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Phillips Academy has established very high repute for its broad scholarship, for its elevated ideals, and especially for the practical success which has been attained by its students.

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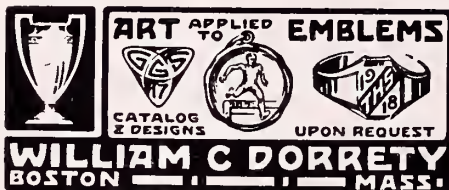
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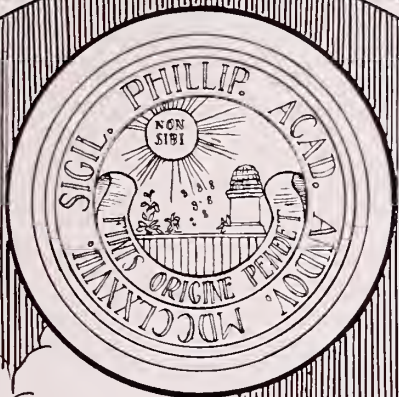
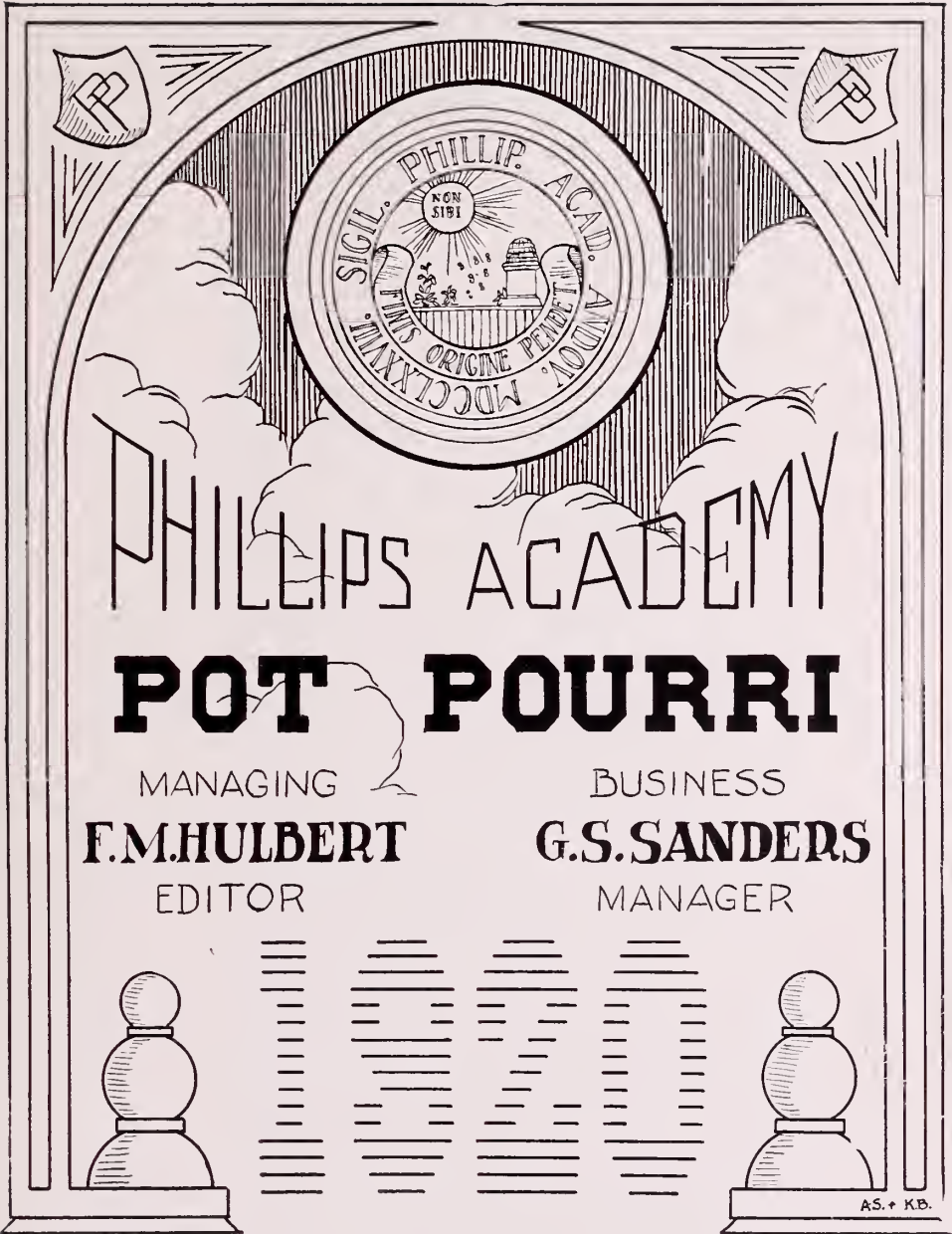

