### SENSATIONAL STORIES ARE CONTRADICTED

#### HIS MAJESTY'S HEALTH RAPIDLY IMPROVING

**Authoritative Statements Published in London Medical Journals—No Trace of Malignant Disease.**

(Associated Press.)  
 London, July 10.—The bulletin at Buckingham Palace posted at 10 o'clock this morning says:  
 "The King's condition continues to be satisfactory."  
 An authoritative statement regarding the health of King Edward was published in to-day's issue of the British Medical Journal. It says: "In view of the fact that sinister stories continue to be manufactured and printed, it may be again stated as emphatically as possible that during the operation no trace of malignant disease was observed, that no suspicion of any kind has arisen since, and that the medical attendants are quite satisfied that His Majesty's constitution is thoroughly sound."  
 The British Medical Journal adds: "The progress of the last week has been everything that could be desired. The wound, though still deep, is granulating well. During the last ten days the improvement in His Majesty's general health has been remarkably rapid. The King has regained his strength almost completely, and is able to take restricted diet with a good appetite."  
 The Lancet also stigmatizes as "lies" the sensational rumors circulated, and says: "There is not and never has been the faintest shadow or ghost of a suspicion of any malignant disease."  
 The Lancet specifically asserts that the King is free from cancer.

#### THE CORONATION

London, July 10.—It is said on good authority that, subject to the approval of King Edward's physicians, the coronation will take place on August 9th.

#### CANNERS' ULTIMATUM

Their Final Offer is a Slight Increase on the Former Sliding Scale Proposal.

(Special to the Times.)  
 Vancouver, July 10.—The canners posted to-day a set of prices for the season, being their ultimatum in reply to fishermen, and the latter can accept it or not as they like. It is a slight increase on their former sliding scale proposal, the lowest price being ten and a half cents per fish if the pack is over six hundred thousand cases, and up to twenty cents per fish if the pack is only two hundred thousand. Quite a number of boats were out last night, the highest catch being two hundred at Westminster, and forty-five at Ladner.

#### LABOR DAY CELEBRATION

Nanaimo Unions Will Be Asked to Subscribed to Meet Expenses.

(Special to the Times.)  
 Nanaimo, July 10.—The trades and labor council at its meeting last evening, during the discussion of the report of the committee having in hand the arrangements for the Labor Day celebration, decided to request each union with the fact that money was required. The various unions will be asked to contribute to the funds necessary to provide for a fitting celebration. The union men in the city expect to provide all the necessary funds without asking the merchants and other citizens to contribute.

#### TERMS REJECTED

Chicago Freight Handlers Refuse Offer Made by Railroads and Vote to Continue Strike.

(Associated Press.)  
 Chicago, July 10.—A large percentage of the striking freight handlers voted today to refuse the terms presented by the railroads last night and to continue the strike, despite the official refusal of the Chicago organization of labor to help them. A thousand members attended the meeting. The strikers decided to fight to the last, without seeking co-operation or support.

#### MUST OBEY LAW

French Institutions Which Have Not Complied With Law Will Be Closed.

(Associated Press.)  
 Paris, July 10.—The premier, M. Combes, has instructed the prefects of all the departments to notify the religious orders who have not complied with the law of associations, that unless they are dissolved within a week their establishments will be forcibly closed. Two thousand establishments are involved.

#### MINERS ENTOMBED

Explosion in Pennsylvania Mine—Over One Hundred Men Reported to Have Been Killed.

(Associated Press.)  
 Pittsburgh, Pa., July 10.—It is reported that an explosion occurred in Cambria Coal Company's mine near Johnston, Pa., this afternoon. Six hundred men are entombed. They are about two miles from the opening of the pit. Three men escaped and report seeing many dead. One report says 100 to 250 are dead.

#### CHINESE AFFAIRS

Troubles in Chi Li Have Delayed Surrender of Administration of Tientsin to Officials.

(Associated Press.)  
 Paris, July 10.—The foreign office has received the following from Peking, dated July 9th:  
 "The surrender of the administration of Tientsin to the Chinese is expected very shortly. France has been for several months in favor of this measure, which has been delayed solely by the disturbance in Chi Li province."

#### CASUALTIES AMONG BOERS DURING WAR

Nearly Four Thousand Killed or Died of Wounds—Basuto Chief Charged With High Treason.

