

DRACÆNA.

The four species we offer are all of practical value for decorating vases, baskets, etc., and are heartily recommended.


PELTANDRA Virginica. This plant resembles the well-known Calla, both in flower


CLERODENDRON.

ACHRAS SAPOTA.


