

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

#### ALYSSUM BENTHAMII COMPACTUM LILACINUM "LILAC QUEEN"

Distinct, new variety of the annual Sweet Alyssum with pure lilac flowers. The plants are of dwarf, compact, upright growth and resemble, when in full bloom, a tiny Candytuft. Equally as useful for carpet-bedding. Pkt. 20c.

#### NTIRRHINUM MAJUS GRANDIFLORUM BRILLIANT ROSE

Large-flowered, tall Snapdragon, producing long spikes of self-colored, pure, brilliant rose flowers; valuable for cutting. Pkt. 15c.

#### ANTIRRHINUM MAJUS "RUBY"

A strikingly beautiful, new variety and main color of the very popular Tall Snapdragon. The flowers are self-colored, bright ruby red, and of surprising effect. This novelty is at the same time a charming plant for tall beds and groups, and highly valuable as a cut flower. Pkt. 15c.

#### ARTEMISIA SACCORUM VIRIDIS

New annual species introduced from China. SCARLET QUEEN



#### CYPERUS ADENOPHORUS

#### DIMORPHOTHECA SINUATA

Equally useful and of the same easy culture as the Dimorphotheca aurantiaca, this new South African species distinguishes itself essentially by the singularly pretty color of its flowers. #### BEAN, BUSH—Black Valentine

#### **ARTICHOKE**

Artichaut. Alcachofa. Artischocke.

One ounce will sow 100 feet of row, and produce about 500 plants.

A deep, rich sandy loam is best adapted for this plant. The seed should be sown thinly in drills  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches deep and 1 foot apart. When large enough, transplant to permanent rows 3 feet apart, allowing 2 feet between the plants. They reach maturity the second year, and in the northern States should be protected in Winter by a covering of leaves or coarse manure. A bed will continue in bearing for several years.

Improved Large Green Globe. Heads large, fleshy, and of rich flavor. Pkt. 5c., oz. 30c., lb. \$3.00.

Jerusalem. Distinct from the above. Grown for the tubers, which resemble potatoes, and are cultivated in a similar manner, but the rows should be at least 4 feet apart. Qt. 25c., pk. \$1.50, bus. \$5.00.

#### **ASPARAGUS**

Asperge. Esparrago. Spargel.

One ounce will sow 50 feet of row, and produce about 1200 plants.

Sow the seed as early in Spring as the soil can be worked, in drills 12 to 14 inches apart, and when well started thin out to 3 inches apart. When one or two years old, transplant into permanent beds, thoroughly trenched, 2 feet or more in depth. Set the plants in rows 2 feet apart and not less than 18 inches apart in the row. Care should be taken that the roots are well spread, and set at a depth of 6 inches below the level of the bed. Cover only 2 or 3 inches, and fill in gradually as the plants grow. Very little, if any, should be cut the first year after transplanting, but a fair crop can be cut the second year. Every Fall after the tops have been cut down apply a dressing of coarse manure, and in the Spring fork it in. An occasional top dressing of salt at the rate of one-half pound per square yard is also beneficial and keeps down the weeds.


#### **ASPARAGUS ROOTS**

If planted in rows 3 feet apart and 2 feet between the plants, 7260 roots will plant an acre. As nothing is gained by using one-year-old plants we offer only strong two-year-old roots. #### **BEANS**

Beans like a well-drained, rich and light loam, and should not be planted too early, as they are very sensitive to cold and wet. Plant about the middle of April when warm and favorable, and at intervals throughout the season for a succession until the latter part of August. Bush varieties should be planted in drills 2 feet apart, and from 2 to 6 plants to the foot in a row. Keep them well cultivated and draw the earth up to the stems.

#### DWARF GREEN-PODDED SNAP BEANS

Haricots Nains. Frijoles. Rrup Bohnen.

One quart will plant 100 feet of drill; 11/2 to 2 bushels required for an acre.

After the planting is completed, nothing further is necessary for 6 or 7 weeks, except running through between the rows with the cultivator or hoe, and freeing the plants from weeds. About the middle of August earthing up is necessary for blanching and whitening of that which is wanted for early use. After the soil has been drawn up against the plant with the hoe, it is further pressed close around each plant by the hand, firm enough to keep the leaves upright and prevent them from spreading, using care to prevent the soil falling into the heart of the plant.







When up, and all danger of insects has passed, pull out all but 3 plants. Cultivate until the vines cover the gound, and pinch the ends off the growing shoots to induce early fruiting. Slug shot or tobacco dust is excellent to sift over the young plants when the dew is on to prevent attacks of insects. A few hills for early use may be had by sowing in hotbed on pieces of sod or in pots. The seed may also be started outdoors under hand-frames or glasses.





Mushroom beds may be made in a warm, dry cellar, or in any building where the frost does not penetrate, and in the open air during the Summer and Fall months. Having procured the spawn, the next thing to be attended to is to make preparations for the beds. About a fortnight or three weeks before the beds are to be made, collect a quantity of fresh horse manure without the straw; place it in a heap under cover, and as it heats keep turning it over once or twice a week, until the fiery heat has become exhausted, which will require from ten to fourteen days' time. When the manure is in a condition to be made up, lay out your bed according to your requirements, say 3 feet wide, 10 feet long, and from 2 to 3 feet deep; beat it well down with the back of the spade as the process of building goes on. When the bed has been made some time, say a week or thereabouts, and the heat sufficiently declined to a temperature of 65 or 75 degrees, the spawn may be put into it. Break the spawn in pieces 2 inches square, and put them 6 inches apart all over the bed, then cover the bed with 2 inches of rich soil. When the soil looks dry, give a gentle watering with tepid water, using a rose on the watering-pot.

One ounce will sow 100 feet of row; 5 pounds is required for one acre.

For Onion culture the ground should be prepared the previous Autumn by plowing or spading deeply, using plenty of well-rotted barnyard manure. A rather strong, deep, rich, loamy soil is considered most suitable, although we have seen splendid crops raised from a stiff, clay soil, which was well under-drained. Sow the seed as early in Spring as practicable, in shallow drills 1 foot apart, covering with fine soil, which should be pressed down by the use of a light roller or the back of a spade. When the young plants are strong enough thin out to 4 inches apart. Keep the surface of the ground open and free from weeds by hoeing frequently.







They should be large enough for use in from four to five weeks from the time of planting. Plant in the open air as soon as the ground can be worked, on finely prepared beds, in rows 8 to 10 inches apart; sow for succession every ten days or two weeks as long as wanted. 



#### HERBS FOR CULINARY AND MEDICINAL USE

Herbs should have a place in every garden. Any good housekeeper knows the value of the little patch of herbs upon which she makes daily drafts in the Summer, and which furnishes such a nice collection of dried herbs for Winter seasoning, while as domestic medicines several kinds are held in high repute. The culture is very simple; the best way is to make a little seed-bed in the early Spring, and set the plants out in a bed as soon as large enough. They should be harvested on a dry day, just before the blossom develops, dried quickly and bottled, or closely packed in dry boxes with the air entirely excluded.

By planting at intervals up to the first of July, blooms can be had all through the Summer and Fall. About the end of October, when the leaves begin to


