The Home Gardener's Time Table

This is a year's schedule of garden work that will tell you what to plant during certain periods and what preparations to make for future planting as well as what remedies to use for preventing plant diseases and destroying insects.

Cultural directions telling how to plant will be found at the heading of each vegetable variety throughout the catalogue and on all our packet, ounce, quarter-pound, pound, pint and quart bags.

January 1—February 25

During the month of January The Maule Seed Books are usually being distributed. As soon as you receive yours, make arrangements for your garden and order all the seeds you will need for the season. The sooner you send your order the better; you will have your seeds ready to plant at the proper time.

In order to raise strong, healthy plants that should be set out early in the spring, it would be to your advantage to make a hot-bed or cold frame. These are easily made. We give you directions on page 3.

Insure success in your garden by adopting the practical instructions given throughout this book.

February 25—March 30

Sow in greenhouse, hot-bed or indoors in shallow boxes or pots, seeds of Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Early Cabbage, Cauliflower, Celeriac, Celery, Chinese Lantern Plant, Egg Plants, Ground Cherry, Lettuce, Peppers and Tomatoes. We offer paper pots on page 35.

After March 15, or as soon as the ground can be worked, plant Asparagus seed or roots, Table Beets, Carrots, Cress, Dandelion, Horse Radish Sets, Leek, Lettuce, Mustard, Onion Sets or seed, Smooth Peas, Potatoes, Radishes, Rhubarb Roots and Spinach.

Asparagus beds may now be top-dressed with manure and given an application of salt.

April 1—May 10

Plants of Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Early Cabbage, Cauliflower and Lettuce may now be set outdoors.

Plant Asparagus seed or roots, Bush Beans, Table Beets, Brussels Sprouts, Carrots, Celeriac, Celery, Chicory, Collards, Corn Salad, Early Corn, Cress, Dandelion, Endive, Garlic Sets, Herbs, Horse Radish Sets, Kale, Kohl Rabi, Leek, Lettuce, Mustard, Nasturtium, Onion seed or sets, Parsley, Parsnips, Peas, Potatoes, Radishes, Rhubarb seed or roots, Salsify, Sorrel, Spinach, Swiss Chard and Early Turnips.

If you do not have the time nor space to devote to the growing of vegetable plants from seed, we can furnish you with the following varieties, grown on our farm at Newfield, N. J.: Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Celery, Egg Plants, Lettuce, Pepper, Sweet Potato and Tomatoes. Consult index on page 176.

May 10—June 15

Chinese Lanteru Plant, Egg Plants, Ground Cherry, Peppers, Sweet Potato and Tomato plants, as well as Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Early Cabbage, Cauliflower and Lettuce plants, if not yet set out in the open ground, should be re-set or transplanted now.

Asparagus roots, Beans of all kinds, Lima Beans, Table and Sugar Beets, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Late Cabbage, Carrots, Cauliflower, Chicory, Collards, Corn Salad, Corn, Cress, Cucumbers, Dandelion, Garden Lemon, Garlic Sets, Gourds, Herbs, Horse Radish Sets, Kale, Kohl Rabi, Leek, Lettuce, Mangels, Melou Peach, Muskmelons, Mustard, Nasturtiums, Okra, Onion seed or sets, Parsley, Parsnip, Peanuts, Peas, Potatoes, Pumpkins, Radishes, Rhubarb seed or roots, Salsify, Sorrel, Spinach, Squash, Swiss Chard, Early Turnips and Watermelons may be planted.

June 15—July 20

Bush Beans, Bush Limas, Beets, Carrots, Chicory, Chinese Cabbage, Collards, Corn, Cress, Cucumbers, Endive, Kale, Kohl Rabi, Lettuce, Nasturtium, Okra, Potatoes, Summer and Winter Radishes, Ruta Baga, Sorrel and Swiss Chard may be sown.

Set out plants of Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Late Cabbage, Cauliflower, Celeriac and Celery.

July 20—August 31

At this time many of the vegetables that were planted early have matured and should be followed by others, but the probable time of the first frost in each locality must be considered before deciding what to plant.

Sow the following for a late fall crop: Bush Beans, Collards, Kale, Lettuce, Mustard, Onions, Early Peas, Summer or Winter Radishes, Spinach and Turuips.

September 1—October 15

Sow no later than September 15: Corn Salad, Kale, Lettuce and Spinach for late fall or early spring use. Sow Onion seed for early spring use (we recommend Silver Skin). Celery plants should be slightly banked up.