(Associated Press.)  
 Pretoria, July 10.—According to an estimate of the Red Cross identity depot, which fulfilled the function of a casualty bureau for the Boer forces, their total losses during the war were 3,700 men killed or died of wounds, 32,000 made prisoners of war, of whom 700 died. The Boer forces in the field numbered about 75,000.

#### WORK OF INCENDIARY

Gagged Woman, Robbed House, and Then Set It On Fire.

Whitcomb, July 9.—At 11 o'clock this morning a masked man entered the house of a family at Ferndale, this county, whose name has not been learned, bound and gagged the wife, robbed the house of all money in it, and then set the house on fire, locked the doors and made his escape.

#### SAD FATALITY

Mass of Copying From Church, Killing One Person and Injuring Several Others.

(Associated Press.)  
 London, July 10.—Shortly after Queen Alexandra passed on her way to open the coronation bazaar, the decorations across Langham Place, heavy and sodden with rain, were caught in a squall of wind and fell, dragging down a mass of copying from the top of All Soul's church. Miss Strathly, believed to be a Canadian, was killed, and several persons were injured.

#### CHESS BY LETTER

Four Moves Made in Game Which Will Last Five Years.

Canton, O., July 9.—S. Kayser, an employee of a local steel roofing plant of this city, and R. Bloch, of Warsaw, Russia, have made four moves in a chess game which is expected to last five years. The game is being played by letter and it requires about fourteen days for a letter to pass between Canton and Warsaw. The men are playing for a prize of \$5,000 offered by Charles Rosebloom, who is related to both of them.

#### THROUGH PUMICE STONE

San Francisco, July 10.—The schooner Pearl has arrived from Sitka, Alaska, and her crew reports that when about 400 miles northeast of Alaska the vessel sailed through a quantity of pumice stone floating on the surface of the ocean. The stone was encountered on June 26th, and for nearly 90 miles the vessel sailed through it in almost a straight course.

#### RIVERS STILL RISING

Des Moines, Ia., July 10.—The flood situation is at a most alarming stage today. The Des Moines river was 21 feet above low water mark at 7 o'clock and is still rising fast. The Racoon river, which empties into the Des Moines here, is also still going up. The flood is at the highest point since 1851, when the river was six feet deep over what is now occupied by thousands of residences, business houses and factories.

### THREE TORONTO FIREMEN KILLED

DURING BLAZE WHICH DESTROYED FLOUR MILL

Close Watch Is Being Kept on the Condemned Murderer Rice—Fatal Shooting Accident.

(Associated Press.)  
 Toronto, July 10.—McIntosh & McCann's flour mill, 1133 Front street, east, was destroyed by fire this morning. Three firemen were killed and several others injured.

#### READY FOR BATTLE

President of Venezuela With Army Which Is Now Facing the Enemy.

 Washington, July 10.—The state department has received a cablegram from Minister Bowen at Caracas to-day saying: "The President has arrived at Barcelona to attack enemy who are waiting here to be attacked."

Host of Applications Made for These Privileges in Anticipation of the Legalization of Traps.

In the Gazette of July 3rd there appeared a notice by the government to the following effect:  
 "In order to remove a doubt which apparently exists as to the date upon which the orders-in-council providing for the cancellation of the reservation of foreshore and tidal lands, notice of which was published in the British Columbia Gazette on the 10th April, 1902, shall take effect, public notice is therefore hereby given that the said order-in-council takes effect from and after midnight of the 9th July, 1902. This notice is not intended as an intimation that applications for foreshore or tidal lands will be acted upon or dealt with at present."

### THE FINAL HEATS AT HENLEY REGATTA

THIRD TRINITY WON GRAND CHALLENGE CUP

Defeated Leander Rowing Club Which Has Held the Trophy for Four Years.

 Henley, July 10.—Unsettled weather somewhat marred the spectacular features of the closing day of the regatta, but it in no way diminished the attendance. Besides the thousands temporarily domiciled in the town and on the house boats, visitors arrived in large numbers throughout the morning, and when the racing began at 10 o'clock the enclosure, club lawns and river banks were packed by immense crowds. Most of the colonial premiers and a number of Indian Princes were guests of the regatta officials.

