TERMS AND INSTRUCTIONS, FALL 1936

1.—**REFERENCES.**—We refer new customers for our bona fides to our bankers, Messrs. Brown Bros., Harriman & Co., 59 Wall Street, New York City, or The Canadian Bank of Commerce, King Street West, Toronto. Our firm was established in 1868 and has been in the American trade for over thirty-eight years.

2.—**GUARANTEE.**—We guarantee all our stock to be true to name and of extra selected and highest quality.

3.—**PRICES.**—Prices are F.O.B. New York City. These cover all charges, clearing from Customs, etc. Forwarding charges from New York are met by customers.

4.—**PAYMENTS.**—Cash with order on all orders amounting to less than \$25.00. On orders of \$25.00 or more, if desired, 25% remittance with order and balance C.O.D. To out of Toronto or New York cheques add 15 cents exchange. **All accounts are payable in U.S. money only.** We pack a nice premium for all cash-with-order orders for \$10.00 or over, and allow 5% discount for cash with order, amounting to \$10.00 or over.

5.—**IMPORT ONLY.**—We do not carry stocks in New York. We import only what is ordered. Orders can be accepted until **September 20th**, and delivery is made in about 6 weeks.

6.—**GROUP ORDERS.**—We have many groups of customers, in offices, schools, factories and garden communities who combine their orders in one, thus saving charges. The individual orders are packed and labelled separately at no additional charge, provided each individual's order is for a reasonable amount, say at least \$2.00. Group orders should be in early.

7.—**ORDERS UNDER \$5.00 CANNOT BE ACCEPTED.**—As the cost of handling and clearing small import orders is relatively very high, orders amounting to less than \$5.00 cannot be accepted.

8.—**COMPLAINTS.**—Shortages, damages or defects should be reported immediately upon unpacking. Post-season complaints cannot be considered. Orders are accepted and executed conditional on strikes, accidents, changes in tariffs and governmental regulations.

9.—**RESTRICTIONS ON U.S. IMPORTATIONS LIFTED SOON.**—Under the regulations of the U.S. Horticultural Board it is not permitted to fill orders for Narcissi, Irises, etc., at the present. However, Narcissus and Daffodils will be allowed again in fall 1937.

RATES FOR DIFFERENT QUANTITIES OF BULBS

With the exception of a few specially high-priced varieties for which the price is given for a single bulb, **orders are not filled for less than five bulbs of a variety.**

The Prices listed in this catalogue are for 10 and 100 bulbs. 25 bulbs are sold at the 100 rate proportionately. For 5's—add 10% to the 10 rate. 1,000 bulbs of one variety are sold at 100 rate less 10%.

TULIPS

THE CLASSIFICATION OF TULIPS

As the Tulip has been a very popular garden flower and in large commercial demand for over 250 years, there has naturally been a great production of varieties. The number of varieties listed in Holland catalogues, all told, approaches the 2,500 mark. Their classification is therefore complicated, and more or less artificial. A committee of the Royal Horticultural Society of England in 1917 drafted a classification, which is briefly explained in the descriptions given in our catalogue, in the belief that tulip growers will be interested and helped to a better understanding of the characteristics of varieties. According to the R.H.S. classification, Tulips are divided into three classes:

I.—Native, or natural-growing species. II.—Early Flowering. III.—Late, or May Flowering.

