On the 7th of September RLT-7 established a CP ashore in the vicinity of (BS 771851) on the CAP BATANGAN Peninsula in order to carry out the mission assigned in Operation PIRANHA. On the 10th of September, the RLT-7 CP was re-established within the CHU LAI enclave at (BT 560048).

Part II

1. Personnel. The S-1 section processed a total of 30 Battle Casualty Reports to Division and processed a total of 60 Permanent Change of Station Orders on personnel within the Regiment. A total of nine Special Orders, affecting re-assignment of personnel within the Regiment, were issued. Nineteen Marines and three Navy replacements were ordered to the 7th Marines during the month of September.

2. Administration. The administration is considered good on a day-to-day basis, but will become more effective when the S-1 Section is established in adequate working spaces. The largest current administrative project is the processing of awards via Division Headquarters. During the month a total of 38 recommendations for personal decoration were processed by the 7th Marines Decoration Board. See enclosure (1), S-1 Journal.

3. Intelligence. Intelligence operations and activity throughout the month of September were relatively routine. No particular problem areas existed that required action by other than the local command and the next senior command and these were of a relatively minor nature.

See enclosure (2), Operation PIRANHA After-Action Report. Intelligence planning for Operation PIRANHA commenced on 1 September 1965 with the Intelligence Annex and estimate published and in the hands of the staff and troops by 4 September 1965. See enclosure (3), Operation PIRANHA Operation Order 324-65. For significant chronological intelligence events pertaining to, and reported by this command, see enclosure (4), Daily Intelligence Summaries for September 1965. Weather during the month did not seriously hamper intelligence collection activities, although, for a period of 18 days it rained a total of 17.54 inches. The rain did not limit the use of aerial observers. However, during periods of the heaviest rain falls, observation was limited. The normal collection of intelligence through patrol and OP activity continued without interruption. See enclosure (5), Weather Summary for September 1965. The enemy's activity during this period, other than during Operation PIRANHA, was relatively quiet and consisted mainly of two to six man harassments and infiltration attempts through our lines. The enemy's main activity was directed at retaining control over the civilian populace in areas adjacent to our TAOR and collecting a rice tax from the people. Known and suspected enemy locations and dispositions at the end of September are shown in enclosure (6), Enemy Situation as of 30 September 1965. Also see enclosure (7), S-2 Journal.

4. Training. Due to the mission assigned and the limited training facilities, training was limited and oriented towards preventive instructions. These instructions dealt with the safe handling of fire arms, rules of engagement, and the proper use of the challenge and password. The 81mm Mortar platoons conducted gun drill and the supporting arms, Tanks, Amtracs and Ontos conducted line firing. A great deal of "on the job" training was conducted.

5. Special Operations. During the month of September there were three Special Operations conducted. Operation PIRANHA was a regimental landing team operation in which RMT-7 executed a combined amphibious and helicopterborne assault in conjunction with RVN forces on the CAP BATANGAN and AN KY Peninsula to destroy Viet Cong forces and positions. See Part III, Enclosure (2), Operation PIRANHA After-Action Report. The 1st Battalion, 7th Marines conducted two operations; Operation ZIPPER and Operation HARDROCK. Operation ZIPPER began on the 13th of September. The 1st Battalion established a reinforced company sized combat base in the vicinity of TAN HY (1) (grid square BT 6200) and conducted exhaustive search and clear operations in the village and surrounding areas. The company maintained surveillance over VC activities and movements and attacked, destroyed or captured all VC forces encountered. Operation HARDROCK began where Operation ZIPPER ended on the 25th of September. Operation HARDROCK had the mission to search and clear the northeastern portion of the TRUNG PHAN Peninsula and to destroy any caves, tunnels or fortifications encountered. See the Command Chronology of the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines for further details on both of these operations.

6. Nuclear, Biological, Chemical and other special types of warfare. During the month of September, there were many occasions in which tear gas/riot control agents could have been employed in clearing tunnels, caves, and enemy trenches. A retrospective study of Operations PIRANHA, ZIPPER and HARDROCK discloses many specific instances in which lives could have been saved, casualties avoided, and risks reduced.



At present, the current method employed for searching and clearing tunnels is a dangerous one. Despite the obvious risk, small groups of Marines must enter dark tunnels and caves with flashlights in order to determine whether the occupants are civilian or VC. Despite the precautions taken these Marines became a target for any VC with a weapon. In many caves the VC used civilians as shields and unfortunately when Marines are forced to shoot, unnecessary casualties may be produced among civilians and Marines.

Tear gas/CS is ideal for use in tunnels and caves. VC, who are subjected to tear gas, will be rendered incapable of resisting attempts to capture them and will be flushed out of their hiding places. There are no lasting effects from tear gas and any civilians who are hiding in tunnels or being used as shields will quickly recover.

7. Command and Control. Throughout the month of September, the active aggressive patrolling, conducted within the TAOR by the 1st Battalion and 3rd Battalion, was controlled almost exclusively by the company commanders and their subordinate leaders. The 3rd Battalion did, however, conduct patrols which penetrated to the extreme boundaries of the TAOR and which were controlled by the Battalion Commander. Operation PIRANHA demonstrated the excellent results a regimental landing team size operation can achieve when good coordination exists between supporting arms and the infantry. This operation was conducted in a populous area and was highly successful in that no buildings were destroyed and very few civilians injured. During Operation PIRANHA, as the small, separate search and clear operations developed, company commanders and their subordinate leaders gained experience in small arms coordination and combat leadership.

Operation ZIPPER, conducted by the 1st Battalion on the TRUNG PHAN Peninsula, saw a company establish a remote combat outpost and conduct search and clear operations for several days with good results. See Command Chronology for the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines.

Again on the TRUNG PHAN Peninsula, the 1st Battalion conducted a two company search and clear operation, Operation HARDROCK. One company provided the blocking force and a reinforced squad from Reconnaissance Group Alpha with an FO Team attached established an OP to report VC activity and call artillery/mortar fire on targets of opportunity and escaping VC. The Battalion Commander employed LVT's to lift one company from its positions on the MLR and throughout the operation employed his supporting arms in such a manner as to give maximum support to the rifle companies involved. During the operation, company commanders and subordinate leaders made effective use of their men and equipment to conduct successful search and destroy missions.

8. Communications-Electronics. Communications-electronics elements of RL7-7 were engaged in planning and preparation for Operation PIRANHA during the period 1-7 September 1965. Operation PIRANHA was conducted during the period 7-11 September 1965 and normal communications facilities were provided for this operation. These facilities included a covered RATT circuit and a ship-to-shore (Rear CP) radio relay circuit. A battery charger for the BB-451 and maintenance facility was established in the Beach Support Area by RL7-7 Headquarters communications personnel. Several experiments were conducted with different types of antennas on the SSB radio equipment.

No significant improvement was noted on the RATT circuit through the use of different types of antennas.

The period from 15-30 September 1965 was occupied with the repair and preventive maintenance of equipment and training of personnel. Significant training events were:

25 September: Instruction in Communications Security was presented by Det. "J", 1st Radio Battalion for Headquarters, 7th Marines communication personnel.

29 September: Headquarters, 7th Marines communications personnel participated in a Provisional Battalion exercise.

30 September: Communications Security instructions presented to Headquarters, 7th Marines officers by Officer-in-Charge, Det. "J", 1st Radio Battalion.

9. Close Combat. On the 2nd of September, Company A conducted a platoon size, daylight combat patrol. The platoon was informed by local militia in VINH AN (1) of four VC and one VCS in the vicinity of (BT 614010). All five men were apprehended and brought to the Battalion POW Compound. At 021030H two men approached the MLR positions of Company B. One of the two men was apprehended and the other escaped. One hour after Company A left the hamlet of VINH AN (1) at (BT 614010), a platoon from Company B conducted a search and clear of the same village and captured three VCS who were pointed out by Lt Long of the Popular Forces. This platoon from Company B suffered one KIA and two WIA, when a fire team leader stepped on a release type grenade booby trap at 021745H, when leaving the village of VINH AN (1).

On the 5th of September, patrolling was secured in the 7th Marines TAOR to enable the battalions to prepare for Operation PIRANHA.

At 060900H September, RLT-7 displaced from the CHU LAI enclave to assigned shipping for transportation to CAP BATANGAN where Operation PIRANHA would take place. See enclosure (8), Weekly Operations Summaries and Overlays.

Operation PIRANHA commenced at 070635H when companies A and C with B in reserve landed on WHITE Beach and secured it to the dune line. At 070650H, the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines landed by helicopter in assigned landing zones to establish blocking positions and protect the RLT west flank. Company B searched and cleared CHAU THUAN (1) in CAP BATANGAN, where they killed three VC and captured six VCS in a cave.

On the 8th of September, Company A searched and cleared the village of PHU QUI (BS 785845) and AN HAI (1) (BS 777833). The company found numerous caves and tunnels and captured two weapons, ammunition, grenades, trip flares, documents and medical supplies. Company B conducted search and clear operations moving south on the coastal side of CAP BATANGAN. At 081145H, the company found a few caves with weapons, ammunition and medical supplies.

Company A killed one VC in the vicinity of coordinates (BS 789845). Company B found a cave at (BS 791848) and killed seven VC with demolitions when they destroyed the cave (081600H). Later, Company A took 21 VC bodies out of the cave and counted 31 VC bodies remaining in the cave complex. The company also sent 15 VCS and one VCC to the Battalion CP for interrogation. Company C found one home-made land mine in the vicinity of (BS 785847). See enclosure (2), Operation PIRANHA After-Action Report for more details of this operation.

Company A departed on Operation ZIPPER at 130529H September and established a combat base on a hill at (BT 623004). Company A found one booby trap, consisting of a hand grenade and a short trip wire, on the northwest slope of the hill with mine detector equipment.

At 132200H, Company K received a probe of its lines at (BT 529009). An illumination grenade and one round from a rifle was fired at two VCS who were seen fleeing the area.

On the 14th of September, a platoon from Company B, while on a daylight combat patrol, picked up six VCS in the vicinity of (BT 608004). They were all young males without ID cards and looked suspicious. Company C, having relieved Company A on Operation ZIPPER, apprehended five VCS and one VCC in the vicinity of (BT 624003). Company C found an unoccupied cave at (BT 625004) which contained one M-1 carbine, one WP rifle grenade, one cartridge belt, communications wire, one PRC-10 battery and small arms ammunition.

Company C interrogated the villagers in TAN HY (1) and apprehended one VCS at 151000H. At 151800H a platoon from Company B on a daylight combat patrol captured three VCS. Two of the VCS were captured at (BT 611015) after a warning shot halted them. The third VCS was found at (BT 613983) through routine checking of people in the area.

At 161700H, when Company A found an M-14 grenade (in a cave in the vicinity of BT 622012) they were fired on by a sniper with a high powered rifle. At the same time the Company CP and resupply helicopters, both located at (BT 624007) also received rifle fire.

At 161800H Company C captured one wounded VC being carried by villagers on a stretcher covered by woven mats near (BT 623014).

On the 18th of September at 0900H, a reconnaissance patrol from Company I captured a VCS at (BT 533988). Company C apprehended 17 VCS at (BT 620018) and found one pair ARVN boots, one ARVN shirt, and one PF shirt in a cave at (BT 623015). Company C also destroyed several caves, fighting holes, tank traps and bunkers in the area of their operations. At 182200H, a patrol from Company K received an enemy hand grenade near (BS 541009). The patrol fired 70 rounds in return without effect and there were no Marine casualties. At 182335H, Company C apprehended one VC woman cadre leader and two VCS at (BS 620012).

At 190015H, a squad from Company D, that was proceeding to a night ambush site was fired upon by six VC as it left the company defensive perimeter at (BT 556013). The squad immediately returned fire and assaulted the VC position. One Marine was later found to have a slight scalp wound and was attended by a corpsman. At 190700H, while returning from BINH SON, a Marine from Company I was seriously wounded when he opened a booby trapped gate in the vicinity of (BS 572962). At 192345H, the 2nd Platoon of Company K saw two VCS with a flashlight in the vicinity of (BT 539001). The platoon fired at the two VCS and fire was returned. There were no friendly or enemy casualties and pursuit was impractical in the dark.

At 200740H, four Marines from Company I, including the Company Commander, were injured by booby trapped grenade at (BT 522971). Company A, having relieved Company C earlier in the day, apprehended one VC at (BT 622091) at 201500H.

On the 21st of September a Marine in Company C was slightly wounded by an air burst from a friendly artillery round that prematurely exploded.

Company A captured four VCS at (BT 651033) around 211100H. At the same time, a patrol from Company A received sniper fire from (BT 655035) and again at 211130H from (BT 664035). The patrol returned fire and observed one wounded VC being helped away by his comrades. At 211200H, the patrol encountered automatic weapons fire from across the river at (BT 600027). The patrol returned fire and observed two wounded VC being helped away by their comrades. At 211228H three VC fired upon a patrol, from Company A, from a rock pile at (BT 647017). The patrol killed one VC and captured six rifle grenades, two home-made demolition charges and one document. At 211515H, another company patrol ran into a VC patrol, killed one VC and captured four.

At 221100H, Company B sent out a patrol to meet and accompany Mr Lam, Security Chief of BINH NGHIA, to apprehend 15 known VC. At 221300H in the vicinity of (BS 613983), the patrol apprehended four women, one child and five men, all VCS.

At 232215H, the Company D roadblock, at (BT 554014), had one hand grenade thrown into its area. There were no casualties and no enemy found.

At 241530H, a patrol from Company D found a carbine magazine with nine rounds at BT 567984.

During Operation HARDROCK at 251600H, Company A patrol captured one VCS in a house at (BT 685034). See enclosure (9), Regimental Frag Order 3-65 to Operation Order 327-65. At 251705H, Company A received heavy sniper fire from an automatic weapon and several small arms at (BT 663028). At 261345H, Company B encountered and destroyed a cave and entrenchments in the vicinity of (BT 668023). During the day while searching and clearing grid squares 6701, 6702 and 6703, Company B picked up nine VCS. At 261850H, a Company D patrol chased two VCS with negative results. They had been observing Company D's outpost at (BS 554492).

At 261845H, a platoon sized patrol from Company K received small arms fire at (BS 556992). They returned fire and the VC fled. Distance and terrain precluded chasing the VC.

At 271130H, Company B captured six VCS hiding along the sea cliffs. At 271630H, Company B apprehended two VCS who were hiding in a rock pile at (BT 678025). A platoon size patrol from Company K received small arms fire from five or six armed men, dressed in black and wearing straw hats (BS 511973). The patrol returned fire and the VC fled leaving behind a wallet, an overlay, documents and sandals. There were no casualties sustained on either side. At 282245H, in the vicinity of (BS 510995), trip flares were set off and one Vietnamese male was sighted and taken under fire, but he escaped.

At 290930H in the vicinity of (BS 548974), a Company K patrol was fired at by an undetermined number of VC in a nearby village. Fire was not returned because of the proximity of many civilians. A Company B patrol received sniper fire at 291035H from six VC at (BT 669009). The patrol pursued the VC but lost contact. At 291825H, a platoon from Company L was helilifted to (BS 479966) in order to reinforce a platoon from Company C, 1st Reconnaissance Battalion, which had reported that it was surrounded. Another platoon from Company L was immediately helilifted in and a perimeter defense was established for the night. No VC were encountered and there were no friendly casualties. See enclosure (10), Regimental Frag Order 4-65 to Operation Order 327-65. Also see enclosure (11), S-3 Journal.

10. Fire Support and Fire Support Coordination. The primary role filled by artillery during this month within the TAOR was that of firing harassing and interdiction fires in support of 7th Marines. The following significant events occurred.

a. From the 5th of September to 10 September, Operation PIRANHA. See enclosure (2), Operation PIRANHA After-Action Report.

b. 21 September. Artillery fired 12 rounds of HE in support of an ambushed reconnaissance patrol at (BS 510939).

c. 25 September. Artillery fired three preparations for the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines in support of Operation HARDROCK.

d. 26 September. Artillery fired 18 rounds of HE in support of ARVN forces at AN HOA in the vicinity of (BS 463873). There were four VC KIA's confirmed as a result of these rounds.

No significant or serious problems arose during this period.

11. Logistics. During the month of September several problems developed. The operations conducted, depleted the mountout blocks of repair parts. Adding to this problem was the backlog of unfilled requisitions for repair parts, therefore, higher than normal deadline percentages will occur in October. Critical shortages of common items caused excess deadline rates, e.g., brake shoes for M-422's, tire tubes for mechanical mules and tire patching material. Routine maintenance was performed with excellent results. However, the lack of proper maintenance facilities, such as strong-backed tents and cement decks presented a problem. With care and ingenuity these can be overcome. Maintenance tents are now on order to help alleviate this problem. Headquarters Company has picked up the supply accounts of attached units. These include the following.

- (1) Co C, 1st Engineer Bn
- (2) Co B, 1st Tank Bn
- (3) Co A, 3d Amtrac Bn
- (4) Det, Hq Bn, 3rd MarDiv

This has proven to be an administrative burden beyond the capabilities of organic Headquarters Supply personnel alone. Therefore, attachments are now augmenting personnel to Headquarters Company in order to handle reports and the administrative work load.

The logistics status of this Regiment at the present time is considered excellent. Although there are shortages of supplies in some areas, this organization can support logistically its mission.

12. Air Defense. Air Defense by the 7th Marines was entirely passive during the month of September.

13. Combat Air Defense. The primary mission for air support during September was troop movement, resupply, medical evacuation and AO support. The following significant events occurred.

a. 5 September to 10 September, Operation PIRANHA. See enclosure (2), Operation PIRANHA After-Action Report.

b. 21 September. MAG-36 provided armed helo and helo support for an ambushed reconnaissance patrol at (BS 510939).

c. 23 September. MAG-11 and 12 conducted TPQ-10 and Close Air Support missions against positions on the TRUNG PHAN Peninsula.

d. 25 September. MAG-36 provided troop lift and AO support for the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines during Operation HARDROCK.

14. Medical and Dental Support. From the 1st through the 5th of September 1965 there was treatment for 17 cases of mild gastroenteritis, probably of oral etiology, characterized by nausea, vomiting, diarrhea (non-bloody), chills, fever, and malaise. All symptoms and signs were gone within a 24 to 36 hour period. From the 6th to the 11th of September support was given to Operation PIRANHA. From the 12th to the 20th of September treatment was given to five cases of gastroenteritis, as described above. During the period 23-29 September, symptomatic and supportive treatment was given to 30 cases of mild gastroenteritis.