HISTORY

The Junior Year

The swimming team did its best to relieve the tedium by affording interesting and exciting meets, although it did not live up to the records of past seasons. 1920 was not represented on this team. The wrestling team, captained by Bill Russell was fairly successful. Scott represented 1920. The hockey team led by Paul Crane went down to defeat to Exeter, 3-0. It was only after a hard struggle however, and the result was continually in doubt.

With the coming of Spring our hopes for revenge on Exeter, for our many years of defeat, were heightened. It seemed that, with the spirit which was everywhere evident, the tide was bound to turn; but it didn't. Once more the track team was defeated and again the baseball nine was the under dog.

We, however, the preps, got as much consolation as we could out of the thought that we had served our apprenticeship and were now full-fledged Andover students. With the eternal human weakness, we forgot our viewpoint upon our entrance on the hill and looked forward with pleasure to the coming year when we should swagger about with the preps groveling at our feet.

The Lower Middle Year

OLD men! Those two words suggested a world of importance and possibilities to us who had, less than three months before the opening of our second year, been insignificant, ever-in-the-way, "preps". We returned to Andover in the Fall of 1917 with a new feeling of responsibility on our shoulders, not only because we could now be considered old-timers, but also because the world-wide conflict begun in Europe in August 1914 had spread to America, and we were all anxious to do our bit in whatever way we could. Only last Spring had Andover sent across the Atlantic an Ambulance Unit. That, and the many other happenings of those days, imbued the heart of all Andover men (especially us, who were now "old") with the spirit of fight.

At the very beginning of the Fall term of our Junior Middle year we got into the game and clad ourselves in the uniform all men are proud to wear. The whole student body was organized into a battalion and recognized as a Senior R. O. T. C. We were drilled and instructed in military science and tactics by Major Robert N. Davy, R. O. C. E. F., and Lieutenant R. E. Wyatt, 4th C. M. R., C. E. E. Our life was a new one and it seemed somewhat tedious to class athletics and our Wednesday half-holidays to drill, but we went in as Andover men should, and stuck to our elementary military training throughout the year. In spite of the fact that we tried to prepare ourselves for our country by putting military matters foremost in the school activities, we by no means neglected Varsity athletics. Our football team practiced hard all season with Frank Quinby taking Fred Daly's place as coach, in event of the latter being in France. However the Exeter team proved to be the better at the end of the season and left us with another moral victory.

During the Winter our military drill continued in the gym. We had now become quite used to our uniforms and had almost forgotten that we had ever done anything else but drill. Our strenuous life led to the necessity of more social affairs than usual. Informal dances were held every Saturday afternoon at Peabody House, which, along with the Junior Prom, did much towards breaking up the hard study and continuous drill of the Winter term. Our athletic teams were especially successful this term. The Hockey team completed a highly commemorable season with a victory over Exeter, and the Wrestling and Swimming teams also passed through a successful season.

When the snow had melted away and Andover's annual menace, spring fever, once more tried to spread its disastrous effects among us, we resumed our military drill out on the campus. This term we gained a slight knowledge of trench building and ended up the year with a grand sham battle in which we destroyed the trenches we had so laboriously constructed. At Andover the Spring term always passes quickly and this year was no exception. Exeter added two more moral victories to our list and before we knew it the close of the year was at hand. We shook hands and parted, some about to work for the Summer, and others about to loaf, but all with the pleasant feeling that we had passed one more milestone in our prep school career and would come back as Upper Classmen next fall.

