**Half The Profits!**

IN the Pacific and the East Asia War, the Anglo-American aim is to dominate all Asia by fighting against Nippon and reducing the strength of the East Asiatic nations. So far, the Anglo-American Scheme has proved a tragic and costly failure. Fighting solely for imperialistic expansion, Britain and America have not co-operated wholeheartedly. On the other hand, at every stage of the war, in every single operation, Britain and America have each of them considered its own private advantages and disadvantages—its own possible gains and losses.

Nippon completed her vast successes in East Asia in less than a year; and thereafter for two years the Anglo-Americans have been trying desperately to mount a counter-offensive. The British left the war against Nippon solely to America, with the excuse that all available British strength in the East was not sufficient even for the defence of the vital base of India. In fact even with the help of American, Chungking and African troops, the British in India are unable to hold their own. But the British made good capital out of this fact. They adopted the policy of letting America fight it out with Nippon, and if America had any success against Nippon, if America could reconquer any former British or other territories, then the British idea was to sneak in and claim half the profits.

The British game of exploiting America's fighting power and then claiming a share of the gains was all right so long as the Americans did not have anything to say about it. But ever since August 2602, when they started island hopping campaign in the Pacific, the Americans have been bitterly complaining about lack of British co-operation in the war against Nippon. This was their way of saying that Britain must share part of their tragic and enormous losses.

But at the second Quebec Conference when Churchill insisted that Britain should have an important share of the Pacific operation against Nippon, Roosevelt would have none of it. Roosevelt said America would do all the fighting in the Pacific, without British assistance.

All that was long ago. The Americans have changed their tune now. Their recent losses in the Taiwan and in the Philippines battles have induced them to demand that Britain should share the losses. Thus it is that the British have been forced to create a British Pacific fleet—to partially replace the American losses. Britain waited to share the profits, but now she is being forced to share tragic losses! Well, as the war becomes more and more decisive, Britain and America will march more and more perfectly in step in their march to total destruction.

## U.S. Production Unable To Meet War Requisitions

Washington In Big Panic  
War Mobilization Head  
Decrees New Order

Lisbon, Dec. 10 (Domei)—The inability of United States war production to meet front-line requirements was underscored in a decree issued in Washington today by James Byrnes, director of the Office of War Mobilization, ordering the registration of all men between 26 and 37 years of age for vital war work, it is reported from Washington.

The men drawn from these age groups will fill vacancies in war industry caused by draft for the American army and navy.

Meanwhile, despite General Dwight Eisenhower's appeal for more munitions, American war production continued practically on the same level or showed very slight gains which were inadequate to supply American forces fighting in Europe and the Pacific area.

The United States War Production Board, in a report on war production for October issued tonight, said in Washington that despite the October gain of six per cent. over the September output of war materials urgently needed, "critical programs" must still improve much more if the armed forces are to get all of the critical supplies called for. The report pointed out the fact that munitions production for October remained virtually the same as September.

### U.S. Attack On Britain

Lisbon, Dec. 10 (Domei)—Coming out flatly for United States' post-war domination of international civil aviation, Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, President of the United States Eastern Airlines, today sharply attacked Great Britain's attitude at the recent International Anti-Axis Air Conference at Chicago, according to a New York dispatch.

## P.I. Campaign To Be Conducted In "Taiatari" Spirit

Tokyo, December 9 (Domei)—Declaring that the recent brilliant Nippon victories off Taiwan and in the Philippines were scored through the traditional Nippon spirit of self-sacrifice, Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, Commander-in-Chief of the Nippon expeditionary forces in the Philippines, in a radio speech from the frontline at 8 o'clock yesterday evening pledged to prosecute the Philippines campaign with the same spirit. ## NIPPON SPECIAL AIR CORPS SINKS ONE CRUISER & FOUR VESSELS OFF LEYTE ISLAND

Attack Units Set Up High Record  
94 Foe Warcraft Sunk, Damaged

Tokyo, December 10 (Domei)—Forty-seven enemy war vessels sunk and 47 others heavily damaged, totalling 94 either sunk or damaged by our death-defying army and naval air units since the "Kamikaze and Shikishima" Special Attack Corps made their first appearance on October 25, followed by the "Banda" Special Attack Corps of our army and navy air force, as compiled on the basis of Dai Honyei announcements follow:

Firstly, Army Special Attack Corps: Sunk—six battleships, four cruisers, one war vessel of unidentified category, 17 transports; heavily damaged—two battleships or cruisers, one cruiser, three war vessels of unidentified category, 11 transports, totalling 45 war vessels either sunk or damaged.