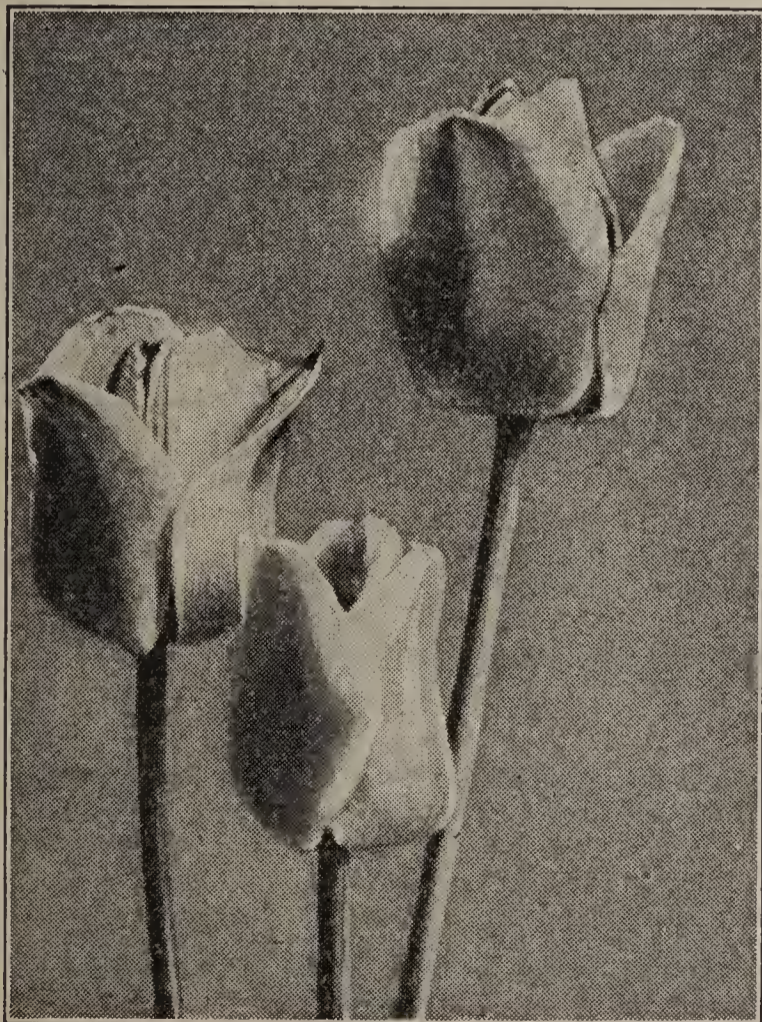
The native species of Tulips are those original native species growing in Europe, Asia, England, etc. It is from these that the numerous horticultural varieties have been derived.

The Early Flowering Tulips comprise: (1) Single Early Tulips; (2) Double Early Tulips; (3) Duc Von Tholl Tulips.

The late or May Flowering Tulips comprise groups known as: (1) Darwins; (2) Breeders; (3) Cottage Tulips; (4) Parrots; (5) Rembrandts; (6) Byblooms; (7) Bizarres; (8) Late Double Tulips; (9) Lily Flowered Tulips; (10) Mendel Tulips; (11) Triumph Tulips.

Darwin Tulips

The culture of these Late or May Flowering Tulips has developed in recent years into a fad amongst flower growers, as their beauties and merits have become recognized. They were named in 1889 after the great English naturalist, Charles Darwin. Some years previous they had been originated by an unknown amateur in the north of France.



The bloom is borne on strong, stately stems 18 to 30 inches in length. Their range of colors embraces almost every conceivable tint of rose, heliotrope, claret, maroon, crimson and rich shades of purple approaching a black and within the past four years yellow and white Darwins have been developed also. The flowers of Darwin Tulips are large, globular and of heavy texture. As cut flowers they are much used and very satisfactory. They are most valuable for permanent planting in borders and amongst shrubbery. They show best in clusters, and will continue to bloom for years.

From the many hundreds of varieties on the market, we list only the following varieties. We

can commend the selections as containing the best of the best. For customers, unacquainted with varieties, we recommend the purchase of Parcel Lots.

The letters E, M and L, used in the descriptions, represent Early, Medium and Late respectively. The numbers represent the heights in inches. It is hardly necessary to state that these letters and numbers suggest only the **approximate, relative and probable** time of blooming and heights.

