Echoes From Yester Year News Shows City's Growth Society Not Unlike Circus Let Us Keep Ball Rolling

By Gil A. Cowan CHOES of the dim distant past are to be seen in an issue of The Glendale News for Friday, January 6, 1911, which was brought to this office yesterday.

Glendale had won on the preceding New Year's day the first prize in the Pasadena Tournament of Roses. A \$150 prize cup was awarded the entry.

The paper was then published by J. C. Sherer, the present city treasurer, and among the advertisements were found those of Williams' and McGee's dry goods stores, the Glendale Pharmacy, the Glendale Hard-ware company, First National Bank, the Glendale Dye Works, and several other establishments which still operate under the same firm name.

The Glendale News then was only a four-page weekly, issued every Friday. L. W. Chobe, J. A. Newton a four-page weekly, issued every Friday. L. W. Chobe, J. A. Newton and E. R. Naudain were in the electrical business; Guernsey ran a jewelry store; the classified advertisements filled less than a column of space; and the paper stated that

the city had about 2700 population.
Today there are 27,000 and more people here; the classified columns fill much more than a page; there are a half dozen jewelry stores; a half dozen electrical shops; and the daily edition of The Glendale Evening News runs from eight to twenty-four pages. All of which in a ew words tells of the progress and prosperity of this city.

Truly, The Glendale Evening News' growth best demonstrates the strides taken in the last ten years Publishing a paper here in 1911 was more or less a precarious proposition. The linotyping was done in Los Angeles, the printing business was poor, the factional fights made it difficult to promote the best interests and the business prosperity

of the city.

Now all of the merchants are united in advertising in their "home town paper." It represents all sec-It represents all sec tions, all organizations and makes for a friendly feeling in everything that is good. Five linotype machines, a perfecting press, a superior equipment for quality job printing, and managerial, editorial and mechanical forces equal to any city of its size in an office that is truly representative, yet under the same banner, give Glendale all that it needs in the way of a newspaper and publishing plant.






