

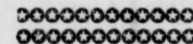

COMMENT THAT'S ALL
 Disregard for Laws Officers Underpaid Nationalize Detectives Switching Officers About

 COMMENDATION when commendation is due seems fitting in the example the Los Angeles county board of supervisors has set by appointing thirty-five additional deputy sheriffs in order that the work of apprehending criminals and curbing crime in the county may be brought to a higher state of efficiency.
 In the same news report it contained the information that county and city authorities will be able to better correlate their efforts in this work with the Crime Commission acting as an intermediary. Certainly this action is necessary if peace is to be maintained.
 The murder of Earle Remington in the parkway of his home, a series of hold robberies entailing total loss of several hundred thousand dollars, the insidiousness of both bootleg and dope ring activities—all lead to the conclusion there is something basically wrong, however, in the present system of curbing criminal tendencies.
 It is noted that a campaign now well under way would make the contravention of law and order more difficult, but mere legislation means nothing to a pack of criminal lawyers. The real crux of the matter lies with the people.
 In the first place, the tendency nowadays is to disregard the law, to challenge authority and deliberately attempt to violate even that which the constitution provides.
 The Los Angeles Times submits that assemblymen and senators in the state legislature who refuse to live up to their oath of office in the matter of reapportionment are equally as responsible as the business man who convinces to beat the income tax or the "moonshiner" or the highwayman or the salesman of adulterated or worthless goods.
 For all of this someone pays dearly, yet it is the history of the human race that it loves "to pay the price." While many a seemingly intelligent man will pay \$10 a quart for bootleg whiskey, he would object to a detective getting \$10 a day for tracing the manufacturer of death-dealing booze. That is where inconsistency begins.
 Study of the crime situation, which is in no way a credit to American business acumen, reveals several striking discrepancies, which are:
 First—Underpaid law enforcement officers, which is neither an incentive for a mentally alert person to seek the job nor stay with it after obtaining employment.
 Second—The utter disrespect and disregard for authority, principally due to the American's inherent self-assertiveness of "personal liberty" and the pervasive attitude which has grown from the efforts of incompetent persons to enforce laws.
 Third—Morbidity begets morbidity and many a young man who "goes through the mill" of jailhouse jargon and police palaver and criminal association finally arrives at the conclusion "it pays to be crooked" and falls by the wayside.
 The writer could name detectives who have asked to be relieved from pawnshop detail to go back on a sequestered patrol beat where they could admire the homes, see the children playing and hold back the lines of parade.
 Others have taken midnight shifts to get away from the politics of the department and more have joined private investigating agencies where merit is more quickly rewarded.
 It is the writer's firm belief that all detective work should be nationalized and frequent transfers be made for the benefit of all concerned. At the same time, the wage scale should be standardized and not less than \$10 a day be paid regular detectives. Again, it would be wise to annually increase the pay and give liberal vacations.
 Operatives, as sleuths are commonly called, are worth \$25 every working day to the public if there is work for them to be done. By nationalizing their services it would be possible to keep them busy and broaden the scope of their work.
 At the present time the most serious handicap of western police departments is that their men do not know eastern crooks. Likewise, the east does not know the "bad men" of the west.

 Always supporting any measure looking toward civic or moral betterment, thoroughly enthused over the development of Rockford, yet not in any sense of the word a "glad-hander," he was a sincere builder and one of the breed of men to whom the people owe the new vision of beauty and achievement rising up on the American prairie.
 Such was the esteem in which he was held by his townspeople, that when finally, sixteen years ago, he concluded to spend the remaining years of his life in southern California, his departure was celebrated with a great banquet at the Masonic temple, where he was a member of the lodge and of the Eastern Star. Following this mass testimonial of esteem, Mr. Potter was presented with a diamond stick-pin by the merchants of Rockford—a souvenir he never ceased to cherish, through all the remaining years.

 John Nodolin, of Easton, fireman of engine No. 11,147, which was being towed by the freight.
 Joseph Fox, fireman on the mail train.
 Kasper was not instantly killed but died while he was being taken to a local hospital.