15. Chaplain Support. The support for 7th Marines during the month of September was highlighted by the Chaplains' coverage of Operation PIRANHA. One Catholic and two Protestant Chaplains participated in the assault landings, both by LVT and helicopter. Chaplains accompanied the rifle companies throughout the operation providing a vital spiritual ministry to Marines and assisting with Civil Affairs activities.

In garrison, Chaplain support included 32 Protestant and 12 Catholic Divine Services on the four Sundays of the month. Four Memorial services for Marines killed in action; eight Protestant and 26 Catholic weekday services; 8 Protestant Bible Studies and 24 lay Rosary services and extensive correspondence and counseling activities. The Chaplains continue to improve the facilities over which they have cognizance, i.e., chapels, offices, etc.

The Regimental Chaplain continues to coordinate the activities of the 13 Chaplains in the CHU LAI enclave through a weekly meeting of all the Chaplains.

16. Civil Affairs/Military Government/Community Relations. During the month of September 1965, the civil affairs program of the 7th Marines was occupied mainly with combat operations and coordinating with the District Chief at BINH SON in establishing a regular medical assistance program within our TAOR and occasionally out of the TAOR. The Regimental Civil Affairs Officer attended a three day Civil Affairs briefing in DA NANG the first of the month. Operation PIRANHA began on September 7, 1965, and lasted until September 10, 1965. During this time the regimental and battalion civil affairs officers were engaged in aiding and controlling the civilians within the operational area. Sick call and emergency medical aid was given to approximately 1,000 people during this period. Medcap supplies were taken and used by the Civil Affairs teams. In addition, QUANG NGAI Province provided two Civil Affairs teams to accompany the operation. Each team was composed of a medic, interpreter, police element, security element and a psychological warfare element. Operation HARDROCK, a battalion size operation conducted by the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines, used a civil affairs team from District Headquarters in BINH SON. Medical services were provided to civilians within the area of operation.

Captain Long, the District Chief at BINH SON, was contacted on two occasions in the latter part of September. His help was solicited in selecting hamlets within our TAOR which were in most need of medical assistance, keeping in mind added factors of security and control. The hamlet of TRUNG AN was selected by the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines as their first objective for providing medical services on a regular basis. The 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines have selected the hamlet of THANH TRA (1). It is anticipated our medical assistance program will be more extensive during the next month.

7. Supporting Forces.

a. Artillery. Two 107mm Mortar Batteries were employed in general support, one each from the Third Battalion, Eleventh Marines and the Third Battalion, Twelfth Marines. They were landed in LVT's beginning at 0930H on D-day and took up positions at coordinates 757859 and 760856 respectively. Artillery was available throughout the operation and there was no shortage of ammunition. There were no displacements required as possible target areas outside the Zone of Action that were beyond the range of mortars were within range of Naval Gun Fire.

Artillery activity consisted mainly of firing illumination and H&I fires. From 071200H to 081200H, eight H&I missions (96 rounds for U.S. Forces) and two illumination missions (14 rounds) were fired for RVN Forces. One illumination mission (6 rounds) was fired for BLT 1/7. (Note: The RVN Forces had one four-gun howitzer battery of 105's and a two-gun platoon of 155 howitzers.) From 081200H to 091200H, artillery fired one HE mission (51 rounds) and three illumination missions (60 rounds) for BLT 3/7. Although all artillery fire was timely, H&I fires cannot be accurately measured as to their effectiveness. There was no artillery fired the third day.

The relatively few artillery missions fired can be attributed to the fact that there was a small impact area containing a high population density; this coupled with announced target restrictions resulted in few artillery targets being available or required.

b. Naval Gunfire. Naval Gunfire Support for Operation PIRANHA was provided by an initial assignment of one CLG, two DD's and one APD. The combatants were subsequently relieved by one CLG and two DD's. Of the seven fire support ships participating, only three were actually requested to fire, expending a total of 1052 rounds on eight missions. Two illumination missions were requested and fired by RLIT-7 units. All destructive missions fired in this operation were in support of ARVN units. Complete shore fire control parties were attached to BLT's 1/7, 3/7, as well as 3/3 (-) in reserve. Spotter services for RVN units were accomplished through an ANGLICO airborne spotter with an ANGLICO Liaison Team located at the ARVN Quang Ngai Headquarters. Seventh Fleet units providing fire support were utilized as follows:

(1) USS OKLAHOMA CITY (CLG-5) was initially assigned direct support of BLT 3/7 and stationed in grid squares BS 7691 and 7692. The USS OKLAHOMA CITY relieved the USS ORLECK (DD-886) about 082100H to provide direct support to ARVN units, but did not fire any missions prior to being relieved by the USS GALVESTON (CLG-8) about 090945H.

(2) USS PRICHETT (DD-561) was assigned direct support of BLT 1/7 and stationed in grid square BS 7888. The USS PRICHETT fired one illumination mission totaling nine rounds prior to being relieved by the USS GALVESTON (CLG-8) about 092115H when it was apparent BLT 1/7 no longer required a direct support ship.

(3) USS ORLECK (DD-886) was initially assigned direct support of ARVN units and stationed in grid squares BS 7980. The USS ORLECK fired a total of 527 rounds of high explosive on two missions and an additional 118 rounds of illumination in direct support of BLT 3/7 after having been relieved by the USS OKLAHOMA CITY (CLG-5). The spotter reported eleven huts destroyed and 35 damaged in the ARVN Zone of Action on one mission following an expenditure of 96 rounds. The USS ORLECK (DD-886) was relieved by the USS BRAINE (DD-630)

(4) USS DIACHENKO (APD-123) was assigned in general support of RLIT-7 because it could conduct only direct fire missions. It was therefore stationed in grid square BS 7688.

(5) USS GALVESTON (CLG-8) relieved the USS OKLAHOMA CITY about 090945H to provide direct support to ARVN units. The GALVESTON expended 285 rounds 5"/38 illumination on two missions, and on three subsequent missions fired additional 133 rounds 6"/47 high capacity.

(6) USS WATKINS (DD-723) was available for direct support of ARVN units during the afternoon of 9 September but was never requested to fire.

(7) USS BRAINE (DD-630) relieved the USS ORLECK about 091330H to provide direct support to BLT 3/7, but it too, was not requested to fire.

In summary, the lack of suitable targets during Operation PIRANHA prevented the extensive use of Naval Gunfire.

c. Air. For Operation PIRANHA the USAF provided C-123 flare planes. The USA provided O-1F observation aircraft and UH-1B escort helicopters. VMG(R)-152 furnished the KC-130F for the airborne DASC. MAG-11 and MAG-12 flew close air support and MAG-16 provided UH-34D helicopters for troop lifts, resupply and medical evacuation missions. UH-1E helicopters also from MAG-16, flew escort, observation, command and psychological warfare missions. DASC personnel were provided by MASS-2.

From H-35 to H-15 MAG-12 aircraft prepared WHITE Beach under air dropped flares. The beach preparations consisted of strafing runs with 20mm HE in an attempt to detonate mines and booby traps on the landing beach. Investigation upon landing revealed that the beaches were not mined. At L-30 MAG-11 and MAG-12 aircraft commenced preparing LZ OAK and lifted their fire upon the arrival of 40 UH-34D helicopters with the first elements of BLT 3/7 aboard. After the initial troop lift, 16 of the UH-34D's went to Quang Ngai to begin lifting the RVN forces into LZ BIRCH and PINE. The remaining 24 helicopters returned to Chu Lai to complete lifting BLT 3/7. The UH-34D's were provided escort by Army and Marine armed UH-1E helicopters. LZ BIRCH received 20 minutes of preparation commencing at L-hour. Preparation of LZ PINE for 20 minutes began at L+60 and ended with the arrival of the first helicopter troop lift of RVN units into that LZ. During the assault phase, aircraft in the objective area were controlled by an airborne DASC in the modified KC-130F. The close air support aircraft remained on station during the daylight hours of the first 2½ days of the operation. Marine AO's in Army O-1F aircraft were on station throughout the operation with the capability of Tactical Air Controller, Airborne (TAC(A)), and Artillery/Naval Gun spot capability as well as aerial observation. The support provided by AO's was considered excellent throughout the operation. With the exception of the second day of PIRANHA, a command helicopter was on station during daylight hours for use by the CO of RLT-7. Upon completion of the troop lift, 12 UH-34D helicopters remained on standby for resupply and medical evacuation missions. After the pre-planned beach and LZ preparations and pre-planned troop lifts were completed, all requests for air support were submitted on the TAR net. Since the tactical situation did not call for any close air support for U.S. Forces except for one landing zone preparation for BLT 3/7 on D+1, all requests were for helicopter observation support. When DASC had complete control of the HD system and when enough helicopters were available, the reaction time and effectiveness was good. During the first two days the USS PRINCETON (LPH-5) was controlling helicopter part of the time and this slowed reaction time and effectiveness.

A shortage of helicopters caused delays in reaction time on the third day. The USAF flare plane was on station or strip alert each night all night. Although the flares were dropped accurately and timely there were a large number of flares that did not ignite. During a night sweep and clear operation conducted by DIT 3/7, the intended constant illumination for its operation in the area was interrupted by periods in which flares failed to ignite.

b. Source of intelligence on VC units in area was considered valid as of 27 August 1965 and was obtained from 3rd MarDiv Operation Order 330-65.

c. VC Strength and Situation actually found as Operation was conducted.

(1) No actual organized resistance as such was found during the period of operations. VC activity consisted initially of light sporadic fire in the IIZ and light sniper fire on the beach. As the operation proceeded south on the cape of Phu Qui and An Hai villages, brief encounters with small groups of VC were made while searching out and destroying caves and bunkers.

d. VC Units Identified. No VC units were identified. However, when the detailed interrogation reports on the VC are completed by III MAF IIT and are made available, it is quite possible that some VC unit identification will be made.

e. Significant Intelligence Gained.

(1) Through the initial tactical interrogation reports of VC it was determined that the bulk of VC units in the area fled approximately 3 to 4 days prior to landing. Civilians (women) in Chau Me (2) stated that 3 days prior to our landing that all the fishermen, some of which were VC, left in boats and had not returned. This activity coincided with the increased activity of Junk Force 15, and the increase of ship movements in the Chu Lai area. In view of the above, it is apparent that attention must be given to the security aspects and tactical deception in the planning and in conduct of future operations involving amphibious forces.

(2) There was sufficient evidence found in the area of operation to definitely establish the area as a VC training area, supply area, hospital area and a probable point of infiltration. Without the detailed interrogation reports it is impossible at this time to definitely establish the mode and direction from which the infiltration occurs. It is believed, however, that the infiltration occurs by land generally from a northwest direction and from the north by sea. The infiltration from the sea could be controlled more efficiently by checking the numerous fishing boat movements, particularly night movement. These fishing boats carry VC from one fishing village or hamlet to another with boats making short and numerous stops for the VC on the way to their final destination. Additionally, closer observation as to the influx numbers and activity of these fishing boats could probably give an indication as to possible VC unit and supply movements.

(3) Further information was gained as to possible VC communications when in Chau Me (2) approximately 30 to 40 pigeons were discovered. It appears that the VC are using this as a method of communications.

(2) Observation and Fields of Fire.

(a) The high ground on the rocky headlands southeast of National Intelligence Survey (NIS) Landing Beach 12 afforded excellent observation of sea approaches and the beach. Long range fields of fire for direct fire weapons were excellent and enfiladed the beach along its entire length.

(b) Observation and fields of fire over NIS Landing Beach 13 were excellent from the headlands at the northeast end of the beach.

(c) The high ground on the peninsula proper provided excellent observation and fields of fire over the eastern approaches. Observation and fields of fire over beach exits from NIS Landing Beach 12 were limited due to shrub growth and scattered pines.

(d) Nui A Linh (BS 7285) provided excellent observation and fields of fire over the northwestern, central and southwestern approaches to the peninsula.

(e) Hill 108 (BS 6982) afforded excellent observation and fields of fire over the western approaches but was partially hindered by roughly dissecting terrain and shrub growth in the vicinity of BS 6681 and BS 6781.

(f) Hill 144 (BS 7686) provided excellent observation and fields of fire over western and northwestern approaches to the peninsula.

(3) Cover and Concealment.

(a) The pine and shrub growth to the south of NIS Landing Beach 12 afforded concealment for individuals and small units. Some cover was provided from direct fire weapons by the dunes paralleling the beach.

(b) Built up areas provided concealment for individuals and small units.

(c) The terraced paddies on the peninsula proper provided protection from direct fire weapons.

(4) Avenues of Approach.

(5) Weather. The weather throughout the period of operation was generally clear and fair and in no way hampered air or ground operations.

9. Mission. In order to destroy Viet Cong forces and positions, RL7-7 executed a combined amphibious and heliborne assault on Cap Batangan in conjunction with heliborne RVN forces landing on the An Ky Peninsula.

10. Concept of Operation.

(1) Operation PIRANHA was divided into two phases. During Phase I, RL7-7 in conjunction with two RVN battalions was to execute a search and clear operation on Cap Batangan and An Ky Peninsula at H-hour on D-day. To implement this, BLT 3/7 was to be landed by helicopters on the high ground at (BS 7285) (BS 729849) (BS 727858) at L-hour. Initially they were to occupy blocking positions and protect the RL7-7 west flank.

At H-hour BLT 1/7 was to execute an amphibious landing over WHITE Beach in the vicinity of (BS 760866) and then sweep through the dune line to search and clear CHAU ME (2), CHAU THUAN (1), CHAU THUAN (2), CHAU ME (1), and, on order, AN THINH (2). One platoon of BLT 1/7 was to be left as security for the Beach Support Area (BSA).

The 3rd Battalion, VMMC, was to execute a helicopter landing in the vicinity of (BS 700809) and establish a blocking position. At the same time the 2nd Battalion, 4th Regiment, 2d Division ARVN, was to execute a heliborne landing in the vicinity of (BS 716781) to carry out a search and clear operation on the An Ky Peninsula and secure the causeway located to the southwest. They were also to search and clear CON CHIEU-DONG XUAN Village area complex to the Northeast.

During both phases BLT 3/3 (-) was to be embarked aboard amphibious shipping as the RLT-7 reserve.

## II. Execution.

### a. Planning. See enclosure (1).

(1) On 26 August RLT-7 received a warning order that it was to participate in Operation PIRANHA. This warning order started the planning stage of the operation that culminated on 6 September 1965 when the RLT boarded amphibious shipping.

b. D-day, 7 September. The 7th of September was designated as D-day. During the night of the 6th and early morning of the 7th the shipping and the junk fleet screen moved into positions around Amphibious Objective Area (AOA). By 0550H on D-day, the USS PRICHETT (DD-531), in direct support of BLT 1/7, was on station northwest of the promontory left of WHITE Beach. At 0555H aerial flares illuminated WHITE Beach for preparatory air strikes. The beach was strafed from 0555H to 0615H to detonate mines along the water's edge and to deny the VC the opportunity to plan additional moves. At 0620H planes laid a smoke screen across the promontory on the south flank of the beach.

### (1) BLT 1/7 on D-day. See enclosure (2).

(a) From 0625H to 0635H the second wave of LVT's sprayed the beach with machinegun fire in order to protect the two LVTE-1's in the first wave. At 0628H the first wave, consisting of two LVTE-1's, landed. The left LVTE-1 fired a line charge on an azimuth of 180 degrees magnetic but the charge failed to detonate. This failure also rendered the second line charge inoperative. Both discharges were salvaged and used for demolition charges. The second LVTE-1, also firing on 180 degree azimuth, was successful in firing and detonating both of its charges.

(b) The second wave of LVT's, carrying the assault elements of Companies A and C, landed at 0635H. The troops dismounted at the water edge and deployed. A few rounds of sniper fire were received at the center of the beach but there was no organized resistance. As the assault elements moved inland, the LVTE-1's ploughed a safe passageway for following troops from the beach to the Assembly Area. The reserve elements of Companies A and C landed in the third wave at 0610H and proceeded to their Assembly Area.

(c) The fourth wave of LVT's, consisting of Company B (-) and the 81mm Mortar Platoon, landed at 0648H. One LVT, loaded with Company B personnel, had mechanical failure and did not reach the beach. However, the intact elements of Company B proceeded inland to the Assembly Area (BS 759863).

(d) At 0652H the fifth wave, consisting of elements of Company B, Command Group Alpha, and two Ontos landed. At the same time the free boat LVT, carrying the BLT Commander landed. The BLT CP was then established at (BS 759864).

(e) By 0741 on D-day, Companies A and C seized Battalion Objective A (BS 760857), without enemy contact. They did, however, encounter approximately 190 civilians from CHAU ME (2). Two civilians, who had been wounded during the air strikes, were evacuated for medical aid.

(f) At 0842H Company D with two tanks was landed by an LCU. After reaching the Battalion Assembly Area, Company D began a search and clear operation of CHAU ME (2). One male, suspected of being a VC, was detained. At 0846H Company C was ordered to seize Battalion Objective C (BS 772852), which they secured without incident by 0915H. At the same time Battalion Objective C was secured, Company B was ordered to seize Battalion Objective B (BS 778665) which they found forty or fifty carrier pigeons at (BS 777858). Company B secured Battalion Objective B by 1230H and was ordered to seize and secure Battalion Objective F, (BS 782862).

(g) At 1030H a LVTE-1 detonated two explosive charges (BS 765860), damaging one of the teeth on the LVTE-1's plow. Then at 1200H, in the same general vicinity, a Vietnamese male, suspected of being a Viet Cong, emerged from a cave and was captured. Company B secured Bn Objective F (BS 782862), by 1353H and was ordered to seize Bn Objective I (BS 790858), which they accomplished without incident by 1420H. Company D was moved by LVT to an attack position (BS 752864), from which they were to seize Battalion Objective D (BS 753854). While clearing and searching CHAU ME (1) in the vicinity of Battalion Objective D, Company D destroyed three small tunnels. The Battalion Objective was secured by 1536H and the 3rd platoon was detached in order to provide security for the Beach Support Area (BSA).

