1. Numerous requests have been received from news agencies in Tokyo to release the names of the 102 businessmen who will enter Japan under the U.S. quota.

2. a. The original list submitted by the War Department included 113 names. It is not deemed desirable to release this list because certain undesirable individuals were included.

b. War radio WCL 39826 indicates that War Department selection is complete. It does not, however, list the 102 names selected.

c. News agencies in Tokyo have received information that the Department of Commerce has released 102 names. These have not been transmitted to Tokyo news agencies because of expense and in anticipation of a simultaneous release in Tokyo.

d. It is to SCAP's advantage to have the list of firms and individual representatives before the Japanese as early as possible in order that Japanese business may anticipate the nature of the market and make appropriate preparations.

3. If all doubtful names are deleted from the list as well as those for whom clearance is definitely not granted, the list may be reduced to 102. It is believed that it is to SCAP's advantage to release these 102 names as being among those who have been cleared for entry in August or who will be cleared for entry with a second increment in September.

4. Recommend approval of a press release as follows:

"A SCAP official stated today that the following list of individuals and firms have been cleared to enter Japan in connection with the limited reopening of private trade. (Include here list of names remaining on WCL 35298.) Exact dates of entry of these individuals is not known but they may be expected to arrive as part of the first or second United States quotas."

1. WCL 38608 requests views on entry of Tatsuo Hori, Japanese national in California, under U. S. quota as a private trader.

2. a. ESS (Mr Pickelle) states that from the commercial aspect his entry is highly desirable and that he does the highest volume of business through USCC with Japan of any buyer in California.

b. CIS (Mr Nunan) states no derogatory information is on file.

3. a. The fact that he is a Japanese national need not be a bar to his entry under the usual provisions of the trade program. Responsibility for submission of the application of a person about whose entry cries of discrimination might be raised in the U. S. is that of the Department of Commerce and the War Department. AS (Mr Sebald) concurs.

b. Mr Pickelle further states that the nature of control of Mr Hori over his interests precludes the appointment of an American citizen to represent him in Japan.

c. The initial quota of 102 private traders from the U.S. has been filled. Therefore clearance may not be granted for entry of Mr Hori until the day after scheduled departure of the initial quota.

4. Concluded no objection to entry with provision of paragraph 3c above.

5. Recommend approval proposed radio to War Department.

2. a. SCAP radio CX 52691, 15 May 47, presented to OMGUS the case of nine former German citizens (five women, four children), Japanese by marriage, all except one of whom were repatriated from Germany to Japan with their Japanese husbands by Russian authorities after V-E Day. Names of subject personnel are:

- (1) Kaiwachi, Gertrude and 2 children.
- (2) Suzuki, Babette, and 1 child.
- (3) Stiller, Charlotte (20 yrs residence Japan).
- (4) Deguchi, Erna and child.
- (5) Mrs Neckel, mother-in-law of Mrs Deguchi.

b. All husbands of above are deceased except Mr. Deguchi, who has expressed a desire to return to Germany but is willing to have his wife return alone if he is not permitted to leave Japan. It is considered inadvisable to press OMGUS for entry of Mr. Deguchi.

3. OMGUS radio 1776, 20 May, disapproved their repatriation at Military Government expense, but stated that instructions for securing Military Government permits for those desiring to return at their own expense would be forwarded upon request. These instructions, received in OMGUS radio 9317, 27 May, require that subjects be war refugees, have housing available and have qualifications indicating potential contribution to German economy. Applications should be submitted OMGUS prior to approval for repatriation. This information has been given to subject personnel and to German community representatives,

however, since these refugees have no money, and are living on relief, they are unable to pay their passage.

4. Transportation Section (Personnel Movements - Mr Vierhus) states that at current transportation rates for Army transports, (five cents per nautical mile), the trip from Japan to Bremerhaven by the USAT General Black would be \$579.45 per person; actually, since space is available on the General Black, the cost to the U. S. Government to repatriate these refugees would be the cost of their meals for 45 days; i.e., approximately \$40.00 per person, which is negligible in comparison to the overall cost.