Any of these vegetables wanted for early spring use should be covered with a few inches of hay, leaves or litter the last of November and left ou during the winter.

Until October 15: Asparagus roots, Horse Radish Sets, Onion Sets and Rhubarb roots may be planted. These require no protection, but a covering will prove beueficial.

October 15—December 31

Continue banking up celery plants. After a few light frosts, when the ground is dry, dig roots of Beets, Carrots, Celeriac, Parsnips, Winter Radishes, Ruta Bagas, Salsify and Turnips, remove tops all but an inch or two, which will prevent bleeding or drying out. Store either in pit outdoors or in boxes indoors, covering roots with dry sand or soil. We offer a special collection on page 29 of root vegetables for winter storing.

Store Cabbage outdoors by placing heads close together, roots up, and cover with straw and soil.

Important Note: The above suggestions are based on climatic conditions in the latitude of Philadelphia. Farther south, allow one week to two months earlier. Farther north, allow one to four weeks later, according to the climatic conditions in the various sections.

Protect Your Garden Against Blight Disease and Insects

Prevent blight (at first dark brown spots on leaves, which spread, causing the foliage to dry up and die) by dusting or spraying with Bordeaux Mixture, Quick Bordeaux or Bug Death every two weeks until the plants are in full bearing.

For cut-worms, make a poisoned bait by diluting $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce of Arsenate of Lead or Paris Green with water and mixing with 1 pound of Bran. Add enough water to make a thick mash, and spread around plants in the evening, as cut-worms feed only at night.

Plaut lice or Aphis, and all bugs which suck the sap of plants during the hot, dry weather, can be destroyed by spraying with Kerosene Emulsion, Sulpho Tobacco Soap, Readearna or Fox's Insecticide.

All bugs aud worms which eat the foliage of plants can be destroyed by spraying with either Arsenate of Lead or Bordo-Lead, or by dusting with Bug Death, Slug Shot or Red Wing Insect Powder.

The insecticides here mentioned, as well as the necessary implements for applying same, are offered on page 173.

Directions for using preparations to destroy insects, blight, etc., are printed on every can or package

The Care of Your Soil—Several Practical Suggestions

Choose, if possible, a previously cultivated piece of ground that is level and free from stones. That will give you the working basis for your garden.

Next, you must prepare the soil itself. Heavy clay should be mixed with sifted coal ashes or sand. Sandy soil should be mixed with coarse manure. On all soils a wheelbarrow load of manure to every two square yards of ground will be enough. Well rotted stable manure is undoubtedly the most efficient fertilizer for the garden. Vegetables need Nitrogen, Potash and Phosphoric Acid, and a ton of stable manure contains ten pounds of the first two elements and five pounds of the last.

When stable manure is not obtainable, the use of commercial fertilizers, such as Maule's Panmure Plant Food or Sheep Manure, may prove highly productive.

If your garden is large it should be plowed; if small, it

may be dug. The soil should be worked to a depth of 6 or 8 inches. An application of fertilizer or Sheep Manure may be spread on this plowed or dug ground and harrowed or raked in. The ground is now ready for planting. Sow seeds as suggested by our planting table.

Cultivation is necessary between the plants in a row as well as between the rows themselves. If you will do this thoroughly and often, your soil will get all the air and moisture it needs. And you will keep down the weeds at the same time.

This is important. As long as your garden contains weeds, the plants will not get the full benefit of the fertility of the soil. The soil must have air to be fertile. In short, if your garden is to produce all that it should you must cultivate it. That is especially true if it is a heavy clay soil.

How To Make A Hot Bed or Cold Frame

Select a southern or southeastern exposure for the location. Frames of various sizes may be made from those holding one sash or more. Make a box-like frame of heavy lumber, as wide and as long as desirable, the back of the frame being 12 inches high and the front 8 inches high. Dig a pit about 1½ feet deep, and line the sides with boards. Fill the pit with fresh stable manure which contains a good supply of straw bedding or leaves, if possible. Pack manure down firmly until it is level with surrounding earth. On top of this manure put rich, light and well sifted soil to a depth of four inches. Cover the frame with the sashes when the manure will generate heat. In a few days the heat will have reached its highest point and start to drop. When it has fallen to 80 or 90 degrees, seeds may be sown. Fresh manure may be packed outside the wooden frames which will help the bed to hold the heat.

