



# PROFILE HOUSE,

FRANCONIA NOTCH. WHITE MOUNTAINS, N. H.

#### TAFT & GREENLEAF, Proprietors.

This favorite summer resort, situated nineteen hundred and seventy-two feet above tide-water, is the largest hotel in New England, and has long been known and appreciated by thousands of summer visitors. The location of the hotel is well described by the Rev. Dr. Prime: "A plain of a few clear acres in extent, in a gorge that admits the passage of a narrow carriage-way, mountains two thousand feet high rising almost perpendicularly or each side, with two lovely lakes, being mader the bills and stirred larly on each side, with two lovely lakes lying under the hills and skirted with forests, has been chosen as a summer resort, and the site of a magnificent hotel, in which five hundred guests find refreshment, and a cool retreat from the torrid heats that blight the world below. It is never hot at the Profile House."

FRANCONIA NOTCH, in which the Profile House is located, is a pass, about five miles in extent, between the western wall of Lafayette and Mount Cannon.

Starr King says: "The narrow district thus enclosed contains more objects of interest to the mass of travellers than any other region of equal extent within the usual compass of the White Mountain tour. In the way of rock-sculpture and waterfalls, it is a huge museum of curiosities. There is no spot usually visited in any of the valleys where the senses are at once impressed so strongly and so pleasantly with the wildness and freshness which a stranger instinctively associates with mountain scenery in New Hampshire."

Harriet Martineau said: "I certainly think the Franconia Defile the noblest mountain pass I saw in the United States."

Among the most remarkable of these wonders of nature are:—
THE OLD MAN OF THE MOUNTAIN, as it is familiarly called, which hangs upon one of the cliffs, twelve hundred feet above Profile Lake, - a piece of sculpture older than the Sphinx. It is unquestionably the most remarkable natural curiosity in this country, if not in the world.

THE FLUME, a wonderful freak of nature, is an upright fissure in the rocks, whose perpendicular walls on either side are from fifty to sixty feet in height, several hundred in length, and from ten to twenty feet apart. A small stream flows between the walls, and farther on forms a beautiful cascade over six hundred feet of polished rock.

THE BASIN AND POOL are also famous as illustrating the wondrous doings of nature.

Within a short walk of the Profile House is Profile Lake, a beautiful neet of water, and one of the gems of mountain pictures. The finest sheet of water, and one of the gems of mountain pictures. trout live in its waters.

Also ECHO LAKE, a clear, limpid sheet of water, of great depth and

transparency. Here are the centres of most marvellous echoes.

How to Get There.—Profile and Franconia Notch Railroad (narrow gauge) from Bethlehem Junction, or stage via Flume House, ten miles from Pemigewasset Valley Railroad.

### THE FLUME HOUSE.

This new Hotel, five miles from the Profile House, and under the same anagement, is pleasantly located in the southern extremity of Franconia Notch. To the north can be seen the most prominent mountains of the range, Lafayette, the two Haystacks and Mount Liberty, while the beautiful valley of the Pemigewasset Stretches to the south. It is first-class in all its appointments, and is open from June 1 to November 1.

The drives are delightful and exceedingly varied, over good roads, along the lake on either side, by the banks of rivers and on the hill-tops, from which rare and grand views may be had of the highest mountains in Vermont and Canada.


## Montreal & Boston Air Line.

THE MONTREAL AND BOSTON AIR LINE forms the great Summer Highway to the famed lake, mountain and river resorts of Northern New England and Canada. The picturesque regions of the White Hills, the rivers and lakes of the Granite State, the most romantic nooks of the Green Mountain State, and the commercial metropolis of the Canadian Dominion, are upon the direct line of railway; while in connection therewith are found the most delightful routes to Lake Champlain, Lake George, Saratoga, Watkins Glen, Niagara Falls, the Thousand Islands, the Rapids and Gulf of St. Lawrence, Quebec, the wonderful Saguenay, the fishing and hunting regions of Northwestern Maine and Northern New Hampshire, and many other pleasure resorts. In another place will be found a comprehensive List of Tours, embracing all the great summer resorts of New England, New York and Canada.