#### EXCURSION FROM SEATTLE

Garonne Chartered to Carry Large Numbers of Visitors to This City.

A mammoth excursion from Seattle, to be held under the auspices of the good roads committee of that city, will arrive here on Sunday. The large ocean going steamer Garonne has been chartered for the purpose, and will leave Seattle at 8 a. m., arriving here early in the afternoon.

Nearly ten thousand delegates congregated in the Infanterie hall and at the First Baptist church for the opening praise service this morning. The convention, which will continue until Saturday, was formally opened by President Chapman, of Chicago.

#### OPPOSED TO GENERAL STRIKE

Birmingham, Ala., July 10.—The local unions of the United Mine Workers held meetings throughout the district yesterday to take action on the recent agreement reached by the joint committee of miners and operators. It is understood that a majority of the leagues have declared in favor of accepting the seals and preventing a general strike.

## A STEEL BRIDGE IS DECIDED UPON

### NEW REVENUE BY-LAW IS FINALLY ADOPTED

### Council Agrees to Addition of Platform and Steps to North End of James Bay Wall.

A special meeting of the city council was held yesterday afternoon when the new Revenue By-Law was finally passed. Aids, Williams and Worthington voting against it, the former disapproving the increased taxation it provides, and the latter desiring the rates for liquor licenses to be increased to the limit of what is allowed.

The subject of the tenders received on Monday last for the supply of gravel for street work then came up for discussion, and as W. W. Northcott explained that these tenders understood that they would not be allowed to take gravel from the forest which the city limits, it was decided to open the tenders. The Victoria Transfer Company tendered for the supply of 600 cubic yards of gravel at 85 cents, provided they were allowed to take it from the Ross Bay beach; John Haggerty offered to supply it for 90 cents, and the Victoria & Sidney Railway Company and John Piercy offered to supply sand at \$1. The tenders were referred to the city engineer and the purchasing agent for report.

The council then resolved itself into the committee on streets, bridges and sewers, and the Point Ellice bridge question was brought up again. The plans submitted by Mr. Mohun were passed round and admired, while the Mayor explained that he understood such a bridge would cost about \$110,000. But the aldermen had had enough worry over the bridge, and were altogether indisposed to allow any more doubt to exist as to the nature of that important structure. "The public are blaming us," said Ald. Graham, "for taking up another suggestion when we have already decided in favor of a steel bridge. They say we have been shilly-shallying."

Ald. Worthington was also in a non-compromising mood. He said that if the council intended to consider a concrete bridge they ought also to call tenders for a stone bridge, which was what the ratepayers really wanted. He mentioned the fact that Mr. Sorby's plans for a stone bridge had been sent in some time ago.

Ald. McCandless considered that the public and the press were at fault in supposing there had been any unnecessary delay in the construction of the bridge. After the council had decided on a steel bridge, permission for the construction of the same had to be obtained from the Dominion government. Further, there was the question of a contribution towards its cost from the provincial government, and the council had secured \$30,000. Instructions were given to Mr. Bell to prepare plans for the steel bridge, and he was given five weeks for the work. It seemed a long time since the building of the bridge was first mooted, but nothing could be done before the election.

The Mayor pointed out that after the election there was a strong attempt made to have a drawbridge, and when that had been disposed of the council thought that if they started the construction of the bridge before they got any money from the government that money would never be procured at all. He was sure the ratepayers were quite satisfied, and understood why the delay had been desirable.

Ald. Kinsman remarked that the public was sick of the bridge. The C. P. R. had been satisfied with a steel bridge, and such a structure should be good enough for Victoria.

Ald. Williams thought that the alternative tenders should be called as Mr. Mohun suggested. He could not see that any delay had been caused by the concrete proposition. As a matter of fact Mr. Bell's plans for the steel bridge had not yet come in.

Ald. Barnard did not know that much unnecessary delay had taken place, but he was sure that the name of the Point Ellice bridge stuck in the nostrils of the ratepayers.

A motion was then put before the committee by Ald. Vincent that the plans should be returned to Mr. Mohun with thanks and a statement that the council had decided in favor of a steel bridge. This was carried, all the aldermen voting for it, except Ald. Williams.

believed that when completed the entire cost of the work would not exceed \$100,000. His plans provided for a thirty-foot platform, 10 feet wide, and steps with a 6-inch rise.