5. OMGUS radio CC 1091, 1 August, agreed to accept the non-objectionable Germans previously reported by SCAP as desiring repatriation. Subject personnel, while having Japanese citizenship by marriage, are Caucasian, and desire to regain German citizenship when a central government is organized to do this.

6. Colonel Bunker, of the C-in-C's office, has indicated that the C-in-C desires that every effort be made to include these personnel on the General Black. While OMGUS previously refused entry of subject personnel, in view of the blanket clearance granted by CC 1091, it is felt that there would be no objection to including them on the General Black, in order to complete the repatriation from Japan.

7. Recommend approval of proposed radio to OMGUS, and return to G-1 for action.

8. G-1, in addition to dispatching proposed radio to OMGUS, will secure from German community representatives the necessary personal data, and will endeavor to ascertain if any relief agencies are willing to pay transportation charges of subject personnel in case OMGUS gives unfavorable consideration to this request.

Part 1. Ourad CX 52691, 15 May 47, presented the appeals of nine former German citizens, Japanese by marriage, who desired to return to their homes in Germany. Names follow: Kaiwachi, Gertrude and two children; Suzuki, Babette and one child; Deguchi, Erna with mother-in-law and one child; Stiller, Charlotte. All are on relief, have no money to pay passage and have homes awaiting them in Germany. In view of urad CC 1091, 1 August, assume here there will be no objection to their repatriation on General Black. Japanese husband of Mrs Deguchi will not rpt not be permitted to return to Germany. Inclusion of above will complete German repatriation from Japan.

Part 2. Reurad CC 1091, nominal rolls will be made up by zone. Subject to shipboard facilities, will segregate obnoxious and non-obnoxious Germans prior to arrival.

1. The United Kingdom Liaison Mission has submitted the names of 24 private traders for entry into Japan under the private trade program (Tab: UKLM Rqst).

2. a. ESS (Lt Col Ryder) states that all are acceptable from the point of view of business to be conducted. It is noted that a woman is included. ESS (Foreign Trade - Mr Pickelle) states that accommodations can be provided.

b. This clearance will not exceed the United Kingdom quota of 64.

c. G-2 (CIS - Mr Nunan) states no derogatory information is on file on any person named except Joseph Levy. On the latter person G-2 has no objection to entry of Levy from a security standpoint. However, G-2 reports that files indicate Joseph Levy sent twenty strings of pearls of a value of approximately \$700.00 through an intermediary, Lt Moe Kadish (present residence Beverly Hills, California) to a person in the United States in the latter part of 1946. This action was in contravention of the Supreme Commander's effort to finance the occupational import trade program. PM, FEC, at request of Legal Section in February 1947, informed agencies in the U.S. Subsequent investigation resulted in apprehension of Levy in New York. He was later released basis unknown.

3. It is concluded that clearance should be granted for all persons named with the exception of Joseph Levy. It is considered

Government to Japan during the years 1943-45. He was apprehended by United States Occupation Forces and incarcerated in Sugamo Prison in October, 1945, on the charge of collaboration. He was transferred to the jurisdiction of the Chinese Government in 1946 and currently is serving an eight year prison sentence. Miss Duarte is known to have solicited the favor of various Occupation Forces persons to further her own interests. She is believed to have been engaged in 1946 to an American sergeant of the Fifth Air Force. The general consensus of opinion is that she is an opportunist. Despite the above, however, G-2 CIS (Mr. Nunan) states that no valid reason exists from a security standpoint for denying her reentry into Japan.

3. Reference paragraph 5 C/N No 1 above, oral information received from DS (Mr. Poole) indicates that Mr. Nogueira has a house and has given assurance that he will provide billeting for Miss Duarte.

4. Mr. Nogueira has telephoned to DS and to G-1 Section several times during the past two days requesting an early reply to this request in view of the fact that Miss Duarte hopes to leave Hong Kong on 8 August.

5. Recommend DS reply to the Portuguese Diplomatic Agent as follows:

"Clearance is granted for Miss Vera Machado Duarte to reenter Japan. It is understood that full logistic support is guaranteed by the Portuguese Diplomatic Agent."

