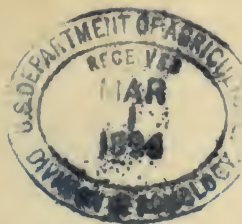

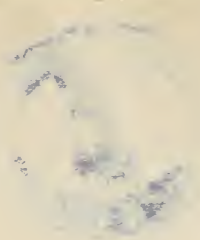

NOTICE TO CORRESPONDENTS.

1. Our Nurseries are situated at Babylon, L. I., three-fourths of a mile north of the railroad depot, and thirty-seven miles east of New York City.

2. Orders should be sent early, plainly written, and not in the body of the letter. It will prevent mistakes in the hurry of the packing season.

3. Trees and plants will be carefully packed. A charge will be made to cover cost of materials only. Goods delivered free at the Babylon depot and Deer Park, L. I.

4. The business opens in the spring as soon as the frost is out of the ground; continues through April and May; opens again by the middle of October, and continues while the ground is open.

5. Purchasers are often imposed upon by unprincipled men, who do not procure their trees of the parties they pretend to represent; frequently furnishing inferior trees, or those not true to name, causing great disappointment in after years. Send your orders direct, or, which is better, visit the Nursery yourself, and see what you are to get for your money.

6. Terms—cash or approved notes; must be paid before stock will be delivered.

7. We offer a larger assortment of shade and ornamental trees, common and fancy evergreens, well-known, and new fruits, bedding plants, &c., than can be found near New York, the proof of which can be ascertained by a personal inspection.

8. We solicit a trial, and guarantee all orders will be filled punctually, correctly, and with liberality. Orders for less than \$5.00 must be accompanied with remittance, and at least 25 cents added for packing.