After some discussion, the engineer was authorized to proceed with this additional work.

The choice of a site for the Carnegie library came up for discussion, and it was resolved to submit the choice to the ratepayers, as resolved previously by the council.

Ald. Barnard wished to know if soundings of the mud flats would be taken before they were filled in so that it might be known where rock occurred in the bottom. He hoped that some day an hotel would be built there, and if the whereabouts of the rock was known the laying of foundations would be facilitated.

The Mayor said that there was a chart showing the position of the rocks exact, a very careful survey having been made some time ago.

After some recommendations to the council to proceed with some sidewalk improvements had been passed, the committee adjourned.

## BUDGET OF NEWS BROUGHT BY MOANA

### STATEMENT BY REAR ADMIRAL BEAUMONT

### Great Britain's Naval Power—Chinese Claims for Damages Incurred in Plague Epidemic.

R. M. S. Moana, which arrived yesterday afternoon, carried a large company of distinguished passengers. In addition to those mentioned in last evening's paper there were Sir Edward Stewart Richardson, aide-de-camp to the late governor of Queensland, going home to England; Captain W. Spencer Stanhope is a retired British army officer, going home to Col. Clavering Francis, connected with the government and F. J. B. accompanied by his wife, bound for England, and Lieut. R. B. Johnson, a member of the Royal and Welsh Fusiliers.

Another passenger who boarded the steamer at Sydney was W. Michael Bray, a young American who has been engaged in newspaper work in South Africa and Australia for the past few years, having been in the business in Adelaide and having been through the South African war.

The Moana's cargo included 147 incots tin, 29 crates pineapple, 131 bales hemp, 18 cases bicycle parts, 25 cases metals, 75 bales skins, 208 sacks hides, 13 pieces timber and 27 packages merchandise.

Captain Cable of the Island steamer Bruner, reported at Sydney shortly before the Moana sailed, that when at Christmas Island the islanders informed him that a United States warship had called there a few weeks before in search of the British warship Candor.

The Sydney Morning Herald of recent issue received by the Moana gives an interesting statement of Rear-Admiral Beaumont, formerly commander-in-chief of the Pacific naval fleet. At the annual banquet of the Sydney Chamber of Commerce to the toast of "The Navy and Army," he made some pertinent remarks regarding the position and power of the British navy, and the necessity for the component parts of the British Empire falling into line in the direction of upholding British supremacy in naval armament. Admiral Beaumont, whilst acknowledging the hearty cheers that greeted the toast, said that naval officers always appreciated the way in which it was received by a chamber of commerce, because they knew that the tokens of commendation came from gentlemen who were acquainted with maritime affairs, and whose influence and support had often contributed to the welfare of the navy. There was no doubt, said Admiral Beaumont, that a great island power must be protected by sea. The two or three great principles that were really the foundations of naval defence were that an island power should have its line of defence at sea, that its commerce should be protected at sea, and that the best form of attack that it could adopt was to go and seek the enemy and defeat him as far from the island shores as possible. (Cheers.)

Those three principles were the foundation of the naval defence of the United Kingdom, and it was a lesson that could be learned by all great divisions of the Empire. (Cheers.) The British navy, remarked the Admiral, was stronger than any other afloat. As regards its battleships they were superior in numbers, and were fully equal to the best of any other nation. With regard to the cruisers of the British navy they were in great superiority to those of any other nation, and it had not been for the abnormal activity of certain powers during the last few years the cruiser power of Great Britain would be even greater than it is. As regarded smaller vessels of war, and even submarines, England was on a par with all that could attack her. (Cheers.) From his remarks, said Admiral Beaumont, they would gather that the power of the British navy was very great as compared with any other power, and very formidable even against any combination of powers. (Cheers.) The cost of the naval power of Great Britain was £41,000,000 a year. The influence of sea power was so great, as explained by Capt. Melham, of the United States navy, that almost every country that owned a flag now owned a navy. The effect of that was to alter the balance of the naval power as regarded Great Britain. If every division of the British Empire should have a navy, (Cheers.) That was the point of view which should be taken by those responsible for the protection, not only of this great division of the Empire, but of all the commerce that passed between it. (Cheers.) Admiral Beaumont concluded, amidst hearty cheers, by remarking that whilst foreign governments might have a poor opinion of the British navy, they had a great respect for the British navy. That navy had often been successful in determining the issue of peace. If the future of Great Britain lay in the command of the sea, then every division of the Empire should be adequately protected, but, unfortunately, as yet they had not got it. (Cheers.)

