The Viceroy and Members of the Government of India having left the Presidency for Simla, it is hereby notified that on and after the 3rd April and until further notice, the *Gazette of India* will be published at Simla on the morning of every Saturday.

Calcutta, the 9th April 1869.

It is hereby notified for general information that under arrangements made with the owners of the opium steamers which ply monthly between Calcutta, the Straits, and Hong-Kong, these steamers will in future be classed as Indian Mail Packets, and that letters, newspapers, and packets of newspapers, books or patterns will be forwarded by them from Calcutta for the Straits and Hong-Kong under the same conditions and at the same rates as similar articles forwarded by British Mail Packets (Peninsular and Oriental Company). This arrangement will commence with the first opium steamer which leaves Calcutta in April.

2. These steamers leave Calcutta about 12 days more or less after each Government opium sale: the advertised dates of the opium sales for the current year (1869) being as follows:—

April 8th.	September 9th.
May 6th.	October 4th.
June 7th.	November 5th.
July 7th.	December 6th.
August 9th.	

3. Mails for the United States of America, *vid* Hong-Kong, can be forwarded by these steamers at the same rates and under the same conditions as by British packets.

4. The opium steamers proceed from Calcutta direct to the Straits and thence to Hong-Kong, and the time of transit from Calcutta to Hong-Kong is only about 15 days, that is, about 7 days less than the time taken by the British packets (Peninsular and Oriental Company), which proceed by the more circuitous route of Madras and Galle.

The Governor General in Council is pleased to direct the following revision of Clause 3 of the Notification of this Department, No. 1202, dated 9th March 1865:—

CLAUSE 3 AS IT EXISTS.

Sections 28, 35, 48, 51 and 52 of Act XXI. of 1856, so far as they restrict the sale of opium to licensed vendors only, and prohibit the possession of opium by other parties.

CLAUSE 3 AS NOW REVISED.

Sections 28, 35, 48, 51 and 52 of Act XXI. of 1856 are to be considered in force in all districts subject to the following provisos:—

In districts where an acreage system is in force, there is no restriction upon the possession of home manufactured opium by *bond fide* cultivators of the poppy. The sale of such opium by the cultivators to any one but a licensed contractor or his agent, is prohibited.

The possession of foreign imported opium in any quantity exceeding 5 tolas weight, by any other party than a licensed contractor, or his agent, is prohibited, except under a pass granted under rules issued by the Financial Commissioner.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 2790, dated the 12th ultimo, submitting a claim from Mr. F. B. Peacock, the Registrar of the High Court, Calcutta, to an allowance of £500 per annum, during the portion in excess of twenty months of his absence in Europe on leave on medical certificate, from the 24th October 1865 to the 12th November 1868, and enquiring, first, whether the absentee allowance of Covenanted Civil Servants forfeiting their appointments under the rules extracted in the margin* from Section XII. of the Absentee Rules of the 16th December 1864, and Clause C. of Section VIII. of the Rules of the 16th June 1868,† should be determined by their standing at the time they forfeit their appointments, or their standing at the time their leave commence; and secondly, whether such standing should, with reference to an order of the Government of India in the General Department, No. 3349, dated the 15th November 1831, be held to include time spent at Hayleybury College.

* "After twenty months' absence his office will be vacated, but he will be permitted to draw a sick absentee allowance of £500 per annum if he be above ten years' standing, and of £250 per annum if not above ten years' standing."

† "When on furlough under this clause, an officer will not retain a lien on his appointment, and will be entitled only to subsistence allowance."

2. In reply to the first question, I am desired to observe that the rates of absentee allowance in the cases to which that question relates, should be determined by the Officers' standing at the time they forfeit their appointments.

3. In reply to the second question, I am directed to state that the Governor General in Council considers it unnecessary to disturb the order of November 1831, which directed that time spent at Hayleybury College should be included in the computation of standing which qualifies for subsistence allowance, because nearly all the Officers now in the Covenanted Civil Service, who were at Hayleybury College, have, without calculating the time spent by them at Hayleybury, attained the standing which qualifies for the highest rate of subsistence allowance; but that the subsistence allowance of Covenanted Civil Servants who were not at Hayleybury must be regulated by their standing from the dates of their arrival in India. I am directed, however, to point out that the decision of 1831 which allows Hayleybury time to be included in the computation of standing qualifying for subsistence allowance does not authorize its being included in the standing which qualifies for *absentee* allowance under Section XII. of the Absentee Rules of December 1864, and that consequently the standing qualifying for such *absentee* allowance must be computed from the date of an Officer's arrival in India.

4. I am to add that Mr. Peacock's claim to £500 per annum, from the 24th June 1867 to the 12th November 1868, may be admitted under the orders contained in this letter, because having arrived in India on the 1st February 1857, he was, according to those orders, an Officer of above ten years' standing on the 24th June 1867.

From the 1st of February 1869, all messages received into a Telegraph Office for despatch, must be stamped to the full value for all demands.

Introduction of Stamps from 1st February 1869.

2. Telegraph Stamps will be procurable at all Telegraph Stations in any quantities, and at Civil Treasuries in quantities of the value of not less than Rs. 5 of labels at one time, provided that the quantity sold shall not include less than one Rupee worth of any particular value of Stamps.

Stamps procurable at Telegraph Offices and Civil Treasuries.

3. Telegrams can be sent from out-stations by post, but they must be enclosed in registered covers. At stations where Telegraph Stamps are not procurable, they may be paid for by Postage Stamps at the rate of 17 annas to the Rupee. In such cases, the Post Office registration receipt will take the place of the ordinary Telegraph receipt. If any telegram be received insufficiently stamped, it will be returned bearing to the sender.

Telegrams for transmission from Non-Telegraph Stations, where Telegraph Stamps are not available, may be paid for in Postage Stamps.

4. Telegraph Stamps are double headed, the object being that the upper half shall be returned on the receipt (whereby the sender receives a guarantee that his message has not been suppressed for the sake of the money), and the lower half shall be affixed to the message as voucher to Government that it has been prepaid.

The form of Stamp provides a guarantee to the sender and to the Government.

5. Proper forms on which to write telegrams are available at all Telegraph Stations gratis for messages written at the Office, or for sale at the following rates:—

7. Telegraph Stamps cut in two, before being sent into a Telegraph Office, will not be accepted.

8. For rates of charge, see Notification, on revised Tariff of the 20th September 1868.

9. Skeleton Maps of India showing the Telegraph Lines and Stations are procurable at most Telegraph Offices at eight annas each.

The Ceylon charge on a message of 20 words to or from India will, in future, be one Rupee. Thus, a message of 10 words between any station in Ceylon and any station in India (except those east of Calcutta), will be two Rupees, a message of 20 words will be three Rupees, a message of 30 words will be five Rupees, and so on.

A charge of one Rupee in addition to the above will be made for a message of 20 words to or from any station east of Calcutta.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of an Officiating Junior Secretary A. Maekenzie's No. 691 of the 22nd February 1869, regarding the allowances of Commissioned Medical Officers of the Army officiating in Civil appoint-

“2. In reply, I am desired to state that orders will be issued hereafter regarding the allowances of Medical Officers officiating in any of the Civil appointments, the salaries of which were fixed in the General Order of the Government of India in the Military Department, No. 370, dated the 4th April 1867, but that the allowances of a Medical Officer acting in any other Civil appointment must be regulated by the rules for the grant of acting allowances to Military Officers in Civil employ.”