Favorite varieties are printed in capitals. This does not mean, however, that the other varieties are less desirable or attractive. It means only that those printed in capitals are popular favorites and well recommended.

Hints on Forcing Darwins

Darwins may be forced for winter bloom if brought to the heat not earlier than the end of January. They will bloom about the first of March. Most varieties, but especially the violet-colored sorts, have their colors softened down in forcing. They should be forced slowly in a moderate temperature. The bulbs require more room than those of Single Early Tulips and deep pans or pots should be used. The varieties suitable for forcing are marked with an asterisk.* The varieties most commonly seen in florists' shop windows in the Winter are Bartigon and Wm. Pitt (reds), Princess Elizabeth and Le Notre (pinks), Wm. Copeland (mauve).

Planted together with Darwin and with Cottage Tulips, a most artistic effect will be obtained. Those varieties of the Breeders suitable for forcing, should be forced very slowly only.

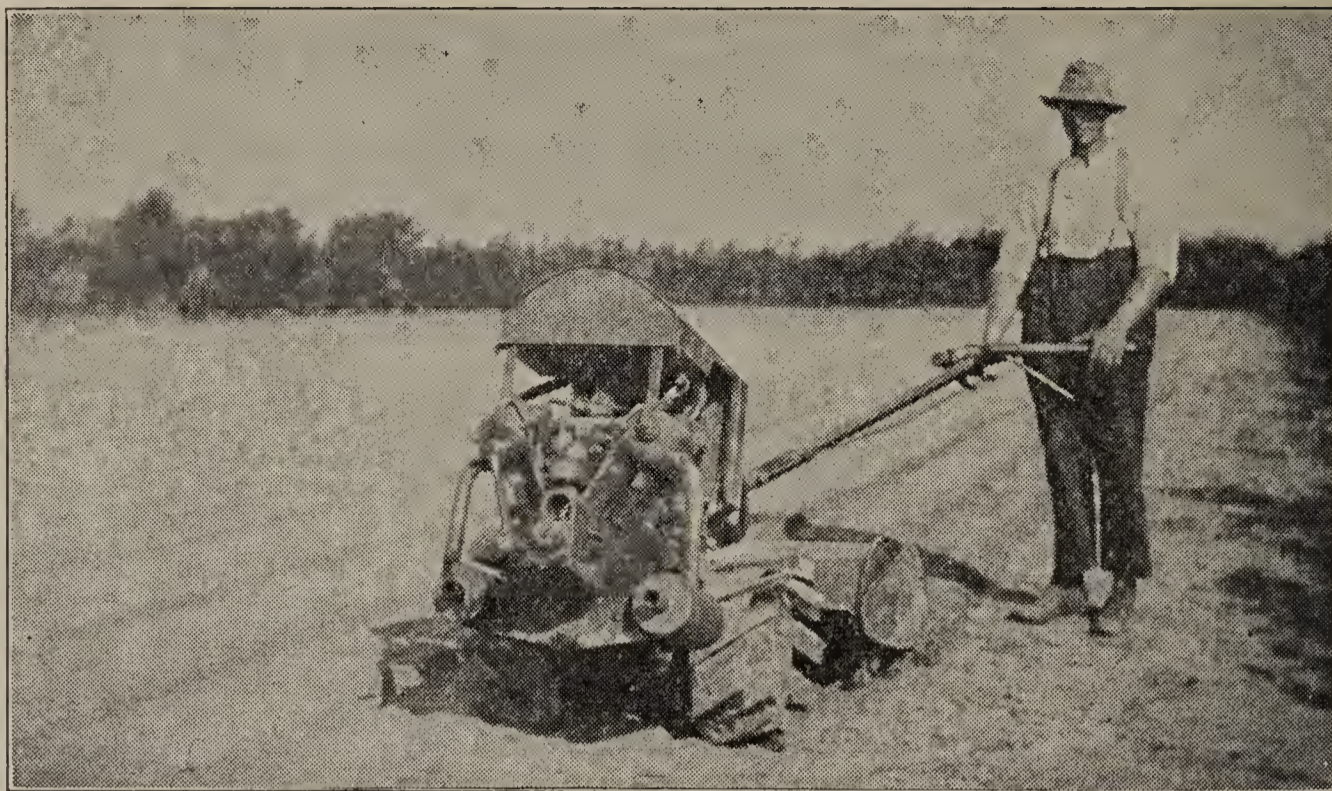

Cottage Tulips