Another addition to the already long list of shipping disasters which have occurred off Botany Heads is told in advices received by the Moana. This time it is the wreck of the Advance, a schooner of 51 tons. She had been engaged for a number of years in trading between Sydney and the northern and southern coasts. It appears that after having discharged a cargo of coal from Wollongong at Botany she sailed on her fatal trip. She was in ballast, bound for Newcastle, to load coal. At the entrance to Botany Bay she struck the rocks. Again and again she was dashed against the rollers and violently dashed against the foot of the cliff until she was reduced to wreckage. The Advance only carried four hands all told, and three of them succeeded in reaching the rocks in safety, although all of them received injuries of

**A WARNING.**

Man that is born of woman is of few days, but if men of science and research do not cease their investigations and the publication of their alleged discoveries, these few days will be days of dread and apprehension. Germs and microbes and death-dealing seeds have been discovered almost everywhere that touches the hand or enters the stomach and lungs. Our food and our drink are constant resources of danger. Those who cannot assimilate the active and energetic creatures which make these things their "habitat" succumb.

But there are more disquieting facts than these for the too enlightened folk of the present day to contemplate. The latest addition to the hosts of industrial micro-organisms which lie in wait for a chance to insert themselves within the human body when it is off its guard is the little rascal which reaches the breakfast or any other table through the agency of the morning mail. If he breaks through the glass he loses no time in "planting" himself for his colony. He has a very active agent in this one, and soon has the soil cleared and a thriving settlement implanted in a place which shortly before was a howling wilderness. There is a splendid field for speculation here as to the degree of intelligence possessed by this fellow, and whether he has any conception of the dignity of the creature called man upon whom he wages constant war. Also whether he regards the body which he makes his dwelling-place as the ultimate bounds of the universe, as some of us do the globe which is our very temporary abiding place. In this instance, however, we must put aside determinedly all speculation and deal entirely with facts. The micro-organism, we are assured on unimpeachable authority, is from our point of view a very active and a very unhealthy fact. In regard to this the London Lancet issues a solemn, timely warning. Don't touch a letter or read a newspaper until you have ate a good, hearty breakfast. Then you will be in a condition to put up a good fight against this valiant warrior. Even then the chances are in his favor, because to your eye of visual limitations he is invisible. At the risk of having our motives misconstrued, we would suggest that the better course would be to refuse to look at a morning paper at all. Take only the paper printed in the evening; because the germs thrive in the darkness and flee to their unknown fastnesses when the sun is bright and all the earth is flooded with his light, the source of healthy life. Besides towards nightfall the body is strongly fortified against unseen enemies. It has been engaged all day in the task of halting itself up with "squares meals" and pure ozone. There will remain a few, however, who have not the patience to take our prescription, and we would repeat our advice, supplementing that of the Lancet as follows:

In this case a letter of ten the envelope containing a list of ticks, as is also the stamp, by the sender. Infection, therefore, may easily lurk here, especially at the time the letter reaches its destination. The stamp and sealed cover are dry. Any letters which present themselves should be carefully examined. Then there are the ticks of infection to which a letter is exposed in transit. The sorter at the post office, the postman may not be as bacteriologically clean as is desirable. The dust of the roads may adhere to any crossed gum, or the letters may be dropped, and the bacteriology of the

road dust exhibits some well-known pathogenic organisms. Letters are frequently smeared with road mud. Among the microbes recognized in road sweepings are the microbes of pus, malignant oedema, tetanus, tubercle and septicæmia. The post probably is a very wide distributing agency of all sorts and conditions of organisms, and this would be difficult to prevent. But surely care might be taken to keep from association the plate upon which food is partaken with the letter or newspaper packet. It follows that from a hygienic point of view letters should never be opened or read during a meal.