No. 101.

Read Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Foreign Department, No. 452, dated the 8th ultimo, sanctioning an application from Mr. J. D. Gordon, Judicial Commissioner of Mysore, on privilege leave, for permission to proceed to Europe on furlough for two years on the expiration of his privilege leave, without rejoining his appointment.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council observes that there are two theories of privilege leave—

First.—That which has always been maintained by the Secretary of State and the Government of India, *viz.*, that this leave is granted for the purpose of enabling an Officer who has worked uninterruptedly for a certain period to recruit his health and strength for future work; and

Secondly.—That which has gained ground among the Officers of the Service, *viz.*, that this leave is a privilege earned by past work, and has no reference to the future. On the first theory has been founded the rule which has always been insisted upon, that at the conclusion of privilege leave an Officer must rejoin his appointment. On the second theory, every attempt has been made to evade the above rule. Privilege leave has been unhesitatingly granted to Officers, although it was known that at the conclusion of that leave they did not intend to do any more work for some time but were about to proceed on leave of another kind. The formality of rejoining the appointment has been observed in letter, but the spirit of the rule has been broken by the nominal transfer of the Officer concerned to a similar post in or near a Presidency Town, whence he could embark on longer leave.

2. His Excellency in Council is of opinion that such evasions of the rule should not be allowed, and accordingly takes this opportunity of prescribing that an Officer, when applying for privilege leave, shall declare that he has no present intention of taking another leave within a period of six months after the expiry of his privilege leave, provided, however, that if any Officer to whom privilege leave is due be allowed subsidiary or preparatory leave, he shall be permitted to draw the allowances admissible during privilege leave for the period of his subsidiary or preparatory leave, or for any less period for which privilege leave may be due to him.

3. This Rule will apply to all Civil Officers as well as to Military Officers in Civil employ.

4. With regard to the particular case of Mr. Gordon, His Excellency in Council observes that as Mr. Gordon has already been allowed privilege

leave unconditionally, he will not be required to join his appointment before proceeding on furlough.

ORDERED that the foregoing Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

RESOLUTION.—Under the terms of the Resolution of the 4th July 1861, a Government servant discharged on reduction of establishment with pension, if temporarily re-employed under Government, draw both pension and the pay of the temporary office, provided the aggregate receipts do not exceed the pay of the appointment relinquished at the time of the reduction. In other words, if the pay of the new office be more than, or equal to, the pay of former office, no portion of the pension is allowed to be drawn; but if less, so much of the pension is allowed to be drawn, in addition to the pay, as is necessary to make up the aggregate receipts equal to former pay.

2. The Governor General in Council sees no reason why these rules should be restricted only to pensioners employed temporarily, and is pleased to direct that, in future, the same rules shall be applied to the cases of Government servants discharged with pension on reduction of establishment, who may be subsequently re-employed on permanent establishments.

3. With regard to the enquiry made by the Deputy Accountant General, N. W. Provinces, the Governor General in Council observes that special orders of Government are not necessary for the admission of claims under these rules.

TELEGRAPH DEPARTMENT.

NOTIFICATIONS.

Calcutta, the 22nd December 1868.

From the 1st of February 1869, all messages received into a Telegraph Office for despatch, must be stamped to the full value for all demands.

2. Telegraph Stamps will be procurable at all Telegraph Stations in any quantities, and at Civil Treasuries in quantities of the value of not less than Rs. 5 of labels at one time, provided that the quantity sold shall not include less than one Rupee worth of any particular value of Stamps.

3. Telegrams can be sent from out-stations by post, but they must be enclosed in registered covers. At stations where Telegraph Stamps are not procurable, they may be paid for by Postage Stamps at the rate of 17 annas to the Rupee. In such cases, the Post Office registration receipt will take the place of the ordinary Telegraph receipt. If any telegram be received insufficiently stamped, it will be returned bearing to the sender.

4. Telegraph Stamps are double headed, the object being that the upper half shall be returned on the receipt (whereby the sender receives a guarantee that his message has not been suppressed for the sake of the money), and the lower half shall be affixed to the message as voucher to Government that it has been prepaid.

5. Proper forms on which to write telegrams are available at all Telegraph Stations gratis for messages written at the Office, or for sale at the following rates:—

These forms will also shortly be obtainable at the same rates at all Treasuries.

6. The senders of Telegrams must be careful to affix their Stamps on the spaces left blank for the purpose on the message forms,—the upper half on the receipt, the lower half on the message,—and to see that the Stamps are defaced with the Office Stamp which carries the name of the Office and date.

7. Telegram Stamps cut in two, before being sent into a* Telegraph Office, will not be accepted.

8. For rates of charge, see Notification on revised Tariff of the 20th September 1868.

9. Skeleton Maps of India showing the Telegraph Lines and Stations are procurable at most Telegraph Offices at eight annas each.

THE Ceylon charge on a message of 20 words to or from India will, in future, be one Rupee. Thus, a message of 10 words between any station in Ceylon and any station in India (except those east of Calcutta), will be two Rupees, a message of 20 words will be three Rupees, a message of 30 words will be five Rupees, and so on.

A charge of one Rupee in addition to the above will be made for a message of 20 words to or from any station east of Calcutta.

The above cancels paragraph 9 of the Telegraph Notification dated Simla, the 20th September 1868, published in the *Gazette of India* of the 20th idem.

The following alterations in the Rules respecting the cost of transmission of telegrams by Post have received the sanction of the Government of India:—

From the 1st of May 1869, the uniform rate one Rupee for ten words will include the postage of telegrams which are forwarded by inland Post to their destination.

The postage on a message sent from a Non-Telegraph Station to a Telegraph Office for transmission, must, as heretofore, be prepaid by the sender.

Compulsory postal registration is abolished, the sender of a telegram to be delivered by Post can secure its registration, if desired, by affixing to his message a four-anna Telegraph Stamp in addition to the usual Telegraph charge.

The following letter to the Officiating Accountant General, Bombay, is published for general information:—

"I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 3626 A. of the 19th March 1869, enquiring, with reference to the letter No. 1482, addressed to you from this Department on the 5th idem, "whether an Uncovenanted Servant acting for another on a salary of less than Rs. 100 per mensem, should be permitted to draw deputation allowance under the old Rules, *viz.*, a moiety of his substantive appointment *plus* a moiety of the acting appointment."

2. In reply, I am desired to state that the old rules for the grant of acting allowance to Uncovenanted Servants have been abolished, and that the acting allowance of the substitute of an Uncovenanted Servant on a salary of even less than Rs. 100 per mensem, should always be regulated, if practicable, by the Resolution No. 123, passed in this Department on the 6th January 1869, whenever it is necessary formally to appoint a substitute for the absentee.

3. I am also to point out that the old Rules did not, as you apparently suppose, invariably allow the substitute of an Uncovenanted Servant to draw half his substantive salary and half the salary of the absentee.

Read a letter from the Reverend R. Henderson, Senior Chaplain of the Church of Scotland at Calcutta, No. 20, dated the 4th March, submitting certain questions with reference to the Sections quoted below from the rules of the 31st July 1868, for the grant of leave of absence to Chaplains:—

"XXV.—The term of *residence* qualifying for pension shall be, in the case of Chaplains appointed before the 11th January 1854, fifteen years, and, in the case of Chaplains appointed on or after that date, seventeen years, but no leave, except privilege leave and subsidiary leave, shall count as residence."

