Orders are filled promptly upon reccipt or a reason given with acknowledgment of same．
Prices．As it is impossible to predict our exact demand，our prices are made subject to change without notice and goods being unsold when order reaches us．We，however，carry very large stocks， and if orders reach us in good season，full satisfaction may always be expected．

C．O．D．orders can be sent only by express．Such orders should be accompanied by a remittance in part payment，to guarantee charges．

It will stand slow forcing and if the flowers are brought in before outdoor Gladiolus are ready, they command very high prices. We have watched the variety for a number of jears, but were never before able to get a sufficient quantity of bulbs to offer it to the commercial grovier at a reasonable price. It is a sure monejmaker and no florist will be disappointed who gives it a trial. Most other good whites are unproductive and do not give more than 95 per cent. of bloom, for which reason they do not pay to grow; but the Augusta will return upwards of 200 per cent. of large, handsome spikes' of flowers.
