said he thought he would succeed, he did not act very confident. He indicated that some of his strongest support to accomplish this would probably come from the Nationalists, even though BRAZAITIS has been an outspoken critic of the Nationalists, since the Nationalists have been seeking political harmony with BRAZAITIS.

3 SIDZIKAUSAS expects to be in Washington on 31 January or 1 February 1955. He will telephone us at that time.

- 1. On 24 March 1955 at 1400 hours, the undersigned met subject in New York City at the Statler Hotel. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss spotting of REDSOX agent candidates.
- 2. Subject explained that one of the candidates he had in mind implied to him that he would be reluctant to undertake any REDSOX-type mission. Therefore, he did not prepare a PRQ on this candidate as he had promised to previously. Subject further stated that he finds it quite difficult to find suitable candidates in the United States. He then explained his general views on the subject of recruiting agents and stated that it seemed to him that anyone selected for such a mission at this time should be considered a total loss.
- 3. The undersigned at this point then discussed in detail our cooperation with subject's organization and the purpose and importance of finding suitable persons that can serve the common cause for the ultimate liberation of Lithuania. The undersigned also emphasized to subject the great importance of having such missions, as Mr. Galcius had discussed with him previously, implemented at this time. Subject then indicated that he realized the importance of our cooperation and that he will try in the future to help us in our mission as much as it is possible for him. He emphasized, however, that in order to make contact with the members of his organization who would be willing to undertake a certain type of mission, he must do a lot of traveling, and such trips he can not undertake without any outside help. Subject mentioned that he discussed previously a trip to Europe for the purpose of contacting members of his organization in Germany and France. He would also be able to coordinate his activities with Mr. BACKYS, who is one of the main leaders of the FRONTAS organization. Subject stated that in all honesty he must admit that he can not promise anything concrete from this trip. However, since the majority of young members of his organization are now in Germany, whom he never met, he believes that he may find among them suitable candidates.
- 4. Mr. BRAZAITIS further mentioned that he received letters from several members of VLIK asking him, on a personal basis, as to his attitude with regard to re-entering the VLIK organization. Mr. BRAZAITIS again expressed his unwillingness to become a member of VLIK at the present time, until the composition of VLIK, as well as its activities, has been changed. However, he indicated that in the course of his visits with their political leaders, the matter of his party's cooperation with VLIK will undoubtedly be discussed privately.

SECRET

Subject implied that a trip to Germany would undoubtedly facilitate his future re-entry into the VLIK organization.

- 5. Subject estimated that the cost of such a trip, including transportation by plane, would amount to at least \$1,000... This sum will have to be advanced by us as his organization is not able to finance his travel. As far as the security aspects of this trip are concerned, subject indicated that the Lithuanian community in the United States, as well as in Europe, will accept his trip as a normal undertaking, and they will not question what source is financing this trip. He added that two years ago he made a similar trip on his own, and it would be quite normal to repeat the same undertaking.
- 6. In view of the above and in view of the difficulties that the Lithuanian Desk encounters in securing proper agent candidates through our own facilities, it is recommended that a trip to Europe by Mr. BRAZAITIS, as outlined above, should be approved. The investment will undoubtedly prove worthwhile if subject only acts as a spotter for future REDSKIN and REDSOX leads. Moreover, it seems that such a trip will greatly contribute to FRONTAS' joining VLIK, which is definitely in our interest at the present time.

- 1. Reference is made to paragraph 5 of the Memorandum for the Record dated 27 January 1955, concerning the undersigned's meeting with Professor Juozas BRAZAITIS on 26 January 1955.
- 2. The following is the action to be taken by the Lithuanian Section concerning the employment of CIBIRAS and BRAZAITIS' connection therewith:
 - a. BRAZAITIS will be advised to write to CIBIRAS and recommend that he accept the position offered by VLIK. The undersigned will personally guarantee to BRAZAITIS that if CIBIRAS is not employed by VLIK for at least two years and is not furnished transportation back to his present domicile at the end of his tenure of service. then the U. S. Government will extend such benefits to CIBIRAS, directly or through VLIK. However, BRAZAITIS will be requested not to advise CIBIRAS of this guarantee, nor anyone else. It will be understood that this guarantee will be known only to BRAZAITIS and the U. S. Government.
 - b. VLIK will be advised that an examination of CIBIRAS' professional qualifications and a security investigation enables us to concur with VLIK's recommendation for CIBIRAS' employment. VLIK will be authorised to contract for obligation against subsidy funds with CIBIRAS for a two-year period of employment and transportation to Europe from his home, and return.

In return for his services, and to furnish him a tangible expression of our appreciation, it would be very desirable if CIA could bring about his seating on the Committee for a Free Lithuania and in the Lithuanian delegation to the Assembly of Captive Nations. At the present time BRAZAITIS is not a member of either body.
- 3. Aside from our desire to reward BRAZAITIS for his valuable service, it is believed that he should be a member of the organizations mentioned above because the "Lithuanian Front", a splinter of young activiste from the Lithuanian Christian Democratic Party, is virtually the only important political group not represented in the Committee and the Assembly.

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

SUBJECT: Meeting with Juozas BRAZAITIS

- 1. The undersigned met with subject on 16 April 1955 at 1700 in New York at a downtown hotel. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss subject's contemplated trip to Europe and his itinerary.
- 3. Subject them told the undersigned that he had received a letter from Professor IVINSKAS, a leader of the FRONTAS party who is now residing at Bonn. The latter wrote subject that he was contacted by a certain Professor IBSEN who represents the Germany Foreign Ministry. Professor IBSEN explained to Professor IVINSKAS that the German Government looks with disfavor on Dr. KARVELIS. They consider him an "HOCHTAPLER" a political opportunist and would be glad if he disappeared from the scene at Bonn. He further stated that the German Foreign Ministry would be glad to have BRAZAITIS in Bonn as representative of Lithuanian matters before the Ministry. Subject added that he received the impression from IVINSKAS letter that the German officials are anxious to meet with him and discuss various aspects of Lithuanian political affairs.
- 4. Subject further explained that the reason for his plan to visit Zurich was to meet with a certain Dr. SCAPER. The latter is a newspaper man of German origin whom subject has been meeting while in Germany after the war. According to subject, Dr. SCAPER has been very close with the German Wehrmacht and apparently still has close contact in German military circles.
- 5. Subject then asked the undersigned whether it is possible to receive more details on SKRAJUNAS' death, namely whether information about his death was obtained from British sources. He explained that the

reason for this request was that he recently met with SKRAJUNAS' widow and the latter still believes that SKRAJUNAS is alive. The undersigned told subject that inasmuch as he (the undersigned) is unfamiliar with the details, he would suggest that BRAZAITIS talk about the case with when he meets him in Germany.

