In October, 1812, he was invited by the Duke of Basano, to a conference with the Emperor Napoleon, at Wilma. He immediately set off on his mission, travelling day and night. The weather was unusually severe, and the whole country through which he passed, after leaving France, was so wasted by contending armies as scarcely to afford him a comfortable meal. In a state of exhaustion, from want of food and sleep, the sudden changes pen, while many of its former friends are willing from extreme cold to the excessive heat of the small and crowded cottages of the Jews, the only taveras in Poland, produced a violent inflamation in the lungs.
