## P R E F A C E.

THE advent of the year 1850, fraught with Time's mutations, invites the Fifteenth annual issue of the Boston Almanac. The endeavor has been made to sustain its previous high reputation, and improve with the progress of the times. Several new features will be observed in the present number. The RAILROAD MAP, accurately compiled, expressly for this work, presents a view of the iron channels through which flows and will continue to flow the prosperity of our favored city; the plan is intended to embrace all roads now (or soon to be) in operation. It is hoped that the VIGNETTES of the chiefs of the nation, presented in the astronomical pages, will commend themselves as an humble tribute in honor of the most perfect system of human government ever devised. The short sketches of the Presidents accompanying them are believed to comprise information not generally held, nor easily accessible. These, and the account of the CITY ADMINISTRATION, in its various departments, and the PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS in Boston, have been prepared with care and ability by a gentleman familiar with the affairs of the city. The great hive of Business is indexed afresh in the DIRECTORY, and much of its activity presented more fully in the Advertising pages. The whole is submitted without lengthened comment, to the judgment of patrons.

To the public in general, among whom his fame was widely spread during a stirring and inventive career, it is well known that the former proprietor and founder of this work has realized "the last of earth." A brief biographical sketch is given in a subsequent page. The fruits of his exertions for the past fourteen years to establish the Almanac in the public estimation, he rendered available to his bereaved consort, from its future publication, by arrangement with his successors. They enter upon their duties with the desire to render the Almanac worthy of a still increased patronage, and to sustain its position as the favorite annual of New England.

## THE BOSTON ALMANAC, For the Year 1850.

Being the latter part of the 74th, and the beginning of the 75th, year of the Independence of the United States of America; and the 6563d year of the Julian Period; and the latter part of the 5610th, and the beginning of the 5611th, year since the creation of the world, according to the Jews; and the 2604th year since the foundation of Rome, according to Varro; and the latter part of the 1266th, and the beginning of the 1267th, (lunar) year since the Hegira, or flight of Mahomet.

---

The Astronomical computations for the Boston Almanac are generally given for *Mean Time* at Boston. The Sun's Declination is given at Greenwich, Mean Noon; and the Equation of Time at Washington, Mean Noon.

The time of the Sun's Rising and Setting, and the Length of Days, have reference to the Sun's Upper Limb. The Moon's Rising and Setting are also given for the Upper Limb, corrected for a Mean Semi-diameter of  $15' 33''$ .1, a Mean Equatorial Horizontal Parallax of  $57' 4''$ .7, and a Mean Horizontal Refraction of  $36' 6''$ .9.

---

The Planet MERCURY may be seen for a few evenings about the 22d of January and about the 15th of May, and for a few mornings about the 23d of October. VENUS will be the *Evening Star* from its superior conjunction with the Sun, 2d of March, until its inferior conjunction with the Sun, 16th of December; and the *Morning Star* the remainder of the year. This planet will be at its greatest brilliancy on the 10th of November, when it may be seen, in clear weather, through most of the day, about two hours and three quarters behind the Sun. MARS will be *Evening Star* until its conjunction with the Sun, 29th of November, then *Morning Star* until the end of the year. JUPITER is *Evening Star* from its opposition, 8th of March, until its conjunction, 26th of September, and *Morning Star* the remainder of the year.

# ECLIPSES. 1910820

In 1850, there will be two Eclipses, — both of the Sun.

I. *An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, Feb. 11th and 12th, invisible at Boston.*

This Eclipse will be visible throughout most of the Chinese Empire, India, Arabia, the Red Sea, the greater part of Africa, a part of the South Atlantic Ocean, the Indian Ocean, a part of the Southern Ocean, Australia, and a part of the North Pacific Ocean. The annular phase will traverse the South of Africa, Madagascar, and Sumatra.

II. *A Total Eclipse of the Sun, August 7th, invisible at Boston.*

This Eclipse will be visible throughout Peru, a part of Brazil, Ecuador, Venezuela, the West Indies, the Isthmus of Panama, Guatemala, Mexico, the southern extremity of Florida, the Gulf of Mexico, a part of Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, California, the Great American Desert, Oregon, a great part of the Pacific Ocean, the Empire of Japan, and New Guinea. The total phase will traverse the middle of the Pacific Ocean, passing north of the Sandwich Islands.

## SAMUEL NELSON DICKINSON,

The originator of the Boston Almanac, and its conductor for the first fourteen years, died in Roxbury, Dec. 16, 1848, in the 48th year of his age. He was born in the town of Phelps, Ontario Co., New York, the 11th of December, 1801, being the 7th child of Cotton Dickinson and Nancy Pullen; and was soon left an orphan, in humble circumstances, dependent upon himself and the arbiter of his future course.

In early life he manifested that taste for his calling which distinguished his later years. He began his career in the "Art conservative of all arts," at about the age of twelve, by neatly engraving his name from right to left in *alto reliefo*, on wood, and printing it in his spelling book; a circumstance which occasioned thus early the prophetic intimation that "he was born a printer!" He commenced learning his trade in Geneva, N. Y., with a Mr. Young, printer of the Palladium; but his employer dying, he went to New York City, where he remained a year or two, and then came to Boston. Here he pursued his occupation in the Boston Type Foundry, then located in Salem street. While thus engaged, he was eminent as a skilful workman, and for his assiduous application. He was accustomed to transfer the materials of his employment to his lodgings, and while others sought relaxation from labor, would pursue his avocation into the hours of the night.

In 1829, he started in business for himself, in two small rooms, at No. 52 Washington street. His office rapidly went through a series of transformations, in perfect accordance with his character. Wall after wall was perforated, till his establishment comprised twelve spacious halls and rooms, covering over an acre of ground, crowded with an innumerable variety of materials of the choicest kind, and comprising a perfect Foundry for the manufacture of type. This establishment was sold in 1847, and was nearly consumed by fire in February, 1848.

Few individuals, not in public life, have acquired a more extended reputation. With a perseverance and devotion to his calling almost or quite unparalleled, he wrought a revolution in the Art of Printing in this community. His unremitting assiduity, as related by himself in his last affecting words to his readers of 1849, finally resulted in the ruin of his health; and this, we regret to say, in the unavoidable sacrifice of the gatherings of his life of toil.

During his long continuance in business, he gathered around him a large number of assistants, among whom he has left pleasant remembrances. From the date of his first issue of the Boston Almanac, we have been familiar with his daily pursuits; and we are assured our testimony to his genius and many virtues will have a heartfelt response, among a wide circle of sincere mourners for his departure, in the summer of his years.

GEORGE WASHINGTON, First President of the U. S., for the first and second terms, 1789—1797, was b. in Westmoreland Co., Va., Feb. 22, 1732, and d. at Mount Vernon, Dec 14, 1799, æ. 67y., 9mo., 21d. He was the son of Augustine Washington, by Mary Ball, his 2d wife. A planter, commander of American Army during the Revolution, and was twice unanimously elected President of the U. S. He m., Jan. 6, 1759, Martha, dau. of John Dandridge, and widow of Daniel P. Custis of New Kent Co., Va. She d. May 22, 1802, æ. 70. Washington d. without issue.

JOHN ADAMS, Second President of the U. S., for the third term, 1797—1801, was b. in Quincy, Oct. 30, 1735, and d. in his native town, July 4, 1826, æ. 90y. 8mo. 4d. He was the son of John Adams and Susanna Boylston, graduated H. C. 1755; a lawyer and distinguished leader in the Am. Revolution. Vice President, 1789—1797. He m., Feb. 24, 1764, Abigail, dau. of Rev. Wm. Smith of Weymouth. She d. Oct. 28, 1818, æ. 74. Their children were, 1, Abigail, b. July 14, 1765; 2, John Quincy, b. July 11, 1767; 3, Susanna, b. Dec. 28, 1768; 4, Charles; 5, Thomas Boylston, b. Sept. 15, 1771.

THOMAS JEFFERSON, Third President of the U. S., for the fourth and fifth terms, 1801-1809, was b. in Shadwell, Albemarle Co., Va., April 2, 1743, and d. at Monticello, Orange Co., Va., July 4, 1826, a. 83y. 3m. 2d. He was the son of Peter Jefferson and Jane Randolph, was educated a lawyer, and was the author of the Declaration of Independence. He m., Jan. 1, 1772, Martha Skelton, widow of Bathurst Skelton, and dau. of John Wayles. She d. in 1782, leaving two daughters, one of whom d. unmarried, the other m. Mr. Randolph, whose son, Thomas Jefferson Randolph, compiled his memoir and writings.

He was the son of Andrew Jackson and Elizabeth Hutchinson, natives of Ireland, and of Scotch descent. He was educated a lawyer, and admitted to practice in N. Car., 1786; removed to Nashville, 1788; was a representative and senator in Congress; spent a considerable portion of his life in the military profession, and gained great celebrity at the battle of New Orleans, Jan. 8, 1815. He married, but died without issue.

He was the son of Benjamin Harrison, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, and Miss Bassett. He was a military general, governor, representative and senator in Congress. He was a planter, at North Bend, Ohio. He m., 1795, a da. of John Cleaves Symms, founder of the Miami Settlement, by whom he had 5 sons and 4 daughters. 4 sons and 1 daughter died before their father.

### THE CITY POLICE

**SPECIAL POLICE NOTICE.—1.** The public are respectfully informed that arrangements are now made to have the Police Office in the City Hall, (fronting on Court Square,) open at all hours of the DAY and NIGHT, and that officers who are paid by the City, are in attendance at all hours, to render such assistance as may be needed by the inhabitants.

2. Books are kept at the office, in which may be entered a description of all goods lost or stolen, and immediate information of all Robberies, Larcenies, or other crimes which may be committed, is desired, to the end that the services of the whole Police force of the City may be secured in arresting the perpetrators.

3. All persons losing goods of any kind are requested to give information at the office, and all persons finding goods are informed that by leaving the same, or a description of them, efforts will always be made to obtain a reward for the finder, proportioned to the trouble, and value of the article.

4. All rewards offered by the owners of lost or stolen goods that shall be received of the advertiser, will be paid to any person giving INFORMATION which leads to their discovery.

5. No day Police man, who is in the regular employ of the City, is entitled to any witness fees, nor are they permitted to receive any compensation, gratuity or reward, from any person, for services rendered by them, unless by a special vote of the Mayor and Aldermen.