6. It was agreed that when subject makes reservation for his air passage he will notify the undersigned so that financial arrangements for the trip can be made.

SUBJECT: Meeting with BRAZAITIS

- 1. The undersigned met subject on 6 May 1955 at 1500 hours in a downtown hotel in New York City. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss with subject his planned trip to Europe and to give him an advance for his expenses on this trip.
- 2. Subject stated that he had already made a reservation for passage to Europe by plane on 25 May 1955. He will arrive in Paris on 26 May where he will meet Minister BACKIS and some other members of his party. He will then proceed to Germany some time in the beginning of June and meet with PARLIMONIS and in Frankfurt. After that meeting his schedule will be flexible, and he will make various visits in Germany, France and possible Stockholm as the situation may require.
- 3. Subject further mentioned that PAULTUKENIS has written to him stating that he was working in Frankfurt and that subject was expected in Frankfurt by 1 June. (Comment: This letter apparently means that () has already informed PAULTUKENIS about subject's anticipated visit.)
- 4. The undersigned then discussed in detail subject's trip and what he is expected to perform on our behalf. The undersigned indicated to subject the type of help he can render us in the field of REDSKIN operations. Subject seemed to be very interested and, to a certain extent, relieved by visualizing that he could assist us in another way than by only procuring candidates for REDSOX-type operations. Subject promised to discuss in detail with what he can accomplish during his stay in Europe.
- 5. The undersigned further discussed with subject the case of RASTIKYS. Subject stated that he received an inquiry from the Department of Defense with regard to RASTIKYS from which he understood that RASTIKYS is being considered as a condidate for a Lithuanian language instructor at the Monterey Army School. Subject believes that this inquiry is due to our intervention on the behalf of RASTIKYS and is therefore grateful for our effort.
 - 6. The undersigned also discussed with subject the situation in VLIK and suggested that he meet VLIK members and then present an evaluation of VLIK and the current internal relations in VLIK either to I or to the undersigned. The undersigned also discussed

with subject MIGLINAS -- the present chief of the VLIK Radio Section. Subject stated that MIGLINAS is not consistent in his political views. He also confirmed that MIGLINAS was influenced to accept the job by KARVELIS cue to the fact that some business relations have existed between the two.

7. The undersigned them handed over to subject \$1000.00 as an advance for the expenses that subject will incur during his trip. The undersigned asked subject to submit at a later date a detailed accounting of these expenses.

SUPJECT: Meeting with J. BRATAITIS - 6 August 1955

- 1. On 6 August 1955 at 1230 hours the undersigned met BRAZAITTS in New York in a downtown hotel for the purpose of checking his accountings for expenditures made during his trip to Europe and also to supplement operational information given by subject during his meeting with the undersigned on 18 July 1955.
- 2. The undersigned indicated to subject that the accountings for expenditures submitted by him were not detailed enough and asked him to supplement the accountings by giving dates of trips and submitting an available receipts and tickets. Subject promised to comply and to mail to the undersigned a new statement of expenditures.
- h. Subject then asked the undersigned an embarrassing question with regard to the meeting of [] with %. LOZORAITIS. According to subject he received information from a friend in Home that such a meeting between [] and LOTORAITIS took place. The undersigned sidestepped this question by telling subject that he has no knowledge of such a meeting but that it is quite possible that the person involved, during his extensive travels in Europe, met accidentally with LOZOPAITIS.

Comment: The undersigned wishes to state at this time that subject seems on many occasions to be too inquisitive as to our activities and the undersigned will make it clear to subject at the next meeting that our relations with him are on a "need to know" basis.



- Subject further discussed the matter of VLIK's monitoring service. Subject complained that RASTENIS, who is a member of the Committee for Free Europe as well as an editor of a party paper, is using the copy of the monitoring report which he gets from the Committee for Free Europe for the purpose of publishing some items in his newspaper which are not available to other papers, including the newspaper which is edited by subject. Darbininkas. Subject further stated that another person, VILKAITIS, in Chicago, Illinois, receives the same monitoring report and is also exploiting it for publishing exclusive news in Naujienos. The undersigned promised subject that he would look into the matter and see whether VLIK could arrange to have additional copies of their report made so that all Lithuanian newspapers in the U.S. could receive a copy.
- 6. The undersigned then asked subject to write to K. CIBIRAS in Montevideo and ask him to confirm whether he received an invitation from VIJK to accept a job in Madrid as chief editor of the radio section. According to our information, such an invitation was sent to CIBIRAS but the latter stalls his acceptance giving as an excuse that he is awaiting approval for such acceptance from LOZORAITIS. Subject promised to investigate immediately this matter.
- 7. The undersigned also discussed with subject spotting REDSOX and REDSKIN leads in the U.S. The undersigned indicated that if necessary subject will be advanced expenses for an operational trip, providing he has good leads and such expenses can be properly justified.
- 8. At the end of the meeting subject queried the undersigned with regard to DEKSNYS who allegedly was seen in Canada a year ago. He wanted to know whether we had any further information regarding this matter. He stated that he met a certain Jonas ZILTMEKAS in New York some time ago who again repeated that DEKSNYS was seen in Canada. The undersigned stated that he had no further information on this matter but asked that subject follow up the rumors and that if he had some concrete evidence with regard to the appearance of DEKSNYS in Canada, his trip to verify this information might be warranted.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Meeting with Mr. BRAZAITIS