This class of Late or May-Flowering Tulips comprises a miscellaneous catch-all group of old-fashioned Tulips that had been grown for generations in the cottage-gardens of England and Europe. They have been much improved in recent years through selection and hybridization, so that now they are beginning to rival the Darwins in popularity. All colours are represented, of striking tints and shades. They are similar to Darwins in their habits of tall growth, but have their petals more open. Many of them are fragrant and some have drooping heads. Yellow sorts, which are not represented in the cheaper Darwins, are prominent. They are very hardy, and if undisturbed in good soil will increase and flower for many years. In forcing care must be taken to bring them on slowly.

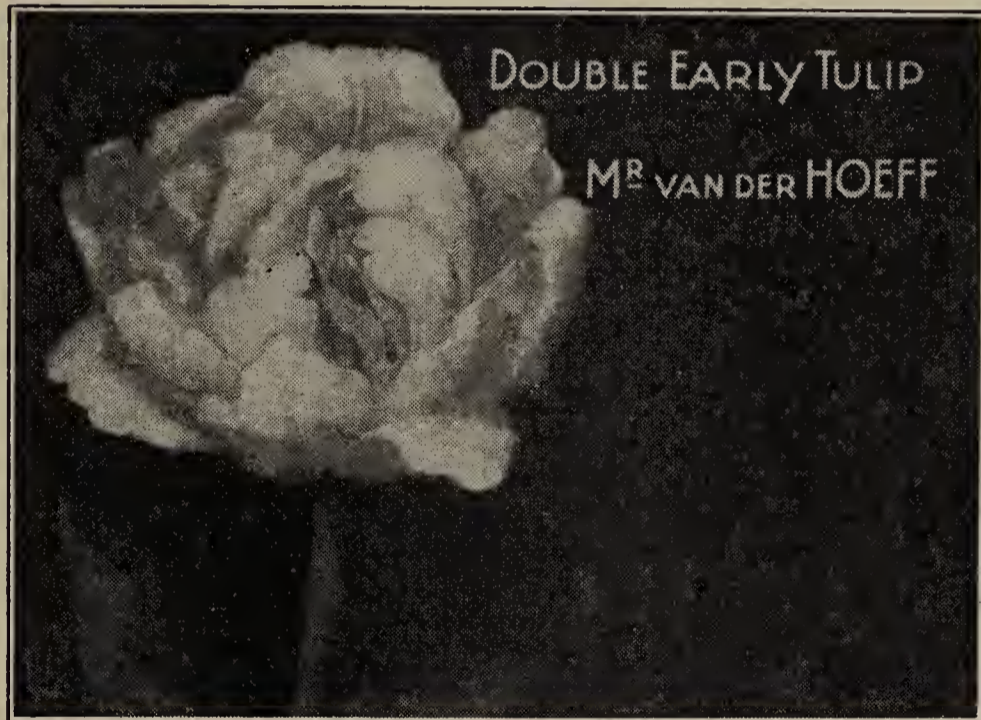

Though the Double Early Tulips are not so striking in their shapeliness as the Single Early Tulips they produce very attractive color effects in bedding as well as in pots and pans. Well grown, they look like small-sized peonies. As their heavy blooms may be spoiled by winds and rain, it is advisable in outdoor planting to grow them where they may have some protection. Every one of the varieties listed below is highly recommended.

