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PREFACE.

Since the publication of the last Edition of the ComPANION in 1891 a greater number of changes have occurred
in the leadership of the dominating political party than at
any other period during the history of Canada. Sir John
A. Macdonald, Sir John J. C. Abbott, Sir John S. D.
Thompson, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Sir Charles Tupper,
Bart., and Hon. Wilfrid Laurier have all successively been
Prime Ministers of Canada within the comparatively short
period of six years. The General Election of June, 1896,
resulted in the Liberal-Conservative Government being
obliged to give way to a Ministry from the Liberal party.
A change has also taken place in the Premiership in all
the provinces save that of Manitoba. General Elections
have also largely changed the complexion of the several
legislatures.

The arrangement of the information in the former editions has been followed except the portion relating to the Imperial Honours borne by Canadians, which has been given a more prominent place in the present edition. Heretofore the information on this subject could only be gleaned at some trouble from English publications, and the Editor believes that the general list given in the Companion will prove interesting. The Tables of Precedence and Titles in Canada have been carefully prepared from the Imperial despatches relating to the subject, and may be relied upon as correct. In conclusion, the Editor desires to thank his numerous correspondents and friends for information supplied to him.

Matthew Aylmer, b. 1842, formerly Lieut. 7th Foot, and now Lieut. Col. and Adjutant Gen. Canadian Militia, at Ottawa.—Melbourne, P.Q.

MACDONALD OF EARNSCLIFFE, Rt. Hon. Ludy (1st baroness, 1891, U. K.). Susan Agnes, dau. of late Hon. T. J. Barnard, Mem. Privy Council of Jamaica, b. 1836; m. 1867, as his second wife, the Rt. Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, P.C.G., e.B. (for many years Prime Minister of Can.), who. d. 1891.—Earnscliffe, Ottawa, Canada.

MOUNT-STEPHEN, LORD (1st baron, 1891, U.K.). Sir George Stephen, 1st baronet; s. of Mr. William Stephen, formerly of Dufftown, Banff, Scot.; b. 5. June, 1829; came to Can. in 1850, and became a merchant in Montreal, and president of the Bank of Montreal; president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. to 1888, created a baronet 1886, and raised to the peerage, 1891.—25 St. James place S. W., Brockett Hall, Hatfield, Herts.

CANADIAN PEER.

The undermentioned Feudal Barony is the only Canadian hereditary title existing. The patent of nobility signed by Louis XIV., granting this title to Charles le Moyne for distinguished services, is remarkable as creating not only a Territorial Barony, but also conferring a title of honor upon himself and his descendants, whether male or female. The cession of Canada to England by the Treaty of Paris in 1763 made no change in the legal right to hold honours; since this period each successive head of the family has, by assumption of right, used the title; but it was not officially recognized by the British Government until Dec. 4, 1880.

BARON DE LONGUEUIL.

Grant, Charles Colmor (7th baron); b. 13 Feb., 1844; succeeded his father, 1879; m. 1878, Mary, third dau. of the late Thomas Wayne, Esq., of Glendare, Aberdare, Eng.—Birchwood, Pitlochry, Scotland; Conservative Club, London, England.

JOHNSON, Sir WILLIAM GEO. (4th baronet); b. 1830; ed. at Royal Academy, Woolwich; formerly Lieut. in Royal Artillery; succeeded his uncle, 1843; m. 1889, Elizabeth, dau. of R. H. Rose, Sir William (2nd baronet); b. 1846; succeeded his father, 1888; ed. at Rugby; called to the Bar, L. Canada, 1868; served in Can. Militia, 1868-71; is head of the Stock Exchange firm of Govett Sous

& Co.; m. 1868, Katherine, dau. of Alex. Macalister of Torresdale Castle, Argyllshire. Baronetcy conferred 1872, on the Rt. Hon. Sir John Rose, P.C., G.C.M.G., Receiver Gen. for the Duchy of Cornwall.—18 St. James Square, London.

STUART, Sir CHARLES JAS. (2nd baronet); b. 1824; succeeded his father, 1853; ed. at Univ. Coll., Oxford (B.A. 1845, M.A. 1848); called to the Bar, Inner Temple, 1848. Baronetcy conferred 1840, on Sir James Stuart, Chief Justice of Lower Canada.—98 Eaton Square, London, S. W.

TABLE OF TITLES AS AUTHORIZED TO BE USED IN CANADA.

In a despatch bearing date, 24 July, 1868, the Secretary of State for the Colonies informed the Governor-General of Canada, that in consequence of the Confederation of the British Provinces, some revision of the former usage there about titles had become necessary, and that Her Majesty had been pleased to approve of the adoption of certain regulations; subsequent despatch bearing date 29 December. 1893, made certain additions, and the following is now the amended

Table of Titles.

1. The Governor General of Canada to be styled "His Excellency."

2. The Lieutenant Governor of the Provinces to be styled "His Honour."

3. The Privy Councillors of Canada to be styled

"Honourable," and for life.

4. The Solicitor General, the Controller of Customs and the Controller of Inland Revenue to be styled "Honourable," while in office.

5. Senators of Canada are to be Styled "Honour-

able," but only during office, and the title not to be continued afterwards.

6. Executive Councillors of the Provinces to be styled "Honourable," but only while in office, and the

title not to be continued afterwards.

7. Legislative Councillors in the Provinces not in future to have that title; but gentlemen who were Legislative Councillors at the time of the Union (1st July, 1867) to retain their title of "Honourable" for life.

8. The President of the Legislative Council in the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" during office.

9. The Speaker of the House of Assembly in the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" during office.

When personally recommended for the distinction by the Governor General the title of "Hon ourable" may be retained by the President of the Senate or by the Speaker of the House of Commons on retirement after three years of office, not necessarily continuous.

DESPATCH OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLONIES, DATED JUNE, 1893.

The Marquis of Ripon to the Earl of Derby.

Downing Street, 15th June, 1893.

My Lord,—The title of "Honourable" as conferred by the Queen in the Duke of Buckingham's despatch, No. 164, of the 24th July, 1868, upon certain persons in the Dominion of Canada, and as appertaining to members of Executive and Legislative Councils in other Colonies possessing responsible Government, has generally been understood not to run beyond the particular colony; but in these cases Her Majesty has now, on my recommendation, been graciously pleased to approve of its use and recognition throughout Her Dominions.

In the Duke of Buckingham's despatch of the 24th July, 1868, there was no express confinement of the use of the title within the Dominion of Canada, and you will understand that the persons upon whom it was thereby conferred will enjoy it throughout Her Majesty's Dominions for so long as they may be entitled to it,

LAIRD, Hon. DAVID. S. of the late Hon. Alexander Laird, who came to P.E.1, from Renfrewshire, Scot., 1819, and was for some years a member of the Ex. Council of the colony; b. at New Glasgow, P.E.I., 1833; ed. at the Presbyterian Seminary, Truro, N.S.; m., 1864, Mary Louisa, dan. of the late Thos. Owen, Esq., Postmaster-General of P.E.I. By profession a journalist; and is editor of the Charlottetown Patriot newspaper. Has sat in the Charlottetown City Council. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, P.E.I., from Nov., 1872, until April, 1873, and while holding that position, formed a delegation to Ottawa, with Hon, R. P. Haythorne, to negotiate terms of Union with the Dominion Govt.; the basis agreed upon by the delegation was submitted to the people, and being rejected, on according to the council of the people and being rejected, on according the council of the people. a member of the Ex. Council of the colony; b. at New Glasgow, delegation was submitted to the people, and being rejected, on account of the side issues brought up, the Govt. resigned; but a short time afterwards the same terms, with a slight modification in two clauses, were adopted by the Legislature, and the Island entered the Dominion. Civil Sccy. under the Earl of Gosford and Lord Sydenham, during the periods those noblemen held office of Governor General, by the late Sophie Scholastique La Force, whose father, Major La Force, went with his militia men to the frontier in the war of 1812, and whose grandfather was Acting Commodore of the British fleet on Lake Ontario during the American Revolutionary war; and brother of His Lordship the Right Rev. Jean Langevin, Bishop of St. Germain de Rimouski. B. in the city of Quebec, 26 Aug., 1826; ed. at the Seminary of that city; m., 1854, Justine, eldest dau. of the late Lieut.-Col. Charles H. Tetu, J. P. (she d. 30 Oct., 1882). Studied law first with the late Hon. A. N. Morin, and afterwards with the late Hon. Sir George E. Cartier, and was called to the Bar, L.C., Oct., 1850, Apptd. Q.C., 1864. Was editor of the Mélanges Religieux (Montreal) from 1847 to 1849, and also of the Journal d'Agriculture (same city); and at a later period (1857) of the Courier du Canada (Quebec). Sat as a mem. of the City Council Quebec, for some years, and was Chairman of the Water Works Committee. Was Seey.-Treas, and afterwards Vice-Presdt, of the North Shore Railway Co.; Mayor of Quebec from Jan., 1858, to Jan., 1861, and during his incumbency visited England on matters affecting the city finances, etc.; for two years, 1861 and 1862, Presdt. of St. Jean Baptiste Society (Quebec); and 1863 and 1864 Presdt. of the Institut Canadien, same city. Author of Le Canada, ses Institutions, etc., a prize essay (Quebec, 1855), and of Droit Administratif, ou Manuel des Paroisses et Fabriques (Quebec, 1862), second edition being published by him in 1878. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 30 March, 1864, until the Union, and held the office of Solicitor-General, L.C., from 30 March, 1864, to Nov., 1865; and Postmaster General from latter period until the Union. Sworn of the Privy Council, 1 July, 1867, and appointed Secretary of State of Canada, in which office he remained until transferred to the Public Works, 7 December, 1869. Elected by acclamation for the city of Three Rivers, 17 Nov., 1878, on resignation of the sitting men., and by acclamation at g.e., 1882. Reclected at g.e., 1887. At the g.e., 1891, was elected for the constituencies of Three Rivers and Richelieu, and subsequently elected to sit for Three Rivers — Was not a candidate at g.e., 1896. Sworn of the Privy Council 14 June, 1873, and was Presidt, of that body until 1 July, when apptd. Minister of Militia and Defence. Resigned on appointment as a Phisné Judge of the Supreme Court of N. S., 5 Nov., 1873. Retired 19 Feb., 1893. Sat for Inverness in N. S. Assem. from 1859 to 1862, and for Antigonish in Commons from 1866 until Nov., 1873.—Antigonish, N. S.

S. from June, 1863, to Dec., 1864, when he was appointed Financial Secr. in the Govt. led by Dr. Tupper, which he continued to hold until the Union. Was one of the Comm. (representing N.S.) apptd. to open trade relations between the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil and the B. A. Provinces, 1865-66 Sworn of the Privy Council and Minister of Justice, from 17 Oct., 1878, to 20 May, 1881. Sat for Pictou in N.S. Assem. from 1859 until the Union, and from g.e., 1871, until July, 1872, when he resigned. An unsuccessful candidate for Pictou in the Commons at g.e., 1867. Sat in the Commons from g.e., 1874, until apptd. Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, 20 May, 1881. Apptd. Was the leading political writer on the Daily Globe from 1857 to 1860. Represented Can. at the New York Exhibition, 1853. Was Secy. of the Constitutional Reform Assoc. of U. C., 1859; a mem, of Ex. Conneil and Commr. of Crown Lands, Can., from May, 1862, to March, 1864 (in the Sandfield MacDonald-Dorion Administration), when the Govt. resigned; Prov. Secy. (in the Taché-Macdonald Union Adminstration from June, 1864, and Acting Minister of Marine (with charge of Provincial gun boats on the lakes), from July, 1866, until the Union of the Provinces, 1867. Sworn of the Privy Council and was Minister of Public Works from 1 July, 1867, until com-missioned Lieut-Gov. of Rupert's Land and the North-West Territories, Oct., 1869. Created c.B. (Civil), 1867. Sworn of the Privy Conneil, July, 1867, and was Minister of Marine and Fisheries from that date until 6 Nov., 1873, when he retired from the office with Sir John A. Macdonald. Was a men. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1858 to March, 1865, when his party was defeated on an appeal to the people on the scheme for the Confederation of B.N.A. In April, 1866, after the resignation of the Smith Cabinet, was called upon to form a Government, in connection with the Hon.

R. D. Wilmot, which he did, holding the office of President of Ex. Council from that date until the Uniou. Was a delegate to Quebec in 1861, and again in 1862, on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway; to the Union Conference, in same city, 1864; and to the London Colonial Conference to complete terms of Union of B.N.A. Provinces, 1866. Sat for Northumberland in N.B. Assem. from 1856 to 1860, when apptd. to L. C. same Province, where he remained until the Union. Commanded the Batt. throughout the Northwest Rebellion Campaign, 1885, and rendered valuable services in the Edmonton district by pacifying the Indians and persuading the Half-breeds to support the Dominion Govt. Was Collector of Customs at Halifax from 5 Nov., 1874, until 21 Jan., 1888, when he resigned. Sat for Victoria in N.S. Assem. from 1858 until the Union, 1867, and for same seat in the Commons from that time until 5 Nov., 1874. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Victoria, N.S., at g.e., 1891—Halitax.

The Supreme Court of Canada.

The Supreme Court of Canada, the highest within the Dominion, was constituted in 1875 in accordance with the B.N. Act 1867, section 101. It has both original and appellate jurisdiction—Original, as to: (1) Judicial opinions to the Crown; (2) Private bills and peritious therefor referred by the Senate or House of Commons; and (3) Civil suits in which the validity of a Dominion or Provincial Act is questioned; Appellate—in appeals: (1) from the Exchequer Court: (2) from the Provincial Courts; (3) in habeas corpus cases; and (4) in Election cases.

The Court is presided over by a Chief Justice (who is known as the Chief Justice of Canada) and puisné judges. The quorum of the Court is four, From a decision of the Supreme Court au appeal always lies to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council of England, the Court of last resort for the British Empire, excepting in criminal cases; in these the judgment of the Supreme Court is made final by

an Act passed in 1887.

The Exchequer Court of Canada.

This Court consists of one Judge. It has exclusive original jurisdiction in respect of any matter which might in England be the subject of an action against the Crown; also in respect of claims against the Crown for property taken for public purposes, and for damages, etc. The Court possesses concurrent original jurisdiction in all matters relating to revenue, the impeachment or annulling of patents at the instance of the Attorney-General of Cauada, and in all cases in which demand is made or relief is sought against any officer of the Crown for anything done or omitted to be done in the performance of his duty. This Court is also a Colonial Court of Admiralty, having such jurisdiction throughout Canada, and its waters, whether tidal or non-tidal, naturally or artificially navigable, and such rights and remedies in all matters connected with navigation, shipping, trade and commerce, as may be had or enforced in any Colonial Court of Admiralty, under the Imperial "Colonial Court of Admiralty Act 1890."

PART II.

The Senate of Canada.

The Upper House of the Parliament of Canada called the Senate consists of 81 Senators, who are from time to time summoned by the Governor-General in the Queen's name. The appointment is for life, and the sessional allowance is \$1,000 and mileage. Ontario is represented by 24 Senators, Quebec by 24, Nova Scotia by 10, New Brunswick by 10, Prince Edward Island by 4, British Columbia by 3, Manitoba by 4, and North-West Territories by 2.

A Senator must be a natural born or a naturalized British subject, of the full age of 30 years, resident in the Province for which he is appointed, and possessed of real and personal estate to the amount of \$4,000

over and above all liabilities.

In the case of Quebec, each Senator is appointed for one of the 24 Electoral Divisions of Lower Canada; he must be a resident in that division or have his real property qualification therein.

The Queen's Proclamation, uniting the provinces in 1867, contained the names of the first Senators for

the Dominion of Canada as follows :-

CANADA.

BY THE QUEEN.

A PROCLAMATION

For uniting the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotiu and New Brunswick into one Dominion under the name of CANADA.

Whereas hy an Act of Parliament passed on the 29th day of March, 1867, in the thirtieth year of our reign, intituled: "An Act for the Union of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, and the Government thereof, and for purposes connected therewith," after divers recitals, it is enacted that it "shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, to declare by Proclamation, that on and after a day therein appointed, not being more than six months after the passing of this Act, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall form and he One Dominion under the name of Canada, and on and after that day these Three Provinces shall form and he One Dominion under that Name accordingly;" and it is thereby further enacted that "such persons shall be first summoned to the Senate as the

Queen by warrant, under Her Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, thinks fit to approve, and their names shall be inserted in the Queen's Proclamation of Union;" We, therefore, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, have thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and we do ordain, declare and command, that on and after the 1st day of July, 1867, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall form and be One Dominion under the name of Canada

And we do further ordain and declare that the persons whose names are herein inserted and set forth are the persons of whom we have by Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual thought fit to approve as the persons who shall be first summoned to the Senate of Canada.

Mary Eliza, dau. of William Townsend. Esq., of Chicago. A farmer. Is Major of Iberville Reserve Militia. Has been Mayor of St. Gregoire. Sat in the House of Commons continuously from 1867 until July. 1896, when he resigned and was appointed to the Senate, 17 July, 1896. A Liberal.—Mount Johnson, P.Q.

Bellerose, Lieut.-Col. Hon. Joseph Hyacinthe, J.P. (De La Naudiere).

S. of the late M. H. Bellerose, Esq., merchant, Three Rivers, P.Q., by Sophie Le Maitre de Lottinville. B. at Three Rivers, 12 July, 1820. Ed. at the Coll. of Nicolet and St. Hyacinthe. M., 1847, Henlietta, dan. of Lieut.-Col. Armand, and sister of Hon. J. F. Armand, Senator. Was for many years Vice-President of the Sovereign Fire Insu. Co.; Mayor of the Municipality; Comm. under 2 Vict., c. 29, Stat. L. C., and Presdt. of the Union Navigation Co. Has been long and prominently connected with the Volunteer Militia movement in L. C., and in 1859 was Commander of the whole Force in Military District No. 8. Is now Lieut.-Col. commanding Laval Reserve Militia. In 1858, H. M. the Queen, being desirous of showing her estimation of his military services, charged Sir E. W. Head, then Gov.-General, to offer him a captaincy in the 100th or "Prince of Wales Royal Can. Regiment," then being organized, a position he accepted, but subsequently, for private reasons, resigned, notwithstanding that he had passed the necessary examinations therefor. On two occasions declined important appts, under Govt., and after the death of Sir G. E. Cartier refused a seat in the Cabinet owing to the unsettled policy of Govt. on Man. Amnesty and N. B. School questions, but principally on account of Pacific Railway charges then pending. Sat for Laval in Can. Assem. from g.e., 1863, until the Union, and for same seat in the Commons from that event until called to the Senate, 16 Oct., 1873. Represented Laval in Quebec Assem, from the Union until g.e., 1875, when he retired, and was during the whole of that time

Chairman of the Contingent Committee, and as such effected great reductions in the House expenditure; was for some years Chairman of the Private Bills Committee of the Senate. During the Session of 1871 he was offered the Speakership of the Leg. Assem., Quebec, for the next Parlt., which he then accepted, but during the recess, owing to party dissensions, he thought the Govt. was endangered, and had an interview with the Premier, Mr. Chauveau, the result being the continuation in office of the late Speaker. Bernier, Hon. Thomas Alfred (St. Boniface).

Called to the Senate, 27 Oct., 1892. A Conservative.—St. Boniface, Man.

Bolduc, Hon. Joseph (Lauzon).

S. of Captain A. Bolduc, one of the descendants of Louis Bolduc. who came to Canada in 1668, as the "Procureur du Roi." B. 22 June, 1847. Ed. in Ste. Marie Coll. and at Laval Univ. M. at St. Francois de la Beauce, 12 Oct., 1873, M. G. A. Mathieu. Is a notary and a lumber manufacturer. Was Mayor of the parish in which he resides, and Warden of the Co. of Beauce for several years; also a Dir. of the Levis & Kennebec Railway and of the Co. Agricultural Assoc. Has successfully promoted the building of the Tring & Megantic Railway, which gives Quebec and Levis the shortest route to the Maritime Provinces and New England. Was elected, June, 1876, a mem.

of the Prov. Board of Notaries for the Prov. of Quebec. Sat in the Commons for Beauce, from 18 Oct., 1876, until called to the Senate, 3 Oct., 1884. A Conservative.—St. Victor de Tring, Co. Beauce, P.Q.

Boucher DE Boucherville, Hon. Charles Eugene, M.D., C.M. (d. (Montarville).

Descended from Lieut.-Gen. Pierre Boucher, Sieur de Grosbois, Governor of Three Rivers in 1653, and founder of the Seigniory of Boucherville. S. of the late Hon. P. Boucher de Boucherville, a mem ber of the L. C. Can., by Amelie, sister of the Hon. C. C. S. de Bleury. B. at Boucherville, P.Q., 4 May, 1822. Ed. at St. Sulpice Coll., Montreal. Pursued his medical studies at Paris, where he graduated. M., 1st, Suzane, dau. of R. L. Morrough, Esq., advocate of Montreal; 2nd, Miss C. Lussier, of Varennes. Created a C.M.G., 26 May, 1894. Sat for Chambly in Can. Assem. from g. e., 1861, until the Union. Apptd. a mem. of the Leg. Council, Prov. of Quebec, July, 1867, and continues to hold his seat in that House. Was a member of the Ex-Council and Speaker of the L. C., P. Q., from July, 1867, to Feb., 1873. Became Premier of the Province and Secy, and Registrar and Minister of Public Instruction, 22 Sept., 1874; transferred to the Department of Agriculture and Public Works, 27 Jan., 1876. Dismissed by Lieut.-Gov. Letellier de St. Just in March, 1878. Was Premier a second time from 17 Dec., 1891, to Dec., 1892, when he resigned. Called to Senate, 12 Feb., 1879. A Conservative.— Boucherville, P.Q.

BOULTON, Lieut.-Col. Hon. CHARLES ARKEL (Marquette).

S. of Lieut._Col. D'Arcy Boulton, of Cobourg, Ont., by his wife, a dan. of the late Brig. Gen. Heath of the East India Co.'s Service. B. at Cobourg, 17 Sept., 1841, and ed. at U. C. Coll., Toronto. Obtained a commission in H. M. 100th Royal Canadian Regt. in 1857, and after serving in several parts of the world retired in 1868. Apptd. Major of the 46th Batt. V. M., in 1868. Went to Red River Settlement in 1869, and on account of the part he took in the political troubles which occurred there at that time, he was imprisoned for 30 days and sentenced to death by Riel, but was ultimately reprieved through the intervention of Sir Donald A. Smith and others. Return-

ing to Ont., he engaged in lumbering at Lakefield, and was Reeve of the Village for three years. Returned to Man. in 1880 and settled at Shellmouth. Was Warden of the Co. of Russell for three years, and afterwards Chairman of the Judicial Board of the Western Judicial Dist. On the breaking out of the North-West Rebellion in 1885, raised a corps of mounted ifflemen, and served through the campaign. (Medal.) Is author of Reminiscences of the North-West Rebellions. Called to the Senate, 10 Dec., 1889. A Liberal Conservative and a Free Trader.—Shellmouth, Man.

BOWELL, Lieut. Col. Hon. SIR MACKENZIE, P.C., K.C.M.G. (Hastings).

B. at Rickinghall, Suffolk, Eng., 27 Dec., 1823. Came to Can, with his parents, 1833. M., Dec., 1857, Harriet Louisa, eld. dau, of the late J. G. Moore, Esq., of Belleville. Was a Major 49th Batt. of Volunteer Rifles, and scryed upon the frontier during the American rebellion in 1864, and in 1866, during the Fenian troubles; rctired as Lieut.-Col. Has been Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Editors' and Reporters' Asso.; Vice_Presdt. of the Agricultural and Art Asso. of Ontario; Presdt. of the Hastings Mutual Fire Ins. Co., the Farren Manufacturing Co., the Dominion Safety Gas Co., and Presdt. of the Belleville & North Hastings Railway. Was Editor and Proprietor of the Belleville Daily and Weekly Intelligencer newspaper for a lengthened period; and has also been Presdt, of the Ontario Press Asso. Held the Chairmanship of the Board of School Trustees, Belleville, for eleven years; and was for eight years Grand Master of the Provincial Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario East. Elected Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign of the Orange Asso. of B.A., 1870—an office he continued to hold until he resigned in 1878. Was Presdt of the Tri-Annual Council of the Moved the resolution for the expulsion of Louis Riel from the Commons, which was caried 16 April, 1874. Was a special commissioner to Australia. in 1893, for the promotion of closer trade relations between Canada and that country; a mem. of and Chairman of the Colonial Conference, held in Ottawa in 1894, and Commr. for Canada in the Pacific Cable Conference held in London, 1896. Created K.C.M.G.,

1 Jan., 1895. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Customs, 19 Oct., 1878, and held that office until the death of the Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald, 6 June, 1891. Was also Minister of Customs in the administration of Sir John Abbott, from 16 June, 1891, to 24 Jan., 1892, when he was transferred to the Dept, of Militia and Defence, where he continued until the resignation of Sir John Abbott, 24 Nov., 1892. On the creation of the new department of Trade and Commerce, he accepted that portfolio in the Administration of Sir John Thompson, 5 Dec., 1892, and was Leader for the Government in the Senate until the death of Sir John Thompson, when he formed an Administration, and became Prime Minister, 13 Dec., 1894, and Presdt. of the Council, 21 Dec., 1894. Resigned, 27 April, 1896. Is now Leader of the Opposition in the Senate. Sat in the House of Commons from 1867 to 1891. Resigned his seat in the Commons, and was called to the Senate, 5 Dec., 1892. A Conservative.-William Street, Belleville; Rideau Club.

CARLING, Hon. SIR JOHN, P.C., K.C.M.G.

Youngest s. of Thomas Carling, Esq., of London, Ont., a native of Yorkshire, England, who came to Canada in 1818, and settled in Middlesex, Ont., 1819. B. in the Tp. of London, Middlesex, 23 Jan., 1828. Ed. at the Common Sch. there. M., Hannah, eldest dau. of the late Henry Dalton, Esq., of London, Ont. Was a mem. of the firm of Carling & Co., brewers, London, a dir. of the Great Western Railway for a number of years, and also a dir. of the London, Huron & Bruce and London & Port Stanley Railways. Elected a Water Commr. for London in 1878, and subsequently appointed Chairman of the Board. Created a K.C.M.G., 24 May, 1893. Was returned as a mem, for London to the Can, Assem., 18 Dec., 1857, and held the seat continuously from that time until Confederation. Was Receiver-General of Can. in 1862. Was elected in Aug., 1867, for the Commons, and held the seat up to the g. e., 1874; and also returned to the Leg. Assem., Out., 1867, holding the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture and Public Works in the Sandfield-Macdonald Govt. from July, 1867, until Dec., 1871, when the Govt, was defeated, and retired from office. Sworn of the Privy Council

and was Postmaster-General from 23 May, 1882, until 25 Sept., 1885, when he became Minister of Agriculture. Resigned this position, 25 Nov., 1892, but continued in the Cabinet without portfolio until Dec., 1894. Re-elected to Commons for London at g. e., 1878, and continued to sit for that constituency until the g. e., 1891, when he was an unsuccessful candidate. Sat in the Senate from 27 April, 1891, to Feb., 1892, when he resigned and was elected for London, having been an unsuccessful candidate at g. e., 1891. Continued a mem. of the House of Commons until 23 April, 1896, when he was again called to the Senate. A Liberal Conservative.—London, Ont.; Rideau Club.