- 1. On 28 November 1955 at 1500 hours the undersigned met Subject at a downtown New York hotel. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss some REDSKIN leads which Subject acquired and his future cooperation in our PP activities.
- 2. Subject stated that his contact, Juozas Kazickas, has recently returned to the States from Europe. He will be glad to introduce the undersigned to him (Comment: Kazickas is a source of REDSKIN leads and was trying unsuccessfully to contact him in Germany. The undersigned will now attempt to establish this contact in the U.S.)
- 3. Subject then raised the question about U.S.'s interest in the Lithuanian cause in light of the recent policy of "appeasement" towards the USSR on the part of the Western Powers. He was wondering whether we are still interested in supporting our Lithuanian PP activities as well as engage in REDSOX type operation. The undersigned clarified that basically our support remained the same. We are continuing our support of covert PP activities against the Lithuanian SSR. "The spirit of Geneva" has not daysed us fundmentally to change our attitude towards the activities of the Lithuanian political groups especially as far as radio broadcasts are concerned. We, of course, do not wish that the radio broadcasts should reflect encouragement to resist against the present regime but neither would VLIK like to encourage such resistance. Our aim in the radio broadcasts is to keep up the spirit of the people in the homeland and to let them know that they are not forgotten. This, at present, is also believed to be the policy that VLIK has applied in its broadcasts. Subject agreed to the above and stated that he would be ready to support such broadcasts and particularly the radio work providing VLIK reorganizes its radio section where favorable conditions exist for participation in the radio work of persons now outside of VLIK.
- 4. Subject then informed the undersigned that he again received a message from German authorities in Bominquiring whether he made up his mind to come to Germany and head the "German Lithuanian Cultural Society". Subject stated that he will send the same reply as previously, namely, that he was not in a position to accept this office, at the present time.
- 5. Subject further mentioned that Mr. Lozoraitis has recently been on very friendly terms with the "Frontas" representative in Rome, Prof. Ivinskis.

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Subject was wondering what was the reason for this particular interest on the part of Lozoraitis in "Frontas". He asked the undersigned whether any of our "people" have met recently with Lozoraitis. The undersigned denied any knowledge of such a meeting.

6. In the course of the discussion, Subject mentioned that he would like to visit various branches of his organization in the U.S. but he is short of funds. The undersigned explained to Subject that only in cases where Subject felt that he could obtain definite REDSKIN or REDSOX leads he might receive support from us to undertake a visit to one of the branches of his organization. However, Subject will have to discuss his itinerary in advance with the undersigned before approval will be given.

SUBJECT: Meeting with Juozas BRAZAITIS - 16 January 1956

- 1. The undersigned met subject on 16 January 1956 in a downtown New York hotel at 1900 hours. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss subject's attitude toward the new administration of VLIK and the prospect of his cooperation with this new administration.
- 2. Subject stated that during the past few months he had been very busy with his own organizational matters. His party is now undergoing a process of expansion and reorganization. Subject's party (Frontas) has arranged several regional meetings and expects to have a national meeting in Canada next spring, which would include representatives of the various branches of the party in the U.S. as well as Canada. Subject declared that under these conditions he feels his party can accomplish more for the Lithuanian cause by "going it alone" and not affiliating itself with either VLIK or the new alliance of political parties which was formed recently outside of VLIK. Subject emphasized that he did not believe that the new administration of VIIK is capable of substantially changing the existing condition of ineptness and ineffectiveness. Subject stated that VLIK had deteriorated greatly during the past year and it would be difficult for the present administration, without having broader powers, to transform VLIK into an effectively functioning organization.
- 3. Subject further stated that he knows the new chairman of VIIK, Mr. MATULIONIS, and does not regard him as a strong personality. However he believes that the new chairman is more amenable to cooperation than Monseigneur KHUPAVICIUS was. Basically, however, subject thinks the new chairman will not change the existing policy of VIIK and will continue to strive for domination of the Christian Democratic Party within VIIK.
- 4. Subject then asked the undersigned whether it would be possible to intervene in the case of two members of the Frontas Party, now residing in Germany, who plan on arriving in the U.S. on visitors' visas for the purpose of participation in the above-mentioned national conference which is to take place in Canada. The two members are planning to stay about two months in the U.S. and visit the various branches of the party prior to departing for Canada. Subject explained that the party members in question will apply for the visas themselves, but in case they run into difficulty he wanted to receive assurance from the undersigned that we could facilitate their obtaining visas. The two persons in question are:
 - a. Professor Antanas MACEINA Prinz-Eugen-Strasse 23 Freiburg i Br Germany



b. Professor Zenonas IVINSKIS Heerstrasse 4 Bonn, Germany

The undersigned informed subject that he would consider this matter and would let him know at a later date whether or not we could intervene in this matter.

- 5. Subject then related a very interesting experience which Prof. MACEINA had recently. About two months ago Prof. MACEINA was visited by his wife from Lithuania. She came to his place of residence in the guise of an interpreter for a Soviet officer who came to Freiburg to pick up another Soviet officer who became ill while with the Repatriation Mission. Prof. MACEINA's wife visited him alone and spent about ten hours with him. She tried to convince him that he should return with her to Lithuania for her sake and the sake of their two children. She did not discuss political matters with him. Prof. MACEINA of course refused to return to Lithuania; however he promised his wife he would send her food packages. Prof. MACEINA also informed the local German Police about this occurrence.
- 6. Subject further told the undersigned that Prof. MACEINA was informed by the German Police that he could expect a second visit from his wife. Whether this visit materialized or not, subject does not know. Subject also could not tell the undersigned how the German Police (German Intelligence Service) found out about the planned second visit. Subject also gave were detailed information about Prof. MACEINA, stating that he was very active in the Frontas Party in Lithuania and that he was well-known at the University as a philosopher and economist, and that the Soviets apparently were trying to lure him back to Lithuania in order to use him for propaganda purposes.

7. At the end of the meeting subject promised the undersigned to keep him informed regarding any further contacts of Prof. MACEINA with his wife and also to be alert for any REDSKIN leads that he might become aware of while attending the regional conferences of his party.

le At a recent meeting between | _ _ and ABFOLE 8 the latter discussed his party's activities. He stated that the party plans to hold a meeting of delegates in the early spring in Canada. Two preminent members of the party new residing in Germany, (Identity 1 and Identity 2), plan to participate in the convention. They plan to come first to FDFR.DE on a visitors' view and visit the various branches of the party prior to departing for Canada. Subject explained that shove identities will apply for the views themselves, but in case they run into difficulties, he asked Wellerson if it would be possible to render the Identities assistance in obtaining the views.

