ENLARGING THE GERMAN ARMY

QUESTION WILL COME UP IN REICHSTAG

Socialists Will Introduce Subject of the Kaiser's Recent Speech

Berlin, Nov. 22.—The Reichstag will reassemble to-day for its last complete session before its dissolution for the general election at which will be chosen the deputies to represent the German people.

The present Reichstag, the election of members to which was completed in February, 1907, automatically ceases to exist at the beginning of 1912 under the law providing that no parliament shall continue for more than five years. It is possible, indeed, that there may be a session in the autumn of 1911 for the transaction of emergency business, but this is unlikely.

The most important legislative measure with which the administration will be the bill providing for the German army's gradual expansion during the next five to seven years.

In order to escape the danger of fluctuations resulting from varying parliamentary majorities, the government long ago adopted the policy of fixing the naval and military forces in advance, for periods of years, so that a bill once passed, remained operative during the ensuing years even though there might be a majority in favor of diminishing expenditures for armament. Thus the German Naval Act of 1900 regulates the fatherland's naval programme up to the year 1916 and it has been customary to fix the rate of military expenditures for terms either of five or of seven years.

This time the government proposes to enact a fixed programme for the next seven years, but will reduce the period to five if there proves to be a strong feeling in the Reichstag that seven is too long.

The desired increase will be justified by the government's spokesmen on the ground that the present international situation renders it imperative for Germany to be armed to the teeth in order to maintain its position among the world's great powers.

The Socialists will offer the most determined opposition to any increase in military expenditures, but all the other parties, including the Radicals, are likely to co-operate in carrying

the administration's bill which is, therefore almost certain to be accepted with very few modifications.

Other administration measures will propose the reform of the existing criminal code, an extension of the system of state insurance against old age, sickness and accident and a broadening of the field of usefulness of the government labor exchanges.

The criminal code changes will be mainly technical in character. The pension law alterations will look towards the inclusion of many classes of people who do not profit by the system now. The strengthening of the labor exchanges is designed still further to lessen unemployment, which has been actively relieved by the exchanges already in operation.

There are three other bills the government will likely introduce, to which there is unlikely to be any opposition. One of them revises the federal constitution in such a way as to provide for concessions by Prussia, the predominant state, to the three smaller states of Saxony, Baden and Hesse. A second provides for the construction of new waterways throughout the empire. A third revises the procedure in military trials by court martial.

The most interesting of the session's debates will probably grow out of interpellations which the Socialists intend to introduce.

First and foremost, the Socialists will question the chancellor regarding the Kaiser's recent speech at Königsberg, in which His Majesty broke his last two years' reserve and proclaimed his inspiration from the Almighty to rule by divine right.

The second Socialist interpellation will deal with the riots in the North-western district of Berlin and with the measures to which the police resorted in suppressing them. The Socialists will charge that these measures were brutal in the extreme and that many harmless and perfectly peaceful citizens were sabred or bludgeoned in one indiscriminate persecution of everyone living in the locality where the disorders occurred.

A third query will concern the price of meat. In this the Radicals will join the Socialists in attacking the administration.

LORDS AND COMMONS.

Lord Lansdowne Submits Proposal for Settlement of Disputes.

London, Nov. 22.—The House of Lords yesterday began an apparently fruitless discussion of the veto bill in the second reading stage, the Earl of Crewe introducing the measure before a crowded house. He said the veto bill constituted a request by the government that the country restore a reasonable measurement of freedom to its chosen representatives.

Lord Lansdowne criticized the bill, but said it contained points that might have formed the basis of a useful discussion. He moved an adjournment until Wednesday, at which time he said he would introduce resolutions suggesting a manner in which the deadlock of the two houses might be broken. The motion was adopted.

Lord Rosebery supported the motion for an adjournment, saying the upper house had a right to present its case to the country without being suggested by the government.

The resolutions which Lord Lansdowne gave notice that he would introduce on Wednesday follow:

"It is desirable that provision be made for settling differences that may arise between the House of Commons and this House as re-constituted, reduced in numbers in accordance with the recent resolutions of this house.