6. Any information in relation to hacks, cabs, omnibuses, or their drivers, or trucks, wagons, handcarts, &c., may be had at the office. And all persons dealing with them are requested to notice their numbers—the Superintendents of which are present every day at 8 o'clock A. M., and 2 P. M., at which time all the Police of the Districts throughout the City report and leave the office.

7. In consequence of the many impostors who go about beggaring, an officer has been appointed to obtain information concerning them, and in all cases which come to the knowledge of the Police, a card will be given to those who may be deserving of charity, containing a statement of the facts in each case.

An ordinance was passed, June 25, 1849, providing for carrying into effect in this city the laws of the State relating to Births, Marriages, and Deaths. The office of Superintendent of Burials was abolished, and that of *City Registrar* created in its stead. All births, marriages, and deaths, which take place in the city are now required to be returned to this office to be recorded, with such particulars in regard to each as the law requires. Every parent or other person interested, who neglects to make a return of a birth, is liable to a penalty of \$5.00; every person who solemnizes a marriage, and neglects to make a return of such marriage between the first and tenth day of each month, is liable to a penalty not less than \$20, nor more than \$100: and every undertaker, or other person who shall superintend the burial of any person who dies in the city, who neglects to make a return of such death, is liable to a penalty of \$20. It is important that this law should be strictly carried into effect—to the public, that the health and condition of the population may be known; and to every individual, that evidence may be furnished by the records of the three great events of life, the birth, the marriage, and the death. Great personal inconvenience and pecuniary loss have often arisen from want of this evidence. If the importance of records was generally understood, no one would go out of the State to be married, or neglect to have his marriage entered upon the public records.

In the *Contingent Expenditures*, in 1845-6, are included \$1,053.59 for the funeral obsequies of President Jackson, \$2,000 for detecting an incendiary, \$25,488.74 for the State tax, and \$1,175.89 for other purposes; in 1846-7, \$17,020 for a sea wall, \$2,338.51 for the census of the city in 1845, and \$1,480.65 for other purposes; in 1847-8, \$4,042.49 for the reception and entertainment of President Polk, \$784.17 for funeral solemnities of President Adams, \$1,209.00 for the reception and entertainment of the Congressional Committee, \$1,000 for apprehending a murderer, and \$2,130.81 for other purposes; and in 1848-9, \$1,508.33, balance of the funeral expenses of President Adams, \$9,062.50 for the purchase of George's, Lovel's, and Great Brewster Islands, and \$3,288.44 for other purposes. The *Law Expenses* are exclusive of \$2,500 paid annually to the City Solicitor, included in salaries. Against *Public Buildings*, in 1846-7, is included \$7,660.82 for Stables, and \$908.00 for the jail; and, in 1848-9, \$134,658.83, on account of the new jail. The *Public Charities* includes the expenses of House of Correction, Lunatic Hospital, Houses of Industry and Reformation, Overseers of the Poor, &c. The *Public Lands* in 1846-7, includes \$23,936.75 for the purchase of Flats, and \$40,000 for the purchase of Urann's Wharf; in 1847-8, \$112,000 for the purchase of 280,000 feet of land, at 40 cents per foot, on South Boston Heights, for a Reservoir, and in 1848-9, \$2,980 for Stone Wharf; in 1847-8, \$65,907.70 for Public Lands and South Bay, and \$1,500 for Stone Wharf. The *Streets* includes the expense of widening, paving, and repairing, and lighting, but does not include the cleaning, which is charged to Internal Health.

### CITY DEBT.

The City Debt, May 1, 1841, was \$1,663,800. During the four subsequent years it was reduced \$500,533.38, leaving it, May 1, 1845, at \$1,163,266.62. From May 1, 1845, to Jan. 1, 1846, it was further reduced \$105,249.96, leaving it, at that time, \$1,058,016.66. And there was then on hand, pledged to its reduction, cash, \$120,894.68, and bonds and mortgages, \$378,143.79, making the net debt then, \$558,978.19. The following statement will show the amount of the debt at the close of each financial year, April 30, since that time.

By a standing city ordinance, the proceeds of bonds and mortgages held by the city, the sales of public lands, the balance in the treasury at the close of the year, and a special appropriation of 3 per cent. of the debt, the same not being less than \$50,000, are required to be applied annually to the payment of the principal of the debt. Notwithstanding this requirement, no part of the debt has been paid during the last two years, but it has greatly increased over the gross debt of May, 1845, \$393,802.40, for the ordinary purposes of the city, and \$3,787,328.98 for the water works, or \$4,181,131.38 in all, leaving it, on the 1st of May last, at \$5,334,844.54. The public works undertaken this year will probably increase this amount more than \$1,000,000, making the debt next year between six and a half and seven millions of dollars. An idea of the proportion of this debt to each individual may be formed from the following facts. The city tax this year is \$1,175.157; six times this is \$7,050.822, or a little over the probable debt. If each tax payer will multiply the amount of his tax by  $\frac{1}{3}$ , he will ascertain nearly his own liability under the city debt, being about equal to  $5\frac{1}{2}$  years taxes at the present rate.





high water. The fall from the Lake to the Brookline reservoir is 4.26 feet, making the height of the reservoir at its lowest level 120.60 feet above high water mark. The reservoir will, however, retain the water safely  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet higher, or 123 feet above high water, or 16 feet above the floor of the State House. The Fountain Basin on the Common is about  $24\frac{1}{2}$  feet above high water, or 96 feet below the minimum level of the Brookline reservoir, and a 3 inch jet has been raised thence 92 feet, or within 4 feet of its source, though that source is at a distance of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles. In the lower parts of the city, the water conveyed through a hose of the ordinary size of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches, attached to one of the hydrants, will throw a column of water, without the aid of a fire engine, by the force of the head on the pipe, to the height of 75 or 80 feet. The Fountain on the Common is supplied with the means of furnishing a great variety of jets, many of which are of great beauty, and attract general notice and admiration. One of these is given in the accompanying cut.

The Brookline Reservoir is a beautiful structure, of irregular, elliptic shape. The land purchased, including the surrounding embankment, with the necessary margin for its protection, was 38 acres. The area of the surface of the water is about  $22\frac{1}{2}$  acres. It is capable of containing about 100,000,000 gallons of water, a quantity sufficient for the city for a period of two weeks, should the supply by any accident be interrupted so long.

The Beacon Hill Reservoir is a structure of massive stone masonry. Its exterior dimensions are, on Derne street 199 feet and 3 inches; on Temple street 182 feet and 11 inches; on Hancock street 191 feet and 7 inches; and on the rear of Mount Vernon street 206 feet and 5 inches. Its height, from the foundation to the top of the coping, exclusive of the railing, is, on Derne street, 66 feet, and on the rear of Mount Vernon street 43 feet. The foundation or substructure which is to support the basin, or reservoir of water, rests on arches of immense strength,  $14\frac{1}{2}$  feet span. The lateral basin walls which are to retain the water, are 12 feet within the faces of the exterior walls on the streets. They are raised from the bottom of the reservoir or basin, to the height of 15 feet and 8 inches, including 20 inches of coping. The contents of the basin will be equal to 2,678,961 wine gallons, and its mean horizontal section equal to 28.014 square feet. The line or level, at this reservoir, corresponding to the maximum level of the water in the reservoir at Brookline, which is about 123 feet above marsh level, or high water mark, will run about 7 inches on the coping, or 14 feet and 7 inches above the bottom of the basin; and the minimum level of the Brookline reservoir will be  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet below this line. It must be apparent that whatever may be the height of water at Brookline, it must, when flowing, be at a lower level on

**Beacon hill.** The difference in the height of water in the two reservoirs will vary with the supply and discharge.

On the northerly side of the reservoir are two granite tablets, on which are cut the following inscriptions:—

## THE RESERVOIR COMPLETED

The South Boston Reservoir is situated on Telegraph Hill, the old "Dorchester Heights." It is entered by a 20 inch pipe from the main in Tremont, through Dover street, over the South Free Bridge. The water will be 16 feet deep, of the same height as Beacon Hill reservoir, and it will contain about 6,000,000 gallons.

The water is conveyed from the Lake to the Brookline reservoir, in an aqueduct, excepting 965 feet across the valley of Charles river, where are two parallel iron pipes of 30 inches in diameter. There are two tunnels, one in Newton of 2,410 $\frac{1}{2}$  feet, and another in Brookline of 1,123 $\frac{1}{2}$  feet. The former passes through a hill 86 feet below the surface, at its highest elevation. The aqueduct is built principally of brick masonry, in an oval, egg shape, 6 feet 4 inches in height by 5 feet in width, and has a gradual fall for the whole distance, including the pipe section, of 3 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches to the mile, nearly. With this fall, and a depth of 3 feet 10 inches of water, when the conduit is two thirds full, it is estimated to convey 11 millions of gallons per day. From the Brookline reservoir it is conveyed to the city in two main 36 inch iron pipes.

On the 21st of July, 1849, there had been laid 75 miles and 1,450 feet of water pipes, from 4 to 36 inches diameter, extending from the Brookline reservoir through city, leaving a further amount of 28,030 feet of 4 to 12 inch pipes to supply the wharves and South Boston, and —— feet to convey and distribute the water in East Boston.

This, with the interest and contingent expenses, yet to be incurred, will increase the cost of the Water Works to *more than five millions of dollars*. The City Auditor says, "about five millions of dollars." Alterations in the original plans have extended the cost greatly beyond the estimates.

The rates of charges established by the Water Commissioners for the use of water from the Boston Water Works, commencing January, 1849, are as follows:—

"RATES OF CHARGES FOR THE USE OF THE WATER.

1st. For water introduced at the charge of the City, through the first wall of each Dwelling-House, including full supply for all domestic uses, to each family occupying a house, valued, for the assessment of taxes, at \$5,000, or any less sum per annum, — \$5. To each family occupying a house, valued over \$5,000, and not over \$15,000, — \$5 to 15, at the rate of one dollar for every thousand dollars of valuation. To each family occupying a house valued over \$15,000, — \$15. When a house is occupied by several families taking the water at a single tap, charge will be according to the value of the house, for one house, for one family only.

2d. In warehouses, shops and other buildings not requiring more than an ordinary supply of water, and not included in any other classification, one half per cent. on the rent of the part occupied by the persons or persons using the water; but not less than \$3. When water closets or urinals are supplied, not less for each than \$5.

3d. For Hotels, Taverns and Boarding Houses, not including water for Baths, or for uses without the house, \$15. And when the valuation exceeds \$15,000, for every thousand dollars of the valuation, \$1.