"XXVI.—The term of *service* qualifying for pension shall be, in the case of Chaplains appointed before the 11th January 1854, eighteen years, and, in the case of Chaplains appointed on or after that date, twenty years. Leave of absence in India taken prior to the 25th August 1864 shall count as service for pension, and shall not be reckoned as furlough under these Rules."

RESOLUTION.—The general questions submitted in the above letter are,—

First.—Whether, after the periods of residence and service specified in Sections XXV. and XXVI. of the Rules of July 1868 have been completed, retirement is optional or compulsory;

Second.—Whether a Chaplain may retire after completing either the period of residence specified in Section XXV., or the period of service specified in Section XXVI.;

Third.—Whether privilege leave and subsidiary leave are the only leaves which can be reckoned as residence for pension;

Fourth.—Whether furlough for three years and all leave taken in India before the 25th August 1864, can be reckoned as service for pension;

Fifth.—Whether leave taken in India prior to the 25th August 1864, shall be reckoned as furlough under the Rules of July 1868.

2. With reference to the first question, the Governor General in Council observes that after the specified periods of residence and service have been completed, retirement is optional, not compulsory, until the completion of 25 years' service, when, under the orders of the Secretary of State, No. 32, dated 17th February 1865, retirement is compulsory, unless a Chaplain is specially retained in the service by the Secretary of State.

3. As regards the second question, His Excellency in Council observes that

Financial Despatch from Court of Directors, to Government of India, No. 113, dated the 28th December 1855, paragraph 3.—"If a Chaplain or Assistant Chaplain should not avail himself of the privilege of furlough, he may be permitted to retire on the regulated pension after the completion of the required period of Indian residence."

by the orders of the late Court of Directors quoted in the margin, Chaplains were allowed to retire on pension after completing the specified period of residence without completing the prescribed period of service, but that this indulgence is at variance with the rules in the analogous case of Covenanted Civil Servants, and may be appropriately withdrawn now that various concessions in respect to furlough and furlough allowance have been made to the Ecclesiastical Service in the Rules of July 1868. His Excellency in Council is accordingly pleased to rule that a Chaplain shall not be permitted to retire on pension until he has completed both the period of residence specified in Section XXV. of those Rules, and the period of service specified in Section XXVI.

4. The third question is answered in the affirmative.

5. With reference to the fourth question, His Excellency in Council observes that for the Civil Service all periods spent on leave count as *service* qualifying for pension, and with reference to the withdrawal of the indulgence referred to in paragraph 3 of this Resolution, the same Rule may be held to apply to Chaplains.

6. As regards the fifth question, His Excellency in Council observes that on the 25th August 1854, it was first ruled that a Chaplain's absence on leave in India should not be reckoned as *service*

qualifying for pension, and on the 5th September 1855,* it was decided that this Rule should not have retrospective effect. The last sentence of Section XXVI. of the Rules of July 1868, was intended merely to repeat the decision of September 1855, but 1864 was misprinted in it for 1854. As, however, it is now ruled that all periods spent on leave shall be reckoned as service qualifying for pension, His Excellency in Council is pleased to direct that for the last sentence of Section XXVI. the following shall be substituted:—

"All periods spent on leave of any description shall be reckoned as service qualifying for pension, and periods spent on leave in India prior to the 25th August 1854, shall neither be reckoned as furlough nor as actual service qualifying for furlough."

ORDERED that the foregoing Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the grant of the palankeen allowance claimed with reference to a Resolution No. 3149, passed in this Department on the 26th May 1858; but in doing so, observes that as "Tulloh's Hand-book" has not been published by authority, all references from public Officers with regard to their allowances should be supported by quotations not from the Hand-book, but from the orders of Government. In the present instance, a Resolution of the 9th August 1860 was quoted in support of the claim to palankeen allowances, to which that Resolution had no reference.

ORDERED that the foregoing Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

Read the undermentioned papers:—

Resolution No. 575 passed in this Department on the 31st January 1868, ruling "that Covenanted Civil Servants posted to the Upper Division of the Bengal Presidency with permission to come to India *via* Bombay, shall be entitled to a salary of Rs. 400 per mensem from the date of their reporting their arrival at Bombay, and that every other such servant who shall have passed for the service under the new system referred to above, shall be entitled to a salary of Rs. 400 per mensem from the date of his reporting his arrival at the Presidency to which he belongs."

Letter to the Accountant General, North-Western Provinces, No. 424, dated the 21st January 1869, authorizing him "to pass all bills submitted by Covenanted Civil Servants appointed to the North-Western Provinces for travelling charges between Bombay and Allahabad."

Letter from the Secretary to the Government of Bengal, No. 1143, dated the 24th March 1869, and enclosure, recommending that Covenanted Civil Servants posted to the Lower Provinces of the Bengal Presidency, who come out to India *via* Bombay, should be permitted to draw salary

from the date of reporting arrival at Bombay, and travelling allowance from Bombay to Calcutta.

RESOLUTION.—On a re-consideration of the orders of the 31st January 1868 and 21st January 1869, the Governor General in Council is of opinion that there is no reason for exempting Covenanted Civil Servants proceeding to the North-Western Provinces from the operation of the Rule which denies pay and travelling allowance to a Covenanted Civil Servant before he reaches the Presidency to which he is posted. His Excellency in Council is accordingly pleased to rule in supersession of the orders of the 31st January 1868 and 21st January 1869, that a Covenanted Civil Servant shall be entitled to salary at Rs. 400 per mensem from the date on which he reports his arrival either at the seat of the Government to which he is attached, or at any other station to which he may proceed direct by order of that Government at his own request, and that he shall receive no travelling allowance unless he is subsequently transferred, in which case his travelling allowance will be regulated by the Rules for the grant of travelling allowance to Officers transferred from one station to another.

ORDERED that the foregoing Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

TELEGRAPH DEPARTMENT.

NOTIFICATIONS.

Calcutta, the 22nd December 1868.

From the 1st of February 1869, all messages received into a Telegraph Office for despatch, must be stamped to the full value for all demands.

Introduction of Stamps from 1st February 1869.

2. Telegraph Stamps will be procurable at all Telegraph Stations in any quantities, and at Civil Treasuries in quantities of the value of not less than Rs. 5 of labels at one time, provided that the quantity sold shall not include less than one Rupee worth of any particular value of Stamps.

3. Telegrams can be sent from out-stations by post, but they must be enclosed in registered covers. At stations where Telegraph Stamps are not procurable, they may be paid for by Postage Stamps at the rate of 17 annas to the Rupee. In such cases, the Post Office registration receipt will take the place of the ordinary Telegraph receipt. If any telegram be received insufficiently stamped, it will be returned bearing to the sender.

4. Telegraph Stamps are double headed, the object being that the upper half shall be returned on the receipt (whereby the sender receives a guarantee that his message has not been suppressed for the sake of the money), and the lower half shall be affixed to the message as voucher to Government that it has been prepaid.

5. Proper forms on which to write telegrams are available at all Telegraph Stations gratis for messages written at the Office, or for sale at the following rates:—

These forms will also shortly be obtainable at the same rates at all Treasuries.

6. The senders of Telegrams must be careful to affix their Stamps on the spaces left blank for the purpose on the message forms,—the upper half on the receipt, the lower half on the message,—and to see that the Stamps are defaced with the Office Stamp which carries the name of the Office and date.