"That as to bills other than money bills such provision should be made on the following lines:

"If a difference arises between the houses in connection with any bill in two successive sessions and during an interval of not less than one year, and such differences are unable to be adjusted by other means, it shall be settled at a joint sitting composed of the members of the two houses; provided, that if the measure relates to a matter of great gravity and has not been adequately submitted to the judgment of the people, it shall not be referred

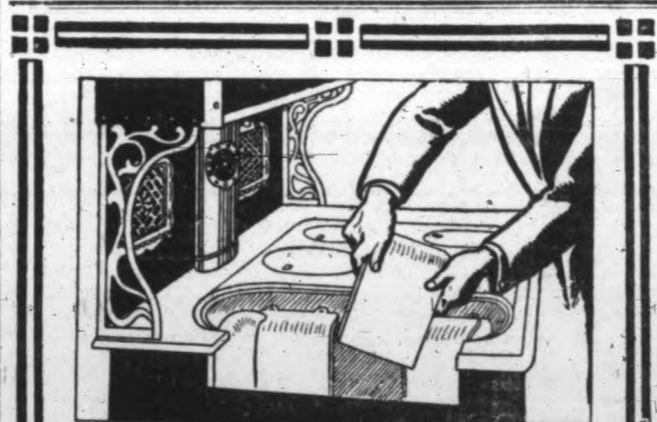

That as to money bills the provision shall be on the following lines:

"The Lords are prepared to forego their constitutional rights to enact and amend money bills which are of a purely financial character provided effectual provision is made against 'tacking,' and provided that if any question arises as to whether a bill or any of the provisions thereof are of a purely financial character, that question shall be referred to a joint committee of both houses, with the speaker of the House of Commons as chairman, and who shall have a casting vote only. If the committee holds that the bill or the provisions in question are not of a financial character they shall be dealt with forthwith at a joint sitting of the houses."

STRIKE QUESTION.

Federation of Labor Rejects Proposal to Centralize Power in Officials.

St. Louis, Nov. 22.—The American Federation of Labor yesterday declined to adopt a resolution the purpose of which was to centralize in its officials the power to call general strikes in given localities. President Gompers led the opposition to the resolution, which was introduced by Delegate Abrahams, of the Central Federation of Greater New York.

Resolutions were unanimously adopted rebuking railroad employees who petitioned the Interstate Commerce Commission to permit railroads to increase their freight rates.

The strike question came up on the report of the special committee, which was unfavorable to the measure. Delegates from the state and central bodies claimed that often they were unable to make strikes effective because of lack of authority over the various local unions. President Gompers said he would not accept such authority vested in himself as president of the federation, neither would he want it vested in anybody else who might hold his place.

A resolution asking that congress be petitioned to enact a law for the pensioning of aged workmen was defeated.

The convention adopted a resolution opposing government appropriations for river improvements of waterways, except in cases where the states or cities interested agree to provide free wharves and landings for all vessels without discrimination. Other resolutions adopted provide for pushing the organization of trade union, stenographers and office workers generally; favored a two cent tax on oleomargarine and a forty-eight hour law for public works, and protested against the recent executive order prohibiting civil service employees from petitioning the government for redress of grievances.

SURPRISE FOR FARMER.

Thought Crops Burned But Returns and Threshes 2,500 Bushels From 90 Acres.

To leave 40 acres of spring wheat unattended and to work on an irrigation ditch because he thought the dry weather had killed his crop, and later to return and thresh 2,500 bushels from the 40 acres, or an average of 23 bushels to the acre was the experience of William Jones, an American farmer who moved to this country last spring and purchased a farm near Gleichen.

The story told by Jones is that he put in 40 acres of spring wheat last summer. Later the dry spell came, and after deciding that he had lost all his crop, he went to work for the Southern Land Co., taking a contract on their ditch.