SUBJECT: Meetings with Juozas BRAZAITIS - 30 April - 1 May 1956

- 1. The undersigned met subject in New York City on 30 April and 1 May 1956. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss with subject the progress he made in his negotiations with VLIK concerning re-entry of Frontas into VLIK organization and discussion of other operational CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY SOURCES METHODS EXEMPTION 3B2B NAZI WAR CRIMES DISCLOSURE ACT BATE 2006
- 2. Subject told the undersigned that he met Matulionis after the latter's return from his European trip and discussed the problem of his organization joining VLIK as well as the question of him becoming head of the radio section. Mr. Brazaitis again told Mr. Matulionis that before he becomes head of the radio section his party must come to asscreement with VLIK. Subject further told Mr. Matulionis that, according to a decision of the Frontas Central Committee, in order for Frontas to join VLIK the following two conditions must be met:
- a. VLIK should recall allegations made by Dr. Karvelis to the effect that subject is an "American agent". VLIK should agree to have a "honor court" review this matter and clear Brazaitis of any such suspicion.
 - b. VLIK should issue an official invitation requesting Frontas to re-join VLIK.
- 3. Subject then pointed out that he was reluctant to take over the radio workshop since he fears political interference on the part of VLIK leadership. He further pointed out that his party is now more interested in cultural activities and makes a program in this respect among the young generation of Lithuania in the US as well as Canada. The undersigned got the impression that Frontas consider it more expediate to go it alone rather than function as a integral part of VLIK.
- 4. Subject then related to the undersigned that a certain Prof. Zenonas Ivinskis, now a member of Frontas in Rome, would like to come to the US for the purpose of participating in a convention of Frontas members residing in the US as well as in Canada. It will take place in the middle of June in Toronto. Subject further related that Prof. Ivinskis is a scholar who is doing research work at the Vatican and that he is also connection with the Baltic Society

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in Germany and the Baltic Research Institute, which is an adjunct of the Baltic Society.

Subject further explained that the Baltic Society has 3 branches, i.e., German Lithuanian,

German Latvian, and German Estonian. The Baltic Research Institute is engaged in historical

research on German Baltic relations. The Society and Institute are sponsored by the German

Government. Subject indicated that Prof. Ivinskis would give us details on the operation

of the Institute and the Society since the activities of this Society and Institute are quite

interesting to us. The undersigned promised to subject that he will inquire whether any

help can be given to Prof. Ivinskis in supporting his application for a tourist visa.

- 5. Subject further told the undersigned about a news item which appeared in the Lithuanian weekly newspaper published in Toronto entitled "TEVISKES ZIBURIAI" (The Lights of Homeland).

 The item appeared in the paper dated 19 April 1956. It states that a certain partisan,

 Julies Butenas, is alive and located in a forced labor camp and sentenced to 25 years.

 According to subject, the person mentioned in this newspaper item is identifical with our

 REDSOX agent known as "STEVE" who was dispatched in 1951. Subject stated that he believes

 the source for this news item was a private letter received by someone from Lithuania. Subject asked the editor of the newspaper to inform him in greater detail as to the source of this information. Subject promised to let the undersigned know as soon as he receives his reply to his request. Subject also gave a copy of the newspaper in question to the undersigned.
- 6. After a discussion with Mr. Matulionis, subsequent to this meeting, it became apparent to the undersigned that the subject, in his negotiations with Matulionis concerning the radio section, is implying he is weare of the fact that some outside pressure is being excerted to employ subject as head of the radio section. This attitude of subject, Matulionis assured, makes it more difficult to achieve an agreement with subject. The undersigned therefore decided to meet subject again and clarify this point.



7. At the meeting of 1 May 1956, the undersigned again discussed with subject VLIK activities and the problem of transferring the radio section to the US. The undersigned made it clear to subject that we are not interested in any effort to excert pressure on VLIK in regard to their political activities and radio work. We are only interested to make the radio work more effective and on this basis we told VLIK leaders it appeared to make the radio work more effective in the US where most of the talent is available. The undersigned further clarified that we are not interested on insisting on certain personnel who should be engaged in this radio work. This matter is entirely within the jurisdiction of VLIK. We would certainly welcome if subject becomes engaged in the radio work, however, we are not prepared to excert any pressure on VLIK. Subject replied that he was quite aware of our hands off policy and that he understood our reasons for interest in VLIK radio activities. Subject again promised to give the undersigned information as to the results of his negotiations with VLIK. (NOTE: It seems to the undersigned that subject understood well the intention of the undersigned in discussing this matter and that he became aware of the fact that we will not excert any pressure that he should be employed by VLIK.)

- 1. The undersigned met subject on 3 July 1956 at 1400 hours in a downtown NY hotel.

 The purpose of the meeting was to clarify the progress subject has made in his negotiations with VLIK concerning his employment as head of the radio section.
- 2. Subject stated that since his last meeting with the undersigned he has met Mr. Matulion several times and discussed with the latter the question of Frontas organization re-entering VLIK as well as his employment as head of the radio section. Subject informed the undersigned that with regards to Frontas re-entering VLIK there are some basic difficulties which to date have not been removed. Frontas demands that as a condition for rejoining VLIK, Dr. Karvelis should recall and apology for his statements made regarding the activities of subject.

 Dr.

 It seems that/Karvelis is not willing to retract these statements. Frontas was demanding reorganization of the Labor Federation Party (a member of VLIK) which at present time is apparently dominated by the Christian Democratic Party. Frontas maintains that this domination is artificial and that representatives of the Labor Federation should be elected on the basis of democratic principles and not appointed as they are at the present time by the leadership of the Democratic Party.
- 3. With regard to subject's acceptance of the offered position as head of the radio section, subject stated that he made it clear to Mr. Matulionis that VLIK has to reach a compromise with Frontas before he agrees to accept the position. Subject further clarified his position that the above compromise does not mean that Frontas has to enter VLIK, it only means that Frontas has to agree to support VLIK's radio activities. If there is no agreement between VLIK and Frontas, then subject cannot become an employee of VLIK.
- 4. Subject further explained that to date he has not received a clear reply from
 Mr. Matulionis as to the above conditions. In subject's opinion, Mr. Matulionis is afraid to

adopt a clear-cut position and employs delaying tactics in negotiating with subject. Subject further stated that actually he is not anxious to undertake the job because of the many complications involved. Subject pointed out, for instance, that Mr. Matulionis did not clarify whether in case subject agrees he will have a certain degree of independence in running the radio section. Subject also asked Mr. Matulionis whether he could guarantee for him and the other employees of the radio section permanent employment for the next two years. Subject explained that it would be difficult for him to find suitable candidates for the radio section if he could not guarantee them permanent employment. As for himself, subject further stated he is at present employed by the newspaper DARBINKAS and receives \$200 a month. The newspaper even advanced him a salary for the next ten months so that he could make a down payment on a house. Subject implied that in case he accepts the position, then VLIK will have to advance him the same amount so that he can get a release from his present employer. Subject again emphasized he would be very happy if VLIK found another person to undertake the job as he is considering this position with VLIK mainly for patriotic reasons because he believes in the importance of radio work in the present situation.

