Policy Holder Asks for the Appointment

New York, April 24.-Receivershi

New York, April 24.—Receivership proceedings were to-day instituted against the Equitable Life Assurance Society by J. Wilcox Brown, of Maryland, a policy holder, in the United States circuit court. He filed an action against the society asking for the appointment of a receiver of the surplus, and accordingly for the benefit of himself and other policy holders that join with him in proceedings and an injunction to prevent the society holding the surplus. Brown alleges that the society's officials have disregarded their trust and have not paid him his proper proportion of the net surplus.

His counsel has issued a statement saying that the huge surplus of the society is no legally retained from the policy holders, nor lawfully used by the society, and that the profits due the policy holders over and above the 7 per cent. dividends is now attempted to be swept aside by the stockholders' claims.

Two other planses of the Equitable controversy were in court to-day. Justice McLean, in court, reserved his decision in the case of Herbert G. Tulla, a policy holder, who applied for an injunction restraining the society's officers from taking any other proceedings to obtain an amended charter, for the society. 



Aden, Arabia, April 25.—The situation in Turkish Arabia has become critical, it transpires that only a thousand of the Turkish troops sent to the relief of Riza Pasha reached Sanaa (capital of Yemen), and these fled thither after sustaining a defeat at the hands of the insurgents.

Riza Pasha's troops, 6,000 strong, encountered the Arabs in great force five miles south of Sanaa on March 30th, and after a sharp encounter most of the troops, consisting of Syrian reserves, laid down their arms or descried, the remant of the Turks managing to reach Sanaa the same evening with only 50 camel loads of supplies.

The chief of staff; Izzat Pasha, was killed and seven guns were abandoned and taken possession of by the Arabs, who also captured 200 camels laden with provisions and large quantities of rifles and ampunition.

The Syrian reinforcements which recently arrived in Arabia are unsatisfactory, and the Ottoman officials are anxiously awalting the arrival of European battations, upon which the fate of the capital of Yeman province depends.

Bishop of London Attacks Practice of Giving Sunday Dinner Parties.

Giving Sunday Dinner Parties.

The subject of simpler living for the rich has been taken up by the Bishop of London, and has resulted in a lively public discussion. He preached on this topic on a recent Sunday, and referred to it in two addresses during the following week.

He attacked the Increasing custom of Sunday dinner parties at hotels and restewants, and, in reply to a suggestion that the practice saved work of the domestic servants, said those who gave frequent dinner, parties should give public, as well as private, servants a day of rest. He referred to many letters he had received from rich men who stated that they did not have extravagant tastes and did not care for the entertainments which they gave, but it was the custom of their class.

The Bishop argued that it was the duty of cuch men to maintain their estates and position, but there should be no extravagance, no undue luxury in their management. Much more should be given by rich men to the extension of the Kingdom of God.