Secondly, Naval Special Attack Corps: Sunk—six aircraft-carriers, three cruisers, ten transports; heavily damaged—seven aircraft-carriers, three battleships, one battleship or cruiser, five cruisers, one destroyer, ten transports, three war vessels of unidentified category, totalling 49 war vessels either sunk or damaged.

Grand total 47 sunk, 47 heavily damaged, totalling 94.

### Imperial Diet Session Convoked For Dec. 24

Tokyo, Dec. 11 (Domei)—The 86th ordinary session of the Imperial Diet, fourth to be held since the outbreak of the Greater East Asia War, will be convoked on Dec. 24, it was announced today. Both Houses are scheduled to deliberate on 19 Government bills. It is officially disclosed that the objective of the forthcoming Diet will mainly be to devise practical measures to secure absolute victory in the war.

Tokyo, Dec. 11 (Domei)—The "Tanshin" Air Unit of the Nippon Special Attack Corps yesterday assaulted an enemy convoy in the Surigao Strait, south-east of Leyte Island, and accounted for two large transports, one cruiser or large destroyer and two large landing vessels instantaneously sunk or sunk, and also one large transport and one cruiser or destroyer heavily damaged and set on fire, Dai Honyei announced at 3.30 p.m. today.

The announcement reads: "Six planes of the Tanshin Air Unit of our Special Attack Corps assaulted an enemy convoy in the Surigao Strait, south-east of Leyte Island, yesterday, December 10, and achieved the following war results: instantaneously sank or sank two large transports, one cruiser or destroyer and two large landing vessels; heavily damaged and set ablaze one large transport and one cruiser or destroyer.

"This cruiser or destroyer which was heavily damaged and set ablaze was sunk later by our escorting fighter-plane."

### Three Planes Set On Fire In Suichan Raid

A Nippon Base in China, Dec. 10 (Domei)—In a midnight raid against Suichan airfield, our China-based bomber unit yesterday set ablaze on the ground two large and one small aircraft and damaged two other aircraft of unidentified type.

Our unit also blasted ground installations in the airfield interception by enemy interceptors was strong but all our aircraft returned to their base safely.

## U.S. SITUATION IN CHINA SERIOUS; SENATORS WARN

Lisbon, Dec. 10 (Domei)—American Senators Albert B. Chandler, Democrat, and O. W. Brewster, Republican, today jointly warned that, barring a miracle, the United States is

doomed to lose all of her bases in China, according to a Reuter's dispatch from Washington. Referring to the sensational Nipponese military campaign in Southern China, they said they did not know of anything that can halt the Nipponese from taking Kunming and moving towards Chungking. Senator Chandler asserted that the United States effort in China was a "costly failure and great tragedy" and predicted that if American forces invade the China coast, they will have to fight battles much longer and costlier than anticipated.

## Revolt & Unrest Spreading Among Br. Indian Army

Disgruntled Soldiers Now  
Engaged In Acts Of  
Mutiny, Sabotage

Mounting unrest and revolt among the Indian soldiers of the British Indian Army have struck fear in the hearts of the British authorities in India. This is revealed in the latest reports received here today.

Callous discrimination and ill-treatment by the British officers are reported to have driven the Indian soldiers to acts of mutiny and sabotage.

