Eusebio AZCUE Lopez, and Official of the Cuban Mational Institute of Culture

AZCUE, a former Consul and CUIS officer in Mexico at the Cuban Embassy, has ordered to direct the Organization and Assembly of the Cuban Pavillion at the International Fair to be held in Montreal, Canada, in 1967.

Victor RICO Galan, the pro-Cuban Maxican journalist, reportedly
told a rather "unreliable" source (Senors, the de P.Z.) recently in
Mexico that he had learned that "one of the most powerful men now in
Cuba was Eusebio Ascue, the former Cuban Consul in Mexico".

Mexico for 19 years before returning in November 1963. Part of that time he was employed at the Cuban Embassy - since 1959, at least. (He worked for the Cuban Embassy in Hadrid in 1943.)

There are many Mexi Station assets who know him -(LITAMIL-9) in particular is a long-time friend. There are other assets, such as the double agent! (the Swiss) AMKNOB-1, to whom AZCUE seems to have talked almost unbelievably considering their brief period of friendship.

AZCUE's son Busebio Jr., arrived in Mexico shortly after his Father returned from his recent trip (presumably to inspect the site in Camada, sign a contract, et cetera, to begin the work for the Pavillion) to Camada. Whether Eusebio's trip to baxico is just a brief visit or whether he intends to remain there might be of interest to determine. His iomicile is given in UFGA 24420 of 31 January 1966 in the attached file. There are enough Mexi Station contacts to initiate contact with the son, if desired.

There is also a sister who has been im States for years. (Possibly in New York City, where Azcue's Mother died circs 1962. (See HMMA 21978 of 16 August 1963.)

The possibility that AZCUE could be a Spanish Communist, could be working for French Intelligence, is imissted in the files. (While Senora de Par's comment that he worked for French IS may be part of her "gossip" — it might be noted that his long-time friend foce Antonio CASAS Redrigues remarks (see Memo dated 16 May 1963) on his difficulties with the French in 1952 and his activities less to this possibility. Ris character accessment by Casas is also of interest.

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