#### The Route.

Leaving the large and elegant station of the Boston & Lowell Railroad, on Causeway street, in Boston, passengers by this route proceed northward through the pleasant suburbs of the city. Lowell, one of the greatest of American manufacturing cities, is soon reached, and it is here that the valley of the Merrimac is entered upon. For an hour and a half the route lies along the pleasant banks of this stream. Nashua and Concord, both handsome and attractive cities, the latter being the capital of New Hampshire, are the next places of importance. Tilton is a charming town 18 miles above Concord. Above Tilton, on the left, is Lake Winnisquam, an outlying bay of Lake Winnis

All Through Trains Start from and Arrive at the Magnificent



Boston and Lowell Railroad Station CAUSEWAY STREET, BOSTON pesaukee, and formerly known as Sanbornton, or Great Bay. It is a lovely sheet of water, and opens one of the first views the traveler has of the White Mountains. Laconia and Lake Village are two thriving places, and above the latter the railroad skirts the shores of Long Bay, a portion of the beautiful Lake Winnipesaukee.

At the Weirs we reach the steamboat landing on Lake Winnipesaukee. The fine steamer "Lady of the Lake" connects here with all express trains and runs across the beautiful waters to Centre Harbor and Wolfeboro'. The former is situated at the northern end of the lake, and the latter on the eastern shore. The round trip to Centre Harbor and Wolfeboro', back to the Weirs, can easily be taken if the traveler has not time to spare for a longer sojourn. The Weirs has become a favorite resort, and in addition to three hotels, the place possesses a beautiful grove in which religious, temperance, military, and other social assemblages are held every summer.

Plymouth, which lies above Lake Winnipesaukee, is 51 miles from Concord and 126 miles from Boston. It is situated at the confluence of Baker's and the Pemigewasset rivers, and has been termed "the gateway to the mountains." The great sentinels of the Franconia range are near at hand, and the mountain and river scenery of the region is exceedingly fine. Very extended views may be had from Prospect mountain and other elevations in the town and its vicinity, and there are excellent drives in all directions. The popular Pemigewasset House, is situated here, and during the summer it is filled with city guests. The Pemigewasset valley, in which are situated Campton, Thornton and Woodstock, has long been a favorite haunt of artists. From Plymouth to Profile Lake there is an ascent of upwards of 1,500 feet. The Pemigewasset Valley Railroad extends as far as North Woodstock, from whence a stage runs to the Profile House. The main line of railway ascends the valley of Baker's river through the picturesque towns of Rumney, Wentworth and Warren. The latter town is said to contain over one hundred miles of trout streams. There are several prominent mountains in Warren, and Moosilauke, which lies chiefly in the neighboring town of Benton, has an altitude of 4,811 feet. This is the highest peak in the White

Mountains west of Mount Lafayette, and the summit is reached by a good carriage road.

From Warren, the railroad crosses the height of land to the Connecticut River, which is reached in the town of Haverhill. The elevation of the railroad at Warren Summit, is 1,063 feet. The elevated line of the road through Haverhill gives a succession of beautiful views up and down the Connecticut, and across the river in Vermont. The passenger overlooks the

broad valley, and at one point the great bend or "Ox Bow." Among the charming villages seen on the Vermont side are Bradford and Newbury.

At Woodsville, the traveller can diverge from the line and proceed by railway up the valley of the Ammonoosuc River in the direction of the celebrated White Mountain Notch and Mount Washington. By this route there is unbroken rail communication with Littleton, Bethlehem, the Profile House

and Franconia Notch, Twin Mountain House, Fabyan House, Mount Pleasant House, Crawford House and White Mountain Notch, Mount Washington Summit House (situated at the very summit of Mount Washington, 6,203 feet above the sea level), Whitefield, Jefferson, Lancaster, Groveton Junction, etc. It is the route also to Brunswick Springs, Colebrook, Dixville Notch, Lake Umbagog, the Richardson or Rangely Lakes of Maine, the Magalloway River, Parmachenee Lake, the Connecticut Lakes, etc. The ascent of Mount Washington is made on the famous mountain railway, the grade of which reaches 1,080 feet to the mile, or about one foot in three. Its length is a trifle over three miles, and the total rise is nearly four thousand feet. At Littleton there is a stage connection with Franconia, Littleton, Franconia, Bethlehem, Jefferson, and the other mountain towns, abound in hotels and boardinghouses, Bethlehem alone entertaining every summer two thousand guests.