5. The undersigned again clarified that our position was not to interfer in the internal affairs of VLIK and that VLIK is at liberty to decide who should be employed as the head of the radio section. Our only interest in the radio section is that it be effective and authoritative so that it will be worthy of our support. Inasmuch as VLIK leadership expressed its wish to employ subjects as head of the radio section and found him suitable, we are also interested in subject's acceptance of the job. The undersigned further added that if in the course of subject's further negotiations with Mr. Matulionis, we find that the main obstacle are some technical questions, the undersigned might be will in the participate in/private confidential meeting with subject and Mr. Matulionis in order to help iron out

- and the undersigned met with Mr. Juogas BRAZAITIS at a down-town hotel in New York City at 1000 hours on 14 July 1956. The purpose of this meeting was to convince Subject he should agree to be the director of the VLIK radio center.
- 2. Mr. BRAZETTIS mentioned the newspaper accounts of alleged American aircraft flying over the Baltic area, and asked for the undersigned's opinion on the reliability of the accounts. The undersigned remarked that several possibilities existed; (1) that British or Norwegian aircraft might have flown over the area and had been mistaken for American, and (2) that it might be a possible ruse on the part of the Soviets to perpetuate the "Cold War". The undersigned further remarked that the American defense officials had definitely stated that American aircraft had not flown over the Baltic area. Mr. BRAZATTIS stated that United States State Department officials had missed an excellent opportunity to rebuff the Soviet allegation by stating that since the United States did not recognize the occupation of Lithuania, that it was Lithuania's prerogative to object to overflights and not the prerogative of the Kremlin.
- 3. Mr. BRAZAITIS briefly mentioned the Cultural Congress held in Chicago recently. Subject stated the Cultural center of the Lithuanian people was in Cleveland, Ohio, and that the political center of the Lithuanians was in New York City.
- 4. C Dasked Mr. BRAZAITIS what his feelings were toward being the director of the radio centeer. Mr. BRAZAITIS replied that he would like to accept the position very much, but there were some minor obligations that prevented him from doing so.

asked whether the fact that Mr. BRAZAITIS' political party was not in VLIK prevented him from accepting the position. Mr. BRAZAITIS replied that it was not necessary for his party to become a member of VLIK in order for him to accept the position. Mr. BRAZAITIS stated that he had recently purchased a house and had indebted himself to the "DRAUGAS" newspaper for \$2,000, and was obligated to repay it before he could consider accepting the position of director of the radio center. Treplied that a loan of \$2,000 could be made to him, and a salary of \$400 per month would be guaranteed him for one year. Mr. BRAZAITIS replied that given those assurances, he would accept the position as radio director of the radio center, and that he and Mr. MATULIONIS would discuss it in the near future. 5. SUBJECT: Meeting with Jonas Brazaitis - 31 July 1956

- 1. The undersigned met subject on 31 July 1956 at 1500 hours in a NY downtown hotel. The purpose of the meeting was to establish the degree of progress subject has made in his negotiations with the Chairman of VLIK regarding subject's acceptance of the position as chief of the radio center.
- 2. Subject stated that, after his last meeting with Mr. Matulionis, he had mailed to Matulionis a formal letter in which he outlined his conditions for accepting the position. Subject gave the undersigned a copy of the letter. The conditions outlined in the letter are as follows:
 - a. Officially the radio center is under the jurisdiction of the Chairman of VLIK.
 - b. The radio center is autonomous as to its activities and implements its functions within the limits of an established budget.
 - c. The radio center funds, according to policy directives of a consultatory organ which establishes the political line is to be followed in general matters as well as particular cases. The following will participate in this consultatory organ: Chairman of VLIK (or his representative), representative of the Diplomats, representative of ALT, and perhaps a representative of the Lithuanian community (in the US). The manager of the radio center is to participate in this organ (with or without voting rights).
 - d. The manager of the radio center appoints all employees of the center. A contract should be signed with all these employees for a definite period.
- 3. Subject further stated that to date he had not received a reply to his letter from Mr. Matulionis.
- 4. Subject added, however, that a certain Mr. Salcius who presently writes scripts for VLIK recently met Mr. Matulionis. The latter told Mr. Salcius that Mr. Brazaitis is unacceptable as Chief of the radio section because his requirements are too rigid. Subject felt that Mr. Matulionis should have discussed these matters with him and not with a third party.
- 5. Subject further added that he agrees in principle to accept the position as head of the radio center, however, he would like to have autonomy and secondly, Mr. Matulionis must come to a certain working agreement with the Frontas organization. Subject thought that the second condition could be easily met if Matulionis writes a letter to Frontas explaining that he personally dissassociates himself with any previous derogatory statements made by Er. Karvelis concerning Brazaitis.
- 6. The undersigned discussed with subject at great length the present situation in VLIK and the necessity for subject to cooperate in the field of radio propaganda. The undersigned also emphasized our interest in this radio work. At the end of the meeting, subject promised

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SECRET

to cooperate in his negotiations with Matulionis provided the latter agrees that the radio center be given a certain degree of autonomy. The undersigned indicated to subject that he may meet him again in a day or so.