It is not necessary to ventilate the bed until the seed comes up, when air should be given on every bright day by raising the sash slightly at the back. Coverings of old carpet, salt hay or boards should be used at night to protect against danger of the cold. On bright sunny days, before noon, water should be given the plants. Give enough ventilation to dry up any moisture that might be on or around plants. Water very sparingly during wet or cloudy weather to prevent mildew which causes your young plants to wilt and die.

The cold frame is used for hardening plants started in the hot bed. It is built like a hot bed but without the pit or manure, the frame resting on the surface of the ground. In mild climates, seed may be started in a cold frame instead of a hot bed.

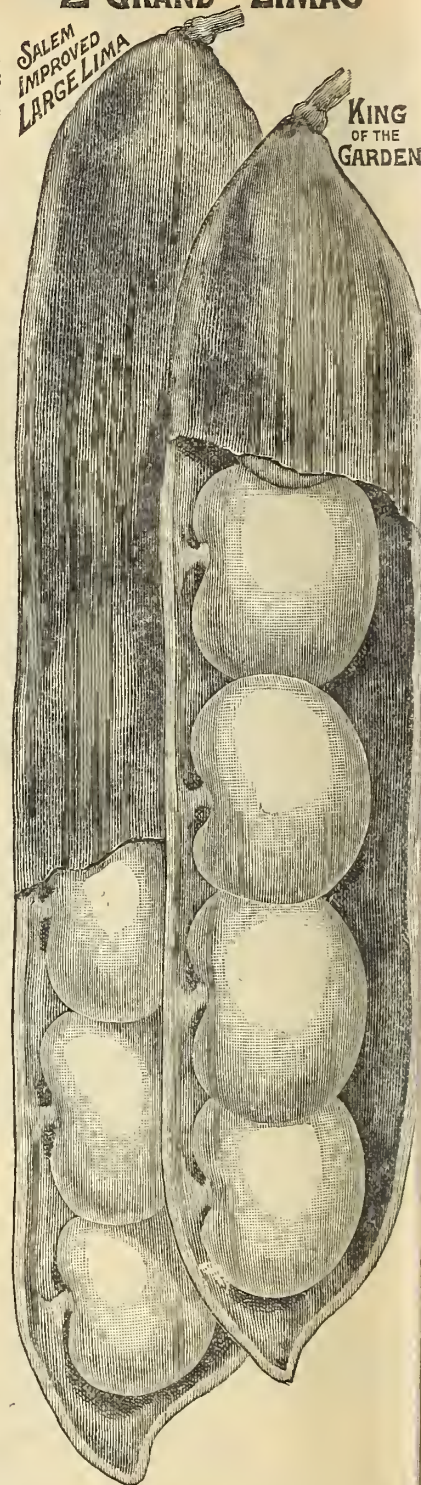


TABLE BEETS

The sugar and starch, as well as mineral salts, contained in beets make them a valuable crop for summer use or winter storage.

CULTURE—For earliest use and market sow seed of any round sort under glass, in February or March, and transplant to open ground in March or April. Seed for main crop may be sown as soon as ground can be put into proper condition. For table beets sow in drills 18 inches apart, and thin to stand 3 to 4 inches apart in the rows. Fine marketable size onions (according to variety planted) are easily produced the first year from early spring sown seed, maturing in from 65 to 120 days. Culture should be frequent though shallow. The same ground may be used for onions, season after season, if well fertilized annually. Bone meal is an excellent fertilizer. Winter storage demands dryness and protection from sudden changes. Onions should never be hauled while frozen.

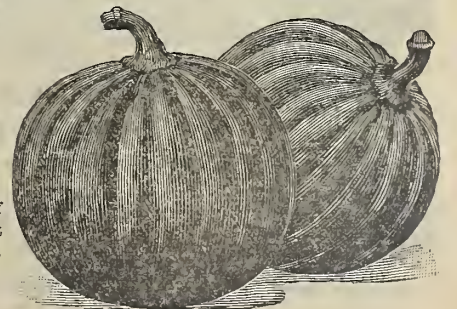

Although we all know these flowers are very lovely why not grow your own flowers to beautify your home surroundings, no matter what size your grounds may be! The cost is small, practically nothing, while the pleasure derived will pay many times over for the seeds.