#### Through Vermont.

At Wells River, on the Vermont side of the Connecticut river, opposite Woodsville, another important link of the Air Line route is reached. This is the Passumpsic Railroad. The Connecticut River Railroad Line brings its passengers here from the south (New York, New Haven, Hartford, Springfield, Brattleboro', Bellows Falls, White River Junction, etc.), and there is also railway communication with Montpelier by the Montpelier & Wells River Railroad. The ride northward through the Connecticut and Passumpsic valleys is delightful, and there is a constant succession of beautiful river, mountain and lake views.

After passing Ryegate, McIndoes Falls, Barnet, East Barnet and Passumpsic, St. Johnsbury, 20 miles from Wells River, is reached. This is one of the most thriving and beautiful towns in New England and an important business centre. The manufacture of scales is the chief industry of the place, and the productions of the Messrs. Fairbanks' immense establishment comprise everything from the immense dock and railway scale to the tiny balance of the banker, all equally nice in adjustment and precise in plan of construction. The product of these works finds its way to every part of the globe.

St. Johnsbury is the point of junction with the Vermont

Division of the Boston & Lowell (formerly the St. Johnsbury & Lake Champlain) Railroad, by which Mount Mansfield (stage from Morrisville), Lake Champlain, Highgate Springs, Highgate Falls, Alburgh Springs, the Adirondack regions, Ogdensburg and other important points west may be reached. It is from here, too, that the trains from Portland and the White Mountains enter upon the Passumpsic Railroad.

Continuing northward from St. Johnsbury, and just before reaching Lyndon, a charming water-fall will be observed. It is one of many that break the flow of the rapid Passumpsic River and its two branches, which unite in the main stream in Lyndon. At Lyndonville, a flourishing and growing village, are the repair and construction shops of this important line. West Burke, 37 miles from Wells River, is the station from which passengers leave by stage line for Willoughby Lake, six miles distant. Burke Mountain, a bold elevation of 2,000 feet, will be observed to the right as you approach this station, and a good view of the eastern wall of the lake is also had in approaching the same point. This wonderful sheet of water lies between two lofty mountain walls, and probably dates back to the glacial period, when the ice scooped for the present lake its very remarkable basin. The surface of the lake is 1,162 feet above the sea level, and the mountain walls tower on each side to the height of about 2,500 feet above the water. Mount Willoughby, or Annanance, forms the eastern wall, and Mount Hor the western. The height of the former above the sea level is 3,800 feet. From the summit of these mountains you may look to the southeast upon the White and Franconia mountains; westward, upon the bold peaks and extended ridges of the Green Mountains; northward into Canada; and southward, along the broad valley which stretches between the great mountain ranges. The lake is six miles long, from half a mile to two miles wide, and of very great depth. The mountains rise so abruptly from the water, that on the east side there is barely room beneath the great frowning wall for a carriage road. The WILLOUGHBY LAKE HOUSE, Francis Richardson & Co., proprietors, is situated near the lake, and is easily reached from West Burke Station by stage, or from Barton by stage to the lake, and a delightful steamer trip the entire length of the lake to the hotel.

The summit of the railroad (1,183 feet) is reached above West Burke. South Barton, Barton, Barton Landing and Coventry, are successively passed, and near Barton is a beautiful sheet of water known as Crystal Lake.