- 7. Subject then informed the undersigned that Prof. Ivinskis, who planned to come to the US in order to attend the Frontas convention to be held at the end of this month, changed his plans and is not coming. Prof. Ivinskis again went to the US Embassy in Rome and this time was told that he would be given a visitor's visa provided he could obtain an extension of a permit from the Italian officials to remain in Italy for another year.
- 8. Subject further informed the undersigned that instead of Prof. Ivinskis, Mr. Pajaujis, who is residing in Stockholm, contemplates coming to the Fontas convention. He has already applied for the visa and the Frontas organization has sent him the necessary affidavit. Subject hopes that Pajaujis will receive the visa without any difficulty; however, subject asked the undersigned for assistance if the latter should encounter any difficulties.
- 9. Inasmuch as Mr. Pajaujis is a contact of \subseteq and the undersigned would like to meet him when he arrives in the US, the undersigned promised subject that he will explore the possibilities of rendering assistance in Pajaujis' request for a visa in case the latter encounters difficulties.
 - 10. The meeting adjourned at 1700 hours.

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- 1. and the undersigned met subject on 1 Aug. 56 at 1600 hours in a down-town NY hotel. The purpose of the meeting was to establish subject's position in regard to the tentative plan for the organization of the radio center agreed upon during the previous meeting with Matulionis (see memorandum for the record on meeting with Matulionis on 1 Aug. 56)
- 2. Outlined to subject the plan for organization of the radio center under the aegis of ELTA, Inc. It was further indicated to subject that he is to be appointed by the ELTA, Inc., Board of Directors (VLIK Presidium) as manager of the radio center.

 According to this plan, subject is to select the staff members of the radio center and present their names for approval to the ELTA Board of Directors.
- and the undersigned then discussed at length with subject the particular aspects of the problem, i.e., an assurance that subject will receive his salary for the next two years. It was explained to subject we will guarantee that his salary will be forthcoming from VLIK in the amount of \$400 per month, or whatever is agreed upon between him and VLIK, for a period of two years. If for any reason VLIK stops payment, we will see to it he receives his salary. We will also advance him \$2,000 so that he can clear his debt to his present employer. Subject will repay this amount of \$2,000 in monthly installments.
- 4. After lengthy discussions with subject and further detailed explanations as to his cooperation with VLIK, subject agreed to the above plan and stated that when Matulionis officially approaches him with the proposal to become manager of the radio center he will accept it in the form now presented to him.
- 5. The undersigned exphasized that this meeting is to remain confidential and when subject meets Matulionis he should not reveal the fact that the plan for the radio section was known to subject.
- 6. Subject promised that he will inform the undersigned as to the results of his forthcoming meeting with Matulianis. The meeting adjourned at 1800 hours.
- 7. COMMENT: The undersigned wishes to record that it is envisaged to arrange with subject a two year contract for his employment as a covert associate. The contract will include a provision that payment of his salary is to be offset by payments received from his cover organization, i.e., VLIK radio center. His contract will contain another provision stating that subject was advanced \$2,000 in order to obtain a release from his present position. He is to repay the \$2,000 in monthly installments during the period of the validity of the contract (2 years). It is believed that this arrangement will enable us to have close control over subject and in case the arrangement with VLIK for some reason proves to be unsuccessful, we can retain him as head of a radio center completely under our control.

1. The undersigned met subj on 11 Aug'56 at 1300 hours in a downtown NY hotel. The purpose of the meeting was to find out the remu results of subject's recent negotiations with Mat.

- 2. Subj stated that his meeting with Mat was not successful and he considers the chapter closed. Mr. Mat did not come out with any concrete plan for his employment as manager of the radio center. The reason for it being, according to subj, that M did not obtain approval of his plan for establishment of the radio policy committee and employment of Braz from the other two members of the Presidium. The undersigned told subj the same as he did the day before during his meeting with Sidz & Mat, namely, that the fact that the Lithuanian leaders could not agree to cooperate is extremely regretable and will be regarded by the undersigned's superiors with great disgavor.
- 3. Subject remits continued to discuss the situation and stated that in his opinion the undersigned's superiors have 3 courses of action:
 - a. The To continue support of VLIK radio section as it was done before.
 - b. To stop support of VLIK.
- c. To support an independent organization which would take over VLIK Radio assets and administrative them as well as establish the general policy line for the broadcasts.
- 4. Subj then proceeded to outline to the undersigned the composition and functions of the committee along the same lines as mentioned previously (memo fith for the record with xxx on meeting with Sidzi on 10 Aug'56). Note: It seems to the undersigned that the latter's plan was discussed between Sidzi and Braz and they both agreed on it. Subj assured the undersigned that, in his opinion, even Manage Mat, after rate realizing that no help was coming from us for the radio section, would also agree to participate in a single independent body

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to take over VLIK radio assets.

He further explained that Mr. Matulionis did not come up with any concrete proposal according to the plan discussed by us with subject previously (see contact report of meeting with subject on 10 August 1956).
- 3. Subject again restated his position that he would like to participate in the radio effort provided it adopts a non-partisan character and the possibility given to all elements of the Lithuanian emigration to participate in this effort. According to subject, VLIK did not show good will to bring about the establishment of a radio policy committee consisting of five leading persons as discussed previously. (See contact report of 10 and 11 August with subject and J. Matulionis).
- 4. Subject again reiterated his opinion expressed previously that we should choose a person in whom we have confidence and who will organize an independent body consisting of five or seven leading Lithuanians. This body will be in charge of the radio broadcasts. Such an organ, according to subject, would receive the support of the entire Lithuanian emigration.
- 6. () was careful to point out that personally we respect subject and think highly of his qualifications. It was unfortunate that he could not get together with VLIK and lend his talents to the radio effort. We expect, however, to continue our association with subject as previously.

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and to arrange for the undersigned to meet him sometime in September. Subject agreed to arrange such a meeting.

8. The meeting terminated at 1700 hours.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Meeting with Juozas BRAZAITIS

and the undersigned met subject on 11 December 1956 at 1300 hours in a downtown Washington, DLC. hotel. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss with subject the possibility of his organizing a non-faction radio advisory committee which is to sponsor a radio center in NY.

