## REQUISITES FOR ADMISSION

INTO THE

#### ACADEMICAL AND UNDER-GRADUATE DEPART-MENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY.

APPLICANTS for admission into the Freshman Class are required to sustain an approved examination on the Grammars of the English, Greek, and Latin Languages; Latin Prosody; Andrews' or Arnold's Exercises; Cæsar's Commentaries; Ovid's Metamorphoses; Virgil's Bueolics, and six Books of his Æneid; Sallust; St. John's Gospel, and the Acts in the Greek Testament; Græca Minora, or Greek Reader; Arithmetie; Algebra, through equations of the first degree; Ancient and Modern Geography.

Applicants for a more advanced standing will be examined on all the studies already pursued by the class they wish to join.

The Instructors in the Greek, Latin, and Mathematical Departments have to complain that the applicants for admission are too often defieient in some part of their preparatory studies. There seems to be a disposition abroad to diminish the very limited amount of reading that is now required in Greek and Latin. There is also a lack of due preparation in the Grammars, Prosody, and construction of these languages, in Grecian and Roman Antiquities, and especially in Ancient and Modern Geography. In the Mathematics more time and practice should be devoted to problems wherein the various rules of Arithmetie are involved with more or less complexity. Unless these suggestions are regarded, Students will be unable to secure the peculiar advantages of an education at the University. For the Instructors, instead of adopting such exercises as will mature the taste and scholarship of their pupils, will be obliged to return to the drilling of the grammar school without its advantages for ensuring success.

To the teachers who are laboring to promote Classical and Mathematical learning by thorough elementary instruction we are already much indebted. We trust that our obligations to them will be still further increased; for on their efforts we must in a great measure depend for success in elevating the standard of scholarship at the Uni-

versity.

The SENIOR CLASS reads the Gorgias of Plato.

The Junior Class directs its attention to the Tragedies of Sophocles.

The SOPHOMORE CLASS during the first term is occupied with the Iliad of Homer and select Orations of Demosthenes, and during the second with the History of the Peloponesian War by Thucydides.

The Freshman Class, in the first term, is employed upon the Anabasis of Xenophon, and in the second upon Herodotus.

## DEPARTMENT OF LATIN.

REV. FORDYCE M. HUBBARD, A. M., PROFESSOR.

JOSEPH B. LUCAS, A. M., TUTOR.

PETER E. SPRUILL, A. B., TUTOR.

WILLIAM L. ALEXANDER, A. B., TUTOR.

THE FRESHMAN and SOPHOMORE CLASSES have each four recitations, the Juniors two, and the Seniors one, each week, through the year.

In the Freshman Class, the first term is spent in reading Curtius; the second is devoted to Virgil's Georgies and Cicero's Orations. The Sophomore Class reads in the first term the Odes and Satires of Horace, and in the second the Epistles of Horace and Cicero on

the Immortality of the Soul. The Junior Class is employed during the first term upon the Satires of Juvenal, and during the second upon Cicero's Brutus. The recitations of the Senior Class are devoted to Cicero de Officiis.

# DEPARTMENT OF MODERN LANGUAGES.

#### HILDRETH H. SMITH, A. M., PROFESSOR.

The Sophomore and Junior Classes have each two recitations a week in French, and the Seniors two in German throughout the year. Volunteer classes are taught Spanish and Italian in the Senior year.

#### SOPHOMORE CLASS.

Ollendorff's French Grammar; Arnoult's French Reader; and Selection's from Molière's Comedies.

#### JUNIOR CLASS.

Racine's Tragedies; Dumas' History of Napoleon, and Rowan's Modern French Reader.

#### SENIOR CLASS.

FIRST TERM.

Ollendorff's German and Spanish Grammars; Adler's German Reader, and Don Quixote.

SECOND TERM.

Schiller's Maid of Orleans; Goethe's Iphigenia in Tauris; Monti's Italian Grammar, and Tasso's Jerusalem Delivered.

#### DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY.

### REV ALBERT M. SHIPP, A. M., PROFESSOR.

THE FRESHMAN and JUNIOR CLASSES have each two recitations a week, throughout their respective years.

The Freshman Class is occupied with the History of Greece in the first term, and in the second with Roman History. The Junior Class in the first term completes the study of Ancient History together with

the History of the Middle Ages. The second term is devoted exclusively to Modern History—special attention being given to that of England and America

Throughout the entire course, the classes will be guided to the best sources of information on all the more important subjects of Historical inquiry, and stimulated to extend their investigations beyond the text books, by making a free use of the collateral aids supplied by the Libraries of the University and of the two Literary Societies. The text books recommended in this Department are Smith's History of Greece, Liddell's Rome, Smith's Gibbon, and Smyth's Lectures on Modern History.

#### DEPARTMENT OF LOGIC AND RHETORIC.

REV. JOHN T. WHEAT, D. D., PROFESSOR.

Instruction in this Department is first given to the Sofiomore Class. It is required to write Compositions every third week; and as the benefit proposed does not consist in the intrinsic value of the composition, but in the *exercise* to the writer's mind, care is taken to select such subjects as will afford that exercise. Particular attention is also paid to spelling, punctuation, the precise meaning of words, good taste in the forms of expression, and the various particulars of a correct "proof reading."

In the second term, lectures are given upon the origin and growth of the English Language; chiefly with a view to purity and precision of style in regard to its idioms and anomalies.

In the Junior year the topics are:—Habits of reading and writing for the proper conduct of the Understanding: Forms and Tribunals of Taste and Criticism: Elecution and the different kinds of Oratory.—The Class has also occasional exercises in extemporaneous speaking and debate.

The Senior Class has two recitations a week in Whately's Logic and Rhetoric; and, at the close of the second term, each one is required to pronounce, in public, an Oration of his own composition.

#### FRESHMAN CLASS.

First Term. Peiree's Algebra, through Equations of the second degree; Munroe's Geometry and Science of Form.

Second Term. Peirce's Algebra, through Geometrical Progression;
Peirce's Geometry.

#### SOPHOMORE CLASS.

FIRST TERM. Phillips' Plane and Spherical Trigonometry with its applications to Navigation, Heights, Distances, Surveying, &c.

Second Term. Loomis' Differential Calculus; Loomis' Integral Calculus.

#### JUNIOR CLASS.

FIRST TERM. Olmsted's Natural Philosophy. Second Term. Norton's Astronomy.

During the Freshman, Sophomore, and Junior years four recitations a week are devoted to the studies in Pure and mixed Mathematics. The Professor of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy superintends all these studies as to the text books to be used, the parts of each to be omitted, the time to be occupied by the rest, and the attainments to be required from the Students. But in the instruction of the different classes he avails himself of such aid from the Assistant Professor and the Tutors as he may require.

One of the four recitations during the Junior year is appropriated to Lectures on Natural Philosophy and Astronomy, by the Assistant

Professor. These Lectures embrace all the topics disscussed in the text books, and others more or less closely connected with them, and are fully illustrated by appropriate experiments. The Partial Course Students and pupils in the Scientific School, whose tastes and acquirements may enable them to profit by these lectures, can obtain permission to attend them by applying to the Professor.

It will be seen that the organization of an Analytical, as distinct from a Geometrical course of Mathematics, during the Sophomore and Junior years, has been abandoned. It was begun as an experiment in 1855; but a full trial has shown that the advantages of the plan have so far been counterbalanced by its disadvantages. Therefore our own former, and the almost universal practice in this respect by institutions of similar organization has been revived. Members of the same class and colleagues in study receive almost as much education from one another as they do from their teachers. So it has been found advisable to maintain the interest in each other's pursuits that should pervade a large body of students, and not deprive the less successful of the assistance which superior talents and better opportunities for education may enable some of their classmates to render them. Those who have time enough, and are qualified to make the researches, are constantly urged to all the investigations in Mathematics which their own curiosity, or their teachers and the libraries around them may suggest.

# DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY, MINERALOGY, GEOLOGY. WILLIAM J. MARTIN, PROFESSOR.

On these branches, four lectures, illustrated by appropriate experiments and the exhibitions of specimens, are commonly delivered, every week, to the Senior and Junior classes, two to each; which such persons pursuing a Partial Course as choose to apply themselves to these studies, have an opportunity of attending. The Lecture is succeeded, after an interval of an hour or an hour and a half, by an examination extending through one hour, upon the facts and doctrines that were its subject; and upon others, the knowledge of which may contribute to a better understanding of the Lecture that is next to follow. With these, the Student is expected to make himself acquainted, by means of notes taken at the time, a volume that is placed in his hands, or some other book of elements.

The history of Chemistry, its Nomenclature, and General Doctrincs, the Imponderables, (under which head the phenomena and laws of Light, Heat, Electricity, and Galvanism, are treated of, at such length as their relations to the science of Chemistry seem to require,) and the non-metallic elements occupy the Junior year. In the Senior year, the non-metallic elements, if any part remains unfinished, are completed—with the Chemistry of the Metals, and of Organized bodies.

In Natural History, the sciences of Botany and Zoology receive attention, so far only, as is necessary to a knowledge of their methods, the classification, and the means employed for distinguishing different plants and animals from each other. A much larger portion of time is devoted during the Junior year to Mineralogy, and pains taken to render the student familiar at least with the more common and useful minerals. With reference to this object, a very sufficient collection has been made, and is increasing from year to year, of such species as the rocks of North Carolina, especially, afford, but which contains many specimens from the neighboring States, and distant parts of the world. To this the Student has free access, and ample opportunity of learning to distinguish one species from another. The Cabinet purchased some years since in Vienna affords additional facilities, where a more accurate knowledge of the Science is desired.

Geology is taught throughout the Senior year.

# DEPARTMENT OF MORAL PHILOSOPHY, METAPHYSICS, POLITICAL ECONOMY, INTERNATIONAL AND CONSTITUTIONAL LAW.

#### THE PRESIDENT.

Instruction in these branches is given the Senior Class three days (five recitations) of every week in the Collegiate year.

Metaphysics and Political Economy receive attention during the first term. The Sunday Recitations throughout the year are devoted to the Old Testament and Moral Science; and in addition, the recitations on Monday afternoon of the second term, are ordinarily assigned to the latter strdy.

The text books are: The Bible, Wayland's Moral Science, Abercrombie's Inquiries concerning the Intellectual Powers, (Abbott's Edition); Wayland's Political Economy; Sheppard's Constitutional Text Book; and the first volume of Kent's Commentaries on American Law.

No portion of the text books (except the Bible, instruction in which is confined to the Pentateuch,) is omitted, but the whole is carefully recited, subsequently reviewed, and each member of the class separately and rigidly examined on the entire system.

Oral lectures are given whenever, in the opinon of the Instructor, they are calculated to promote the improvement of the class; and, towards the close of the second term, a regular course is delivered on the History of Constitutional Law, presenting an analytical review, in chronological order, of the Magna Charta of King John; the Petition of Right; the Charters of Carolina; the Fundamental Constitutions, (by John Locke); the Habeas Corpus Act; the Bill of Rights; the Declaration of Independence; the Articles of Confederation; the Treaty of Peace with Great Britain; and the Constitution of the United States.

The Scientific Students are candidates either for the degree of Baehelor of Arts, or for that of Bachelor of Science. The former are such members of the Senior Class as are permitted to substitute studies in this School for the Ancient Languages during their first term, or for the Ancient Languages, and International and Constitutional Law during their second term. If these Students spend a fifth year at the University they may obtain the degree of Master of Arts. The de-

gree of Bachclor of Science may be conferred on those who devote their time chiefly to the studies prescribed in the Scientific School.— This course will generally require an attendance of two years and a half. But, as is usual, in beginning his labors any such Student will be admitted to the standing for which he is qualified by his acquisitions.