#### Newport and Lake Memphremagog.

Sixty-five miles above Wells River, upon the shores of the romantic Lake Memphremagog, and amid scenery of the most picturesque character, is situated the village of Newport, a place long famed as one of the most attractive and beautiful of northern summer resorts. Few travellers who have the leisure at command can well withstand the temptation to halt at this pleasant spot, especially if they have formed a previous acquaintance with the elegant and substantial comforts afforded by the well-known MEMPHREMAGOG HOUSE. The natural attractions of Newport have, within the past few years, been greatly enhanced by improvements of a practical kind, and there are many cities not as well provided for in a sanitary way as this country village. The guests of the hotel, instead of being compelled to drink the water of the neighboring lake, which might be deemed good enough at other similar resorts, are supplied from the pure and crystal springs upon the hill

across the arm of the lake, pipes leading directly to the house across the bay. The drainage is also perfect. Prospect Hill, a very sightly elevation a short distance from the hotel, has been made a most charming resort by the construction of driveways and paths. A reservoir is located here, and pure spring water, obtained from the same copious

sources which supply the hotel, is furnished therefrom to houses in the village. The view from this point is very extended,

including the village with its surroundings of lake, river and mountain, and many far-away peaks. A large expanse of the

lake is seen, together with the bay, which assists in forming the peninsula on which Newport stands.

Owl's Head, a sharp peak which rises from the western shore of the lake, and Jay Peak, 4,018 feet high, and the third highest of the Green Mountains, are near at hand. Mount Elephantis is beyond Owl's Head, and Mount Orford, 3,300 feet high, still

farther away. The three mountains last mentioned are in Canada, and Jay Peak in Vermont. Southward, the Willoughby Mountains, with the remarkable gap in which Willoughby Lake

was formed, are plainly seen. The places of interest in the neighborhood of Newport are very numerous, and a long sojourn would be necessary to exhaust the extended list of rides and boating excursions which can be taken, with the hotel as a startingpoint. To meet the requirements of guests carriages, saddlehorses and boats are

always at command. A new boat-house has been built in front of the hotel and near the railroad station. Steamboat landing, station and hotel are all near each other. Among the many places of interest near Newport are Clyde and Coventry

Falls, the former of which are within a half-hour's walk of the hotel. It is a pleasant drive to Stanstead, which is situated across the Canadian line, and another pleasant excursion may be made to Jay Peak. A delightful excursion by row-boat may be made to Black River, which pursues its way toward the lake in graceful windings, amid the green-

est and most luxuriant foliage. Barton River is another point of interest to be reached in the same way, while the lake shores have many attractive points. Experienced and careful boatmen are always to be had.

The Memphremagog House is admirably kept by W. F. Bowman, and will accommodate four hundred guests. Music will be furnished by the Easthampton Orchestral Club, of six pieces, A. N. Baldwin, leader. The broad and spacious verandas, which extend upon all sides of the hotel, afford glorious outlooks upon the lake and the other scenic beauties of Newport.

Lake Memphremagog is from one to two miles wide and thirty miles long, fully two-thirds of its fair expanse lying in Canada. Its outlet is at Magog, which is situated at its northern extremity, and Newport, which is at the southern end, is therefore at the head of the lake. An excursion down the lake in one of the fine steamers, "Mountain Maid," or "Lady of the Lake," is a most delightful experience. Along the western shore is a range of mountains, of which Owl's Head and Mount Elephantis are the most prominent elevations. The eastern shore is less wild, though very picturesque, and towards

the southern end it is dotted with the pleasant summer villas of some of Montreal's wealthy citizens. Memphremagog is an

Memphremagog is an Indian name, and is said to signify "beautiful water," a most happy designation, surely. The scenery greatly resembles that upon Loch Lomond, the "Queen of the Scottish Lakes." There are upwards of twenty islands in the lake, the largest of which, one hundred acres in extent, is Province known as Island. Round Island is a gracefully formed


and wooded isle, guarding the bay which leads up to Owl's Head. Lord's Island is near the foot of the lake. On Long Island is a hugh boulder, known as Balance Rock, and upon Skinner's

Island is a cave, of which romantic stories are told in connection with early smuggling operations. The Owl's Head Mountain House is a beautiful summer resort situated at the base of Owl's Head Mountain. on the shore of Lake Memphremagog, twelve miles from Newport, Vt., at the head of the lake, and eighteen miles from

