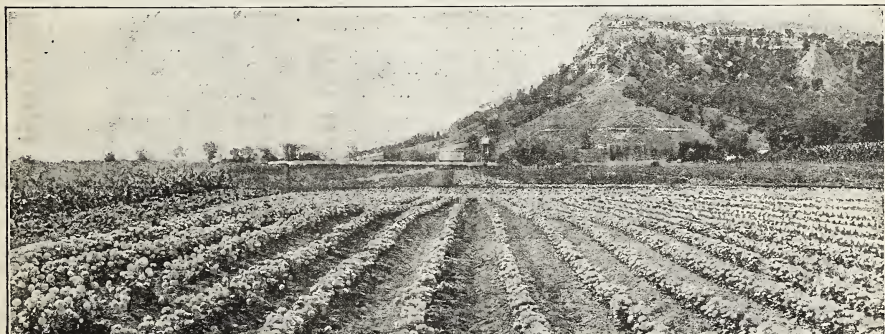

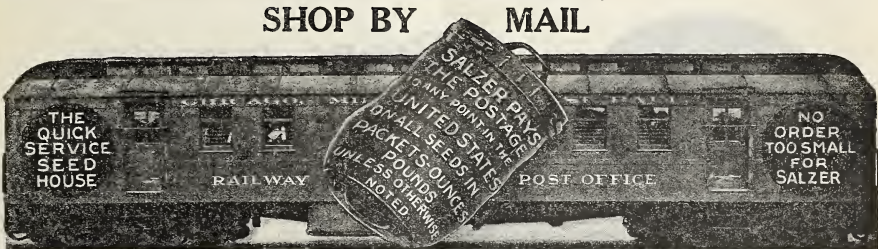

TERMS: Cash with order. Remit in manner that suits your convenience. If seeds are to go by mail always add postage when ordering quantities not listed at postpaid prices. If your nearest Freight or Express Office is a prepaid station, enclose sufficient money to prepay charges or give name of nearest open station. All seeds are sold "sacks weighed in."

PRICES: All prices in this catalog subject to change without notice. Prices quoted "By Express" or "By Freight" means transportation "At Purchaser's Expense."

CONDITIONS OF SALE: In common with all seedsmen we, The John A. Salzer Seed Co., do not give, and our employees are forbidden to give, any warranty, expressed or implied, as to description, quality, productiveness, or any other matter of any seeds, bulbs or plants we send out, and we will not be in any way responsible for the crop. If the purchaser does not accept the goods on these terms they must at once be returned and money will be refunded.

PARCEL POST RATES

From the 4th to 8th Zone Seeds or Plants Weighing 10 Lbs. or More Usually Go About as Cheap by Express. (Poisons cannot be sent by mail.)

- 1st Zone: 5c for the first lb., 1c for each additional lb.
- 2nd Zone: 5c for the first lb., 1c for each additional lb.
- 3rd Zone: 6c for the first lb., 2c for each additional lb.
- 4th Zone: 7c for the first lb., 4c for each additional lb.
- 5th Zone: 8c for the first lb., 6c for each additional lb.
- 6th Zone: 9c for the first lb., 8c for each additional lb.
- 7th Zone: 11c for the first lb., 10c for each additional lb.
- 8th Zone: 12c for each pound or fraction thereof.

Parcel Post packages must not exceed 70 pounds in weight for the first three zones, and 50 pounds for the other zones. Parcels of seeds, bulbs, and plants weighing 8 ounces or less are mailable at the rate of 1c for every two ounces, regardless of distance; if weight is more than 8 ounces the pound rate applies.

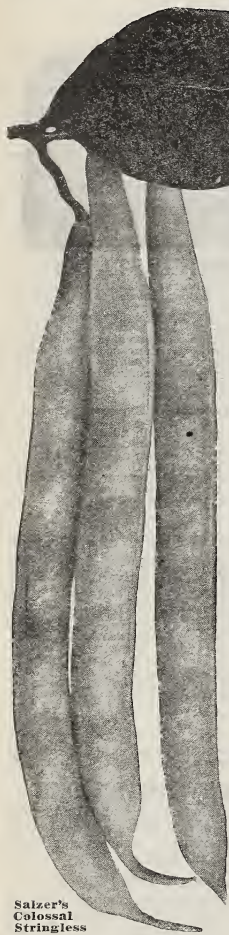

The color is a clear golden yellow, of strong upright bush growth, fourteen to eighteen inches high, pods about seven inches long, broad, flat and unusually meaty.