The Double Early Tulips last much longer in bloom than the Single Early Tulips. Those marked with an asterisk are very suitable for forcing for winter bloom. They should be forced more slowly than the Single Early Tulips. To those unacquainted with the varieties named, we recommend the purchase of our Parcel Lots.

**Rembrandt Tulips**

These Late or May-Flowering Tulips are a strain of variegated Darwins technically known as "Broken Darwins." Double Hyacinths

Prepared Hyacinths

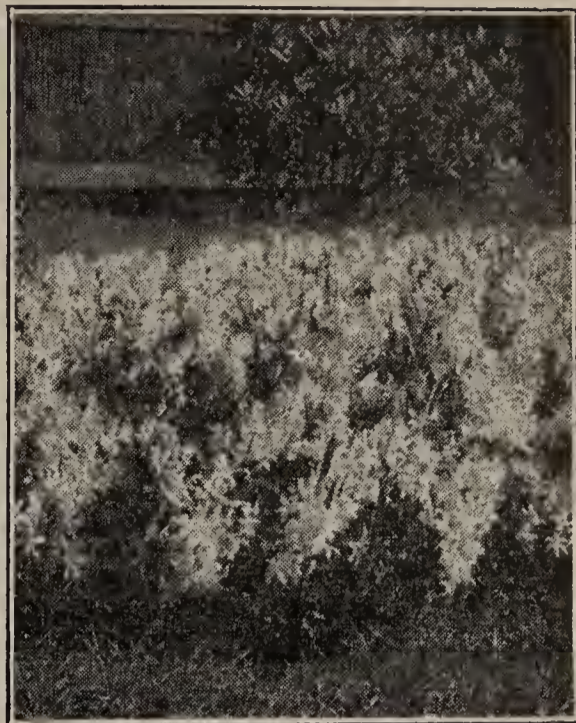

Chionodoxa

As the name, Glory of the Snow, suggests, it blooms early in the Spring. Their blue flowers appear at the same time as the Snowdrops and Siberian Squill. They are borne in sprays on stems five or six inches long. The Chionodoxa are perfectly hardy and their bloom last a long time. Any kind of soil seems to suit them. They require no care, appearing year after year without fail. They should be planted in clusters in rock gardens, about shrubbery and in borders. For winter bloom they may be grown in pots like the Crocuses and Grape Hyacinths.

Crocuses



The Crocus is a general favorite amongst the Dutch Bulbs, because of its bright showiness in the Spring. They are very hardy, do not deteriorate, and may be left undisturbed for years. The varieties marked * can be forced for Winter bloom, but slowly and in very moderate temperature. They make a fine show naturalized in lawns. In this case the tops of the Crocus must have time to ripen before the grass is cut. Plant Crocuses in clusters, covering the bulbs with about three inches of soil.

For the earliest bloom in the Spring, plant as early in the Fall as possible.

Eranthis or Winter Aconite

The Winter Aconite is one of the earliest and hardiest of the early Spring flowers. The pretty golden-yellow, buttercup-like flowers appear before the snow goes away, about the time the Chionodoxa bloom. They continue to flower for several weeks. The plants have shining green leaves and are about six inches high. The bulbs are only about the size of a large pea and should not be planted more than an inch or so deep. They naturalize under trees or about shrubbery and enjoy moist situations. The bulbs can be forced for indoor winter bloom.

Fritillaria

The best known of this branch of the Lily Family are the stately Crown Imperials (*Fritillaria Imperialis*) which bear their flower-ringed clusters at the top of the two or three-foot plant. They should be planted in a place where the tall plants will not be exposed to winds and where they may remain undisturbed for a number of years. The stem should not be cut off but allowed to mature naturally. The Guinea Hen flower is *Fritillaria Meleagris*. It is a dwarf form with pendant bell-shaped, oddly marked flowers. *Fritillaria* bulbs should be planted in small clumps about five or six inches deep and should have a deep mulching of leaves or coarse manure for protection before freeze-up. The bulbs may be forced for indoor or greenhouse display.