The different varieties on the following pages are designated either as Annuals, Biennials or Perennials, which with the description will aid you in selecting flowers that will bloom at different times throughout the season. For early flowers, few of the popular annuals are Alyssum, Candytuft, Centaurea, Poppies, Sweet Peas, etc.; for mid-summer such as Antirrhinum, Dianthus, Marigold, Nasturtium, etc., and for late blooming such sorts as Asters, Cosmos, Zinnias, etc. Then there are many sorts which may be grown in pots for porch or house decoration. We offer a very complete list of flower seeds in which are included the old-fashioned sorts as well as many new varieties recently introduced.

Last year we were obliged to omit from our seed book quite a few varieties of flower seeds owing to our inability to procure them from abroad, but we have been more fortunate this year and can now re-offer them to you. All flower seeds worth growing will be found in this book. We exercise every care to offer only tested flower seeds of the highest quality. Every year we test out hundreds of varieties, improving our stocks wherever possible and adding many sorts showing special merit or a marked improvement over some of the older varieties, which are then discarded.

When ordering flower seeds it is unnecessary to write the long names—it is sufficient to **give the number** which we have assigned each variety, but you must **give the number correctly**, so you may receive just what you desire.

Full cultural directions are printed on all flower seed packet, ounce or fraction thereof, quarter-pound and pound bags.

All flower seeds are delivered by parcel post to your door or post-office, free of all extra charges, at prices given.

On page 176 will be found a complete index of the botanical, as well as the common, name of all flowers in this book.

Hardy Annuals. Seed may be sown in the open ground in early spring. The plants will flower and die in the one season.

Half Hardy Annuals. Seeds should be sown in boxes in the house or in hot-beds during March or April and the plants set out in the open ground in May. They will flower for the one season and die.

Hardy Biennials. Sow seed as you would the hardy annual. The plants will not bloom until the following year, after which they die.

Half Hardy Biennials. Seed should be sown as you would the half hardy annuals. The plants require protection during the winter. They will bloom and die the following season.

Hardy Perennials. Seeds may be sown in early spring, or during July and August to produce plants that will flower the next season and continue to bloom each succeeding year. Seed of some hardy perennials if sown very early will produce plants that will bloom the same season. It is unnecessary to give protection to these plants during the winter, but it will prove beneficial to the plants if covering of leaves, litter or straw manure is provided.

Half Hardy Perennials. Sow seed as you would the half hardy annuals. If plants are set out in the open ground they must be lifted before frost, potted up and taken in the house during the winter.

