2. ANNOUNCER Uncle Sam's Forest Rangers!  
3. MUSIC Theme  
4. ANNOUNCER For over ten years now I've been talking to you folks  
5. about forest conservation. In fact, right along with  
6. Ranger Jim and the others, I've tried to preach the gospel, if you  
7. please, of sensible forest management. Now that we're at war it seems  
8. more urgent than ever to me that our forests be used and handled properly.  
9. I get a real feeling of pride, I can tell you, in being the fellow who  
10. starts these Forest Ranger programs off with a message in behalf of  
11. "America's woods and rills and templed hills.".... Sometimes I've  
12. wondered if what I've tried to say has really gotten across...if my  
13. message has struck home. And then, like the other day, we get a letter  
14. from one of our regular listeners down there in Villa Rica, Georgia,  
15. and the writer tells us about her fine woodland, carefully nursed along  
16. and protected through the years, and now ready, under the best logging  
17. practices possible, to provide prime timber for our Nation at war....  
18. That's what makes a fellow really proud. And I can't help but think  
19. that thousands of other people have also come to realize the value of  
20. their wooded land to themselves and to their country, and that they,  
21. too, are sensibly handling the forest resource in their care and are  
22. protecting it to the best of their ability. To them I say, "That's  
23. swell!" And now, once again to the Pine Cone National Forest where  
24. anything can happen, and it usually does. At the moment, for example,  
25. Ranger Jim Robbins has just returned to the Ranger Station after an  
absence of several weeks, to find his wife, Bess, and the local school  
teacher, Mary Halloway, all up in the air about Assistant Ranger Jerry  
Quick....Here they are....

1. CHIEF Jim speaks words of angry man. I am sorry. (BACKGROUND NOISES UP) My people impatient. Must start ceremony...  
2. (CALLS) Running Wolf...John Bear Claw...bring torches!
3. JIM No...Wait...Wait, Red Hawk...By George, why didn't I think of this before?...Jerry, run back to the car and get that package on the front seat, will you? Quick!
4. JERRY Okay, Jim.
5. MARY That's the package he brought for you, Mrs. Robbins.