4th. For the right to attach a hose, of not exceeding five eighths of an inch orifice, for washing windows, sprinkling streets, washing carriages or other purposes, in addition to the charge for other uses, not less than \$3. For each pipe not exceeding an inch, with right to attach a hose for extinguishing fire on the premises, exclusive of any right of water for other uses, not less than \$20.

5th. For each Stable including water for washing carriages, \$6, and for each stall over two, \$1.

6th. For Public Baths, for each tub, \$5.

7th. For each Printing Office, according to the number of presses used, not including supplying of steam engine, \$6 to \$20. For each Daily Newspaper Printing Office, exclusive of supplying of steam engine, \$8 to \$12.

8th. For stationary high pressure Steam Engines, working not over twelve hours per day, if of more than five horse power, on each horse power, \$3. When working night and day or over twelve hours, \$6. If of less than five horse power, working not over twelve hours, for each horse power, \$5.

9th. To Rail Road Corporations, for each Locomotive Engine in daily use, supplied for outward and inward trains, \$100. For each Engine, watering for the outward trip only, once a

great kitchen, scullery, bakery, and laundry, and will be uniform level with the lower story of cells in each of the wings which contain the same. The upper story will be finished as one "great central guard and inspection room," reaching from the ceiling of the first story up to the roof of the building; this room will measure 70 feet square, and will contain the galleries and stair cases connecting with the galleries around the outside of the cells in the three wings.

The north, south and east wings, to contain the cells, are to be constructed upon the "Auburn plan," being a prison within a prison; the north and south wings will each measure 80 feet 6 inches in length, and 55 feet in width, and 56 feet in height above the surface of the ground; the block of cells within each of the north and south wings will measure 63 feet 6 inches in length, 21 feet in width, and 54 feet in height, and will be divided into five stories; each story will contain ten cells, each of which will measure 8 by 11 feet, and 10 feet high, thus giving to each of these two wings 50 cells.

The east wing will measure 164 feet 6 inches in length, 55 feet in width, and 56 feet in height above the surface of the ground; the block of cells within this wing will be 146 feet 6 inches long, 21 feet wide, and 54 feet high; it will also be divided into five stories in height; each story will contain 24 cells of uniform size with the cells of the northern and southern wings, before described, thus giving to this wing 120 cells.

The spaces around the outside of each block of cells in each of the wings (between the cell walls and the exterior walls of the said wings), are to be "areas," which are to be open from the floor of the lower story of cells in each wing, to the ceiling of the upper story. Galleries of iron will extend the entire length of each of these spaces, outside of the cells, on a level with each of the floors. These galleries will form a communication with other galleries, which are to encircle the interior of the "centre octagonal building," on the same uniform level with the other galleries. Each cell will contain a window and a door communicating immediately with the galleries of the areas.

All the areas around the outside of the cells of the north, south, and east wings, will receive light from the great windows of the exterior walls. These windows will be thirty in number, each measuring 10 feet in width, and 33 feet in height, beneath which other windows, 10 feet wide and 9 feet in height, will be placed, thus yielding an amount of light to the interior of the cells probably four times as great as any prison yet constructed upon the Auburn system. The jail kitchen and guard or inspection room, of the centre octagonal building, will receive light from windows of uniform size, and arranged in the same manner as those windows in the exterior walls of the wings. The guard or inspection room will receive additional light from circular windows placed above the great windows, and from a skylight in its ceiling. The various stories of the west wing will be lighted from windows arranged uniformly with those in the exterior walls of the wings.

The exterior of the structure will be entirely of Quincy granite, formed with split ashler in courses, with cornices, and other projecting portions hammered or dressed; the remaining portions of the entire buildings, both inside and outside thereof, will be of bricks, iron and stone, excepting the interior of the west wing, which will be finished with wood.

## NEW ALMS HOUSE AT DEER ISLAND.

Hospitals were erected at Deer Island, in May, 1847, as a quarantine establishment, and a general receptacle for foreign paupers, and others, arriving here infected with the ship fever and other contagious diseases. In November, 1848, this establishment was made a branch of the House of Industry, and placed under the directors of that institution.

The City Council decided last summer, to erect a new Alms House on this Island. The building will be in the form of a "Latin Cross," having its four wings radiating at right angles from a central building, somewhat after the form of the New Jail. The central building will be 79 feet square and 75 feet in height; the west wing 50 feet square and 48 feet high; the north and south wings, each 100 feet long, 50 feet wide and 48 feet high; and the east wing 200 feet long, 50 feet wide and 48 feet high. A cellar beneath the entire building. The wings are each to be three stories in height, beside the attic. Each story will be 12 feet in the clear, and the attic 9 feet in the clear. There are to be 8 circular towers attached to the outer walls of the north, south and east wings, each 13 feet in diameter and 65 feet in height. The central building is to be four stories in height. The first three stories are to be uniform in height with the first, second and third stories of the wings; the fourth story, designed for the chapel, will be 31 feet in height, and encircled with a gallery 9 feet above the floor, and a curved ceiling with a circular opening in the centre to receive the light from above. The central building is to have its four corners formed as quadrants of circles, within which all the windows for lighting its interior are to be placed. This building is to be covered with a pitch roof, in the centre of which is to be an observatory, measuring 17 feet square and 31 feet in height above the roof, and surmounted with the cardinal points wrought in iron. The west wing is designed for the family of the superintendent; the north, south, and east wings for the paupers, and will contain accommodations for 1500 inmates. The work was commenced in September, and is to be ready for occupancy in July 1850.

## EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY.

This institution was established in 1824, and incorporated in 1827. It is intended exclusively for the poor, and no fees are permitted to be taken. The new building erected for its accommodation in 1849, is situated on Charles street, a short distance southerly of Cambridge bridge. It consists of a main building 67 feet front by 44 feet deep, and 40 feet 4 in. high, and two wings 25 feet front and 34 feet high, one 52 feet deep and the other 63 feet. The front of the principal building is embellished by stone dressings to all the windows, doors, and cornices, in Italian style. The wings retire from the front 11 feet, and are perfectly plain. In the basement are the kitchen, wash-room, laundry, refractory wards, baths, store rooms, &c. In the first story in the main building are rooms for the matron and committee, and receiving and reading rooms; in the wings are the male wards, with operating, apothecary, and bath rooms. In the second story are accommodations for the matron, and private female wards. The building is heated by two furnaces, and provided with a thorough system of ventilating, and the whole surrounded by a spacious, airy ground, shut out from the street by a high brick wall. *Architect,* Edw. C. Cabot. *Contractor,* Jonathan Preston. Cost, land, \$25,000; building, about \$29,000; total, \$54,000.



### THE NEW ATHENÆUM BUILDING.


The above illustration is a view of the front elevation of the new building erected for the Boston Athenæum, on the southerly side of Beacon, between Bowdoin and Somerset streets. It is 114 feet in length; of irregular breadth, covering the entire space between the street and the Granary Burying Ground: and 60 feet in height. In the design of this building several objects were to be regarded:—1st, a library of 40,000 volumes, with provision for increase; 2d, suitable places for the exhibition of works of art; and 3d, a museum for miscellaneous collections; beside the usual offices for such a building. The want of unity of plan, together with the extremely irregular form of the lot and the slightly disproportionate height of the stories, made the design one of considerable difficulty, which was sought to be obviated in effect by presenting to the eye a succession of horizontal lines from the base upwards toward the cornice. The elevation is in the later Italian style of architecture, and resembles in the general arrangement some of the works of Palladio, though some of the details belong to a still later style. The material is of Patterson free stone, known here as "Little Fall gray rock," the color of which is a light gray, slightly varying in different stones, and the texture considerably harder than the free stones in general use. The building is 10 feet back from the street, and the ground space in front is surrounded by a bronze lacquered iron balustrade, with stone coping.

The basement story is constructed of solid masonry, supporting the first floor upon groined arches of brick; a room is here fitted up for the use of the janitor and his family. Here also are a

furnace with flues, conducting the heat to all parts of the building; rooms for fuel, for binding and packing books, apparatus for hoisting to the upper story, &c.

The entrance to the building is into the first story, by a doorway 14 feet high by 10 feet broad. It opens on a vestibule, or main entry, 32 by 28 feet, which contains staircases ascending to the upper stories, and lighted from the roof and large windows in front. From this vestibule, designed to be finished in beautiful style of architecture, doors open to all the rooms in the building.

In the first story is a hall 80 feet in length, designed for the Sculpture Gallery, entered through the vestibule directly opposite the front door. It is surrounded by a row of iron columns opposite each window pier, for supporting the floors above. Fitting into these columns above are still others supporting the third floor, thus making continuous supports to the floors of each story, in addition to the walls. On the right of the vestibule are two apartments, designed for reading rooms, one in the front for newspapers, the other in the rear for other periodicals. On the left of the vestibule is the Trustees' room. All these apartments are as yet unfinished, but are intended to be in appropriate ornamental style.



The second story is appropriated to the library. The main hall extends the entire length of the rear of the building, and is surrounded by an iron gallery, accessible by iron spiral staircases. It is divided by an archway, one compartment displaying the books in cases lining the walls, the other in alcoves between the pillars. It is highly finished, in Italian style, with



## STORES AND WAREHOUSES.

Within the last few years several blocks of buildings have been erected for the business accommodations of the Merchants of Boston, which, for beauty, convenience and durability, we have never seen surpassed. We select two only, as specimens of these costly structures.

The above is a view of the stores Nos. 35, 37, and 39, fronting on Kilby, and 15 and 17 on Lindall and Hawes streets, owned by Charles R. Codman, Esq., and leased by Messrs. James M. Beebe & Co., for the sale of Dry Goods. The buildings are, in both facades, of Quincy granite of the best quality, and of uniform color. They are four stories high besides a basement and attic. The corner store is 33 feet in width and 86 feet in depth. The two rear stores, which front on Lindall and Hawes streets, are each 25 feet in width and 80 feet in depth. The three stores are connected together in every story by large openings, thus forming in each story an immense salesroom, and is together the most extensive establishment of the kind in the country. All

the stories are of great height, and are finished in the best manner, containing every modern convenience, such as sofas, counting rooms, washing sinks, water closets, &c.