CASGRAIN, Hon. CHARLES EUSEBE, C.M., M.D. (Windsor).

Paternal ancestors belonged to an ancient family at Ervault, in Poitou, France. The first to come to Can. was Jean Baptiste Casgrain, an officer in the French Army, who landed about 1750. His son Pierre was Lord of the Seigniories of Riviere Ouelle and L'Islet. Maternally descended from Jacques Babie, an officer of the Regiment of Carignan-Saliers, who landed in Quebec in 1665, and whose descendants of that name have occupied high and responsible positions in the country. S. of the late Hon. Charles Eusebe Casgrain, Lieut-Col. unattached, who sat for Cornwallis in the L. C. Assem. from 1830 to 1834; was a mem. of the Special Council of L. C. from 1838 to 1840, and at his death held the office of Asst. Commr. of Public Works, Can., by Anne Elizabeth, dau. of the late Hon. James Baby, at one time Speaker of the L. C. of U.C. B. at Quebec, 3 Aug., 1825. Ed. in classics at the Coll. of Ste. Anne's. Quebec, and in medicine at McGill Univ., Montreal. M., 1st, in 1851, Charlotte Mary, dau, of Thos. Chase of Detroit, Mich., formerly of Quebec. (She died 16 Mar., 1886.) 2nd, M. A. Dougall, eldest dau. of R. P. Street, Esq., formerly of Hamilton, Ont., now residing at Highland Park, Ills. Began to practice in Detroit in 1851, but removed to Sandwich in 1856. Is Coroner for Essex. Was Capt. of the Sandwich Co. V. M., and subsequently surgeon to the troops stationed at Windsor and Sarnia during the Fenian raids in 1861 to 1864. Was for two years mem. of the Municipal Council of Windsor, and has been a mem. of the Board of Education for 18 years. Was elected first Presdt. of the St. Jean Baptiste Soc. of Essex in 1864; General Presdt. of all the French Socs. of Essex in 1883, and as such presided at the French-Canadian Convention held at Windsor in 1883. Created a Knight of the Order of the Holy Sepulchre in 1884. Is a brother of the Abbe H. R. Casgrain and of P. B. Casgrain, ex-M.P. for L'Islet. Called to the Senate, 12 Jan., 1887. A Liberal Conservative.—Windsor, Ont.

CLEMOW, Hon. FRANCIS (Rideau).

S. of Capt. John Clemow, an officer in H. M. 41st Regt., who was severely wounded at the battle of Queenston Heights. B. at Three Rivers, P.Q., 4 May, 1821. Ed. at U. C. Coll., Toronto. Settled in Ottawa in 1841. M., 1847, Margaret, dau. of the late Col. Powell, of H. M. 101st Regt. Was for some years engaged in the forwarding business, and then became an Official Assignee under the Insolvent Act. Ig a dir. of the Ottawa Electric Co., and has been Manager of the Ottawa Gas Works since 1866. Was a member of the City Council, Cttawa, for two years, and Chairman for years of the Board of Water Commrs. Was Grand Master of the Orangemen, Co. of Carleton, for eight years. Was Chairman of the Committee of the Whole in the Senate, in 1892, on the Bill to Codify the Criminal Laws of Canada. Called to the Senate, 3 Feb., 1885. A Conservative. -575 Maria St., Ottawa: Rideau Club.

COCHRANE, Hon. MATTHEW HENRY (Wellington).

Family came to Can. from the north of Irel.. S. of the late Mr. James Cochrane, a Quebec trader. B. at Compton, 11 Nov., 1823. Has been a member of the firm of Cochrane, Cassils & Co., Montreal, extensively engaged in the manufacture of boots and shoes. Is an eminent cattle importer and breeder. Is a trustee of Lennoxville Univ.; a mem. of the Council of Agriculture of Quebec; a dir. of the Eastern Townships Bank, and of the Waterloo & Magog Railway Co., Presdt. of the Cochrane Ranch Co., the British American Ranch Co., and of the Bigelow Heel Co. Called to the Senate, 17 Oct., 1872. A Conservative.—Hillhurst Farm, Compton, P.Q.; St. James Club, Montreal; Rideau Club.

Cox, Hon. George Albertus (Saugeen).

Of English parentage. B. in Colborne, Co. of Northumberland, Ont., 7 May, 1840. Ed. in the public and grammar schools there, until Feb., 1856, when he entered the service of the Montreal Telegraph Co., and in 1858, went to Peterborough, where he was the Company's Agent for several years. M., May, 1862, the second dau, of Mr. Daniel Hopkins. Became a dir. in 1885, and Presdt. in 1890, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce; Presdt. of the Central Canada Loan & Savings Co., of the Western Fire & Marine Insur. Co., and of the British America Fire & Marine Insur. Co.; a dir. of the Canada Life Assur. Co'y., the Toronto Trusts Co., the Canadian General Electric Co., and the Peterborough Lock Manufacturing Co. Is one of the Bursars of Victoria Univ., and Presdt. of the Ontario Ladies' College. Was Presdt. and General Manager of the Midland Railway, from 1871 until 1884, when it became part of the Grand Trunk Railway System. Was Mayor of Peterborough, for 7 years. Elected for West Peterborough in the Commons in 1871, but the election was set aside: at the new election which followed, he was an unsuccessful candidate and again at g. e., 1887. Called to the Senate, Nov., 1896. A Liberal.—Toronto.

DEBLOIS, Hon. PIERRE ANTOINE (LaSalle).

B. in the City of Quebec about 1818. M. Miss Genevieve Lefebre. Is engaged in farming. Formerly a merchant in Quebec. Has been Mayor of the Parish of Beauport. Is an uncle of Hon. Sir A. P. Caron, M.P. Called to the Senate, 13 Feb., 1883. A Conservative.—Beauport, P.Q.

DEVER, Hon. JAMES (St. John).

B. at Ballyshannon, Irel., 2 May, 1825. Came to N. B. early in life, and was ed. at St. John. M., 25 Nov., 1853, Miss Margaret Morris. Is a retired merchant. Called to the Senate, 14 March, 1868. A Liberal.—5 Chipman Hill, St. John, N.B.

Dobson, Hon. John (Lindsay).

B. in the Co. of Fermanagh, Irel., 8 Sept., 1824. Came to Can. in 1852, and after a residence of two years in Toronto, settled in Lindsay, Ont., where he has since been a merchant. Was elected Mayor of Lindsay by acclamation in 1873, and first Presdt. of the Lindsay Board of Trade. Has also been Presdt. of the Lindsay Central Agricultural Soc. and of the Mechanics' Institute, and Chairman of the School Board. Was Presdt. of the South Victoria Liberal Conservative Assoc. for 25 years. Called to the Senate, 23 Feb., 1892. A Liberal Conservative.—Lindsay, Ont.

DICKEY, Hon. ROBERT BARRY, Q.C. (Amherst).

S. of the late R. M. Dickey, Esq. B. at Amherst, N.S., 10 Nov., 1811. Ed. at Windsor Academy. M., Oct., 1844, Mary Blair, third dau. of the late Hon. Alex. Stewart, C.B. Called to Bar N.S., Jan., 1834, and to that of N.B., 1835. Apptd. a Q.C. 1863. Has retired from active practice. Has been a dir. of the N. S. Electric Telegraph Co., and Consular Agent for the United States at Amherst. Was a delegate from N. S. Govt. to Eng. on the subject of Intercolonial Railway, 1858 and 1865; and to the Charlottetown and Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Was a mem. of the L. C. of N.S. from Jan., 1858, until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Conservative.—Amherst, N. S.; Halifax Club; Rideau Club.

DRUMMOND, Hon. GEORGE ALEXANDER (Kennebec).

B. 1829, at Edinburgh, Scotland. Ed. at Edinburgh High School and University. Came to Montreal in 1854; married, 1st, 1857, Helen, dau. of the late John Redpath; 2nd, 1884, Grace Julia Hamilton, dau. of late A. Davidson Parker. Not in business, but interested in a number of commercial, manufacturing and mining companies. Is Vice-Presdt. of Bank of Montreal. Called to the Senate, 1 Dec., 1888. A Conservative.—Sherbrooke st., Montreal; St. James Club, Montreal; Reform Club, London, England; Kideau Club, Ottawa; Manhattan Club, New York.

FERGUSON, Hon. DONALD, P.C.

Grand parents came from Blair in Athol, Perthshire, Scot., and settled in P.E.I., in 1806. B. at East River, P.E.I., 7 March, 1839, M., 26 March, 1873, Elizabeth, dau. of the late John Scott, of Charlotte-

town. Is a farmer. Was elected to the House of Assem. in 1878, for the Cardigan Dist., of King's Co., on the resignation of the sitting member, by acclamation. On the defeat of the Davies administration on a vote of want of confidence in March, 1879, he entered the Sullivan administration as Commissioner of Public Works, and was again elected by acclamation. In 1880, he became Provincial Secretary and Commissioner of Crown Lands. In 1882, he contested the Fort Augustus Dist. of Queen's Co., and was elected, and was re-elected for the same seat in 1886, 1887 and 1890. In 1891, he resigned his place in the Provincial administration and Legislature to contest Queen's Co. for the Commons, and was unsuccessful. Was called to the Senate in Sept., 1893, and became a member of the Bowell administration without portfolio, 21 Dec., 1894, and continued in the same position, in Sir Charles Tupper's administration. Was one of the earliest advocates of Confederation in P.E.I., and remains a firm believer in Canadian and Imperial unity. A Liberal Conservative.—Tulloch, near Charlottetown, P.E.I.

FORGET, Hon. Louis Joseph (Sorel).

Ancestors came to Can. from Normandy, in France, about 1600. B. at Terrebonne, 11 Mar., 1853, and ed. at Masson Coll. M., 2 May, 1876, Maria Raymond, of Montreal. Is a banker and stock broker, and Presdt. of the Montreal Street Railway Co., the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Co., and of the Montreal Stock Exchange, and Vice-Presdt. of the Board of Governors of Laval Univ. Apptd. to the Senate, June, 1896. A Conservative.—Montreal.

GOWAN, Hon. JAMES ROBERT, C.M.G., LL D., Q.C. (Barrie).

Only s. of the late H. H. Gowan, Esq., who, emigrating from Irel., settled in the Tp. of Albion, and became Clerk of the Crown and Pleas, Dist. of Simcoe. B. in Co. Wexford, Irel., 22 Dec., 1815. Ed. in Can. Admitted to the Law Soc. of Upper Can., 1834. Served during the Can. Rebellion 1837-8. Lieut. in 4th Reg., North York Militia, in 1840. M., 1853, Anna, dau. of Rev. S. B. Ardagh, M.A., Rector of Barrie. Called to the Bar U.C., 1839, and apptd. Judge of the Judicial Dist. of Simcoe, 17 Jan., 1843, became Senior Judge, 1872; apptd. to the High Court of Justice,

Ont., March, 1882; retired Oct., 1883. Received Hon. degree of LL.D., Univ. of Queen's Coll., Kingston, 1884, and apptd. Q.C. by Dominion Govt., 14 Dec., 1889. Admitted a mem. of the Hon. Soc. of King's Inns, and on 5 Nov., 1890, was called to the Irish Bar by the Lord Chancellor of Ireland. Created a C.M.G., 3 June, 1893. Much of the reform and regulation of the legal procedure of the several courts in Ontario is due to him Assisted in the consolidation of the Statutes of Can. in 1858 and 1859; in 1869 in the consolidation of the Criminal Law, and in 1876 in the consolidation of the Statute Law of Ontario. Was the Judicial mem, of the Board, apptd, to settle the difference between the Govt, and the contractors for the Public Buildings at Ottawa; Chairman of the Board of Judges for Ont., 1869 to 1887; a mem. of the Commission to inquire into the constitution and jurisdiction of the several Courts of Law and Equity in Out., 1871, and on the 14 Aug., 1873, apptd. a mem. of the Royal Commission to investigate the charges against the Ministry in connection with the Canadian Pacific Railway contract: Chairman of "The Board of Public Instruction" from 1844 to 1871, and Chairman of the Barrie Collegiate Institute by annual election, 1881 to 1890. Called to the Senate, 29 Jan., 1885. During the Session of 1888 framed and introduced Rules reforming the procedure in the Senate with respect to applications for Divorce, which Rules were ultimately adopted by and now govern the House. HINGSTON, Hon. SIR WILLIAM HALES, KNT., M.D., D.C.L., LL.D. (Rougemont).

S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Hingston, formerly of H. M. 100th Regt., which, at the close of the last American War, became the 99th Regt., and when disbanded, he settled on the banks of the Chateauguay River. B. near Huntingdon, P. Q., 29 June, 1829. Ed. at the Montreal Coll. and McGill Univ., and afterwards at Edinburgh, where he took his diploma as a surgeon. Began practice in Montreal, in 1853. M., 1875, a dau. of the late Hon. D. A. Macdonald, formerly Postmaster Gen. and afterwards Lieut.-Gov. of Onta-

rio. Has been President of the Canadian Medical Assoc., of the Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons, of the Medico-Chirurgical Soc., and was Vice-Presdt. of the British Assoc. for the Advancement of Science. Is LL.D. of Victoria Univ., and D.C.L. of Lennoxville Univ. Was Mayor of Montreal in 1876 and 1877, a dir. of the Montreal Savings Bank, and is the author of The Climate of Canada, and its Relations to Life and Health. Knighted by Her Majesty, May, 1895. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Montreal Centre, at by-election held Dec., 1895. Called to the Senate, 2 Jan., 1896. A Liberal-Conservative.—882 Sherbrooke St., Montreal.

KING, Hon. GEORGE GERALD.

Eldest s. of the late Malcolm King, of Fintry, Scot., by Elizabeth, dau. of Edward Hickson, of Miltown, Irel. B., 11 Dec., 1836, at Springfield, King's Co., N.B., and ed. at the Public School there. M., 23 Oct., 1860, Esther, dau. of Ebenezer Briggs. A merchant. Was Warden of Queen's Co. for one term. Sat in the Commons from g. e., 1878, to g. e., 1887, at which election he received a majority of votes, but was deprived of the seat by the action of the Returning officer declaring his opponent elected. At the by-election which followed, he was an unsuccessful candidate. Re-elected at g. e., 1891, and again at g. e., 1896. Resigned July, 1896. Called to the Senate, Dec., 1896. A Liberal.—Chipman, N.B.

KIRCHHOFFER, Hon. JOHN NESBITT (Selkirk).

Great grandfather a mem. of a Swiss family, went to Ireland as a Surgeon with William. Prince of Orange. S. of the Rev. Richard B. Kirchhoffer, who was Rector of Ballyvourney Parish, Co. Cork, Irel. B. there, 5 May, 1848. Ed. at Marlborough Coll., Wiltshire, one of the Great Public Schools of England. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1871, and practised law in Port Hope, Ont., with his uncle, the late Nesbitt Kirchhoffer, Q.C. Called to the Bar, Manitoba, 1884. M., 1st, Ada, dau. of the late William Smith, Esq., Port Hope: and 2nd, Clara, dau. of the late Rev. J. B. Howard, Port Hope. Founded and successfully completed the "Plum Creek Settlement" in Manitoba, now the most thriving part of that province. Was successively Reeve and Mayor of Souris, and a mem. of the

Western Judicial District Board, of which he subsequently became Chairman. Sat in the Leg. Assem. of Manitoba, from 1886 to 1888. Called to the Senate, 16 Dec., 1892. Was Chairman of the Senate Divorce Committee for the Session, 1896. A Conservative.—Brandon, Man.; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.

LANDRY, Hon. Auguste Charles Philippe Robert, A.B. (Studacona).

S. of the late Dr. J. E. Landry, of Quebec, by the late Caroline E. Lelivre. B. at Quebec, 15 Jan., 1846. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary, where he obtained the degree of B.A. and at St. Anne Agricultural Coll. M., 6 Oct., 1868, Wilhelmina, dau. of the late Etienne Couture of St. Gervais. A farmer. Is a mem. of the Council of Agriculture of the Prov. of Quebec, to which position he was called after having obtained the first prize and gold medal for the best treatise on Agriculture. Presdt. of the Montmagny Agricultural Soc.; Vice-Presdt, of the Union Agricole Nationale of the Prov. of Quebec; Secretary of the Montmagny No. 3, Colonization Soc.; mem. of the Entomological Soc. Can.; Lieut.-Col. of the 61st Batt. of Montmagny and L'Islet; A. D. C. to His Excellency the Governor-General; Presdt. of the Quebec Conservative Assoc.; Presdt, of the Syndicat des Cultivateurs de la Proy, de Quebec; mem, of the Bibliographical Soc. of Paris: Knight of the Order of St. Gregory the Great, and Knight Com. of the Military Order of the Holy Sepulchre. One of the Commissioners of the Province of Quebec to the Chicago Exhibition. Author of Traite Populaire d'Agriculture Theo ique et Pratique ; Les Boissons alcoholiques et leurs falsifications; On est la disgrace, and other scientific, literary and political pamphlets. Was an unsuccessful candidate in 1873 for the Local House. First returned to the Quebec Leg. Assem, for the County of Montniagny at g e., 1875. Unseated 29 May, 1876, by judgment of the Superior Court. Returned to the Commons at g.e., 1878; re-elected at g.e., 1882; an unsuccessful candidate at the g. e., 1887. Called to the Senate, 23 Feb., 1892. A Conservative.—Mastai, P. Q.

LEWIN, HOH. JAMES DAVIES (St. John).

Descended from the Lewins of Womaston, Radnor-shire, Wales, a family of private country gentlemen.

B. at Womaston, Radnorshire, 1 April, 1812. Ed. at Kington (Wales) Grammar School. M., 1832, Sarah Ann, dau. of the late Sheriff Clarke, N.B., a U. E. Loyalist (she d. 1882). In early life entered the service of the British Govt., and in that service came to N. B. in 1830, and continued thus for twenty years, when, upon the abolition of the Dept. with which he was connected, was elected in 1855 Presdt. of the Bank of N. B., maintaining that position ever since. Called to the Senate, 10 Nov., 1876. A Liberal.—Nt. John, N B.

LOUGHEED, Hon. JAMES ALEXANDER, Q.C. (Calgary).

B. in Brampton, Co. of Pecl, Ont., 1 Sept., 1854.
M. Sept., 1884, eldest dau. of the late Chief Factor William Hardisty of the Hon. Hudson's Bay Co. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1877; apptd. Q.C. by Dominion Govt..
23 Nov., 1889. Began practice in Toronto, but moved in 1882 to the North-West and settled in Calgary, N.W.T. Called to the Senate, 10 Dec., 1889. A Liberal Conservative.—Calgary, N.W.T.

LOVITT, Hon. John (Yarmouth).

Eldest s. of the late John W. Lovitt. B. at Yarmouth, 9 Oct., 1832. Ed. at the Academy there. M. 26 Jan., 1860, Elizabeth, second dau. of the late Robt. Guest. Is a master mariner and shipowner. Was a dir. of the Pacific Insu. Co. from its formation until it ceased to do business. Is a dir. of the Bank of Yarmouth, the Yarmouth Water Co. and Township dir. of the Western Counties Railway Co. Sat in the N.S. Ho. of Assem. for Yarmouth from g. e., 1874, until 1878, when he was not a candidate. Sat in the House of Commons from g. e., 1887. to g. c., 1891. A Liberal.—Yarmouth, N.S.

McCallum, Hon. Lachlan (Monck).

B. in the Island of Tiree, Argyleshire, Scot., 15 March, 1823. Came to Can. in 1842. M., Oct., 1854, Priscella Dawson Thewlis. Is a contractor, shipbuilder and shipowner. Was Reeve of the united Townships of Moulton and Sherbrooke for several years. Was Captain of the Dunnville Naval Company, which he commanded at Fort Erie during the Fenian Raid, June, 1866. An unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand in Can. Assem. at g. e., 1863. Sat. in the Commons from g. e., 1867, until g. e. 1872, when defeated. Sat. in Leg. Assem., Ont., from g. e., 1871, until 1872, when he resigned in consequence of the passing of the Act abolishing dual representation. Re-elected to the Commons at g. e., 1874; unseated on petition, 12 May, 1875. Re-elected 22 June, 1875, and sat until the dissolution of that Parlt. in 1887. Called to the Senate 4 Feb., 1887. A Liberal Conservative.—Stromness, Ont.

MACDONALD, Hon. ANDREW ARCHIBALD (Charlottetown).

Descended from the Clanronald branch of the Macdonalds of the Isles. S. of Hugh and Catherine Macdonald of Panmure, and grand-s. of Andrew Macdonald who purchased a large tract of land in the Province. and with his family and retainers emigrated from Inverness-shire, Scot., and settled at Three Rivers, P.E.I. in 1806, where he and his sons carried on an extensive mercantile business for many years. B. at Three Rivers. P.E.I., 14 Feb., 1829. M., in 1863, Elizabeth, dau. of the late Thomas Owen, formerly Provincial Post-Master General. Ed. at the County Grammar School and by private tutor. Sat for Georgetown in the Ho. of Assem. from 1854 until 1860. When Leg. Council became elective in 1863, was returned for King's Co. 2nd Dist. in Leg. Co., and re-elected in 1867; continued a mem. of that body until July, 1873, when appointed Post-Master General of the Province. Was one of the delegates to the Charlottetown Conference on the Union of the Lower Provinces in 1864, and in Sept. of the same year a delegate to the Quebec Conference which succeeded it, and arranged the basis of Union of all the B.N.A. Colonies. Was a delegate to the International Convention at Portland, U.S., 1868, and a mem. of the Board of Education, 1867 to 1870. Is a Public Trustee under the Land Purchase Act 1875. Was a mem. of the Ex.-Council from 1867 to 1872, and again from 18 April, 1872, until Confederation. Was leader of the Govt. party in Leg. Council for some years. Was Lieut.-Governor of P. E. I. from 1 Aug., 1884, to 2 Sept., 1889. Called to the Senate 11 May, 1891. A Liberal Conservative.—Charlottetown.

MACDONALD, Hon. WILLIAM JOHN (Victoria, B.C.).

Descended from Somerled, Thane of Argyll, and Lord of the Isles. Third s. of the late Major Alexander Macdonald, of Valley, North Uist, and Glendale, Isle of Skye. B. in Co. of Inverness, Scot., 29 Nov., 1832. Ed. there. Came to B. C. in 1851. M., 17 March, 1857, Catherine, second dau. of Capt. J. M. Read, of Hon. H. B. Co's service. Has acted as Capt. of Militia and a Collector of Customs. Elected Mayor of the city of Victoria, 1866, and again in 1871. Served as a mem. of first Board of Education, Road Commr., etc. Sat for Sooke in V.I. Assem. from 1859 for several years, and was also a mem. of the L.C. of B.C. Apptd. to the Senate on B. C. entering the Dominion, 13 Dec., 1871. A Liberal Conservative.—Armadale, Victoria; Union Club, Victoria, B.C.

MACFARLANE, Hon. ALEXANDER, Q.C. (Wallace).

Of Scottish descent. S. of the late Hon. Donald Macfarlane. B. at Wallace, N. S., 17 June, 1818. M. Anne, dau. of Amos Seaman, Esq., of Minudie, N. S. Called to the Bar of N.S. Dec., 1844. Apptd. Q.C. June, 1867. Is a Surrogate of Vice-Admiralty, and presdt. of the Spring Hill Mining Co. Sat for Cumberland in N.S. Assem. from 1856 until the Union. Was a mem. of the Ex.-Council of N. S. from 1865 to time of Union, and holds rank and precedence as such by patent from the Queen. Was one of the delegates from N. S. to the Colonial Conference in London, to complete terms of Union, 1866-67. Called to the Senate, 10 Oct., 1870. A Conservative.—Wallace, N.S.; Halifax Club.

MacInnes, Hon. Donald (Burlington).

B. at Oban, Argyleshire, Scot., 26 May, 1824. Came to Can. in 1840. M., 30 April, 1863, Mary Amelia, fourth dau. of the late Hon. Sir J. B. Robinson, Bart. Commenced business in Dundas, subsequently removing to Hamilton, and was for some years one of the leading merchants in Canada. Was Presdt. of the Bank of Hamilton, of the Canada Cotton Co. of Cornwall, and of the South Saskatchewan Valley Railway Co., and is now a dir. of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co, and of the Canada Life Insu. Co. Was Chairman of the Royal Commission apptd. 16 June, 1880, to inquire into the organization of the Civil Service of

Canada. Called to the Senate, 24 Dec., 1881. A Liberal Conservative.—"Dundurn," Hamilton; Rideau Club; Toronto Club; St. James Club; Manitoba Club.

Masson, Hon. Louis Francois Rodrigue, P.C. (Mille Isles).

Fourth s. of the late Hon. Joseph Masson, and brother of the late Hon. Edouard Masson, M.L.C. Born at Terrebonne, P.Q., 7 Nov., 1833. Ed. at the Jesuit Coll., Georgetown, and at Worcester, U. S., and completed his classical studies at the Coll, of St. Hyacinthe, P.Q. M., 1st, 1856, Louisa Rachel, eld. dau, of the late Lieut.-Col. Alexander Mackenzie, and grand-dau, of the Hon. Roderick Mackenzie, an Ex-Councillor of L. C. (she d. 24 July, 1880); 2nd, 1883, Cecile, dau. of John H. Burroughs, Esq., Quebec. Called to the Bar, L.C., Nov., 1859. Has been Mayor of Terrebonne. Has held a commission in the Can. Vol. Militia Force since Oct., 1862, and was Brigade Major 8th Military Dist. L. C., from 1863 to 1868. Served on the frontier during the first Fenian raid. March, 1866, and was on active service during the second raid, in the same year; promoted Lieut.-Col., 1867. Is author of an Historical sketch of the old North West Company ("Les Bourgeois de la Compagnic ou Nord-Ouest"), comprising numerous unpublished documents, letters and journals relating to the early history of the North-West Territories. Sworn of the Privy Council, as Minister of Militia and Defence, 19 Oct., 1878. Resigned, 15 Jan., 1880, and accepted portfolio of Presdt. of the Council, which position he was compelled to resign through ill-health, 8 Nov., 1880. Sat in the Commons for Terrebonne from 1867 until 30 Sept., 1882, when called to the Senate. Has also been a Leg. Councillor, P.Q. On the resignation of Hon. Mr. Mousseau, Premier of Quebec, was called by the Lieut.-Governor to form an Administration, but was compelled to decline owing continued ill-health. Was Lieut.-Governor of Prov. of Quebec, from 7 Nov., 1884, until 28 Oct., 1887, when he resigned. Re-apptd. to the Senate, 3 Feb., 1890. A Conservative.—Terrebonne, P. O.

