Mr. Borden, in stead of repudiating the men who have set up the standard of Nation alism in the narrowest sense, and who have exultantly avowed their opp tion to Canada either establishing system of defence for their own coun try or contributing to the defence of the Empire as a whole, has set his political sails to catch the fitful breeze raised in the province of Quebec by Bourassa. At the same time the Conservative leader has intimated that he is in favor of the relations of the province of British Columbia with the Dominion being settled by arbitration. That is to say, Mr. Borden would substitute for the B N. A. Act a court of appeal constituted upon a political basis, because a concession granted. one province could not be denied all the others on demand. All this simply accentuates a fact which has long been transparent-that Mr. Border has not the strength of character es-mental to the leadership of a political party in Canada. The impotent posi-tion of the Conservative party to-day is to a large extent due to this weak ness of its leader; and it would be an unfortunate thing for the country should a party which has no other policy than appeals to racialism and sectionalism ever gain ascendency.

There are some landssurveyed, but they are so; far away and the information in egard to them is so meagre that settlers usually decide not to try to look

for them. If one-more persistent than the average does venture forth, he usually returns disgusted, and the report is sent back to Britain and to Eastern Canada or the United States that there is no land to be obtained here without paying through the nose for it. In a few cases lands are pur-chased from the syndicates or private holders, but in the majority of cases the prospective settlers leave the country in disgust.

POULTRY RAISING. When the price of eggs soars to anywhere between sixty and eighty cents a dozen, people wonder whether it might not be advisable to turn their attention to poultry raising. Last year th poultry output of Canada was valued at \$25,000,000, but even this enormous sum did not pay for all the eggs and poultry consumed in the country, for large quantities were imported from the United States. It is curious that in an agricultural country like Canada it is found impossible to produce all the

eggs that are required for home con-sumption. British Columbia is as bad, if not worse than the other provinces, and the prices realized by poultry raisers are higher here than in any

other part of Canada. British Columbia is particularly nited to poultry raising, and especialis this true of the district surroundng Victoria. The climate here is nore equable and there is not as much ain and more sunshine than in any other part of the coast. For these reasons the industry has flourished. A great many people now are making a

feature of the industry, and it is found to be extremely profitable when scien tifically followed. There is still room for more to enter the field. The mar-ket is constantly growing, and will contine to do so for many years to com When the railway rates make it possi ble to ship the low grade wheat from the prairies in large quantities it will become still more profitable. We look for great developments along this line, and are of opinion that poultry and fruit will in time become the staple products of the southerly part of Van-
