Vancouver, Jan. 16.—Construction of a line of railway into the Peace River country from some point on the Canadian Na-tional Railway east of Brule Lake will furnish the solution of the Peace River area's long-standing transportation problem, according to Premier Oliver, who returned here from Ottawa. to-day.

Quebec, Jan. 16—"Our worst lills were those which we inherited from the previous administration and we came into a national estate that was heavily mortgaged," declared Premier King, during an address at a banquet tendered in his honor here last night by the Association of Liberal Clubs of Quebec.

The Premier reviewed the financial questions, development of the natural resources of the country, capital and labor and transportation.

Speaking of the potential wealth of the country, the Premier declared the eyes of the public had to be focussed on how the money could be raised. There were three factors land, labor and capital, All material wealth was subservient to human well-being and the Government could shape its policies so as to emphasize those differences which stood out in the various sections of Canada or it could shape its policy so as to cause these differences to disappear.



Nurmi Runs Better Than in His First Appearance in America, Winning Easily

Madison Square Garden, New York, Jan. 16 .- The flying feet of Paavo Nurmi showed their heels to time again last night when the phantom Finn ran away from Willie Ritola and three other rivals in a 3,000metre race and shattered three

world's records.

Two hours later Nurmi was on his way to Chicago to run to-night, then speed to New York for his third race in as many nights of an unprecedented endurance test.