McDonald, Hon. William, J.P. (Cape Breton).

Descended from a Scottish family. Parents and grandparents emigrated from the Island of Uist.,

Scot., about 1827, and settled in the Co. Inverness, N.S. B. at River Denys Road, Inverness, 7 Oct., 1837. Ed. there and at St. Francois Xavier Coll., Antigonish. M., Feb., 1865, Kate, dau. of Mr. D. McDonald, of East Bay, C.B. A merchant. Was offered the shrievalty of his Co. in 1872. Held several municipal and provincial offices which he resigned previous to g. e., 1872. Sat for Cape Breton in the Commons from g. e., 1872, until called to the Senate, 12 May, 1884. Was Chairman of the Immigration and Colonization Committee of the House of Commons for four years. A Liberal Conservative.—Little Glace Bay, N. S.

McInnes, Hon. Thomas Robert, M.D., C.M. (New West-minster).

Fourth s. of the late John McInnes, Esq., formerly of Inverness, Scot., and latterly of Lake Ainslie, N.S., by Mary, third dan, of Capt, Edward Hamilton, of Paisley, Scot. B. at Lake Ainslie, N.S., 5 Nov., 1840. Ed. at Normal School, Truro, N.S., and Harvard Univ., Boston, U.S. Graduated M.D., at Bennet Coll. of Medicine and Rush Med. Coll., 1869, and a mem. of the Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons, Ont., 1873. M., 5 Oct., 1865, Mrs. Webster, relict of the late Geo. M. Webster, Esq., of Dresden, Ont. Elected by acclamation Reeve of Dresden, Ont., Jan., 1874. Was Mayor of the City of New Westminster, B.C., from Jan., 1876, to Jan., 1878. Physician, and Surgeon to the Royal Columbia Hospital since May. 1874. Apptd. Medical Superintendent of British Columbia Lunatic Asylum, July, 1878. Sat for New Westminster in the Commons from 26 March, 1878, until apptd. to the Senate, 24 Dec., 1881. Thoroughly independent in politics. Favors compulsory voting and equitable reciprocity with the U. S.-Michigan Street, Victoria, B.C.

McKeen, Hon. David (Cape Breton).

Ancestors came to Canada from Scot. and north of Irel. S. of the late Hon. William McKeen, M.L.C., N.S. B. at Mabou, N.S., 20 Sept., 1839, and ed. there, at Halifax and in Boston. M., 1st, 1867, Isabel, dau. of the late Henry Poole, Esq., Derby, Eng. (she died); 2nd, 1877, Frances M., dau. of the late William

Lawson, merchant, Halifax (she died); 3rd, 1888, Janie K., dau. of the late John Crerar of Halifax. Is Agent and Treasurer of the Caledonia Coal & Railway Company. Has been Sub-Collector of Customs, U. S. Consular Agent, a Municipal Councillor and Warden of the Co. of Cape Breton. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1887; re-elected at g. e., 1891, and sat until Jan., 1896, when he resigned. Called to the Senate, 21 Feb., 1896. A Conservative.—Caledonia Mine, Little Glace Bay, N.S.; Rideau Club.

McKay, Hon. Thomas (Truro).

Eldest s. of the late William McKay, who came from Sutherlandshire, Scot., and settled in the Co. of Pictou, N.S. B. in Co. Pictou, N.S., 8 Jan., 1839. Ed. there. M., Nov., 1868, Miss Jessie Blair, of Truro. A merchant. First returned to Parlt. for Colchester at g. e., 1874. Unseated on petition, 14 Nov., 1874; re-elected and sat from 17 Dec., 1874, until May, 1881. Apptd. to the Senate, 24 Dec., 1881. A Liberal Conservative.—Truro, N.S.

McKindsey, Hon. George Crawford (Milton).

Parents, who were natives of the North of Irel., came to Can. in 1819, and settled in the Co. of Halton. B. in the Tp. of Trafalgar, Co. of Halton, 29 March, 1829. Ed. at Common school and by private tutor. M. at Brockville, 19 Oct., 1859, Teresa Crawford. Held the offices of Deputy Sheriff from July, 1855, to Oct., 1858, and Sheriff of the Co. of Halton from Oct., 1858, to June, 1882. Has been a J.P. and a Capt. in the Militia, and Presdt. of the Agricultural Asso. of the Co. of Halton. Called to the Senate, 11 Jan., 1884. A Conservative.—Milton, Ont.

McLaren, Hon. Peter (Perth).

S. of James McLaren who came from Perthshire, Scot., and settled at Lanark, Ont., in 1820. B. there, 21 Sept., 1833. Ed. at the Common Sch. M., dau. of William Lees, Esq., ex-M.P.P. for South Lanark. Was for many years extensively engaged in the manufacture of timber and sawn lumber, but retired from business in 1887. Called to the Senate, 21 Feb., 1890. A Conservative.—Perth, Ont.

McMillan, Hon. Donald, M.D. (Alexandria).

Descended from a mem. of the Clan McMillan of Falcon Grove, Glengarry, Scot. B. in Glengarry, Ont., 5 March, 1835. Ed. there, and by private tutor. Graduated M.D. at the Medical department of the Victoria Univ., Toronto, 1865. M., in St. Thomas, 17 Nov., 1857, Amy Ann, daughter of Amasa Lewis, Esq., J.P., Aylmer, Ont. Is a J.P. and an Asso. Coroner for Glengarry. Was for some years a member of the County Council, and has been a Vice-Presdt. of the Medical Asso. of Ont. Is an hon. mem. of the Celtic Soc. of Montreal. Called to the Senate, 11 Jan., 1884. A Conservative.—Alexandria, Ont.

MERNER, Hon. Samuel (Hambury).

S. of Jacob Merner, farmer, in Reichenbock, Canton of Berne, Switzerland. B. there, 29 Jan., 1823. Ed. there. Came to Canada with his parents in 1837. M. in Preston, Ont., Nov., 1845. Mary Ann, dau. of Joseph Grasser, of Wilmot, Ont. Was in business some years as an iron founder and furniture manufacturer. Has for many years been instrumental in settling in the Province all the Swiss people immigrating to Can. Was Warden of the Co. of Waterloo, in 1873, and has been Reeve of New Hamburg for several years. Was an unsuccessful candidate for South Waterloo in the Leg. Assem., Ont., at the bye-election in 1877. Sat in the Commons for same seat from g. e., 1878, to g. e., 1882, when he was defeated. Called to the Senate, 12 Jan., 1887. A Conservative.—New Hamburg.

MILLER, Hon. WILLIAM, Q.C., P.C. (Richmond).

Descended on paternal side from a family that emigrated from Belfast, Irel., in 1720, and settled in Maine, U.S., a branch of which removed to Colchester, N.S., in 1760, great grandfather being one of the original grantees of the Township of Truro. S. of Charles Miller of Antigonish, N.S., by Eliza, dau. of Richard Smith, Esq., who with his family came to N.S. from Co. Wicklow, Irel., and settled at Antigonish, in 1811. B. at Antigonish, N.S., 12 Feb., 1834. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Andrews, and the Antigonish Academy. M., Oct., 1871, Annie, dau. of the late Hon. James Cochrane, of Halifax, N.S.

Called to the Bar, N.S., May, 1860. Apptd. Q.C., 1872. Sat in N.S. Assem. from g. e., 1863, until the Union, and while in that House rendered important assistance to the Union cause. Being in favor of Confederation, but opposed to the financial conditions and other details of the Quebec scheme of Union, it was on his suggestion and with his assistance that the compromise was effected whereby the delegation to England was appointed in 1866, in order to secure, under the auspices of the Imperial authorities, such modifications of that scheme as would make it more acceptable to the people of N.S. Was nominated a delegate to the London Colonial Conference of 1866-67, but declined the appointment. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, 1867. Was Chairman of Private Bills Committee of the Senate during several sessions; also Chairman of the Contingent Committee (Internal Economy) of that House for some years; and is now chairman of the Senate Committee on Railways and Canals. Was also Chairman of the Select Joint Committee of both Houses of Parliament on the Bill to Codify the Criminal Laws of Canada, 1892. Has twice declined a seat on the Bench-first, when offered by Premier Mackenzie, and afterwards when offered by Sir J. A. Macdonald. Was Speaker of the Senate from 17 Oct., until 3 April, 1887. Was offered by the late Premier, Sir J. A. Macdonald, the leadership of the Senate, in place of Sir Alex. Campbell, on the latter's recommendation, in 1886. Apptd. a mem. of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, 30 May, 1891. A Liberal Conservative.—Halifar; Arichat. N.S.

MILLS, Hon. DAVID, Q.C., P.C.

Family, which came from near Plymouth, Eng., proceeded to Holland in the time of Charles I., thence to New England with the Puritans, and the descendants removed to N.S. at the time of the Am. Revolution. S. of Nathaniel Mills, who removed from N.S. to Can., 1817. B. in the Tp. of Oxford, Kent, Ont., 18 March, 1831. Graduated at Michigan Univ. M., Dec., 1860, Miss M. J. Brown. Called to the Bar, Ont., 1883. Apptd. Q.C. by Ont. Govt., 1890. Was Superintendent of Schools for Co. of Kent, from April, 1856, to April, 1865. Was employed by Ontario Govt. to define the North-western Boundary of the Prov.,

1872, and was one of the counsel on the argument before the Privy Council in Eng. in 1884. Author of a pamphlet on The Present and Future Political Aspects of Canada (1860); and another on The Blunders of the Dominion Government in connection with the North-West Territory (1871). Elected a mem. of the Council of Public Instruction for Ont. (representing the School Inspectors), Aug., 1875. Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Minister of the Interior, from 24 Oct., 1876, until resignation of Govt., Oct., 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1867; reelected at g. e., 1872, 1874 and 1878. Was a candidate at g. e., 1882, but was unable to take his seat in the House until declared by the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada to have been improperly deprived of the seat. Re-elected at g. e., 1887 and 1891. An unsuccessful candidate at g. e., 1896. Called to the Senate, Nov., 1896. An advanced Liberal.—Palmyra, Ont.

Montplaisir, Hon. Hypolite (Shawanegan).

S. of Mr. Paschal Montplaisir, by Victoire Crevier. B. at Cap de la Madeleine, P.Q., 7 March, 1839. Ed. at Three Rivers. A farmer. Has been Secretary and Treasurer of Schools, and Mayor of the parish. Sat in the Commons for Champlain from g. e., 1874, to the close of the Sixth Parlt. in 1891. Called to the Senate, 9 Feb., 1891. A Liberal Conservative.—Cap de la Madeleine, P.Q.

MOWAT, Hon. SIR OLIVER, K.C.M.G., Q.C., LL.D., P.C.

Eldest s. of the late John Mowat, Esq., formerly of Canisby, Caithness-shire, Scot., who, after serving in the British Army during the campaign in Portugal and Spain under Lord Wellington, came to Can., 1816, and settled at Kingston, by Miss Levack; and brother of the Rev. Prof. Mowat, D.D., of Queen's Univ., Kingston. B. in Kingston, 22 July, 1820. Ed. there. M., 1846, Jane, second dau. of the late John Ewart, Esq., of Toronto. Studied law with the late Sir John A. Macdonald, and afterwards with Mr. Justice Burns. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1841. Apptd. Q.C. in 1856. Created a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, 24 May, 1892. Is a Bencher ex officio of the Law Society of Ont.; LL.D. (Hon.), of Toronto Univ.. and Queen's Coll., Kingston. Was a mem. of the

City Council of Toronto for two years, and has been Presdt. of the Canadian Institute, Toronto. Was Presdt. of the Evangelical Alliance of Ont., from 1867 to 1889, and a Commr. for Consolidating the Public General Statutes for Can. and Upper Can., in 1856. Was a mem. of the Quebcc Conference, held in 1864, to discuss the Union of the Provinces. Sat for South Ont. in the Can. Assem., from 1857 to 1864, and was Provl. Sec. (in the Brown-Dorion Administration) from 2 to 6 Aug., 1858; Postmaster-General (in the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Administration), from May, 1863, until March, 1864; held the same office (in the Coalition Govt.), from June, 1864, until 14 Nov., same year, when appointed Vice-Chancellor of U.C., an office he resigned, 25 Oct., 1872, to re-enter political life. Was Premier and Attorney Gen. of Ontario from 31 Oct., 1872, to 9 July, 1896. when he resigned. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Minister of Justice, in the Laurier Administration, 13 July, 1896. Sat for North Oxford, in the Leg. Assem., Ont., from Nov., 1872, until his resignation, 9 July, 1896. Called to the Senate, 15 July, 1896. A Liberal.—63 George St., Toronto; Cartier St., Ottawa.

O'BRIEN, Hon. James (Victoria).

B. at Aughnagar, Co. Tyrone, Irel., 3 Aug., 1836, and ed. there. Came to Can. in 1850, and in 1858 began business in Montreal, in the wholesale clothing and dry goods trade, from which he retired in 1893. Is a dir. of the City and District Savings Bank, a member of the Board of Trade, a Life Governor of the Montreal General Hospital, the Western and Notre Dame Hospitals, a trustee of St. Patrick's Orphan Asylum and a Governor of Laval Univ. Was one of the founders of the Dominion Commercial Travellers' Assoc. Called to the Senate, 2 Jan., 1896. A Liberal Conservative.—Sherbrooke St., Montreal; St. James' Club.

O'Donohoe, Hon. John, Q.C. (Erie).

Descended from the ancient family of his name, having their chief seat at Glenflesk, Kerry, Irel. B. at Tuam, in Galway, 18 April, 1824, and ed. at St. Jarlath's Coll. there. Arrived in Toronto in 1839, and has continued to reside there ever since. M.,

1848, Charlotte Josephine, dau. of Dr. Bradley, of Toronto (she d. 1854). Was engaged in commercial pursuits for some years. Called to the Bar, Ont., Hilary term, 1869. Apptd. Q.C., 4 Oct., 1880. Is a Captain in the Militia. Sat as an Alderman in the City Council of Toronto, 1857, and again in 1859, and on those occasions was Chairman of the Finance Committee, and represented the Corporation at the Board of Governors of Toronto General Hospital. Was Secy. of St. Patrick's Benevolent Soc. during the Presidency of the late Hon. Robt. Baldwin, and held the office of Presdt. for many years after Mr. Baldwin's retirement. Was County Crown Attorney of the County of York and City of Toronto from 1872, to Jan., 1874, when he resigned in order to become a candidate for Parlt. Elected Presdt. of the "Ontario Catholic League," 3 April, 1871. Was an unsuccessful candidate for East Peterboro in Ont. Assem. at g. e., 1871, and for Toronto East in the Commons at g. e., 1872. First returned to Parlt. for East Toronto at g. e., 1874. Being unseated on petition, 26 Nov., 1874, he was again unsuccessful for the same seat. Called to the Senate, 31 May, 1882. A Liberal.—Jarris St., Toronto.

Ogilvie, Lieut.-Col. Hon. Alexander Walker, J.P. (Almu).

Descended from a younger brother of Gilchrist, Earl of Angus, a valiant soldier, who, in the 13th Century, was rewarded with the lands of Ogilvie in Banffshire, Scot., and assumed the name of the estate. Parents came to Can. in 1800, where his father served during the war of 1812 and during the rebellion of 1837 as a volunteer cavalry officer. B. at St. Michel, near Montreal, 7 May, 1829. Ed. in Montreal. M. Sarah, dau, of William Leney, Esq. In 1854 founded the firm of A. W. Ogilvie & Co., largely engaged in the grain trade, and proprietors of the Glenora Mills, Montreal. Retired from the firm in 1874. Is a Lieut.-Col. of Montreal Cavalry (retired list); Presdt. of the St. Michel Road Co.; and Chairman of the Montreal Board of directors of the London (Eng.) Guarantee Co.; Vice-Presdt. of the

Sun Life Insu. Co., and of the Montreal Loan and Mortgage Co.; a dir. of the Federal Telephone Co., and a Trustee of Mount Royal Cemetery. He has

been an Alderman for the City of Montreal; Chairman of the Montreal Turnpike Trust; Presdt. of the Workingmen's Widows' and Orphans' Benefit Soc., and of the St. Andrew's Soc. Sat for Montreal West in Leg. Assem., P.Q., from g. e., 1867, when returned by acclamation, until 1871, when he declined renomination. PRICE, Hon. EVAN JOHN, D.C.L. (Laurentides).

B. at Wolfesfield, near Quebec, 8 May, 1840. Ed. at a private school in Eng. Unmarried. Is the sole surviving partner in the extensive lumber manufacturing and exporting house of Price Bros., of Quebec and the Saguenay. Ross, Hon. John Jones, M.D., P.C. (De La Durantaye).

S. of G. McIntosh Ross, Esq., of St. Annes, formerly a West Indian merchant, by Marie Louise Gouin. B. at Ste. Anne de la Perade, 16 Aug., 1833. M., 1856, Marie Arline, dau. of Lieut.-Col. Lanouette, of Champlain. A physician and surgeon. Is Presdt. of the Prov. Coll. of Physicians and Surgeons; Honorary Presdt. of the Champlain Agricultural Soc.; and was a member of the Agricultural Council of Quebec from 1862 to 1890. Elected Vice-Presdt. of the North Shore Railway Co., 1875. Was a mem. of the Ex-Council, Quebec, and Speaker of the L.C. from 27 Feb., 1873, to Aug., 1874, when he resigned; re-appointed 27 Jan., 1876, and retained position until March, 1878, when Ministry was dismissed by Lieut.-Governor. Re_apptd. mem. of the Ex. Council. and Speaker of Leg. Council, 31 Oct., 1879. Was Commr. of Agriculture and Public Works from July, 1881, to March, 1882, when he retired from the Cabinet. Called to the Senate, 8 Feb., 1887. A Conservative.—Hamilton. Ont.

Scott, Hon. Richard William, Q.C., LL.D., P.C. (Ottawa).

On paternal side descended from an influential family in the Co. Clare, Irel. S. of the late W. J. Scott, Esq., M.D., who after serving on the medical staff of the army during the Peninsular war, came to Can., and subsequently became Registrar of the Co. of Grenville, Ont., by Sarah Ann, dau. of the late Capt. Allan McDonnell, of Matilda, Dundas, Ont., formerly an officer in the King's Royal Yorkers. B. at Prescott, 24 Feb., 1825. Ed. at Prescott. M. Mary Ann, dan, of the late John Heron, Esq., of Ottawa. Called to the Bar of U.C., Easter Term, 1848. Apptd. 3 Q.C., 1867, and LL.D. Univ. of Ottawa, 1889. Was Mayor of Ottawa, 1852. Elected speaker of the Ont. Assem., 7 Dec., 1871, but resigned on being apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council and Commr. of Crown Lands for that Prov., on 21 same month, in which office he remained until 7 Nov., 1873, when sworn of the

Queen's Privy Council. Was Secretary of State from 9 Jan., 1874, until 16 Oct., 1878, when the Mac-Kenzie Administration, of which he was a mem., resigned. Was Leader of the Opposition in the Senate, until the formation of the Laurier Administration, 13 July, 1896, when he again became Secretary of State. Sat for Ottawa in Can. Assem. from 1857 to 1863, when defeated; and for same seat in Ont. Assem. from g. e., 1867, until Nov., 1873, when he resigned. Sat in the Commons for Northumberland, N.B., from g. e., 1878, to g. e., 1882, when he retired. Called to the Senate, 1 May, 1891. An Independent.—Chatham, N.B.

SULLIVAN, Hon. MICHAEL, M.D. (Kingston).

B. at Killarney, Co. of Kerry, Irel., 13 Feb., 1838. Came to Can. in 1842, and settled at Kingston, Ont. Ed. at the Regiopolis Coll., and graduated M.D. at Queen's Coll., 1858. Is a wholesale grocer, a dir. of the Jacques Cartier Bank, and of the Dominion Cotton Mills. Was Mayor of the village of St. Jean Baptiste for twenty years, and subsequently represented the St. Jean Baptiste Ward in the City

Council of Montreal. Prefet of the Co. of Hochelaga for ten years, a Harbor Commissioner and Presdt. of the Commrs. of Mount Royal Park. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1886. The election being declared void, he was re-elected, 28 April, 1888, and again at g. e., 1890 and 1892; resigned, and was called to the Senate, 2 Jan., 1896. A Conservative.—592 St. Denis St., Montreal.

WARK, Hon. DAVID (Fredericton).

Descended by both parents from Scottish families that settled in Ulster in the 17th century. B. near Londonderry, Irel., 19 Feb., 1804. Came to N.B., 1825. M. Annie Elizabeth, dau. of Isaac Burpee, Esq., of Sunbury, N.S. A retired merchant. Is a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of N.B. Was a mem. of the Excouncil, N.B., from 1858 to 1862, and Receiver-General for a few months, 1867. Sat for Kent in N.B. Assem. from 1843 to 1851, when apptd. to L.C. of that Province, where he remained until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation May, 1867. A Liberal.—Fredericton, N.B.

Wood, Hon. Josiah, M.A. (Westmoreland).

S. of Mariner Wood, a merchant in Sackville, N.B. B. there 18 April, 1843. Ed. at Mount Allison Wesleyan Coll., Sackville, where he graduated in 1863, and received the degree of M.A. in 1866. M., 14 Jan., 1874, Laura S., dau. of Thompson Trueman, of Sackville. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1866. After practising a short time he relinquished the profession and entered his father's business, of which he is now the only surviving partner. Is also a shipowner and largely interested in farming and stock-raising. Is Treasurer of the Board of Regents of Mount Allison Coll. Unsuccessfully contested Westmoreland for Leg. Assem., N.B., at g. e., 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1882, and re-elected at g. e., 1887 and 1891. Resigned, and was called to the Senate, 5 Aug., 1895. A Conservative.—Sackville, N.B.; Rideau Club.

The House of Commons of Canada.

The House of Commons consists at the present time of 213 members, representing constituencies in the different Provinces of the Dominion as follows:—

This number is fixed under the provisions of the Act of Confederation, and the representation is rearranged after every decennial census, by Act of Parliament, the basis being that Quebec is always to have sixty-five representatives, and each of the other provinces such a number as will give the same proportion of representatives to its population as the number 65 bears to the population of Quebec, as ascertained by the census. British Columbia, by the terms of its admission into the Union, however, is never to have less than six members.

The members are elected for the term of a Parliament, which is five years from the day of the return of the writs for closing the House, subject to sooner

dissolution by the Governor-General.

No property or income qualification is necessary. The annual sessional allowance to each member is \$1,000 and mileage.—\$8 a day being deducted for each day's absence (beyond a certain number of days fixed at each Session), if the House is sitting, unless the absence is caused by illness after the member has been in attendance.

RECORD OF THE STATE OF THE POLITICAL PARTIES AFTER EACH GENERAL ELECTION SINCE 1867.

FIRST PARLIAMENT.

On the 1st of July, 1867, the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick were, under Royal Proclamation, dated May 22, 1867, confederated under the title of the Dominion of Canada. Lord Monck, the then Governor-General, entrusted Sir John A. Macdonald with the duty of forming the first Government of the Dominion. The first election was held in Sept., 1867—Confederation being the issue— Sir John appealing to the country to support him in building up the Dominion. At this election the Opposition raised no particular battle cry. To a certain extent they were indifferent. As many of their friends were in the Government, the principal leaders of the Opposition were willing to give the Ministry of Sir John Macdonald a fair trial, although the anti-Confederate party, particularly in the Maritime Provinces, was strong, and exerted itself to elect opponents to the Government The election, however, resulted as follows :-

The first Parliament of the Dominion opened Nov. 6, 1867, and was dissolved, 8 July, 1872. Manitoba entered the Confederation on July 15, 1870, and British Columbia on July 20, 1871. The last session was almost wholly devoted to discussing the proposed Canadian Pacific Railway and the British Columbia terms—one of the provisoes of the Pacific province entering the Confederation being that the railway should be commenced within two years from the date

of the union. Parliament passed measures providing for the construction of the road, after which Sir John Macdonald dissolved the House, and called upon the people to ratify the Canadian Pacific proposals, and thus enable him to carry out the terms with British Columbia. The Liberals, however, objected to the measures proposed, claiming that the projected line had never been properly surveyed, and that the cost of the line would overwhelm the country in a debt from which it would be impossible to extricate it.

SECOND PARLIAMENT.

The elections took place on July 20, 1872, and resulted in Sir John being sustained by a small majority, the figures being as follows:-

The second Parliament opened Mar. 5, 1873, and was dissolved on Jan. 2, 1874. Prince Edward Island entered the confederation on Sept. 17, 1873. This Parliament is memorable on account of the charges made against Sir John Macdonald of corrupt dealing with the Canadian Pacific Railway contract, and the subsequent resignation of his administration, Nov. 5, 1873. Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, the leader of the opposition, being sent for by the Governor General, succeeded in forming his ministry on Nov. 7, 1873.

The new Government were, it is presumed, natu rally disinclined to trust to a House which, on its assembling, was largely composed of Conservatives. and though the Pacific Railway matter had considerably broken up the party so far at least as that question was concerned, it was very improbable that they would give allegiance to the new ministry on other

questions.

THIRD PARLIAMENT.

It was, therefore, determined to have a new House, and on Jan. 7, 1874, the writs were issued. The Conservatives were thoroughly disorganized, while the Liberals went to the country with the "Pacific Scandal" as their battle cry, and Mr. Mackenzie was returned to power by an overwhelming majority, as the following figures will show:—

It will be seen that all the provinces, with the exception of Manitoba and British Columbia, gave the Liberals majorities, the former scoring a tie and the

latter going solid for the Conservatives.