Grape Hyacinths (*Muscari*)

This is one of the daintiest of the spring flowers. The inverted clusters of little flowers look somewhat like a miniature bunch of grapes, hence their name. They are closely akin to the true Hyacinth. The small rich blue or white flowers clustering on their six to eight-inch stems make a delightful show. Grape Hyacinths are particularly adapted to growing in borders, about shrubbery, along paths, streams, or scattered about the lawn. They multiply abundantly and persist indefinitely without any care. They seem to be suited to any soil or any conditions. Cover the bulbs about two inches and plant in clusters. For indoor winter bloom they should be handled like Crocuses. As with most forced bulbs, color may be less intense than the natural coloring when grown outdoors. A six-inch pot will hold about a dozen bulbs.

Ixia

The Ixias are also known as the African Corn Lily. They are natives of the Cape of Good Hope country and are well suited for winter blooming indoors. They should be forced at a low temperature. The flowers are borne in graceful spikes of white, yellow, pink, rose, orange and red colors. The centre of the flowers is always characterized by a striking "eye" which contrasts noticeably with the other color of the flower. Six or ten bulbs can be planted in a six-inch pot or pan. When planted outdoors give them good winter protection.

Lilium

There are only two Lilies, the bulbs of which are matured sufficiently to permit shipping with the Tulips, etc., in Fall. *Lilium Candidum*—the White Madonna Lily—is quite hardy for outdoor growing and should have a half-shady, moist position such as in a shrub border. Protect with leaves or coarse manure for the Winter. It can be forced also for Easter or early Spring bloom. *Excelsum* is used mostly for outside. Scilla

Few flowers make a brighter show in the early spring than the various Squills. They are also called the Wood or Star Hyacinths. They are quite hardy. Their flowers are white, blue, rose and red. For winter bloom indoors, treat them in the same way as Crocuses. Give them about six weeks in the cellar to root. A five-inch pot will hold about a dozen bulbs. Garden Scillas are improved varieties of three native species named *Siberica*, *Campanulata* and *Nutans*. *Scilla Campanulata* is the common Bluebell of England.

Snowdrops (Galanthus)



The Snowdrop is an old-time favorite of the early Spring. It does not wait for the snow to disappear to display its attractive white flowers. There is a double form as well as a single. The bulbs should be covered with about 2 inches of soil and left undisturbed from one season to another. They seem to prefer a somewhat sandy soil. They are suitable for planting in clumps amongst shrubbery or in flower beds and borders. Very few places come amiss to them. They can be grown in lawns and wild places. If grown for indoor bloom they should be brought forward at a cool temperature. A five-inch pot will hold about ten or twelve bulbs.

Lilies for Spring

Importation, 1937

It must be clearly understood that these Lilies cannot be shipped with Tulips, etc. The only Lilies that can be harvested early enough to ship with the Tulips, etc., are *Lilium Candidum* (The Madonna Lily), and *Lilium Excelsum*, listed on page 33. The Lilies listed here cannot be harvested in time for Fall planting in October or November and so cannot be shipped in time for Fall planting in the United States. They will be shipped in the Spring of 1937, reaching New York about the beginning of April. An order for these Lilies must be handled separately from the Fall importation. Orders for these can be accepted up to March 1st, 1937, not later.

There has been a very noticeable increase in interest in the cultivation of Lilies during the past few years. The varieties listed below comprise a selection suited to U.S. gardens.

Do not let bulbs dry out. Lilies delight in a light, rich soil, a mixture of loam, leaf-mould and well-rotted cow manure. Plant about 4 or 5 inches deep, situation must be well drained. Protection from high winds when flowering is advisable.

