here, on their western slope, a singular character as

the Sierra Nevada of California. The main chains

are rounded form, and the spurs and foot hills, which cover

a great portion of the district, form a series of small, narrow

valleys, which are filled with dense forests, and

which are covered with a dense growth of vegetation.

And, journeying to behold once more on earth,

Hasten's face—tow'rd Hebron, where abode

his father, Jacob, his birthplace;

From Jordan's banks a sumer to the year,

National Democratic Platform.

ADOPTED AT BALTIMORE, July 23rd, 1860.

Resolved. That the platform adopted by the Democratic party at Cincinnati be affirmed, with the following explanatory resolutions:

First. That the government of a Territory organizes it for self-government, and temporary, and during its existence all citizens of the United States have equal rights, with the exception of those in the Territories, to the use of either of person or property, being destroyed or impeded by Congressional territorial legislation.

Second. That it is the duty of the Federal Government, in all its departments, to protect, when necessary, the personal and property rights of the Territories, and whatever else its constitutional authority extends.

Third. That when the settlers in a Territory have an adequate population, from a State Constitution, the right of sovereignty commences and becomes acknowledged by admission into the Union, and they should then be entitled to all the rights of other States, and the state thus organized ought to be admitted into the Federal Union, whether its constitution prohibits or recognizes the institution of slavery.

Fourth. That the Democratic party are in favor of the acquisition of the Island of Cuba, on such terms as will be honorable to ourselves and just to Spain.

Fifth. That the enactments of State legislatures to defeat the faithful execution of the fugitive slave law, are in violation of the Constitution and the laws of the United States, and of the rights of the Territories.

Sixth. That the Territorial Government can give with impunity the right of slavery in the Territories, a cardinal and sanctioned principle of the Democratic party, and upon its faithful observance depends the dignity of our National council, and the peace of our community.

Seventh. That the Territorial Government, with the question of slavery in the Territories, upon any presentation or protest whatever, either for its protection or for its suppression, and the resolution adopted by the Convention at Baltimore which nominated **Stephen A. Douglas** and **Horatio V. Johnson**, for President and Vice President.

Eighth. That the Territorial Government held at Baltimore, in accordance with the two third rule and the usages of the Democratic party in all respects, is justly entitled and should receive the hearty and warm support of the Democracy of Mariposa County.

Ninth. That the platform promulgated by the **Breckinridge and Lane** ticket having been adopted by the **Alton and Bell** and some others—especially the **Perly** and **Franklin**—is the true expression of the principles of the Democratic party, and upon its faithful observance depends the dignity of our National council, and the peace of our community.

Tenth. That the Territorial Government, with the question of slavery in the Territories, upon any presentation or protest whatever, either for its protection or for its suppression, and the resolution adopted by the Convention at Baltimore which nominated **Stephen A. Douglas** and **Horatio V. Johnson**, for President and Vice President.

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REPORT

OF THE...

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

OF MARIPOSA COUNTY.

The Board of Supervisors of Mariposa County, consisting of Messrs. A. W. Jev, J. H. Innet and W. Gray, met in regular session, Monday, August 6th, A. D., 1860, and holding session until— would respectfully present the following semi-Annual Report:

Pursuant to an order entered and signed by two members of the Board, there was a special meeting held on the 3rd day of March, 1860, at which the Board assessed the amount of taxes to be levied and collected for County purposes, as follows, to wit; on each \$100 worth of property, the sum of \$1 40 sub-divided as follows; 30 cents to the County General Fund, 25 cents to the Indigent Sick Fund, 5 cents to the School Fund, 50 cents to the Building Fund, 30 cents to the Interest Tax Fund, which added to the State Tax of 60 cents makes a total of \$2 00 on Property, and a Poll Tax of \$4 00, Road Tax of \$3 00.

In accordance with the provisions of an act of the Legislature, approved April 21st, 1860, the Board having given notice to Delinquent Tax payers, to appear and show cause why their taxes should be reduced, Palmer, Cook & Co. and John C. Fremont from whom taxes were due from assessments on the "Las Mariposas," for the years, 1855, 1856, 1857, appeared by T. W. Park, Esq., and after due consideration the Board deemed it advisable and so ordered that the assessments be reduced to the sum of \$50,000 for each year, and that the gross amount of taxes thereon be placed at the sum of \$2,550.

The Board awarded the Contract of providing for the Indigent Sick of the County to Dr. J. A. Grandvoynet, for the term of one year, for the sum of \$4,198 00, to be paid by monthly payments out of the Indigent Sick Fund.

The Board met as a Board of Equalization, on Monday, Aug. 13th, 1860, and continued in session until Tuesday, 21st Aug., 1860, and on examination of the Assessment Roll for 1859, the names of delinquent Tax payers that were not struck from the Roll, were added to the Assessment Roll for 1860.

The Board have had the usual amount of general business to transact during this term, the most of which they deem it unnecessary to report.