The Upper Middle Year

THE fall of 1918 began for us perhaps the most eventful of our years at Andover. We came back, some of us from military camp, some from the farm or shipyard to an Andover which even more than before, bore witness to the realities of war time. Familiar faces, always few at such a time, were even less in evidence than usual; and there was a spirit of great unrest; many talked of enlisting; many did enlist. The student battalion under Lieutenant Roy E. Wyatt was reorganized, and military training was added to the regular curriculum as a five hour extra course. Yet athletics were taken up; the publication of school papers resumed; and Inquiry and the musical clubs reorganized. November eleventh brought the signing of the armistice with its attendant celebration and holidays. Shortly afterward, military work began to occupy less time and athletics to gain prominence. Soccer was played with varying fortune; but the football team under the coaching of Mr. Benton, Mr. Tower, and Dr. Page and with Bud Adams of our class as captain, worked through a remarkably successful season to the Exeter game. In spite of a game fight Andover was defeated by a score of 26 to 7.

After the Christmas holidays, we returned to a more normal condition of affairs at Andover. Military training had been definitely abandoned, and athletic interests again became paramount. Basketball was added to the usual list of winter athletics; and, coached by Mr. Roth, the team completed a successful season in spite of handicaps. The wrestling team, with Walter Scott from our class as captain, won its three meets, and in swimming we won all but the final meet with Worcester. The track squad was fortunate in securing for coach Mr. R. A. Shepard, who got the team into shape for the Boston Athletic Club meet. Exeter's good fortune still persisted, however, and we lost the meet to them. The hockey squad also, with Bud Adams as captain, tied Exeter. The Peabody dances were held, and the Musical Clubs returned their entertainment by Rogers' Hall with a dance at the Peabody house. The Junior Prom was adjudged a huge success qualified by the usual adjective "the best ever."

The Spring term, living up to its reputation of being the fastest term of the year, came and went with a rush. Owing to the lack of seasoned material, the track squad met with more than its share of misfortune, and lost to Exeter by a score of 71 to 35. The great expectations which we had, not without cause, centered in our baseball team, coached by Fred Daly, were fated to disappointment. The Andover team went to pieces, then rallied, and a little more than held Exeter to the score she made in the first three innings; the score finally stood 11 to 4. The musical season reached its climax in the concert by the combined choir and glee-clubs with Bradford Academy. Meanwhile, ever since Germany signed the armistice, plans had been afoot for a Victory Commencement. Class reunions were held and for once Andover weather did its best to console our class and show the graduating class just what they were quitting. The usual recessional of college entrance examinations accompanied our departure for the brief intermission before we should again make our appearance, and take up our parts in the roll of next year's Seniors.

The Senior Year

AFTER three years under the unusual circumstances which arose during the war days, the class of 1920 in a body of 148 strong marched up the hill on September 18th, to assume the new responsibilities which rest upon the shoulders of every senior.

Their's was a year of reconstruction, a year for advancing, and for making new and greater progress in every branch of school enterprise. Victories against Exeter for the past few years had been few and far between, but, under the leadership of Captain Adams and Manager Pole, ten seniors, out of the nineteen men to get their letter, paved the way for a glorious victory over the New Hampshire rivals, defeating them 19-0. That night the townspeople were witnesses of probably the greatest celebration ever held on the hill. Six years of adversity were wiped away in that grand triumphal revel, and when the tumult and the shouting died away, Andover again saw a clear trail to future successes.

As for the other Fall athletics, the soccer team had a very creditable season, marred only by a defeat at the hands of Worcester, while cross country became a thing of the past, due to the lack of proper material with which to form a team.

Shortly before the Christmas holidays, the musical clubs made their annual pilgrimage to Rogers' Hall, where a successful program was performed, followed by the usual evening of dancing.

The defeat of Exeter in football marked the turning of another page in the annals of Andover's athletic career. Soon came winter, bringing the annual hockey game, and for the first time in the history of the two schools, rival teams met also in swimming and basketball. Again Andover came out on top. Although the hockey team lost 4-2, nevertheless Captain Anderson's swimming team won a decisive victory, 33-20, at Exeter, while in the same hour, Andover's five defeated Exeter 32-27 in a game which will long be remembered.

