An able, intelligent, straightforward and frank officer who spent most of his naval career ashore or in semi-diplomatic posts. A good leader of men and well liked in the Navy. One of the few officers to reach Admiral's rank without graduating from Naval Staff College.

As Foreign Minister in 1940, Nomura made a sincere effort to diminish friction with America. Ambassador Grew in <u>Ten Years in Japan</u> speaks of Nomura as a "man of high personal character who through long personal association had my respect and esteem." He further stated that Nomura had twice refused the Washington appointment because "he did not wish to be placed in the position of giving assurances to the American Government" which might later be invalidated through cabinet changes. After his return to Japan, Radio Tokyo in May 1942 reported Nomura as saying U.S. wished to reach a successful conclusion in Japanese-American negotiations, but sought to compel Japan to accede to its wishes by threats of force.

Lost an eye in bombing incident directed by Koreans against Japanese in Shanghai following Sino-Japanese hostilities in 1932.

A message was sent by Tokyo to NOMURA in Washington stating that Nov 29 was the absolute deadline for NOMURA to reach an agreement with the U.S. "After that, things are going to hap-1940 Nov 20 pen," Tokyo bluntly informed the Japanese Ambassador. On Nov 28 another communication, known as the "winds code" message arrived at the Japanese Embassy, informing NOMURA and his aides that the war tip-off would come soon. the phrases "east wind rain" were broadcast on the news program from Tokyo, it would mean that war with the U. S. would come at any moment. On Dec 4/ the awaited announcement came on the daily Tokyo broadcast. It was heard in Hawaii at 1:00 p.m. The key words, signalling war against the U. S., Britain, and Dutch -- all three-were broadcast.

Admiral, former Japanese Ambassador to Washington, encouraged over-seas Japanese in article in August issue of magazine WARTIME. "America landed troops in rapid succession at Saipan, Guam and Tinian Islands, but the decisive war is not yet fought. Besides that, America must remember that Japan is blessed with territorial advantages. America, who has boasted of her richness, is now suffering from acute shortage of materials. If persevering power is compared, the Japanese Navy far exceeds the enemy. Judging from these factors, the present situation is absolutely in favor of Japan." (F.C.C. 9/4/44).
