

The term community has two distinct commutative meanings: 1) Community can refer to a usually small, social unit of any size that shares common values. The term can also refer to the national community or international community, and 2) in biology, a community is a group of interacting living organisms sharing a populated environment.

In human communities, intent, belief, resources, preferences, needs, risks, and a number of other conditions may be present and common, affecting the identity of the participants and their degree of cohesiveness.

Since the advent of the internet, the concept of community has less geographical limitation, as people can now gather virtually in an online community and share common interests regardless of physical location. Prior to the internet, virtual communities (like social or academic organizations) were far more limited by the constraints of available communication and transportation technologies.

The word "community" is derived from the Cital French communité which is derived from the Latin communitée (com, "with/together" + munus, "gift"), a broad term for fellowship or organized society. [11] Some examples of community service are to help in church, tutoring, hospitals, etc.

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



An encyclopedia (also spelled encyclopædia ir encyclopædia)[1] is: a type of reference work - a compendium holding a summary of Information from either all branches of knowledge or a particular branch of knowledge. Encyclopedias are divided into articles or entries, which are usually accessed alphabetically by article name. Ill Encyclopedia entries are longer and more detailed than those in most dictionaries.[3] Generally speaking, unlike dictionary entries, which focus on linguistic information about words, encyclopedia articles. focus on factual information to cover the thing or concept for which the article name stands. 41556171

Encyclopedias have existed for around 2,000 years; the oldest still in existence, Naturalis Flintoria, was written in ca. A) 77 by Pliny the Elder. The modern encyclopedia evolved out of cictionaries around the 17th century. Historically, some encyclopedias were contained in one volume, but some, such as the Encyclopianda Britishnica or the

world's largest Enciclopedia universal ilustrada europeo-americana, became huge multi-volume works. Some modern encyclopedias, such as Wikipedia, are electronic and are often freely available.

The word encyclopedia comes from the Koine Geek šykūkλiog razībaja, ill transitierated enkyklios paideia, meaning "general education": enkyklios (εγκύκλιος), meaning "circular, recurrent, required regularly, general" (1) + paideia (ηριδεία), meaning *education, rearing of a child", [10] it was reduced to a single word due to an error [11] by copyists of Latin manuscripts. Together, the phrase literally translates as "complete instruction" or "complete knowledge".

Indeed, the purpose of an encyclopedia is to collect knowledge disseminated around the globe; to set forth its general system to the men with whom welive, and transmit it to those who will come after us, so that the work of preceding centuries will not become useless to the centuries to come; and so that our offspring, becoming befler instructed, will at the same time become nore virtuous and happy, and that we should not die without having rendered a service to the human race in the future years to come.



Sponges are animals of the phylum Porifera (/poˈrɪfərə/; meaning "pore bearer"). They are multicellular organisms that have bodies full of pores and channels allowing water to circulate through them, consisting of jelly-like mesohyl sandwiched between two thin layers of cells. Sponges have unspecialized cells that can transform into other types and that often migrate between the main cell layers and the mesohyl in the process. Sponges do not have nervous, digestive or circulatory systems. Instead, most rely on maintaining a constant water flow through their bodies to obtain food and oxygen and to remove wastes.




Nonlinear Finite Elements