In the meantime the men of the baseball and track squads have been devoting themselves to indoor practice and much hard work, and are looking forward to celebrating a two-fold victory this Spring.

Out of the old original class of seventy-five members who entered the halls of Phillips Academy for the first time in the Fall of 1916, few indeed are left. In all there are but twenty-four who, having entered four years ago, have survived the rigors of a *real* prep parade, and have plodded steadfastly on through their course during the trying days of unrest which followed them from the Spring of their Junior year until the Fall when they become upper-middlers.

The class of 1920 will leave the familiar class rooms forever on June 19th; ready to go on to college, or into life, carrying with them Andover traditions and Andover ideals, and ready to enhance the great name of Phillips Academy by their good deeds and progress in the days to come.

Society of Inquiry

DURING the past school year, the Society of Inquiry has attempted to carry out its purpose of upholding Christian ideals and of promoting a strong moral sentiment throughout the school life. The scope of the Society has been enlarged because more men have realized that religion in its simplest form is a vital element not only in life, but also in school.

From the date of the founding of the organization in 1833 until the present day, the activities of the Society have been broadened to suit changing conditions. However, it has, during this period, cooperated with the school in moulding true Christian manhood. Today this work is just as necessary as long ago. Perhaps it is even more necessary now, for the world needs men of that type of character to combat with its many problems.

To help and inspire the members of the school, the Society of Inquiry has held its regular weekly meetings. Some religious gatherings have been held at which religious topics have been discussed, and also the regular platform meetings have taken place, where opportunities were offered to hear well known speakers, delegations from schools and colleges and missionaries from foreign fields. The Bible and Discussion Groups, with an interesting program of topics, were well attended by about two hundred students.

Phillips Academy, under the auspices of the Society of Inquiry, sent a delegation last June to the Blairstown Conference, at which men from all the preparatory schools in the East were present. All of the Andover men took an active part in the work, and many effective plans were formed. The delegation was composed of Mr. Dumont Clarke of the faculty, P. Wilson, E. Greene, R. Sears, J. Lucas, T. Richardson, C. Bartlett, E. Trazel, P. Dudley and M. Hansen.