He stayed on the work for some time, but had occasion to come into Gleichen for supplies and while there he was met by a man who offered him \$15 a acre for

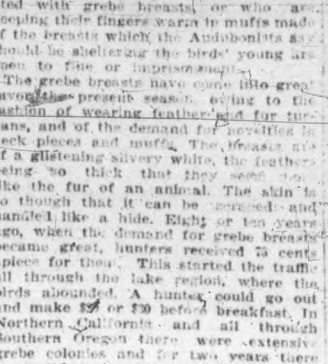

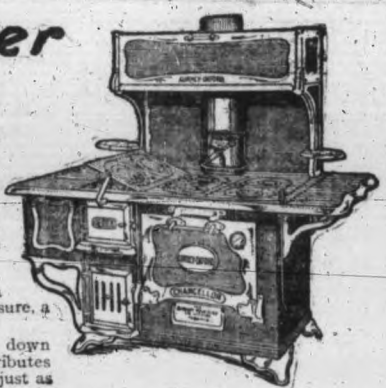

Taking into consideration the extraordinary strides that have been made throughout the spring and summer seasons, the advance noted is not only in itself satisfactory, but it is a really good indication that nothing other than an active condition will obtain for the remainder of the year.

In the cities reporting, the aggregate total for permits issued amounted to \$6,886,438, as compared with \$5,254,281 for the same month last year, and in many cases the figures reflect a most prosperous condition of affairs. Of the cities reporting—these are in Ontario, viz., Ottawa, 4 per cent.; Peterborough, 52 per cent.; and Port Arthur, 48 per cent. Despite these reversals, however, the province in general forged ahead substantially. Toronto's total of \$1,332,525, representing a gain of 27 per cent., is by far the largest total registered in the Dominion, while Brantford's phenomenal advance of 403 per cent. is the second highest increase per cent. attained. London is also substantially ahead with a gain of 171, and an excellent showing was made at Hamilton and Fort William, which exceeded last year's figures for the month by 46 and 5 per cent. in order named. In all these cases the amounts noted are of gratifying proportions. Again, Windsor is ahead by a gain of 117 per cent. and Berlin, comes to the fore with an advance of 75 per cent., while Kingston, which does not send in comparative figures, reports activities to the extent of \$17,576.

The largest proportionate growth for the month, however, was experienced in the Manitoba town of Brandon, whose slight upward march reflects itself in a gain of 684 per cent. Work amounting to \$437,675 was undertaken as against \$57,200 in the same month in 1909. Winnipeg, of the same province, registers \$894,400, and thus managed to slightly top its corresponding figures. Other Western increases are noted in the case of Prince Albert and Regina, which over reach their last year total to the extent of 12 and 295 per cent. respectively. Calgary also witnessed a high state of development, and Victoria made a gain of 41 per cent. Calgary advance of 156 per cent. represent \$439,575 more in new buildings than was undertaken in the previous September. Edmonton and Vancouver, however, were behind for the month, although Vancouver's loss is so infinitesimal as to practically amount to nothing, while Edmonton's decrease, which was 68 per cent., can be ascribed to the fact that improvements for the months were principally of a residential nature.

In the Eastern portion of the Dominion, Montreal, Sydney and St. John all turned month to good account. Montreal's total of \$993,386, representing a gain of 59 per cent., shows an investment that was only surpassed in one instance, Sydney and St. John increases are 37 and 8 per cent. in relative order. Notwithstanding the lateness of the season, a large amount of prospective work is reported from many sections, and unless severe weather interferes with present plans, operations will be continued at a brisk pace up to the end of the year.

BIG SWINDLES ALLEGED

U. S. Official Declares Public Fleeced of \$107,000,000 in Five Years

New York, Nov. 22.—In raids so important that Postmaster-General Hitchcock took charge of them in person, inspectors took action yesterday against two concerns which they charge with swindling the public out of more than \$100,000,000 by fraudulent use of the mails. S. H. Burr, president of the Continental Wireless Telegraph and Telephone Co., incorporated in Arizona, was taken in the second raid, and held in \$20,000 bail. Inspectors say his company has sold stock amounting to at least \$1,000,000, which has brought no returns to investors. Vaughan is treasurer of the Columbia Finance Co., which acts as agent for the Continental Wireless Telegraph and Telephone Co., and had charge of the Continental offices in this city.

Both raids are further evidence that the government in its warfare against alleged interstate swindlers means business and no longer will be content with issuing fraud orders denying them the use of the mails, but will press for conviction on criminal charges.

