CULTURE. Hardy Waterlilies may be planted from April on, tropicals after June 1 Orders should be placed in advance for de-livery at proper time. They should be planted in full sunshine, in 12 inches of water. Pools should be 24 inches deep and planting con-tainers 14 inches square by 10 inches deep or tubs of like size.

Place roots on about 45° angle in soil com-posed of three parts of heavy fibrous loam and one part of well-rotted cow manure, letting just the tip of the plant protrude. Then cover with about 2 inches of sand.