Magog, P. Q., at the outlet of the lake. The summit of the mountain is 3,000 feet above the level of the lake, and 3,500



feet above the level of the sea; and from its rugged top a most charming panorama is spread out before the eye. The ascent of the mountain is quite easy by a plain, smooth foot-path. From points near the house, and easy of access, charming views of the lake in either direction are obtained. The air is pure and dry, a positive cure for hay fever. The house is new and commodious, and fitted with all the modern conveniences. Every facility for rambling, boating, bowling and fishing will be afforded, which, with the great number of places of varied interest in the immediate vicinity, will make a visit here healthful and highly enjoyable. The steam vacht "Raymond" will run between Newport and the Owl's Head Mountain House, and can also be chartered by parties who may wish to visit the several places of interest on the lake. The only village on the shore of the lake between Newport and Magog is Georgeville. on the eastern shore. The steamer touches also at Knowlton's Landing, opposite Georgeville, on the west side. At Magoun's Point, eleven miles from Newport, the Passumpsic Railroad Company has fitted up a picnic grove (Bay View Park), with a pavilion for dancing, etc., and steamer excursions to this place are frequently made during the summer.

#### From Newport to Quebec.

Passengers wishing to go to Ouebec direct from Newport can take the Passumpsic train going north over that portion known as the Massawippi Valley Railroad, which runs along the eastern shore of Lake Memphremagog for two or three miles, and thence into the valley leading to the charming Massawippi Lake. After it reaches this lake it follows the eastern shore for six miles, and then passes on to a union with the Grand Trunk Railway and the Quebec Central Railway at Sherbrooke. This route is by 25 miles the shortest, between Quebec and Boston, and between Quebec and New York. Two trains, with palace, sleeping and parlor cars attached, are run daily between Newport and Quebec during the season of pleasure travel. Sleeping-cars can be taken at Newport at ten o'clock, P. M., and the passenger awakes at six o'clock the next morning at Point Levi, opposite Quebec, thus avoiding the former tedious transit; or if he prefers to take the trip by day, he can leave Newport at about six o'clock, A. M., and reach Ouebec early in the afternoon.

#### From Newport to Montreal.

From Newport to Montreal, the route lies over the South Eastern Railway. This road extends from Newport to St. Lambert, which is at the southern extremity of the famous Victoria Bridge, over which the trains cross the St. Lawrence river into the city of Montreal. The distance from Newport to Montreal is only 103 miles, and a rich and fruitful region, lying chiefly upon the Canadian side of the line, is traversed.

For some distance after leaving Newport, the railroad skirts the shores of Lake Memphremagog, in sight of Jay Peak and other high mountains. Passing through North Troy, the traveler once crosses the boundary line into Canada, but quickly returns to the border town of Richford, Vermont. This is a thriving place in the centre of a rich agricultural region, and near the town are some picturesque falls on the Missisquoi Thenceforward the route is across the border and through some of the most attractive inland towns and villages of the province of Quebec. There are stations at Abercorn, Sutton Junction, West Brome, Sweetsburg, Cowansville, East Farnham, Brigham, Farnham, Ste. Brigide, Ste. Angele, Marieville and Chambly, and at the latter place the Richelieu river, through which the waters of Lake Champlain find their way to the St. Lawrence, is crossed. The northern division of the road leaves the main line at Sutton Junction and the Champlain Division at Farnham, both centering at Sorel, a flourishing town of 6,000 inhabitants, situated on the St. Lawrence river at the mouth of the Richelieu.

The Victoria Bridge, which is used only for railway transit, is one and a quarter miles in length or two miles with its shore extensions, and rests upon twenty-four broad piers, at a height of sixty feet above the ordinary river level. The central span is 330 feet and the others 242 feet each. The bridge was built under the superintendence of Robert Stevenson and his associates, and was completed in 1860.