7. Telegraph Stamps cut in two, before being sent into a Telegraph Office, will not be accepted.

8. For rates of charge, see Notification on revised Tariff of the 20th September 1868.

9. Skeleton Maps of India showing the Telegraph Lines and Stations are procurable at most Telegraph Offices at eight annas each.

THE Ceylon charge on a message of 20 words to or from India will, in future, be one Rupee. Thus, a message of 10 words between any station in Ceylon and any station in India (except those east of Calcutta), will be two Rupees, a message of 20 words will be three Rupees, a message of 30 words will be five Rupees, and so on.

A charge of one Rupee in addition to the above will be made for a message of 20 words to or from any station east of Calcutta.

The above cancels paragraph 9 of the Telegraph Notification dated Simla, the 20th September 1868, published in the *Gazette of India* of the 20th idem.

THE following alterations in the Rules respecting the cost of transmission of telegrams by Post, have received the sanction of the Government of India:—

From the 1st of May 1869, the uniform rate of one Rupee for ten words will include the postage on telegrams which are forwarded by inland Post to their destination.

The postage on a message sent from a Non-Telegraph Station to a Telegraph Office for transmission, must, as heretofore, be prepaid by the sender.

Compulsory postal registration is abolished, but the sender of a telegram to be delivered by Post can secure its registration, if desired, by affixing to his message a four-anna Telegraph Stamp in addition to the usual Telegraph charge.

5th.—To an Officer proceeding on duty from one Presidency or Province to another;

6th.—To an Officer proceeding on duty from one District to another of the same Presidency or Province;

3. In the *first* case, the Accountant General of the absentee's Presidency or Province should furnish him with a last pay certificate in the form A. appended to this Resolution, and simultaneously forward a duplicate of the form to the Local Government for transmission to the Secretary of State, unless the absentee embark at a port in British Burmah, in which case the Accountant General should forward the duplicate of the form at once to the Financial Department of the Government of India for transmission to the Secretary of State, or unless the absentee embark at Calcutta, in which case the Accountant General should forward the duplicate form to the Financial Department after filling up the blanks in the Pilot's certificate at the foot of it.

If the absentee be employed at, or have to pass through, the station of the Accountant General of his Presidency or Province, the Accountant General must pay him up to the date of his departure from that station, and furnish him with a document in the form B. appended to this Resolution, leaving the fifth, seventh and eighth spaces on the face of the document blank, and sending a duplicate of it to the Accountant General, or (if there be no Accountant General) to the District Officer in charge of the Treasury at the port at which the absentee intends to embark for Europe. The Accountant General or District Officer at the port of embarkation, to whom the letter on the back of form B. should be addressed, must act up to the instructions contained in that letter, and return the original form to the absentee. If he be an Accountant General, he must, moreover, forward the duplicate of the form to the Local Government for transmission to the Secretary of State, and address a letter in the form C. appended to this Resolution to the Accountant General of the absentee's Presidency; but if he be a District Officer, he must forward a duplicate of form B. to the Accountant General of his own Presidency, who must forward it on to the Local Government for transmission to the Secretary of State, and send a letter to the Accountant General of the absentee's Presidency in the form D. appended to this Resolution.

6. If the absentee be not employed at the station of the Accountant General of his Presidency, and have not to pass through that station on his way to the port at which he intends to embark for Europe, the Accountant General must send him a document in the form E. appended to this Resolution, leaving the fifth, seventh and eighth spaces on the face of the form blank, and forward a duplicate of it to the Accountant

General or District Officer at the port at which the absentee intends to embark for Europe. Before the absentee's departure from his station, the District Officer in charge of the Treasury from which he last drew pay must fill up and attest the certificate at the end of the original form E. The Accountant General or District Officer at the port at which the absentee intends to embark for Europe must act up to the instructions in the letter to his address on the back of form E., must copy the entries and signature from the certificate at the end of the original form into the duplicate, and must return the original form to the absentee. If he be an Accountant General, he must, moreover, forward the duplicate form to the Local Government for transmission to the Secretary of State, and forward a copy of the certificate at the end of the form to the Accountant General of the absentee's Presidency, with a letter in the form F. appended to this Resolution; but if he be a District Officer, he must forward the duplicate form E. to the Accountant General of his own Presidency, who must send it on to the Local Government for transmission to the Secretary of State, and forward a copy of the certificate at the end of the form to the Accountant General of the absentee's Presidency, with a letter in the form G. appended to this Resolution.

7. In the *third* and *fourth* cases the Accountant General of the absentee's Presidency must furnish him with a certificate in the form A. appended to this Resolution; but in the *fourth* case the tenth space in the form may be left blank.

8. In the *fifth* case the transferred officer should be furnished with a certificate in the form H. appended to this Resolution. If he be employed at the station of the Accountant General of his Presidency, the certificate should be given by that officer. If he have to pass through that station on his way to his new Presidency, the certificate should be given by the District Officer in charge of the Treasury from which he last drew pay, and countersigned by the Accountant General. If he be not employed at, and have not to pass through, the Accountant General's station, the certificate should be given by the District Officer in charge of the Treasury from which he last drew pay, and a duplicate of it should be forwarded by the District Officer to the Accountant General for countersignature, and transmission to the Accountant General of the transferred officer's new Presidency.

9. In the *sixth* case the transferred officer should be furnished with a last pay certificate in form H. by the District Officer in charge of the Treasury from which he last drew pay.

Warrant at the station, re-engagements shall accordingly be so limited; provided always that such limitation shall not extend to men who shall have taken their discharge before the aforesaid dates.

AND WHEREAS by Our Royal Warrant of 29th June 1867, an addition of 1*l.* a-day was made to the pay of re-engaged men, We now deem it expedient that the following issues and payments heretofore granted to soldiers at the time of re-engagement, that is to say,—

The free kit, or commutation in lieu thereof;

The twenty days' marching money;

The payment of compensation in lieu of clothing from first April to date of re-engagement, if such re-engagement should take place before first July;

And the payment of 2*l.* for the provision of winter clothing in North America; shall cease and determine on the thirty-first of March next.

OUR WILL AND PLEASURE therefore is that Articles 451 and 454 of Our said Warrant of third February 1866, and Articles 66, 86 and 103 of Our Revised Royal Clothing Warrant, 1865, shall, on and after the first April next, stand revised as follows:—

Revised Articles 451 and 454 of Royal Warrant of 3rd February 1866.

451.—A soldier enlisted under the Army Service Act, 1847, or the Army Enlistment Act, 1867, who while serving shall renew his engagement for a further term, will be entitled, on such re-engagement, to the regulated rate of bounty in force at the time; the sum of 1*s.* shall also, if demanded, be payable to the clerk of the magistrate before whom the declaration on re-engagement is made by the soldier; but rewards shall not in such cases be admissible. Such soldiers shall receive, in addition to bounty, a gratuity of 1*s.*, and a furlough for two months, or a pecuniary allowance in lieu thereof (Articles 564 and 565 as amended by Our Royal Warrant of the 9th August 1867).

454.—A soldier, under the age of 31, and of good character, discharged in the United Kingdom before the first April 1869, or abroad within thirty-one days of the receipt of Our Royal Warrant of 27th February 1869, after the completion of his first term of limited engagement, may, upon production of his parchment certificate of discharge, be permitted to re-engage for any corps of the same arm of the service as that from which he shall have been discharged; and if he re-engage within twelve months from the date of his discharge, he shall be permitted to reckon his former service, on application being made by his Commanding Officer on his behalf to Our Secretary of State for War (Article 472). Such soldier shall receive the free kit of a private, or an allowance in lieu thereof; but no bounty, and no levy money, except as specified in Article 446, shall be payable in such cases. Soldiers of the Canadian Rifles shall be allowed to reckon their former service irrespective of the interval which may have elapsed since their discharge.