(h) At 1430H Company B found nine VC in a cave in the vicinity of Battalion Objective I (BS 790858). After a short fire fight, three VC were killed and six captured. Simple Viet Cong training aids such as wooden rifles and manuals were also found in the cave. Between 1500H and 1600H the company encountered radio jamming in the form of music and jabbering. Company D occupied Battalion Objective G relieving Company C in order that Battalion Objective G could be searched and cleared. Battalion Objective G, (BS 772848), was secured by 1809H. In doing so, Company C found some French medical supplies consisting of vitamins, antibiotics and syringes in a man-made tunnel (BS 773844). While searching CHAU THUAN (2), an elderly man told Company C that 90% of the young men in the village were VC and frequently went out at night on VC missions. He also stated that some young men armed with Russian bolt rifles had left the village that morning.

(i) After securing ~~Battalion Objective G~~, Company C was ordered to advance and seize Objective H (BS 776847). Enroute to Battalion Objective H the company found many fresh foxholes and a number of punji traps along the road between CHAU THUAN (1) and (2) and beside the trail up to Battalion Objective H. Between 1700H and 1800H the BLT 1/7 CP and the 81mm Mortar platoon were displaced to a new location at (BS 772854). At 1709H an air observer (AO) spotted and received fire from VC at (BS 776847).

(j) At 1707H Company A displaced from Battalion Objective A (BS 760857), to Battalion Objective J (BS 782862) via the new BLT CP where they were resupplied with rations and water. After sunset their march route was illuminated by 81mm mortars. They reached Battalion Objective J at 2150H and tied in with Company C. During the night Company B and C conducted security patrols of assigned sectors but no contact was made.

(2) BLT 3/7 D-Day See enclosure (2).

(a) At 0620H thirty minutes of preplanned preparatory air strikes were conducted on Landing Zone OAK, paving the way for the first wave of BLT 3/7. At 0650 the first elements of Company K landed by helicopters at Landing Site ROBIN (BS 731840), to set up a blocking position on Hill #42. The remainder of the company landed at 0829H and strengthened the position. No enemy resistance was encountered.

(b) After the landing of the first wave of BLT 3/7, sixteen helicopters were used to transport the 2d Battalion, 4th Regiment, 2d Division ARVN to coordinates (BS 716781) and the 3rd Marine Battalion VMMC to coordinates (BS 700809). The two Vietnamese Battalions began landing at 0715H and immediately set up defensive blocking positions before conducting search and clear operations in a northeasterly direction.

(c) Company I commenced landing at Landing Site SPARROW (BS 727852) at 0720H. They immediately set up a blocking position and spent the rest of the day improving their position. At 1800H a two platoon ambush was set up in the vicinity of (BS 731842).

(d) Elements of Company M landed at Landing Site KIWI, (BS 727859) at 0700H, followed by the rest of the company at 0930H. A fire team reconnaissance patrol which was sent to make a reconnaissance of LEIN QUANG (3) at 0800, returned at 1000H and reported that they had received 10 rounds of sniper fire from the village. There were no casualties.

(e) A reinforced platoon was sent to search and clear LEIN QUANG (3) at 1145 but met with no enemy contact nor obtained anything of intelligence value.

(f) At 1330H the 3rd platoon of Company M was helilifted to coordinates (BS 745875) to conduct a sweep of a heavy timber area on which a ten minute air strike had been conducted prior to their landing. Two Vietnamese, hiding in a likely ambush sight, were fired on when sighted. They both fled, apparently unharmed and with no visible weapons. At 1800H, Company M set up night blocking positions at coordinates (BS 734874), (BS 734875) and (BS 732865). At 1830H the 2nd platoon of Company M reported finding the body of a Vietnamese male at coordinates (BS 732865). He had apparently died of shrapnel wounds.

He appeared to be about twenty years old and had nothing in his possession except clothing and a rice bag which was tied around his neck.

(g) At 2200H the 2d platoon of Company L set up a blocking position overlooking PHU MY (2), (BS 728834).

(h) Company L landed in two heliborne waves at Landing Site EAGLE (BS 724855) at 0800H and 0845H. At 1330H the company conducted search and clear operations in villages PHUOC SON (2) and LIEN QUANG (2). A French carbine and material for constructing booby traps were found during the search.

(i) At 1200H Company L returned to the landing site to set up a night blocking position from (BS 721851) to (BS 729860).

c. D+1, September 1965.

(1) BLT 3/7 on D+1 See enclosure (5).

(a) On D+1 at 0200H Company I's ambush rejoined the company after encountering no enemy. At 0630H two platoons of Company I began a search and clear operation from the northwest side of PHU NHIEU (4). After destroying three small, empty, L-shaped tunnels, they found a major tunnel network in the southeast portion of the village. The cave had at least eight entrances, was four to six feet wide, three to six feet high and was about 200 feet long. Three male VCS were captured and evacuated. The tunnels were only partially destroyed because of their size and the lack of sufficient demolitions within the company.

(b) The rest of Company I joined the two searching platoons and set up a defensive perimeter southeast of the village. They remained in this position for the rest of the day. At 0700H, D+1, Company K (-) began sweeping through PHU MY toward the blocking position that the 2d platoon held on the other side of the village. One fleeing VC was killed when he refused to halt after repeated attempts were made to stop him. Several large cave systems were searched and destroyed but nothing of intelligence value was uncovered. At 1600H, Company K moved into a defensive position in the vicinity of (BS 733838). The 1st platoon set in a night defensive position in the vicinity of (BS 728857) at 2000H. Companies L and M remained in their blocking positions throughout D+1.

(2) BLT 1/7 on D+1

(a) At 0945H on D+1 Company B and accompanied by Associated Press United Press and other news reporters began search and clear operations in the company zone. At 1230H six VCS were captured in a cave in the vicinity of (BS 789847). From this cave four VC were captured immediately. Other VC started firing from the mouth of the cave. After a futile effort to get the occupants of the cave to cease fire and surrender, demolitions were exploded in the mouth of the cave. Sixty-six VC were killed with none surviving the explosion. The cave contained a quantity of Chinese medical supplies, twenty five grenades, VC uniforms, two M-1 rifles, small arms ammunition, 6000 piasters and some packs. During the search of the cave a lieutenant and eight Marines were overcome by the lack of oxygen. The lieutenant did not recover and died of asphyxia. Near the cave Marines from Company B exchanged fire with two snipers in spider holes. The snipers were wounded and captured.

(b) At 0927H BLT 1/7 CP was moved from the CP position to coordinates (BS 783847). At about 1300H, while searching and clearing a portion of PHY QUI at (BS 788449), Company A received machine gun fire from a tunnel which was excavated in a zig zag pattern. The cave was four feet in diameter enabling only one person room enough to operate freely. The leading Marine of the search party returned the VC fire with an automatic rifle and grenades. After several minutes of fire fight, four VC were coaxed out of the cave with the aid of an AN/PIQ-5 bullhorn. Two of them were wounded. A sub-machinegun with six rounds and a U.S. Carbine with eighteen rounds was captured. One of the newly captured VC led Company A to another cave nearby and coaxed ten VC to surrender, three of which were women. The cave also produced VC uniforms, medical supplies, five grenades and four trip flares.

(c) At 1830H Company A evacuated the 14 prisoners and set up a defensive perimeter at (BS 780825). At 1300H when Companies A, B, and C began to commence a coordinated sweep, Company C received sniper fire at (BS 785844) and encountered a booby trap which was disarmed. The trap consisted of a grenade to be electrically detonated surrounded by two 60mm Mortar rounds and an eight inch Naval shell. While sweeping through the village of AN HAI (1), Company C received fire from six VC who disappeared into a cave. When the VC refused to come out, the cave was assaulted resulting in the death of four VC and three young women. It appeared that the VC had used the women as a human protective wall from the blast of the grenades. The men were apparently killed by the concussion, and the women by shrapnel. Two more VC were captured at another entrance to the cave, one of them wounded.

(d) Company C then established a night defensive position at coordinates (BS 766832). At 0940H Company D relieved Company C on Battalion Objective H (BS 779842), and assumed the mission of supporting A and C Companies by fire. At 1830H Company D and the Battalion OP group moved out to set up a defensive position on Hill #32 at (BS 785828). Enroute they encountered five VC one of which was armed with a carbine. A fire fight ensued in which two VC were killed and three Marines received light wounds from a grenade. It was later learned that one of the dead VC was a warrant officer with 11 years of service. Company D left one platoon at coordinates (BS 775833) to provide security for three mechanical mules which were temporarily broken down. The rest of the company set up a defensive position for the night.

d. D+2, 9 September 1965. See enclosure (6).

(1) BLT 1/7 on D+2

(a) On D+2 Company B continued search and clear operations. Several caves were found and destroyed. One extremely large cave was built in a horse-shoe shape around a slope (BS 790845). It has at least four entrances and was large enough to billet approximately 500 persons. It was estimated that at least 500 pounds of demolitions and 100 feet of detonating cord would be necessary to destroy the cave. The cave was empty but contained numerous sleeping compartments. The cave was roughly 500 feet long and was not fully destroyed because of lack of sufficient demolitions.

(b) At 1230H, a VC threw a grenade from a cave at coordinates (BS 788839). A fire fight ensued and the VC was killed. Two .45 caliber U.S. pistols were captured. At 1300H a VC was killed by Company B while trying to escape from a cave at (BS 788839).

At 1615H a VC was killed, (BS 792841), after he fired on members of Company B. Marines retaliated by tossing a white phosphorous grenade into the tunnel. As the VC occupying the cave came running out, fifteen of them were subdued in "hand to hand" combat and 16 were shot trying to escape. At dusk Company B established a defensive position on the northern one-third of a three company battalion perimeter on Hill #38 at grid square (BS 7784).

(c) Company A captured fifty-one VCS in AN HAI (1) while searching their Zone of Action. The company administered first aid to the people of the village as a gesture of good will, however, the villagers became hysterical when the fifty-one VCS were marched away. At 1800H Company A established a night defensive position on the southeastern portion of the battalion defensive perimeter, Hill #38.

(d) On D+2 Company C conducted search and clear operations simultaneously in TAN DUC, northern AN HAI (1) and AN HAI (2). During the search, Company C discovered several unoccupied caves containing medical supplies, packs, flags, food, and a French carbine. One cave extending 660 feet, (BS 767829) to (BS 765832), was found in the village of AN HAI (2). It had two levels with airfield panels and barbed wire hatches between the levels.

(e) Approximately 125 young men from AN HAI (2) were rounded up and screened. From this group one ARVN deserter, one Chinese citizen, and one VC squad leader were identified. These three and twenty-five other suspects were evacuated. About 1830H while moving back to a night defensive position, Company C encountered sniper fire. In the ensuing assault one Marine was wounded slightly by an M-79 fragment in the shoulder. Company C took a position in the south portion of the battalion perimeter.

(f) On D+2 Company D (-) searched and cleared grid squares (BS 7782) and (BS 7882). Several large caves were destroyed and one VCS captured. The 3rd platoon of Company D, still guarding the BSA, killed one VC and captured a carbine from a group of five VC escaping from within the BSA perimeter. At 1600H Company D (-) began moving to the BLT perimeter, where security was established for BLT 1/7 CP.

(2) BLT 3/7 on D+2

(a) At 090345H a coordinated three company search and clear operation was conducted in the village of CHAU BINH (1) and CHAU ME (1) by BLT 3/7. Company M on the left, Company I in the center, and Company L on the right moving from northeast to southwest. Illumination from Naval Gunfire artillery, and air provided light in the initial stages of the search.

(b) At 0915H Company I completed its search, apprehending three VCS. At 1000H Company I swept back across its zone uncovering several tunnels which were unoccupied. At 1430H Company I assumed a security role for BLT-7 CP at coordinates (BS 759859).

(c) At 090700H Company K finished its sweep with negative results. At this time the 3rd platoon was sent to search the river banks as they proceeded to company assembly point at (BS 768843). At 1500H the 3rd platoon rejoined the company in the assembly area and reported one VC KIA and nine VCS captured. At 1600H Company K swept eastward to the vicinity of (BS 784853) where a defensive position for the night was established.

(d) Company L completed their initial sweep at 090530H. At 1430H Company L became the left flank of a coordinated battalion sweep eastward to the night defensive position. Company M was in the center and Company K on the right flank during the 1530H coordinated sweep through the 3/7 Zone of Action.

(e) At 091330H the BLT 3/7 CP displaced by helicopter to (BS 762855).

e. D+3, 10 September 1965

(1) On D+3 the search and clear operations in the 3/7 Zone of Action were completed and retraction to the CHU LAI area began at 101200H. During the movement to the assembly area, a Lance Corporal from Company M was killed by the accidental explosion of his rifle grenade. By 101715H all elements of BLT 3/7 had been helilifted back to CHU LAI.

(2) BLT 1/7 began returning to WHITE Beach at 0800H on D+3 in order to commence backloading on the USS BAYFIELD (APA-33). All elements of the battalion were on board by 1430H and returned to the CHU LAI defensive position by 102100H.

12. Results. The following table is a summary of enemy casualties and equipment losses which were visibly confirmed by U.S. Forces.

### 13. Administrative Matters.

#### a. Supply and Logistics.

(1) General - Upon receipt of the warning order from 3rd Marine Division, the Administrative Order with a Medical annex, Shore Party annex, and Landing Force Supplies annex was prepared and issued. The order fully supported the operation.

#### (2) Supply.

##### (a) Methods of Supply.

1 Prior to the establishment of Shore Party on the beach, the Landing Force was supplied from a floating dump located on the USS CABILDO (LSD-16). As soon as the beach was cleared the Shore Party established its facilities ashore and the Landing Force was supplied from that organization.

During this operation RLT-7 was operating approximately 24 miles from its normal source of supply. Roads from that source of supply to the objective area were not sufficiently secure for supply convoys; therefore, it was necessary to establish a Beach Support Area (BSA), manned by a Shore Party organization. Another benefit derived from the BSA was in turn-around time saved on helicopters. Turn-around time for helicopters to CHU LAI was 28 minutes not including loading time. By establishing the BSA, supplies were available to any means of transportation in a matter of very few minutes. Additionally, the availability of supplies in the objective area allowed assault units to carry a lighter prescribed load, a most important consideration in view of the heat.

2 Approximately 90% of resupply to the BLT's was done by helicopters. This was necessary because of uncovered routes to the BLT's for wheeled and tracked vehicles. Terrain also prohibited the use of tracked or wheeled vehicles to a great extent

3 As in Operation STARLITE, the greatest difficulty was in the availability of helicopters for resupply at the particular time they were needed. There are many reasons why helicopters must be locally available to the commander in this type of operation. Companies are spread out searching and clearing villages making resupply or medical evacuation difficult. There are not enough doctors, nor is it practical to send a doctor with each of these companies, consequently the reaction of helicopters to these needs must be instantaneous.

The separation of companies from battalions and battalions from regiment brings with it a requirement for frequent conferences of unit commanders with subordinate commanders. Because of the terraced terrain, flooded paddies, and poor roads, the primary means of getting these things done is by helicopter. It is felt that the only solution to this problem is to assign two helicopters for these purposes to each battalion. The DASC is reluctant to release helicopters to battalions because of their possible exposure to the dangers of friendly fire. However, this danger can be overcome and the safety of the aircraft assured, in that they could be dispatched by the Battalion Air Liaison Officer who would report their route and destination to the DASC making their location known at all times. Regardless of the system to be used, a solution to this problem must be forthcoming. In both this operation and Operation STARLITE there were sufficient supplies available and staged for delivery but delivery frequently was delayed because of helicopters not being timely available for transportation.

4 Water Supply. The Engineer Company established a water point in the Beach Support Area that provided water in adequate quantities and quality for the RLt.

HqCo, 7th Marines, including attachments, carried 150 five-gallon water cans, one lister bag and five 400-gallon water trailers on this operation. The average consumption of water was  $1\frac{1}{2}$  gallons per man per day.

1st Battalion, 7th Marines carried 244 five-gallon water cans and one 400 gallon water trailer. This battalion consumed an average of two gallons per man per day.

3rd Battalion, 7th Marines carried 250 water cans and consumed an average of two gallons per man per day.

Some difficulty was experienced in keeping enough water cans for resupply. It is recommended that each battalion carry 300 five-gallon water cans on future operations of this nature. It is further recommended that more lister bags and water trailers be utilized by Headquarters and CP units in order to free additional water cans for use by assault units.

(3) Transportation. As mentioned above, most transportation was accomplished by helicopter. When helicopters were available no significant transportation problems were encountered.

The use of Amphibian Tractors and wheeled vehicles was seriously hampered by terrain and poor routes. It was found that on this operation almost all the roads led through the middle of villages.

They were so narrow that no supply vehicle could get through without destroying civilian property. Additionally, many roads led into flooded paddies or into terraced hills or fields making it impossible for wheeled or tracked vehicles to negotiate.

(4) Maintenance. Only first and second echelon maintenance was performed in the field because of the short duration of the operation. End item replacement was made from the RLT rear, and the FLSU at CHU LAI met third and fourth echelon requirements.

(5) Medical. Because of the light casualties sustained on the operation there was no real test of the hospitalization and evacuation plan. The same can be said of the treatment of casualties in the field. However, it is judged that the medical plan would have been quite adequate even had greater casualties occurred.

(6) Embarkation.

(a) RLT-7 was assigned one LPH, two LSD's, three LST's, three LCU's, and two LCMB's for this operation. Although there was much unused space, all of the shipping was needed to support the Landing Plan and the scheme of maneuver ashore. Loading plans were drawn up by the RLT and approved by each ship's commanding officer. RLT-7 commenced loading at 041904H and completed loading at 061800H.

(b) During loading it was found that the seaward section of the causeway could not support M-48 tanks. The recommended solution is to load all heavy equipment into LCU's/LCMB's during high tide, causing them to ford only two feet of water.

(c) Unloading at the objective area was accomplished during high tide. Boats grounded out and the troops that came ashore by this means had to wade through approximately four feet of water. All one-half ton and one-fourth ton vehicles were removed from LCU's and LCM's, after grounding out by loading them into LVT's and shuttling them ashore. If unloading could have been accomplished at low tide, the boats could beach on the sand bar thereby causing troops and equipment to ford only three to six inches of water.

(d) Backloading of troops and equipment commenced at 100715H and proceeded at a steady and smooth rate. Naval Beach Group and PHIBRON-7 personnel controlled the lighterage while Shore Party regulated the loading. All ships were administratively loaded and backloading was completed at 101740H. No significant problems were encountered during the backloading phase.

(e) Unloading commenced at CHU LAI at approximately 101740H. Tanks were able to unload over the causeway, as they obtained enough speed coming off the LCU's to get off the end section of the causeway before it sank. The tank commander requested not to load or unload by an at-sea marriage. Unloading was completed at 110730H.