Could the facts of a case be more succinctly and clearly laid before a trembling people? Is there in the whole world a city more favorably situated than Victoria for the dissemination of disease in which the "micro" is the active agent? We have not only the moisture of the lips and lungs of senders of letters to guard against. There is the risk of "infection" being picked up in transit. "The sorter at the post office or the postman may not be as bacteriologically clean as is desirable." There is the dust of the roads and other minute particles with which "pathogenic organisms" love to mingle. Is there a city in the world in which the terrible "pathogenic organisms" have greater opportunities to mix with the dust of the roads? From all these facts we unhesitatingly draw the conclusion that a morning paper should be avoided as the plague, while a learned contemporary suggests because of the same set of disquieting facts that it would not be a violent assumption to argue that letters should not be opened and read at all until thoroughly sterilized. This might be done in a wholesale way at the post office, if many of the micro-organisms described by the Lancet were not picked up in delivery. During the cholera epidemic in the south of France some years ago, telegrams received at Paris from Marseilles were disinfected before distribution, and equal prudence might cause the postal system to cease to be a disseminating of contagion; but since the sorter and the carrier cannot very well be maintained in a condition of surgical asepsis, the only avenue of safety would seem to lie in having a steam-chamber or a tank of bichloride of mercury solution so placed that the postman may drop his mail matter into it through a slot in the outside wall or the front door, and so keep dangerous organisms out of the house. The correspondence habit was ever one of peril to the writers of letters; and since it is shown to be equally perilous to those who receive them, to expect its relegation to innocuous desuetude is not unreasonable.

**VICTORIA'S GROWING TIME.**

One approach at least has been removed from Victoria. Her people no longer sit down in places where the cool breezes and the atmosphere fragrant with the odor of roses and all the flowers that bloom are grateful to the senses, fold their hands and sleepily murmur something about a goodly heritage and pleasant genes. The City Council is pushing useful municipal works with all the energy consistent with the extent of the funds at its disposal. The James Bay flats will soon be converted from an abomination to the nostrils, an offence to the eye and a menace to health, into a valuable property as well as an ornament to the city. This work, thanks to the assistance about to be given by the Dominion government, will cost but little, if any, more than would the construction of a suitable bridge, which would not be permanent and would still leave the offensive features of the bay with us. The preliminary part of this undertaking is the unprofessional eye—and to the eyes of many professional men as well—looked extremely hazardous. However, Mr. Popp, the city engineer, as has been demonstrated, was extremely accurate in his calculations and deductions. His dam withstood the onslaught of the storms of a very severe winter, and doubtless the Mayor and aldermen and citizens generally are ready to accord him full credit for his notable achievement.

Our Tourist Association at the beginning of its career as an organization was regarded by many with something that approached closely to disdain. If public opinion has not veered around it must be very nearly blind. The Association has done splendid work for the city, and many who viewed its operations from afar are now the loudest in its praise. Our neighbors in Vancouver are never slow to discover the usefulness and merits of any public movement. They have flattered Victoria by imitating her in this respect. An association has been organized in the Terminal City also. There is no good reason why the bodies should not be auxiliary to each other. The work is one in which co-operation can not but add materially to the results. Tourists whose objective point is the coast desire to see all the notable points. Vancouver and Victoria both have advantages in this respect distinct from each other. We hope the good work may go forward harmoniously with an entire absence of the petty feeling which is discredit to both places.

The work of the Voters' League thus far has been of value. The most that can be hoped for from such a body is discussion, the discussion being useful in drawing attention to the proper quarters to features that might otherwise for a long time escape notice. There are many subjects of municipal interest that might with advantage be kept alive during the period of comparative inactivity that occurs between the beginning and the end of the year, when the affairs of the city are receiving the "best attention" of

Letters having been read from the head office touching upon the matter of establishing a branch of the league in Vancouver, the president was constituted a special committee to confer with Capt. Eddie, the hon. local secretary, and his associates in Vancouver on the subject and report to the next meeting.

A letter from the secretary of the Montreal Board of Trade indicated that a resolution had been adopted by that board as follows: "Resolved, that in the opinion of the Montreal Board of Trade it is the duty of this Dominion, as an important division of the Empire, to share in the cost of the general defence of said Empire, and, therefore, that an annual appropriation should be provided in the Dominion budget for this purpose to be expended as the Dominion government may direct." It was also stated that this resolution was presented by the Montreal board at the recent conference of boards of trade held in Toronto, where it was carried after a sharp and prolonged debate on a vote of 40-yes to 32-noes.
