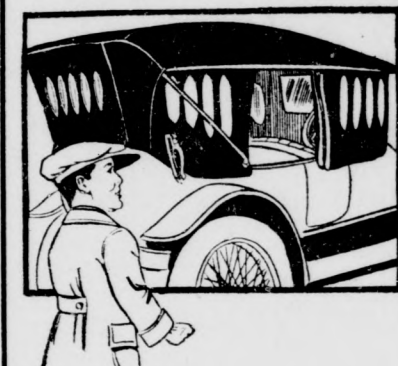

**PUBLIC EXPRESSION LOCAL REAL ESTATE P. - T. A. EXECUTIVE BOARD IN FAVOR OF BOOST TRIP ON BUS SYSTEM BEING SOUGHT**

Traffic Expert Declares People Should Give Views; Highway Tests Are Described

"If the people of Glendale don't show a willingness to co-operate with the city administration and get in touch with the mayor and city council, it is certain that the mayor and city council are not going to force the issue themselves," declared C. D. Gulick, municipal bus expert, speaking about recent developments in the situation.

Mr. Gulick stated that he was outlining a plan to get public sentiment on the subject and that he expected to bring the matter before tonight's session of the city council.

"The Pacific Electric is working day and night," he remarked with reference to propaganda. "Those fellows never sleep."

Mr. Gulick is leaving next week for various cities of the east to study at first hand their transportation problems. He intends to obtain first-hand information upon operating expenses of existing bus lines and to observe several new types of single and double deck busses in operation. He will be gone about fifteen days and may get as far as Boston.

A committee was appointed to investigate and work out the full details regarding attendance at the national convention. It is understood that Glendale will be represented by about ten persons.

The multiple listing committee next submitted its report, recommending the adoption of the multiple listing system by the Glendale Realty board referring the matter to the governing committee to draw up rules and regulations. Owing to the fact that there were two or three members not perfectly satisfied to agree with the plan at this time, and that this is to be one of the important matters taken up at the national convention, the board decided to defer action until after the convention when the opinion of realtors throughout the country may be had regarding the desirability of the multiple listing plan. It was also agreed that the adoption of this plan should be unanimous before the plan is to be used.

The meeting was concluded with a reminder from President C. B. Thom for everybody to turn out to assist the Chamber of Commerce in the trade trip through the San Fernando Valley and for everybody to make arrangements to attend the social evening after the trip through the valley. The object of the social evening is to further cement the ties of friendly association with all the Realty Board activities and the president therefore encouraged all to remain for this.

**F. L. Platt Tells About Testing Different Highways**

"It is not the motor busses of California that are hitting road transportation today," declared F. L. Platt, secretary and manager of the State Motor Carriers' association, during his recent visit to Glendale.

"I have noticed that private cars have crippled very noticeably our own profit. Are you going to pull private cars off the roads?"

Mr. Platt commented on the fact that only 1450 or 1500 motor busses are in operation in California while 749,000 licenses for private cars have been issued so far this year.

"Busses are no harder on the road than private cars," said Mr. Platt. He admitted that this statement probably would be received with skepticism, but called attention to a recent scientific test near Pittsburg, California. Here a special circular track one-fourth of a mile in circumference and eighteen feet wide was paved with thirteen specimen road pavings. An observation tunnel underneath this track was fitted with instruments which registered the impression of various automobiles upon the roadway. According to Mr. Platt, when a motor bus was driven upon the track, the jar was so light that the engineers in the pit below thought the vibration was due to the passage of a machine upon an adjoining strip of roadway. He stated that the reason auto busses had less effect on the road than ordinary private cars is because the load is distributed over a longer wheel base.

"The faster a car goes the less the impact on the road," declared Mr. Platt, mentioning the recordings of this experiment which showed that a loaded bus standing still affected the road .008 of an inch, at ten miles an hour, .006 of an inch, at 20 miles, .005 of an inch, and at thirty miles, .004 of an inch.

Mr. Platt declared that the life of a highway depends to a large extent upon the kind of soil and the kind of foundation it is built upon. He said that potholes in the road were caused principally by rainwater being drained underneath and causing a cavity into which the road caved. He said a great deal of damage was done by puddles of water being left on the surface of a thoroughfare after a rain.