**GRAY'S BLOCK**, fronting on the southerly corner of Summer and Washington streets, is 56 by 135 feet. The two fronts are of Quincy granite, quarried mostly from a single block of stone, having windows of the best French plate glass. The first story, 13½ feet high in clear, is divided into two spacious stores, with basements. One is occupied by Messrs. Jones, Ball & Poor, an interior view of which is in the front of this Almanac, and extends the whole length on Summer street, 28 feet wide in front and 57 in the rear, and is furnished with safes of peculiar construction, and every other convenience; the other is occupied by Messrs. Jacobs, and is 26 feet by 80. The second story is 12 feet high, and divided into 6 rooms; the third story 12 feet high, and divided into 8 rooms; the fourth story 16½ feet high, and divided into 2 large and 2 small halls. The corner hall is 75 feet by 26. The attic is fitted up with suitable rooms for artists, and for storage to accommodate the occupants below. The distinctive features of the exterior of this building are the richness of the materials, its beautiful proportions and cornice, and the windows in the attic; and of the interior, its perfect adaptation to the purposes for which it is designed, and its rich and appropriate finish. Designed and superintended by S. P. Fuller, assisted by Charles Booth. Stone Cutters, A. C. Sanborn & Co.; Masons, I. H. & C. Hazelton; Carpenters, Pratt & Judson. Cost of land and building, about \$140,000.

### NEW CLUB HOUSE.

The new Club House, situated on the northerly side of West street, is worthy of notice among the improvements of the city. It is 38 feet in front, 80 feet deep, and 52 feet high. The front elevation is built of Connecticut free stone in Italian style, and combines great architectural beauty. The first story is occupied by two stores, and a central passage to the second story, in which is a lobby, reading room, and three parlors. In the third story is a hall 35 by 63 feet, and 22 feet high.

Erected by an association of gentlemen. *Architect*, H. Billings. *Builders*—Masons, Messrs. Wheeler and Drake; Carpenter, Chas. Dupee. Estimated cost of land and building, \$45,000.

### BOSTON SOCIETY OF NATURAL HISTORY.

This institution has recently purchased the estate in Mason street, formerly occupied by the Massachusetts Medical College, and re-modelled the building to adapt it to its present purposes. It contains 9 rooms, one of which is occupied by the librarian, and each of the others by objects of interest in the different departments of natural history. The whole estate cost about \$30,000, which was obtained by subscription from the liberal citizens of Boston. All who desire it have free access to the cabinet every Wednesday, and strangers in the city, who cannot conveniently visit it on that day, can obtain admission at any time by application to an officer of the Society. Five volumes of the Boston Journal of Natural History, and three of the Proceedings of the Society at its Monthly Meetings, have been published, containing contributions from our most distinguished naturalists, illustrated by engravings.

The Post Office is in the Merchants' Exchange, in State street. From the first of April to the first of October, the office is open from 7 A. M., to 7½ P. M. From October to April, from 8 A. M., to 7½ P. M. On Sundays, from 9 A. M., to 10 A. M.

The Penny Post Department is under the superintendence of J. H. Patterson. Letter Carriers' office, 24 Merchants' Exchange.

## LETTER POSTAGE.

*All letters (with the exceptions specified below,) weighing half an ounce or less, are rated as single letters; over half an ounce, and less than one ounce, a double charge is made; and two additional charges for each succeeding ounce or fraction of an ounce.*

### INTERNAL OR DOMESTIC POSTAGE.

The postage may or may not be prepaid.

From and to any part of the United States, (except Oregon and California,) the letter postage is as follows:

For every single letter, sent any distance not exceeding 300 miles, 5 c.

For every single letter, sent any distance over 300 miles, 10 c.

All drop letters, placed in any post office, not for transmission by mail but for delivery only, are charged 2 cents each.

All advertised letters, when delivered out, are charged with the cost of advertising, (2 cents each) in addition to the regular postage.

Letters, addressed to different persons in the United States, enclosed in the same envelop or packet, cannot be sent through the mails, under a penalty of ten dollars.

Letters for Oregon and California may be sent by the U. S. steam packets from New York twice a month. The postage on a single letter is 40c.

### CHAGRES AND PANAMA.

Letters for Chagres, Panama, or any South American port on the Pacific, or for the Sandwich Islands, may be sent by the U. S. steam packets from New York. To Chagres, the postage on a single letter is 20 c. to Panama, 30 c. to be prepaid. On letters to the other places, the postage to Panama only is to be prepaid.

### HAVANA.

Steam packets leave Charleston, S. C. for Havana, on the 1st and 15th of each month. On single letters, the uniform postage from any part of the United States to Havana, or any part of Cuba, is 12½ c. which must be prepaid. Five days should be allowed for communication between Boston and Charleston.

### BRITISH AMERICAN PROVINCES.

*Halifax.* Single letters to Halifax, by the British steamers, are rated at 5 or 10 c. each, according to the distance; postage to be prepaid. Letters for the British *West India* possessions at the same rates, prepaid.

*Upper Canada and New Brunswick.* Communication by the general mail, every day. The postage is 10 c. each, on single letters; to be prepaid.

*Lower Canada.* Daily mail—single letters 5 c. each; to be prepaid.

The rates of postage abovementioned, to Upper and Lower Canada, and New Brunswick, pay only to the lines—but letters will be immediately forwarded thence, to their places of destination.

## GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

Between any post office in the United States (Oregon and California excepted) and any post office in Great Britain and Ireland, the entire postage is 24 c. the single letter—which may be prepaid or not. The entire postage, or nothing, must be prepaid.

Between the offices of California and Oregon and those of Great Britain and Ireland, the entire postage is 59 c. the single letter—which may be prepaid or not. The entire postage, or nothing, must be prepaid.

## VARIOUS COUNTRIES, VIA ENGLAND.

On all correspondence to and from the following countries, the British and foreign postage is to be collected at the other end of the route. The U. S. postage, and that only, *must* be collected in the U. S., by prepayment when sent, and on delivery when received. The U. S. postage is 5 c. the single letter when conveyed by British packet (unless from or to Oregon or California, then 40 c.) and 21 c. the single letter, when conveyed by U. S. packet (unless from or to Oregon or California, then 56 c.) The following are the countries to which this paragraph refers:

NOTE. In computing postage from England to the countries named above, in Table 2, the *foreign* postage is rated by the  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce for the single letter. Thus, a letter directed to the East Indies, by a British Steamer, if it weighs less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce, will be charged 65 cents postage—if  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce, or more, but less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce, 75 cents—the *foreign* postage, only, being added for each additional  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce.

When the correspondence with the countries in the foregoing list (Ta-

bles 1 & 2) is from or to Oregon or California, the single letter rate—to be collected by prepayment when sent, or on delivery when received—is to be, in each instance, 35 c. more than the amounts stated in the above tables.

### NEWSPAPER POSTAGE.

On newspapers transmitted between Great Britain and the U. S., the postage is 4 c. for each newspaper—2 c. to be paid in each country.

On newspapers transmitted to or from a foreign country, through Great Britain, the postage is 4 c. each—to be paid by the party sending or receiving it.

On newspapers transmitted by the American line from New York to Bremen, the postage is 3 c. for each newspaper, in addition to our inland postage, which is 1 or 1½ c. (according to distance, as below specified,) to be prepaid in all cases.

On newspapers transmitted to the Island of Cuba, by the Charleston or New York steam packets, the postage is 4½ c. for each newspaper, to be prepaid.

On newspapers transmitted to any of the British American provinces, of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, or Upper or Lower Canada, the postage is 1½ c. for each newspaper, to be prepaid.

On newspapers transmitted to Chagres, Panama, any South American port on the Pacific, or to the Sandwich Islands, by the steam packets from Charleston, S. C., the postage is 4½ c. for each newspaper, to be prepaid.

On newspapers transmitted to Oregon or California, the postage is 4½ c. for each newspaper; to be prepaid on all newspapers except those issued from the office of publication.

On newspapers transmitted within the U. S., if not over 100 miles, or any distance within the state where they are mailed, the postage is 1 c. each. Over 100 miles, and out of the state in which they are mailed, 1½ c. each. The postage on newspapers transmitted within the U. S., must be prepaid, at the time they are deposited in the office, unless they are sent from the office of publication, or legally franked.

Every newspaper mailed, must be so enveloped or folded that it can be distinctly seen to be such; and it must contain no writing, marks, or signs, to serve the purpose of written communications. If not so done up as to be open at the end, it is to be charged as a letter, by weight.

### POSTAGE ON PAMPHLETS, MAGAZINES, &c.

Periodical works and pamphlets may be sent from Great Britain to the U. S., or from the U. S. to Great Britain. The U. S. postage is 2 c. each, if they do not exceed two ounces in weight; and 1 c. per ounce, or fraction of an ounce, when they exceed that weight—this postage to be collected in all cases in the U. S.—and they will be subject to an additional like charge in Great Britain, when not exceeding two ounces; but the third ounce raises the British charge to 6 pence, with an additional charge of 2 pence for each additional ounce.

All pamphlets, magazines, periodicals, and every other kind and description of printed matter, transmitted within the U. S., (except newspapers, circulars, handbills, and advertisements,) which shall be unconnected with any manuscript communication whatever, are charged 2½ c. for each copy of no greater weight than one ounce, for any distance. For every additional ounce, 1 c.—any fractional excess, exceeding half an ounce, to be charged as an ounce—any excess of less than half an ounce, not to be regarded.

Circulars, handbills, and advertisements, printed on one sheet, containing no written matter, and which are folded and directed but not sealed, may be transmitted within the U. S., subject to 3 c. postage on each, for any distance, to be prepaid when they are deposited in the office.

## DEPARTURE OF STEAM PACKETS.

*British Mail Steam Packets.* These packets take their departure weekly, from Boston or New York, alternately, except during the months of Dec., Jan., Feb., and March, when they leave every fortnight.

On the days upon which the steamers depart from this port, the foreign mail closes precisely at 10 o'clock, A. M., and the office will be closed for one hour from that time, while the mail is in course of preparation.

*Bremen Mail Steam Packets.* A Steam Packet, of the Bremen line, leaves New-York on the 20th day of every month, for Bremen, touching, on her way, at the port of Southampton, in England.

*U. S. Mail Steam Packets.* A line of U. S. Steam Packets runs between Charleston, S. C. and Havana, in the Island of Cuba—taking the mails for that Island. 1. The Wharfage of all Goods shipped by or consigned to, people residing out of the city, is to be paid by the master or owner of the vessel receiving or landing such goods, and a return or account thereof shall be made by the master before sailing, or landing goods, so shipped or consigned.

2. The Wharfage of Goods received or delivered from the wharf to be paid for by the master or owner of the vessel, delivering or receiving the said goods, unless the same are received or shipped by persons belonging to Boston, and a return thereof has been made by the master or owner of the vessel to the wharfinger.