Early in the third Parliament the question of Free Trade and Protection began to attract attention and became each year more prominent in the discussion of public affairs. A period of trade depression prevailed, and whether rightly or wrongly a great number of the people had arrived at the conclusion that, though the financial and industrial depression could not rightly be charged to the Ministry, yet they were much to blame for doing nothing for its alleviation. This, it was claimed, could be done by altering the tariff so as to afford an adequate protection to many important but suffering industries. Mr. Mackenzie's policy, however, was opposed to this, and as time moved on the contention against the policy of the Ministry became daily more and more bitter. Sir John Macdonald took advantage of this growing discontent, and it culminated during the session of 1877 into the great dividing question between the two parties. At each session, the Liberal Finance Minister, Sir Richard Cartwright, had been compelled to admit a decreasing revenue, and as yet had submitted no plan of relief. In 1877, Sir John Macdonald moved that the deficiency in the revenue should be met by a diminution of expenditure, aided by such a readjustment of the tariff as would benefit and foster the agricultural, mining and manufacturing interests of the Dominion. This was defeated, as were several others of a like nature proposed during the same session. The attack, however, was renewed the following year, when, on March 7th, Sir John took the first step in the official announcement of the course settled upon by the Conservative Opposition. when he moved in amendment to going into Com-

mittee of supply:-

"That this House is of the opinion that the welfare of Canada requires the adoption of a National Folicy, which by a judicious readjustment of the tariff will benefit and foster the agricultural, the mining, the manufacturing and other interests of the Dominion; that such a policy will retain in Canada thousands of our fellow-countrymen, now obliged to expatriate themselves in search of the employment denied them at home; will restore prosperity to our struggling industries, now so sadly depressed; will prevent Canada from being made a sacrifice market; will encourage and develop an active interprovincial trade, and moving (as it ought to do) in the direction of a reciprocity of tariff with our neighbors, so far as the varied interests of Canada may demand, will greatly tend to procure for this country, eventually, a reciprocity of trade."

This motion was defeated, as were a series of others on a like subject introduced during the session. But Sir John's object was gained. He had introduced his National Policy to the people, which was destined to play so important a part at the next clection, while the Government were compelled to announce more positively than ever their firm adher-

ence to their Free Trade opinions.

FOURTH PARLIAMENT.

Parliament was dissolved on August 17th, 1878, and the elections took place on Sept. 10th. The rallying cry of the Conservatives was the " National Policy, Reciprocity of Trade or Reciprocity of Tariff," while the Liberals stuck to their policy of "Tariff for Revenue." The result was an overwhelming victory for Sir John Macdonald, the following being the figures:—

Hon. Mr. Mackenzie and his colleagues resigning shortly afterwards, Sir John A. Macdonald was again called upon to form a Ministry.

FIFTH PARLIAMENT.

The fourth Parliament opened Feb. 13, 1879, and was dissolved, May 18, 1882. The Conservatives sought a ratification of the National Policy, while the Liberals claimed for their policy "Tariff Reform." The campaign resulted as follows:—

SIXTH PARLIAMENT.

The fifth Parliament opened Feb. 8, 1883, and was dissolved, Jan. 15, 1887. At the general election following, Sir John A. Macdonald appealed to the country in justification of the conduct of his Government in the execution of Riel, the leader in the North-West Rebellion of 1885, and for a renewal of the National Policy, while the Liberals raised the cry of tariff reform, and sought the condemnation of the Government for mismanagement of North-West affairs. The elections were held on Feb. 22, 1887, and resulted as follows:—

There were several Nationalists and Independents returned at this election, but all of them had their predilections, and on a straight party vote the government could count on the above majority.

SEVENTH PARLIAMENT.

The sixth Parliament opened April 13, 1887, and was dissolved, Feb. 3, 1891. The reasons assigned by the Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald, for dissolving Parliament were, that the Dominion Government had, through the Imperial Government, made certain proposals to the United States looking to an extension of Canada's Commerce, and that if such proposals resulted in a treaty which should be ratified by Canada, it was expedient that the Government should be able to deal with a Parliament fresh from the people rather than with a moribund House. The Government therefore appealed to

the people under the banner of the National Policy and Partial Reciprocity, while the Liberals unfurled the flag of Unrestricted Reciprocity. The election took place on 5 March, 1891, with the following result as confirmed by divisions on two motions in the House of Commons on 20 and 22 May, 1891, respectively:—

THE EIGHTH PARLIAMENT.

The seventh Parliament, which began on 29 April, 1891, expired by effluxion of time on the 28th April, 1896. During this term the Liberal Conservative party sustained the loss of its three ablest public men: Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir J. Abbott, and Sir J. Thompson, successively Prime Ministers of Canada, and in the dving days of Parliament, another change occurred in the Leadership of the party. when Sir Mackenzie Bowell, who had succeeded on the death of Sir John Thompson, gave place to Sir Chas. Tupper, Bart. The chief issues in this election were the Manitoba School question and the Tariff. Sir Charles Tupper believed that the good faith of confederated Canada was pledged to restore to the Roman Catholics of Manitoba their Separate Schools. On the other hand, Mr. Laurier, while not seriously contesting this pledge, urged that there should be further inquiry into the facts, and he asked the electorate to accept his assurance, that if the Liberals were returned to power, the Leader of the Manitoba Government, Mr. Greenway, would be ready enough to bring Manitoba into a conciliatory attitude. On the Tariff question, the Conservatives adhered to their protective policy. The Liberals, while professing a free trade policy, agreed that it was distant, and that the home industries of the country should have a measure of protection. The election took place on 23 June, 1896, with the following result, as confirmed by division in the House of Commons, on 8 Sept., 1896.*

Sir Charles Tupper resigned, 8 July, 1896, and on the following day His Excellency the Governor-General sent for Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, who on 13 July, 1896, informed His Excellency, that he had formed a Liberal Administration.

CARSCALLEN, ALEXANDER WILLIAMSON (North Hastings).

Grandfather, George Carscallen, was a U. E. Loyalist, who held a Captain's commission in the British Army, and during the Revolutionary War, he abandoned his property at Albany, N.Y., and came to Can. S. of Edward Riggs Carscallen, who was on active service as a Lieut. in Canadian Militia during the Rebellion of 1837. B. in Tp. of North Fredericksburg, Co. of Lennox, 14 Oct., 1844. Ed. at Napanee Academy and at the Univ. of Nashville, Tennessee, U.S.A. M., 16 Nov., 1874, Marcia Pringle. Is a private banker, and a J.P. Has been a Councillor and Reeve of his Township, and Chairman of the School Board. First returned to Parlt. at by-election, held 30 Dec., 1892, succeeding Hon. Sir Mackenzie Bowell, apptd. to the Senate. Re-elected at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Marmora, Ont.

CARROLL, HENRY GEORGE (Kamouraska).

S. of Michael Burke Carroll, by his wife Marguerite Campbell. B. at Kamouraska, 31 Jan., 1866 Ed. at Ste. Anne de Lapocatiere Coll. and graduated LL.B. at Laval Univ., Quebec, July, 1889. M., 1st June, 1891, Amazelie, dau. of L. Boulanger, Esq., merchant of Ste. Agathe. Is an advocate. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal, and in favor of unrestricted reciprocity.—Quebec.

CARTWRIGHT, Hon. SIR RICHARD JOHN, K.C.M.G., P.C. (South Oxford).

S. of the late Rev. R. D. Cartwright, Chaplain to the Forces of Kingston; and grands. of Hon. Richard Cartwright, a U.E. loyalist, who was a mem. of the first Parlt. of U.C., which met in 1792, and continued to hold a seat in that body until his death, 1815. B. at Kingston, 4 Dec., 1835. Ed. at Trin. Coll., Dublin. M., Aug., 1859, Frances, eldest dau. of the late Col. Alex. Lawe, H.E.I.C.S. Was Presdt. of the late Commercial Bank of Can. Author of a Pamphlet on the Militia question (1864). Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Finance of Can., 7 Nov., 1873, which position he held until the resignation of Mr. Mackenzie's administration, Oct., 1878. Proceeded to England on public business, 1874 and 1875, and again in 1876. Sat for Lennox and Addington in Can. Assem. from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons for Lennox, at g. e., 1867; again at g. e., 1872; again on his appt. to office; and by acclamation at g. e., 1874. An unsuccessful candidate at g. e., 1878, elected for Huron on resignation of Mr. Horton, the sitting mem., 2 Nov., 1878. An unsuccessful candidate for Wellington County g. e., 1882. Returned by acclamation for South Huron on the resignation of the sitting mem., Mr. McMillan, Dec., 1883. Re-elected for present seat at g. e., 1887, 1891 and 1896. Created a K.C.M.G., 1879. On the formation of the Laurier Administration, he was again sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Minister of Trade and Commerce, 13 July, 1896. A Liberal.-King Street, Kingston, Ont.; Rideau Club.

CASEY, GEORGE ELLIOTT, B.A., J.P. (West Elgin).

S. of the late William Casey, Esq., of Southwold, Elgin, Ont., and formerly of Westmeath, Irel., by Sarah, dau. of the late Geo. Elliott, Esq., a native of Omagh, Irel., who came to Elgin, then a portion of the Talbot Settlement, in 1817, and took a prominent part in local affairs. B. in Southwold, March, 1850. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Thomas, and at the Univ. of Toronto, where he graduated (with honors in classics), June, 1871. M., 27 Dec., 1877, Master in Laws summa cum laude, and took the Dufferin Medal. M., in Quebec, 15 May, 1878, Marie elected at g. e., 1874, 1878, 1882, 1887, 1891 and 1896. Was Government whip under the Mackenzie Administration. Began agitation for Civil Service Reform on the English Competitive System in 1875, and has succeeded in getting his plan endorsed by the several Committees dealing with the subject, as well as by the Civil Service Commission of 1880. Introduced bill in 1879 to avert trouble arising from irregular dealing with ballots by Returning Officers. A Reformer.—Fingal, Ont.

CASGRAIN, THOMAS CHASE, Q.C., LL D. (Montmorency).

A mem. of one of the oldest French families in Can. S. of Senator Charles E. Casgrain, M.D., and of Charlotte M. Chase, of Windsor, Ont. B. in Detroit, U.S., 28 July, 1852. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec and at Laval Univ., where he graduated in 1877, as Master in Laws summa cum laude, and took the Dufferin Medal. M., in Quebec, 15 May, 1878, Marie Louise, dau. of Alex. Le Moine, Esq. Apptd. Q.C., April, 1887. Is Professor of Criminal Law at Laval Univ., and was granted the degree of Doctor of Law by that Institution, on 13 Oct., 1883. Has represented the Crown during several terms at the Court of Queen's Bench, Crown Side, and was Junior Counsel for the Crown at the trial of Louis Riel and other rebels at Regina, July, 1885. Sat in Leg. Assem. of Quebec, from g. e., 1886, until May, 1896, when he resigned and was elected to the House of Commons. Apptd. a mem. of the Executive Council, 20 Dec., 1891, and became Attorney-General in the DeBoucherville Administration. Subsequently re-apptd. to the same position in the Taillon Administration. A Conservative.—Union and Garrison Clubs, Quebcc; St. James Club, Montreal; Rideau Club, Ottawa.

CHARLTON, JOHN (North Norfolk).

Father came from Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Eng., in 1824. B. near Caledonia, N.Y., 3 Feb., 1829. Ed. in New York. Came to Can. with his father's family, in 1849, from Ellicottville, N.Y., where his father had been for many years in the employ of the Holland Land Co. Family settled on a farm near Ayr, Ont. M., 1 Nov., 1854, Miss Ella Gray. Worked on his father's farm for four years; went to Lynedoch in 1853, and opened a country store in partnership with Geo. Gray, Esq. Is now a timber and lumber dealer, and carries on business in Canada, Michigan and New York. Was Chairman of the Ontario Mining Commission, 1888-9. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1872; re-elected at g. e., 1874, 1878, 1882, 1887, 1891 and 1896. Has taken a prominent part in promoting

moral legislation. Was the chief promoter of the bill known as the Charlton Act. Has for many years urged, without success, the passage of a law to secure Sunday rest, as a civil right for employees, and to prohibit the publication of Sunday newspapers. Is a Liberal, and believes that no public issue rivals in importance the necessity for seeking to increase the prosperity of Canada, by obtaining more liberal trade relations with the United States.—Lyncdoch, Ont.

CHAUVIN, LÉON ADOLPHE (Terrebonne).

B. at Terrebonne, P.Q., 20 July, 1861, and ed. at Montreal Coll. M., 1889, Berthe Gagnon, of Quebec. Is a mem. of law firm of Archambault & Chauvin, Montreal. Was Chief Census Officer for the Prov. of Quebec, in 1891, and was Secretary of "La Societe Canadienne d'Economie Sociale," Montreal. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal Conservative.—1598 Notre Dame St., Montreal.

CHOQUETTE, PHILIPPE AUGUSTE, LL.B. (Montmagny).

Ancestors came from Amiens, Picardie, France, in 1643, and settled in Varennes, Co. of Vercheres. S. of Joseph Choquette, farmer, and Marie T. Audet, his wife. B. at Beloeil, Co. of Vercheres, 6 Jan., 1854. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe Coll. and at Laval Univ., where he graduated B.C.L. in 1880, having previously taken the Silver Medal given by Lord Lorne, late Governor-General. M., 29 Aug., 1883, Marie, dau. of A. Bender, Prothonotary, and a grand-d, of the late Sir E. P. Tache. Is in practice as an advocate. Has been for some years a contributor to the newspaper press, and publishes — Montmagny, newspaper. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e., 1882. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1887, and reelected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. A Liberal.—Montmagny, Q.

CHRISTIE, THOMAS, M.D. (Argenteuil).

Third s. of the late John Christie, by Elizabeth Nichol, both of Stirlingshire, Scot. B. in Glasgow, Scot., March, 1824. Came to Can. with his parents in 1827. Ed. at McGill Univ., and graduated M.D., 1848. M., Oct., 1849, Catherine, dau. of the late Peter McMartin, of St. Andrews, P.Q. Has been Chairman of

Board of School Commrs. for Parish of St. Jerusalem D'Argenteuil, and has been Secretary of Lachute Academy. Was Warden of Argenteuil for some years. Acted as Asst. Surgeon at Point St. Charles during the ship fever, 1847. First returned to Parlt. for present seat by acclamation, 31 Dec., 1875; re-elected at g. e., 1878, but unseated, and was an unsuccessful candidate at one by-election. Re-elected at g. e., 1891, and again at last g. e. A Liberal,—Lachute, P.Q.

CLANCY, JAMES (Bothwell, Ont.).

Second s. of the late Patrick Clancy, a native of the Co. of Roscommon, Irel. B. in the Tp. of Mosa, Co. of Middlesex, Ont., 21 July, 1844. M., 28 July, 1868, Emily, dau. of the late Alex. McIntosh. Is a farmer. Was a mem. of the Town Council of Dresden, and has been Reeve of Chatham on several occasions. Sat in Leg. Assem. of Ontario from 1883 to 1894, when he was an unsuccessful candidate. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Wallaceburg, Ont.

CLARKE, EDWARD FREDERICK (Toronto).

Third s. of the late Richard Clarke, merchant in Bailieboro' Co. Cavan, Irel. B. at Bailieboro', 24 April, 1850. Attended the National Model School there. Came to Can. in 1864, and settled in Toronto. M., 30 Dec., 1884, Charitte Elizabeth, dau. of D. Scott, Esq. Was Mayor of Toronto from 1888 to 1892. Sat in the Leg. Assem., Ont., from 1886 to 1894. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal Conservative.—397 Markham St., Toronto.

COCHRANE, EDWARD, J.P. (East Northumberland, Ont.).

S. of James Cochrane, a native of Yorkshire, Eng., by Mary Davis, of Wexford, Irel., who both settled in the Tp. of Cramahe, Ont., in 1826. B. there, 1st. Jan., 1834. Ed. at Colborne, Ont. M., 1st, 5 Aug., 1856, Miss Mary Hicks (she d. 3 July, 1872); 2ndly, 26 April, 1876, Ellen Louisa, dau. of Stephen Thorn, Esq. Is a farmer. Has filled all municipal positions in the Tp. of Cramahe, and was Warden of the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham in 1880. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1882. An unsuccessful candidate at g. e., 1887. The sitting mem., Dr.

Mallory, being unseated for bribery by agents, a new election was held 22 Dec., 1887, when Mr. Cochrane was elected. This election being declared void, another election was held 21 Nov., 1888, when he was again returned. Re-elected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. A Conservative.—Dundonald, Ont.

COPP, ALBERT JAMES SMITH (Digby)

Of English descent. S. of Thomas Copp, a Loyalist, who came from the United States, by Annie Carter, his wife. B. at Amherst, N.S. Ed. in Amherst Academy, also at Sackville and Dorchester, N.B. M., 1881, Eliza, youngest dau. of James A. Dennison, Esq., Judge of Probate, Co. of Digby. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1879, and has been Crown Prosecutor for the Co. of Digby since 1887. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Digby, N.S.

CORBY, HENRY (West Hustings).

Family came to Can. from Hanwell, Co. of Middlesex, Eng. B. in Belleville, 2 May, 1851, and ed. at the Common School there, and at Rockwood Academy, Ont. Took commercial course at Bryant & Stratton's Commercial Coll., Toronto. M., 23 Sept., 1872, Maria Courtney, of Belleville. Is a miller, distiller and importer of wines. Was first Asst. Chief Belleville Fire Dept.; and is now Presdt. of Ramblers' Bicycle Club, Bay of Quinte Yacht Club, Forest and Stream Club, and of the Cricket Club; and a dir. of the Bay of Quinte Agricultural Exhibition, and Vice-Presdt. of the Bay of Quinte Bridge Co., and Presdt. of Belleville Hotel Co. First returned to Parlt. by acclamation at by-election, held 17 March, 1888, and re-elected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. A Conservative.-Belleville, Ont.; Rideau Club.

COSTIGAN, Hon. JOHN, J.P., P.C. (Victoria, N.B.).

B. at St. Nicholas, P.Q., 1st Feb., 1835. Ed. at St. Ann's Coll. M., 1855, Harriet, dau. of Mr. J. R. Ryan, of Grand Falls, N.B. Has been Registrar of Deeds for Victoria, and Judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas, N.B. Sat for present seat in N.B. Assem. from 1861 to 1866, when defeated. Returned to Commons at the Union; re-elected at g. e., 1872,

1878, 1882, 1887, 1891 and 1896. Sworn of the Privy Council and was Minister of Inland Revenue, from 23 May, 1882, to 5 Dec., 1892. On the formation of the Thompson Administration, became Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and held that office in the Bowell and Tupper Administrations until 8 July, 1896, when he resigned with his Leader. Moved an address, 20 May, 1872, praying His Excellency to disallow the N.B. School Act., on the ground "that said law is unjust, and causes much uneasiness among the Roman Catholic population; " and on 14 May, 1873, "that the Goyt, should advise His Excellency to disallow the Act passed by the N.B. Legislature," which was carried. On 6 May, 1874, moved for an address to Her Majesty, praying to cause an Act to be passed amending the B.N.A. Act 1867, by providing that every religious denomination in N.B. shall continue to possess and enjoy all such rights with regard to their schools as they possessed and enjoyed at the time of the passage of the said Act, etc., which motion was subsequently withdrawn. On 8 March, 1875, moved resolution praying for the passage of an Act amending the B.N.A. Act, by providing that the Roman Catholic inhabitants of N.B. shall have the same rights, privileges, etc., as to separate and dissential schools, etc., as are enjoyed and possessed by the Roman Catholic minority of Ontario and the Protestant minority of Quebec, which, after amendment, was carried. In session 1877, moved for an inquiry into the case of Prof. O'Donoghue, charged with having aided in the North-West Rebellion. In session of 1882, moved and carried an address to Her Majesty passed on the "Costigan Irish Resolutions," praying that she would grant Home Rule Government to Irel., for the release of the "suspects" and other ameliorations, A Conservative.—Grand Falls, N.B.; Rideau Club, Ottawa,

COWAN, MAHLON K. (South Essex).

Father, a native of the Co. of Armagh, Irel., came to Can. in 1842. B., 10 May, 1863, at Blytheswood, Essex Co., Ont., and ed. at Brantford Collegiate Institute. M., 5 Jan., 1892, Clara S. Pilkey, of Brantford. Called to the Bar, Ontario, 1890. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Windsor, Ont.

CRAIG, THOMAS DIXON (Durham East).

B. in London, Eng., 20 Nov., 1842, and came to Can. when six months old. Ed. at Toronto Univ., where he graduated in 1864. Was Gold Medalist in metaphysics. Sat in Leg. Assem., Ont., from 1886 to 1890. Introduced the motion respecting French Schools in Ontario, which caused the Mowat Govt. to appoint a commission on the subject, and which was one of the principal planks in the platform of the Conservative party at the g. e., 1890, for the Ontario Legislature. First returned to the Commons, g. e., 1891 and reelected, 1896. A Conservative.—Port Hope, Ont.

Davies, Mon. Louis Henry, Q.C., P.C. (Queen's, P.E.I).

S. of Hon. Benjamin Davies, M.P.P., and grands. of Nathan Davies, Esq., who came to P.E.I., about 1812. B. in Charlottetown, P.E.I., 4 May, 1845. Ed. at the Central Academy, and Prince of Wales Coll. M., at St. Eleanors, P.E.I., July, 1872, Susan, fourth dau. of the late Dr. A. V. G. Wiggins. Called to the Bar, P.E.I., 1866, and apptd. a Q.C., 26 Nov., 1880. Is Presdt. of the Merchant's Bank of P.E.I. Was Counsel for the Tenantry before the P.E.I. Land Commission, presided over by the Right Hon. H. C. Childers, and was one of the Canadian Counsel before the International Fishery Commission, at Halifax 1877. Was Solicitor General of P.E.I. in 1869, and again in 1872-73, and Leader of the Opposition in the Leg. Assem., until Sept., 1876, when he became Premier and Attorney-General. His Administration resigned March, 1879. Sat in Leg. Assem., P.E.I., from Nov., 1872, until g. e., 1879, when he was defeated. First returned to Commons at g. e., 1882, and re-elected at g. e., 1887, 1891 and 1896. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, 13 July, 1896. Re-elected by acclamation on acceptance of office. A Liberal.—Riverside, Charlottetown, P.E.I.; Rideau Club, Ottawa.

DAVIN, NICHOLAS FLOOD, Q.C. (Assimiboia West).

Descended from an Irish family settled in Tipperary, for some generations. B. at Kilfinane, 13 Jan., 1843. Ed. at the Common School, by private tuition, at a Coll. affiliated to London Univ., and afterwards at Queen's Coll., Cork. Called to the English Bar by the Hon. Soc. of the Middle Temple, Hilary Term,

1868. Subsequently called to the Bar of Ontario, and is also a Barrister of the North-West Territories. Apptd. Q.C. by the Dominion Govt., 1892. Was war correspondent for the Irish Times and the London Standard during the Franco-German War, and was wounded at the siege of Montmedy. Was sent by the Canadian Govt. to Washington, U.S., 1879, to inquire into the system of management of Indian Industrial Schools, and went to Manitoba, to take evidence on the best location for such Schools, and on his report the present successful system of educating the Indian children, was based. Was Secretary to the Royal Commission respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway, 1880-81, and Secretary to the Commission apptd. in 1884 to inquire into the Chinese Immigration question. Established the Regina Leader in March, 1883. Was a delegate to Ottawa, in 1884, to represent the requirements of the N.W. before the Dominion Govt. Is the author of The Irishman in Can, : Eos: an Epic of the Dawn and other Poems; The Fair Grit; British versus American Civilization: The Earl of Beaconsfield; Culture and Praetical Power; Ireland and the Empire; France and Germany, Westminster Review, Jan., 1891, de., de. An unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand in the Commons at g. e., 1878. First returned to Commons at g. e., 1887, and re-elected at g. e., 1891, and at last g. e. A Conservative, and favors a broad and generous policy for developing and peopling the North-West.—Regina, N.W.T.; Albany Club, Toronto.

DAVIS, THOMAS OSBORNE (Saskatchewan).

A native of the City of Montreal, and settled at Prince Albert about 1876. Is a general storekeeper. Has been a Councillor and Mayor of the Town of Prince Albert. First returned to Parlt. at by-election held Dec., 1896, to fill vacancy caused by Hon. Mr. Laurier, who was elected for Saskatchewan and Quebec East, determining to sit for the latter constituency. A Liberal.—Prince Albert.

DECHENE, ARTHUR MIVILLE (L'Islet).

Brother to Gilbert Miville Dechene, M.P.P. for L'Islet in Leg. Assem., Prov. of Quebec. B., 1848. Ed. in Ste. Anne's Coll. M., 1891, Aurore Ouillet. Is a lumber merchant. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Village des Aulnaies, P.Q.

DESMARAIS, ODILON (Montreal, St. James Division).

Family came from Normandie, France—one of them being son-in-law to Champlain. B. in Joliette, 28 Feb., 1854. Ed. at the Coll. there, and afterwards in Law at McGill Univ., where he graduated B.C.L. M., at Three Rivers, 23 May, 1877, a sister of the late A. Gelinas, Editor of La Minerve. Is an advocate, and has also been a journalist for some years. Was a Councillor of St. Hyacinthe for two years, and Presdt. of several local societies. Sat in Leg. Assem. of Quebec for St. Hyacinthe, from g. e., 1890 until 1892. First returned to the Commons at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—1614 Notre Dame St., Montreal.

Devlin, Charles Ramsay (Wright).

S. of Charles Devlin, who came to Canada in 1842 from Roscommon Co., Irel. B. at Aylmer, P.Q., 29 Oct., 1858, and ed. at Montreal Coll. and Laval Univ. M., 27 Sept., 1893, Blanche, dau. of Charles de Montigny, of Ste. Scholastique. Is a merchant. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1891, for the Co. of Ottawa. Re-elected at g. e., 1896, for present seat. A Liberal.—Aylmer, P.Q.

DIMOCK, WILBERT D. (Colchester).

B. at Onslow, Colchester, N.S. Ed. at the Provincial Model and Normal Schools in Truro, and graduated at the Univ. of Acadia Coll., Wolfville, N.S. Unmarried. Is one of the proprietors and is editor of the Truro Daily and Weekly News. Was Principal of the Academy at North Sydney, C.B., and afterwards Headmaster of the Model Schools in Truro. Has been for some years connected with the Agricultural and Industrial Exhibitions in Nova Scotia. Was Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Dept. of the International Fisheries Exhibition held in London in 1883. Represented Nova Scotia at the Colonial and Indian Exhibition held in London in 1886; was Manager of the Maritime Provinces Exhibition, held in Moncton, N.B., 1887, and Superintendent of the Canadian Dept. of the Jamaica Exhibition, held in 1891. Holds diplomas and medals from all these Exhibitions. Was Sec.-Treas. of the Canadian branch of the World's Columbian Exposition, held in Chicago, in 1893. Sat in Leg. Assem. of N.S., from

March, 1894, to June, 1896, when he resigned, and was elected to present seat in the Commons at g. e., 1896. A Liberal Conservative.—Truro, N.S.