Hundreds of Indian soldiers are also reported to be deserting the British every day, and going back to their respective villages, where they are carrying on vigorous anti-British propaganda. This is one of the main reasons for the failure of the recruiting campaigns launched by the British. To-day, the position has become so serious that the British authorities are frantically making all sorts of promises and presents to the Indian soldiers and their families, to would-be-recruits and all others, in a vain attempt to regain the loyalty of those who are still in their service and to attract more recruits into the army to replace the thousands who are deserting or are becoming war casualties.

### Hypocritical Gestures

A New Delhi report yesterday revealed several hypocritical gestures which the British authorities have made so as to save the situation. The United Provinces Government, for example, have issued instructions to their Revenue Officers not to sell or confiscate lands of the soldiers now in service in lieu of non-payment of taxes. Again, Gorakhpur District authorities have decided to give one tin of kerosene oil to all the soldiers returning home on leave.

## Zanshi-Ki-Rani Draws Full House At Kokaido

There was a full house at the Syonan Kokaido last night when the Volunteers of the Rani of Jhansi Regiment gave a repeat performance of the Zanshi-ki-Rani, the historic drama depicting the first war of Indian Independence and the gallant deeds of the Rani of Jhansi.

The performance will be repeated tonight, tomorrow and on Thursday and the curtain will go up at 7.30 p.m. as usual. The whole proceeds will be donated to Netaji Fund.

### British Pacific Fleet Formed To Assist U.S.

Lisbon, December 10 (Domei)—Ostensibly to bolster anti-Axis operations in the Pacific theatre of the war, which have been hard hit by the terrific losses sustained by the American Navy, Britain has been compelled to create a British "Pacific Fleet" in order to assist the Americans in the Far East, according to a London dispatch.

A Reuter's message said that Sir Bruce Fraser has been appointed Commander-in-Chief of the new "Pacific Fleet". Meantime, it was also disclosed that Vice-Admiral Sir Arthur Power has been named Commander-in-Chief of a newly-created East Indies naval command.

### Stalin-De Gaulle Treaty Of Alliance

Lisbon, Dec. 10 (Domei)—A Moscow Radio announcement intercepted here reported that the so-called "Provisional Government of France" and the Soviet Union, following a series of consultations in Moscow between General Charles de Gaulle, Head of the French regime, and Soviet Premier Josef Stalin, today concluded a treaty of alliance and mutual assistance.

The text of the new Franco-Soviet treaty shortly will be made public, the announcement said, adding that General de Gaulle has now left Moscow for Paris, concluding an eight-day visit in the Soviet capital.

The latest accord is regarded with considerable significance as it is believed to mark the beginning of a Soviet political offensive in Western European countries aimed at positively strengthening Soviet influence in Europe as a counter-measure to Anglo-American designs.

### Opportunity For Girls To Learn Nursing

An opportunity for 30 girls between the ages of 16 and 20 to learn nursing has been thrown open to them with the establishment of the Syonan Tokubetu-si Nurses' Training Institute.

The nurses who will receive their training at the Chuo Byoin should be graduates from elementary schools or possess equal or higher academic qualifications.

During the training period of one year, the trainees will receive a monthly allowance of \$25. Board and lodging will be provided free while working clothes, bedding, etc., will be loaned to them.

After completing their training, nurses who pass the qualifying examination will be awarded certificates as qualified nurses with an initial salary of \$40 per month. Graduates will be required to work for one year after graduation at places designated by the Tokubetu-si authorities.

Applications for enlistment must be made at the Chuo Byoin on Dec. 23. They will be required to sit for an entrance examination at the Chuo Byoin at 10 a.m. on Dec. 26.

### Sanguinary Civil War Threatens To Engulf Greece

Lisbon, Dec. 10 (Domei)—Troops of the "ELAS" anti-Government military organization launched a strong attack in the eastern districts of Athens this morning in a vigorous attempt to penetrate to the centre of the city, where British and Greek government headquarters are located, according to information received here from Athens.

In the effort to wrest control of part of the city, the "ELAS" forces were said to have directed their attack first against the police barracks in Athens where fierce fighting ensued. British dispatches reported, however, that the attack was repulsed with machinegun and artillery fire.