(f) Summary. The overage of shipping was necessary due to the following factors:

(a) The amount of tracked vehicles precluded the use of the weather decks on the LST's.

(b) The LPH was required as the principal point of casualty evacuation.

(c) The APA was required for the number of troops which participate and the communications requirement for the RLT-7 Command Group during the ship-to-shore phase, and during the tactical withdrawal of troops from the objective area.

Overall the entire embarkation/debarkation phases of Operation PIRANHA proceeded smoothly and the only problems encountered were minor in nature and easily solved.

(7) Communications.

(a) Communications during the embarkation and movement to the objective phases were normal and no difficulties were encountered.

(b) On D-day, no communications problems were encountered during the assault phase.

1 The RLT Command Post displaced by normal echelon and all circuits were activated and operating ashore, with the exception of Division Command #1, by H+3 $\frac{1}{2}$  hours. The Division Command #1 did not become operational ashore until about 2100H on D-day due to failure of both KW-7 (On-line Crypto equipment) and AN/GGC-3 teletype equipment. This problem of equipment failure was amplified by the difficulty in obtaining circuit time to conduct the necessary alignment and synchronization tests with the USS BAYFIELD (APA-33), which was the closest station. An inordinate amount of circuit time was pre-empted by 3rd Marine Division Headquarters in sending queries to RLT-7 (Forward) as to the status of communications.

2 The PU-348 Generator brought on the operation for a battery charging facility broke down in the first hour of operation ashore. It was replaced with the spare PE-75 from the Communications Center. The battery re-charging and maintenance facility was completely satisfactory throughout the operation.

(c) On D-day plus one, radio communications were still not established on a continuous basis with Division Headquarters and in many instances messages were relayed through the USS BAYFIELD (APA-33) and units in the CHU LAI area. Long wire and "V" type antennas were experimented with but did not appreciably improve communications.

(d) On D-day plus two, the PE-75, providing power for the Communications Center failed and was evacuated to FLSU #1. An immediate replacement was obtained. A shortage of battery, BA-414 developed and none was available through the logistical sources although they had been requested prior to the operation. Sufficient assets were available at the RLT-7 Rear CP to provide for austere operations and these batteries were obtained and used. Additional experiments were conducted with antennas with no success.

(e) On D-day plus three, the RLT commenced backloading and no unusual problems developed during the retraction.

(f) The radio-relay terminal installed aboard the USS BAYFIELD (APA-33) received little use during this operation. An AN/MRC-62 radio-relay terminal ashore would have been feasible and could have carried a large amount of the communications load to higher headquarters if the equipment had been available. It is recommended that future operations of this type contain provisions for the attachment of a radio-relay team from the Communications Company of the Division Headquarters Battalion.

(g) In some instances, SITREPS and INTSUMS were delayed in submission to 3rd Marine Division Headquarters because of queries from that Headquarters with an "Immediate" precedence for the identical information that was contained in Regimental SITREPS and INTSUMS that were being attempted to send out simultaneously with only a "Priority" precedence.

(8) Engineers.

(a) The company headquarters was in general support of the RLT and assigned the mission of supplying potable water for the RLT. The two platoons were attached to the BLT's.

(b) The mission of the 1st platoon was initially mine clearing of the beach and assembly areas and all roads leading into and out of the assembly area. This was to be accomplished thru the use of the LVTE-1's and mine detector teams. Additionally, the engineers attached to the companies were to be used in the destruction of all caves, tunnels and booby traps encountered.

(c) The employment of the LVTE-1's was very effective. The line charges that were fired cleared a path twelve feet to sixteen feet wide, three feet deep and approximately three hundred feet long.

(d) The 3d platoon (-) was used as a general supporting element to Battalion Landing Team 3/7. The ultimate breakdown of the platoon was as follows: seven man demolitions teams were attached to India, Kilo, Lima and Mike Companies and the coordinating or headquarters portion of the platoon, also a seven man team, was attached to H&S Company.

(e) The various missions of the demolitions teams were: destruction of enemy caches, strongholds and caves; destruction of captured food stores and ammunition; mapping and plotting of caves using grid coordinates and providing of reconnaissance patrols for the location of mines and boobytraps.

(f) The company used a total of 3,227 pounds of Composition C4 and ten 40 pound cratering charges during the operation for destroying a total of forty-four caves and/or tunnels. Four projected line charges, M-125, were used on the operation.

A total of 18,000 gallons of potable water were issued during the operation. The water was obtained from an open well that was cleared and excavated by a TD-18. The water needed only chlorine treatment.

(g) Recommendations.

- 1 Battle lanterns be provided for those people searching the tunnels.
- 2 Demolition teams be allowed enough time to adequately set their charge.
- 3 Automatic weapons such as the .45 Cal sub-machine gun be used by searching teams.

(9) Summary. The logistics effort on this operation was satisfactory. The use of Shore Party on the beach provided an excellent means for water supply, resupply to the BLT's and temporary prisoner of war detention. The only significant problem encountered was the occasional non-availability of helicopters for resupply missions.

14. Special Equipment and Techniques.

a. This was the first combat operation in which the LVTE-1 was used. Of the two LVTE-1's used only one fired both its charges without difficulty. When the second fired its line charge, rockets for both line charges ignited causing the bottom pallet and line charge to be useless. The top line charge fired but failed to detonate. Both LVTE-1's were used in ploughing passageways for troops, vehicles, and other LVT's. One LVTE-1 had its blade slightly damaged when it detonated an explosive charge which the VC had buried in the sand.

b. Two Civil Affairs teams, composed of ARVN from QUANG NGAI, accompanied RL7-7 on Operation PIRANHA. One team was composed of eight members and the other team of seven members. Each team had a medic, interpreter, police element, security element, and psychological warfare element. BLT 1/7 and BLT 3/7 each had one of these teams to use at its discretion. On D-day, BLT 1/7 encountered approximately 250 civilians in their landing area. The Civil Affairs team was employed in controlling, caring for, and questioning them. The refugees were kept at a collection point where they were provided with food and water. They were adequately controlled by a small group of MP's throughout this operation.

c. A sick call was held on D+1 and D+2 for approximately 500 civilians. MEDCAP supplies were used in treating the sick and injured. Soap was dispensed to the people with instructions on how to use it. It was noted that there was a noticeable change in the attitude of the people after receiving medical aid. They became more receptive and cooperative, making the civil affairs operations quite rewarding.

15. Commander's Analysis.

a. The basic tactics employed during Operation PIRANHA were sound and proved effective. The lessons learned were connected with the implementation of tactical doctrine rather than the tactics themselves.

b. The success of Operation PIRANHA revolved around the locating, searching and destruction of the numerous well-hidden tunnels throughout the area. In carrying out these operations, it was apparent that the searching units will have to be furnished with additional equipment such as battle lanterns, rope, lightweight telephone communications from the searching party to the mouth of the cave, Navy Oxygen Breathing Apparatus (Type A-3 with canister), and tear gas. Although tear gas has been prohibited, its use would save the lives of civilians and Marines alike and provide a more discriminatory method of clearing enemy positions than does the use of WP or HE grenades.

c. Air Observers over the battle area were very helpful in both observing the enemy activity and aiding in the coordination of friendly units.

d. The junk fleet screen to the seaward around the peninsula was particularly effective.

e. Problems arose in the timely availability of helicopters for resupply purposes. If two helicopters were given the single mission of supporting a battalion the battalion would be capable of timely accomplishing its own resupply and evacuation. A helicopterborne battalion, that relies entirely on helicopters for resupply, needs to have helicopters available constantly.

#### 16. Recommendations.

a. It is recommended that infantry platoons be provided with battle lantern rope, Navy Oxygen Breathing Apparatus (Type A-3 with canisters), and a lightweight telephone communication capability to be used in the search and clearing of caves. It is also recommended that tear gas be used in conjunction with field protective masks while clearing caves.

b. The administrative requirement of paragraphs 6. and 8. of enclosure (1) to Division (Forward) Order 3040.2 are impractical in that paragraph 6. requires Statements of Recognition in triplicate on all deaths and paragraph 8. requires a certification in triplicate that a Class "A" uniform for the deceased is not available. To implement paragraph 6., each company needs at least two men from each company (total of ten) at the evacuation point to identify the remains of deceased members of their unit. For an RLT Operation this could tie up 42 men for the identification remains at the evacuation point. It is recommended that both paragraph 6. and 8. of the aforementioned order be deleted and identification of KLA's be accomplished by ID tags, fingerprints or dentures and that the identification be accomplished by qualified graves registration, or other qualified personnel.

c. Because of the complications of poor telephone connections and the time consuming process of calling through five telephone exchanges with the constant problem that one is down or busy, it is recommended that the field phone be used for serious injuries and deaths while non-serious casualties be reported through a courier.

d. It is recommended that a receipt system be established to ensure accurate accountability of POW's between RLT and Division Collecting Points.

e. In future operations of this type, more time should be made available to clearing units so that they may more thoroughly search and destroy tunnels and trenches. In cases where this is not possible, Naval Gunfire can be called in to destroy the positions if they are not in the vicinity of villages.

f. Because of frequent contacts with Vietnamese by small units during search and clear operations, it is recommended that each rifle platoon be provided with at least one interpreter.

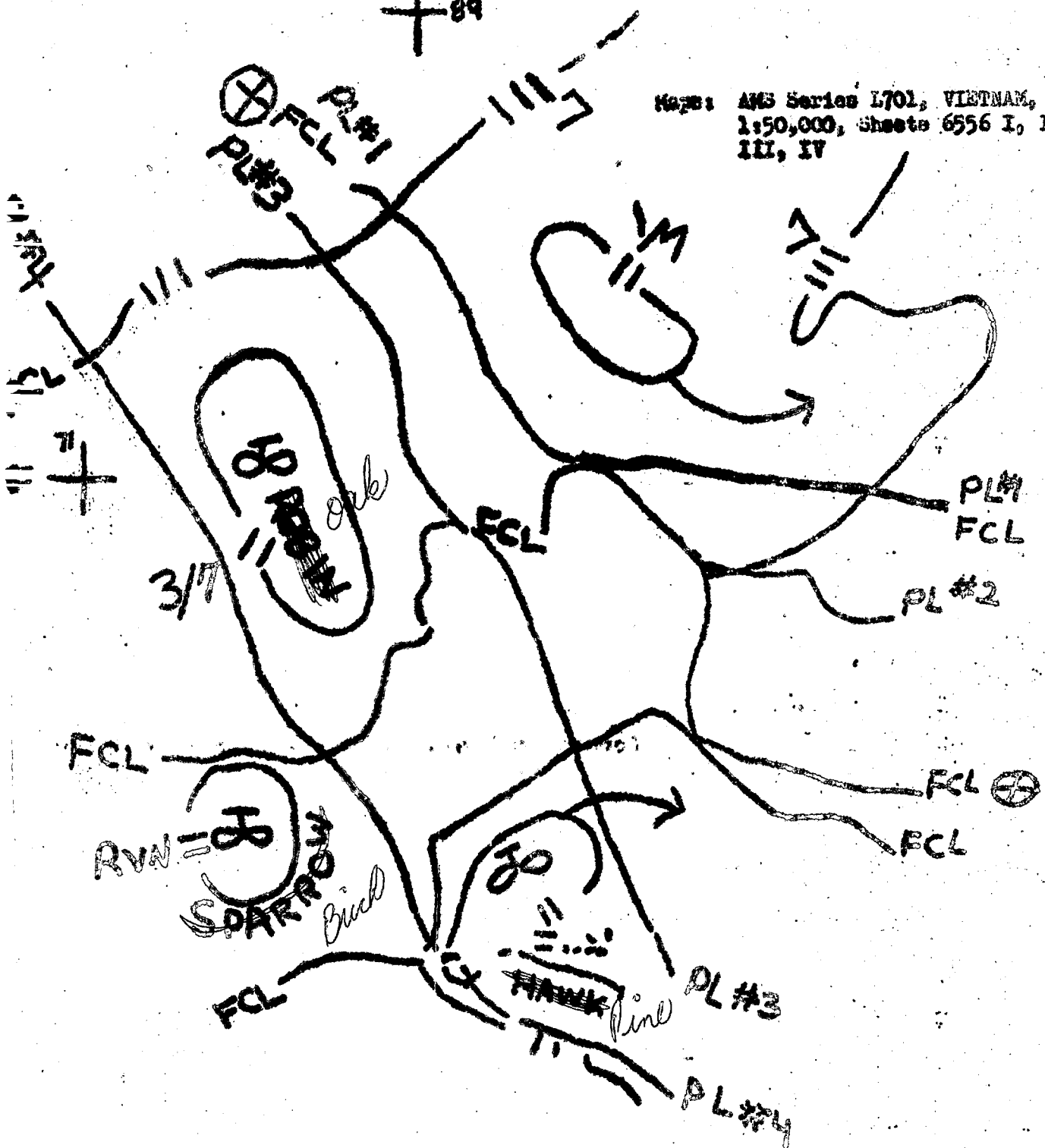

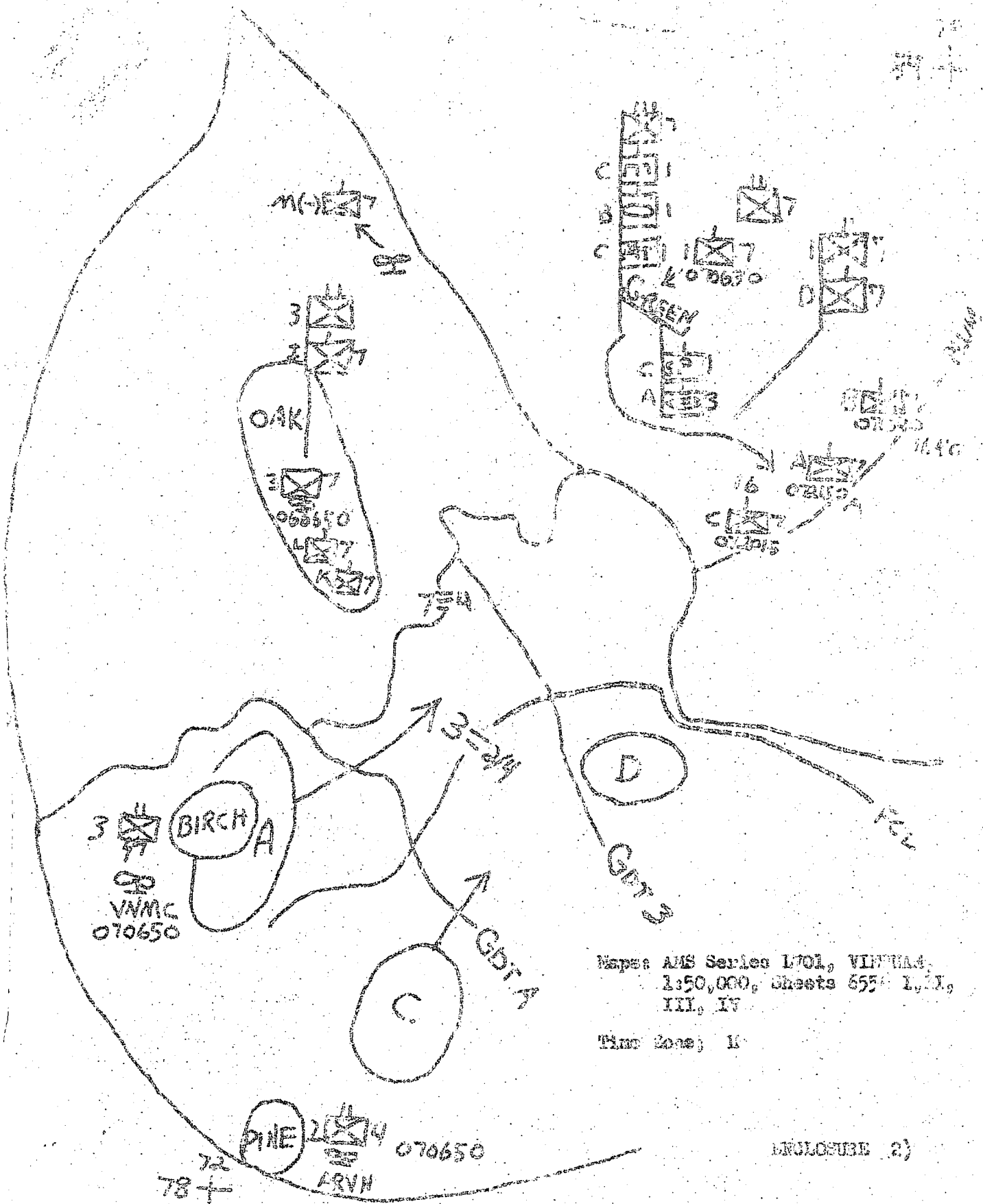

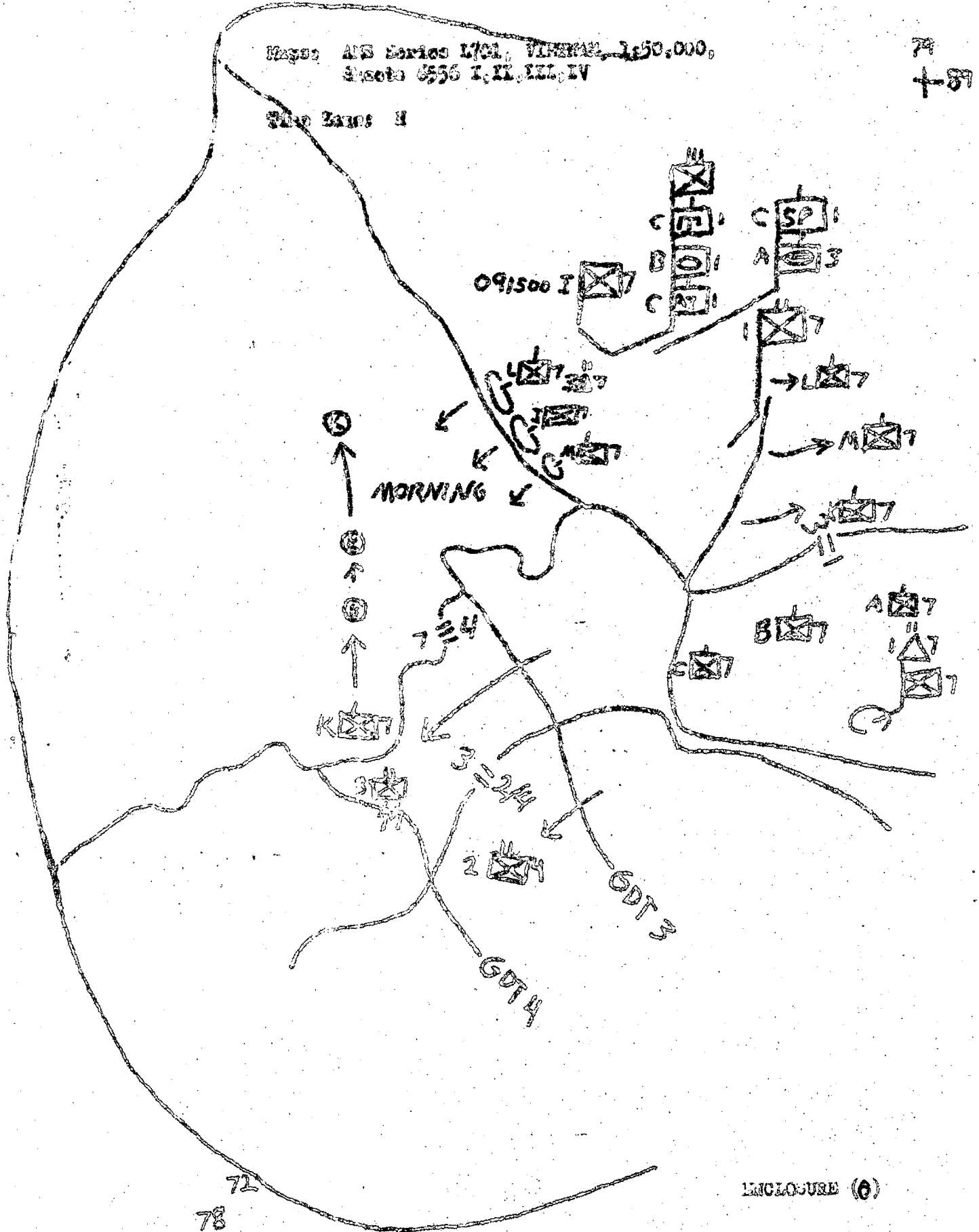

- 4. MEASURES FOR HANDLING PRISONERS, CAPTURED DOCUMENTS AND MATERIALS.

