One of the most common issues found in Indigenous Wikipedia articles require proving notability

How do I prove notability?

A person or their work must meet **one** of the following criteria:

- Well-known
- A monument
- Part of an exhibition
- Received critical attention
- Significa In the permanent collections of several notable galleries or museums


 Part of the enduring historical record in their field

- Received / Nominated for a wellknown and significant award or honour
- Known for originating a significant new concept, theory, or technique

Cited by peers or successors

- Entry in the Dictionary of National Biography (or similar)
- Regarded as an important figure

Secondary sources with more than a trivial mention



Notability depends on these two types of sources



Peer-reviewed journals, newspaper articles, and books


The following sources can be used to write your entry, but will not be considered to prove notability:

Sources by the subject or an affiliate

For example, do not use autobiographical materials, the author's website, publisher write-ups, or press releases.

Multiple publications from the same author/organization


These are considered a single source for determining notability.





How do I choose good sources?



They can be used, but when possible, find extra sources to ensure that your writing won't be taken down.



Avoid original research and conflicts of interest