The present campaign began some months ago, and has resulted in the arrest of Louis A. Cella, of St. Louis, and his associates, charged with operating a string of bucket shops; the officers of the United Wireless Company, of the Elgin, Ill., office; and the officers of the United Exchange of Chicago, of the Steel-Mill cotton firm of Corinth, Miss., and of more than sixty other firms in all parts of the country.

Postmaster-General Hitchcock estimates that the public has been fleeced out of at least \$100,000,000 by get-rich-quick concerns in the last five years; but he says the heaviest loss has gone. He said that other raids, involving corporations that sought investors throughout the country, were expected shortly.

CANADIANS AT NEW YORK

Hon. Clifford Sifton and His Son Entered in Amateur Hunters' Class at Horse Show

Canada won the second prize at the New York horse show for amateur hunters ridden over a stiff flight of rails and one of the puzzling in-out jumps. Herbert C. Cox was the Canadian who carried off the honors. Among those who competed were Hon. Clifford Sifton and his son, Lt. Clifford Sifton. Speaking of the event a special correspondent of one of the eastern newspapers says: "A sporty sight was the appearance of Hon. Clifford Sifton, S.M.P.H., of the Ottawa hunt, in the pink coat and black velvet cap of the hunting field, and who was followed into the ring by his son, Lieut. Clifford Sifton, Jr., in the full regiments of the Canadian cavalry. Each had a thrashing big hunter under him, but both were in trouble at the rails. Henry M. Sage, of Albany, won the cup through the excellent performance of his 14.2 hand bay gelding, Dorchester, well ridden by Wm. Wick. The second prize went to Toronto, Canada,

A BY-LAW

To assess, levy and collect the cost of the Work of Local Improvement (No. 24) under By-Law No. 568, and to raise upon debenture loan the necessary monies to repay the temporary loan made in anticipation of this assessment.

Whereas the Council, by the Permanent Sidewalk and General Construction (No. 24) Local Improvement By-Law, 1908, directed certain works or improvements, viz: the construction of permanent sidewalks on both sides of Frances Avenue and the grading and macadamizing of roadway 24 feet wide between Douglas street and Burnside Road; the construction of permanent sidewalk on the West side of Haughton Street between Pembroke street and Denman street; the construction of permanent sidewalks on both sides of Pembroke street between Stanley Avenue and Haughton street; the grading, macadamizing and construction of permanent sidewalks with curbs, gutters and gutters on both sides of Fernwood road from Edmonton road and Cedar Hill road; the construction of permanent sidewalks on the East side of Fern Street from Cadboro Bay Road to Pandora Avenue; the construction of permanent sidewalks on the West side of Government Street in front of lot 534, Block H, and East Johnson Street to Pandora Avenue; the construction of permanent sidewalks with gutters on both sides, and grading and macadamizing roadway 24 feet wide on Pandora Avenue between Fernwood road and Stanley Avenue; the construction of permanent sidewalks on both sides of Cross street with curbs, gutters and boulevards, and the grading and macadamizing of roadway

between St. John street and Montreal street; the construction of permanent sidewalks on both sides of Vancouver street with boulevards, curbs and gutters and the grading and macadamizing of roadway between Humboldt street and Beacon Hill Park; Trutch street; the construction of permanent sidewalks on both sides and grading and macadamizing roadway thirty feet wide from Richardson street to Fairfield road; the construction of permanent sidewalks and roadway 24 feet wide with rock foundation and gravel surface from Oak Bay Avenue southerly, as a work of local improvement;

And Whereas, the City Engineer and City Assessor on the 14th day of May, 1908, made eleven joint reports and thereupon determined the proper life of the work or improvement and jointly ascertained and determined the proportion in which the assessment for the cost, as then estimated, of the said work of improvement would have to be made on the real property, and portions of real property benefited, and ascertained, determined and showed what real property is immediately benefited by the said work of improvement;

And Whereas, in pursuance of said

By-Law (No. 568) and in order to defray the cost during construction, the Council raised from the Bank of British North America on temporary loan \$65,501.92, of the estimated cost, and it is intended to repay the sum so raised and advanced out of the proceeds of the debenture loan to be raised hereunder;

And Whereas, the Council, by resolution, affirmed that the said work of local improvement benefits the Municipality at large and that it would be inequitable to raise the whole cost of such improvement by special assessments upon the persons otherwise assessable therefor, and propose to contribute the said amount of \$19,232.07 out of the revenue of the municipality, being approximately one-fourth of the total cost;