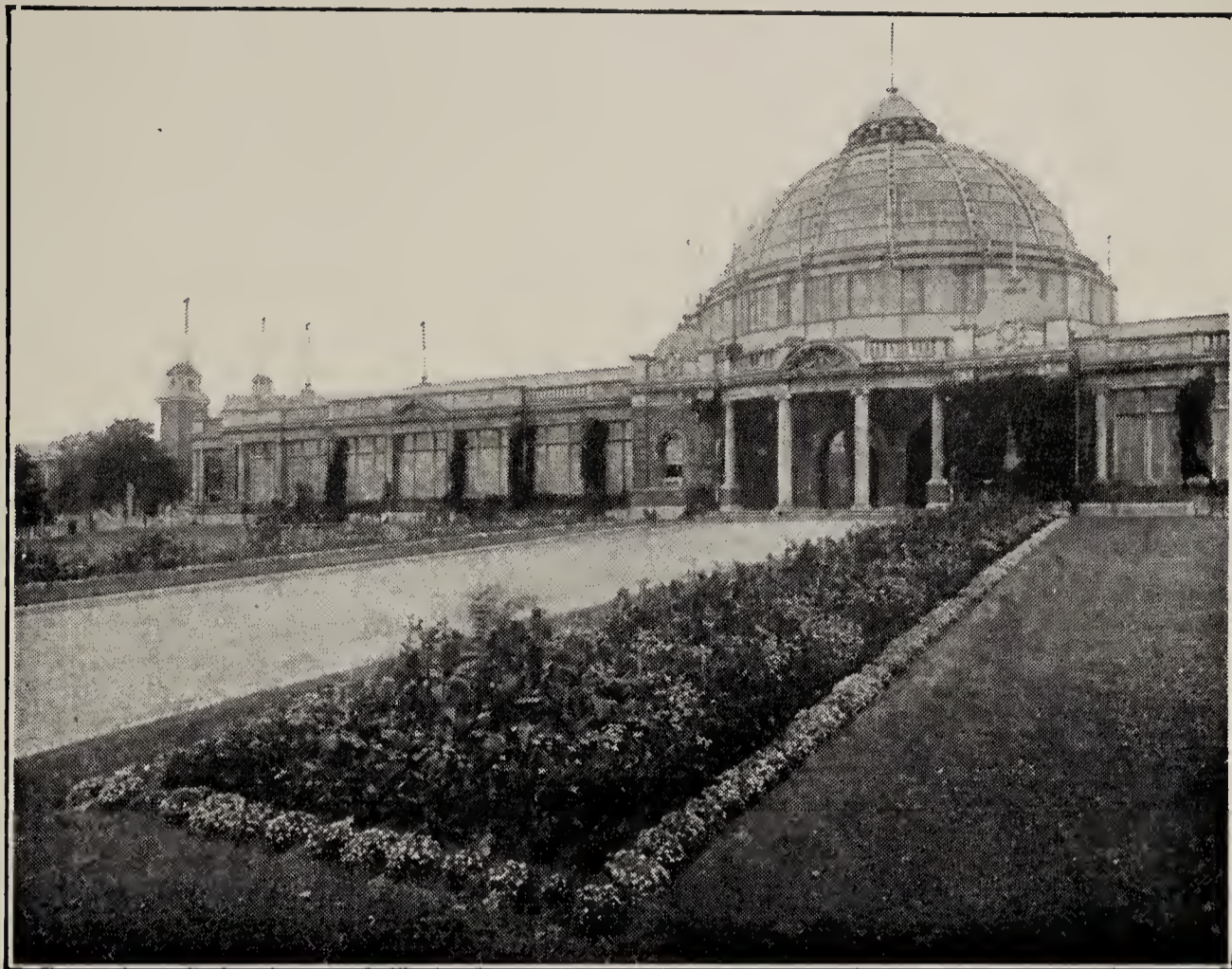

Narcissi, Irises, Peonies, Roses, Gladioli, Dahlias, etc., cannot be shipped into the United States except under a special permit granted by the U.S. Horticultural Board, Washington.