Revised Articles of Revised Royal Clothing Warrant, 1865.

86.—A corporal or private, when promoted to be serjeant after the yearly issue of clothing, shall,

when practicable, receive the clothing of his predecessor; if not practicable, and the promotion takes place before first October, he shall receive the new clothing of his rank, if it can be supplied, and return the old into store. If promoted on or after the first October, he shall retain his clothing, and receive the difference in money between serjeant's and rank and file clothing, at the regulated rates, from the date of his promotion to the 31st March following. He shall, however, be entitled to the extra serjeant's chevrons at the public expense.

If appointed drummer, the same rule shall be observed, but no compensation granted.

When a serjeant is reduced to the ranks, an exchange of clothing shall be effected with his successor, if possible, or part-worn clothing issued to him. If no part-worn clothing is available, he shall be treated as a recruit, returning his former clothing into store. If the clothing so returned be not in a serviceable state, after allowing for fair wear and tear, the soldier shall be charged for the unnecessary damage.

Men whose period of service will expire or who have given notice that they intend to purchase their discharge during the first quarter of the year, namely, from the first of April to the thirtieth of June, shall not be supplied with clothing. Men who do not re-engage for a second period of service, shall, on taking their discharge, be paid compensation up to that date.

Men brought forward for discharge between first July and thirty-first December, shall be allowed to take with them from their regiment or depot,—

One part-worn tunic.

One part-worn pair cloth trowsers or trews.

One pair boots or shoes (Royal Engineers two pairs, if after thirtieth September).

These articles shall have been three months at least in wear.

Men discharged after thirty-first December shall be allowed to take with them such clothing as would have become their property on the following first of April, except the regimental head dress, which must be returned into store, and for which no compensation will be allowed.

Men re-engaging for a second period of service, between first April and thirtieth June, shall be supplied, on re-engagement, with such articles of clothing as they would have been entitled to receive on the first April preceding, unless they shall have already received the same, and the supply of such articles, together with the boots or shoes which such men may be entitled to receive on first October in the year of re-engagement, shall be a full and sufficient discharge of all claims of the said soldiers on account of clothing for the financial year in which they may be re-engaged.

Men re-engaging between first July and thirty-first March shall continue to wear the clothing issued to them on first April, and shall, as regards clothing, be dealt with in all respects in the same manner as during an ordinary year of service.

86. The complete kit of necessaries granted by Article 441 of Our Royal Warrant of third February 1866, to each man or boy enlisted into Our Army, and finally approved by his Commanding Officer, shall be kept up by the soldier at his own expense.

Soldiers shall, on re-engagement for a second period of service, be required to furnish themselves

with the articles of necessaries required to complete their respective kits.

All articles of necessaries shall be served out in the presence of the Quarter Master or his Sergeant in the place where they are kept in store, and nowhere else; and soldiers must be made to understand that their objection to the articles, if any, must be made before they are taken away from the said stores, or they cannot be attended to.

103.—The allowance for the provision of warm clothing shall be drawn only once for each soldier, and shall be charged in the pay list, supported by a certificate signed by the Commanding Officer, stating that the sum has been expended in the supply of the articles above-named, and that no man have been included except those who, to the best of his belief, have not received the allowance previously since their arrival in the country. Volunteers, or men transferred from other regiments who have already received the allowance, will not be entitled to it again, but must bring their winter equipment with them.

Men re-engaging in Our North American Colonies, who have received the aforesaid allowance, shall not be entitled, on re-engagement, to a second issue of warm clothing, nor to any allowance for the provision thereof. They shall be required to complete, at their own expense, the winter equipment detailed in the foregoing Article (102).

Men re-enlisting will, however, be entitled to the allowance on the first October following their re-enlistment.

Commanding Officers shall further be allowed to draw 7s. 6d. for each soldier (excepting men re-enlisting), present and effective in their regiments on the first October of each subsequent year, to defray the expense of renewals or repairs of the above-named winter equipment.

Read the following Resolution by the Government of India in the Financial Department, No. 1772, dated 31st March 1869:—

RESOLUTION.—Now that the arrangements have been made for carrying out the Financial Budget for 1869-70, and that specific orders regarding the allotments for each head of service have been issued to each Local Government and Administration, and to each Imperial Department, the Government of India desires to impress on all concerned, in general terms, the importance of strictly restraining all expenditure within the limits of the Budget allotments.

It will have been apparent to all executive authorities that the Government of India is determined to have at least an equilibrium between income and ordinary expenditure; that this equilibrium has been obtained in the present Budget with some difficulty, and only with the aid of an Income Tax. It will hence be further manifest that the equilibrium can only be preserved by means of the restriction of expenditure according to the limitation laid down. If the allotments shall be at all exceeded, the consequent inconvenience will be grave indeed. The Government of India will of course do all in its power to prevent any such excess occurring, but it confidently relies on the zealous exertions of all executive authorities for the same end. It believes that such reliance cannot be misplaced, remembering the comparatively close correspondence during the present year and the past year between the amounts budgetted for, and the amounts ultimately audited and adjusted for all Civil and Military Departments. The attention bestowed on this important matter should not only be sustained, but if possible increased. Whatever degree of discretion may be properly left to the local authorities in respect to details, there should be the most complete understanding that the totals of the Budget allotments must not on any account be exceeded. On the

contrary, there should rather be savings under each Budget head by the rigid enforcement of economy. For all this the departmental or other authorities are really responsible. The Departments of Audit and Account will do their best to check irregularity of expenditure, but real economy and substantive check must mainly depend on the efforts of those who are in administrative charge.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council, in circulating to the Public Works Department the foregoing Resolution, desires to direct the earnest attention of all Officers concerned to the absolute necessity of keeping the expenditure strictly within the limit of the Budget grant; and at the same time to point out that the main divisions of the grant being virtually separate grants, excess over one cannot be compensated by a saving on the other.

2. It will be the special duty of the Controllers of Public Works Accounts to watch the expenditure of the year, and to bring to the notice of the Accountant General of the Department any deviations from the established practice in the allotment of funds to works in excess of the grants.

3. The Governor General in Council further deems it necessary to add that, in case of any excess outlay on Public Works taking place in any year without the special sanction of the Government of India, such excess will be viewed by His Excellency in Council as evincing a direct and wilful disregard of the distinct orders of the Supreme Government; and this Government will in every such case consider the propriety of making a retrenchment equal to the amount of the excess expenditure from the grant of the succeeding year in which the excess may be brought to light.

ORDER.—Ordered, that this Resolution be communicated to all Local Governments and Administrations, and to the Accountant General, Department Public Works, for information and guidance.

TELEGRAPH DEPARTMENT.

NOTIFICATIONS.

Calcutta, the 22nd December 1868.

From the 1st of February 1869, all messages received into a Telegraph Office for despatch, must be stamped to the full value for all demands.

Introduction of Stamps from 1st February 1869.

2. Telegraph Stamps will be procurable at all Telegraph Stations in any quantities, and at Civil Treasuries in quantities of the value of not less than Rs. 5 of labels at one time, provided that the quantity sold shall not include less than one Rupee worth of any particular value of Stamps.

