FIRST ELECTRONIC MAIL USERS SEMINAR HELD

The first national (and international) seminar of government and industry users of Dialcom's electronic mail system was held in Alexandria, Va., last week.

Major portion of the day-long seminar was discussion of major improvements to be implemented in the electronic mail system--called MAIL II--to be inaugurated by Dialcom for all mail users by early 1983.

MAIL II will incorporate the latest advances in electronic mail technology and suggestions for improvement made by mail users over the past two or three years.

It will include more than 200 new features, not now available on Dialcom's electronic mail--recognized as the most advanced system by large industry users.

Dialcom officials also announced the firm's venture into "electronic publishing," with the first user being USDA. This is a specific reference to the new USDA electronic news service, started last month by USDA's News Center.

The Los Angeles Times-Washington Post News Service and Gannett News Service are planning to begin providing electronic news services through Dialcom's system. Others expected to follow shortly are McGraw-Hill and Newsnet.

Commerce Department, Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Labor Department and the Food & Drug Administration of the Health & Human Services Department are most interested in following USDA's lead in offering electronic news releases.

Later this month, United Press International and Dialcom will announce a new scanning service, called "Newstrack."

This service will scan the full UPI national and international news files 24 hours a day for subjects of special interest to the user. The stories will always be ready when desired, within minutes as they're released by UPI.

"Newstrack" will be touted as combining the most sophisticated package of electronic office services available anywhere with the full universe of news from UPI, including their special Washington Wire, long known for its Daybooks, Senate and House schedules, future files and advisories to correspondents.

Another major development by Dialcom is its new "Infogate" which will allow users to access other electronic mail and data systems, such as the Source, Lockheed's Dialog, Dow Jones News Service, New York Times, Justice Department's Juris and many others, including the Comet system used by some USDA agencies.

Dialcom also announced that in addition to serving clients in the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom, it is expanding into Hong Kong, Ireland and Switzerland in the next few weeks, and into 12 to 15 other nations (many in the Far East) by the end of the year.

ELECTRONIC AGRICULTURAL NEWS EXPANDING

In addition to the AGNET and Dialcom USDA news services, electronic dissemination of agricultural information is expanding through other systems.

The Minneapolis STAR-TRIBUNE's electronic news service is off and running, according to Bob Elkin. This experimental service is reaching about 200 North Dakota and Minnesota farmers in the Fargo, N.Dak., area who have home computers.

Radio Station KFYZ, Bismarck, N.Dak., is planning to access USDA news from the Dialcom system.

USDA's News Center plans to offer the popular weekly "Farm Paper Letter" over the USDA electronic news service within a few weeks. Format of the printed FPL has already been changed to accommodate the new electronic version.

Another sign of the times comes from Memphis, Tenn., where Lloyd Dinkins has launched the "Computer Farming Newsletter" to serve as a forum for farmers interested in computer use on their farms.

When Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block traveled to Mexico recently, his press aide John Ochs carried a portable terminal so that they could communicate electronically with home base and the USDA News Center.

KANSAS STATE UNIV. NEEDS GRAPHIC ARTIST

The incumbent will work with editors and other faculty in designing, illustrating and producing art for educational materials including brochures, publications, newsletters, news releases and audiovisual presentations.

Some work experience in photography and communications training would be helpful.