    - (2) IIT personnel with each battalion will initially screen all captives at battalion level.
    - (3) Captives will be evacuated under guard from battalion collection points by the most expeditious transportation available to the Regimental Collection Point in the BSA. Coordinates to be announced upon establishment of compound.
    - (4) Specific attention will be given to insure compliance with the Geneva Convention in the treatment of POW's.

- (9) All POWs will be accompanied by a guard from the capturing unit. Guards will be returned to their units ASAP.

- (2) Other documents will be tagged showing time, date, location and circumstances of capture, and evacuated to the regimental collection POW compound.

- 1 All captured food stuffs will be reported to this headquarters telling type, quantity and location.
- 2 Caches of foods stuffs of sufficient quantity to justify evacuation will be evacuated to the BSA for redistribution by the Civil Affairs Team.

- (b) All other captured material. All captured material of a nature and size allowing for helicopter evacuation will be evacuated by land to this headquarters telling location, type, quantity, and capturing unit.



## 1. MISSION

- a. Basic Mission. To destroy Viet Cong Forces in the CAP BATANGAN and AN KY Peninsula.
- b. Previous decisions. To conduct a combined amphibious and helicopter assault on the objective.
- c. Purpose of this estimate. To furnish this command known basic intelligence on the weather, terrain and the enemy in the objective area in order to facilitate planning and operations in the objective area.

## 2. CHARACTERISTICS OF THE AREA OF OPERATIONS.

### a. Weather.

- (1) See weather forecasts as issued.
- (2) During the period of operations the weather is not expected to affect the enemy's capabilities. Prolonged heavy rains would limit our use of helicopter and close air support and would seriously affect the trafficability of tracked and wheeled vehicles.
- (3) Astronomical Data for period of operations.

(3) Observation and Fields of Fire.

- (a) The high ground on the rocky ground headlands southeast of NIS Landing Beach 12 affords excellent observation of sea approaches and the beach. Long range fields of fire for direct fire weapons are excellent and enfilade the beach along its entire length.
- (b) Observation and fields of fire over NIS Landing Beach 13 are excellent from the headlands on the northeast end of the beach.
- (c) The high ground on the peninsula proper provides excellent observation and fields of fire over the eastern approaches. Observation and fields of fire over beach exits from NIS Landing Beach 12 are limited due to scrub growth and scattered pi.
- (d) NUI A LINH (BS 7285) provides excellent observation and fields of fire over the northwestern, central, and southwestern approaches to the peninsula.
- (e) Hill 108 (BS 6982) affords excellent observation and fields of fire over the southwestern approaches to the peninsula. Observation and fields of fire over the western approaches partially hindered by roughly dissected terrain and scrub growth in the vicinity of BS 6681 and BS 6781.

(f) Hill 144 (BS 6786) provides excellent observation and fields of fire over western and northwestern approaches to the peninsula.

(4) Obstacles.

- (a) See reference (a) and Appendix 1 (Terrain Overlay) and Appendix 2 (Obstacle Overlay) to reference (b).
- (b) The SONG CHO MOI is an obstacle to east-west and north-south movement from the mainland to AN KY Peninsula (BS 7581).
- (c) The pine growth paralleling NIS Landing Beach 12 is an obstacle to vehicular movement south from the beach.
- (d) The wet rice paddies in the neck of the peninsula are obstacles to track and wheel vehicles.
- (e) The numerous road cuts would impede wheeled and track vehicle movement.

(5) Cover and concealment.

- (a) See reference (a) and Appendix 1 (Terrain Overlay) to reference (b).
- (b) The pine and scrub growth to the south of NIS Landing Beach 12 affords concealment for individuals and small units. Some cover is provided from direct fire weapons by the dunes paralleling the beach.
- (c) Built up areas provide concealment for individuals and small units.
- (d) The terraced paddies on the peninsula proper provide protection from direct fire weapons.

c. Hydrography.

- (1) NIS Landing Beach 12.
- (2) NIS Landing Beach 13.

d. Helicopter Landing Zones. See Appendix 3 (Helicopter suitability overlay) to reference (b).

3. ENEMY SITUATION.\* a. Composition, strength, disposition, and armament.

- (1) Viet Cong forces in the objective area consist of Main and Local Forces, supported by an undetermined number of guerrillas.

(b) Morale and combat efficiency.

- 1 90th Bn - Combat efficiency is excellent. Most highly decorated unit of the 1st VC Regiment. Morale is assumed to be poor to fair due to recent defeat of its parent unit.
- 2 52nd Bn. Unknown, however its strength and weapons indicate that it is a strong force and it must be pre-

sumed to enjoy wide support from local populace in the objective area.

3 3d Co. 80th Bn. Combat efficiency and morale is poor due to recent losses at VAN TUONG.

4 Other Forces. Unknown.

b. Recent and present activities.

- (1) 90th Bn. This unit had been identified in the VAN TUONG Village complex just prior to the commencement of Operation Starlight, however, reports subsequently received indicate the 90th had moved south to the CAP BATANGAN Area on 15 August. It is believed this unit escaped intact and still possess its full combat potential.
- (2) 3d Co 80th Bn. A VCC captured by the 11th Ranger Battalion (ARVN) stated that the 1st and 2nd companies suffered only 20-30 casualties. This company attempted to exfiltrate the battle area, but was turned back by ARVN blocking forces along Route #1. VCC claims the 3d Company is presently operating in the area immediately northwest of CAP BATANGAN.
- (3) 52nd Battalion. This battalion was not identified in the VAN TUONG battle area. This battalion has always operated in the general area south of CHU LAI and east of Route #1.
- (4) T 18 Company. Little is known of this unit, but it is believed that it operates in the same general area as the 52nd Battalion.
- (5) QUANG NGAI Province Local Force Headquarters and other Local Forces and guerrillas. It is believed the QUANG NAI Province Local Force Headquarters has been directing the fortification of the CAP BATANGAN Peninsula and environs. Initially, defenses were oriented westward, but recent photography indicates that during July and especially early August, Viet Cong has extended his fortifications to include sea approaches.

4. ENEMY CAPABILITIES.a. Enumeration.

- (1) Capability 1. To exfiltrate present forces in the objective area, fighting rear guard actions as necessary from combat villages, fortified positions and strongpoints, destroying his supply caches and other installations while withdrawing to the southwest, west or north at any time of his choosing.
- (2) Capability 2. To defend from combat villages, strongpoints and fortified positions where located with the 90th battalion and 3d Company 80th battalion, the 52nd Local Forces Battalion and the 25th Recon Company supported by CP, transportation, service elements, and in the objective area.
- (3) Capability 3. Attack our forces at any time during our initial landing or immediately thereafter, in the HLZ and over the beach with the same strength and units as in Capability 2
- (4) Capability 4. Reinforce his forces in the objective area with one Main Force Battalion and 8 Local Force Companies supported by an estimated 1000 guerrillas or elements thereof in a time period ranging from 5 $\frac{1}{2}$  hours to 10 hours.

b. Analysis and discussion.

- (1) Capability 1. The enemy could choose to affect this capability at any time prior to the completed landing of friendly forces, however, after blocking forces have linked up he would be unable to successfully exfiltrate his forces in their entirety from the objective area. Further in attempting to accomplish this capability, the Viet Cong would most certainly lose any and all control of the population in the objective area for an extended period of time causing almost as much harm to his cause as a defeat on the battlefield. If he were to affect this capability it would only partly affect the accomplishment of our mission in that we could not completely destroy his forces in the objective area.

CONFIDENTIAL

- (2) Capability 2. If he choose to affect this capability he will enhance our mission by allowing us to fix him in place and destroy him in detail. However, by doing so, he will greatly increase his control over the civilian population in areas surrounding the objective by virtue of the fact that he will convince those peoples that he will defend them when required to do so. By the same token, a severe defeat would weaken his recruiting efforts and would undoubtedly cause his surrender and desertion rate to increase greatly. Further failure to defend would cause him the loss of a supply, communication, command and infiltration complex. The enemy's adoption of this capability would allow us to concentrate our superior fire and manpower on his strongest points of defense, allowing us to completely destroy his forces piecemeal and in place.
- (3) Capability 3. If he chooses to affect this capability he will immediately expose his forces to our air and naval gunfire, thus risking the destruction of his forces without seriously affecting the accomplishment of our mission. The enemy's adoption of this capability would greatly speed up the accomplishment of our mission after the clearing of the HLZ and the landing beach.
- (4) Capability 4. The Viet Cong could accomplish this capability at any time prior to or after our landing, committing his forces piecemeal or concentrating them at any time and point of his choosing. However, in doing so, he exposes his forces while moving to our air power and air observation thus running the risk of the destruction of much of his manpower. Also, in doing so, he would undoubtedly lose much of his control over areas from which he had moved his troops. The affecting of this capability would most certainly enhance our mission by allowing us to destroy more of his forces than are in the immediate objective area. On the other hand if he is successful in concentrating at least 1/3 of his available reinforcements at any one point he could cause a serious time delay although not affect the accomplishment of our mission in the long run.

5. CONCLUSIONS.

- a. Relative probability of adoption of enemy capabilities. It is felt that the Viet Cong will adopt capabilities 2 and 1 in that order and adopt 3 and 4 only as a desperate attempt to maintain control over the objective area and to attempt to inflict as many casualties and as much damage to our forces as possible and utilize the results for propaganda purposes to weaken the cause of the U. S. Forces in other areas of Southeast Asia and to help him maintain control over other areas of the Republic of Vietnam. In affecting capability 1 it would allow him to escape from the objective area with his main forces intact or a good portion thereof, but in doing so, losing his supply, communication, command and infiltration complex and also the loss of his influence in the objective and the surrounding areas. In affecting capability 2,

he will allow us to destroy his forces in the objective area, but at the same time, greatly increase his image among the local population and that of the surrounding area, also greatly propagandize his cause among other countries of Southeast Asia.

- b. Effect of enemy capabilities on the Commander's mission. In affecting the capabilities as discussed, only capabilities 3 and 4 would seriously hinder the accomplishment of our mission.

- b. Spot Reports. Spot reports will answer as completely as possible the following questions.

- d. Supply Caches, Installations, Caves. Each unit shall submit commencing 1200 D-Day a report of all supply caches; installations (specific type of installation) and caves discovered and/or destroyed to this headquarters. This report shall list the above by type, location by coordinates, contents, who discovered or destroyed same, and any other action taken.
- e. ITT Interrogation Reports. ITT personnel shall submit to this headquarters and the capturing unit a copy of all interrogations as soon as possible after each interrogation.
- f. Viet Cong Killed or Wounded Report. All units shall submit a report every four hours commencing 1200, D-Day a report of Viet Cong killed, wounded. This report will be made in the following manner:

2. CAPTURED VCS AND VCC's.

- a. All VCS and VCCs captured during this operation will be sent to the collection point in the BSA, (location to be announced), after, repeat after, first being screened by battalions.
- b. ITT personnel will rescreen all prisoners at the collection point in the BSA prior to being evacuated to the CHU LAI compound.
- c. Evacuation of VCS and VCC from the CHU LAI compound to III MAF compound at DANANG will be coordinated and accomplished by the S-2 of the 4th Marines.
- d. No, repeat no, VCS or VCC will be sent to any other place other than specified herein.
- e. Wounded VCS or VCC will be evacuated through medical channels with a report to this headquarters on location of capture, time and date of capture, circumstances of capture and place of evacuation.

3. AERIAL OBSERVATION REQUESTS AND PHOTOGRAPHS.

- a. Aerial observation will be available upon request.
- b. All units will monitor the DAO Net.

- c. All requests for aerial observation missions or photographs will be made to this headquarters. Upon approval of request the requesting unit will be notified and the AO will report all observations to the requesting unit on the DAO Net.

4. PERTINENT INSTRUCTIONS TO ALL UNITS.

- a. All captured VCS and VCC's shall be tagged, showing the location, a date and time of capture, circumstances of capture and capturing unit.
- b. All captured documents taken from a prisoner shall be tagged and identified with and evacuated with the prisoner.
- c. All other captured documents shall be tagged showing the location, time and date of capture, circumstances of capture and capturing unit or individual.
- d. All captured weapons, and other transportable material shall be tagged showing location of capture, time and date of capture, circumstances of capture, capturing unit or individual.
- e. No captured VCS, VCC, weapon or material shall be evacuated to the compound in the BAS or to this headquarters in cases of weapons and material without being tagged as described in paragraph 4.a through 4.d.

5. INTELLIGENCE REQUIREMENTS.

- a. All battalions including 3d Battalion, 11th Marines shall report answers to the below listed intelligence requirements and/or information pertaining thereto as obtained.
  - (1) What are the strengths and identities of Viet Cong Forces contacted by friendly forces in the CAP BATANGAN area? What other units were reported, but not contacted?
  - (2) What degree of resistance was encountered in the helicopter landing zones and landing beaches? What tactics did the Viet Cong employ?
  - (3) Did Viet Cong attempt to defend in strength? What tactics did he employ? What use did he make of his fortifications?
  - (4) Did Viet Cong attempt to exfiltrate from the battle area? What tactics did he employ? By what routes?
  - (5) Where were Viet Cong command posts located?
  - (6) What communications equipment did the Viet Cong in the battle area possess? What signal systems were employed?

- (7) What crew-served weapons were employed in the battle area? Where were they located? How employed? (Special attention to anti-aircraft and anti-tank weapons).
- (8) To what extent were mines utilized by the Viet Cong? Where were the mines located? How located? What types? What system was utilized to make the locations?
- (9) What was the status of Viet Cong logistics in the area?
6. INTELLIGENCE RECAPITULATION. On the 3d day following the return of battalions and the 3d Battalion, 11th Marines, each unit shall submit to this headquarters a comprehensive recapitulation of items of intelligence value, developed during the operation, to include any lessons learned, efficiency of captured personnel, documents, and accounting procedures. A critique of intelligence support rendered by higher headquarters; intelligence problems encountered, and recommendations for future operations will be made.

- (2) Artillery forward observers and naval gunfire spotters will check fire when it appears that the trajectories of artillery and support ships will endanger friendly aircraft.
- (3) Unless special coordination measures are prescribed, fires on helicopter routes in use are restricted to observed fires where the observer is capable of ensuring the safety of helicopters using the route.
- (4) Information on all artillery and naval gunfire missions will be posted to all helicopter and fixed wing control agencies. For this purpose a SAVAPLANE report will be used. This report will include the coordinates of the firing unit, the target coordinates, the time period involved, the maximum ordinate of the projectiles. Example:

SAVAPLANE: A-5404, B4897, C-0900H, D-1100H, E-5000Feet

The artillery battalion FDC will be responsible for passing the SAVAPLANE report to the RLT FSCC. RLT-7 will disseminate the reports to the air control agencies. For helicopter approach and retirement lanes, see Annex E.

- b. Flak Suppression Fires. When required and when time permits, flak suppression fires will be planned in detail to most effectively protect support aircraft from enemy ground fire and to provide a reasonable degree of safety from the suppressing fire.
6. Illumination. The primary means of illumination will be by flare plane as coordinated by the Regimental Air Liaison Officer. Secondary means of illumination will be by artillery, NGF and organic weapons on an "on call" basis.
7. Safety of Ground Forces. No fires will be placed across battalion boundaries without the approval of RLT-7 FSCC. This approval must be voiced - silence does not mean consent. The boundaries between adjacent units are fire coordination lines. No fire will be placed across these lines without the approval of the RLT-7 FSCC. The nature of this operation is such that extreme care must be taken to avoid the accidental attack of friendly forces.

When RLT-7 is ready to assume responsibility for the coordination of supporting arms, control of both fixed wing and helicopter operations within the bomblines will be exercised by the DASC (FWD) located with RLT-7 Headquarters.

2. PREPLANNED. Requests for both fixed wing and helicopter aircraft in support of pre-planned operations should be submitted via TAR net to reach the Regimental Air Officer or his representative by 1700 each day. Requests for fixed wing air support will be submitted over the TAR net (HF or UHF as directed), to the DASC (Airborne) until coordination of supporting arms is established ashore by RLT-7 at which time requests will then go to the DASC (FWD) ashore. b. Helicopters. Requests for on-call helicopter support will be submitted over the TAR net (HF or UHF as directed) to the DASC (Airborne) until control of helicopter operations is assumed by the DASC (FWD) ashore. Tab B contains the Helicopter Request Form to be utilized. Line 8.g. of Tab B will designate most secure approach route and if LZ is secure.