3. Goods brought on the wharf, by trucks, or otherwise, for public sale, to pay the same wharfage as if landed thereon.

4. Goods taken by one vessel from another, to pay half the wharfage the same would have paid had they been landed or shipped from the wharf, excepting flour and grain, which shall pay the same as if landed; the wharfage to be paid by the vessel nearest the wharf.

5. All goods, excepting iron, salt, flour and grain, that have paid full wharfage, and have not changed ownership, may be reshipped within thirty days, free of additional wharfage. After thirty days full wharfage will be charged in all cases.

6. Iron, salt, flour and grain, must pay full wharfage in all cases, whether the same may have been just landed and reshipped by the importer, or sold and shipped by any other person.

7. Wharfage will be charged on all goods from the day the vessel hauls to the wharf, and if the goods remain by permission of the wharfinger, and are not sold, additional wharfage will be charged the same as for landing, for each and every month, from the expiration of the first month, and molasses shall be charged

in addition, fifteen cents per hogshead, per month, wharfage for each and every month after the first landing and charge of ten cents each hogshead.

8. All merchandise on the wharf to be removed in six days from the time of sale, or pay monthly wharfage same as for landing, except for molasses as in 7th article, and in no case to lay over a month without additional wharfage.

9. Mahogany, dye woods, and lumber, landed on the wharf, to be immediately taken away, or piled up by the wharfinger at the expense of the owner or consignee.

10. Vessels will be charged dockage for the day of their arrival, but not for the day of their departure.

11. Vessels at the wharf of 200 tons and over to be allowed 20 days for loading and 20 days for unloading cargo, free from dockage, and after that dockage shall be charged at the foregoing rates without deduction; and dockage shall be charged in all cases when vessels are not so employed.

12. No sand, gravel, or other ballast to be landed on the wharf, unless with the approbation and under the inspection of the wharfinger; nor are the dirt, sweepings of the hold, or other articles, under any pretence whatever, to be thrown into the dock.

13. No boats are to be put on the wharf, without the consent of the wharfinger.

14. No articles of any kind whatever put upon the wharf are to be considered as entitled to remain there any longer time than the wharfinger shall consent to, and always subject to be removed at the expense of the owners.

15. Vessels lying at the wharf, are to remove at the request of the wharfinger, and if not done at his request, the vessel will be removed by the wharfinger, at the risk and expense of the owners.

16. Vessels hauling to the wharf are to have their jib and spanker booms and sprit sail yards rigged in, lower yards topped, and to accommodate other vessels as much as possible.

17. Vessels being loaded, and coming from, or going to other wharves, to pay double rates of dockage, to remove when directed by the wharfinger, and not to remain at the wharf except with his permission.

18. No vessel with unslack'd lime will be allowed to lie at the wharf, except with the particular permission of the wharfinger.

19. No fire will be permitted on the wharf, nor any tar or pitch to be heated on board any vessel lying at the wharf, excepting when such vessel may be afloat, or a special permission be obtained from the wharfinger.

## Local Events from Oct. 1, 1848, to Oct. 1, 1849.

OCTOBER 25. The Great Cochituate Water Celebration.

NOVEMBER 4. Henry Durell, a carpenter, while at work on the new block of granite stores in Kilby st., fell through the scuttle, and died in two hours. He left a wife and four small children.

A female infant, about a week old, was left on the steps of 44 Lowell st., with clothing of a fine texture, and two extra suits. She was handed over to John Augustus, and named Anna Lowell.

7. Presidential election in all the states. Taylor's majority in the city was 3516, having received 8427 votes, out of 13,347 cast.

16. The thermometer this morning, at sunrise, stood at 17, barometer 30.56. Since the 11th of November, 1846, when the thermometer in this city stood at 16, it has not fallen so low, so early in the season. In 1847, the first frost was on the 28th of November. The three coldest mornings in November for the last 25 years, were the 25th and 26th in 1838, and the 30th in 1847, when the thermometer indicated 5½, 6, and 10 degrees.

Caroline C. Tappan, 3 years old, youngest child of Mrs. T. at 33 Essex street, died from the effects of burns received last evening. She had been put to bed, but got up during the evening, and in passing a lamp placed on the stairway, her clothing took fire, and burned her in a shocking manner. She was a beautiful child.

14. A hostler employed in a stable in Elm street, fell from the scaffold, and was killed.

17. A woman named Mary Henry, was killed by her husband at a cellar in 186 Ann st. Coroner Pratt held an inquest, and the jury agreed on the following verdict: "That Mary Henry came to her death between the hours of 9 o'clock on the evening of Nov. 17th, and 7 o'clock on November 18th, by repeated blows and kicks upon her head and body by James Henry, her husband." Henry was arrested.

20. A severe gale, and much damage to shipping. The schooner Olive, of St. John, N. B., Capt. Oliver, went ashore on Nantasket beach, and all on board perished. She was a new vessel, and cleared from this port on the 5th instant.

22. Miss Sarah Hobart, a young lady about 16, was knocked down while crossing the common, and very seriously injured by a boy

coasting. She remained speechless several hours.

23. The Legislature met, in accordance with the call of the Governor, to choose Presidential electors. There were 36 Senators, and 245 members of the House present to answer to their names.

24. The Whig electors were today chosen by the Legislature, having received 196 out of 299 votes. The Democratic ticket received 65, and the Free Soil 37 votes, 1 scattering.

25. The Legislature was prorogued.

At a meeting of the Whigs of Ward five, on motion of Mr. F. Emerson, the "Ventilator Man," it was voted to raise a subscription and give every poor family in the ward, without distinction of parties, a good Thanksgiving dinner.

Two men in Hollis st., about 11 o'clock at night, were attacked by four others, and one of them knocked down, with his head badly cut, when the four assailants ran away and escaped.

30. The Annual Thanksgiving day, and in this city a celebrated physician said "it was hallowed by a flood of charity, gushing forth in a full and beneficent tide, into innumerable channels, to make glad the hearts of the destitute." Fifteen or twenty individuals were lodged in the watch house beastly intoxicated.

FIRES. The department were called out during this month 27 times. Nineteen times were for fires in the city, three alarms originated out of the city, four were false, and one from a burning chimney.

DECEMBER 2. Michael McDonald was run over at the head of Hanover street, by a hack, two ribs were broken, and he was otherwise injured. The driver kept on, as though nothing had happened.

4. Leonard Spalding, a night soil man from West Cambridge, was stabbed in Ann street, by a man named James Campbell. He tried to reach home, but fell down exhausted, and was taken into the toll-house at Medford turnpike, where he was obliged to remain. His wounds were thought to be mortal. Campbell was arrested.

An Irishman named John Farren, fell into a well 40 feet deep, on Shurtleff street, and was injured so much that he died. Another man was at work at the bottom of the well, and escaped unhurt.

7. A meeting was held at the Hanover House, to see if a hundred persons would form themselves into a company to go to California. About 200 persons were present, and exhibited much enthusiasm. Each member is to furnish \$300 capital, and they bind themselves not to gamble, or use intoxicating drinks.

Thomas Jones, a negro, was taken up in Commercial st. dead drunk, and conveyed to the watch-house in a hand-cart. In a short time after, he died. He was a sailor, from Maryland, 60 years old.

11. At the Municipal election to-day, Hon. John P. Bigelow was elected Mayor, Mr. Quiney having declined a re-election. Mr. Bigelow's majority was 2,500.

A fight took place in the "Verandah," a notorious drinking saloon opposite Concert Hall, and Benjamin Jordan, was dreadfully beaten, kicked, stamped upon, and stabbed with a carving knife. He was taken to the Hospital, and two of the gang of the rioters were arrested.

14. Mrs. Jordan, a mesmeric physician in this city, recovered \$527.67, of the Fall River Railroad Corporation, for a trunk and its contents, that had been lost after she left it in the care of the baggage master.

An old gentleman belonging to Chelsea, William Mear, walked overboard, from the half-past nine boat, and was dead before he could be got out of the water. He hurried to get off before the boat was fairly at the slip.

16. George Bemish, a minor, was sentenced by the Municipal Court, to two years in States Prison for offering obscene prints for sale.

17. Geo. Whitehouse was found dead on Kelley & Homes' wharf, at East Boston. Verdict — "he died from intemperance and exposure."

18. A man named Webb was killed at East Boston, by being caught between two freight cars on the Eastern Railroad.

Robert Roberts, a boy seven years old, was almost killed by the falling of a gutter from an old building corner of Salem and Prince streets, that was being torn down.

James Henry, the man who killed his wife on the 17th of Nov., was sent to the State Prison for manslaughter, for six years.

19. Mr. George S. Emerson, son of George B. Emerson, of Pemberton square, shot himself at his father's house, with a double-barrelled gun. It seemed that the young man was insane.

21. The first snow storm of the season.

22. An elderly man named Rowe, in consequence of a rail being broken, fell overboard from South Boston bridge, and was drowned. It was very stormy and the night dark.

24. William J. Snelling, editor of the Boston Herald, died at his residence in Chelsea, aged 44. His talents were of a high order, his life and experience a warning to others. His father-in-law, Mr. Simon Jordan, a few hours after, while attempting to comfort his daughter, fell backward and died in his chair.

25. Christmas day, increasingly observed in Boston, and a large number of stores and other places of business closed. The rain fell in torrents. As the snow melted away, a man's body was discovered on the Tremont road, near Roxbury, which proved to be the remains of Jacob Daffler, a German, which had undoubtedly lain there since the storm of Friday previous, — the day he left home.

**FIRE.** During the month of December, the department was called out twenty-nine times, — viz: nineteen times from fires in the city; eight times from alarms originating out of the city; and two from false alarms. Estimated loss, \$31,650. Insurance, \$28,350.

JANUARY 1. There were several accidents from furious driving in sleighs. A boy was badly injured on Washington street, near the railroad bridge, and a horse was killed in Temple place.

6. Mr. Charles G. Bean was said to have died of hydrophobia this morning, at his house 71 Nashua street. He was bitten very slightly several months previous. He was 43 years old, and suffered horribly.

9. Mr. Seth Bliss, Assistant Clerk, had his pocket picked in the *Court Room*, of \$27 in Bank Bills, a \$100 check, and valuable papers.

12. The ship Edward Everett, for California, with her fine company all on board, was towed down the harbor by the R. B. Forbes, and went to sea, all in health and fine spirits. This is the first company formed in the city.

17. Officer Towle arrested John Shay, who lived in Emery place, and who broke his wife's arm by striking her with a cricket.