And Whereas the Council has decided to distribute the payment of the cost of said work, proposed to be assessed hereunder over a period of ten years and to borrow the money necessary to defray such cost upon the special rates levied hereunder upon the lands and improvements benefited, upon the guarantee of the Corporation at large;

ALL RED TELEGRAPH ROUTE PROPOSED

Only Line Not British is That Across the Atlantic Ocean

The announcement that the Atlantic cable may very shortly pass under the control of a great United States trust has aroused renewed interest in the question of an "All-Red" cable route—that is to say, an "All-British" line between the Mother Country and the Oversea Dominions, says a London exchange. The Atlantic cable is the only part of that connection which is not "All-British," but it is a vital part of the link between England, Canada and Australia. The cables between Canada and Australia and New Zealand are state-owned, and controlled by what is known as the Pacific cable board, composed of representatives of the joint owners, Great Britain, Canada and Australia.

For a considerable time an agitation has been in progress for securing the possession of a similar state-owned cable across the Atlantic. The Commonwealth of Australia has supported the proposal, Canada also favors it. The present labor government of Australia has recently had its attention drawn to the question, and is prepared to co-operate with Great Britain and Canada. But the British government has been apparently too much occupied with other matters to take up this great Imperial question as an urgent need. At present, has been said, the Pacific cable board control and own all the cables from Australia and New Zealand to Canada, the Atlantic companies continuing the communication with Great Britain from Montreal. The result is that where any question of through rates or communication is concerned the Pacific cable board is to a certain extent in the hands of the private companies owning the Atlantic cables. The Pacific cables, which were laid down at a cost of \$23,000,000, touch the Norfolk Island, Suva, the Fiji Islands and Fanning on the route to Vancouver Island. So far as South Africa is concerned it is served by the Eastern Telegraph Company—an "All-Red" route—there being two lines, via Gibraltar, Malta, Alexandria, Suez, Zanzibar, Mozambique, Delagoa Bay, Durban and Capetown, or alternatively, via Madeira, St. Vincent, Ascension, St. Helena and Capetown.

OUT ON BAIL

Lieut. Helm, of the German army, pleaded guilty in the Winchester court to spying on the British coast fortifications at Portsmouth. The original felony charge of sketching the fortifications was not substantiated. The court ordered Lieut. Helm to secure bail in the sum of \$1,250 to insure his appearance if he is called before the tribunal for sentence. This action was looked upon in the light of acquittal, as punishment will probably be suspended indefinitely.

ACTIVE PUBLICITY CAMPAIGN URGED

Thompson Valley Settlement Will Be Asked to Co-Operate With Kamloops

Kamloops, Nov. 21.—At the quarterly meeting of the board of trade a letter was received from the secretary of the Royal Inland hospital asking the board to appoint a committee of two to co-operate with similar committees from the city council and hospital board to take the initial steps for the building of a new hospital in the city.

It was explained that the mayor, chairman of the hospital board and president of the board of trade will be ex-officio members of the joint committee. It was decided to accede to the request, and the president appointed J. M. Harper and F. E. Simpson as the board of trade committee.

The Victoria Board of Trade asked the board to endorse a resolution asking the provincial government to build and maintain trunk roads through municipalities. The communication was received and filed.

J. M. Harper reported progress on the smelter proposition and read the correspondence that has passed between the committee and Mr. Wallender of the Iron Mask mine. The proposition, as understood so far, is that a company is to be formed with an authorized capital of \$3,000,000 to erect and operate the Iron Mask mine. It is asked by the promoters that Kamloops contribute the sum of \$60,000, to be paid for shares which are to be redeemed in 1916, with interest at 6 per cent if the concern is found to pay. The committee has not received information asked for and are awaiting further reply from Mr. Wallender before laying the proposition fully before the board.

Mayor Robinson spoke of the necessity of more extended efforts being made along the lines of publicity. He suggested that a competent man should be secured to devote his entire time to the matter. He considered this a most important matter. The city had given a grant for \$1500 this year and only half the sum has been made use of, and that not in the best way. The service requires a man with ample time and most members of the board have too much to do to give the matter proper attention.