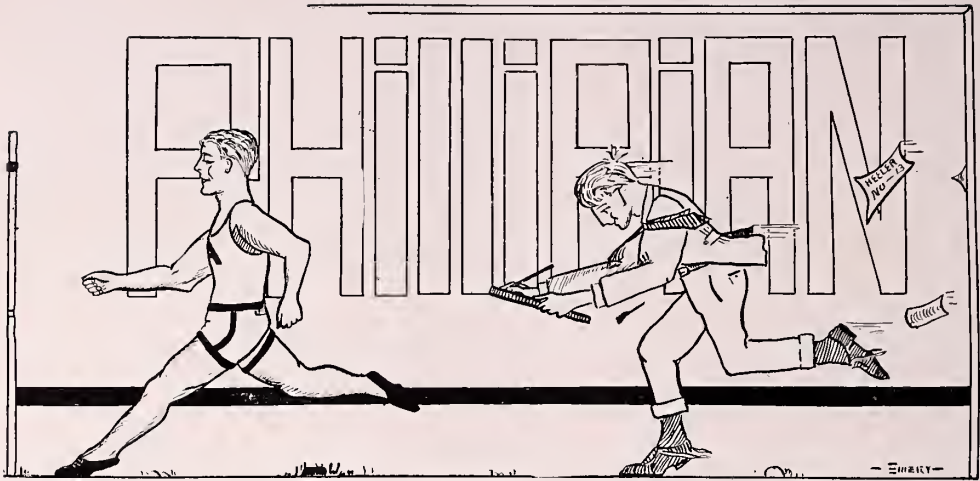

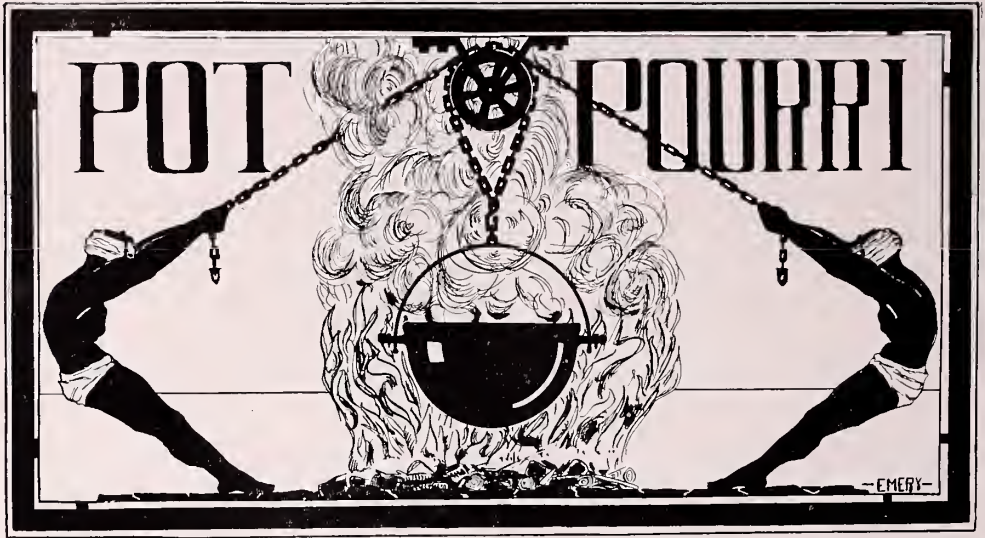

Athletics



1919-1920

Athletics

HISTORY has taught us that all nations have their periods of supremacy and domination. So it is in schools in respect to athletics. Records of the past depict Andover in glowing colors. We have not forgotten that Andover triumphed for eight consecutive years on the gridiron, that she has won twenty-two baseball games to Exeter's fourteen and that a good share of the dual track records are hers.

In the fall of 1916 we watched Captain Bill Russel's team fight through a heartbreaking contest to a 6-0 defeat. Andover has well been proud of the team that represented her in that game, for they contested every yard gamely and put up a sportsman's battle to the end. Nineteen twenty was represented by Avery.

Captain George Allen's hockey team brought victory to the school for the first time since the introduction of that department of athletics by defeating Exeter decisively at Andover. We had Loftus on the team.

The swimming team under the leadership of Captain Searle and the wrestling team captained by Bill Russel had good seasons. We were represented on the wrestling team by Scott.

During our spring vacation the United States opened operations against Germany and by vote of the student body, athletics were placed secondary to military work and so we did not meet Exeter in either baseball or track. We had informal teams in each sport but gave military work the first position as we should have done.

And so athletics progressed in 1917. We had varsity teams but since we devoted three hours a week to drill, we do not feel that we did ourselves justice. Nevertheless, we did produce a football team which gave our rivals a good demonstration of what could be done under obstacles such as we had that year. Exeter won 3-0. We were represented by Abbot, Scott, Adams and Captain Braden.

The wrestling team won every meet and the swimming team lost but two contests. We had Scott and Duffy on the former and Anderson on the latter.

The hockey team under Captain Dodd kept up the good work begun the year before and defeated Exeter 3-2 in a game which does not at all represent the relative strengths of the teams. Davis and Adams were from 1920.

The track team ran in hard luck. They captured first place in the Harvard Interscholastics but were defeated by Exeter 69½ to 24½. Callahan represented 1920. W. E. Stevenson was captain.

The baseball team had a poor season and Exeter overwhelmed us 10-1. We had Graham, Gross and Early on the team.

In the fall of 1918 we again had to produce teams under the handicap of military training. Coaches were scarce and for a while, work in football progressed without one. Later on faculty coaches were used. Then the influenza set in and many games had to be cancelled on that account, but still the hard practice continued. The preliminary season passed with but one score being made by our opponents and no defeats. But again the inevitable something happened and we were defeated by Exeter 27-7. 1920 was represented by Strong, Richmond, Neidlinger and Captain Adams.