DOBELL, Hon. RICHARD REID (Quebec West).

S. of Mr. George Dobell, an independent gentleman of Liverpool, Eng. B. there in 1837; came to Quebeo in 1857. M. a dau. of the late Senator Sir David L. Macpherson, K.C.M.G., Toronto. Is largely interested in the business of exporting lumber and timber. Was an uusuccessful candidate for present seat at by-election held 1895. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. On the formation of the Liberal Administration, by Hon. W. Laurier, he was sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. a mem. of the Cabinet, without portfolio, 13 July, 1896. A Liberal.—Quebec; Rideau Club; Constitutional Club, London, England.

Domville, Lieut. Col. James (King's N.B.).

Only s. of the late Lieut.-General James William Domville, Royal Regiment of Artillery, by Frances, dau. of Hon. William Usher, a descendant of the celebrated Bishop Usher. B., 29 Nov., 1842. Ed in England. M., 1867, Isabel, dau. of the late William H. Scovil. Esq., of St. John, N.B. Was at one time extensively engaged in iron manufacturing and other commercial business. S. of Flavien Dupont, Esq., by Nathalie Fournier. B. at St. Simon, 1847, and ed. at St. Hyacinthe Coll. Unmarried. Admitted to practice as notary, 3 Oct., 1873. Has been Secretary and Treasurer of the Co. of Bagot, and of the Agricultural and Colonization Soc. of the same Co. First returned to Parlt. for present seat in Leg. Assem., P.Q., 7 July, 1876; an unsuccessful candidate at g. e., 1878. Elected for present seat in the Commons on the resignation of the Hon. J. A. Mousseau, 2 Sept., 1882, and re-elected by acclamation at g. e., 1887. Re-elected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. A Conservative.—St. Liboire, P.Q.

DUPRÉ, HERCULE (Montreal, St. Mary's Division).

DYMENT, ALBERT EDWARD (Algoma).

Father, Nathaniel Dyment, of Barrie, came to Can. with his father, John Dyment, from Devonshire, Eng., about 1837, and settled near Ancaster, Co. of Wentworth, Ont. B., 1869, at Lynden, Co. of Wentworth. Ed. at Barrie Collegiate Institute, and afterwards at U. C. College, Toronto. M., 1st June, 1892, Miss Chapman of Hamilton. Is a lumberman, and has served in the Barrie Town Council. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Thessalon, Ont.

Early, Thomas (Victoria City, B.C.).

Has been a frequent contributor

to the daily press and periodicals, and is author of several pamphlets. Was sent to British Columbia in 1874, by the Dominion Govt., to arrange terms for the postponement of the construction of the C. P. Railway. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1872, for the County of Monck, and sat until g. e., 1874. Unsuccessfully contested Centre Toronto at g. e., 1872. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e., 1882. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1887. The election being declared void, a new election was held 7 May, 1888, when he was re-elected. Re-elected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. A Liberal,—Rockland, Ont.; Rideau Club.

ELLIS, JOHN VALENTINE (St. John City).

Of Irish descent. S. of Michael and Margaret Ellis. B. at Halifax, N.S., 1835; moved to Montreal in 1854, to St. John, N.B., in 1857. M., 1864, at Fredericton, N. B., Mary Caroline, eldest dau. of the late Samuel Babbitt, Esq. Is Editor of the St. John Daily Globe, Was Postmaster of St. John for a short period. Sat in the Honse of Assem., N.B., from g. e., 1882, until Jan., 1887, when he resigned, and was elected for present seat in the Commons at g. e., 1887. An unsuccessful candidate at g. e., 1891; re-elected at g. e., 1896. Mr. Ellis is well known throughout Canada because of circumstances which arose in the Queen's (N.B.) election in 1887. Mr. G. G. King had a majority of the votes. Mr. John R. Dunn, the returning officer, gave the seat to the other candidate, George A. Baird, on the ground that King was not regularly nominated, through some

defect in making his report. All of the votes given to King were rejected. King applied to a County Judge for a recount. The Judge decided to make the recount, and set a date for doing so. Baird applied to a Circuit Judge (Tuck), for a stay, and this Judge Tuck granted. A copy of this order to stay proceedings was served on the County Judge, but he disobeyed the order and opened his count. Dunn, the returning officer, declined to give the ballots to the County Judge, and thus Baird got the seat for which King claimed to have the majority of votes. In his newspaper, the Globe, Mr. Ellis criticized and denounced the whole proceeding. He was held for contempt of court, and the matter was nearly seven years in litigation. His Counsel maintained that the proper proceedings against him should be for libel. Finally, the matter was decided against him by the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, there being no appeal to the Superior Court of Canada, and he was committed to jail for one month, fined \$200, and condemned to pay costs. His friends throughout Canada raised two thousand dollars, and paid all his expenses. A Libcral.—St. John. N.B.

ERB, DILMAN KINSEY (South Perth).

Great grandfather, Daniel Erb, came from Pennsylvania, in 1807, and settled in Co. of Waterloo, Ont. S. of Isaac Erb, farmer, near New Dundee, Ont. B. in Co. of Waterloo, in 1857. his parents in 1847, and settled in Admaston, where he has since been engaged in farming and lumbering. First returned to Parlt. at Ly-election held 2 Aug., 1887. Re-elected at g. e., 1891, and again at last g. e. An Independent Conservative.—Admaston, Unit.

Fielding, Hon. William Stevens, P.C., 2nd Member (Shelburne and Queen's, N.S.).

Of English descent. B. at Halifax, 24 Nov., 1848. Ed. there. M., 7 Sept., 1876, Hester, dau. of Thomas A. Rankine, Esq., of St. John, N.B. Is a journalist, and connected for many years with the Halifax Morning Chronicle. Is Presdt. of the St. George's Soc. of Halifax, and a Governor of Dalhousie Univ. At the Convention of the Liberal party held at Halifax after the resignation of the Thompson Govt., in 1882, the positions of Premier and Prov. Secy. were tendered to and declined by him. Entered the administration of Hon. W. T. Pipes, 22 Dec., 1882, having previously declined the offer of a seat in it. Resigned May, 1884. On the retirement of Hon. FOSTER, Hon. GEORGE EULAS, B.A., D.C.L., LL.D. P.C. (York, N.B.).

Descended from a U.E. Loyalist, who settled in N.B., 1783. B. in Carleton Co., N.B., 3 Sept., 1847. Ed. at the Common and Superior schools, in King's Co., and at the Univ. of N.B., where he graduated B.A., June, 1868. Spent 1872-3 at the Univ. of Edinburgh, Scot., and at the Univ. of Heidelberg, in Germany. Was Principal of Victoria Co. Grammar School, 1868-1869; of Sunbury Co. Superior School, 1870; Classical and Mathematical teacher Baptist Academy, Fredericton, 1871, and Principal of the Ladies' High School, Fredericton, 1872. Held the Professorship of Classics and History in the Univ. of N.B., from Sept., 1872, until Jan., 1879. Received Degree of D.C.L. from Acadia College, N.S., 1883, and of LL.D. from the Univ. of New Brunswick, in 1895. Has held the highest position in connection with the leading Temperance organizations in Canada and the United States. Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Minister of Marine and Fisheries from 10 Dec., 1885, to 29 May, 1888, when apptd. Minister of Finance. Held this office in the Macdonald, Abbott. Thompson.

Bowell and Tupper Administrations, until 8 July, 1896, when he resigned with his Leader. First returned to Parlt., for King's, at g. e., 1882. Resigned, and re-elected, 7 Nov., 1882. Re-elected on appointment to office, and again at g. e., 1887 and 1891. Elected for present seat at g. e., 1896. A Liberal Conservative. Q.C., 18 Feb., 1887. First returned to Ho. of Commons for Vereheres, at by-election in 1895, and re-elected at g. e., 1896. Godbout, Joseph, M.D. (Beauce).

S. of Joseph Godbout, farmer, a descendant of the first settler in St. Vital de Lambton, Co. of Beauce. B. there 12 May, 1850. Ed. at the Seminary in Quebec

and at Laval Univ., where he graduated in medicine. M., 8 Oct., 1878, at Quebec, Rachel Audet, who d. 21 Jan., 1881. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1887, and re-elected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. A Liberal.—St. Francois, Beauce, P.Q.

Guillet, George (West Northumberland).

Father, John Guillet, was a native of the Island of Jersey, and his mother, Charlotte, second dau. of John Payne, was born in Frome, Somersetsbare, Eng. B. in Cobourg, Ont., 1840, and ed. at the Public School there and at Victoria Coll. Unmarried. Is a merchant. Fifth s. of the late Hon. Robert Unwin Harwood, a native of Sheffield, Eng., who represented the Rigaud division, in the Leg. Council of Canada, until his death, in 1863—by dau. of the late Hon. Alain Chartier de Lotbiniere, Seigneur of Vaudreuil, de Lotbiniere and Rigaud, and grand-daughter of the Marquis de Lotbiniere. B. in Vaudreuil, 8 Aug., 1840. Ed. at St. Mary's Coll., Montreal. M., 17 May, 1864, Josephine Sidney, dau. of the late J. C. Brauneis, Esq. Is a Provincial Land Surveyor. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1891; unseated, and re-elected 1893. Re-elected at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Vaudreuil.

Henderson, David (Halton).

S. of John Henderson, who came from Scot. in 1832, and settled in the Tp. of Nelson, Ont. B. there, 18 Feb., 1841. Ed. at Milton Grammar School, and at the Normal School, Toronto. M., 1865, Alison, dau. of Charles Christie. Was Deputy Registrar of Deeds

for the Co. of Halton, 1866 to 1873. Is a general merchant. Has been a mem. of the Municipal Councils of Milton and Acton. First returned to Parliament at by-election held 1888, but the election was subsequently voided. Re-elected 1891; unseated, and re-elected 1892, and re-elected at g. e., 1896. Holds 1st Class "A" Provincial, Public School Inspector's, and Honor Certificates in English, French, German and History from Univ. of Toronto. M., 1st, in 1872, Caroline J., dau. of Major Isaac Preston, a U. E. Loyalist family, late of Vancouver, B.C., and 2ndly, Mary E., dau. of Harvey W. Burk, ex-M.P., West Durham. Has been the editor and publisher of the Victoria Warder, Lindsay, since 1885. Taught school in Belleville, Lifford and Bowmanville, and was first English Master of Toronto Collegiate Institute for 10 years, retiring in 1885. Past County Master Victoria Co. Orange Assoc., and Grand Officer of Grand Orange Lodge of Canada. Holds 1st and 2nd Class certificates of efficiency from the Canadian Military School of Instruction. Spent several years in the United States, in the flour milling business; returning to Canada, he went into business with his uncle, the late Thos. McKay, the business eventually being turned into a joint stock company, under the name of the McKay Milling Coy., of which he is now Managing-Director. Was a mem. of the Ottawa City Council from 1885 to 1891, and Chairman of the Board of Works for 4 years. Was a dir. of the Chaudiere Electric Light Co. and the Ottawa City Passenger Railway Co. Is now a dir. of the Ottawa Electric Railway Co., and the Ottawa Land Assoc. Has been a Dir. for several years, and is now Presdt, of the Central Canada Exhibition. IVES, Hon. WILLIAM BULLOCK, Q.C., P.C. (Sherbrooke).

S. of Eli Ives and Artemissa Bullock, of English extraction. Ancestors first settled in Connecticut; moved to the Co. of Stanstead among the first settlers on the Lake Memphremagog. B. in the Township of Compton, Co. Compton, 17 Nov., 1841. Selfeducated, after taking course in Compton Academy. Sat for Richmond and Wolfe in the Commons from g. e., 1878, to g. e., 1891, when he was returned for present seat. Re-elected by acclamation on acceptance of Office, and again at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Sherbrooke, P.Q.; Rideau Club.

JOLY DE LOTBINIÈRE, HON. SIR HENRY GUSTAVE, Q.C., K.C.M.G. (Portneuf).

S. of the late Gaspard Pierre Gustave Joly, Esq., Seigneur de Lotbiniere, by Julia Christin, dau. of the late Hon. M. E. G. A. Chartier de Lotbiniere, Speaker of the Quebec Assem. from 1794, until May, 1797, and afterwards a mem. of the L. C. of same Province. B. in France, 5 Dec., 1829. Ed. at Paris. M. the dau. of Hammond Gowan, Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Bar L. C., March, 1855. Apptd a Q. C., 9 March, 1878. Declined a seat in the Dominion Cabinct as Minister of Agriculture, Jan., 1877. On the dismissal of the DeBoucherville Administration by Lieut,-Governor Letellier de St. Just, in March, 1878, became Premier and Commr. of Public Works. His Ministry resigned 30 Oct., 1879. Was Leader of the Opposition from 1879 to 1883. Sat for Lotbiniere in Can. Assem. from g. e., 1861, until the Union, when elected by acclamation to both the Commons and Leg. Assem. Continued to sit in both Houses until g. e., 1874, when he retired from the Commons, and continued to sit in Leg. Assem. until he resigned in 1885. Was elected for present seat at g. e., 1896. On the formation of the Liberal Administration, by Hon. W. Laurier, he was apptd. Comptroller of Inland Revenue, 9 July, 1896. Created a K.C.M.G., May, 1895. A Liberal.—23 Mount Carmel St., Cape, Quebec.

KAULBACH, Lieut.-Col. CHARLES EDWIN Lunenburg).

Of German descent, son of Lieut,-Col. J. H. Kaulbach, High Shcriff of Lunenburg, N.S., and grandson of Henry Kaulbach, Esq., who was High Sheriff of the same Co. for an extended period. B. at Lunenburg, 13 July, 1834, and ed. there. Unmarried. Is a ship and real estate owner. Was a Capt. and Adjt. in the Militia, and for several years in command of the Volunteer Rifle Co. in Lunenburg. Is now Lieut.-Col. commanding the 75th Batt. Vol. Militia. Performed the duties of High Sheriff of the Co. for some years. Is Vice-Presdt. of the N.S. Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and of the Ottawa Board of Mercy. Director of Lunenburg Marine Insurance Co. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1878, and re-elected at g. e., 1882, but in consequence of the irregularity of two of the Deputy Returning Officers his opponent occupied the scat for one year which at the expiration of that time the Court declared vacant, and a new election being held Oct., 1883, he was re-elected. Parents came to Can. from Baden, Germany, about 1842. B. in New Germany, Co. of Waterloo, Ont., 22 Dec., 1847. Ed. at the Parochial School there. M., 1st June, 1880, Elizabeth Murphy, Guelph. Is a wholesale carriage hardware merchant. Has been an Alderman of the City of Guelph, and is a dir. of several trading corporations. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal-Conservative.—Guelph, Ont.

Langelier, Francois Charles Stanislas, Q.C., LL.D. (Quebec Centre).

S. of Capt. Louis Sebastien Langelier, by Julie Esther Casault. Descended on father's side from Sebastien Langelier, who came to Can. from Fresquienne, near Rouen, France, 1659, settled at Sillery, near Quebec, and thence removed to L'Islet, of which family the celebrated Bishop Langelier was a mem., and on mother's side from the Casaults of Granville, France, to which family the late L. J. Casault. founder of Laval Univ., and Mr. Justice Casault belong. B. at Ste. Rosalie, Bagot, P.Q., 24 Dec., 1838. Ed. in Classics at St. Hyacinthe Coll., and in Law at Laval Univ., where he graduated with honors, 1861. M., 1st, 2 Feb., 1884, Virginie Marie, dau. of the late I. A Liberal.—Hanover, Ont.

LANG, JOHN (East Peterhorough).

S. of James Lang, and Agnes Stewart, natives of Renfrewshire, Scot., who emigrated to Can. in 1832 and 1820, respectively. B. in the Village of Sheene, 10 April, 1839, and ed. in the Common School there. M., 9 Nov., 1866. Elizabeth Shearer. Is a farmer. Apptd. a J.P. in 1868. Sat in the Ontabee Tp. Co. for 16 years, and in the County Co. for 13 years, as Reeve and Deputy Reeve, and was Warden of his County in 1884. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1887. Was not a candidate at g. e., 1891. Re-elected at g. e., 1896. An Independent Liberal.—Jermyn, Ont.

LARIVIERE, ALPHONSE ALFRED CLÉMENT (Provencher).

Third s. of the late Abraham C. LaRiviere, of Montreal, P.Q., by the late Adelaide Marcil, of Longueuil, P.Q. B. in Montreal, P.Q., 24 July, 1842. Ed. at Jacques-Cartier Normal School, and at St. Mary's Coll., Montreal. M., 4 Feb., 1867, to Marie Melvina Bourdeau (she died 7 June, 1885). Graduated at the Montreal School of Military Instruction, 2nd class, 1365, and 1st class, 1866; apped. Ensign in the Reserve Militia, Military District of Hochelaga, P.Q., 1869, and Capt, for the Military District of Man., 1871, Was Presdt. of the Board of Arts and Manufactures for the Prov. of Quebec, of the Institut des Artisans Canadieus and of the Cercle St. Pierre, of Montreal. Received an appointment in the Dominion Lands Office, Winnipeg, when coming to Man., Oct., 1871, which he held till 1875. Acted as special correspondent of La Minerve (Montreal), for several years, and is now chief editor of Le Manitoba. Founded the Association N. Introduced and carried through the Legislature several important Bills, including the Civil Service Act, the Act respecting the Internal Economy of the Legislative Assem., a Consolidation of the Acts respecting the Department of Agriculture, the Treasury Department, and the election laws. On the resignation of Hon. Mr. Royal, on appt. as Lieut.-Governor N.W.T., was elected to present seat in the Commons at byelection held 24 Jan., 1889. Re-elected at g. e., 1891

LAURIER, Hon. WILFRED, B.C.L., Q.C., P.C. (Quebec East).

M., 13 May, 1868, Miss Lafontaine. Obtained degree of B.C.L. at McGill Univ., 1864. Studied law with Hon. R. Laflamme, Q.C., and was called to the Bar, L.C., 1864. Apptd. Q.C., 11 Oct., 1880. A dir. of the Royal Mutual Life Ins. Co. Edited Le Defricheur newspaper for a short time. Sat for Drummond and Arthabaska in Quebec Assem. from g. e., 1871, until Jan., 1874, when he resigned, and was elected to the Commons for the same constituency at g. e., 1874. Sworn of the Privy Council as Minister of Inland Revenue, Sept., 1877, which office he held until the resignation of the Mackenzie Administration, 1878; defeated in Drummond and Arthabaska upon appealing to his constituents; elected immediately after for Quebec East, upon resignation of Hon. I. Thibaudeau. Re-elected g. e., 1878, 1882, 1887 and 1891, and in 1896 for Quebec East and Saskatchewan-elected to sit for the former constituency. On the resignation of the Liberal-Conservative Administration of Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., 8 July, 1896, he formed a Liberal Administration, and became Prime Minister of Canada and Presdt, of the Council. Family came from Normandy, France. B. in Montreal, 1st Nov., 1866. Ed. at the Coll. of Nicolet and at Ottawa Univ. M., 15 May, 1894, Berthe, eldest dau. of Hon. Mr. Justice Jette. Admitted to the Bar of Prov. of Quebec, 1892, and received degree of Doctor in Law from Laval Univ., 1st May, 1896. Was Assistant Editor of La Patrie, 1886-7, and correspondent of L'Electeur, 1887-92. Is Consul for the U. S. of Colombia. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. First returned to House of Assem., N.B., at g. e., 1878, and continued a mem. until June, 1896, when he resigned, and was elected for present seat in House of Commons. Served as Private in 14th Batt, Vol. Militia, in Cornwall, in 1866, as Ensign in 1st Ontario Rifles in the Red River Expedition, 1870, under Sir Garnet (now Lord) Wolseley, and as Lieut. and Capt, in 90th Batt, in 1885. Is Presdt, of Manitoba Rifle Assoc. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1891. Resigned 1893. Sworn of the Privy Council, as a mem. of the Administration of Hon. First returned to Parlt. at g. c., 1887, and re-elected at g. c., 1891 and 1896. MACDONELL, JOHN ALEXANDER, C.E. (Selkirk).

M., 29 April, 1885, Janet MacLeod, of Woodstock, Ont. Is a cheese dealer and manufacturer of MacLaren's Imperial Cheese. Is Presdt. of the Dairyman's Assoc. of Western Ont. Was a judge of cheese at the World's Fair, in Chicago, and is the sole judge of cheese at Toronto and Ottawa Agricultural Exhibitions. Was Presdt. of the Young Liberal Conservative Assoc. of the City of Stratford. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Stratford, Ont.

MACLEAN, WHLLIAM FINDLAY (East York).

Forefathers were natives of the Island of Mull, Scot. S. of John Maclean who came to Can. in 1837, and became a prominent newspaper writer—especially on Protection, which he took up as the mission of his life in 1864, and lived to see take effect in Canada, as a National Policy. Elected mem. of the Senate of Univ. of Toronto for term of 1889-92. An unsuccessful candidate for North Wentworth in Ontario Leg. at g. e., 1890, and also for present seat

in the Commons at last g. e. First returned to Parlt. at by-election held 11 May, 1892, to fill vacancy caused by death of sitting member, Hon. Alex. Mackenzie. Re-elected at g. e., 1896. A Conservative and Protectionist. Believes that the first duty of the Parlt. of Canada is to bring about the development of our material resources, the settlement of our waste lands, and the encouragement of manufactures—also in the State regulation of railway freight and passenger rates.—Toronto; Rideau Club.

MACLENNAN, AUGUS, M.D. (Inverness).

S. of Francois Marcotte, merchant, Ste. Anne de la Perade. B. 25 Sept., 1866. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec, where he graduated in Medicine. Is Mayor of Ste. Anne de la Perade, and Prefet of the Co. of Champlain. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Ste. Anne de la Perade.

MARTIN, ALEXANDER (Queen's, P.E.I.).

S. of the late Alex. Martin, of Springton, P.E.I., who emigrated to P.E.I. from Uigg, Isle of Skye, in 1830. Mother was Isabella, dau. of the late Alex. Martin, of Belle Creek, P.E.I. B. at Springton in 1842. Ed. in the Common Schools and Normal School. M. 1859, Anne, dau, of the late Roderick McLeod, of Uigg, P.E.I. Taught school for nine years; is now a merchant and farmer. Sat in the House of Assem. of P.E.I. from 1884 to 1886, and in the Leg. Co. from 1886 to 1889, when he resigned and was an unsuccessful candidate for the House of Assem. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Conservative. In favor of the unity of the Empire and the maintenance of British connection by Canada; the development of the national resources of Canada; the protection and encouragement of native industry; extension of trade by extending and perfecting steam communication, and fair and equitable treaties with Great Britain and other countries, strongly in favor of a preferential trade treaty with Great Britain, and so far back as 1887, in the Leg. Co., P.E.I., introduced a resolution advocating a 5 per cent. differential duty.-Valleyfield, P.E.I.

Mr. Harnman's School, Blackrock; at Rev. Mr. Flynn's School, Dublin; and at Barrie Grammar School. M., 1st, 21 Oct., 1867, Emma Catherine, dau. of Edmund G. Lally, Esq., of Barrie; 2nd, 15 July, 1873, Agnes Elizabeth, relict of Rich. B. Bernard, Esq. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term 1859. Apptd. a Q.C., 18 Dec., 1872. Is a Bencher of the Law Soc. of Ontario. Was Presdt. of Agricultural Soc. of North Riding of Simcoe until its dissolution by the division of North Riding into East and West Ridings, since which he has been Presdt. of the West Riding Agric. Soc. Has also been Presdt. since formation, 1873, of the Liberal-Conservative Assoc. of North Riding of Simcoe. Contested North Simcoe unsuccessfully, 1872-74. First returned for Parlt. for Cardwell, 14 Dec., 1876. Returned for North Simcoe g. e., 1878, and re-elected g. e., 1882, 1887 and 1891. Is of Norman French descent. B. on Allumette Island, P.Q., in 1847. Ed. there, and in Ottawa Coll. M., 1870, Eleanore, second dau. of the late John Poupore, Esq., formerly M.P. for Pontiac. Is a mill owner, contractor and farmer. Was Mayor of Chichester from 1872 to 1882; Warden of the Co. of

Pontiac in 1881-82, and Chairman of the Board of School Commrs. of Chichester from 1873 to 1881. Sat for Pontiac in Leg. Assem. Prov. of Quebec, from March, 1882, to g. e., 1892. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Morrisburg, Ont.

Powell, Henry A. (Westmoreland).

Descended from Thomas Powell, who emigrated from Wales, and settled in Huntingdon, Long Island, in the State of New York, about 1660. His greatgrandson, Caleb Powell, from whom the subject of this sketch is descended, remained loyal to the British Crown during the American Revolution, and after the close of the War came with his family as Loyalists to New Brunswick, and settled near Gagetown on the St. John River. The most of his children removed to Richibucto, N.B. B. at Richibucto, 6 April, 1855. Ed. at Kent Co. Grammar School, and at Mount Allison Univ., from which he graduated in 1875. Family stttled in Chambly towards 1680. B. in Longueuil, P.Q., 16 Sept., 1850. Ed. by private tuition, and at the Jesuits' Coll., Montreal. M., 20 June, 1876, Hermantine, dau. of the late Senator J. B. Rolland, Montreal. Received the degree of B.C.L. from McGill Univ., and was called to the Bar, L.C., 1873. Was Mayor of Hochelaga from 1879 to 1884, and is now an Alderman of Montreal, and has been Chairman of the Board of Works for the City for ten years. Is Presdt. of the Young Liberals Assoc. of Can. Sat in the Quebec Assem. from g. e., 1875, until g. e., 1878, when he was an unsuccessful candidate. Upon the sitting mem. being unseated, he was re-elected 26 June, 1879, and sat until g. e., 1881, when he was

again an unsuccessful candidate. First returned to the Commons for Chambly, July, 1886, upon the resignation of the sitting mem., Mr. Benoit; re-elected at g. e., 1887, 1891 and 1896. A Liberal.—Montreal; Rideau Club.

M. at Victoria, 30 Jan., 1878, Suzette, youngest day, of the late John Work, Esq., of Hillside, Victoria. Is an iron and hardware merchant. Was Mining Engineer and Surveyor for the Vancouver Coal Mining & Land Co., from 1873 to 1878. Was Govt. Inspector of Mines for two years. Elected a life mem, of the North of Eng. Institute of Mining and Civil Engineers in 1875. Was Lieut. Colonel commanding the 5th British Columbia Regt., Artillery; resigned Nov., 1896, holds certificate of qualification from the Royal School of Artillery. Apptd. an Honorary A.D.C. to Gov.-Gen. of Can., Jan., 1889. Commanded the Canadian Rifle Team at Bisley, Eng., July, 1890. Is Presdt. of the Dominion Artillery Assoc. and a Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Rifle Assoc. Sat in Leg. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1891, and reelected at last g. e. A Liberal.—Plantagenet.