A. L. Brown endorsed what the mayor said. He advocated that steps should be taken to get all places along the Thompson valley to co-operate in advertising its resources. Okanagan was taking credit for the Salmon Arm now and it was the duty of the people in this section to look after their own interests. The advertising committee was instructed to take the publicity question in hand, F. E. Simpson being added to the committee vice T. Calloway.

C. E. Lawrence urged that steps be taken to have an experimental farm established in close proximity to Kamloops.

DRINK AND CRIME

At a meeting held by the international Order of Good Templars in the Reform church schoolrooms on Friday the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, there have recently occurred in the vicinity of this city three tragedies whereby two persons have been murdered, one has committed suicide, another has presumably taken his own life, and another now lies in jail under sentence of death;

Therefore, be it resolved, that Victoria lodge of the International Order of Good Templars urges upon the government of this province, upon the authorities of the city, upon the Christian churches, and upon all who desire to prevent the recurrence of similar tragedies in the future, to do all in their power to encourage the practice of total abstinence from intoxicants, and to discourage and prevent the common sale of such liquors, or their use at public gatherings.

"And this lodge would further urge on all public minded citizens, the importance of supporting such orders and societies as promote total abstinence, by becoming members of such societies, or aiding them in their beneficial labors.

"And that copies of these resolutions be sent to the prime minister, the mayor, and the daily papers of this city."

FREE TRADE IN DOCTORS.

Bill to be introduced at Present Session of Dominion Parliament.

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Dr. Black, the Liberal member of House, N. S., has prepared a bill, which he will introduce this session, permitting physicians authorized to practice in any province of the Dominion.

It is understood that all the provincial governments and other interests have been consulted, and that the bill will not meet with any opposition.

The bill may also admit to practice physicians from any country in the British Empire, which extends a reciprocal privilege to the physicians of Canada.

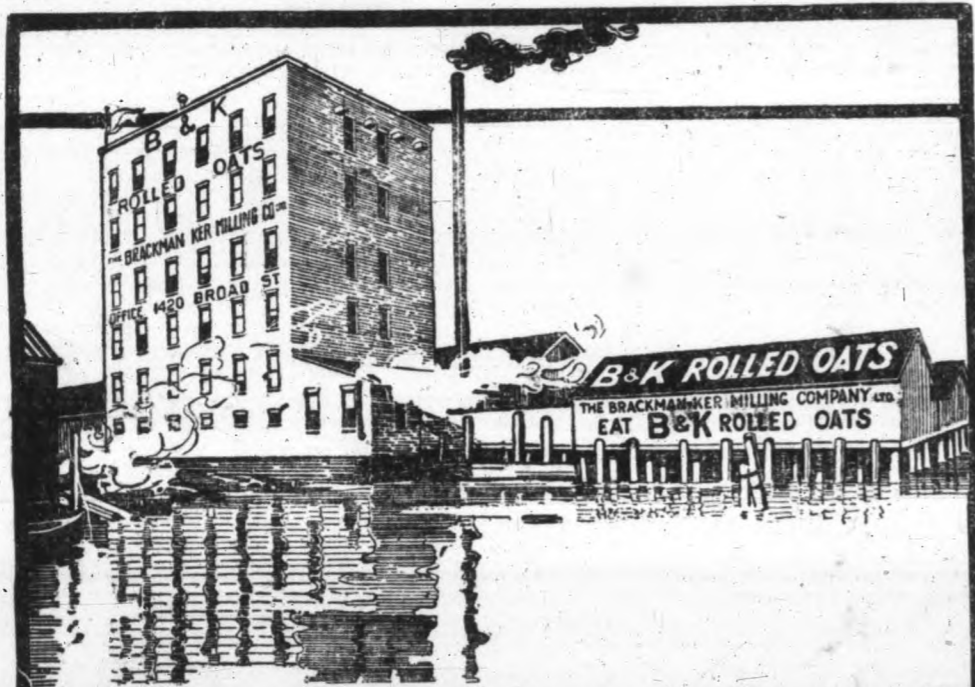

Book Review

THE SECOND CHANCE.

(By Nellie McClung.)