The swimming team had a successful season, winning from all competitors but Worcester. Two records were established, one by Captain Marshall in the 200 and another by Anderson in the plunge. On the team from 1920 were Colgate, Winkler, Van Patten, Smith, Anderson and Pole.

Basketball which had been extinct for some years, was again re-established and we won all but the final game with Worcester. Neidlinger, Morgan, Ferguson and R. Munger represented 1920.

The hockey season was successful, but we were forced to leave the Exeter game a 1-1 tie after playing two extra periods, because water was covering the ice. Farnsworth, Neidlinger, Davis and Captain Adams were from 1920.

The wrestling team had its usual successful season. 1920 was represented by Hale and Captain Scott.

The track team was again defeated by Exeter after an unsuccessful season, and the baseball team, although it had a mediocre season, was also defeated by Exeter 11-4.

We returned for our senior year with a grim determination to do something which would make our final year a landmark in our athletic history. Our preliminary football season was only fair, for we won but three games out of six. However, but a few minutes after the start of the Exeter game it became evident that Coach Daley had reserved his strength for the final blow. There is no necessity of recording here the score 19-0, except that it is exceedingly pleasant to the eye, for Andover men everywhere know it. Some mention ought here be made of "Johnny" Gault, captain of the victorious 1912 football team. The fire that he injected into the team was in no small part responsible for the final result. The leadership of Captain "Bud" Adams was always an incentive to do the best. This combination, as twenty men told us around the celebration bonfire of the cool nerve of Coach Daley, the dash of "Johnny" Gault and the leadership of Captain Adams, was the cause of our 19-0 victory. 1920 was represented by Captain Adams, Manager Pole, Pfaffmann, Batty, Blodgett, I. E. Wight, K. B. Smith, Anderson, Talmage, Scott, Strong, Bush, Koehler and Akerley.

The swimming team had a successful season ending by defeating Exeter in the first dual meet ever held in this sport. The score was 33-20. We were represented by Anderson, York, Pole, Smith, Frost, Ferguson and Colgate.

The basketball team defeated the Exonians on the same day that the swimming team did, by the score of 31-26. We were represented by Burbridge, Correa and Manager Akerley. They lost but one game during a long season.

The preliminary hockey season was fairly successful, but Exeter won the game 4-2. We had Manager Bartlett, Koehler, Farnsworth, Pfaffmann, Bemis, Keyes and Clough.

The wrestling team lost but one meet, the first meet they had lost in three years. We had Tuttle, Duffy, Captain Scott, Blodgett, Dupont, Talmage and Manager Scheide.

And now we gaze into the spring term with anticipation of success. We hope for the best and as we won this fall, so we hope to triumph in the future. We cannot justly say that athletics have been successful during our four years, but we can say that at least we think we have seen a radical change take place.