Quinn, Michael Joseph Francis, Q.C. (Montreal, St Ann's Division).

Father came from Co. Tyrone, Irel. B. in Kingston, Ont. Ed. at the Christian Brothers School and at Regiopolis Coll., Kingston. M., 1st, in 1871, Mary Elizabeth, dau. of the late John Harty of Peterborough, Ont. (she d. 1885); 2ndly, in 1889, Ellen Mary, dau. of M. C. Mullarky, Montreal. Admitted to the Bar of Quebec in 1878; apptd. Q.C., 1890, and has been Crown Prosecutor and substitute of the Attorney-Gen. of Prov. of Quebec since March, 1892. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Chateauguay at g. e., 1887. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Montreal; Rideau Club.

RATZ, VALENTINE (North Middlesex).

Grandson of Valentine Ratz, who emigrated from Germany, in 1827, and settled on the site of the present town of Waterloo, Ont. S. of Jacob Ratz, formerly an extensive lumberman in the Tp. of Wilmot, Co. of Waterloo. B. at St. Jacobs, Co. of Waterloo, 12 Nov., 1848, and ed. at Pine Hill Public School. M., 13 Feb., 1873, Mary Yager, of New Hamburg. Is a lumber merchant and farmer. Entered the Municipal Council of Tp. of Stephen in 1879, and has been successively Deputy Reeve and Reeve, and was Warden for the Co. of Huron, in 1886. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Mount Carmel, Ont.

REID, JOHN DOWSLEY, M.D. (South Grenville).

S. of the late John Reid, a native of Belfast, Irel., who came to Can. in 1845, and married Jane, dau. of the late John Dowsley, Prescott. B. at Prescott, 1 Jan., 1859, and ed. at Queen's Coll., Kingston, where he graduated M.D. Unmarried. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1891, and re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative.—Cardlnal, Ont.

RICHARDSON, WILLIAM LARUE (Lisgar).

Grandfather, Thomas Richardson, came from Yorkshire, and settled in Co. of Lanark, about 1820. His maternal grandfather, Robert Thompson, was at the battle of Trafalgar, and at the conclusion of the war of that time, came to Can., and settled near the Town of Perth. B. in the Tp. of Drummond, Co. of Lanark, 28 June, 1860. Ed. at the Balderson Public School. M., 11 March, 1885, Clara, dau. of the late Ira Mallory of Mallorytown. Is a journalist. Was on the reportorial staffs of the Montreal Star and the Toronto Globe; moved to Winnipeg in 1882, and was City Editor of the Winnipeg Sun for several years. Laliberte, at St. Croix, in 1873. Graduated M.D. at Victoria Univ., Montreal, in 1869. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1878. Re-elected at g. e., 1882, 1887, 1891, and 1896. A Liberal.—St. Croix, P.Q.

ROBERTSON, JOHN ROSS (East Toronto).

Eldest s. of the late John Robertson, wholesale dry goods merchant, Toronto, ninth s. of Alex. Robertson of Rait, in the parish of Nairn, Nairnshire, Scot., and great-grands. of Hugh Robertson, who resided at Rait, in 1660, and of Margaret Sinclair, dau. of Hector Sinclair of Goathill, Stornaway, Scot. The family are direct descendants of Duncan Robertson, Chief of the Clan of Struan Robertson, 1347. B. in Toronto, 28 Dec. 1841. Ed. at Upper Can. Coll. M., 1st, 1871, Maria Louise, dau. of E. E. M. Gillbee of Toronto; she d. 1886; 2nd, 1888, Jessie Elizabeth, dau. of Geo. B. Holland of Toronto. Is a publisher: Grand Master of the Free Masons of the Grand Lodge of Can. in the Prov. of Ontario, 1890-1892; Grand First Principal of the Royal Arch Chapter of Can., 1894-97; Repre-

sentative of the United Grand Lodge of England, in Ontario: Presdt. Canadian Copyright Assoc., 1888-96. First returned to House of Commons at g. e., 1896. An Independent Liberal-Conservative.—Toronto.

Sat in the House of Assem., N.B., from Jan., 1890, to Jan., 1896, when he resigned, and was elected for present seat in the Commons at by-election held to fill vacancy caused by appt. of the sitting mem. to the Senate. ROCHE, WILLIAM JAMES, M.D. (Marquette).

Was Grand Master of Independent Order Odd Fellows for Prov. of Manitoba, 1892-3, and Grand Representative to Sovereign Grand Lodge which met in Chatanooga, Tennessee, 1894, and Atlantic City, N.J., 1895. RODDICK, THOMAS G., M.D. (Montreal, St. Antoine Div.).

near Paisley, Scot. B. in Carleton Place, Ont., 10 May, 1833, and ed. at the Grammar School there. Is Presdt. and Managing Dir. of the Rosamond Woollen Co., and Vice-Presdt. of the Almonte Knitting Co. Held the offices of Reeve and Mayor of Almonte, and Chairmanship of the United School Board, Almonte, for several years. First returned to Parlt. at by-election held 31 Dec., 1892, to fill vacancy created by the appt. of the sitting mem., Mr. Jamieson, to a Judgeship; and re-elected at last g. e. Reelected by acclamation at g. e., 1872; and again returned at g. e., 1874. Re-elected by acclamation at g. e., 1878, and re-elected at g. e., 1882. Re-elected by acclamation at g. e., 1891 and 1896. SEAGRAM, JOSEPH EMM (North Waterloo).

S. of Octavius Augustus Seagram and Amelia Styles, his wife, both natives of Bratton, Wiltshire, Eng. B. in the Co. of Waterloo, Ont., in 1841. Ed. at Galt Grammar School. M., 1869, Stephanie Erbs, of Galt. Is a miller and a distiller, and has been a Town Councillor for Waterloo. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Waterloo, Ont.: Rideau Club.

SIFTON, Hon. CLIFFORD, Q.C., P.C. (Brandon).

Family from Tipperary, Irel., settled in Co. of Middlesex, Ont. S. of John W. Sifton, formerly a mem. of and Speaker of the Leg. Assem. of Manitoba. B. in Tp. of London, Co. of Middlesex, 10 March, 1861. Ed. at London High School and at Victoria Univ. M., 14 Aug., 1884, Elizabeth Anna, dau. of H. T. Burrows, formerly of Ottawa. Is a Barrister-at-Law, and a Q.C. Sat in Leg. Assem. of Man. from g. e., 1888, to Nov., 1896, and was a mem. of the Executive Council and Attorney Gen. of the Prov. from April, 1891, until fits resignation in 1896. Sworn a mem. of the Privy Council for Can., and apptd. Minister of the Interior, 17 Nov., 1896. First returned to House of Commons by acclamation at by-election for Brandon held 4 Dec., 1896. SEMPLE, ANDREW (Centre Wellington).

Parents, natives of Lanarkshire, Scot., emigrated to Can. from Glasgow, in 1841. B. in Glasgow, 10 June, 1837, and ed. at the Common School in Co. of Simcoe. M., 19 Oct., 1866, Margaret Potter. Is a

farmer and custom miller. Is a J.P., and was for two years a Councillor and Reeve of East Garafraxa. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1887, and re-elected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. A Liberal.—Fergus, Ont.

SNETSINGER, JOHN GOODALL (Cornwall and Stormont).

Ancestors of German origin, settled in Stormont about end of 18th Century. B. 1836, and ed. at Cornwall Grammar School. A, merchant. Has been Warden of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry. Sat in Leg. Assem., Ontario, from July, 1872 to 1879. First returned to Parlt., Dec., 1896. A Liberal.—Moulinette, Ont.

SOMERVILLE, JAMES (North Brant).

Family came from Fifeshire, Scot., in 1833, and settled in Dundas, Out. B. in Dundas, 7 June, 1834. Ed. at Common and Grammar Schools, in Dundas and Simcoe. M., 1858, Janette, dau. of Mr. Alex. Rogers, of Co. of Brant, Ont. Was editor and proprietor of the Dundas True Banner (Reform), up to 1886. Carried on farming at Cote St. Michel, near Montreal, until 1862, when he removed to Tp. of Wotton, Co. of Wolfe. Taught school there for three years, and was Inspector of Schools for the dist. of St. Francis, from 1864 to June, 1896. Was for several years Mayor of Wotton, and Warden of the Co. of Wolfe. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Wotton, P.Q.

STUBBS, WILLIAM (Cardwell).

Parents were natives of the Co. Fermanagh, Irel., and came to Can. in 1824, and settled in the Tp. of Caledon. B. in that Tp., 11 July, 1847. S. of the late Alexander Sutherland, who came to Canada in 1841, from Caithness-shire, Scot., settled in the Tp. of Ancaster, Co. of Wentworth, afterwards moved to the Tp. of East Zorra, Co. of Oxford, in 1855, by his wife, Allison, dau. of the late John Renton, of Ancaster. B. 17 July, 1849, in the Tp. of Ancaster, Co. of Wentworth. Ed. at the Grammar School, Woodstock. Unmarried. Was a mem. of the Municipal Council of Woodstock for several years; was Reeve from 1877 to 1879, and Mayor for 1880. Has been a mem. of the Collegiate Institute Board of Trustees, since 1880. First returned to Parlt., 9 Dec., 1880. on death of the sitting mem. Re-elected at g. e.,

and Grenville, in 1879. Apptd. County Auditor for 1881 and 1882. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1882, and re-elected at g. e., 1887, 1891 and 1896. A Conservative; believes protection of industries is and will be a necessity in Canada for many years.—Gananoque, Ont.

TISDALE, Lieut.-Col. Hon. DAVID, Q.C., P.C. (South Norfolk).

Has taken an active part in railway construction, and was · Vice-Presdt, of the Grand Trunk, Georgian Bay and Lake Erie Railway Co. Entered the Militia service in 1861, and was Lieut.-Col. commanding 39th Norfolk Rifles, V.M., from 1868 to 1876, when he retired, retaining rank. Was thanked in general orders for successfully dispersing with his Batt., an American mob assembled at Port Dover to witness a prize fight in 1872. Was an unsuccessful candidate for North Norfolk in the Commons at g. e., 1874. First returned to Commons at g. e., 1887, and re-elected at g. e., 1891 and 1896. Was Chairman of the Railway Com, of the House of Commons, during the whole of the 7th Parlt. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Minister of Militia in the Administration of Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., 2 May, 1896. Resigned with his Leader, 8 July, 1896. A Conservative.—Simcoe, Ont.; Rideau Club; Toronto Club; Albany Club.

TOLMIE, JOHN (West Bruce).

B. in Balgown, near Cluny Castle, parish of Laggan, Inverness-shire, Scot., 30 Aug., 1845. Ed. in the Common Schools in Scotland. M., 1883, Maggie H. Paterson of Lucknow, Ont. Came to Can., and settled in Tp. of Bruce in 1868, and was engaged in farming until 1884, when he moved to Kincardine,

where he is now Secretary and Manager of the Ontario Peoples Salt & Soda Co. Has been Councillor and Reeve of the Tp. of Bruce, and Deputy Reeve and Mayor of Kincardine. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. An Independent, and elected as a Patron of Industry.—Kincardine, Ont.

Tucker, Lt.-Col. Joseph John (St. John, N.B.).

B. at Chatham, Kent, Eng., and when quite young came to Can. with his father, the late John Tucker, for many years agent and surveyor for the English Lloyds, at St. John. Was for 20 years chief surveyor for Lloyds in the East, with residence at Hong Kong. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding the 62nd Batt. (Fusileers), at St. John, N.B. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—St. John, N.B.

Tupper, Hon. Sir Charles, Bart., G.C.M.G., C.B., M.D., LL.D. (Cantab.), LL.D. (Edinburgh), (Cape Breton).

S. of the late Rev. Charles Tupper,* D.D., of Aylesford, N.S., whose father, Charles Tupper, emigrated irom Lebanon, Connecticut, in 1760, to Cornwallis, N.S. B. at Amherst, N.S., 2 July, 1821. Is M.A. and D.L.C. of Acadia Coll., N.S. Took degree of M.D. at Edinburgh, and obtained the diploma of the Royal College of Surgeons, same city, 1843. M., 8 Oct., 1846, Frances Amelia, dau. of Silas Hibbert Morse, Esq., of Amherst. Is Governor of Dalhousie Coll., Halifax (apptd. by Act of Parlt., 1862). Was Presdt. of the Can. Medical Asso. from its formation, 1867, until 1370, when he declined re-election. Was a mem. of the Ex-Council and Provl. Secy. N.S., from 1857 to 1860, and from 1863 to 30 June, 1867; and Prime Minister of that Prov. from 1864, until he retired from office with his Govt. on the Union Act coming in

^{*}In consequence of persecution, two brothers, previous to 1522, had fled from Hesse Cassel, Upper Saxony; one settled in Holland, and in 1813, a descendant, Daniel Tnpper, was burgomaster of Rotterdam. Another member of the family settled at Sandwich, Co. Kent, England. From this latter branch descended Thomas Tupper, who emigrated to America in 1635. landed at Sangus, Mass. ferce, July, 1867. Was a delegate to England on public business from the N.S. Govt., 1858 and 1865: from the Dominion Govt. (with respect to the N.S. difficulty), March, 1868; leader of the delegation from N.S. to the Union Conference, at Charlottetown. 1864: to that in Quebec, in the same year, and to the final Colonial Conference in London, to complete the terms of Union, 1866-67. Holds patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex-Councillor. N.S. Created C.B. (Civil) by Her Majesty, 1867; K.C.M.G., 24 May, 1879; G.C.M.G., 1 Feb., 1886; and a Baronet for his services on the Fisheries Conference, 13 Sept., 1888. Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet, 1867, and the Chairmanship of Intercolonial Railway Board, 1868. Sworn of the Privy Council, June, 1870, and was Presdt. of that body from that date until July, 1872, when he was apptd. Minister of Inland Revenue, which office he held 22 Feb., 1873, when apptd. Minister of Customs; resigned office with Sir John Macdonald, 5 Nov., 1873. Apptd. Minister of Public Works, Oct., 1878, and was Minister of Railways and Canals from 26 May, 1879, to 24 May, 1884, when apptd. High Commr. for Canada, in London. Apptd. Executive Commr. for Can. at the International Exhibition. Antwerp, 1885, and of the Colonial and Indian Exhibition, London, 1886, of which he was also apptd. Royal Commr. by the Queen. He received in 1886, the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws (Cambridge), and the same day had conferred on him the honorary freedom of the Worshipful Company of Fishmongers of London, LL.D. (Edinburgh), 1892. Just previous to the Federal Elections of February, 1887, he reentered the Cabinet as Finance Minister, which position he retained until May 24, 1888, when he was reappointed High Commissioner for the Dominion of Canada in London. Was appointed one of Her Majesty's plenipotentiaries to the Fisheries Conference at Washington in 1887, the result of which Conference was the signature of a treaty on February 15. 1888—subject to ratification—for the settlement of the matters in dispute between Canada and the United States in connection with the Atlantic Fisheries. Sir Charles carried a Bill through the Canadian Parliament for the ratification of the Treaty, where it was passed in both Houses without

division. Sat for Cumberland in N.S. Assem. from 22 May, 1855, until the Union, when elected to Commons, in which he sat until 24 May, 1884. Reelected at g. e., 1887; unseated for bribery by agents, but re-elected with an increased majority. Was not a candidate at g. e., 1891. In Jan., 1896, entered the Administration of Sir Mackenzie Bowell, as Secretary of State, and was elected for Cape Breton. On the resignation of Sir M. Bowell, he formed a Liberal-Conservative Administration, in which he held the position of Prime Minister, and the portfolio of Secretary of State, from 27 April, 1896, to 8 July, 1896, when, in consequence of the defeat of his party at the polls, 23 June, 1896, he resigned. He was re-elected for Cape Breton at last g. e. The following are some of the measures which were introduced and carried through the Legislature of N.S. by the Hon. gentleman :- The Jury Law; Education Act, providing free schools; Equity Judge Act; Windsor & Annapolis Railway Act; Representation Bill; Executive and Legislative Disabilities Act (the first Act passed by any of the Provinces prohibiting dual representation); an Act reducing the number of mems. in the Assem. from 55 to 38 on entering the Union, and an Act relative to certain public officers and their salaries, which abolished the office of Financial Secv. and Solicitor-Genl., and largely reduced the expenditure for salaries; he also inaugurated the movement, and moved the resolution for the Union of the Maritime Provinces 1864, under which delegates were sent to Charlottetown in that year; and the resolution authorizing delegates to be sent to London to arrange the terms for the Union of N.S. and N.B. with Can. in 1866. Among the important measures introduced by him in the Federal Parlt. may be mentioned the Weights and Measures Act; the Act prohibiting the sale or manufacture of intoxicating liquors in the N.W.T. of Canada; the Consolidated Railway Act of 1879; the Act granting a charter to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company in 1881; the Act of 1884 granting a loan to that Company; the Railway Subsidies Acts of 1883 and 1884; and the Act of 1884, respecting an agreement between the Province of B.C. and the Dominion of Canada; the Customs Act of 1887, giving better protection encouragement to the manufacture of iron and steel;

the arrangement with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, by which their monopoly rights under the agreement of 1881 were extinguished, in consideration of the Government guarantee of 31/2 per cent. interest for fifty years on \$15,000,000 of bonds, issued by the Company, the proceeds to be used for certain specified purposes; the resolutions for the transfer to the Government of certain of the liabilities of the Montreal Harbor Commissioners for deepening the St. Lawrence channel, and of certain of the liabilities of the Quebec Harbor Commissioners in connection with the Graving Dock and Harbor at Quebec in 1888. In 1888, on his return to London, he arranged for the placing on the market of a loan of £4.000.000 at 3 per cent, interest, the first Colonial loan ever issued at that rate. Represented Canada at the International Conference at Paris, for the protection of sub-marine cables in 1883, at the International Conference at Brussels, relating to customs, the International Postal Union held at Vienna, in 1891, and the International Railway Conference held in London, in 1895. Elected Leader of the Opposition, Aug., 1896. A Liberal-Conservative.—123 Cooper St., Ottawa; Rideau Club; Halifax Club.

TUPPER, Hon. SIR CHARLES HIBBERT, K.C.M.G., LL.B. Q.C., P.C. (Pictou).

Second s. of the Hon. Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., M.P., G.C.M.G., C.B. B. at Amherst, N.S., 3 Aug., 1855. Ed. at McGill Coll. and Harvard Univ., where he received the degree of LL.B. M., Sept., 1879, Janet, dau. of Hon. James McDonald, Chief Justice of N.S. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1878. Apptd. Q.C. by Dominion Govt., 2 Aug., 1890. Is Counsel in the law firm of Borden, Ritchie & Co., Halifax, N.S. Sworn a mem. of the Privy Council for Canada, and was Minister of Marine and Fisheries from 31 May, 1888, to 21 Dec., 1894, when he became Minister of Justice. Held the latter office in the Bowell Administration, until Jan., 1896, when he resigned. Was Solicitor Gen. (not in the Cabinet) in the Administration of his father, Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., from 27 April to 8 July, 1896. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1882, and re-elected at g. e., 1887, 1891 and 1896. On appt. to office, reelected by acclamation, 18 June, 1888. Was the Agent

for Her Britannic Majesty at the Behring Sea Arbitration at Paris, and was created K.C.M.G. in 1893, for his services on that occasion. A Liberal-Conservative.—"Armdale," Halifax; Halifax Club; Rideau Club.

TURCOT, GEORGE (Megantic).

B. at Ste. Marie de Beauce, 12 Sept., 1851, and ed. at the Coll. there. M., 1st, 1873, Florida, dau. of F. X. Rousseau (she d. 1875); 2nd, 1885, a sister of his deceased wife. After working upon his father's farm for some years, he began business as a merchant. He has been Chairman of the Board of School Commrs. and Secretary of the Municipal Council of Ste. Julie for some years. Sat for present seat in the House of Commons, from g. e., 1887, to g. e., 1891, when he was an unsuccessful candidate. Re-elected at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Ste. Julie de Somerset, P.Q.

TYRWHITT, Lieut.-Col. RICHARD (South Simcoe).

S. of William Tyrwhitt, and grandson of Richard Tyrwhitt, Esq., of Nantyr Hall, Denbighshire, Barrister of the Middle Temple and Recorder of Chester, Eng. B. in the Co. of Simcoe, Ont., 29 Nov., 1844. Ed. by private tutors, and at Dinan and Rouen, France. M., 26 April, 1870, Emma, dau. of the late Ven. Archdeacon G. Whitaker, Provost Trin. Coll., Toronto. Is a farmer, and Lieut.-Col. of the 36th Batt., V.M. Served as a Lieut. in a Provisional Batt. on Niagara Frontier in 1866, and in the North-West rebellion campaign, 1885 (medal). Commanded the Wimbledon Team in 1886. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, 16 Feb., 1882, on the death of the sitting mem., Mr. W. C. Little. Re-clected at g. e., 1882, 1887, 1891 and 1896. Was also an unsuccessful candidate for North York at g. e., 1887. A Conservative.-Nantyr, Bradford, Ont.

WALLACE, Hon. NATHANIEL CLARKE (West York).

Third s. of Capt. Nathaniel Wallace, of Woodbridge, who came to Canada from Sligo, Irel., in 1834. B. in Woodbridge, Co. of York, 21 May, 1844. Ed. at the Public School there, and for a short time in 1863 at Western Grammar School. M., 7 June, 1877, in the city of Ottawa, to Belinda, youngest daughter of the

late James Gilmour, of Ottawa. Taught Public School from 1864 to 1869, when he went into business. now a merchant and flour miller. Was first Deputy Reeve of the Tp. of Vaughan from 1874 to 1879, and was Warden of the County of York in 1878. Was for many years Co. Master of the Orangemen of West York, and was Grand Treasurer of the Orange Grand Lodge of Ontario West, from 1877 to 1883, when he resigned. Has been Grand Master of the Orangemen of British America since 1887. Takes an active interest in agricultural societies. Is Presdt. of the York Farmers' Colonization Co., the operations of which are in the North-West. Was Chairman of the Committee of Parlt, apptd, to investigate the operations of the combines formed to restrain trade, and he introduced and carried a measure declaring such combinations to be illegal. Apptd. Controller of Customs, 6 Dec., 1892,—resigned 1895. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1878, and re-elected at g. e., 1882, 1887 and 1891. A Liberal-Conservative.—Woodbridge, Ont.

WILSON, URIAH (Lennox).

Father a native of England, and mother from the County Tyrone, Irel. B. 17 March, 1841, in Township of North Fredericksburg, Co. of Lennox and Addington, Ont. Educated at the Public School, Napanee, Ont. M., 1867, Mary Moyle, Napanee. Is a merchant. Represented Centre Ward in Town Council 1875, 1876, and 1878. Deputy Reeve of Napanee, 1879, 1880, 1881 and 1882. Warden of County of Lennox and Addington in 1882. Reeve of Napanee in 1884 and 1885, and Mayor in 1886. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1887; defeated at g. e., 1891, but returned at by-election in 1892, and again at g. e., 1896. A Conservative.—Napanee, Ont.

Has been Presdt. of the Hamilton Board of Trade. Sat in Parlt. from g. e., 1874 to 1878. Re-elected at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Elmwood, Hamilton, Ont.; Rideau Club.

WOOD, Hon. JOHN FISHER, Q.C., P.C. (Brockville).

S. of John Wood, a railroad contractor, who came from Dundee, Scot., and settled at Brockville. B. 12 Oct., 1852, at Elizabethtown, Co. of Leeds, Ont. Called to the Bar, Ont., Easter Term, 1876. Apptd. Q.C., 15 Feb., 1890. Is Solicitor for the Brockville Loan & Savings Company, and for the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1882, and re-elected at g. e., 1887, 1891 and 1896. Was Chairman of Committees and Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons in 1890, and Chairman of the Committee on Railways and Canals in 1892. Apptd. Controller of Inland Revenue, 6 Dec., 1892,—resigned July, 1896. A Conservative.—Brockville, Ont.; Rideau Club.

Yeo, John (East Prince, P.E.I.).

B. at Porthill, P.E.I., 29 June, 1837. Ed. at Uxbridge, Eng. Unmarried. A merchant and shipowner. Elected M. W. Grand Master of the Free Masons of P.E.I., June, 1875. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, 1870, and Speaker of the Assem., 1871. Re-apptd. to Ex.-Council, 27 Sept., 1873, and again in 1876; resigned March, 1879. Sat in the House of Assem. for Prince, 2nd Dist., from 1858 to 1891, when he resigned his seat to run for the Commons. First returned to Parlt. for Prince at g. e., 1891, and re-elected for East Prince at g. e., 1896. A Liberal.—Porthill, P.E.I.

PART IV.

Explanation of Technical Parliamentary Expressions.

WITH BRIEF DESCRIPTIONS OF THE DUTIES OF HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS.

ACCEPTANCE OF OFFICE.—A member of the Commons accepting office must vacate his seat in Parliament. Exception is made as to a Minister of the Crown, provided he is elected to Parliament while he holds such office. A Minister may be transferred from one office to another without re-election.—Revised Stat. of Can., cap. 11, secs. 12 and 9.

Adjournment is a postponement of the sittings or proceedings of the House from one time to another specified for the re-assemblage. It is a right belonging to each House, and there are no restrictions to this power. By previous permission of the House, the Speaker may leave the Chair for a certain number of hours, but this does not amount to an adjournment, and cannot be noted as such by the Clerk. The adjournment of one House does not adjourn the other. The Crown may, pending an adjournment, summon, by proclamation, either House or both, and may direct either House or both to adjourn to any particular day. An individual member may, for a time, interrupt the progress of business by successive motions for adjournment, which may be repeated indefinitely, with this restriction: no second motion to adjourn can be made until after some intermediate proceeding shall have been had. The motion in committee, that the chairman report progress, is equivalent to a motion to adjourn the debate. Adjournment does not close the debate, but a member who moves the adjournment of a debate, or who is in possession of the floor at the time of adjournment, is said to be in possession of the House, with the right to re-open the debate which had been interrupted. This is not the case, however, when committees of the Whole House adjourn.

AGRICULTURE, MINISTER OF, has the control and direction of Agriculture, Immigration and Emigration, Public Health and Quarantine, the Marine Hospital, Quebec, Arts

and Manufactures, the Census and Statistics, Patents of Invention, Copyrights, Industrial Design and Trade Marks, and Experimental Farms Stations. In 1892, the subjects of Immigration and Emigration were assigned to the Minister of the Interior.

ALIENS are incapable of voting for the election of members of Parliament in Canada, neither can they be candidates for seats as members for any constituency.