Among the best of the autumn books—in fact one might almost say the best—is "The Second Chance," by Nellie McClung, author of "Sowing Seeds in Danny," which brought the young prairie author, well-merited fame two years ago.

In her latest book, Mrs. McClung has followed to a successful issue the adventures of Pearl Watson, the little prairie-bred girl, whose never failing optimism and amusing resourcefulness made one think of what "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch" must have been in her girlhood's days.

The title of the book, "The Second Chance," is taken from the name given by Pearl to the abandoned homestead on which the Watson family settled; for the reason which Pearl gave when writing the following item for the social column of the local paper:

"Mr. and Mrs. John Watson and their interesting family are leaving our midst to live on a farm, hoping to better their ~~lot~~ and give the boys a chance to grow up decent."

The story of the Cavers family, who had first settled on the homestead, reaches one of the best temperance sermons ever delivered. Speaking of Mrs. Cavers, Pearl says:

"I know just what she is like—a poor, thin woman with knots on her knuckles. I could see her face in the house as we drove up to the door (this was purely imaginative on Pearl's part) kind of crooked like the house, and gray and ~~sever~~ beaten, with teeth on their ~~teeth~~ and she's failed. That's the sad thing. If people just set around and let things go to smash and don't care, that's top bad, but there's nothing sad about it. But to try your livin' best and still have to go under, that's awful."

"I know how she felt—when she was standin' here watchin' for Bill, hopin' so hard that he'd come home right this time and brought the list of things she'd asked him to bring with his wheat ticket. She'd lay out the supper, but not eat a bit herself, but just wait and wait and wait, and then when Bill did come she'd run out with the lantern, her heart thumpin' and her knees all weak and wobbly. The tavern-keeper had got the wheat ticket and he hadn't paid a bill or brought a thing for the house, and so at last she saw she was beat and done for."

One of the funniest of the many funny things in the book is where, in the absence of the regular secretary, Pearl writes the minutes of a ladies' aid meeting. She is a rapid writer, and puts in all the little side issues verbatim, and the report rather staggered the ladies when it was read aloud at their next regular meeting.

As a match-maker, Pearl was an unqualified success. When the young English girl Thursa who had come out to the prairies to marry her fellow countryman, who had packed her to get the home ready, changed her mind at the last minute, Pearl saw a chance for her friend Martha Perkins: "There was a chance for Martha now, if she could only qualify." The latter, however, lacked education, although she was a model house-keeper. Pearl expressed herself in the following terms:

"All Martha needs is more education, and there's lot of it lyin' around loose—its stickin' out of everything—its in the air and on the ground, and all over, and it seems too bad if Martha can't grab hold of some of it, and her so anxious for it."

Whether Pearl's good natured efforts to place her friend's willing feet on the glad road which led to the desired goal, matrimony, the last chapter of the story tells.

From cover to cover, the book is readable, and in a pleasant way teaches lessons of strict honesty, temperance, optimism, and the good which comes to oneself from lending a helping hand to others.

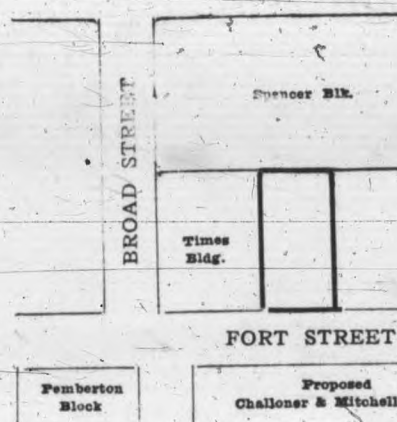

MARINE NOTES

The salvage steamer Salvor is still at work on the sunken Victoria tug Hope at Nanaimo, and it is expected that the little steamer will be floated and towed to port to-day.

The G. T. P. steamer Prince Rupert returned to port from the north on Saturday night and, after making the round trip to Seattle with a large number of passengers, sailed again on Sunday for Prince Rupert.

H. M. C. S. Rainbow is expected to leave to-day for Vancouver, where she will remain for about a week before returning to Esquimalt. Later in the year the Rainbow will leave on a fishery protection cruise in the north.