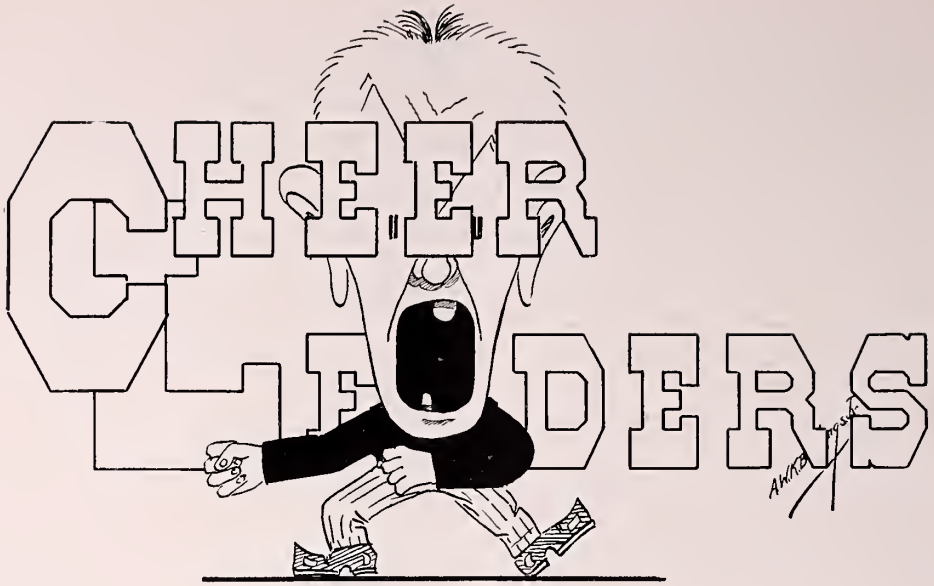

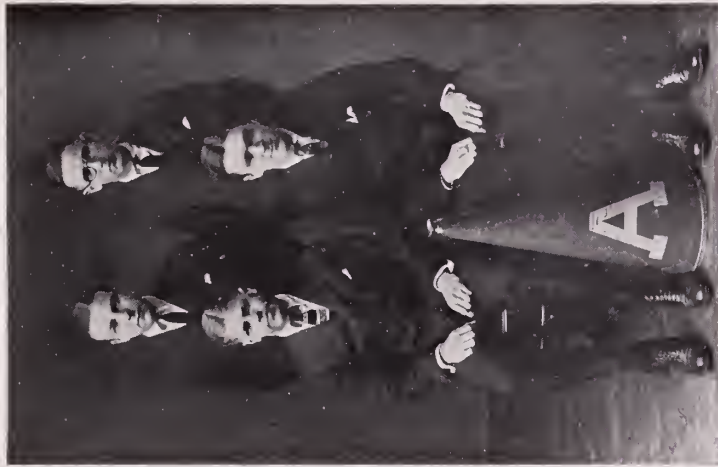

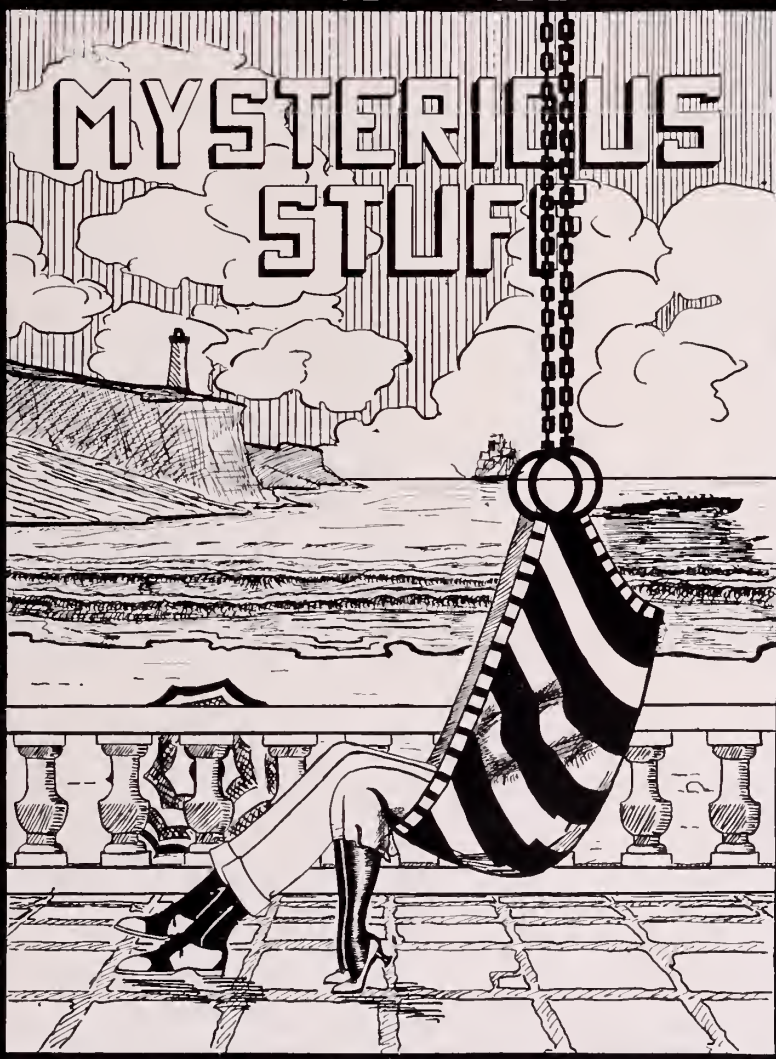

Whats — Habitats and Mores

Sir Dingleberry Uckle, the infamous geographer, geologist and what-not, of Bygad, Arabia, has startled the world of thought by announcing the positive discovery and identification of the Yellow-Yelling-Yhat, of the family of Yunk and the species Yahoo, which furnishes the long sought connection twixt the tailless Tantula and the dumb Didarah. Hoary bearded scientists the world over, will beam and cease to pull their chin-herbage, in a vain endeavor to solve the most perplexing of genealogical questions, namely: Where is the Yellow-Yelling-Yhat, the most important link in the chain of herbivorous deodrum? (N. B. Deodrum is a quadruped which waddles on two feet, using its tail as a gyroscope and rudder.)

The following facts are recorded under oath (in fact, a couple of oaths) by Sir Uckle and his trusty retainer, the black hued Finklestein.

"We were threading our way cautiously along the tortuous banks of the lower Nile on the night of July 7, 1931. Finklestein, squatting on the swivel-mast, crooned an old Didaranian ditty, accompanying the wail of his voice with the melodious wheeze of the Uba as he gurgled the following:

JUGA

The scene is laid in Notaland,
An island far out in the sea,
Where dwells the tribe of Buba,
Which in Whistleglot — means flea.

The chief of the Tribe, Juga Brande,
Held his office by dint of might,
For no soul dwelt on the Isle of Hop
Who could down the chief in a fight.

And fights were the rule, not exception,
For every Saturday night,
The tribe of Buba met by the sea
To pull off a mean tea-fight.

Now tea in the glut of Buba
Means Rum, with a kick — Oh My!
Just put one drop on a rabbit's tongue
And he'll spit in a wild cat's eye.

A shrill shriek pierced the jungle quiet and suddenly rending the darkness round about us, filled our native crew with palsy and violent lamentations. Picking up my trusty nightroscope, I peered into the streaks of radiant light that the sound had broken in the Nubian darkness. All was still save the gentle sobbing sound emitted by our wheezy engine. Suddenly, as the focal strength of my nightroscope asserted itself, I perceived the sight of my life — my senses swam (using the Australian crawl) — I almost fainted from sheer delight (and also due to the fact that I had consumed 320 Corona-Coronas that day, in an effort to lay down a smoke screen