The instructions afforded in the Departments of this School are intended to prepare young men for professional life, as Artizans, Engineers, Farmers, Miners, and Physicians. The Students will have frequent opportunities for the practice of rules of their professions. But their attention will rather be directed to the obtaining of a familiar acquaintance with the theories and principles by which the Science of the day most vigorously advances the Arts of Civilization.

The Scientific Students will be subject to the general oversight and discipline of the Faculty of the University. Their attendance on Recitations, Prayers, Public Worship, &c., is expected to be as punctual and their responsibility to all the laws of the University to be as complete as is that of the Students in the Academical Departments.

#### DEPARTMENT OF CIVIL ENGINEERING.

#### CHARLES PHILLIPS, A. M., PROFESSOR.

Applicants for admission into this Department will be expected to manifest great familiarity with the various processes in Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, and Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, together with their applications in Surveying, Navigation, Heights and Distances. These preliminary acquisitions are indispensable. At present, the studies in this department are arranged as follows:

#### FIRST YEAR.

Analytical Geometry; Differential and Integral Calculus; Davies' Descriptive Geometry; Davies' Shades and Shadows.

#### SECOND YEAR.

Smith's Mechanics; Mahan's Civil Engineering; Gillespie on Roads and Railways; Trautwine, Borden, Long, &c., on Geodesy and Earth Works.

#### THIRD YEAR.

Application of Science to various constructive Arts; Reviews of previous studies.

Mechanical, Topographical, and Architectural drawing, both plain and isometrical, will be taught throughout the whole course. The theories, involved in the construction and adjustment of instruments, together with their uses in the field, and exercises in the resulting computations, will be attended to in their proper seasons. Besides the studies peculiar to this Department, its pupils will pursue such in Analytical Chemistry, and in the Academical Departments as may be necessary to the ends they have in view.

# DEPARTMENT FOR THE APPLICATION OF CHEMISTRY

TO

## AGRICULTURE AND THE ARTS.

JOHN KIMBERLY, A. M., PROFESSOR.

STUDENTS in this Department will receive instructions in Analytical Chemistry, and its applications to the analysis of soils and manures the assaying of ores and minerals, the analysis of mineral waters, and the testing of drugs and medicines. An Analytical Laboratory has been fitted up in one of the buildings of the University, and will be open for Students every day in the Week, during each term, so that those who desire it may occupy all their time in performing the various operations in practical Chemistry.

Particular attention will be given to the Chemistry of Agriculture, by recitations as well as lectures, during each term of the course.

The text-books for reading and reference are: Will's Outlines of Chemical Analysis; Roso's Analytical Chemistry; Regnault's Chemistry; Stockhardt's Field Lectures; Plattner's testing with the Blowpipe, and Bowman's Medical Chemistry.

This Department contains two Classes, of which the first, called the Independent Class, consists of such Students of Law as have no connexion with any of the College Classes; and the second, called the College Class, of such Members of College as, with the permission of the Faculty, may be desirous of joining it.

The plan of Studies comprises Blackstone's Commentaries; Cruise's Digest of Real Property; Fearne on Remainders; Iredell on Executors; Stephen on Pleading; Chitty's Pleading; Selwyn's Nisi Prius; Smith on Contracts; Greenleaf on Evidence, and Adams' Doctrine of Equity; together with lectures on the Common Law having special reference to the Legislation and Judicial decisions of North Carolina. A complete course will occupy two years for the Independent Class, at the end of which, the degree of Bachelor of Laws is conferred on such students as, by their proficiency, may be entitled to it.

The Independent Class is ealled on for recitations three times a week. The recitations of the College Class occur only once a week, and are so arranged as not to interfere with the ordinary duties of College.

A Moot Court will be held occasionally by one of the Professors, for the discussion, by the Students, of such legal questions as he may propose. The Student will also be required, from time to time, to draw pleadings, and other legal instruments, and be instructed in the practice of the Courts.

The Professors of Law receive no salary from the Trustees of the University; but are entitled to demand from each member of the Independent Class fifty dollars per session for the first two sessions of the course, and twenty-five dollars per session afterwards; and from each member of the College Class twenty-five dollars per session. The sessions and vacations of this department are the same as those of the College, but the Professors will give instructions during the vacations to such members of either class as desire it, without an extra charge.