After losing 24 hours through being forced to shelter under the lee of James Island during a violent wind storm, the steamer City of Nanaimo returned to port Sunday night from Comox and way ports and sailed again this morning.

The Princess Royal replaced the steamer Chamber of the night run to Vancouver on Sunday and will maintain the same schedule, leaving here at 11:45 p. m., arriving at Vancouver 7:30 a. m., leaving Vancouver at 1 p. m. and arriving here at 7 p. m. The Chamber will be laid up at the Hudson Bay company's wharf.

The board of conciliation appointed under the Lemieux act to inquire into the grievances of the deckhands on the C. P. R. coasting steamers, concurred in their report to the minister of labor at Ottawa to-day. Afterwards it will be printed in the Labor Gazette.

Capt. Reuben Balcom, of this city, has received from the Norwegian government a silver cup through the Norwegian consul at Halifax, in recognition of his rescue, when commanding the sealing schooner Agnes Donahue, of the whaling steamer Solgilt. The Agnes Donahue and the Beatrice Corkum, two sealing schooners owned by Victorians, came upon a wrecked steamer on a reef at the Marion Islands and lost a month in the height of the whaling season taking the crew to Port Natal.

A cablegram received by Capt. J. W. Troup, manager of the C. P. R. steamer Princess Mary, recently completed at Bow, MacLaughlin and company's yards, Paisley, attained a speed of 15 knots, loaded, during her steam trials on the Clyde on Friday. The C. P. R. officials are greatly gratified by this fine showing, as the steamer was built to a contract speed of 14 knots. The Mary, which is intended for the Victoria, Comox and Vancouver run, is expected to leave the Clyde for this port early next month.

PERNIE CITY CLERK.
Pernie, Nov. 21.—The city council at a recent weekly meeting received petitions requesting that the moving picture shows be stopped on Sunday evenings. There were several applications received for the position of city clerk and treasurer, which was finally given to S. Barclay of the Crown's Nest Pass Coal Company.

Rapid progress is being made on the new Anglican church, the roof now being put on. When completed it will be one of the handsomest sacred edifices in the Kootenays.

TIMELY RESCUE.
Vancouver, Nov. 21.—Joe Fortes, the city's special officer and swimming instructor at English Bay, added another to the lengthy list of lives he has saved, when he launched his lifeboat and rescued Walter Parkes, an eleven-year-old boy whose parents live on Cordova street. The boy was paddling around on a log when the swift tide commenced to carry the log out to sea. If it had not been for the timely rescue the reckless youth's life would have been in great danger.

LABOR TEMPLE.
Vancouver, Nov. 21.—A building permit will be taken out this week for the construction of the labor temple on Dunsmuir street. The plans for the block cover a six-story building involving an expenditure of \$127,000.

the people as is possible is beginning to be felt, and when Victoria is a city of over 200,000 inhabitants such places will be of incalculable value. I have no pecuniary interest whatever in the purchase, but sincerely hope the large majority of ratepayers will turn out to vote in favor of the by-law. There are many opposed to it, as they favor the Sooke project on the ground that it will find employment for many men, and they object to 'putting money into the pockets of the company.' The Esquimalt waterworks are in full operation; the Sooke scheme will take years to carry out and no man knows the cost. If the by-law passes an ample supply of pure water, such as has so greatly benefited the growth of Vancouver will be assured, and the number of new buildings that will, in consequence, spring up in all directions will furnish more work for working men than the Sooke scheme would, and work close to the homes of the men instead of requiring them to camp out in the Sooke district.

CONSERVATIVE OFFICERS. New Appointments in Party Are Announced at Ottawa. Ottawa, Nov. 22.-A reorganization of the Conservative party, insofar as the whips and the methods of organization for the work during the session is concerned, it is announced, has materialized. All the officers and whips of the party have resigned in the reorganization, and the provincial idea has been abandoned. The only one officer to be retained will be Dr. Roche of Marquette, the Manitoba whip. As already announced, George H. Perly, M. P. for Argenteuil, Que., will be the chief whip; T. W. Crothers, of East Elgin, chairman of the committee or chief inside whip; Charles A. Magrath of Medicine Hat, permanent chairman of the caucus; Dr. Roche and A. S. Goddave, of Kootenay, B.