Stamps procurable at Telegraph Offices and Civil Treasuries.

3. Telegrams can be sent from out-stations by post, but they must be enclosed in registered covers. At stations where Telegraph Stamps are not procurable, they may be paid for by Postage Stamps at the rate of 17 annas to the Rupee. In such cases, the Post Office registration receipt will take the place of the ordinary Telegraph receipt. If any telegram be received insufficiently stamped, it will be returned bearing to the sender.

Telegrams for transmission from Non-Telegraph Stations, where Telegraph Stamps are not available, may be paid for in Postage Stamps.

4. Telegraph Stamps are double headed, the object being that the upper half shall be returned on the receipt (whereby the sender receives a guarantee that his message has not been suppressed for the sake of the money), and the lower half shall be affixed to the message as voucher to Government that it has been prepaid.

The form of Stamp provides a guarantee to the sender and to the Government.

5. Proper forms on which to write telegrams are available at all Telegraph Stations gratis for messages written at the Office, or for sale at the following rates:—

These forms will also shortly be obtainable at the same rates at all Treasuries.

6. The senders of Telegrams must be careful to affix their Stamps on the spaces left blank for the purpose on the message forms,—the upper half on the receipt, the lower half on the message,—and to see that the Stamps are defaced with the Office Stamp which carries the name of the Office and date.

Stamps to be properly affixed to the forms,—upper half on the receipt, lower half on the message.

7. Telegraph Stamps cut in two, before being sent into a Telegraph Office, will not be accepted.

8. For rates of charge, see Notification on revised Tariff of the 20th September 1868.

9. Skeleton Maps of India showing the Telegraph Lines and Stations are procurable at most Telegraph Offices at eight annas each.

THE Ceylon charge on a message of 20 words to or from India will, in future, be one Rupee. Thus, a message of 10 words between any station in Ceylon and any station in India (except those east of Calcutta), will be two Rupees, a message of 20 words will be three Rupees, a message of 30 words will be five Rupees, and so on.

A charge of one Rupee in addition to the above will be made for a message of 20 words to or from any station east of Calcutta.

The above cancels paragraph 9 of the Telegraph Notification dated Simla, the 20th September 1868, published in the *Gazette of India* of the 20th idem.

THE following alterations in the Rules respecting the cost of transmission of telegrams by Post, have received the sanction of the Government of India:—

From the 1st of May 1869, the uniform rate of one Rupee for ten words will include the postage on telegrams which are forwarded by inland Post to their destination.

The postage on a message sent from a Non-Telegraph Station to a Telegraph Office for transmission, must, as heretofore, be prepaid by the sender.

Compulsory postal registration is abolished, but the sender of a telegram to be delivered by Post can secure its registration, if desired, by affixing to his message a four-anna Telegraph Stamp in addition to the usual Telegraph charge.

To—The Head Commissioner of Paper Currency.)

In reply to your letters Nos. 337 and 308, dated respectively the 12th September and 7th October 1868, submitting rules for the payment of damaged and lost currency notes, I am directed to observe that it is impossible to lay down any fixed rules as to the conditions under which payment can be refused for a mutilated currency note. It is always a question of the degree and kind of mutilation.

2. The Governor General in Council is of opinion that, so far as the public are concerned, it is decidedly the best plan to prescribe no fixed rules, but simply to declare that, when any doubt arises as to the payment of any note, it will be considered especially by the Head Commissioner of Paper Currency, who will exercise his own discretion whether to pay or not to pay, and will prescribe the conditions of payment, availing himself of legal advice whenever necessary.

3. His Excellency in Council, however, desires you to make provision for the guidance of your subordinates at out-stations, by drawing up instructions to be approved by Government, showing, as far as possible, under what circumstances Government is legally bound to pay a note. The currency officers should pay notes under no other circumstances, without your special orders.

4. As regards lost notes, His Excellency in Council is of opinion that Government should not pledge themselves, by any rules, to pay them. Whenever a case occurs in which you think that

the notes should be paid, you should submit the circumstances and your proposals for the orders of the Government of India in this Department.

5. The present plan by which the Paper Currency Department takes upon itself a great deal of trouble in circulating lists of stopped notes is, it appears, not only unnecessary, but practically useless. Persons who lose notes should be left to advertise them in such manner as they think best, and should themselves give information at such offices as they think proper.

6. The term "stopped note" is inaccurate and misleading. Payment of such notes cannot be refused, unless there be good reason for supposing that the presenter is not a *bona fide* holder.

7. The system which has hitherto been in force was, no doubt, devised for the benefit of losers of notes; but in practice it is found to increase the distrust of notes. Natives of this country dislike taking currency notes, if they know that it is possible for them to be put to trouble and detention, should the note happen to be, what is called, a "stopped note."

8. The Governor General in Council observes that the real aim of Government is to make currency notes approach, as much as possible, to the status of coin. If a man loses a currency note, he must ordinarily take his chance of recovering it, precisely in the same way as a lost coin. If Government attempts to put currency notes on a better footing than coins, by restrictions on their payment, it may be found that they really put them in a worse, by giving further grounds for the natives of this country to dislike taking them.

ORDERED, that the above be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information, with the remark that the rules therein laid down are in supersession of all existing rules on the subject.

If an Officer, while on furlough, be transferred to another appointment, he will still continue to draw the furlough pay as before, whatever the

salary of the new appointment may be, but the Officer acting in the latter will be restricted to half staff salary.

If, during his absence on furlough, an Officer's appointment be abolished, he will forfeit his claim to half staff salary, and will revert to the furlough pay of his Military rank, regard being had to any circumstances deserving special consideration.

That,

The following will *not* form part of the aggregate of eight years' furlough, with pay and retention of appointment, to which an Officer who may elect the Furlough Rules of 1868 is restricted by Rule XVI:—

- I.—All leave taken as local leave (not being furlough) in India;
- II.—All leave necessitated by wounds received in action, or by sickness contracted on field service, which may be allowed to reckon as service for pension under the provisions of G. G. O. No. 1113 of 1857;
- III.—All leave duly granted to England, on extensions of furlough, or leave on medical certificate granted in England *if without* pay;
- IV.—All *sick* leave to England that may have been taken under the Rules of 1796 on the old rates of furlough pay;
- V.—All sick leave granted to the Colonies eastward of the Cape of Good Hope under the Rules of 1796.

But the following *will* form part of the eight years referred to:—

- I.—Furlough with pay on private affairs under whatever Rules it may have been taken;
- II.—Leave to England on medical certificate with pay under the Furlough Rules of 1854.

If the twelve months' leave in India on medical certificate taken under Clause XXVI, be exceeded, the whole leave must be reckoned as furlough, and allowances be adjusted accordingly.

In the case of Military Officers in Civil employ, on consolidated salaries, the acting allowances which have been drawn by such Officers shall not be held to be special or extra allowances, but shall be taken into account as part of the salary on the average of which their furlough allowances are calculated under Rule V.

No. 571 of 1869.—With reference to paragraph 82 of the Regulations for Military Savings Banks which were made applicable to India by G. G. O. No. 1191 of 21st December 1867, and with the object of facilitating the adjustment of the Savings Bank balances of Invalids and men for discharge on arrival in England, the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to direct the following course of procedure:—

I.—On the departure of men for the port of embarkation, two copies of the Bengal Form No. 222, altered according to the annexed form (marked A) will be prepared at the head quarters of regiments and batteries, showing the balance due to the Soldier up to the end of the month *preceding* his departure to join the embarkation depôt. Three extra columns are added to the form No. 222:

two to show the total amount of withdrawals and deposits made at the depôt previous to embarkation;—the third, the total balance due to the Soldier on embarkation, after making allowances for deposits, deducting withdrawals, and adding interest up to the end of the month.