The father of **Verina** Machado Duarte is believed to have been councillor and charge d'affaire of the Nanking Government to Japan during the years 1943-1945. He was apprehended by U. S. occupation forces and incarcerated in Sugamo prison on 13 October 1945, on the charge of collaboration. He was transferred to the jurisdiction of the Chinese Government in the early summer of 1946 - After a three month trial he was sentenced initially to a prison term of fifteen years, which sentence was reduced subsequently to eight years.

**Verina** Wang applied to the Portugese Diplomatic Agent to declare the marriage of her father and mother illegal and void. The basis for this request, is not known. The result of this action is not known, however, she succeeded in changing her name to **Verina** Machado Duarte.

She has been known to have solicited the favor of various occupation force persons to forward her own interests. She is believed to have been engaged in early 1946 to an American Sergeant of the Fifth Air Force. The general consensus of opinion among the people who came in contact with her indicates that she is an "opportunist" and that she would make any changes to further her own welfare irrespective of the principles involved.

MEMORANDUM TO: General Peabody

In compliance with your recent verbal request this memorandum outlines the proposed procedure for control of clearances of private traders.

Because date of entry within the 15 day period of validity of clearance cannot be predicted, because we are working weeks in advance on clearances, and because it is not practicable to receive daily reports from 8th Army of all who physically enter Japan, it is necessary to choose an arbitrary date within the 15 day period at which time it must be presumed that all will enter. Consideration has been given to selecting three dates within the period and assuming a third of them would enter on that date as an average. On a several-month basis this would not be profitable and would unnecessarily complicate accounting procedures.

The arbitrary time chosen at which time entry will be assumed for accounting purposes is 10 days after beginning of period of validity of clearance. For example it will be assumed that all who are cleared for the initial period of 15 - 29 August, inclusive, will enter on 25 August. This will cause their departure date to fall on 15 September, 21 days later. If a nation's quota is filled for the initial period, clearances may be granted for entry between 16 and 30 September, inclusive, but not until that date. This is a conservative system which will prevent the entry of more private traders than those for which we have accommodations.

It is stressed that this procedure is for control of quota restrictions only, and has no bearing upon action to be taken if 8th Army records indicate that John Smith entered on 16 August but is still in Japan on 10 September, i.e., has overstayed his particular individual clearance by 4 days!

1. SWNCC 205/5, 14 July 47, gives the SWNCC decision on the property and financial regulations to be applicable to former German diplomats, and the treatment to be accorded them during repatriation.

2. This directive requires that former embassy and consular officials be given the maintenance, immunities, and privileges established under international law. Subject personnel are to be permitted to take out unlimited amounts of baggage, subject only to shipping space limitations, and with a warning that facilities for handling more than 500 pounds of baggage per person at Bremerhaven are highly dubious. Each repatriate will be permitted to take out \$250 (U.S.) or its equivalent in any other foreign currency except yen.

3. This SWNCC decision was passed to SCAP by JCS radio WARX 82061, 16 July 47, and was the basis for SCAPIN 1750, which ordered the repatriation of Germans from Japan. CG, 8th Army has been issued a directive and is presently engaged in supervising the Japanese Government in this repatriation. Present plans call for a departure date on or about 18 August for the repatriation vessel.

4. No further action appears necessary except the submission of certain reports of intelligence information, and personal data on repatriates to OMGUS and to War Department. These reports will be forwarded air mail immediately after departure of the repatriation vessel.

2. a. Purpose of this shipment is for distribution to accredited Japanese Protestant ministers and church workers. This is necessary since these individuals are inadequately paid and the churches in the U.S. wish to assist them. It is in lieu of a direct cash subsidy.

b. The shipment will consist of \$25,000.00 worth of powdered milk, spaghetti, canned meats and similar items.

c. The Foreign Missions Conference assumes responsibility for its proper distribution at no cost to the U.S. or Japanese Governments.

3. a. Representatives of the Foreign Missions Conference have stated that the church work of their Japanese ministers, teachers and workers is being neglected since these individuals are required to take up other work in order to feed their families.

b. It is believed that, based on past dependability and the almost universal antipathy among missionaries for "rice Christianity", the Foreign Missions Conference may be relied upon to make certain that only their Japanese clergy and workers are recipients of this food.