- 2. Subject stated that he had previously discussed with Mr. Sidzikauskas and other leaders relative VLIK radio activities and the consistencies of opinions was that VLIK radio efforts is deteriorating. VLIK does not have the capabilities and financial means to conduct effective radio broadcasts. Subject thought that in connection with the present tense situation in the satellite and the Baltic countries radio broadcasts would constitute the most effective means to inform the people behind the Iron Curtain of recent events.
- 3. Treviewed our past efforts to bring about a unification of all Lithuaniar factions for the support of effective radio broadcasts. Turther indicated that now would be the propositus time to have effective and informative broadcasts to Lithuania. He expressed his regrets that to date the Lithuanian groups could not manage to agree in this a-political undertaking. Turther indicated that if some Lithuanian leaders with authority would agree to organize a non-faction radio advisory committee to support a radio senter we would regard such efforts favorably and would agree to support it financially.
- 4. Subject stated that this approach was new to him. He was under the impression that we wish to support the radio efforts only via VLIK and were int interested in a group outside of VLIK starting to organize a radio center. Cariffed that to date our dealings with VLIK regarding radio broadcasts were based on the fact that VLIK was the first to establish the radio outlets. We thought that VLIK would suceed in attracting to the radio efforts other groups now not participating in VLIK. Inasmuch as the efforts of VLIK did not suceed and realizing the importance of radio broadcasts at this time, we would certainly regard most favorably if a person like Mr. Brazaitis would organize a non-factional committee of five persons who would actually represent the majority of the Lithuanian emigration in the West.
- 5. Subject agreed with the idea and in the course of the discussion he proposed to contact the following personalities: Messrs. Rastenis and Sidzikauskas in the US and Messrs. Lozoraitis and Krupavicius abroad. Subject particularly emphasied that Krupavicius

Dear Mr. Williams:

I wish to draw your attention to the following facts:

- (1) Mr. J. Lanskoronskis cannot any longer be considered for the Radio Center. He has failed to form a body which would be acceptable to the groups participating in VLIK, consequently he is no longer the Chairman of VT. Mr. L. left for Paris last night.
- (2) Mr. J. Matulionis was informed that the project would in no way interfere with VLIK, but on the contrary would be helpful in performing its activities. Mr. M. contacted his colleagues and their reaction toward the project is reflected by the following paragraph from Bulletin ELTA of Jan. 15, 1957:

"Certain indivuduals are contacting some of our compatriots with a proposition to establish a Radio of Free Lithuania which would broadcast to their homeland in the name of Lithuanians. VT feels that this is its duty to inform our compatriots that this project has been undertaken without the knowlege or approval of the Lithuanian organs of liberation... We are not willing to believe that, whatever the political beliefs, a person will allow to use his name as a cover up for the birth of the Radio of Free Lithuania."

The excerpt has been reprinted by some Lithuanian papers.

The above statement is a clear refusal to cooperate and a "warning" to others not to cooperate with Americans in this field.

(3) I was "warned" personally - that an action will be taken against me if I engage myself in any kind of joint activities with Americans, or Messrs. Lozoraitis or Rastenis.

My conclusions would be as follows.

a/ Personally, I am not impressed by any "warnings" nor give them any consideration. However, I believe, that any further contact at-the present time with the political groups would prove fruitless.

b/ If, after all, you still are considering the possibilities of organization of a Radio Center, I believe, there is only one way to accomplish it: start the ball rolling; meanwhile, without any Council; when the project will be more or less brought about, then the VLIK, LLK and Diplomats could be approached once again for cooperation, and, I believe, with more success than at the present time.

It was only yesterday that I learned about Mr. Lankoronskis' failure. Please excuse me if my information is slightly delayed.

Dear Editor:

Your newspaper "Draugas" published the warnings of VLIK Executive Committee concerning "certain people" who approached "some our compatriots" in the matter of organizing a "Radio Voice of Free Lithuania". In this warning VLIK Executive Committee has also expressed its negative stand with regard to such radio service or as VLIK calls it "Voice", stating as follows: "We would not like to believe that anyone, regardless of his political affiliations would agree to lend his name as a cover for initiation of the 'Radio Voice of Free Lithuania'".

I wish to call your attention, in this letter, to some clarification of the above statement, as well as to direct conclusions that can follow from that statement.

- (1) Under "certain persons" VLIK Executive Committee has in mind an American Institution which has agreed to support financially the work done by Lithuanians in the fight against communism. The American act similarly with regard to other nations. This was also done in the case of VLIK for a number of years; first, when it was under the leadership of Mgr. KRUPAVICIUS and later under the chairmanship of Mr. J. MATULIONIS; at the same time the Executive Committee was under the chairmanship of Messrs. SIDZIKAUSKAS, then ZALKAUSKAS and finally Mrs. DAVENIS.
- (2) The VLIK Executive Committee, in expressing its hopes that "no one would agree to lend his name as a cover" for a radio service which an American Institution agrees to support, impliedly condemns the activities of such American supported radio service. Thus, VLIK also condemns its own cooperations with the same Americans which lasted until the middle of 1956.
- (3) It should be noted that VLIK Executive Committee decided to condemn cooperation with Americans only after the Americans became disappointed with the ineffective operation of the Radio Service and began to urge VLIK to reorganize the radio activities by placing emphasis on competence and specialization, by disassociating such activities from the

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internal fight for prerogative and jurisdiction, and by seeking out the cooperation of known specialists from various groups. Only after VLIK refused to effect this consolidation the Americans withdrew their support of radio activities which until then was rendered via VLIK. Instead, they agreed to support another initiative to organize a radio service.

This is the history as of to date. The question now arises what did the Americans actually undertake or planned to do, in light of the warning of the VLIK Executive Committee to the Lithuanian community not to cooperate with the Americans.

- (4) One may judge as to the wishes of the Americans and the part they are to play in cooperation with the Lithuanians in establishing the radio service from the contents of a project which the Americans would support. The project is as follows:
 - 1. The purpose of the radio service is to provide information via radio to Lithuania and to present the Lithuanian point of view.
 - 2. A director is supervising the activities of the radio service in cooperation with other personnel within the framework of an established budget. Radio broadcasts to Lithuania are being conducted according to an established policy line.
 - 3. A radio council (or any other body under a similar name) establishes the Lithuanian policy line, confirms their budget, coordinates the appointment of the director, and approves the personnel selected by the director for the radio service.
 - 4. The radio council is composed of Lithuanians known to the Lithuanian community. The following personalities are envisaged: M. Krupavicius, S. Lozoriaitis, V. Rastenis, V. Sidzikauskas, J. Brazaitis (I think at a later date one or two more persons will be included).
 - 5. The radio service is a technical (functional) organ established for a special purpose and does not infringe upon the competence of other organs.