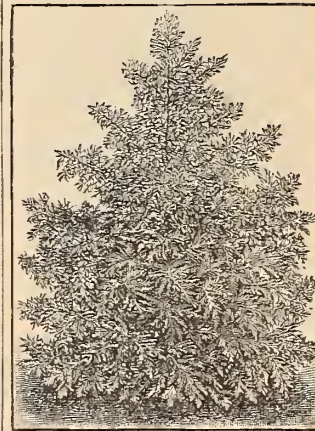

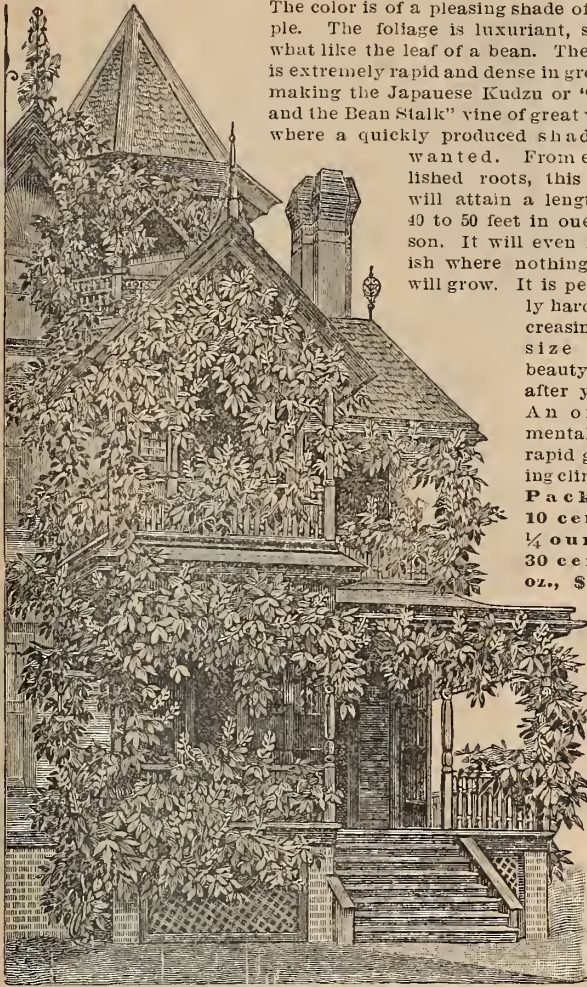

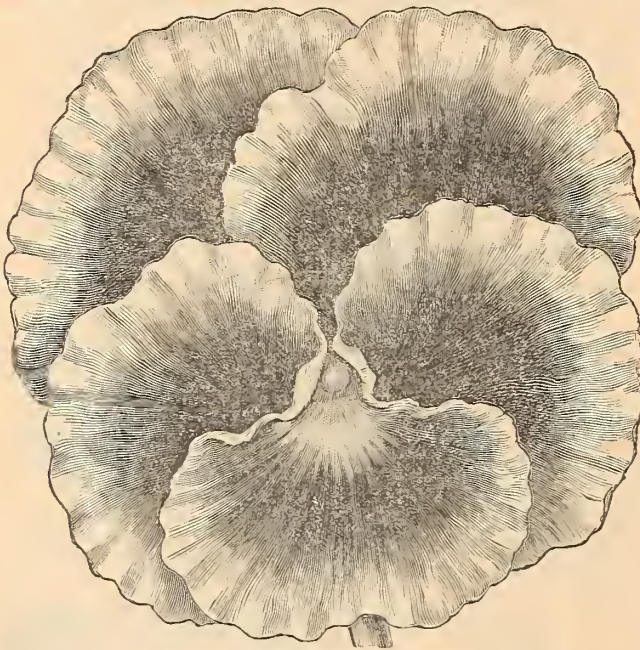

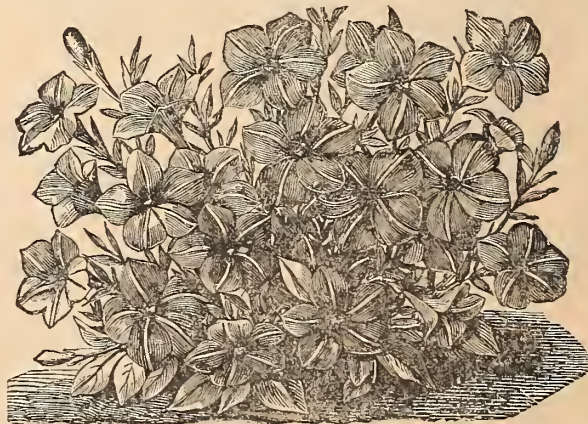

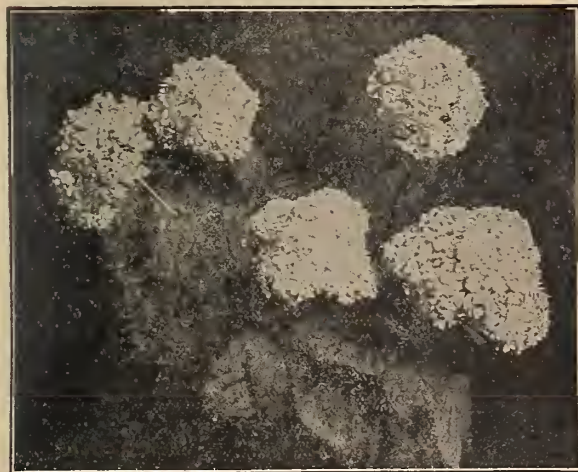

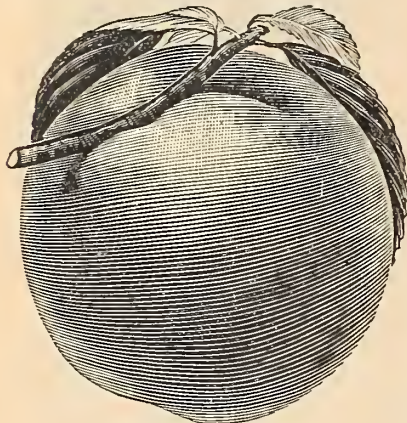

Outdoor Plants, Shrubbery and Small Fruits.—Loosen the soil around the plants. Scatter the sheep manure over the entire surface. Work thoroughly into the soil.

Liquid Manure.—Mix 1 pound sheep manure to 5 gallons water. Applying the mixture direct to the soil; repeat once a week until the plant shows healthy growth, then apply once a month.