#### Montreal.

The metropolis of the Canadas occupies the site of an ancient Indian village, on the island of Montreal, at the head of river navigation proper, 540 miles from the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Mount Royal, which is crowned by a beautiful park, rises to a

height of 550 feet behind the city. There are many places of interest within and near the city that strangers should visit, and among them are the following: The Cathedral of Notre Dame—the largest church in the city and capable of holding 10,000 worshippers; the handsomely decorated Church of the Jesuits, on Bleury street; Christ Church Cathedral, on St. Catherine street: the new and beautiful church of Notre Dame de Lourdes, on St. Catherine street: the ancient church of Notre Dame de Bonsecours, on St. Paul street; the partially constructed St. Peter's Cathedral, near Dominion square; the Bonsecours Market, with its handsome dome; the celebrated Grev Nunnery: the Nelson Monument: the Place d'Armes: the Champ de Mars; Viger square; Victoria square; McGill College; and the Waterworks. A delightful drive may be taken to the elevated Park, on Mount Royal, which overlooks the beautiful city and river; and another pleasant drive is to Lachine, which is at the head of the famous Lachine Rapids. The latter trip can be so timed that the steamer may be seen descending the rapids. A delightful excursion can also be made by taking the train to Lachine at 7.15 o'clock A. M., or 5.00 o'clock P. M., and then descending the rapids in a small steamer, which reaches Montreal by 9.00 o'clock A. M., or 7.00 P. M., respectively, - only two hours later.

The Windson Hotel, George Iles, manager, is one of the handsomest hotels in America and at the same time one of the best conducted.


#### Quebec.

No traveler should fail to visit the quaint old French capital. There are three routes between Montreal and Quebec—the splendid steamers of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company's Mail Line, the "Montreal" and "Quebec;" the North Shore Railway via Three Rivers, and the Grand Trunk Railway via Richmond. The steamers leave each end of the route in the early evening, arriving at their destination early the next morning. The passenger is thus enabled to obtain a good night's rest, while little is lost in the way of attractive scenery, the shores of the St. Lawrence, between these two points, being generally low and uninteresting.

The second route of travel is furnished by the new North

Shore Railway, which follows the bank of the river from Montreal into the very streets of Quebec.

Quebec, once the capital of the French Dominion in America—the western Gibraltar and key to the great St. Lawrence valley—stands at the junction of the St. Lawrence and St. Charles rivers, having been founded in 1608 by Samuel de

Champlain, on the site of the Indian village of Stadacona. The upper and lower towns are separate and distinct, and no imaginary divisions. The upper town is surrounded by a massive and frowning wall of hewn stone, nearly three miles in length, and five gateways communicate with the enclosed part

of the city. From the lofty citadel, or from the magnificent promenade known as Dufferin Terrace, the beholder looks down upon a curious scene of activity. Even the blackened throats of the chimneys and the moss-covered roofs of the lower town are far beneath him.

The citadel will, perhaps, prove the point of greatest interest to the stranger. It covers some forty acres, and was long considered an impregnable fortress. The view of the river, the city and its surroundings, and across to Point Levi is very fine. The Plains of Abraham, and the precipitous bluffs scaled by the dauntless Wolfe and his brave soldiers in that memorable surprise and victory of 1750, are near at hand. Point Levi, on the opposite bank, is where Arnold and his little army rendezvoused in 1775, after their memorable march through the wilderness. The view from Dufferin Terrace is scarcely inferior. At this point an elevator runs between the lower and upper town, and by its use the toilsome ascent by the zig-zag streets may be avoided. Among the special points of interest within the city in addition to the Citadel and the Terrace, are the Basilica or Catholic Cathedral, the English Cathedral, the Grand Battery, the Esplanade, the Ursuline Convent, the University, the Governor's Garden with its monument to Wolfe and Montcalm, the Custom House and Exchange.

The Plains of Abraham and the Falls of Montmorenci are visited by carriage. The latter are six miles from the city, and the drive thither is delightful. The falls have a descent of 240 feet, and near them was fought the unsuccessful and nearly disastrous battle which preceded Wolfe's final victory on the Plains of Abraham. The Chaudiere Falls are nine miles from Quebec on the opposite side of the river.

The new Quebec and Lake St. John Railway which is being built in a northwesterly direction from Quebec, and is now in operation as far as St. Raymond, passes through a very picturesque country, and is likely to prove a favorite route for tourists and sportsmen. Lake St. Joseph, 24 miles from Quebec, is a beautiful sheet of water on which a small passenger steamer makes daily rounds.