At one time, British gunners firing from the Palace roof only six yards from Grande Bretagne Hotel housing the Greek regime were perilously threatened by anti-Government Greek troops, it was said.

A communique issued by Major-General Scoble, Officer Commanding British Forces in Greece, said that "ELAS" elements are increasing their offensive activity in the eastern suburbs of the capital and the British naval headquarters in Piraeus was subjected to mortar fire and sniping on an increased scale.

Last night and early this morning, British paratroops were reported to have repulsed strong "ELAS" attacks launched from the Stadium. Approximately 200 to 300 "ELAS" troops are conducting operations from the Stadium, taking advantage of the underground passages of the arena, a Reuter's message said.

There were still no signs of the fighting ending speedily in a British victory, with "ELAS" elements laying mines, digging trenches and constructing machinegun posts in various strategic areas, braving British tank, artillery and aircraft attacks.

Rumours prevailed in Athens that units of the Greek Navy and the Greek Air Force have begun to desert to the "ELAS" side, as Greek Premier Georg Papandreu last night presided over a four-hour Cabinet meeting to discuss measures to bring about a speedy end to the fighting which threatens to engulf entire Greece in a sanguinary civil war.

### Grim Fighting In Saarlautern And Dillingen Areas

Lisbon, Dec. 10 (Domei)—The heaviest fighting is now going on in the Dillingen and Saarlautern areas as American Third Army troops are making desperate efforts to strengthen their bridgeheads across the Saar River, according to dispatches received here.

German tank and infantry divisions made four counter-attacks yesterday against the American Saar River bridgeheads and for the time being recaptured some pillboxes, dispatches from Paris said. They added that fighting was heaviest in the Siegfried Line fortifications in Dillingen which is three miles north of Saarlautern. The grimmest and bloodiest house-to-house fighting since Aachen has been raging in Dillingen for over a hundred hours, frontline dispatches to Berlin said. Severe fighting was also reported in the area between Saarguemines and Hagenau to the south-east.

American Seventh Army troops have reached Bischweiler. The American attempt to outflank the Hagenau woods from the north-west failed, however. In the area of Aachen no important changes occurred.

The battle for the possession of Budapest is slowly reaching its climax, frontline dispatches to Berlin said. The heaviest fighting is raging at present from the expanded bridgehead of Erosi on the western bank of the Danube where the Soviets have come closest from the south to Budapest, right up to Lake Balaton where German bolt positions are offering stubborn resistance. Dispatches to Berlin indicated increasing German and Hungarian resistance in the battle for Budapest. The lull continued in other sectors of the Eastern Front.

In central Italy the battle for Faenza and the area south-west therefrom increased yesterday to the greatest violence, the German High Command said. German tank formations in a counter-attack on a broad front

### Br. War Ministry Reveals Details Of German V-2

Lisbon, December 8 (Domei)—Germany's destructive rocket-propelled V-2 flying bomb travels so fast—faster than sound—that the rumbling noise like thunder which it makes while in flight is not heard until after the explosion, the British War Ministry stated today in revealing further details about Germany's latest robot missile, according to a London dispatch.

The warhead of the V-2, it was disclosed, is situated in the nose behind which are two large fuel tanks carrying alcohol and liquid oxygen, turbine and combustion chamber and other propulsion units.

As the V-2 derives all its power from the fuel it carries without depending upon external air for combustion, it can operate equally well at extremely high altitudes where there is practically no air, the Air Ministry said.

The rockets stand vertically on a concrete platform for launching and are fired off by igniting the fuel electrically from some distance away. They start their climb vertically, but a gyroscope control causes them to curve from the vertical towards their target.

The robot bombs eventually reach a height of over 60 miles above the earth's surface and come down in the same parabolic path that a shell would take.

As they descend they are slowed down considerably by air resistance and become so heated by friction that they have actually been seen glowing a dull red, the Air Ministry said.

In these battles a total of 13 Nippon planes either crashed or are missing.