between the bothersome flying crocodile and the boat) for there, seated at his ease, twiddling his thumbs, and braiding his whiskers, gleamed a splendid male species of the golden-crested Yhat.

With the utmost caution, which only natives and late returning husbands can exercise, we swung the nose of the Pung towards the bank — and prepared our instant Postum — for a long night's vigil was in store for us. Remembering my positive data relative to the genus, Yhatta, I knew our quarry was deaf and dumb as well as stone blind, during July, but was able to scent once every three and a half hours, by blowing its breath violently through its ears, causing the sound which had startled us on the river.

Being well hidden in the underbrush and fortified with a package of Neeeos, we awaited developments with bated breath. We waited but a short time, when out from the heavy tropical undergrowth waddled a huge unwieldy Yhat, shaking its formidable horned head and mumbling inarticulate words to itself, beating its long tail the while and otherwise denoting agitation. To digress a bit — the male Yhat is an animal about sixty-one inches high, of no mean girth, covered with a yellow horned hide and mounted with a long horned snout of grayish-blue. It is wont to shed this shell about once every three years and an empty Yhat shell is much prized by the natives as a punch bowl. Its ears are the only means of defence and compare in destructiveness with the kick of a mule or an ostrich. As we watched the beast shimmy out from the undergrowth, a cold fear seized us, lest by some chance, we should be seented and attacked. Fortunately, it was set on an attack on its own tail, which speedily it enacted. Starting slowly, it circled — circled ever faster and faster, emitting cries of anguish and knocking down trees in all directions, until so rapidly did the motion become, that the beast gradually ascended in the air, until it had reached a height of seventy-five feet, from whence it suddenly descended with a crash, landing on its back, from where, being impossible to extricate itself, it was powerless. We rushed out and drawing a huge ostrich feather from the case by my side, I tickled the helpless Yhat behind the left ear.