The St. Louis Hotel, the Chateau St. Louis Hotel Co., proprietors, is a first-class establishment, situated in the immediate vicinity of the Governor's Garden, the Citadel,

Dufferin Terrace, etc., and is deservedly popular with the traveling public.

The RUSSELL House is an auxiliary of the St. Louis.

#### The Saguenay River.

The excursion from Quebec down the St. Lawrence and up the River Saguenay is a rich experience for the lover of nature. The round trip from Quebec to Ha! Ha! Bay and Chicoutimi and back to Quebec, occupies only forty-eight hours. The traveler accomplishes the entire distance on the steamers of the St. Lawrence Steam Navigation Company, one of which leaves Quebec in the morning, on the arrival of the Montreal boat.

There are many interesting places to note upon the St Lawrence before the mouth of the Saguenay is reached. The view of Ouebec from the river is very beautiful. A glimpse is had of the Falls of Montmorenci, just before the rich and fruitful Isle of Orleans is reached. This island is nearly twenty miles in length. Cap Tourment, 2,000 feet high, is 28 miles below Quebec, on the wild and picturesque north shore. Many islands are passed, one of which, Grosse Isle, is the quarantine station of Ouebec. Baie St. Paul is a region noted for the richness of its iron mines, and Malbaie, or Murray Bay, is a favorite Canadian summer resort. The last landing-place before reaching Tadousac, at the mouth of the Saguenay, is Riviere du Loup, on the south shore. Riviere du Loup is the point of disembarkation for Cacouna, a celebrated wateringplace six miles distant. St. Lawrence Hall, at Cacouna, is the largest hotel below Quebec.

The ascent of the Saguenay is begun at Tadousac. This river is the largest affluent of the great St. Lawrence, and unquestionably one of the most remarkable rivers on the continent. It is the outlet of Lake St. John, an inland sea into which eleven large rivers pour their floods, 130 miles from the St. Lawrence. The Saguenay itself seems to occupy a deep rift in the Laurentian Mountains, which rise steep and rugged from its brink, while the great, dark stream is, in places, of untold depth. The water has been found to be hundreds of feet deep—even a thousand—but a short distance from the shore. The river is navigable for about 90 miles, and for that distance will float the largest vessels in the world. In places it

is two miles wide, yet every feature of its wild and rugged scenery is on so grand a scale that the distance seems not half so great.

As the steamer generally ascends the Saguenay at night, and descends it the next day, the passenger finds himself in the morning at Ha! Ha! Bay, 65 miles from Tadousac, or at Chicoutimi, 35 miles further, or 235 miles from Quebec. A dozen or fifteen miles below the entrance to Ha! Ha! Bay, and upon the same side of the river, is the Tableau, a smooth, perpendicular mass of dark-colored granite, 600 feet high by 300 wide, and a few miles farther is Statue Point, a huge precipitous cliff, with an inaccessible cavern far up its craggy side, which might serve as a niche for a statue. The grandest features of all are Cape Eternity and Cape Trinity, with Eternity Bay, which rests between. On one side of the bay the crags are 1,800 feet high, and upon the other over 1,500, and in the latter instance the mountain wall is nearly perpendicular. Cape Trinity is the upper point.

The steamer enters the bay, and approaches quite near to the lofty wall of one of these stupendous promontories. The water is said to be as deep five feet from the base of these rocks as it is in the centre of the stream. On account of the overhanging cliffs, the waters assume a black and inky appearance. The steamer's whistle produces a remarkable echo. Here, and in many other places along the river, mountain cascades are seen tumbling over the rocky heights. Upon two of the acclivities of Trinity are profiles, one of which, on the second acclivity, is very clearly defined. These are better seen on approaching the cape from above than from below.

Tadousac is again reached, on the return voyage, towards evening, and Quebec the succeeding morning.

Coupons Toronto to Kingston, Kingston to Prescott and Prescott to Montreal, are each good via Grand Trunk Railway or Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Co.'s steamers, so that the journey may be made partly by one route and completed by the other.

Tickets reading between New York and Albany, via Hudson River Day Line steamers, are good on steamers of the Citizens' Steamboat Co., or People's Evening Line (night boats).