18. A man was knocked down at the head of Langdon place, and robbed of his watch and \$40.

20. A man fell on the icy sidewalk, in Ann street, was taken up speech-

less and conveyed to the Hospital. He was not able to give his name, and it was supposed his back was broken.

18. One of Harnden & Co.'s Express men lost a pocket book containing \$1500, for the recovery of which \$100 was offered. Enoch Shepherd, in the employ of Wm. H. Patten & Co., Federal street, found it, returned it, and refused to take the reward.

23. A man was found dead, with his neck broken, on the Tremont road, beside a heap of manure. He is supposed to have fallen through the frozen shell, and broken his neck thereby.

27. The office of George S. Chapman, broker, in Endicott street, was broken open, and robbed of \$500. Mr. C. was away from the store but twenty minutes.

A little apple girl was run over, and very seriously injured. She was the daughter of Harinon Frieux, of East Boston.

**FIREs.** The fire department was called out in January twenty-four times, viz., fires in the city, 16; out of the city, 4; false alarm, 1; burning chimney, 1. Estimated loss of property destroyed, \$31,420: insurance, \$26,770.

**FEBRUARY 2.** A countryman was knocked down near Craigie's bridge and robbed of \$19. Watchman Mortimer gave chase to the villains, but they escaped.

Three horses ran away with sleighs and "broke things." One knocked a lady down at the corner of Bromfield st., and another jumped into Currier & Trott's windows.

6. Abel McRea was found dead in the forecastle of the schr. Abel Story, having been suffocated in going to his berth, after the vessel had been smoked to kill rats.

8. The Common Council passed an order to pay a sum not exceeding 50 cents, for killing every dog found in the streets contrary to law. This is in consequence of the hydrophobia excitement.

9. A woman named Priscilla Lawrence died from burns occasioned by her clothes taking fire. She belonged to Liverpool, N. S.

10. Michael Dyer, Jr., 7 years old, was run over in Commercial street, and injured so much that he died in a few hours.

11. An awful slippery Sunday. A young man fell down, by Park st. church, and broke his leg, and a lady broke her hip in Temple place.

12. The case of George Miller, for forgery, was decided. His sen-

tence was nine years imprisonment in the State Prison, three days of which to be in solitary confinement.

13. A mad dog bit a carpenter in a shop at the South end. Dr. Newton cauterized the wound.

15. The captain of the forecastle of the British steamship Niagara fell from the foreyard of the vessel, and was instantly killed. His name was William Davis.

17. Robert M. A. Smyth was found in the yard of the Providence Railroad depot, with his throat cut, and still warin. He was well known as a land speculator, and was a prominent witness in the Miller trial. He left a family in Cambridge.

19. The dog slaughter commenced this morning, and boys were found truanting from school in all parts of the city, with clubs in hand, to help on the bloody business that the Mayor and Aldermen instigated and legalized on the 10th instant. Fifty-five dogs were killed the first day!

22. Mrs. Mary Miller was suffocated at a house in Keith's alley, by going to bed with a pan of lighted charcoal in her room.

The Mayor and Aldermen rescinded the "bloody order" paying for the killing of dogs. Two hundred and ten murders had been committed.

25. Two children applied at the Boylston watch-house for lodgings, having been turned out of their father's house because they would not go to a grogillery for rum.

**FIREs.** The Department were called out in February forty-two times. There were 31 fires in the city; 2 alarms originated out of the city; 6 were false, and 8 from burning chimneys. Estimated loss, \$52,622; insurance \$41,980.

**MARCH 7.** Abby Pennock, a girl 17 years old, in the service of Mrs. Binney in Mt. Vernon street, died of congestion of the brain, induced by the improvident use of chloroform, which she had taken to bed with her on a saturated handkerchief. She was of irreproachable character, a native of Keene, N. H.

8. At 10 o'clock this evening, the mate of a vessel was attacked by three men in Endicot street, who stabbed him with a knife, leaving it in his side, and robbed him of his watch and \$55.

12. William H. Huston was committed for trial for robbing Joseph W. Bickford of \$500 and a gold watch, at a house of ill fame in Ann street.

13. Margaret Clark was found dead from intemperance and exposure, under a pair of stairs on the outside of a building, corner of First and Turnpike sts., South Boston. The same coroner—Andrews—who was called to the inquest, sat upon the body of her husband, found in the same place, and from the same cause, about two years ago.

22. Levi Coney of Ashburnham, was robbed of \$150 in Union St. by a fellow whom he was paying for showing him the way "to see the elephant." The scamp seized the money and ran.

**FIREs.** The Department were out in March thirty-two times, viz.: 22 from fires in the city; 4 times from alarms out of the city; 5 false alarms; 1 burning chimney. Estimated loss \$16,842; insurance, \$12,592.

APRIL 3. Joseph Merrill, Esq., a representative from Dracut, was robbed at the State House of \$12, notes, and papers. It was stolen from his coat hanging in the lobby.

4. A girl of the town stabbed another, in front of Derby range. She struck four times, twice in the head and twice in the breast.

5. A bread-eart ran over a Miss Doman in Suffolk street, injuring her severely.

A boat, the "Mary Ann," was upset in the harbor, and Mr. Devine, the owner, drowned.

15. A man was crushed at the East Boston Ferry, by stepping ashore too soon. He fell between the drop and the boat, and was taken up dead.

21. George H. Prince, eleven years old, son of Stephen P., was crushed to death between two cars at the Boston and Maine Railroad depot.

**FIREs.** During the month of April the department was called out thirty times; twenty from fires in the city, and ten from false alarms. Estimated loss, \$24,000. Insurance, \$8,500.

MAY 7. William Phillips escaped from Charlestown State Prison, by persuading the warden that he knew where a quantity of gold and valuables were hidden "down on the Cape." Mr. Robinson took with him City Marshal Niehols of Charlestown, and the criminal, who took the Old Colony Railroad to the pretended place, on the sands of the sea-shore. When they had made a hole big enough to cover them up in, and were digging away ambitiously, the rogue shovelled the "yellow dust" upon them and fled.

They came home a little chop-fallen.

18. The Norfolk Co. Railroad assigned all their property for the benefit of their creditors.

25. Washington Goode was executed for the crime of murder, in the jail yard in Leverett st., at ten minutes before ten. He had attempted to cut his throat at midnight, with a piece of glass, and was so weak that he was obliged to be carried to the gallows in a chair.

**FIREs.** The department were out in May twenty-four times, viz.: eleven times for fires in the city; eight from fires in the neighboring cities, and five false alarms. The destruction of property is estimated at \$750, the insurance at \$480.

JUNE 2. Mr. John H. Allen, a jeweller, in the pleasure boat "Gipsy," was run down in the harbor by the schooner Watchman, and drowned. Two men with him were picked up.

4. The first case of acknowledged Asiatic cholera appeared, although many rumored cases had preceeded it. The victim was an Irishman at 11 Hamilton street.

5. Patrick Murphy was killed at Constitution wharf, by a bale of goods falling upon him.

16. Cyrus G. Francis, for vending lottery tickets, was fined \$100.

17. Three boys took a boat at Lewis wharf and rowed out into the harbor to bathe. They plunged into the water, but one of the number, named John Tooney, never came to the surface again.

18. Mr. Gallagher, twenty-three years old, plunged into the water off Harrison avenue, to rescue another from drowning, but perished himself while the other was rescued.

20. Jared Sparks, LL. D., was inaugurated President of Harvard College.

28. Three children in Atkinson street, two of them of Mr. Myers, came near dying from eating some poisonous ointment left in their reach.

**FIREs.** The department were called out thirty-one times in June; viz. 16 alarms from fires in the city, 13 from fires out of the city, and 2 false alarms. Loss of property, \$5,000; insurance estimated at \$2,100.

JULY 4. The City Celebration was this year greatly enhanced in interest by a procession of all the Public Schools, under direction of Moses Kimball, Esq., Chief Marshal. After marching through the principal streets, they partook of a collation at Assembly Hall. The

oration before the city authorities was by William Greenough, Esq., of the City Council, and the fireworks in the evening by James G. Hovey, universally acknowledged to be the most beautiful ever seen on Boston Common. The escort duty was performed by the whole Brigade of troops under command of General Edmonds.

5. A man was knocked down by two foot-pads in the Public Garden, one of whom held a knife to his throat while the other robbed him.

13. One of the city scavengers died from the effects of drinking cold water; and a strangled infant was found in Lafayette avenue.

21. Joseph H. Simmons, above twelve years old, was shot through the head by another boy about the same age, named Alfred Symington. The gun was heavily loaded with duck shot, and the whole charge passed through the head, killing him instantly. It was probably a careless accident.

While Charles Carroll was filling a lighted fluid lamp in Mr. Natale's restorant in Doane street, it exploded, and burned several persons shockingly.

25. Father Mathew arrived in Boston.

**FIREs.** The Fire Department were called out during the past month sixteen times, from the following causes, viz., 10 times from fires in the city; 3 times from alarms out of the city; 3 times from false alarms. Estimated amount of loss, \$2,650; insurance on the same, \$750.

AUGUST 3. The National Fast was very generally observed in this city. The public buildings were all closed as on the sabbath, and there were services in all the churches.

5. Mr. Samuel T. Edwards, City Crier, fell dead in the street, near his own residence, from an affection of the heart.

7. A child of Mr. R. H. Gould of West Castle street was suffocated by getting a bean in its throat that could not be dislodged.

8. The following singular cause of death was reported at the interment office this morning. A child named Joseph Kennedy, six years old, was sitting in his mother's kitchen. A cat suddenly sprang into the room through a pane of glass, shivering it in pieces. The boy received a severe shock from fright, and although well before, immediately sickened and died.

13. The coroner held an inquest over the body of a child named

James Lee, found dead in his bed at No. 10 Merrimack street. It appeared that he had pulled the clothes over his head so closely as to suffocate.

Three children, Honora and Julia McDonough and Virginia Clark, went upon some boards at the foot of Bosworth's wharf to play, when they all fell in and were drowned.

17. Mr. Charles Cronimeline, of New York, was killed by falling from the hind part of a buggy on the Mill Dam. He had been out to ride with a friend, and in returning the horse became unmanageable; Mr. C. being frightened attempted to get out behind, when he fell and died of his injuries. He was about 35 years of age.

21. Wm. Phillips, the rogue who escaped from State Prison by leading the Warden on a gold hunt to Barnstable, was arrested.