1. LOCATION. TACPs shall keep DASC and FSCC advised of units current positions and dispositions. Forward friendly positions shall be marked with panels and/or smoke when close air support strikes are in progress.

2. Conduct of Strikes.

a. All CAS strikes are to be made parallel to the front lines whenever possible and by single aircraft. Each pilot must acknowledge the sighting of the target. A minimum of 20 minutes will be allowed for conducting a four plane strike.

b. Every effort should be made to mark targets with smoke or WP whenever possible.

c. FACs will locate their position in relation to the target by use of flashing mirror and/or colored smoke.

d. FACs will call target areas using four-digit grid coordinates and then revert to "no-map" control (calling the target in clock code from a known position, e.g., marking smoke, the FAC's position or prominent terrain feature in close proximity.) In this regard, it may be necessary to assist the pilot in establishing an attack heading and target acquisition by advising him when to roll into his run.

e. FACs will not change targets without so advising the strike pilots.

f. FACs will brief strike pilots utilizing the shortened mission briefing form. TAB A contains a Short Mission Briefing Form.

g. FACs will ensure that post-strike damage assessments are given to strike pilots and the DASC. CAS strikes will be stopped by the FAC when any of the following conditions exists:

- (1) The attack aircraft are not on the prescribed heading.
- (2) The attack aircraft is off target.
- (3) Weather conditions do not meet those specified in Annex C.
- (4) The time prescribed for the attack has elapsed.

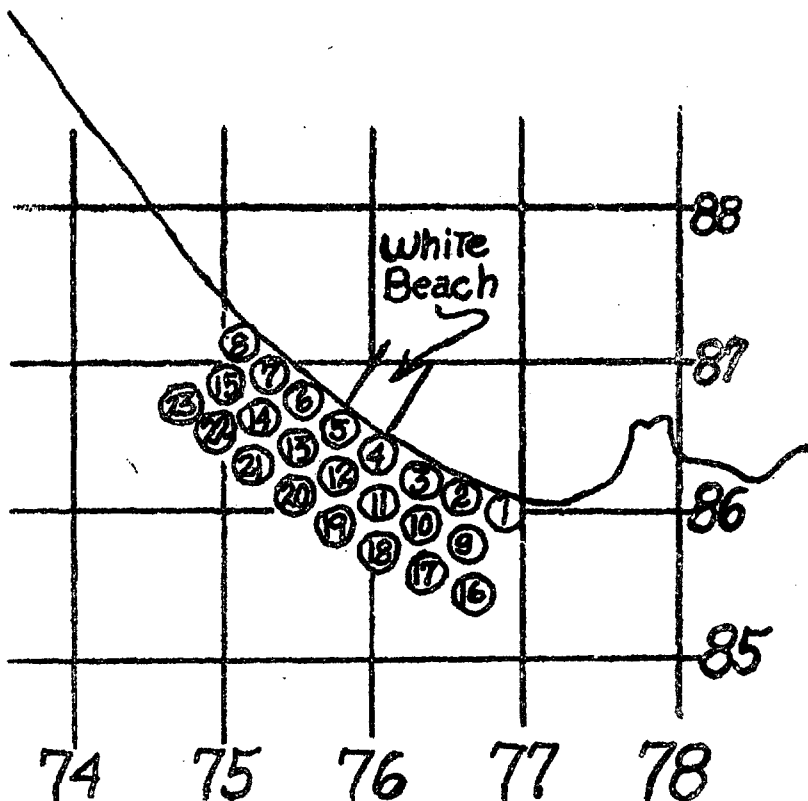

1. Helicopter Landing Points (General Information).

a. Helicopter landing points should be selected which provide helicopter pilots adequate space to maneuver into the wind in order to take advantage of increased performance of the helicopter under a favorable wind direction.

b. All landing points will be at least 180 feet in diameter paying particular attention to ensure overhead wire or antenna do not obstruct the landing areas.

c. Areas of hard ground, solid rock, or grass are the best natural landing points for helicopters. Graveled areas shall never be selected as a helicopter landing point. Dry barren areas should be also avoided since dust clouds created by the helicopter may reveal landing and takeoffs to the enemy.

d. Landing points will be policed of debris and any loose material to avoid damage to aircraft.

2. Safety Precautions. It is mandatory that all landing point personnel be briefed on the following precautions:

a. Personnel will stand clear of the landing and departing aircraft.

b. Approach only after a beckoning signal from the pilot or co-pilot.

c. Approach and depart other type helicopters from the right front of the aircraft.

3. Landing Point Communications.

a. Unit communication officers will install a local telephone from the landing point area to unit switchboards. The telephone will be properly marked and the landing point messengers will maintain a telephone watch on this telephone.

b. To prevent unnecessary landing at the helicopter landing point, when there is no outgoing traffic, the letter "N" will be displayed in the immediate vicinity of the triangle.

4. Helicopter Landing Point Marking System.



- a. All landing points will be marked with equilateral triangle by using three panels from either panel set AP-30C or AP-30D. The color selection will contrast with the landing point in order to be easily recognized by aircraft.
- b. Prevailing wind directions will be shown by installing a short pole (approximately three feet) with streamers, flag, or pennants of sufficient length to allow the pilot to see the local wind.
- c. The unit designation will be accomplished in accordance with Encl. 1, (Helicopter Landing Zone marking code).
- d. Panel set AP-30C or AP-30D as appropriate in conjunction with panels VS-4/U or VS-6/U provides all the necessary equipment and color arrangements needed to effect the above displays.
- e. Upon receiving an air raid warning/alert the helicopter landing point marking will be removed without delay. The markers will be replaced immediately after "all clear" is sounded.
- f. The senior headquarters designator will be displayed when composite headquarters are established.
- g. Night marking for the helicopter landing point will depend upon the tactical situation, however, satisfactory night markings may consist of three flares placed at the apex of the triangle site marker or vehicle lights flashed from a vehicle parked downwind of the landing point and illuminating the landing area.
- h. Care must be exercised in securing panels to the ground to prevent destruction of the displays each time a helicopter lands or takes off.

1. SUPPLY

a. Sources of Supply.

- (1) Prior to embarkation - Parent organization and FLSU #1 for all classes of supply. Notify this headquarters of any critical shortages.
- (2) In the objective area - A Beach Support Area and a floating dump will be established and operated by Company "C" (Rein), 1st Shore Party Bn. This will furnish classes I, III, and V supplies and selected radio batteries.

- (1) Prescribed Loads.
  - (2) Landing Force Supplies (to be carried by Co "C" (-)(Rein), 1st Shore Party Bn.) See Annex A (Landing Force Supplies) to Administrative Order 324-65.
- d. Supplies and Equipment Available.
- (1) Those supplies and equipment embarked.
  - (2) Resupply from unit organic assets and the FLSU #1 at Chu Lai by logistics organizations as required.
- e. Plan for Landing Supplies.
- (1) Prescribed loads will be mobile loaded in landing vehicles to the maximum extent and landed upon order of ELT Commanders.
  - (2) Landing Force Supplies will be staged and landed as recommended by the Shore Party Commander upon order of the RLT Commander.
- f. Resupply.
- (1) Units will request resupply directly from the Beach Support area.
  - (2) The commander of the Beach Support Area will request resupply of Landing Force Supplies directly from the FLSU #1 located at Chu Lai.
- g. Transportation of Supplies.
- (1) The Air Liaison Officer of the RLT will provide on a permanent basis, four helicopters for the sole use of the Shore Party commander for the delivery of supplies.
  - (2) The RLT 3-4 will provide contracts as required for the delivery of supplies from the Beach support area to using units.
  - (3) Requests of additional resupply transportation requirements will be made to the RLT 3-4.
- h. Captured Material. All captured material, including weapons, will be evacuated to the RLT CP and turned over to the Intelligence Officer. This material should be clearly marked as to where found, under what circumstances, when, and by whom. At the conclusion of their requirements the intelligence section will turn over this material to the 3-4 section for storage and

CONFIDENTIAL

disposition. The S-4 will maintain a record of all enemy material in or passing thru its custody.

- i. Salvage. The RLT S-4 will be kept informed of all material requiring salvage. When practicable the material will be delivered to the Beach Support Area. No materials of potential use to the enemy should be left unguarded or abandoned to the enemy.
- j. Excess materials. Any materials determined to be excessive to the units requirements should be returned to the Beach Support Area for disposition or evacuation.

- k. RLT TAG-LOG.

- (1) An RLT TAC-LOG will be established aboard the primary control ship and will operate throughout the operation.
- (2) The TAC-LOG will be staffed by one officer from the RLT S-4 section, one Staff NCO from the RLT S-4 section, one representative from each BLT and three radio operators from the RLT Hq.
- (3) The TAC-LOG will be responsible for establishing liaison with the naval commander afloat and advising him as to the tactical and logistical situation ashore and as to the requirements of the RLT as they effect the naval forces.
- (4) The TAC-LOG will maintain radio contact with the RLT Hq, the Beach Support Commander, the Floating Dump Ship and other stations as required.

2. EVACUATION AND HOSPITALIZATION - See Annex B (Medical) to Administrative Order 324-65.

3. TRANSPORTATION

- a. By sea to the objective area.
- b. Helicopters, LVTs and organic transportation in the objective area.
- c. See reference (b) Embarkation Order 324-65.

4. SERVICES

- a. Co "C" (-) (Rein), 1st Engineer Bn. Perform combat engineer tasks in support of the RLT. Establish and operate one water point in the Beach Support Area.
- b. Co "C" (-)(Rein), 1st Shore Party Bn. Establish and maintain a Beach Support Area in a place and at a time to be designated.

Establish and maintain a floating dump for Classes I, limited II, limited III, and selected V upon an LSD to be designated. Establish a POW collection point in the Beach Support Area. (See Annex C (Shore Party) to Administrative Order 324-65.

- c. Co "A" (-)(Rein), AmTrac Bn. Provide transportation for tactical movement and for logistical support as required by the RIT S-4.
  - d. MAG-16. Provide helicopters for supply, resupply and tactical lifts. Provide four helicopters on a permanent basis to the CO Beach Support Area for the support of BSA.
5. PERSONNEL - See Annex D (Personnel) to Administrative Order 324-65.

## 6. MISCELLANEOUS

- a. All units requiring supplies and services will keep the RIT S-4 and the Beach Support Area informed of their coordinates. All requests for supplies and services will include the coordinates for delivery and any landing zone marking instructions.
- b. Unit commanders will provide security as required in sensitive supply and communications installations.
- c. Reports - See Annex I (Reports) to Operation Order 324-65.
- d. Uniform and Equipment for Embarkation. Utilities, marching pack, T/O weapon, helmet with green side out.
- e. In order to make maximum use of helicopters for resupply, all units will insure that sufficient personnel are present at helicopter landing zones to expedite unloading of supplies and equipment.
- f. Empty water cans will be collected, staged and returned to the BSA on the following resupply run. Units having transportation and a covered route to the BSA will return empty water cans whenever sufficient cans are empty to warrant a run.
- g. Units will provide infantry security for all supply runs made by amphibian tractors to and from the BSA.
- h. Make maximum use of lister bags whenever possible in order to free water cans for transporting water.
- i. Military and Personal effects of casualties.



- e. Medical Platoon MAG-12. Be prepared to treat minor casualties at your dispensary after clearance through "B" Co, 3d MedBn.
- f. Other Medical Sections. Personnel to be designated to assist aboard the LPH or at "B" Med.

## 3. SANITATION AND PREVENTIVE MEDICINE.

- a. Troop commanders of all echelons require maximum sanitary discipline possible under combat conditions.
- b. Ensure all troops have in their possession anti-malarial prophylaxis for a period of two weeks.
- c. Ensure all troops have in their possession water purification tablets (Halazone) to last for a period of seven days.
- d. Companies and Battalions take all available lister bags for water storage and use. It is recommended that each man drink between 6 and 8 canteens of water daily and take one salt tablet with each canteen.
- e. Ensure all troops have sufficient salt tablets for two days use. Resupply to be on Company level.
- f. Ensure all troops have 2 canteens of water upon debarking. Resupply to areas will be by helicopter.

## 4. EVACUATION

a. Movement.

- (1) After embarkation casualties aboard ship which require care beyond the capability of the ship will be evacuated to either the LPH PRINCETON or to "B" Co, 3d MedBn.
- (2) The health of the embarked personnel is the responsibility of the ship's medical officer, but the troops' medical personnel will render all practical assistance as regards to medical service for embarked personnel.

- b. Assault Phase. During the initial assault phase when the greatest demand is placed on the helicopters to land troops, casualties from the combat area will be helicopter lifted to the LPH PRINCETON. When adequate helicopters become available overload casualties will be evacuated directly to "B" Co, 3d MedBn at Chu Lai.

c. Casualty Overload.

- (1) In the event of mass casualties which exceed the clearing capabilities of the LPH and "B" Med, immediate arrangements will be made by "B" Med for direct air evacuation to "C" Med in DaNang from the Chu Lai airfield.
- (2) In no case will the evacuation of casualties in a situation of serious casualty overload be delayed for lack of complete medical records or other administrative requirements.

- d. Civilian, ARVN, and POW casualties. They will not be evacuated through the above described evacuation system; rather they will be evacuated to medical facilities in Quang Nai. Priority of evacuation will be afforded the ARVN and civilians then POWs. The POWs must be evacuated under guard.
5. HOSPITALIZATION
    - a. The LPH and then "B" Med will provide hospitalization for casualties initially.
    - b. "C" Med at Da Nang will be prepared to accept the overload from "B" Med.
  6. MEDICAL SUPPLY - The LPH and "B" Med will have blood available. Emergency resupply of whole blood will be available upon request from "C" Med in Da Nang.
  7. MEDICAL ADMINISTRATION
    - a. Location of Regimental Medical Officer - Afloat: LPH PRINCETON.

(2) Reporting Procedures.

(a) Reporting units will submit to this Headquarters (Attn: S-1) a PDS Form with columns A and B completed on the day of their embarkation aboard ship. In the case of units not embarking, but moving by helicopter, this form will be submitted prior to the embarkation of Headquarters RLT-7. Forms may be obtained from Headquarters RLT-7 if needed.

(b) Commencing at 0700H D/1 reporting units will submit a modified PDS to include changes only. These reports may be submitted by message. Reports will be submitted to this Headquarters by 0700H as of the preceding 2400H to 2400H period.

(3) Reporting Format.

f. POW's will be under the control of the M.P. Platoon, who will be responsible for any emergency first aid, and the issuance of food and water.

g. Seriously wounded POW's will be evacuated to the USOM Hospital in Quang Ngai (Coordinates to be announced) contingent on the availability of transportation. The M.P. Platoon Commander will coordinate the evacuation of POW's with the RIF Air Liaison Officer.

6. Graves Registration. All KIA's will be evacuated to the B Medical Company, Chu Lai.

7. Morale and Personnel Services.

a. Leave. No leave for personnel anticipated.

b. Decorations, Medals and Awards. Recommendations for decorations, Medals, and Awards will be expeditiously processed, within 96 hours after completion of operations in accordance with reference (d).

c. Religious Services. No religious services scheduled. Chaplains will be available to talk to the troops while on line.

d. Informational Services.

(1) ISO personnel will accompany each unit to participate in the timely and accurate reporting of operational action to higher headquarters.

(2) Civilian Correspondents.

(a) Correspondent's participation will be limited to those areas where their presence will not interfere with the success of the operation.

(b) Any incident restricting correspondents activities will be reported to the RIF S-1.

1. General Information:

a. Casualty reporting will be in accordance with references (b), (c) and (d).

b. The USS PRINCETON (LPH-5) and Collecting and Clearing Company ("B" MED) FLSU#1 have been designated as the evacuation points. The USS PRINCETON will be the primary evacuation point. The Collecting and Clearing Company will be used as the alternate evacuation point.

c. All recording of casualty reporting will initially be done aboard the USS PRINCETON and at the Collecting and Clearing Company.

d. All BLT's and the 3dBn, 11thMar (to include all their respective attachments) will report their casualties to RLT-7, S-1 (Rear). RLT-7, S-1 will report casualties on HQ Co, 7thMar, and all attachments of Headquarters, 7th Marines.

e. All BLT's, 3dBn, 11thMar, and RLT-7, S-1, will have casualty liaison representatives on station aboard the USS PRINCETON and at Collecting and Clearing Company at FLSU# 1.

2. Procedure.

a. Steps in reporting a casualty.

(1) Corpsman completes the field medical card at the Plt, company or battalion level.

(2) Casualty is evacuated to the USS PRINCETON or the Collecting and Clearing Company.

(3) Liaison representative will complete a casualty card-USMC reference (d) on each casualty. The information needed will be taken from the field medical card attached to the casualty and the prognosis of the individual from the medical authorities at the evacuation point.

(4) Casualty liaison representative reports information to their respective rear echelon by the most expedition means of communication.

(5) BLT's, 3dBn, 11thMar and RLT-7, S-1 (Rear) will verify and complete the report and phone information using tabs A, B and C of this appendix; to RLT-7, S-1 (Rear) Casualty Reporting Officer.


(6) RLT-7, S-1 (Rear) records information and phones the casualty report to Division Casualty Reporting Officer.

(7) RLT-7, S-1 (Rear) reports to RLT-7 (Forward) every two hours the casualty totals for information.

Miscellaneous

1. At 1800 each day RLT-7, S-1 (Rear) will pick-up one copy of each casualty card filled out on individuals from the liaison representative at the evacuation points for verification.
2. Upon completion of the Operation all casualty card books of recorded casualties will be turned into the RLT-7 Casualty Reporting Officer.
3. BLT Commanders and 3/11 will report name, rank, serno, MOS, and organization of all WIA/NE including the time, date and type of wound received, daily to Regimental S-1 (Forward). Regimental S-1 (Forward) is responsible for reporting Headquarters Company, 7th Marines.