4. Concluded the Foreign Missions Conference should be authorized to ship \$25,000.00 worth of food to Japan.

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

2. SCAP radio CX 52691, 15 May 1947, requested OMGUS comments on the repatriation to Germany of 9 former German citizens, Japanese by marriage, who were repatriated from Germany to Japan with their Japanese husbands by Russian authorities after V-E day.

3. OMGUS radio CXR 1776, 20 May, disapproved their repatriation at Military Government expense, but stated that instructions for securing Military Government permits for those desiring to return at their own expense would be forwarded upon request. These instructions, received in OMGUS radio 9317, 27 May, require that subjects be war refugees, have housing available and have qualifications indicating potential contribution to German economy. Applications should be submitted OMGUS prior to approval for repatriation. This information has been given to subject personnel and to German community representatives, however, since these refugees have no money, and are living on relief, they are unable to pay their passage.

4. Transportation Section (Personnel Movements - Mr. Vierhus) states that at current transportation rates for Army transports, (five cents per nautical mile), the trip from Japan to Bremerhaven by the USAT General Black would be \$579.45 per person; actually, since space is available on the General Black, the cost to the U. S. Government to repatriate these refugees would be the cost of their meals for 45 days; i.e., approximately \$40.00 per person, which is negligible in comparison to the over-all cost.

5. OMGUS radio CC 1091, 1 August, agreed to accept the non-objectionable Germans previously reported by SCAP as desiring repatriation. Subject personnel, while having Japanese citizenship by marriage are Caucasian, and desire to regain German citizenship when a central government is organized to do this.

6. Colonel Bunker, of the C-in-C's office, has indicated that the C-in-C desires that every effort be made to include these personnel on the

General Black. While OMGUS previously refused entry of subject personnel, in view of the blanket clearance granted by CC 1091, it is felt that there would be no objection to including them on the General Black, in order to complete the repatriation from Japan.

1. Reference is made to Memorandum to G-1, above subject, dated 31 July 47, inclosing CPC Memorandum and SCAP Radio.

2. An analysis of CPC Memorandum indicates that exceptions to regulations governing repatriation are to be made as follows:

a. Foerster is to be repatriated whether or not his wife is physically able to accompany him.

b. Foerster will not be given an opportunity to sign property inventories; however, will be given an opportunity to designate a representative for him if he so desires.

3. The above listed exceptions were the subject of discussions between G-1 and CPC on 30 July 47. It was agreed that SCAP had authority to make these exceptions and, based on this, attached radio was dispatched.

4. G-1 concurs in action taken and proposed to be taken as outlined in attached CPC Memorandum.

5. As a matter of information, when attached radio was dispatched, Headquarters Eighth Army was advised that although Foerster should be given opportunity to designate representative to sign property inventories for him, his delay or failure to designate such a representative should in no way delay the property processing incident to repatriation.

MEMORANDUM FOR: General Beiderlinden

SUBJECT: Property of Objectionable German Nationals

1. Radio E 31211DA, 8th Army, requests reconsideration of directive concerning German property, as contained in SCAP Radio C 54371, 28 July. This directive orders that if any objectionable Germans are removed from repatriation for ill health, their property will still be seized, except for 350 pounds personal baggage allowance.

2. 8th Army claims that seizure of such items as furniture, bedding, kitchen ware, etc. which are of little value to anyone except the owner, will be the cause of hardship to the Germans, who will be thrown on Japanese relief for subsistence.

3. JCS Radio WX 86033, 28 April 46, which is basic repatriation directive, states (para 3b) "Private property falling within category A above (objectionable Germans) will be seized and held in your custody in anticipation of your delegation as agent of GEPC. No withdrawals for living expenses will be permitted for former owners who will be dependent for relief on Japanese Government". Our Radio C 61873, 10 June 46, requested that property not be seized until repatriation commences, at which time the Germans would be segregated in the replacement center. JCS Radio W 94599, 17 July 46, agreed to our recommendation above.

4. In view of radios outlined in paragraph 3 above, it is not considered that directives given in SCAP Radio 54371 to 8th Army are unusually harsh. These restrictions were issued particularly to prevent such wealthy Germans as Meissner, Helm and Foerster from retaining their property in case of illness in the family. To date no exceptions have been granted because of illness.