**FIREs.** During the month of August the department were called out sixteen times, viz.: 11 times from fires in the city; 4 times from false alarms, three from a burning chimney. Estimated loss of property \$9,741; insurance \$7,736.

SEPTEMBER 13. A murderous assault was made upon one Ignatius Stone at a house in Ann Street, in which he was stabbed in the stomach, probably fatally. A mulatto man, and another named Freeman, were arrested.

A sailor belonging to the cutter Hamilton slept on the side walk, and waked up minus \$75.

18. A lad named Rearden died at the Hospital from the effects of being scalded with the contents of a hot coffee-pot, in the town of Boxboro', — the selectmen of the town having sent him to this city, in his dying state, to save the town charges.

19. The last death of cholera reported in this city occurred to-day.

24. One of the most daring robberies that has taken place in our city for years, was effected to-day, at half-past 1 o'clock. A lad in the employ of O. M. Beebe & Co., while standing at the counter of the Suffolk Bank, was robbed of \$2300, by a fellow who was soon after arrested and gave his name as J. C. Cunningham. Of the stolen money \$2100 was recovered.

**FIREs.** The department were called out in September 16 times: viz. ten from fires in the city, — three times from false alarms, and three times from fires out of town. Property destroyed, \$2,680. — Insurance \$750.

## General Events from Sept. 1, 1848, to Sept. 1, 1849.\*

Sep. 1. Numerous assassinations are perpetrated at Rome, from political causes. — The number of victims this day is seven killed and four wounded.

Sep. 2—5. The forces of the king of the Two Sicilies attack the town of Messina, and after a bloody bombardment, capture it.

The city of Leghorn revolts, and a provisional government is organized by the insurgents.

Sep. 5. The German National Assembly (at Frankfort) passes a strong censure on the armistice recently concluded between Denmark, Prussia, and Sweden.

British Parliament prorogued.

Sep. 6—14. The city of Moul-tan, in Northern India, is besieged by the British forces under general Whish. The resistance is obstinate; and after the besiegers have suffered severe losses, they are compelled by the desertion of Shere Singh, a leading chief, to raise the siege.

Sep. 9. Brooklyn, N. Y., is ravaged by a fire, which consumes property to the amount of \$750,000.

Sep. 12. The Swiss confederation adopts a new constitution.

Sep. 13. Serious commotions take place at Vienna; the populace attack the official residence of the Minister, Dobblhoff, the archives are seized, and M. Dobblhoff escapes with difficulty, by a private exit. The cause is the refusal of the Government to guaranty the notes of a "Mutual Help Company," according to an alleged agreement.

Sep. 16. The German National Assembly, having reconsidered its vote against the Danish armistice, the populace in Frankfort raise a tumult, which becomes a dangerous insurrection. They are quelled by the troops. Two leading gentlemen, Prince Lichnowsky, and Major Von Auerswald, are savagely tortured and killed by rioters without the city.

Sep. 27. The Hungarians, at Pesth, murder Count Lamberg, who is sent by the Emperor of

Austria to take the command in Hungary.

Sep. 28. A negro takes his seat in the French National Assembly, as representative of Guadaloupe. Two negroes and two mulattoes have been elected.

Sep. 30. Mr. W. Lassell, the astronomer of Liverpool, announces the discovery of "an eighth satellite of the planet Saturn."

Oct. 3. The Hungarian Diet is dissolved by the Emperor of Austria, martial law proclaimed, and the supreme government of the province intrusted to the Ban Jellachlich.

Oct. 5. Tumults occur at Vienna, in consequence of the Emperor's recent proclamation against Hungary.

The Hungarian Diet appoints Kossuth Dictator.

Oct. 6. The popular movement at Vienna increases. Count Latour, the minister at war, orders a body of grenadiers, who had long been quartered in the city, to leave for Hungary. The grenadiers and the populace are incensed at the orders. The railway track is torn up. When the grenadiers march out of the city, the Tabor bridge is barricaded by the National Guard, and the Academical Legion, and a skirmish ensuing, the government troops fraternize with the insurgents. Gen. Brady, the commander of the grenadiers, is slain in the tumult. The insurgents return to the city, and are fired upon from the church of St. Stephen's, by a party of loyal National Guards. The church is attacked, carried, and the commander of its garrison is slain at the altar. The insurgents overpower all opposition. Between five and six P. M. they seize the war office, and finding Count Latour, the minister, concealed in an upper chamber, murder him, and having stripped the body, hang it on a lamp post in the street. At 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> P. M., the Emperor's forces take refuge in the arsenal, from which they maintain a destructive fire on the

rioters; but the building being fired by congreve rockets, at 6 A. M. of the 7th, the garrison surrenders. 50,000 muskets are then distributed to the populace. The diet assembles on the 6th, and having elected a Committee of Safety, prepares an address to the Emperor, demanding, 1. The revocation of the proclamation against Hungary. 2. The removal of Jellachlich. 3. An amnesty for the insurgents. 4. A liberal ministry. The Emperor receives the address, but the Diet deem his answer evasive, and the Committee of Safety is directed to continue the chief executive authority. Early in the morning of the 7th, the Emperor and his family leave Vienna, on the road to Olmütz, with an escort of troops. Before leaving the city, he sends the Diet a proclamation, threatening his return.

Oct. 8. All commotion is over in the city, and the Diet passes a loyal decree. The Emperor requests one of the Diet's ministry to join him. 20,000 imperial troops, stationed outside of the walls, under the command of Count Auersperg, remain in their quarters, without taking part against the city.

Oct. 9. The troops of the Ban Jellachlich move towards the city. Count Auersperg, being requested by the Diet, refuses to enter the city. Jellachlich, also, declines to receive orders from the Diet.

Oct. 11. The troops of the Ban Jellachlich arrive at the walls of Vienna. The Hungarian army also takes up its march toward the city.

Oct. 16. The Emperor of Austria appoints Prince Windischgratz to command his armies.

Oct. 17. The imperial troops close around the city, and Vienna is in a state of siege. The Diet sends frequent deputations to the Emperor.

Oct. 20. The Assembly at Paris votes to raise the state of siege.

The Emperor of Austria issues a proclamation to remove the Austrian Diet from Vienna to Kremsier. Oct. 21. He declines to receive farther deputations from the city. Oct. 23. Win-

dischgratz takes possession of the island of Lobau, near the city. He summons the city to surrender, and proposes his terms of a capitulation. Oct. 28. His offer having been declined, Windischgratz moves against the city and seizes the suburbs. On the 29th the city council send proposals to surrender; but he declines to vary his original offer. The Council then announce to the invaders that the defence has ceased, and the army enters the city. Meanwhile the Hungarian army is seen advancing to the relief of the city: and the corps of workmen, commanded by Gen. Bem, decline to accede to the decision of the council, and fire upon the Austrian troops. A bloody fight ensues; the city is bombarded, and the imperial library set on fire: but on the morning of Nov. 2d, the imperial army is in quiet possession of the city.

Oct. 29. Lombardy is much disturbed, and the republican Mazzini issues an animated proclamation.

Nov. The Constitution of France is adopted by the Assembly 739 voting in its favor, and 30 against it.

Nov. 9. Windischgratz orders many military executions in Vienna. Blum, a leader of the insurgents, and member of the Frankfort Assembly, is shot.

The king of Prussia prorogues the Assembly and appoints that they meet at Brandenburg on the 27th. The Assembly resolve to sit in permanence; but the hall is surrounded by soldiers, and the members withdraw.

Nov. 12. The Prussian ministry dissolves, and dissolves the Burgher Guard, on account of their sympathy with the Assembly. The city of Berlin is proclaimed in a state of siege.

Nov. 13. The Assembly having met in another hall, are quietly expelled by the soldiers, acting under the king's orders; and after successively removing to numerous buildings, and being disturbed in all, desist from assembling.

Nov. 14. The Croatian troops, under Jellachlich, quit Vienna.

Nov. 15. Messenhausen, the

commander of the Viennese National Guard, is shot by order of a court martial.

Nov. 16. Count Rossi, the Pope's prime minister, is assassinated as he enters the Senate House in the morning. A numerous mob gathers, and marching to the palace of the Pope, on the Quirinal Hill, demand radical reforms of their sovereign, including a new ministry; a convention to form a constitution; the recognition of Italian nationality; and a war of independence. These demands not being at once complied with, the windows of the palace are fired upon, the Pope's private secretary, (Mons. Palma,) is shot; and the mob taking the strongest positions around the palace, maintain a strict siege. The Swiss Guard, numbering less than 40 men, close the gates and defend them; and at 7 P. M., when cannon had been brought against the building, the Pope announces a new ministry.

Nov. 22. The British forces, under Lord Gough, encounter the Sikhs near Ramnuggur, on the right bank of the Chenab. After a severe battle, in which many officers are killed, the British are victorious.

Nov. 24. The Pope leaves Rome for Mola di Gaeta, in disguise.

Nov. 27. The Prussian Assembly is convoked at Brandenburg, but the members either prevent a quorum, or immediately adjourn.

Dec. Hungary declares its independence.

Dec. 2. The Emperor of Austria, Ferdinand I., abdicates the throne; and his nephew, Francis Joseph I., is proclaimed in his stead. Francis Charles, next of kin to Ferdinand, and father to the new emperor, renounces the succession.

Dec. 6. The king of Prussia dissolves the Assembly, and publishes a new constitution.

Dec. 10-11. Louis Napoleon Bonaparte is elected President of the French Republic, having received 5,534,520 votes. Gen. Cavaignac received 1,448,302; Ledru Rollin 371,431; and all others 71,999.

Dec. 13. Leave is refused to introduce into the House of Representatives a bill to abolish slavery in the District of Columbia, by a vote of 69 to 81.

Dec. 14. The Senate of South Carolina, by a vote of 23 to 22, declines to commit the choice of Electors directly to the people.

Dec. 25. The cholera attacks the 8th Infantry, at Port Lavaca, in Texas, and in 3 days 76 rank and file fall its victims.

Dec. 29. The Chambers of the Roman Assmblv are dissolved and a constituent assembly is convoked. The provisional government of Venice directs the election, by universal suffrage, of a House of Representatives.

Jan. 3. The town of Moul-tan, in the Punjab, after a resistance scarcely paralleled in the history of British conquest in India, is surrendered to the British army.

Jan. 8. Pope Pius IX. issues a proclamation, threatening with excommunication every person who in any way abets the election of the new Constituent Assembly at Rome.

Jan. 13. The British forces under Lord Gough engage the Sikhs near Chillianwallah, and a desperate battle is fought, in which both armies claim the victory. The British lose 757 killed and 1512 wounded.