The above project shows that the Americans have left the Lithuanians for freedom not only to choose the people for the radio service but also to establish the Lithuanian policy line, according to which the information will be transmitted to the homeland. The principle desire of the Americans is for the service to function properly.

The VLIK Executive Committee, however, has decided that such plan was to be condemned in public and that the Lithuanian community was to be warned against such a plan.



(5) If VLIK condemns the Radio Service because it gives a possibility of cooperation among those who are within VLIK with groups outside VLIK and the diplomatic corp, then one quite justly may doubt the sincerity of VLIK's statements that it wishes to cooperate with the diplomats and to achieve consolidation of all forces.

If the VLIK Executive Committee has condemned the above plan for the Radio Service because it gave the possibility for cooperation between Lithuanians and Americans, then one does not have to be an diplomat in order to see in the statements of the VLIK Executive Committee an expression of distrust towards the Americans.

I would like to call your attention to this distrust which was publicly advertised. The question arises why was it necessary to announce it publicly. Could anyone believe that by challenging the Americans openly VLIK enhances its authority and increases its number of friends? Do you believe that the above attitude of VLIK will help you as ALT chairman to find open doors into American official institutions? The question further arises whether VLIK's attitude will help to win confidence for this organization among the Lithuanian community and especially whether VLIK by acting in such a manner is serving properly the Lithuanian cause.

The VLIK Executive Committee could hardly feel so strong to be able to fight simultaneously the Bolsheviks, other Lithuanian groups competing with it and now also the Americans. It means a simultaneous fight on several fronts. It should be noted, however, that while VLIK publicly has condemned cooperation with the Americans, at the same time VLIK has tried to approach the Americans again through the back door requesting financial help.

The VLIK Executive Committee is warning the Lithuanian public to refrain from statements which could help the enemies of Lithuania. In light of this, do you not think, Mr. Editor, that VLIK's statements discussed above would be of such kind which would serve the enemies of Lithuania.

- (6) I know that you as an editor and as a leader of Lithuanian political organization are concerned with the Lithuanian cause. I wanted to call your attention to the wrong committed by VLIK against truth, against American institutions, and against the Lithuanian cause. I wanted to call your attention to this matter now in order that when the consequences of the discussed statements will later begin to effect adversely our work, we should not blame each other unjustly and we should not regret undertaking actions without knowing the true situation. With expression of great esteem.
- P.S. On this ocassion I wish to express my great joy that the auto accident had an happy ending.

1. In accordance with CSI 240-6 permission is requested to contact, assess, and if the assessment is favorable, to recruit Mr. Juozas BRAZAITIS.

2. Biographic Data:

Mr. Juozas BRAZAITIS (formerly known as AMBRAZEVICIUS) was born on 12 January 1899 in Gudine, a suburb of Kapsukas, Lithuania. He studied Lithuanian literature at the University of Kaunas (1922-1927) and later at the University of Bonn (1931-1932). From 1923-1927 he was the editor of the newspaper Lietuva. From 1934-1940 he was editor of the Catholic youth monthly magazine Ateitis (The Future), and co-editor of the Catholic daily newspaper, XX Amzius (20th Century). BRAZAITIS was a professor at the University of Kaunas from 1934-1940, at which time he was dismissed by the Communists who had taken control of the country. In 1941 BRAZAITIS was the head of the provisional national -) government of Lithuania. Later, he escaped from Lithuania to Germany where he became the leader of the Lietuviu Frontas (Lithuanian Front) and a leader in Vyriausias Lietuvos Islaisvinimo Komitetas (Supreme Lithuanian Committee for Liberation); both of these organizations are devoted to liberating Lithuania from the Soviets. BRAZAITIS, his wife and two children immigrated to the United States in 1951 and presently reside at 1060 East 39th Street, Brooklyn 21, New York. He still retains his Lithuanian citizenship and is still the head of Lietuviu Frontas. BRAZAITIS is the editor of the Lithuanian language newspaper Darbininkas (The Worker) which is published by the Fransciscan Fathers at 680 Bushwick Avenue, Brooklyn 21, New York.

3. Previous Contact with CIA:

BRAZAITIS was granted a Covert Security Approval on 21 June 1954 for use as a spotter for agent candidates for REDSOX operations and as an informant within Lithuanian emigre circles for obtaining REDSKIN leads. He was instrumental in spotting and recruiting ______ and _____ in 1956 as candidates for a REDSOX operation into Soviet occupied Lithuania. This operation got to the "dispatch stage" before it was cancelled by DCI. BRAZAITIS was assigned a pseudonym for use in signing receipts and reports. Contact with Subject ended in 1957 when this office temporarily suspended contact with Lithuanian emigre leaders.

4. Objectives and Intended Uses :

The objectives of recruiting BRAZAITIS are to: (a) learn the names of the American-Lithuanians who plan to visit Soviet occupied Lithuania in 1962, (b) gain insight into the Lithuanian emigre community in the United States, (c) learn the names of Lithuanian political leaders in the West, particularly in the Scandanavian countries, who would be willing to cooperate with CIA, and (d) serve as a consultant on Lithuanian matters. BRAZAITIS is well qualified to assist CIA in attaining these objectives because of his position as the leader of the Lithuanian political party, Lietuviu Frontas, and as the editor of a prominent Lithuanian Catholic newspaper.

5. Salary:

It is not intended to offer BRAZAITIS a salary. It will, however, be necessary to reimburse him for any operational expenses he may incur. Also, Subject may be paid a nominal sum for specific tasks which he is assigned. This payment may take the form of gifts not to exceed \$20.00 per gift. The total amount of gift purchases will not exceed \$60.00 a year and cash payments will not exceed \$500.00 a year. Payments will be charged to AEPOLE funds.

6. Security Clearances and Approvals:

BRAZAITIS was originally granted a Covert Security Clearance on 21 June 1954 which was allowed to lapse in November 1959. He was granted a Provisional Covert Security Approval on 22 December 1961. Field and All-Agency checks on BRAZAITIS aka AMBRAZEVICIUS did not produce derogatory information.