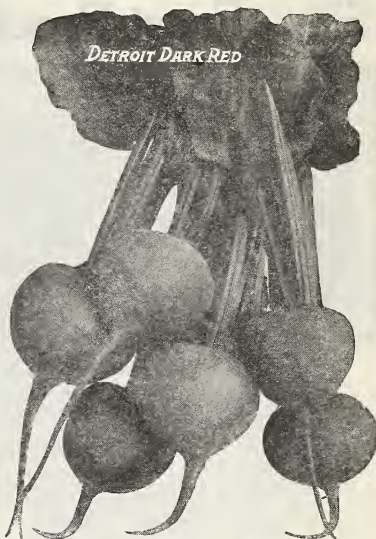

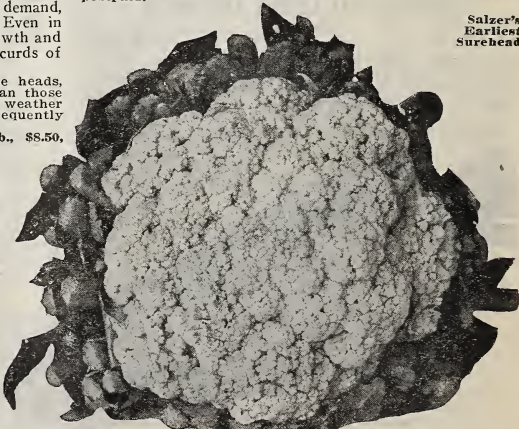

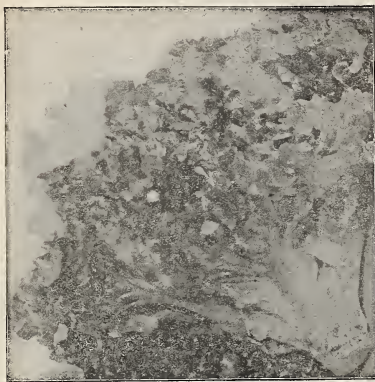

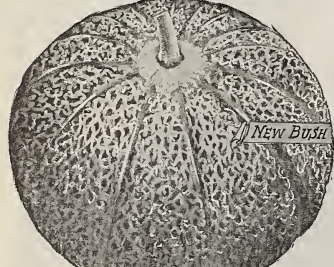

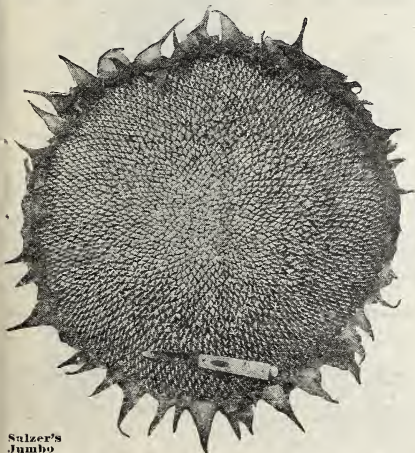

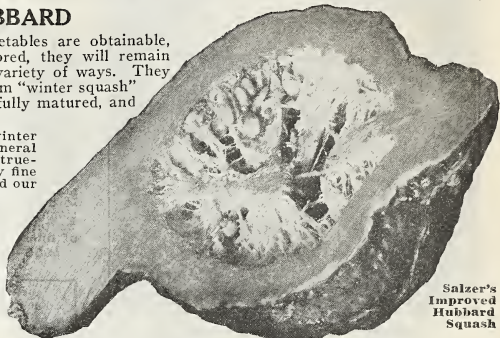

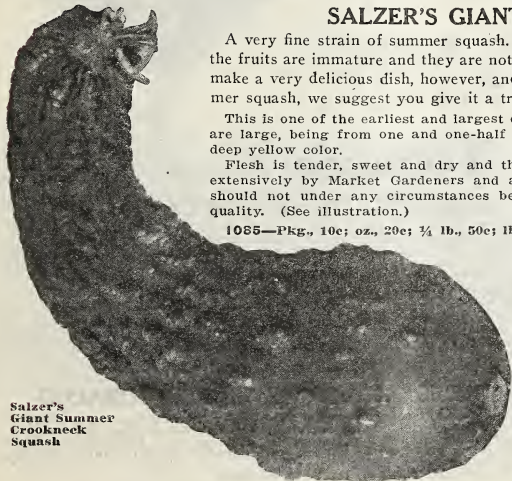

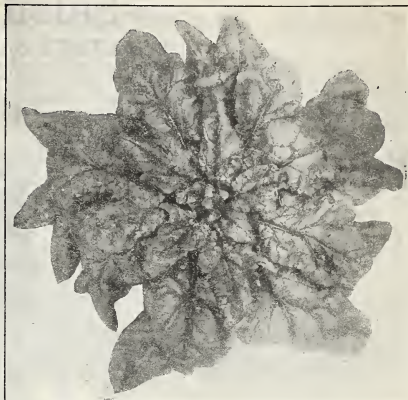

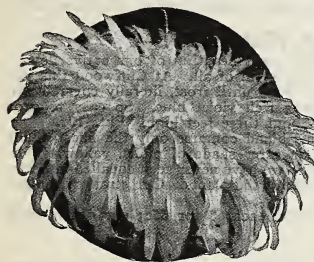

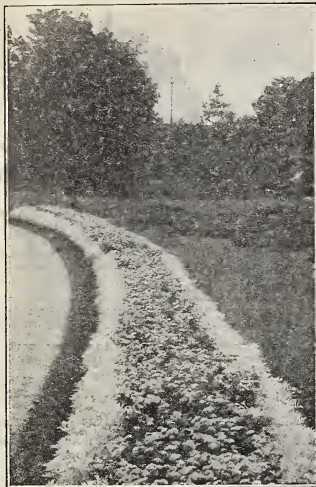

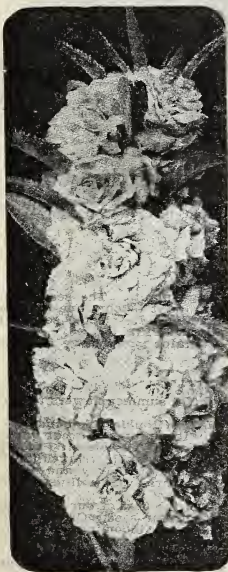

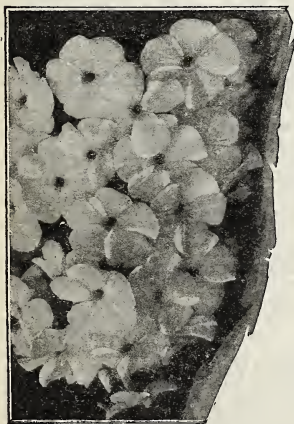

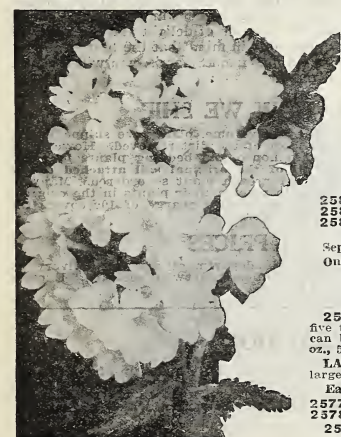

Barley is very early, in some sections being ready for harvesting the end of June or the first of July; the yield is almost invariably good, being often more per acre than oats; its muscle and bone-producing qualities make it a splendid feed; it is one of the best nurse crops for grasses. Barley culture is similar to that of oats or spring wheat. Fall-plowed ground is preferable to spring plowing. Do the work shallow and harrow the ground thoroughly after seeding. Sow early, using 2 to 2½ bushels per acre for broadcasting.

We consider our Giant White Hulless Barley the best variety to grow. It is not a malting variety, but for feeding purposes is unexcelled for earliness, yield, and quality. 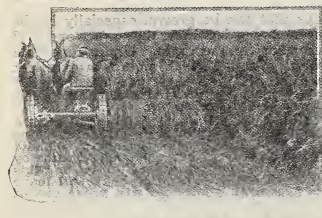