1. **Assumptions.**
  - a. There will be multiple contacts between units of RIT-7 and local inhabitants in the area of operations.
  - b. When hamlets are cleared many local inhabitants will be left homeless and without food and water.
  - c. The unit commanders in the area will control the refugees as they deem fit depending on the military situation.
2. **Mission.** To support the landing force by assisting in restoring and maintaining law and order, to provide food and water to refugees, and to insure that civilian refugees are not unduly oppressed.
3. **Civil Affairs Team.** A civil affairs team will be provided by the Army and will include a medic, interpreter, and security to provide control and care for the refugees.
4. **Food Stocks and Medical Supplies.** Emergency food stocks will be maintained in the BSA for use in civil affairs. Captured food will be turned into the S-4 section and will be available for distribution by the RIT-7 Civil Affairs Officer. Medical supplies will be available for use in civil affairs and will be controlled by the RIT-7 Civil Affairs Officer and will be distributed as required.
5. **Execution.**
  - a. In the event refugees become serious casualties, they will be evacuated to the USOM Hospital in Quang Ngai. The Regimental Civil Affairs Officer will coordinate their evacuation with the RIT-7 Air Liaison Officer.
  - b. Civilians will not be needlessly mistreated and any time there is undue hardship, or they are without food and water the Regimental Civil Affairs Officer will be notified immediately.
  - c. Homes will not be indiscriminately destroyed.
6. **Coordinating Instructions.**
  - a. Local inhabitants will be permitted to return to their homes and hamlets when the military operation permits.

b. Commanders will insure that troops are especially careful not to damage the premises of religious establishment. The use of churches, temples, and other religious institutions for military purposes is prohibited.

1. Operations.

a. Summary of week's activities.

(1) On the 28th of August the Commanding Officer of RIF-7 issued his concept of operations and initial planning guidance to subordinate commanders and supporting arms representatives. On the 29th of August, the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines continued to man its defensive positions on the MLR and continued its active day and night patrolling within the TAOR. On the 30th of August RIF-7 Headquarters continued to plan for the forthcoming operation. Plans are also underway to establish the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines within the Chu Lai TAOR. The 1st Battalion, 7th Marines has improved its defensive posture by utilizing a bull dozer to improve fields of fire and observation. On the 31st of August at first light BLT 3/7 began off-loading from assigned shipping of the BLF. The 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines has been assigned the mission of Regimental Reserve. On the 1st of September, BLT 3/7 continued to off-load from assigned shipping. On the 2nd of September the Commanding Officer and the Executive Staff of RIF-7 conducted briefings for Commanders and Staff of RIF-7 supporting arms on the forthcoming operation. BLT 3/7 completed unloading from assigned shipping at 021305. On the 3rd of September BLT 3/7 had all companies ashore and was engaged in improving positions and conducting training classes.

b. Summary of events.

(1) 1st Battalion, 7th Marines.

(a) On the 29th of August combat patrols, layouts and ambushes were conducted - all with negative results. Company C remains the Battalion Reserve and Company D named CP Newl in the vicinity of (BS 559996).

On the 30th of August, reconnaissance patrols, ambushes and combat patrols were conducted all with negative contact. On the 31st of August patrols were again sent out all with negative contact. On the 1st of September all patrols returned with reports of negative contact. On the 2nd of September, Company A, conducting one platoon day combat patrol, was informed by the local militia in Vinh An (1) of the whereabouts of 4 VC and one VCS vicinity of BT 614010). All five men were brought to the Battalion CP POW compound. Company B apprehended one VCS that approached their MLR position at 021030H. They were not able to detain the man's companion. Company D reported that at 020030H at (BT 573972) a machine gun was observed firing near their left front 3000 meters forward of the MLR. Company A, 3d Antrac Battalion reported to 1/7 that 15 to 20 Vietnamese fishing boats were standing off 200 yards from the Chu Lai Beach and the 7th Marines CP. On the 2nd of September, Company B conducted a platoon search and clear of the village in of Vinh An (1)(BT 614010) approximately one hour after Company A left. They captured 3 VCS who were pointed out by Popular Forces Lt Long. The company suffered 1 KIA and 2 WIA when a fire team leader stepped on a release type grenade booby trap, At 021745H leaving the village of Vinh An (1).

1. Operations.

a. Summary of week's activities.

(1) On the 4th of September, 1/7 conducted active deep patrolling in its assigned TAOR with negative contact. On the 5th of September the Commanding Officer and the Executive Staff of RLP-7 made their plans for "Operation PIRANHA". In connection with "Operation PIRANHA," 1/7 secured all patrolling on the TAOR at 051200H. All patrols conducted that morning had met with negative contact. At 060900H September, RLP-7 displaced from the Chu Lai enclave to the USS Bayfield (APA-33). 1/7 went aboard assigned shipping to participate in "Operation PIRANHA." On the 7th of September at 0630H, "H" hour, 1/7 conducted an amphibious landing over White Beach and conducted a sweep to Phase Line Plum. At 0650H "L" hour, 3/7 executed a helicopterborne landing on the high ground, (BS 732840), (BS 729849) and (BS 727858) to establish blocking positions and protect the RLP west flank. The 2nd Battalion, 4th ARVN Regiment executed a helicopterborne landing at (BS 750819) and commenced a search and clear operation to the east along the An Ky Peninsula. The 3rd Battalion, Vietnamese Marine Corps executed a helicopterborne landing at (BS 724819) and secured the causeway and bridge to the east and then established blocking positions to the northeast and southwest. On the 8th of September, 1/7 began a sweep from Phase Line Plum moving southwest to conduct company search and clear operations in a number of villages and established night defensive positions in the southern portion of their zone of action. 3/7, in conjunction with protection of the RLP west flank, conducted a number of company size search and clear operations within its zone of action. On the 9th of September, 1/7 began a thorough search and clear of the southern sector of the Cape Batangan Peninsula extending its operations north to the east west line dividing the Cape. 3/7 conducted a sweep of the village complex in grid squares (7485) and (7585). They began the sweep, with the aid of illumination, in the early hours of the morning. It was extended to include all contiguous areas where villages extended. At 091600H, Companies K, L and M were in position to conduct a sweep from the west to the east, in the northern sector of Cape Batangan. Half of the sweep was completed before the companies went into night defensive positions. On the 10th of September, Companies K, L and M continued the sweep until it was time to move to designated landing zones by 1200H to be retracted back to the Chu Lai TAOR.

At 0700 on the 10th of September, 1/7 began to move to White Beach to be back-loaded aboard assigned shipping.

b. Summary of Events.

(1) 1st Battalion, 7th Marines.

(a) At 070635 Companies A and C with B in reserve landed on White Beach securing it to the dune line. Company A remained in the beach area until ordered to move to its night defensive positions. Companies B and C turned and moved to the northeast conducting search and clear operations on the Cape Batangan Peninsula. Company B searched and cleared Chau Thau (1), where it killed 3VCS and captured 6VCS in a cave. Company C searched and cleared Chau Thuan (2) with negative results. Company D landed at 07-1000H and commenced a search and clear of Chau Me (2) (BS 759863). During the night of 7-8 September the companies conducted local security patrols to the front of their positions. On the 8th of September, Company A searched and cleared the village of Phu Qui (BS 785845) and An Hai (1) (BS 777833). The company found numerous caves and tunnels and captured 2 weapons, ammunition, grenades and trip flares. Documents and medical supplies were also found. Company B conducted search and clear operations moving south on the coastal side of Cape Batangan. At 081145H, the company found a few caves with weapons, ammunition and medical supplies. They killed 1 VC in the vicinity of coordinates (BS 789845). Company B found a cave at (BS 791848) <sup>located a VC cave</sup> and killed 4 VC by demolitions when they destroyed the cave at 081600H. Also the company reported taking 31 VC bodies out of the cave and counted 35 VC bodies remaining in the cave complex. The company also sent 15 VCS and 1 VC to the Battalion CP for interrogation. Company C commenced its search and clear moving southwest on the western portion of Cape Batangan. They found one home made land mine in the vicinity (BS 785847). The company searched and cleared Chau Thau (2) (BS 774848) and Tan Duc (BS 771838). Company D remained the Battalion Reserve throughout the day digging in on the high ground in grid square (7784). On the 9th of September, Company A moved north on Cape Batangan searching <sup>and</sup> clearing the area to the right of An Hai (1) where it went to night defensive positions just south of Tan Duc. Company C searched and cleared caves in the vicinity of An Hai (2). Company D remained in reserve with the Battalion CP at (BS 784829). On the 10th of September, 1/7 made its way to White Beach to be backloaded aboard assigned shipping.

(2) 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines.

(a) At 070650H, "L" hour, 3/7 landed in assigned landing zones to establish blocking positions and protect the RLTF west flank. In

conjunction with this, Company M searched and cleared Phu Nhieu (2) (BS 730875), Company L searched and cleared Liem Quang (2) (BS 719845). Companies I and I searched and cleared the adjacent areas of landing zones.

- (b) On the 8th of September, Company M continued to search Phu Nhieu (2) and Company K searched and cleared Phu My (2) (BS 728829) Company I searched and cleared Phu Nhieu (4). At ~~090300~~, Company K was in blocking positions in the vicinity of a line running from (BS 731858) to (BS 732837). Companies I, L and M swept west south west conducting a search and clear of the village complex which included the villages of Chau Binh (1) and Chau Me (1). Company K searched and cleared the Song Chau Me Dong from (BS 741846) to (BS 763845). At ~~091600H~~ Companies L, M and K were in position to conduct a sweep from west to east in the northern sector of Cape Batangan. Before establishing night defensive positions they had cleared approximately half of their zone of action. Company I provided Regimental security during this operation. On the 10th of September the companies continued their sweep with negative results until ~~091200H~~ when they moved to landing zones to be retracted to Chu Lai.



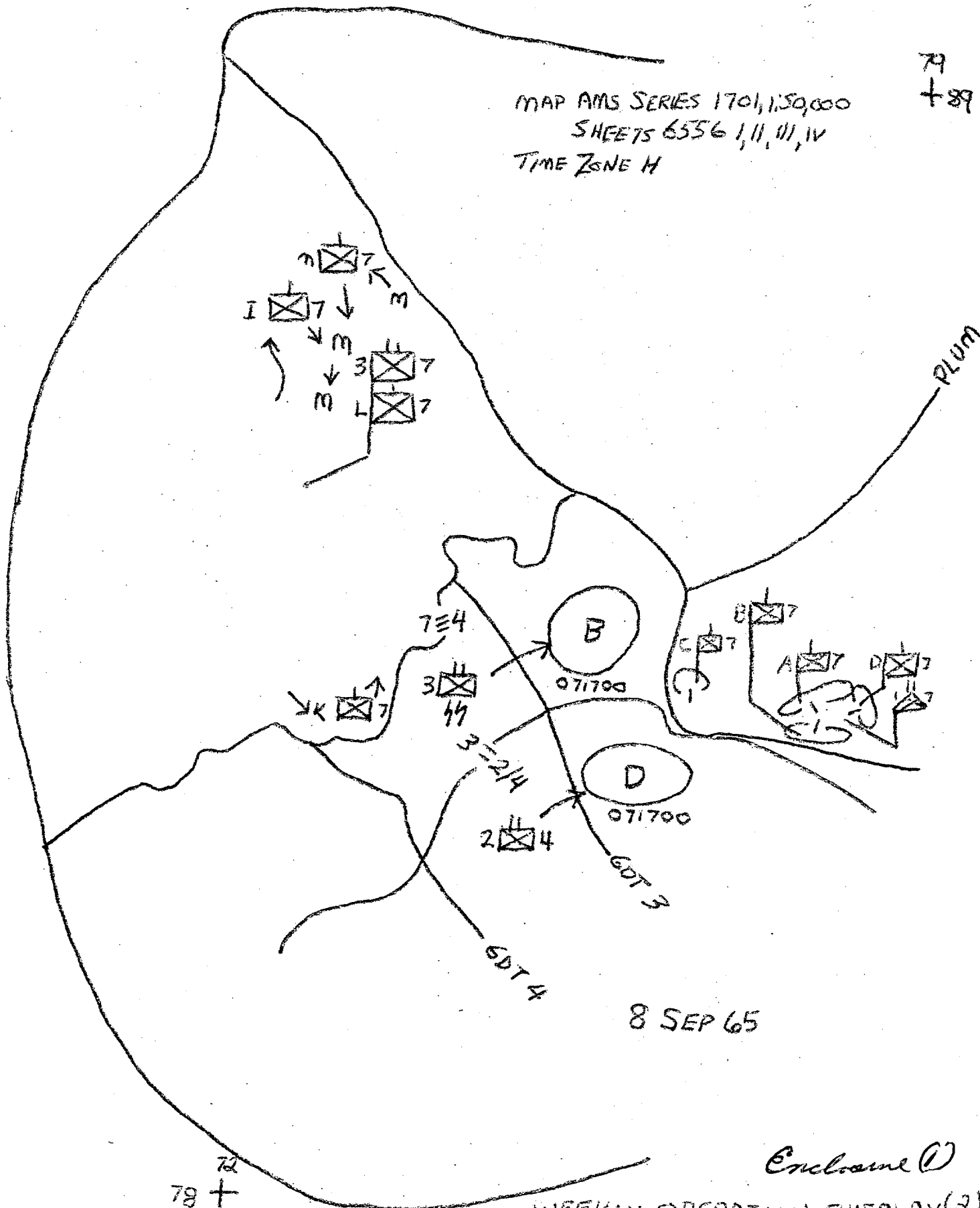

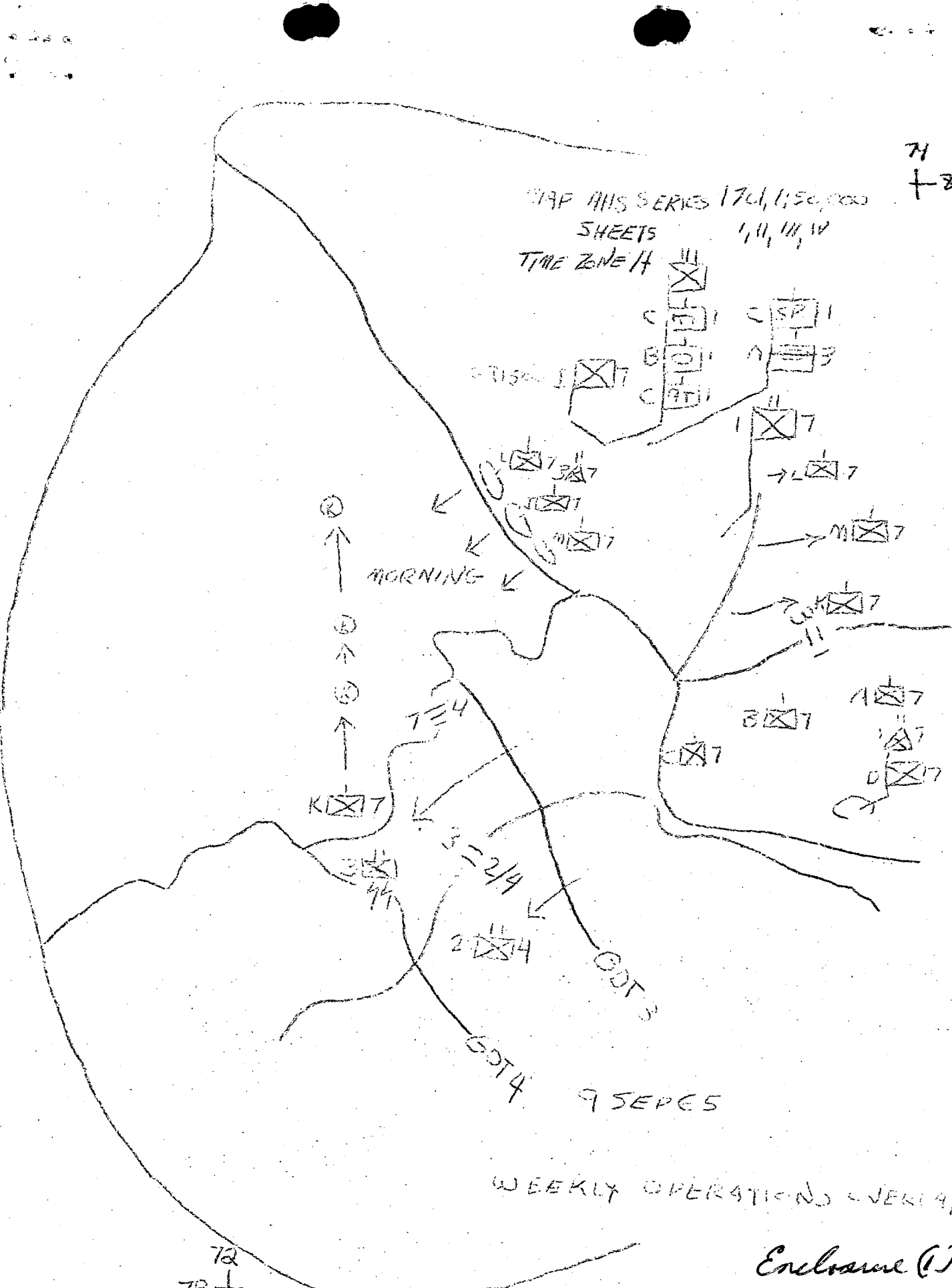

1. Operations.

a. Summary of week's activities

- (1) At 110000Z September the last units of ACP-7 Headquarters and BATT 1/7 departed from assigned shipping at the Chu Lai airbase. 1/7 went immediately to its assigned positions on the beach relieving units of 3/7 that had temporarily filled the gap on the beach after being retracted from their zone of action in "Operation Piranha." After being relieved by 1/7, 3/7 resumed its position as the regimental reserve. On the 12th of September, 1st Battalion, 7th Marines resumed active deep patrolling in its assigned TAOR. The 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines assumed control of a portion of the Chu Lai beach and deployed 3 rifle companies into position. Company I deployed to the Chu Lai airfield to provide a static defense and is now under the operational control of the 4th Marines. On the 13th of September the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines commenced "Operation Lifter" by deploying a company in the vicinity of BAY (1) (BF 625004). The 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines developed their defensive positions, manned observation posts and conducted a patrol in their TAOR. On the 14th of September, the 7th Marines liaison officer to Binh Son returned to the regimental CP to develop closer coordination with the ARVN and AF and to improve upon present fire support techniques currently being employed. 1st Battalion, 7th Marines and 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines worked on establishing a mutually agreeable boundary between their respective TAORs. A crater analysis team from Battery I, 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines investigated incoming rounds that 3/7 received last night and there were indications that they were definitely 105 incoming rounds. On the 15th of September the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines continued to man its assigned TAOR positions and to conduct active, aggressive, patrolling in the assigned TAOR. Company C continued to conduct "Operation Lifter." The 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines continued to improve its positions, man posts and conduct reconnaissance patrols. On the 16th of September aggressive patrolling by Company C resulted in the capture of 3 VCS. The 1st platoon of Company C (Rein), 1st Reconnaissance Battalion was inserted at dusk by helo in the Trung Thanh peninsula and established a CP at BF 623905.