AMENDMENT, An, is the mode by which the decision of the House in a question may be intercepted, by submitting for its consideration an alternative proposition, either wholly or partially opposed to the original question.

AUDITOR-GENERAL, THE, is an officer appointed by the Gov.-Gen. under the Great Seal of Can. for the more complete examination of the public accounts and for reporting thereon to the House of Commons. He holds office during good behavior, but is removable by the Gov.-Gen. on address of the Senate or Commons. (Salary \$4,000.)

Avoidance of a Decision, An, may be effected by proposing an amendment to the original question, or by substitution in its stead of another question, such as the adjournment of the House, or of the debate; "the previous question," or "that the orders of the day be now read," or by enforcing the adjournment of the House, owing to the absence of a quorum. Moving that a bill "be read this day six months," or "this day three months," is a mode of throwing it out without coming to an express declaration against the principle of the measure.

Ballot, The.—(See election of Members.)

BILLS (Public). —A Bill is the draft or skeleton of a Statute. Any Bill which the Senate can originate may be introduced and laid on the table by an individual Senator, without the previous permission of the House; but in the Commons no Bill can be brought in, unless a motion for leave be previously agreed to. Permission having been granted, it is then brought in and read the first time without amendment or debate, and a day is appointed for the second reading, previous to which it is printed, and a copy furnished to each member. The Bill, after the second reading, is referred to a Committee of the Whole House, at the sittings of which its details are considered clause by clause, as its

principles were at each of its several readings. Members are at liberty to discuss its principles at any of its stages, but no one is considered to have declared decisively in favor of its principles unless by his vote he supports its second reading. In Committee the Bill is debated clause by clause; the blanks left for amount of penalties, salaries or rents, ctc., are filled up, and sometimes the Bill is entirely remodelled. The blanks, as they are called, which are usually filled up in italics, are agreed to without a question being put, unless a member should propose to alter them. The next proceeding is, that the Chairman of the Committee should make a report to the House of the changes that the Bill has undergone, which he does by presenting it to the Speaker in its altered form. The Bill, if amended, may be then considered and amended on report of the Committee. It is then read the third time, when any further amend. ments may be made by going back into Committee of the Whole, except in the case of a verbal and unimportant change. The last question but one is that the "Bill do pass," after this nothing remains except to determine its title, which used to be a general one for all the Acts passed in the session, but in modern times distinct titles are used for each Statute. During the progress of the Bill, the House may divide on the following questions: 1st, on the second reading; 2nd, that it be committed; 3rd, on the consideration of report of Committee, in case of amendment; 4th, or that the Bill be re-committed; 5th, that it be read the third time; 6th, that it do pass (but a division at this stage is now practically obsolete); 7th, the title of the Bill. These are quite exclusive of any division in the Committee, or any amendments, or of any clause added to or expunged from the measure, in or out of the Committee. Immediately after the passing of a Bill, it is taken to the Bar of the Senate, desiring their concurrence, where it passes through the same form as in the Commons. If the Bill be rejected, no further proceedings ensue. When the Senate agrees with the Commons in the principle of the measure, but differs on matters of detail, the Bill is returned to the Commons bearing the amendments the Senators propose; these are considered by the Commons, and if disagreed to, the Bill is returned back to the Senate with a message assigning reasons for the disagreement. If the Senate adhere to their amendments, it is for the Commons to recede, or else the Bill is lost. Or a Conference (now very rarely held) may take place between the Houses. The same proceedings are adopted, mutatis mutandis, when the Bill originates in the Senate. The Bill, having thus passed both

Houses, remains with the Senate, except in the case of a Bill of Supply, which is sent back to the Commons, to be by them presented at the Bar of the Senate to the Representative of the Sovereign. The assent of the Crown is the final proceeding which converts a Bill into an Act of Parliament.

BILLS (MONEY).—All bills relating to public income and expenditure, and all Tax or Revenue Bills usually called Money Bills, must originate in the Commons and be introduced by the Government.

Bills (Private) are chiefly introduced to enable individuals or bodies corporate to undertake works of public utility at their own risk and chiefly for their own emolument and benefit; but there are other Private Bills which frequently come before Parliament, such as Bills for adjusting claims to property between individual claimants, and Bills relating to divorce, naturalization, etc., etc. The expenses of legislation in such matters must be paid by the parties seeking the relief; and a deposit of \$200 must be made immediately after the second reading of the Bill. After the second reading, if all the rules of the House have been complied with, Private Bills go to a Select Standing Committee, and it is before this Committee that proper attention must be given by the parties interested. Individuals or companies may appear by Parliamentary Agents.

BUDGET, THE.—Is the financial statement laid annually by the Finance Minister before Parliament, of the estimated public income and expenditure of the following year, commencing 1st July. In it he mentions what taxes it is proposed to repeal, reduce or augment, and what new ones are to be imposed. In his speech on this occasion, the Minister reviews the financial condition of the country, comparing the income and expenditure of the previous year with those of preceding years, justifying the changes that are proposed to be made and estimating their probable effects. This statement is generally made in the Canada House on the motion to go into Committee of Ways and Means, with the Speaker in the Chair.

Chairman of Committees of the House of Commons is elected by the House at the commencement of every Parliament, by virtue of a standing order adopted in 1885. He presides when the House is in Committee, including the Committees of Supply and Ways and Means, and sits at

the table in the seat of the Clerk of the House. His vote is never given in committee, except when, on a division, the members are equal. If the Speaker leave the chair, he may call upon him to preside as Deputy Speaker, and in case of unavoidable absence of the Speaker, the Deputy may act as such.—(See Rev. Stat. of Can., c. 14.)

CLERK OF THE QUEEN'S PRIVY COUNCIL FOR CANADA is appointed by the Crown under the Great Seal, and is the confidential Secretary of the Government of Canada. He is the custodian of all State papers.

CLERK OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS is appointed by the Crown by commission under the Great Seal. It is his duty to make minutes, not of the arguments used in the House, but the decisions at which it arrives—in other words, to make a true and faithful record of all the proceedings in which it may be engaged; to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members; to read aloud all such documents as the House may order to be read; to perform the duty (without taking the chair) of president or moderator during the choice of a Speaker, putting a question and directing a division in the same manner that a Speaker would do. He sits at the upper end of the table, with one or two assistants.

CLERK OF THE CROWN IN CHANCERY is appointed by the Crown. He issues writs for elections, makes certificates to the House of Commons, in due form, of the return of members, and performs other functions relating to elections. He attends the House with election returns, and amends the same when so ordered. The various proclamations summoning, proroguing and dissolving Parliament are issued by command out of Chancery. At the close of a session, when the Governor General attends the Senate to give the Royal assent to bills, it is the duty of this officer to read the titles of the bills in the English and French languages.

COMMITMENT.—Parliament has an inherent power to punish all contempt of their authority or disobedience of their mandates. Each House is armed with power to repress any aggression committed upon its rights, or any interference with its privileges; but in the case of the Commons, the operation of this power is limited to the session of Parliament, committals by that House being invalidated by a prorogation. Either House can delegate to a committee the power of sending for papers and records, but in

case a witness refuses to appear, the committee must seek power from the House to enforce his attendance.

COMMITTEES.—Are, first, those of the Whole House, which may be to consider certain resolutions, as to the nature of which considerable latitude prevails; or the House itself resolves into such Committee to consider the details of a Bill, the principle of which may be discussed at any or all of its other stages; or there may be Committees for financial purposes, as those of "Supply," or "Ways and Means" (which see). Secondly, Select Committees chosen, by ballot or otherwise, for some specific purpose. The number composing such bodies seldom exceeds fifteen members, except by permission of the House, or in case of the large Standing Committee (like the Banking and Commerce and Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines), appointed at the commencement of each session. Committees on Private Bills (which see). When the whole house is in Committee the Speaker vacates the chair, the Mace is placed under the table, and some member is called to preside (generally the Chairman of Committees), who sits in the seat of the Clerk of the House.

Commons, House of. - According to the theory of the English constitution, the House of Commons represents the whole population. Although the members returned by the country voters are presumed to represent the interest concerned in agriculture, and the members returned by towns have their attention most directed towards the interests of trade, yet it is unconstitutional to suppose that members are delegates of any special community. Each member is held to represent the interests of the nation. The proceedings of the Commons are regulated by Standing Orders. The Speaker takes the chair at 3 p. m. daily. If there be a quorum the business is proceeded with; if not, the House is adjourned to the next day at 3 p. m. Early meetings take place before the termination of the Session, in order to expedite business and bring matters to a close; the House does not usually meet on Saturday, nor does it assemble on any holiday. No one can be admitted to hear the debates without an order from the Sergeant-at-Arms, which is generally obtained through a member. Twenty members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum.

Conference, A, is a species of negotiation between the two houses of Parliament, conducted by managers appointed on both sides, for the purpose of producing concurrence in

cases where mutual consent is necessary; or for the purpose of reconciling differences which may have arisen. It is the sole privilege of the Senate to name the time and place for holding a conference, no matter by which house it may have been demanded. Reasons in writing for the course resolved to be taken are usually furnished to the managers on both sides, in which case it is simply called "a conference." Should this proceeding fail, "a free conference" must be held, which gives an opportunity for the managers individually, and unrestrained by any precise form of agreement, to urge such reasons as, in their judgment, may best tend to influence the House to which they are addressed. A free conference is usually demanded after two conferences have been holden without effect. After one free conference, none other but free conferences can be held touching the same subject. Under modern practice, however, conferences are now obviated by sending reasons to either House in case of a disagreement on a Bill.

Controverted Elections.—The trial of election petitions is now regulated by Rev. Stat. of Can., Cap. 9, which transfers the entire jurisdiction to the Courts of Law. A petition, complaining of undue election, must be presented within 30 days after the day of publication in the Canada Gazette of the receipt of the return to the writ of election by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, unless it questions the return or election upon an allegation of corrupt practices, etc., in which case it may be presented at any time within 30 days after the day of payment. At the time of Dominion notes is to be made with the Clerk of the Court, by those presenting it, as security for payment of all costs, charges and expenses, that may become payable by the petitioner.

Count Our.—If a member takes notice of the number present, the Speaker counts the House, and if 15 Senators in the case of the Senate, and 20 members in the case of the House of Commons, be not present, the Speaker adjourns the House without question put, until next sitting day.

DEPUTY SPEAKER.—(See Chairman of Committees.)

DISFRANCHISE.—Is the act of taking away the privilege of the franchise.

DISSOLUTION.—Is the civil death of the Parliament, and may be affected at pleasure by the Crown or by length of time (five years). It puts an end to the representative character of the members, and a Parliament cannot be assembled until after a general election by a proclamation from the Governor-General, under the advice of the Privy Council, calling it together for "the dispatch of business," at a certain date.

Division, A.—Is the mode of taking the votes of each House of Parliament. The proceedings in taking the sense of the House on a question are similar in the Senate and Commons. Members for and against a question are distinguished in the Senate as "Contents" and "Non-contents"; in the Commons as "Yeas" and "Nays."

DIVORCE BILLS.—The B. N. A. Act 1867 places Marriage and Divorce within the exclusive legislative jurisdiction of the Canadian Parliament. Certain provinces in which Divorce Courts existed prior to Confederation, however, continue their functions. These are Nova Scotia, New Brnnswick, Prince Edward Island and British Columbia, while the portions of the Dominion in which no such court exists are Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and the North-West Territories. Bills of Divorce are legislative Acts, and originate, although not necessarily, in the Senate. Procedure is regulated by special Rules, touching Bills of this character. Proof of adultery must be established to the satisfaction of a Select Committee on Divorce. numbering nine Senators, appointed at the beginning of each Session, and the respondent may then be permitted to prove collusion, connivance, condonation or adultery on the part of the petitioner. Proceedings are conducted as in a Court of Law-the petitioner and respondent being represented by Counsel. Having passed the Senate, the Divorce Bill is sent to the Commons where it is dealt with as an ordinary private bill. See Gemmill on the Practice of Parliamentary Divorce in Canada.

DOUBLE RETURNS.—When two members are returned for one place, they may be sworn, but neither should sit or vote until the matter has been finally determined. As under the Rev. Stat. of Can., cap. 8, sec. 61, the returning officer, in case of an equality of votes, shall give a casting vote, double returns will be of infrequent occurrence.

DOUBLE ELECTIONS.—A member returned by two constituencies must, within seven days after the expiration of

the time limited for the presentation of petitions against returns, elect for which he will serve.

DROPPED ORDERS OF THE DAY.—Are the questions put by members, notices of motions and orders standing upon the Order Paper, not taken up when called, or not reached owing to an adjournment of the House. They are set down on the paper for the next sitting day.

ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT.—Writs for the election of members on the occasion of a new Parliament are issued by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, upon direction of the Governor-General, and during a Parliament, upon the Speaker's Warrant. The election is by Ballot, and the procedure is set out in Rev. Stat. of Can., Chapter 8.

ELECTION PETITIONS.—(See Controverted Elections.)

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS is a power possessed by the House of Commons. It has been exercised from time to time to free Parliament from the presence of discreditable members, such as men found guilty of forgery, perjury, etc., or as a punishment for offences committed against the House itself.

FINANCE, DEPARTMENT OF, AND THE TREASURY BOARD, is presided over by the Minister of Finance and Receiver-General. He has the supervision, control and direction of all matters relating to the financial affairs, public accounts, revenue and expenditure not assigned to any other department. See Treasury Board, infra.

FISHERIES, DEPARTMENT OF .- (See Marine and Fisheries.)

Franchise.—The term means the right to vote at an election for a member of Parliament. Rev. Stat. of Can., Cap. 5, regulates the exercise of the Franchise.

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY, DEPARTMENT OF THE, is presided over by the Minister of the Interior. The duties, objects and purposes of the Department are:

- (a) To make a full and scientific examination and survey of the geological structure, mineralogy, mines and mining resources of Canada and of its fauna and flora;
- (b) to maintain a museum of geological and natural history, and to collect, classify and arrange such

- specimens for exhibition therein, and to carry on chemical and palæontological investigations;
- (c) To prepare and publish maps, diagrams, etc., to illustrate and elucidate the reports of surveys;
- (d) To collect mineral statistics.

GOVERNMENT ORDERS are the bills brought in by the Government, and which they are entitled to place at the head of the list of orders of the day. It is generally the practice to call Government orders according to the convenience of the Ministers.

HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR CANADA in the United Kingdom acts as representative and resident agent of Canada in Britain, executes such powers and performs such duties as are from time to time conferred upon and assigned to him by the Governor in Council; takes charge of the immigration office and agencies in Britain under the Minister of Agriculture, and carries out such instructions as he receives from the Governor-in-Council respecting the commercial, financial, and general interests of Canada in Britain and elsewhere. (Salary \$10,000.)

INDEPENDENCE OF PARLIAMENT.—Under Rev. Stat. of Can., Cap. 11, Sec. 9, the holder of an office of emolument under the Government of Can., the Sheriff, Registrar of Deeds, Clerk of the Peace and County Crown Attorney is ineligible to sit or vote in the House of Commons, and by Sec. 10, a contractor with the Government of Can. is also declared ineligible to sit or vote therein. By Secs. 12 and 13, any member interested in any contract, sale of goods, for which the public money is paid, thereby vacates his seat, and is liable to forfeit \$200 for each day he sits or votes thereafter. Exception is made in favor of shareholders or certain incorporated companies, persons upon whom contracts devolve, lenders of money to the Government, and Militia officers and men. By Sec. 18, Senators are subject to the disability and penalty provided by Secs. 12 and 13.

INLAND REVENUE, DEPARTMENT OF —Has the control and management of the collection of excise duties; collection of stamp duties; internal taxes; standard weights and measures; administration of laws relating to timber culling and measurement of timber, masts, spars, deals, and staves; and the collection of slidage and boomage dues; collection of bridge and ferry tolls, and rents, and tolls on public canals, and of the officers and persons employed in that service.

Instruction, An.—Empowers a Committee of the whole House to consider matters not otherwise referred to them, and restricts or extends the order of reference to a Select Committee.

Interior, Minister of the North-West Territories, and of all Crown Lands, the property of Canada, including Ordnance and Admiralty lands, and all other lands not specially under the control of other departments, excepting the land connected with Marine Hospitals and Light Houses, and St. Paul's, Sable and Portage Islands. He has also the control and management of the Dept. of the Geological Survey. He is also the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, having the control and management of the lands and property of the Indians in Canada.

JUSTICE, MINISTER OF .- Is ex officio H. M. Attorney General in Canada, and presides over the Department of Justice. He is the official legal adviser of the Governor-General, and the legal member of H. M. Privy Council for Canada; he sees that the administration of public affairs is in accordance with law; has the superintendence of all matters connected with the administration of justice in Canada, not within the jurisdiction of the Provincial Governments; advises upon the Acts and proceedings of the provincial legislatures, and generally advises the Crown in all As Atty. Gen. he is intrusted with the legal matters. powers and charged with the duties which belong to the office of Atty. Gen. of England, by law or usage, so far as the same are applicable to Canada, and also with the powers and duties which by the laws of the several provinces belonged to the office of the Atty. Gen. of each province up to the time when the B. N. A. Act of 1867 came into effect, and which laws, under the provisions of that Act, are to be administered and carried into effect by the Government of Canada. He advises the Heads of the several Departments upon matters of law connected with such Departments; is charged with the settlement and approval of all instruments issued under the Great Seal of Canada; has the superintendence of penitentiaries and prison system, and the conduct of all litigation for or against the Crown or any public department, in respect of any subjects within the authority or jurisdiction of Canada.

MARINE AND FISHERIES, DEPARTMENTS OF.—These Departments are presided over by the Minister of Marine and

Fisheries. The Department of Marine has the control, regulation, management, supervision and administration of any laws relating to pilots, beacons, light-houses, harbors, piers, vessels belonging to the Govt. of Can. (except gunboats), harbor commissioners and masters, classification of vessels, and examination and granting certificates to officers in the merchants' service, shipping masters and officers, inspection of steamboats, inquiries into causes of shipwrecks, and the superintendence of marine and seamen's hospitals, and care of distressed seamen. The Department of Fisheries administers all laws relating to the subject of sea, coast and inland fisheries and the management and protection thereof.

MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT are under a constitutional obligation to attend the service of the House, and the House is empowered to punish neglect of this duty by committal to custody. The service on committees may be enforced in like manner.

Members, Introduction of.—Members elected during the existence of Parliament, after taking the oath of allogiance and subscribing the roll, appear at the bar of the House and claim their seat, the custom being an introduction by two other members, who announce that these requirements have been fulfilled. A member who has been unseated and re-elected must again sign the roll and take the oath. Since 1879 all new members, including Ministers, after re-election, have been introduced.

MINISTRY, THE.—Is the administration, under the name of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, which exercises the powers of the Crown, in accord with Parliament, and more especially with the House of Commons. Some eminent party leader, who either has or hopes to obtain the confidence of the majority of the House of Commons, is authorized by the Governor General to form a Ministry, the members of which he selects from those favorable to his policy, he himself being the Prime Minister. The Ministry exercises supreme authority, and includes the executive, the legislative and the judicial powers of the Crown, and in it, for the time being, the whole of the governing power of the Sovereign's representative is vested. See Queen's Privy Council for Canada.

Motion, A.—Is the offer of a substantive proposition for adoption by the House, such as a motion for leave to bring in a bill, or of a resolution expressive of an abstract opinion.

NAMED.—For a member to be named by the Speaker is a signification that, in his opinion, he has incurred the displeasure of the House, which must then proceed to deal with him in a formal way.

Votes and Proceedings are the entries printed and published daily of the transactions of the House made at the table by the Clerk, from which the journals are compiled.

Notices of Motion.—The notice of an intended motion must as a rule appear on the Business Paper of the House on the day when it is to be moved.

OATHS OF MEMBERS.—New members may take and subscribe the oath at any time during the sitting of the House before the orders of the day and notices of motion have been entered upon, or after they have been disposed of, but no debate nor business may be interrupted for that purpose. After the first day of a new Parliament (when the members are sworn in by Commissioners per dedimus protestatem at the Clerk's table), members are sworn in, and sign the roll in the Clerk's office, for convenience sake.

ORDER.—By this word is meant obedience to certain rules and regulations intended to facilitate the despatch of business, and preserve that decorum necessary in all deliberative assemblies. The rules by which the business of Parliament is conducted are of two kinds: one kind the House possesses in common with all deliberative assemblies—another is peculiar to its own existence and powers. For the proper application of all these rules, the Speaker or Chairman's decision is had, and to this decision due deference is at all times paid. The Speaker, while in the Chair, takes no part in the debate, it being his duty to regulate the manner in which business shall be transacted; to confine those members who address the House to the subject under consideration; to give his opinion in all things which relate to order; to put the matter in dispute into the form of a question, upon which the votes of the members are taken, and to declare the majority as soon as it is communicated to him by the Clerk. It is also his duty to state when the business of the House is closed, and to see that its transactions are correctly and properly recorded. After routine he calls upon the member whose motion stands first on the paper of notices, or who is otherwise entitled to precedence. A motion must be seconded or it falls to the ground; being seconded, the motion is

handed in writing to the Speaker, who has to read it before debate can be had upon it; having been read, objections may be urged. There are several ways by which a motion may be opposed; it may be met by a direct negative, or by an amendment, or by a motion to postpone, or by proceeding to the next order of the day, or by moving the previous question, or by the simple motion of adjournment. A motion once read cannot be withdrawn without the permission of the House. Unless a speech is made objecting to a motion, neither mover nor seconder can speak a second time, except in explanation. If, however, a debate does arise, in which opposition is offered to the mover of a motion, he has the right to reply; but this privilege does not belong to the mover of an amendment. All are permitted to explain. The debate being ended, the Speaker or Chairman puts the question, and calls upon those in favor to say "Yea," and those of a coutrary disposition to say "Nay." He then declares that in his opinion the "Yeas" or the "Nays" (as the case may be) have it. If his decision is questioned, the House divides, the "Yeas" rising and their names being taken down, the "Nays" following; . the numbers are counted from the record and declared. The simply calling for a division, when the Speaker has declared that "the Yeas have it," would not, however, require the record of his vote adversely as "Nay," the Canadian rule differing herein from the English. When an amendment has been moved, the vote is taken on the amendment, and then on the original question. Should the amendment be adopted, it then becomes the substantive motion, and may be amended in the same way that the original motion was amended. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be disposed of. Any member is at liberty to interrupt another by "rising to order," which means that he rises in his place and calls the attention of the Chair and the House to a breach of order then being committed. In debate it is contrary to order to mention any member by name; the same rnle prevails in the Committee of the Whole, except as regards the Chairman, who is sometimes called by his name, and not Mr. Chairman.

Orders of the Day.—Are the bills set down for consideration on a particular day.

PARLIAMENT, the name of the Supreme Legislature of Great Britain, was first used in the reign of Henry III. It was first applied in Canada by the B. N. A. Act.

Parliamentary Agents.—In England all the business for private corporations and individuals is transacted by Parliamentary Agents, who conduce to the interest of their clients, as well as to the convenience of Committees and Members through their familiarity with Parliamentary practice. Their employment is sanctioned in Canada, every agent being (Rule 72) personally responsible to the House and to the Speaker for the observance of the rules, orders and practice of Parliament, and for the payments of all fees and charges; and all agents must have received the express sanction and authority of the Speaker. As a rule they are professional gentlemen.

PETITIONS.—The following rules respecting Petitions should be carefully observed, as deviation therefrom will involve rejection:—

(1) Petitions involving public expenditure, such as grants of money or lands, claims for arrears of pay or for remuneration for public service rendered, or other demands imposing a burthen upon the people, cannot be received by the House, which has not the power of initiating such

imposition.

Petitions of this nature should be addressed to "His Excellency the Governor General in Council." The correct form is to forward them to the Secretary of State, who will then, "by command," refer them to the Ministers of the Crown, to whose Department their subjects respectively relate; and they will thereafter be dealt with departmentally, in the same manner as any official letter or communication received direct from the party interested. In point of fact, however, the forwarding of such petitions by members of Parliament, with covering letter, direct to the Department concerned, at any time, and without waiting for the session, is practically the best course. In this way, petitions may be brought before the executive in ample time for consideration before the meeting of Parliament, when the representatives can, if desired, bring on a discussion upon the merits of the case.

Although such petitions may not be presented to the House, which has not the power of granting them, it is quite in order (after proceeding as above) to bring them under the cognizance of Parliament by moving an address to His Excellency for them, and any other papers connected with them in the Departments to be brought down; and the Government, upon its responsibility to Parliament, can then be brought to account for the exercise or non-exercise of the power vested in it of granting the pecuniary or other

relief prayed for.

- (2) It has been decided that aliens, non-residents of the Dominion of Canada, have not the right of petitioning this Parliament. Exception is made, however, in case of private bills. See Bourinot's Procedure, p. 265.
- (3) Petitions may be either written or printed; provided always, that the signatures of at least three petitioners (in case of a number of petitioners) are subscribed on the sheet containing the prayer of the petition. Any single individual may petition Parliament.
- (4) Signatures to petitions must be original; no agent should sign a petition to Parliament for any purpose. No chairman can sign for a public meeting, but the common seal of a corporation is received as the petition of the whole body.
- (5) All petitions must be in respectful and temperate language, and must not contain any matter in breach of the privileges of the House, such as animadversion upon the conduct of the Parliament, or reference to any subject under debate, or to a motion in course of preparation.
- (6) Petitions to the House of Commons should be addressed: "To the Honorable the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled," the statement of grievance or cause of complaint should be clearly and succinctly set forth, and they must close with a specific prayer, thus:
- "Wherefore your petitioner prays that," etc., setting forth the address and relief that is sought.
- (7) The member presenting a petition should endorse his name thereon, and present it in his place in the House, confining himself, when doing so, to the statement of the parties from whom it comes, the number of signatures attached to it, and the material allegations it contains. He is responsible that it woes not contains impertment or improper matter.
- (8) After a lapse of two days for scrutiny by the Speaker and Clerk of the House, every petition which proves to be properly receivable is (Rule 86) "brought to the Table by direction of the Speaker, who cannot allow any debate, or any member to speak upon or in relation to such petition; but it may be read by the Clerk at the Table, if required; or if it complain of some present personal grievance, requiring an immediate remedy, the matter contained therein may be brought into immediate discussion. In ordinary course, it may, upon motion, be referred to a committee, or resolutions may be based upon it," etc.

PREMIER, THE.—Is the head of Her Majesty's Government in Canada—is the connecting link between Her Majesty's representative and her Privy Council for Canada, selects his colleagues in the Ministry, and is virtually responsible for the entire patronage of the Crown.