II.—The two copies of the form No. 222, thus altered, will be forwarded by corps direct to the embarkation depôt, by post, immediately after the departure of the men. The extra columns will be filled in as required by Commanding Officers of embarkation depôts, the correctness of the entries being vouched for as indicated in the form. The Officers commanding embarkation depôts will also notify monthly to regiments and batteries all deposits and withdrawals made previous to embarkation, adjusting the same in the usual manner.

III.—On the embarkation of the drafts, two general returns in form B (annexed) will be prepared at the embarkation depôts (one for the Invalids, and one for men in health in each transport or troop-ship) and handed over, with the other documents, to the Officer proceeding home in charge of the drafts.

IV.—On arrival in England, the Officer in charge will at once forward the general returns to the War Office, by which Department the final orders for the payment of the balances will be issued.

V.—On the final embarkation of the different drafts, the Officers commanding the embarkation depôts will forward to regiments and batteries one copy of the modified form No. 222, duly filled in as directed in Clause II, reporting at the same time the date of embarkation. The other copy of the form will be retained at the depôt for office record.

VI.—On receipt back of the modified form No. 222, Commanding Officers of regiments and batteries will proceed as directed in paragraph 82 of the Rules for Savings Banks, being guided by the information received from the embarkation depôts.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

Notice to Mariners.

Change in Cape Recife Light to warn Ships of too near an approach to the Roman Rock in Algoa Bay.

On and after the 1st December 1868, a ray of Red Light will be shown from the Cape Recife Light House, between a N. 39° E. bearing and the shore northwards from the Light House.

Bearings and Magnetic Directions.

Vessels bound for Algoa Bay, after passing Cape Recife, should not open the Red Light at the Cape until the Harbour Light upon the Hill is seen (which will first show red on a N. W. bearing, and lead nine-tenths of a mile eastward of the Roman, where a course for the anchorage may be shaped with safety). As the Hill Light cannot be seen from the Roman Rock, a ship is in safety so long as the Light can be seen, but as its southern extreme of visibility leads only two cables north of the Rock, it is recommended that a course for the anchorage should not be shaped until the region of the Red Light is passed, and the Hill Light shows white on a N. W. by W. bearing.

In beating in or out of the anchorage, the opening of the Red Light at either of the Light Houses will be a signal for vessels to tack when near the vicinity of the Roman Rock.

From the 1st of February 1869, all messages received into a Telegraph Office for despatch, must be stamped to the full value for all demands.

Introduction of Stamps from 1st February 1869.

2. Telegraph Stamps will be procurable at all Telegraph Stations in any quantities, and at Civil Treasuries in quantities of the value of not less than Rs. 5 of labels at one time, provided that the quantity sold shall not include less than one Rupee worth of any particular value of Stamps.

Stamps procurable at Telegraph Offices and Civil Treasuries.

3. Telegrams can be sent from out-stations by post, but they must be enclosed in registered covers. At stations where Telegraph Stamps are not procurable, they may be paid for by Postage Stamps at the rate of 17 annas to the Rupee. In such cases, the Post Office registration receipt will take the place of the ordinary Telegraph receipt. If any telegram be received insufficiently stamped, it will be returned bearing to the sender.

Telegrams for transmission from Non-Telegraph Stations, where Telegraph Stamps are not available, may be paid for in Postage Stamps.

4. Telegraph Stamps are double headed, the object being that the upper half shall be returned on the receipt (whereby the sender receives a guarantee that his message has not been suppressed for the sake of the money), and the lower half shall be affixed to the message as voucher to Government that it has been prepaid.

The form of Stamp provides a guarantee to the sender and to the Government.

5. Proper forms on which to write telegrams are available at all Telegraph Stations gratis for messages written at the Office, or for sale at the following rates:—

These forms will also shortly be obtainable at the same rates at all Treasuries.

6. The senders of Telegrams must be careful to affix their Stamps in the spaces left blank for the purpose on the message forms,—the upper half on the receipt, lower half on the message,—and to see that the Stamps are defaced with the Office Stamp which carries the name of the Office and date.

7. Telegraph Stamps cut in two, before being sent into a Telegraph Office, will not be accepted.

8. For rates of charge, see Notification on revised Tariff of the 20th September 1868.

9. Skeleton Maps of India showing the Telegraph Lines and Stations are procurable at most Telegraph Offices at eight annas each.

The Ceylon charge on a message of 20 words to or from India will, in future, be one Rupee. Thus, a message of 10 words between any station in Ceylon and any station in India (except those east of Calcutta), will be two Rupees, a message of 20 words will be three Rupees, a message of 30 words will be five Rupees, and so on.

A charge of one Rupee in addition to the above will be made for a message of 20 words to or from any station east of Calcutta.

The following extract from a letter received from Her Majesty's Post Master General (dated the 13th February 1869) is published for general information, *viz.* :—

"Referring to your letter of the 7th of October last, I beg leave to state that the Sample Post to and from India was undoubtedly intended, in the first instance, for *bond fide* samples only. In the working of the Sample Post, great difficulty was experienced in deciding whether the contents of packets, which had been posted as Sample Packets, were really intended as samples or as consignments of goods, especially as it would seem that, in regard to India, many articles really intended as samples are inevitably of a somewhat bulky nature, so that it was ultimately considered expedient, upon the whole, to discontinue the practice of challenging packets of samples to or from India on the ground of their contents probably not being strictly samples, and to permit any such packets to pass if they were found not to exceed five pounds in weight, and not to contain any articles which would be likely to injure the contents of the Mail bags or the persons of the Officers of the Department."

The following Rules for the importation and transportation of arms and ammunition in the Lower Provinces of the Bengal Presidency, have been approved by His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General in Council, and are hereby published for general information:—

Rules for the importation and transport of arms and ammunition of the descriptions mentioned in Sections 5, 6 and 25 of Act XXXI. of 1860, into or through the territories under the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal.

I. Under the provisions of Sections 17 and 22 of Act XXXI. of 1860, the importation or transport of all arms and ammunition of the descriptions mentioned in Sections 5, 6 and 25 of the aforesaid Act is prohibited, unless covered by a license or pass.

II. Persons desirous of importing arms and ammunition into any district in the Lower Provinces of Bengal shall apply for a license to the Commissioner of the Division* in which the arms and ammunition are to be exposed for sale, kept, or made use of. The application must be in writing, and must contain full information on the following points:—

- 1st.—Purpose for which required.
- 2nd.—Probable cost of each weapon.
- 3rd.—Port at which the goods will be imported.
- 4th.—District in which the arms and ammunition are to be used, kept, or sold.

III. Commissioners, on receipt of applications in the prescribed form, are authorized to grant licenses according to Form A., at their discretion, arms and for the importation, in reasonable quantities, of ammunition.

IV. Licenses for the importation of fire-arms are not to be granted, except the Commissioner to whom the application is made is satisfied that the weapons are required for *bonâ fide* sporting purposes.

V. The Commissioners should not grant licenses for the importation of fire-arms in large quantities without reference, through the regular official channel, to the Government of Bengal.