The Professors of Law, and the members of the Independent Class. are not subject to any of the ordinary College regulations.

To the above items are to be added the expenses for clothing and pocket money, and certain others incident to a connexion with the two Literary Societies. The cost of the whole series of text-books required in the College course varies from \$55 to \$65.

The above statement applies to those who occupy rooms in the College buildings:—those who lodge in the Village are subjected to an additional expenditure for Room Rent and Servant Hire.

The Laws of the University require that every Student shall, at the beginning of each session, settle the Tutton, &c., in advance; and the attention of Parents and Guardians is particularly directed to this regulation.

It is the duty of the Bursar (Prof. Fetter,) to receive on deposit the funds which a Student may bring with him, or which may be remitted to him;—to disburse them in payment of necessary or contingent expenses, and to render an account of the same to Parents and Guardians at the close of each session.

From what has been mentioned it will be seen what amount of money is necessary for the current expenses of a year. If the regulations of the Trustees and the "Act concerning the University" are strictly complied with, Parents and Guardians may feel confident that the expenses will not exceed those enumerated above. The Faculty of the University entertains the opinion that exclusive of clothing and trav-

eiling expenses, Three Hundred and Twenty-Five Dollars per annum are amply sufficient for all necessary purposes.

The Faculty is authorized in all cases where the applicant is a native of this State, sustains a correct moral character, is believed to possess good talents and studious habits, and is unable to defray the expenses of Tuition and Room Rent, to admit him free of charge into any class for which he may be prepared.

#### AN ACT CONCERNING THE UNIVERSITY.

#### Revised Code, Chapter 113.

- Any licence granted to retail spirituous liquors, wine or cordials at Chapel Hill, or within two miles thereof, shall be void.
- 2. No person shall erect, keep, maintain or have at Chapel Hill, or within two miles thereof, any tippling house, establishment or place, for the sale of wines, cordials, spirituous or malt liquor.
- 3. No person in the State, without permission in writing from the President of the University, or some member of the Faculty, shall sell, or offer to sell or deliver to any Student of the University, or to any other person, any cordial, wine, spirituous or malt liquor for the purpose of being used, or with knowledge that the same will be used, at Chapel Hill, or within two miles thereof by any such Student.
- 4. No person at or within two miles of Chapel Hill, shall give or furnish any electioneering treat or entertainment.
- 5. No person shall set up, keep or maintain at Chapel Hill, or within five miles thereof, any public billiard table, or other public table of any kind, at which games of chance or skill, by whatever name called, may be played.
- 6. No person, without permision in writing obtained therefor from the President of the University, or some member of its Faculty, seven days beforehand, shall exhibit at Chapel Hill or within five miles thereof, any theatricals, slight of hand or equestrian performances, or any dramatic recitations or representations, or any rope or wire dancing, natural or artificial curiosities, or any concert, serenade or performance in music, singing or dancing.
- 7. Any person who shall offend against any of the provisions of this chapter, hereinbefore recited, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor.
- 8. Any contract or agreement by any Student of the University, being then a minor, with any shop-keeper, merchant, trader, or other person, upon the sale of any wine, cordial, spirituous or malt liquors or of any goods, wares or merchandize, or any article of trade, or with the keeper of any livery stable, shall be void, unless the same, if

made at or within two miles of Chapel Hill, be made under the written permission of the President of the University, or some member of its Faculty; or if made at a greater distance from Chapel Hill, under the written consent of the person who may have the control and authority of such Student.

- 9. Every contract made with a Student of the University, contrary to the provisions of the preceding section, shall be void, and may be avoided on account of any of the matters therein contained, on the plea of the general issue; on the trial whereof, if it appear that the defendant was, at the time of the alleged contract, a Student of the University, it shall be presumed that he was, at the making thereof, a minor.
- 10. Every such contract shall be incapable of being confirmed, and any promise or obligation given by such student, after his arrival at full age shall be void.