PREVIOUS QUESTION, THE, is a mode of attempting to avoid a direct expression of opinion upon a motion. It is effected by proposing, in lieu of the original motion, a motion "that this question be now put." A vote is taken on this, and if negatived, the original motion is practically rejected, although the motion may be proposed again at a subsequent sitting.

PRIVILEGE, A QUESTION OF, is founded on a matter directly concerning the privileges of the House, recently arisen, and calling for its immediate interposition. Such a matter may be considered without notice, and takes precedence of all other business.

Privileges of Members.—Under Rev. Stat. of Can., Cap. 11, Sec. 3, every member of the Senate and House of Commons holds, enjoys and exercises the like privileges, immunities and powers as at the time of the passing of the B. N. A. Act 1867, were held, enjoyed and exercised by the Commons, House of Parliament of the United Kingdom and by the members thercof, so far as the same are consistent with and not repugnant to the said Act, and also such privileges, etc., as are from time to time defined by any Act of the Parliament of Canada. These privileges include freedom of specch and person, and freedom from legal arrest and seizure under process from the Courts of Law and Equity. This does not extend to indictable offences, or to actual contempts of the Courts of Justice. Members of both Houses are exempt from all duties, the performance of which might interfere with their prompt attendance to their Parliamentary calls.

PRIVILEGES OF PARLIAMENT.—Amongst the privileges which the Commons claim are:

The power of committing individuals to prison; the power of publishing matters which, if not issuing from such high authority, might become the subject of proceedings in a court of law; the power of directing the Law Officers of the Crown to prosecute persons accused of offences against the laws or affecting the privileges of Parliament; and finally, of doing anything not directly con-

travening an existing Act of Parliament, which may be necessary for the vindication and protection of its own rights, in the exercise of its constitutional functions. Privilege of Parliament, such as it is, continues for a convenient time after prorogation and dissolutions.

Property Qualification of members of the Commons is not now necessary. A Senator must be possessed of \$4000 real and personal estate over and above all liabilities.

Proposation of Parliament is an interruption of its sittings by Royal authority. All unfinished business terminates and dies with a prorogation. Prorogation never extends beyond forty days, but it may be repeated from time to time by proclamation, and eontinue to be renewed until it is intended that Parliament shall meet for the despatch of business. The Crown can summon Parliament to meet at any time by giving fourteen days' notice. By the British North America Act, Sec. 30, it is provided that "there shall be a Session of the Canadian Parliament once, at least, every year, so that twelve months shall not intervene between the last sitting," etc.

Public Printing and Stationery, Department of, is in charge of the Secretary of State. All printing, stereotyping, lithography or binding, and paper and other material required for the use of the Senate and House of Commons and of the several Departments must be procured and executed subject to the superintendence and audit of the deputy head of this Department, who is called the Queen's Printer and Controller of Stationery. He buys and distributes all paper, books, stationery and such like supplies.

Public Works, Department of.—The Minister presiding over this Department has charge of dams, hydraulic works, the construction and repair of harbors, piers and works for improving the navigation of any water works for facilitating transmission of timber, roads and bridges, public buildings, vessels, dredges, seows and machinery for the improvement of navigation, telegraph lines and all other property which belong to Canada, also the works and properties acquired, constructed or improved at the expense of Canada, or for the acquisition, construction or repairing of which any public money is voted by Parliament, also certain portions of the "Ordnance Property," also the management, charge and direction of the heating and maintenance of the Government Buildings at Ottawa.

QUALIFICATION OF ELECTORS.—A voter in a Commons election must be of the full age of twenty-one years, a British subject, and otherwise qualified as shewn in the table on page 227.

QUEEN'S PRINTER is head of the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, and subject to the Secretary of State.

QUEEN'S PRIVY COUNCIL FOR CANADA, The, is the Council to aid and advise in the Government of Canada. B. N. A. Act 1867, Sec. 11.

RAILWAYS AND CANALS, MINISTER OF, has the management, charge and direction of all the Government Railways and Canals, and of all works and property appertaining or incidental thereto, also of railways or canals or other public works placed under his charge and direction by any Act or Order in Council.

REVISING OFFICER revises and completes, in accordance with the *Electoral Franchise Act*, the lists of persons entitled to be registered as voters in the electoral district for which he is appointed. He holds office during good behavior.

ROYAL ASSENT, the Act by which the Crown agrees to a Bill. It is usually given at the end of a Session, unless there is urgent necessity for the Act becoming law without loss of time, in which case the Governor-General, or the person administering the Government, comes down to the Senate Chamber, and there, in the presence of both Houses, gives his assent. His Excellency specially manifests his assent to the Supply Bill. Bills to which the Royal Assent is not given are pronounced to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, and are mentioned in the Official Gazette as having been reserved for Her Majesty's consideration. Unless a reserve is made in the Act itself, so soon as the Royal Assent is given, the Act becomes a law, and can be proceeded on before any competent Court.

Senate, The.—The time for the ordinary meeting of this House is 3 p.m., unless some other time shall have previously been ordered. If a quorum is not present at thirty minutes after the time of meeting, the House is adjourned until the next sitting day. Fifteen members,

including the Speaker, constitute a quorum. The Speaker of the Scnatc is an officer appointed by the Crown.

Sergeant-at-Arms.—This officer, although in attendance on the House of Commons, is appointed by the Crown. It is his duty to obey the commands of the House, to apprehend and take into custody all those who are committed for any offence by the House. All the messengers and servants of the House, except the Clerks, are under his orders. He has a seat within the Bar, and directs all arrangements for the maintenance of order in the approaches thereto and in the galleries. He is, of course, in immediate attendance upon the Speaker, from whom be takes all orders in connection with his duties. He is assisted by a Deputy.

Speaker.—He is the presiding officer of the House. He reads all communications which come from the Queen's Representative or the Senate to the Commons; he has to present and read such addresses and petitions as are carried up to the Governor General by the whole House, and to deliver the usual speeches, on the part of the Commons, when presenting the Supply Bill, and other Bills calling for peculiar note and remark. Through him all witnesses and prisoners at the Bar of the House are examined, and he directs all arrangements when the House is to be addressed by counsel. It is his duty to deliver the reprimand of the House to any one who has incurred the penalty of receiving it; it is also his duty to issue warrants of committal or release for breach of privilege; to communicate with any parties when so instructed by the House. He enforces the Rules of the House; he cannot join in any debate unless in Committee of the Whole House. As the presiding officer of the House, he has all the duties attached to such an office. The Speaker is chosen by the members of Paliament, and holds his office until the Parliament in which he is elected is dissolved. Should a member persevere in disobeying the order of the Speaker and of the House, the Speaker may "name him," a course uniformly followed, as the term implies, by the censure of the House. On divisions, when the numbers happen to be equal, he gives the casting vote, generally with his reasons for voting, but he never otherwise votes.

STATE, SECRETARY, OF, has charge of the State correspondence, and keeps all State records and papers not specially transferred to other departments. He is Regis-

trar-General, and registers all summonses, proclamations, commissions, letters patent, writs and other instruments and documents issued under the Great Seal, and all bonds, warrants of extradition, warrants for removal of prisoners, leases, releases, deeds of sale, surrenders, and all other instruments requiring registration. The Department of Public Printing and Stationery is under his control.

Strangers may be admitted to the galleries of the House by ticket procured from the Sergeant-at-Arms. If any member shall take notice that strangers are present, Mr. Speaker, or the Chairman (as the ease may be), shall forthwith put the question that strangers be ordered to withdraw, without permitting any debate or amendment; provided that Mr. Speaker, or the Chairman, may, whenever he thinks proper, order the withdrawal of strangers.

Supply.—All proceedings which relate to the public income and expenditure must originate with the Commons, and must be begun by resolution moved in Committee of Supply, which is always a Committee of the Whole House. In the course of the session, estimates are submitted to a Committee of Supply, and resolutions moved thereon, granting to the Crown the sums requisite for the management of the various departments of the Government, and the support of various public and private institutions. Such as are confirmed by the Committee of Supply are reported to the House, where they are again reconsidered, and adopted or rejected, as the case may be. Upon these a Bill is passed, and this Supply Bill furnishes authority to the Government for disbursing the various sums appropriated. The Senate may reject this or any other Money Bill, but they cannot alter or amend the substance of a Supply or Money Bill; such a course would be regarded as an invasion of the privileges of the House of Common. Before any Bill ean be introduced authorizing the expenditure of any public money, resolutions must be moved in Committee of Supply, agreed to there, reported and confirmed by the House.

TREASURY BOARD consists of the Minister of Finance, and any five of the Ministers composing the Queen's Privy Council for Canada nominated from time to time by the Governor in Council. The Board acts as a Committee of the Queen's Privy Council on all matters relating to finance, revenue, and expenditure or public accounts referred to it by the Council, or to which the Board thinks it

necessary to eall the attention of the Council. The Minister of Finance is Chairman, and the Deputy Minister of Finance is ex officio Secretary of the Board.

WAYS AND MEANS.—As the Committee of Supply relates to the expenditure of the country, so the functions and duties of a Committee of Ways and Means have reference to the funds by which such expenditure is to be met. Loans, duties, taxes, excise and revenue of every description, are submitted to the Committee of Ways and Means. The propositions of Government on this subject are reduced to resolutions, submitted, considered and decided on, and such as are agreed to are reported to the House. The series of resolutions in eom., when reported, are read the first time, pro forma; then the second time en bloc (not the first resolution the second time, as formerly the practice in Canada), at which stage general discussion of the subject takes place. The resolutions are then read singly, when discussion is confined to the subject matter of each. Those which may be adopted are embodied in a Bill or Bills, and in due course and form become the law of the land. As in the ease of Supply Bills, the Senate may reject these Bills, but cannot amend them.

GARNEAU, PIERRE (De la Durantaye).

Descended from one of the oldest French families in Canada, ancestors having come from France in 1636. B. at Cap Santé, P.Q., 8th May 1823. Ed. there. M., Sept., 1857, to Cécile, dau. of the late Edward Burroughs, formerly prothonotary of Quebec. A merchant. Head of the extensive wholesale dry goods firm P. Garneau, Fils & Cie. Presdt. of the Quebec Steamship Company; one of the founders of the Stadacona Bank, and Vice.-Presdt. during its existence (five years); also Presdt of the Board of Liquidation; one of the founders and Vice-Presdt. of the Quebec and Levis Electric Light Co.; is a Dir. of the Quebec Assurance Co., of the Quebec & Lake St. John Railway Co., of the de Lery Gold Mining Co.; was a Dir. of La Banque Nationale; Vice-Presdt. of the Riverside Worsted Co.; Presdt. of the Quebec Street Railway Co., until 1878, when he resigned; Vice-Presdt. of the Quebec & Gosford Railway Co., which afterwards became part of the Quebec & Lake St. John Railway; Vice-Presdt. of the Quebec Rubber Co., etc. Was a Government dir. of the North Shore Railway. Was Mayor of the city of Quebec from 1870 to 1874. Was Presdt. of the Quebec Board of Trade in 1871; and a member of the Canal Commission in 1870. Apptd. a member of Executive Council and Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works for Quebec 22 Sept., 1874. Subsequently became Commissioner of Crown Lands. Resigned with his colleagues 2 March, 1878.

First returned to Leg. Assem. for Quebec County by acclamation, 11 March, 1873, on resignation of the sitting member; re-elected at g. e., 1875. Assem. of Quebec from 1867 to 1876, and was Attorney Gen. of Quebec prior to Feb., 1873, when he became Premier, Minister of Public Instruction and Provincial Secretary. In Feb., 1876, he retired from the Assem, and was apptd. Superintendent of Public Instruction, a position he held until April, 1875, when apptd to Leg. Council A Conservative.—Quebec.

Pelletier, Thomas Philippe (Grandville).

Poirier, Joseph (Beauce).

B. at St. Joseph de la Beauce, 22 Dec., 1849. Ed. at Nicolet Coll. Is a farmer, and has been Mayor of his parish, and Warden of the Co. of Beauce. Sat in Leg. Assem. from 1878 to 1881. Re-elected at g. e., 1892. A Conservative.—St. Joseph de la Beauce.

RIOUX, NAPOLÉON (Temiscouata).

Family came from Lyons, France, about 1700. B. at Trois Pistoles, 13 Feb., 1837, and ed. there. M., 1862, Philomène Martin. Is a farmer and co-Seigneur of the Seigniory of Trois Pistoles, also a J.P. Savaria, Adolphe François (Shefford).

Family came from France in 1750. B. at St. Pie, Co. Bagot, 21 May, 1848. M., 6 Sept., 1872, Miss Church. Is a merchant, and has been a Conncillor and Mayor of the Town of Waterloo. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1892. A Conservative.—Waterloo, P.Q.

SHEHYN, Hon. JOSEPH, J.P. (Quebec East).

Of Irish and French Canadian parentage. B. in the City of Quebec, 1829. Ed. partly at the Quebec Seminary

and partly by private tuition. M., 16 Aug., 1858, Marie Zoé Virginie, eldest dau. of M. Ambroise Verret, of Quebec. A member of the firm of McCall, Shehyn & Co., whole-ale dry goods merchants. Born at St. Armand East, 19 April, 1846. Ed. at the Grammar School, Frelighsburg, and at Poughkeepsie, N.Y. M., June, 1873, Frances S., dau. of the late R. L. Galer, Esq., Dunham. A farmer and trader. Has been a Councillor; a School Commr.; Presdt. of the Missisquoi Co. Agricultural Soc.; and Sec.-Treas. of the Municipal Coun-

cil and of the School Commrs. of St. Armaud East; is Presdt. of the Missisquoi and Rouville Mutual Fire Insur. Co. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1881, and reelected at g. e., 1886. STEPHENS, GEORGE WASHINGTON (Huntingdon).

GRAHAM, HERBERT CLEMENT (South Brandon).

Family originally from Scot., but settled in Can. for three generations. B. in Blenheim, Co. Oxford, Ont., 27 Feb., 1856, and ed. there. M. in Duart, Kent Co., 1878, Miss Annie Cunningham. Has sat for four years continuously as a mem. of Oakland Municipal Council. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g.e., 1888, and re-elected 1892 and 1896. A Liberal,—Hayfield.

GREENWAY, Hon. THEMAS (Mountain).

Eldest s. of the late Thos. Greenway, Esq., formerly of Cornwall, Eng., and latterly of Stephen, Co. Huron.

B. in Cornwall, Eng., 25 Mar., 1838. Came to Can. with his parents in 1844, and settled at the Tp. of Darling, Co. of Durham, where he was ed. M., 1st, 25 Jan., 1860, Miss Annie Hicks (she d. May, 1875); 2nd, in 1877, Miss Émma Essery. Was in business as a merchant near Exeter; removed to Manitoba in 1878, where he has since been engaged in farming. Was Reeve of the Tp. of Stephen, Ont., for ten years. An unsuccessful candidate for South Huron, in the Commons, at g. e., 1872, and at g. e., 1874. Returned to Commons for that constituency by acclamation on sitting mem. being unseated, 11 Feb., 1875, and held the seat for the rest of the term. Returned for present seat in Leg. Assem. for Man. at g. e., 1879, by acclamation. Re-elected at g. e., 1883, 1886, 1888, 1892 and 1896. On the resignation of the Harrison Administration, 19 Jan., 1888, formed the present Government, taking the offices of Presdt. of the Council and Minister of Agriculture and Immigration. HETTLE, JOHN (Turtle Mountain).

JACKSON, SAMUEL JACOB (Rockwood).

S. of Samuel Jackson, who came from Hacketstown, Co. of Carlow, Irel., and settled in Brampton, Ont., in 1850, by his wife Elizabeth Sutcliffe, a native of the Co. Wicklow, Irel. B. in Stradhally, Queen's Co., Irel., 18 Feb., 1848. Ed. at the Common and Grammar Schools in Brantford, Ont. M., in Winnipeg, 27 Fcb., 1878, Ida Isabella, dau. of A. H. Clark, Esq, of Stonewall, and formerly of London, Ont. Settled in Manitoba in 1871. Is a capitalist, and largely interested in various milling and mercantile concerns. Was an alderman of Winnipeg in 1877-78 and 1880, and Chairman of the Board of Works in 1882; dir. from Winnipeg on the Provl. Agricultural Board for four years; dir. of the Dufferin Park Asso.; dir. of the Manitoba Turf Club; and Presdt. of the Rockwood Agricultural Soc. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1883, and re-elected at g. e., 1886, 1888, 1892 and 1896. Apptd. Speaker of the Leg. Assem., Feb., 1891. A Liberal.—Stonewall.

McIntyre, Peter Campbell (North Winnipeg).

Father, a native of Perthshire, Scot., eame to Can. in 1815, and settled near Perth, Co. of Lanark. B. at Balderson, Co. Lanark, 5 Feb., 1854, and ed. at the Public School there and at Perth High School. M., Nov., 1892. Is a printer. Was a mem. of the Winnipeg School Board for 10 years, and Chairman for 5 years. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1892, and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal.—Winnipeg.

McMillan, Lieut.-Col. Hon. D. H. (Centre Winnipeg).

B. at Whitby, Ont., Jan., 1846. Ed. there and at Collingwood. In 1864 served four months on the Niagara frontier in a Provincial Batt. of Volunteers, and during the Fenian Raid of 1866 he served at Port Colborne and Fort Eric. Went to Winnipeg as an officer in the Red River Expeditionary Force under Col. (now Lord) Wolseley. Has since engaged in business as a miller and grain dealer. On the breaking out of the North West Rebellion in 1885, assisted in organizing 95th Batt. of V.M. and was apptd. Major—since apptd. Lieut.-Col. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Winnipeg in Leg. Was Presdt. of the National Soc. of St. Jean Baptiste of Man. in 1889, and is now Presdt. of L'Union Métisse St. Joseph, and a dir. of the Red River and Assiniboine Bridge Co. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1886, and has sat continuously since then. A Conservative.—St. Boniface.

MICKLE, Hon. CHARLES JULIUS (Birtle).

B. in Stratford, Ont., 22 July, 1849. Ed. at the Grammar School there. Unmarried. Is a Solicitor. First returned to Leg. Assem. for present seat by acclamation at g. e., 1888, and re-elected 1892 and 1896. Apptd. Provincial Secty., 25 Nov., 1896. A Liberal.—Birtle.

MORTON, THOMAS LEWIS (Westbourne).

Of Scottish descent, but parents born in Eng. B. in Hull, Yorkshire, Eng., 10 June, 1846. Ed. at Edward

VI. Coll., Gloucester. M., 29 Nov., 1876, Mary Honora Cory, at Gladstone, Man. Served apprenticeship in the Devon and Cornwall Bank, Plymouth, Eng., and remained there as cashier for five years afterwards. A farmer, and was Treas. of Co. of Westbourne from 1878 to 1888. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1888, and re-elected 1892 and 1896. An English Conservative. Elected as an Independent supporter of the Greenway Administration.—Gladstone, Man.

MULVEY, Major STEWART (Morris).

B. in Sligo, Irel., in May, 1834. Ed. at the Irish National Schools. M., 1856, Rebecca, dau. of Humphrey Gilmore, Esq., of Sligo, Irel. Came to Can. in 1854, and taught school in the Co. of Haldimand, Ont., for 14 years. Went to Winnipeg in 1870 as an ensign in the Red River Expeditionary Force, and remained there. Founded in 1871 and edited the Liberal for two years, when he was apptd. Collector of Inland Revenue. Paré, Théophile (La Verandrye).

S. of Louis Paré, of the Railways and Canals Dept. B. at Lachine, P.Q., and ed. at the Seminary of Ste. Thérèsc. Is a farmer. Was Registrar of the Co. of La Verandrye from 1882 to 1890, and Secty. Treas. of the Municipalities of Ste. Anne and La Broquerie. First returned to Leg. Assem. at g. e., 1892, and re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative.—Ste. Anne des Chènes.

PRENDERGAST, JAMES EMILE PIERRE (St. Boniface).

Eldest s. of the late James Prendergast, Advocate and Coroner for the dist. of Quebec, and of Emélie Gauvreau. B. in the city of Quebec, 22 March, 1858. Ed. at the Seminary and Laval Univ., Que., where he graduated B.A. in 1878 and LL.B. in 1881. M., 29 July, 1886, Olivina, dau. of the late François Mondor, St. Boniface. Is a Barrister of the Prov. of Que. and also of Man. Has been Mayor of St. Bonifacc, Presdt. of La Société St. Jean-Baptiste de Manitoba; a member of the Board of Education of Man. from 1884 to the time of its abolition in 1890; a mem. of the Council of Manitoba Univ. since 1885. Has a seat in the "Académie des Musés Sautones," France. First returned to Leg. Assem. for Verandrye July, 1885, by acclamation on the appt. of the sitting mem., Mr. Prud'homme, to the Bench. Re-elected at g. e., 1886, 1888, 1889, 1890 and 1896. Was a mem. of Executive Council and Provl. Secretary from 19 Jan., 1888, to Aug., 1889, when he resigned on account of differences with his colleagues on the proposed school legislation. Warmly opposed the Greenway Government in the Session of 1890, taking a prominent part in the defence of Separate Schools. A Conservative-Liberal.—St. Boniface, Man.

Sutherland, Hector (Kildonan).

Fifth s. of Senator John Sutherland, a descendant of one of the Sutherland emigrants who were settled at Red River by the Earl of Selkirk in 1815. B. at Kildonan, 1852. Ed. there and at Manitoba Coll. M., 1889, Henrietta, dau. of late William Gunn. Is a farmer. Has been a mem. of the Kildonan Council and a Dir. of Kildonan Agric. Soc. (Entered Confederation, 1st July, 1873.)

Lieutenant-Governor.*—His Honor George William Howland. B. in Waterford, Irel., 19 May, 1835. Emigrated with his parents to P.E.I., 1839. Ed. at the Central Academy there. THE LEGISLATURE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

In this province there were two Legislative Chambers until January, 1894, when they were merged into one—the object of the change being to lessen the cost of legislation. The arrangement being peculiar is thus explained in the Statistical Year Book of 1895:—

Under the old law, there were two Houses: one called the Legislative Council, and the other the House of Assembly. The Legislative Council consisted of thirteen members elected from certain large constituencies. The House of Assembly consisted of thirty members elected from smaller constituencies. The Legislative Councillors were elected by voters, who owned freehold or leasehold property to the value of \$324. The members of the House of Assembly were elected practically by manhood suffrage, that is to say, there were a number of qualifications for the electors, such as property, occupation of land, and performance of statute labor, and, taken altogether, they practically amounted to manhood suffrage.

The purpose of the change made by the statute passed in 1893 was to amalgamate the two Houses. and there is now one House called the Legislative Assembly consisting of thirty members. thirty members were returned for fifteen constituencies, each constituency returning two members. One of these members, who is called a Councillor, is returned by the votes of men who own property, freehold or leasehold, to the value of \$324, which is the same qualification as that for a member of the old Legislative Council. The other member, called an Assemblyman, is elected by the general vote, the same men being able to vote for him as under the old law could vote for a member of the House of Assembly. After they are elected, both Councillor and Assemblyman stand in the same position. They have the same voting power, and the effect of this is to make simply an amalgamation of the two Houses. The protection supposed to be given to property holders by the Legislative Council still exists.

A farmer. First returned to House of Assem. at g. e., 1886, and re-elected at g. e., 1890 and 1893. A Conservative.—New Perth, P.E.I.

Sinclair, Hon. Peter (Queen's, 1st Dist.).

S. of the late Peter Sinclair, Esq., by Mary Crawford, both of Argyleshire, Scot. B. and ed. there. M., Feb., 1879, Margaret, dau. of A. McMurdo, of New Annan. A farmer. First returned to House of Assem., 1867. Was apptd. a mem. of the Board of Education, 1868. Was a mem. of Ex. Council from 1869 to 1871, when the Government resigned; and again in 1872, in the Haythorne Liberal Adminis-

tration, when he acted as Government Leader in the Assem., and was a mem. of the Board of Works. On the admission of P.E.I. into the Dominion, returned to Commons for Queens, Sept., 1873; re-elected by acclamation at g. e., 1874, and defeated at g. e., 1878. Elected to House of Assem. at g. e., 1882, and at g. e., 1886, 1890 and 1893. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council, 22 April, 1891. WARBURTON, ALEXANDER BANNERMAN (Queen's, 1st Dist.).

James Warburton, who was a mem. of the first administration after the grant of responsible government in P.E.I., and subsequently held from time to time the offices of Provincial Secretary and Provincial Treasurer in the different Liberal administrations which followed. Legislative Assembly.

The North-West Territories were governed at first under the administration of the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba; then by a Lieutenant-Governor, and Council nominated by the Dominion Government (Act of 1880); then by a Lieutenant-Governor and by a Council, part elected, and part nominated; then, in 1888, by a Lieutenant-Governor and Elective Assembly. In the Session of 1890, the Federal Parliament provided for the adoption of responsible government. The powers conferred on the Legislative Assembly are the same as those conferred upon the other provinces by the B. N. A. Act, 1867, Sec. 92, except the borrowing of money on the sole credit of the Territories.

father, the late Rev. Wm. Bell, of Perth, came to Canada in 1820, and his late father, the Rev. Andrew Bell, died at L'Orignal in 1856. On his mother's side he is connected with the Dalhousie family. Born in the Township of Toronto, Canada, 3 June, 1841. M., 1873, Agnes, daughter of the late Alexander Smith, Esq., of Westbourne and Auchintroig, Scotland. Was engaged as an assistant on the Gool. DAWSON, GEORGE MERCER, C.M.G., LL.D., F.R.S. F.G.S., F.R.S.C., etc. - Director of the Geological Survey of Canada. S. of Sir William Dawson, late Principal of McGill Univ. B. at Pictou, N.S., 1 Aug., 1849. Studied at McGill Coll., and afterwards at the Royal School of Mines, London, Eng. Held the Duke of Cornwall's Scholarship given by the Prince of Wales, and obtained medals in Geology and Palæontology. Became an Associate of the Royal School of Mines, 1872. Apptd. Geologist and Naturalist to H.M. North American Boundary Commission, 1873. Published a report on the geology and resources of the country in the vicinity of the 49th parallel, 1875. In July, 1875, apptd. to the Geological Survey of Canada, and apptd. Director, 1 Jan., 1895 (Salary, \$3,200). Author of numerous reports published by the Geological Survey, chiefly in the region of the Great Plains and British Columbia, also of many scientific papers published in Canada, Great Britain and in the United States. One of the original members of the Royal Soc. of Canada, and Corresponding or Honorary Member of various learned societies in Canada and abroad. Placed in charge of the Yukon Expedition in 1887. In 1890 granted the honorary degree of LL.D., by Queen's University, Kingston, and in 1891, by McGill University, Montreal.