VI. A copy of all licenses must be forwarded to the Chief Police Officer at the Port at which the goods are to be landed. If the license authorizes the importation of any considerable quantity of fire-arms, a copy of the orders of Government sanctioning the importation must also be sent.

VII. The Collector of Customs is not to deliver any arms or ammunition unless protected by a pass from the Chief Police Officer at the Port where the goods have been landed.

VIII. The Collector of Customs shall be responsible for seeing that the arms imported answer to the description given in pass; and in case of doubt, shall detain the arms and refer the point for the orders of Government.

IX. The consignee, on arrival of the arms and ammunition, must produce his license to the Chief Police Officer of the Port, upon which he is to receive from the said Officer a pass in Form B. for the delivery of such arms and ammunition as may be mentioned in the license.

X. If the arms and ammunition are to be removed from the Port, the Police Officer, at the time of granting the pass for delivery from the Custom House, must grant a pass in Form C. for the transport of the said goods to the place to

which the importation is sanctioned in the license, and will forward a copy of the said pass to the Magistrate of the district from whence the license was issued.

XI. The arms and ammunition must be taken direct from the Port to the place entered in the pass, and they are not to be sold or made use of at any intermediate place.

XII. Any person desirous of transporting any arms or ammunition of the descriptions marginally noted into any portion of the territories under the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, or from one district or town in the said territories to another district or town, must apply for

Fire-arms, bayonets, swords, daggers, spears, spearheads of lead, sulphur, saltpetre, gunpowder, or other ammunition.

a pass to the Commissioner of the Division, specifying the district or town into which he proposes to transport the goods. The application must be made in writing, and must contain full information as to the quantity and description of all the goods.

XIII. The Commissioner, on receipt of an application under the preceding rule, may grant a pass according to Form C., and subject to the conditions and restrictions laid down in Rule X.

XIV. When arms or ammunition are brought into a district, protected by a pass issued in accordance with the preceding Rules, the person in charge of the goods must immediately, on arrival, deliver the pass to the Magistrate in charge of the district or town, whose duty it will be to ascertain that the arms and ammunition correspond with the entries in the pass, or that any excess, deficiency, or discrepancy is satisfactorily explained.

XV. Any person transporting arms in violation of the preceding Rules will on conviction be liable to the penalties prescribed by Section 23 of Act XXXI. of 1860.

XVI. The following fees are to be charged for the issue of licenses and passes under the foregoing Rules:—

XVII. The foregoing Rules do not apply to arms and ammunition imported or transported by any person, in small quantities, for his own private use; but a license or pass may be granted for such arms and ammunition, at the discretion of the officer to whom the application is preferred.

Rules for granting Licenses to carry Arms under Section 28 of Act XXXI. of 1860.

I. In any district or place which has been brought within the provisions of Section 32 of Act XXXI. of 1860, it is not lawful for any person to be in possession of any arms or ammunition without a license.

II. In districts and places not brought under the provisions of Section 32 of the aforesaid Act, persons are not absolutely prohibited from carrying arms without a license; but any person not being exempted under the provisions of Section 27 of the said Act, so doing, is liable to be disarmed by any Magistrate or Police Officer under Section 26 of said Act, if in the judgment of such Magistrate or Police Officer it is dangerous to the public peace to allow such person to go armed, or to carry arms. And Magistrates and Police Officers are to be guided in regard to the enforcement of this section by the orders of Government, No. 4500, dated 17th August 1868.

III. Any person who has not been exempted as above, who is desirous of obtaining a license to carry arms, shall make an application in writing to the Magistrate in charge of the district or town in which he is at the time residing. The application must, under Clause 10, Schedule B. of Act XXVI., bear an 8 annas stamp.

The application must contain the following particulars:—

- 1st.—Name and address of applicant.
- 2nd.—Period for which the license is required.
- 3rd.—For what purpose the arms are required, and the places where applicant proposes to reside during the ensuing year.

4th.—Description of arms for which a license is sought.

5th.—Whether the arms are to be carried only by the applicant, or by his followers; if the latter, the number and description of arms to be carried by each follower.

IV. The Magistrate in charge of a district or town may issue licenses in Forms D. and E. for carrying arms, provided that no license be granted for a longer period than one year. The following information must be clearly stated in the body of the license:—

- 1st.—The districts, towns, or places in which the license is to have operation.
- 2nd.—Name and residence of the person in whose favor it is granted.
- 3rd.—Whether the operation of the license is limited to the person in whose favor it is granted, or whether it extends to any of his followers; in the latter case, the number of the followers of such person licensed to carry arms, and the number and description of arms to be carried by each, must be specified.

V. If the license authorizes the grantee to travel armed through a district which has been disarmed under the provisions of Section 32 of Act XXXI. of 1860, the countersignature of the Magistrate of the district or place from which the license is issued will be required under Clause 61 of aforesaid section.

VI. All Officers authorized under these Rules to grant licenses must keep up a careful Register of all licenses issued by them, as also a list of districts, towns, or places disarmed under the provisions of Section 32 of Act XXXI. of 1860.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 1226, dated the 30th March 1869, and in reply to state that the Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the following addition to the Rules contained in the letter No. 3429, addressed to you from this Department on the 8th December 1868 :—

Third.—When an officer who is temporarily promoted from a lower to a higher acting appointment is relieved of the higher, and within the time allowed by the Rules rejoins the lower acting appointment from which he was promoted, or joins any other acting appointment of not inferior emolument, his allowances from the date of his being so relieved to the date of his so joining, shall be passed at the rate at which he was drawing in the officiating appointment from which he was taken to officiate in the higher appointment.

From the 1st of February 1869, all messages received into a Telegraph Office for despatch, must be stamped to the full value for all demands.

2. Telegraph Stamps will be procurable at all Telegraph Stations in any quantities, and at Civil Treasuries in quantities of the value of not less than Rs. 5 of labels at one time, provided that the quantity sold shall not include less than one Rupee worth of any particular value of Stamps.

3. Telegrams can be sent from out-stations by post, but they must be enclosed in registered covers. At stations where Telegraph Stamps are not procurable, they may be paid for by Postage Stamps at the rate of 17 annas to the Rupee. In such cases, the Post Office registration receipt will take the place of the ordinary Telegraph receipt. If any telegram be received insufficiently stamped, it will be returned bearing to the sender.

4. Telegraph Stamps are double headed, the object being that the upper half shall be returned on the receipt (whereby the sender receives a guarantee that his message has not been suppressed for the sake of the money), and the lower half shall be affixed to the message as voucher to Government that it has been prepaid.

5. Proper forms on which to write telegrams are available at all Telegraph Stations gratis for messages written at the Office, or for sale at the following rates:—

6. The senders of Telegrams must be careful to affix their Stamps on the spaces left blank for the purpose on the message forms,—the upper half on the receipt, the lower half on the message,—and to see that the Stamps are defaced with the Office Stamp which carries the name of the Office and date.

7. Telegraph Stamps cut in two, before being sent into a Telegraph Office, will not be accepted.

8. For rates of charge, see Notification on revised Tariff of the 20th September 1868.

9. Skeleton Maps of India showing the Telegraph Lines and Stations are procurable at most Telegraph Offices at eight annas each.

THE Ceylon charge on a message of 20 words to or from India will, in future, be one Rupee. Thus, a message of 10 words between any station in Ceylon and any station in India (except those east of Calcutta), will be two Rupees, a message of 20 words will be three Rupees, a message of 30 words will be five Rupees, and so on.
