Dear Sir,

The note signed by yourself & others, inviting me to speak at the late Faneuil Hall meeting in behalf of Latimer, was not received until after the meeting. The meeting had my sympathy, & would have had my presence without any special invitation, had not a previous engagement at another public meeting rendered it impossible. As it was, Latimer's Case was mentioned to my people on Sabbath afternoon & made the subject of special prayer & of a few remarks explanatory of it, in the course of which, I took occasion to say, what I am ready to say any & every where, that I regarded the decision of ^{the} Supreme Court of the U. States, under which Latimer is arrested & held, as annihilating the rights of the Sovereignties of the several States in a point most vital to the liberties of their citizens, & as being as much a violation of the Federal Constitution as it is at

war with God & justice.