Jan. 22. The fort of Moultan is given up to the British.

Jan. 25. The election of Gen. Zachary Taylor as President of the United States for four years, from March 4, 1849, is officially announced, upon the opening of electoral votes in the Capitol.

Feb. 1. The British Parliament meets.

Feb. 7. The Supreme Court of the U. S. decide against the validity of the Alien Passenger law.

Feb. 9. The Grand Duke of Tuscany flees from Florence, and a Provisional Government is organized. The "Republic" is proclaimed at Rome.

Feb. 21. A battle is fought near Goojerad, in India, between Lord Gough, commanding the British army, and the Sikhs under Shere Singh, which results in the total defeat of the

latter. The armies are in conflict from 7 A. M., to 4 P. M.; and the British lose 1,000 men in killed and wounded.

March 4-6. The basis of a new constitution is given to the Austrians by their new Emperor, in several decrees.

March 5. Gen. Zachary Taylor is inaugurated as President of the United States, and delivers a brief and dignified address.

March 6. The King of the two Sicilies promulgates a new Constitution, based on that of 1812.

March 14. The armistice between Austria and Sardinia is broken, and both countries prepare for immediate war.

The remaining forces of Shere Singh surrender to the British Army.

March 17. William II., King of Holland, dies aged 57. He was early driven from Holland, on the foundation of the Batavian Republic, and was educated in England under the late Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Howley. At 19 he was appointed a Lieut. Col. of the British Army, served under the Duke of Wellington in the Peninsula from 1811 to 1814; and was severely wounded at the battle of Waterloo. In 1813 it was proposed that he should marry the Princess Charlotte of England; but the lady preferred Prince Leopold, who, as it was many years after remarked, obtained both a wife and a kingdom at the expense of the same rival.

Henry Clay publishes a letter advocating the abolition of slavery in the State of Kentucky.

March 21. The armies of Charles Albert and Marshal Radetsky meet near Vercelli; the Sardinians are defeated and fall back toward Turin.

March 23. The two armies are engaged at and near the town of Novarra, and the battle ends in utter rout of the Sardinians; —Charles Albert, after display of great personal bravery, finding his defeat complete, abdicates in favor of his son, the Duke of Savoy, and leaves the Kingdom.

The Senate of the United States adjourns, after a special session of eighteen days.

March 29. The British arms being every where successful in the contest with the Sikhs, and the war at the end, the Punjab is formally annexed to the British Crown.

March 30. The city of Brescia having risen against the Austrians, is attacked by General Hayneai, and after a destructive bombardment, is entered and sacked.

April 1. Genoa revolts. On the 3d the garrison surrenders to the insurgents in the town; on the 5th the town is invested by the Sardinian army under General Marmora. On the 6th a truce is sued for and granted. On the 11th the city is unconditionally entered by the troops.

April 6. Catania is bombarded and reduced by the Royal forces.

The Danes attack the little fort of Eckendorf, with a fleet mounting 154 guns; and from 7 A. M. to 1 P. M. a constant fire is kept up. A truce is then granted of two hours, during which time the batteries in the fort are repaired. At 5 P. M. hostilities recommence; the fort being assisted by a Nassau battery. The Christian VIII. line of battle ship, having grounded, and struck her flag, the Gefion, frigate, follows her example; 44 superior officers, and nearly 1000 men are made prisoners. At 8 P. M. the Christian VIII. blows up.

April 6. Sixty-nine meetings have been held in Canada to oppose the "Rebellion Compensation Bill," and a violent ferment is going on throughout the Province. The bill appropriates £100,000 for payment of losses incurred during the rebellion of 1837-38, and its opponents maintain that the money will be paid to those who were really rebels.

April 12. Gasparis at Naples, discovers a new planet.

April 15. Gen. Welden succeeds Prince Windischgratz in the command of the Austrian armies.

April 22. The Schleswig-Holsteiners defeat the Danes at the town of Kolding.

April 25. The Earl of Elgin, Governor General of Canada, signs the "Rebellion Losses In-

demnity Bill." An immediate outbreak ensues. The Governor General is insulted and stoned on his way from the Parliament; the Parliament House is burnt down; the leading ministers are chased from their homes. Great excitement prevails throughout Canada, and many meetings are held to condemn the Bill.

The French armament destined to restore the Pope arrives at Civita Vecchia.

April 26. The emperor of Russia publishes an Ukase announcing his purpose to assist Austria in subduing the Hungarians.

April 29. The French attempt to enter Rome, but are met by a barricade near the gate, and by a fierce resistance. After enduring a galling fire with much bravery, they retreat with a loss of about 600 killed and wounded.

May —. The troops of Baden in the fortress of Rastadt revolt, attack their officers, and gain possession of the fort.

May 3. Dresden is held by a mob; the king flees; Prussian troops are called in, and by their aid the insurgents are quelled on the 7th.

May 7. Mr. Macready, the tragedian, is driven from the stage in New-York, by a mob, endeavoring to avenge a supposed slight offered to Mr. Forrest while in England.

May 10. Mr. Macready, at the written request of some of the most respectable citizens of New-York, attempts to play Macbeth, at the Astor Place Opera House. The Police, being forewarned of a tumult, assemble in large force, and by their efforts Mr. Macready goes through the play, but not without violent and continual interruptions from within and without the house. The mob without, as the evening advances, attack the house with stones, and attempt to fire it. The rioters becoming too numerous and desperate for the police, the military are called out, under Gen. Sandford, and after patiently enduring showers of stones, by which more than half of their number are wounded, they are

ordered to fire. More than twenty rioters or spectators are killed on the spot, and no successful attempts at violence are afterwards made.

May —. The steamer United States, sold for purposes of war to the Prussian Government, by citizens of the United States, is detained by order of the government.

May 12. Two large gaps, or crevasses, are burst by the river in the embankments near New-Orleans, and the city is partially submerged.

May 18. The city of St. Louis is swept by a fire, destroying property to the amount of six or seven millions of dollars.

May 21. Miss Edgeworth dies, at Edgeworthstown, in Ireland, aged 83.

May 22. Gen. Ramorino is executed at Turin for "having omitted to act up to the instructions of the General-in-chief," during Charles Albert's brief campaign. No charge of treason is made against him, but a neglect of positive orders in order to follow his own judgment.

June —. An insurrection in Baden, headed by Mierolawski, a Pole, gains much strength. It is quelled by Prussian troops, after a battle.

June 11. Ledru Rollin finds 140 adherents ready to sign a petition to impeach President Bonaparte for his course touching the Roman Expedition. On the 13th a riot is feared, and great preparations are made to meet it, but after much excitement no violence is attempted.

June 26. The great "crevasse" near Sauve's plantation is closed, after much destruction of property, and infinite alarm and inconvenience to the inhabitants of New-Orleans.

June 27. The steamship Europa, on her passage to England, runs down the American barque Charles Bartlett, which sinks. Of 177 passengers, 43 only are saved.

July 1. The city of Rome surrenders to General Oudinot, after a spirited defence of 29 days. On the 3d the French troops enter, and the Roman chief, Garibaldi, leaves the city.

July 4. The cholera ravages St. Louis and Cincinnati. 1,001 deaths occur in the latter city for the week ending July 7.

July 6. The Danes besieged in Frederica make a vigorous sortie, and drive off the Germans, who lose 3,112 men in killed, wounded, and prisoners.

July 9. Rastadt is bombarded by the Prussians.

July 10. An armistice of 12 weeks is concluded between Denmark and Prussia.

July 13. 190 deaths occur this day at St. Louis, and 154 deaths at Cincinnati.

July 23. Rastadt surrenders unconditionally.

July 27. The Grand Duke of Tuscany enters Florence, and the government is placed in his hands.

July 28. Charles Albert, late king of Sardinia, dies at Lisbon.

Aug. 1. The British Parliament adjourns.

The Sardinian Chamber is opened by the new king with a liberal speech.

Queen Victoria leaves Cowes for England, where she is enthusiastically received.

A treaty of peace and commerce is concluded between Great Britain and Liberia.

Aug. 2. Garibaldi's army surrenders to the Austrians. The leader himself, with about 300 followers, escapes on board some fishing vessels in the Adriatic.

Aug. 2. Mehemet Ali, Pasha of Egypt, dies at Alexandria, aged 80. Born about 1769, at Cavalla, in Macedonia, he began life as a tobacconist, but soon volunteered into the Sultan's army, and amid the disorders of the time grasped the pachalic of Egypt. In 1807 occurred the destruction of the Mamelukes, and soon after, the conquest of Arabia, Nubia, Dongola, Sennaar, and Cordofan. He reduced the island of Candia, and held it in subjection till the battle of Navarino, in 1827. His first invasion of Syria in 1830, and his second invasion in 1839—were only prevented, by the intervention of Britain, Austria, and Russia, from ending in the conquest of Turkey.

Aug. 3. Gen. Oudinot resigns

the civil government of Rome to three papal commissioners. The work of reaction is prosecuted with vigor.

Aug. 6. A treaty of peace is concluded between Austria and Sardinia.

Aug. 11. The Hungarian chief Gorgey surrenders his whole force to the Russian General Rudiger.

President Taylor issues a proclamation warning the citizens of the United States not to engage in an expedition supposed to be destined against Cuba.

The house of Mr. Lafontaine, a leading member of the Canadian ministry, is attacked by a mob. The house is defended, fire-arms are used by the inmates, and a lad named Mason is killed. Great excitement prevails in the city of Montreal.

Aug. 17. The number of deaths of cholera in New-York to this date is 4040.

Aug. 18. President Bonaparte writes to M. Ney, condemning the reaction at Rome. He names as the conditions of the pope's restoration, a secular ministry, liberal government, amnesty, and the code Napoleon.

Aug. 21. The National Convention of Inventors meets at Baltimore.

Aug. 22. The Peace Congress assembles at Paris. M. Victor Hugo is chosen president.

Venice capitulates to Marshal Radetsky, after a long and brave resistance.

Aug. 26. The Senate of Hayti concurs with the House of Representatives, in conferring the title and authority of Emperor upon President Faustin Sonlouque. The President of the Senate then placed the imperial crown on the Emperor's head, and placed a cross of gold at his button hole.

Aug. 28-31. A dangerous insurrection breaks out in the Ionian Islands, accompanied by atrocious murders. It is subdued after an engagement with the insurgents, who numbered about three hundred.

Aug. 30. The Sardinian Assembly votes 100,000 livres for the relief of Italian refugees.