CONFIDENTIALD. Summary of events(1) 1st Battalion, 7th Marines

On the 11th of September, after off-loading from assigned shipping Companies A, B and C assumed former positions on the M&R and Company D assumed the mission of the battalion reserve. At 111625 Company A apprehended one VC who tried to walk through the M&R in the vicinity of BT 578032. Company C, conducting a motorized daylight patrol behind the M&R, exchanged small arms fire at 120838 in the vicinity of BT 54-9023 with a sniper. The VC escaped and no weapons were found. Company A departed on "Operation M&R" at 130529 on September 11th. The LVT's, with Company B embarked, commenced landing across Blue Beach at BT 62-3002 at 130615. The company immediately proceeded to establish a combat base on the hill vicinity BT 623004. The company found one booby trap, consisting of a hand grenade and a short trip wire, on the northwest slope of the hill with mine detector equipment. At 131550 the company found a 20 year old female with 4 wounds on her back and effected a medical evacuation for her. On the 13th of September, Company B furnished a reinforced platoon as security to pick up a motor by helicopter on a beach at BT 761863. This operation went off without incident. At 140755, Company A was relieved by Company C and returned by LVTs to the M&R arriving back at 140825 to relieve a composite company that had held its positions in its absence. Company B, conducting a day, platoon, combat patrol picked up 6 VCs vicinity of BT 6080-04. They were young males who looked suspicious and they had no I.C. cards. At 141815, Company B found 4 strands of defensive wire cut vicinity of BT 569025 and apprehended 2 VCs in the immediate area. Company C, continuing to conduct "Operation M&R," apprehended 5 VCs and 1 VC in the vicinity of BT 624003. The company found an unoccupied cave at BT 625004, containing 1 M-1 carbine, 1 rifle grenade, 1 cartridge belt, communication wire, 1 RH-10 battery and small arms ammunition. Company C interrogated the villagers in SAN NY (1) and apprehended 1 VC at 151000. At 151800 a platoon from Company B out on a daylight combat patrol captured 3 VCs. Two VCs were captured at BT 611015 and one VC at BT 613983. The men were running and had to have a warning shot fired to stop them. The third one was found through routine checking of people in the area. At 161700, Company C found one M-19 grenade in a cave vicinity of BT 622012 and at the same time they were fired on by a sniper with a high powered rifle. The Company B and resupply helicopter received carbine and rifle fire in the vicinity of BT 624007. At 161800 the company captured one wounded VC being carried by villagers on a stretcher covered by seven mats vicinity of BT 623014. At 161600 the company apprehended 3 VCs in the vicinity of BT 623006. Throughout the day, Company C destroyed numerous fighting hole and caves in grid square BT 6200

On the 11th of September Companies L, M and N were relieved on the MLR by companies of the 1st Battalion and they reverted to Regimental Reserve. At 121310h, Companies L, M and N completed moving into their respective positions on the MLR and began to consolidate their positions. On the 13th of September, Company I remained under the operational control of the 4th Marines. At 132200h, Company K received a probe of its lines at BF 529009. An illumination grenade was fired and one round from a rifle. Two persons were seen fleeing the area. The same night, Company L received 5 incoming artillery rounds 50 meters forward of their positions at BF 522002. At 141945h, Company I returned to the operational control of the 3rd Battalion. On the 14th, 15th and 16th of September, Companies L, M and N conducted extensive reconnaissance patrols with negative contact. At 171700h a patrol from Company M captured 1 VC and 2 VC's at BF 532995. (See Overlay).

(3) Company J (Rein), 1st Reconnaissance Battalion

(a) The 1st Platoon was inserted at dusk on the 16th of September by helicopter into the Trung Phan Peninsula in grid square BT 6296. They established a CP/OP at BF 628983 and it is their intention to determine the supply/communication routes, both land and water, used by the VC to enter and exit the area. They will attempt to find specific areas used by the VC to stage and store supplies. At 170845, the platoon apprehended one woman who handed her into the platoon CP/OP. They detained her until nightfall when they moved the CP/OP. The platoon spent the day observing normal village action in Huong Hoa 1, My Que (1), Binh Yen Mai (2) and monitored trail and river traffic in the area. At 171410h, small arms fire was received from 3 VC and they were last seen moving south in the vicinity of BF 633984.

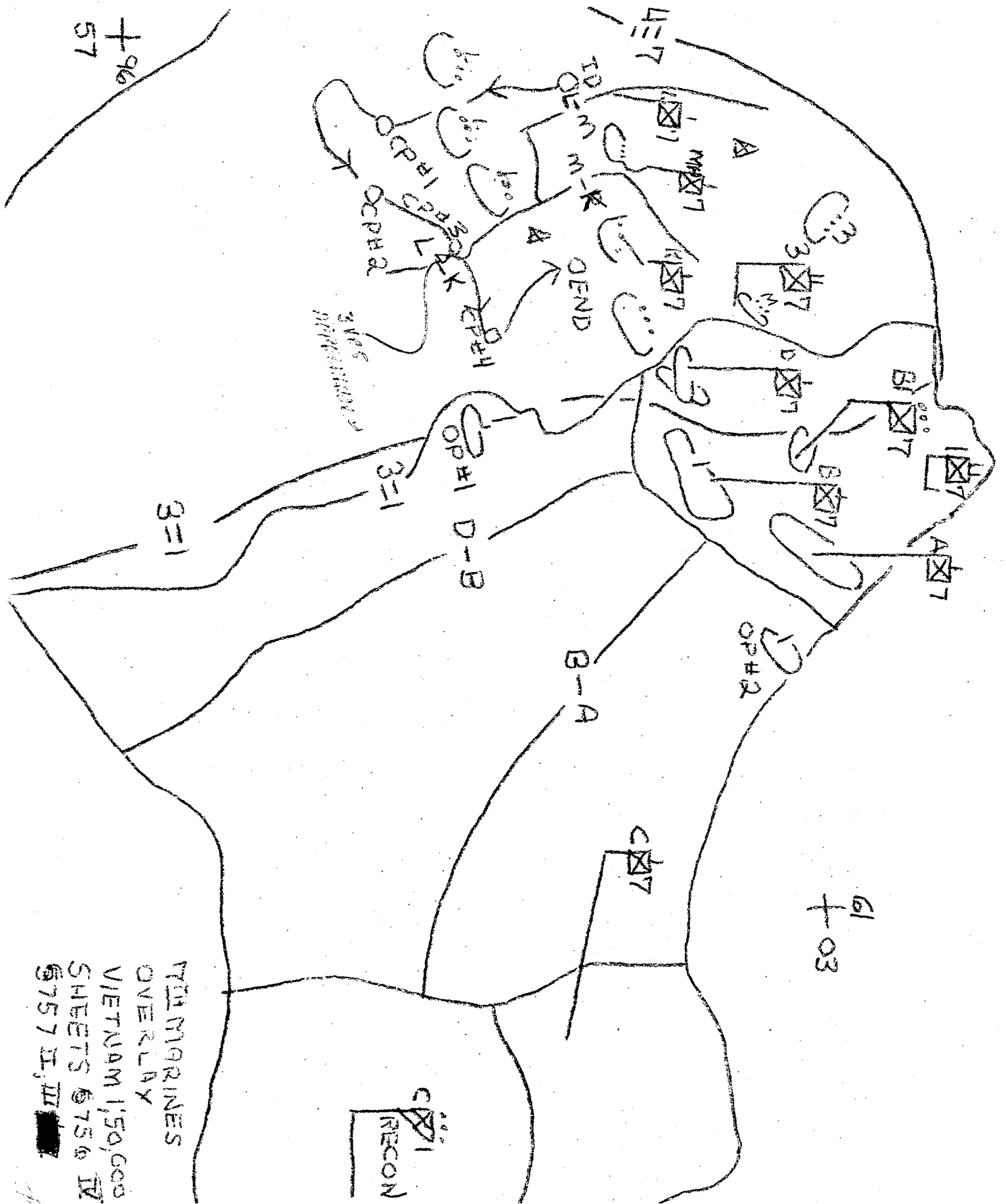

1. Operations

a. Summary of week's activities

On the 18th September, the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines continued to man its assigned MLR positions and to conduct active aggressive patrolling in its assigned FAOR. Company C, continued to conduct "Operation Zipper" in the vicinity of Tan Hy (1) at BF 623004. The 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines improved positions, manned observation posts and conducted reconnaissance patrols and ambushes within the FAOR. On the 19th of September, a squad from Company D, proceeding to an ambush site, was taken under fire just as it departed the company lines. A Marine from Company I was wounded at 190700, returning from Binh Son on Highway 1. On the 20th of September, Company A relieved Company C in order to continue "Operation Zipper". Company C will assume the MLR positions of Company A. On the 21st of September, it became apparent that present weather conditions were impeding the foot movement of troops and limiting visibility. Amphibian tractors were used extensively to deploy troops. At 210630H a Marine from Company C was injured by an air burst at BF 572029. An investigation was conducted by H Battery, 4th Battalion, 11th Marines, who had been firing M+I fires on the Trung Phan Peninsula at BF 665992 using fuze quick, which are seldom prematurely detonated. Although an occurrence of this type is considered highly improbable, owing to the extreme weather conditions prevailing, the round may have been detonated by the rain, resulting in the air burst that superficially wounded the Marine. On the 22nd of September, Company A continued to conduct "Operation Zipper". Company D became stranded by flood waters and depended on the use of LVT's for mobility. Company G, 1st Engineer Battalion reported, that while attached to units participating in Operation Zipper they had destroyed 3 tank traps, 4 bunkers, 25 caves and 67 fighting holes over a period of week. The 3rd platoon of Company G, 1st Recon Battalion conducted an operation working from BS (504941) southeast to BS (512937). They noted several sightings of VC and VBA. At 221505H the platoon was ambushed at BS (512937). The first VC burst of fire killed 1 Marine and wounded 2 others. A village at BS (515935) opened up with automatic fire and two armed LVT's arrived within 40 minutes to expend all their ordnance on the village destroying it.

At 221615H the platoon was extracted and it was <sup>CONFIRMED</sup> estimated that they had killed 17 VC with small arms fire. On the 24th of September, the 3rd Battalion completed the rotation of its companies on the ML and Company A continued to conduct "Operation Zipper".

b. Summary of events

(1) 1st Battalion, 7th Marines

On the 18th of September, Company B furnished one security squad, for an A team that was stationed in the village of Trung An (1) BT (594000), to be used against an expected 30 man VC attack and set up a platoon ambush east of the village. No VC attack materialized, Company C apprehended 17 VCS at BT 620018 and found 1 pair ARVN boots, 1 ARVN shirt and 1 PP shirt in a cave at BT 623015. They destroyed 4 caves and 7 fighting holes, at BT 621016, BT 621008, BT 624006, BT 625005 and BT 625008. Two tank traps at BT 622008 and three bunkers at BT 621007 were destroyed. At 182335H Company C apprehended one VC woman cadre leader and 2 VCS at BS 620012. On the 19th of September Company B had a squad that was proceeding to a night ambush site fired upon by 6 VC at 190015H as the squad departed the company defensive perimeter. The squad immediately returned fire and assaulted the position. One Marine was later found to have a slight scalp wound and was attended by a corpsman. The action took place at BT 556013. There was an unconfirmed report that the squad had killed 2 VC. At 191530H Company A experienced sniper fire from Hai Vinh (3) BT (587027). Fire was returned and a fire team deployed to investigate, returned, having found nothing. At 200855H Company A relieved Company C and took over the mission of "Operation Zipper". At 201500H Company A apprehended 1 VC at BT 622091. On the 21st of September, a Marine in Company C was slightly wounded at BT 572029 by an artillery air burst and was treated by the company corpsman. Continuing Operation Zipper, Company A captured 4 VCS at BT 651033 around 211100H. At 211105H, the company experienced sniper fire from BT 655035 and again at 211130H from BT 664033. The patrol returned fire and observed one wounded VC being helped away by his comrades. At 211200H the patrol encountered automatic weapons fire from BT 660027, again from across the river. The patrol returned fire and observed 2 wounded VC being helped away by their comrades. At 211228 three VC fired upon a Company A patrol from a rock pile at BT 647017. The patrol killed 1 VC and captured 6 rifle grenades, 2 homemade demolition charges and one document. At 211515H another Company A patrol ran into a VC patrol, killed 1 VC and captured 4 VC. At 221100H Company B sent out a patrol to meet and accompany Mr. LAN, Security Chief of Sinh Nghia, to apprehend 15 known VC. At 221300H in the vicinity of BS 613983, the patrol apprehended 4 women, 1 child and 5 men all VCS. At 232215H the Company A roadblock, at BT (554014), had one hand grenade thrown into its area. No casualties were sustained and there were negative results on trying to find the person or persons who had thrown the grenade.

(2) 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines

On the 18th of September at 0900, a reconnaissance patrol from Company I captured a VCS in the vicinity of BT (533968).

At 182200 a patrol from Company K received an enemy hand grenade near BS (541009). The patrol fired 70 rounds in return without effect. There were no friendly casualties. At 190700 while returning from Binh Son, PFC ALLEN of Company I was wounded severely when he opened a booby trapped gate in the vicinity of BS (572962). He was evacuated by helicopter to "B" Med. At 192345 the 2nd Platoon of Company K saw 2 VCS with a flashlight in the vicinity of BF (539001). The platoon fired at the 2 VCS and the fire was returned. There were no friendly or enemy casualties. On the 20th of September, Company I had 6 fire teams deployed within the Battalion TAOR. Team 1 was observing Tri Binh (1) at BF (555988). Teams 4 and 7 were observing Nam Binh (1) at BF 536969 and Nam Binh (7) at BF (538960). Teams 2 and 3 were observing Nam Binh (4) at BF 564956. Team 6 was observing trail nets. At 200740H 4 Marines, including the company commander, were injured by a booby trapped grenade at BF (522971). The 4 Marines were evacuated to "B" Med and their prognosis is good. None of the wounds was serious. From the 21st through the 24th of September, the Battalion continued to conduct reconnaissance patrols and establish ambushes on several trail nets. By the 24th of September the Battalion had completed the realignment of its companies on the MLR.

d. Civil Affairs

During the week the Civil Affairs Team attached to Company C, conducting "Operation Zipper," set up and manned nine collection points. The team talked to the people and explained the Marines mission to a total of 215 men, 847 women and 1384 children. Over 450 people were treated by the corpsmen for various sores, infections, and other minor ailments. At 201015, the Regimental Civil Affairs Officer consulted with the District Chief at Binh Son to establish some form of regular sick call for the hamlets in the 1/7 TAOR. The Civil Affairs Team attached to Company A, conducting "Operation Zipper" treated the citizens of Son Tra (1) and (2) for skin diseases, colds, and lacerations. The team spent 5 hours on the 20th of September and 4½ hours on the 22nd of September in the Hamlet of Son Tra (2). A total of 4 hours was spent working in the Hamlet of Son Tra (1). A total of 180 children and 70 adults were treated. The team collected all extra unused c-ration cans and distributed the food among the people. Company A conducted religious services in the Hamlets of Son Tra (1) and (2) on the 24th of September.

1. Operations.

a. Summary of Week's Activities.

On the 25th of September, the 1st Battalion and the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines continued to man their assigned MLR positions and to conduct active, aggressive patrolling in the TAOR. The 1st Battalion ended Operation ZIPPER and began Operation HARDROCK with the movement of Company A at 250000H from its combat base located at BT 623003. Operation HARDROCK had the mission to search and clear the northeastern portion of the THRUONG PHIAN Peninsula and to destroy any caves, tunnels or fortifications encountered. On the 26th of September at 0641H, Company B was helilifted into the THRUONG PHIAN Peninsula to participate in Operation HARDROCK. The 1st Battalion, 7th Marines left their portion of the MLR at CHU LAI to be guarded by Companies C and D and a reinforced platoon from Company L, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines. The 1st Battalion modified all patrolling in order to support Operation HARDROCK. On the 27th of September, Operation HARDROCK continued as the destruction of enemy fortifications slowed the momentum of the operation. At 271128H, Company A was retracted from the operation by LVT's and returned to the Battalion CP. The 3rd Battalion continued to conduct aggressive patrolling to the far border of its TAOR. On the 28th of September, Company B continued Operation HARDROCK, searching and clearing several tunnels and caves. On the 29th of September both battalions continued to conduct patrols with limited contacts made. Company B continued Operation HARDROCK, searching caves and picking up VC suspects. At 291745H RL7-7 Headquarters alerted the ready striking force of the 3rd Battalion to be ready to reinforce the 3rd Platoon, Company C, 1st Reconnaissance Battalion which had been operating in the TAOR and had been taken under fire by the VC. A platoon from Company L was helilifted at 291825H to reinforce the reconnaissance unit and became the first such unit ever to reinforce reconnaissance elements outside the Chu Lai enclave. On the 30th of September, the battalions continued their active patrolling within the TAOR. Company B continued Operation HARDROCK, searching and clearing caves and fortifications. On the 1st of October, active patrolling was again conducted with negative results. The 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines made their final preparations for Operation QUICKDRAW scheduled to begin on the 3rd of October. However, on D-1, the 2nd of October, two reinforced platoons will move into a harbor site as part of the operation.



b. Summary of Events.(1) 1st Battalion, 7th Marines

On the 25th of September, Company C furnished a platoon to provide security for Vietnamese rice harvesters at BT 610017. At 250000H, Company A departed the combat base located at BT 623003 and proceeded as ordered in Operation HANDBROCK to BT 663031 arriving there at 251300H. At 251600H Company A captured one VCS in a house at BT 663034. At 251705H Company A experienced heavy sniper fire from an automatic weapon and several M-1's in the vicinity of BT 663028. Company A established its CP at BT 659037, and at 260625H occupied its objective BT 653037 through BT 662029. Company B was relieved of its MLR positions at 251755H. Company C assumed a portion of the Company B MLR positions and was reinforced with a rifle platoon from Company L, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines. Company D relieved Company B of the right one-third of its MLR positions. Company B was helilifted to Landing Zone BEECH vicinity of BT 676005 at 260641H. No resistance was encountered and Company B proceeded north. At 260910H, Company B passed Phase Line APPLE enroute to Phase Line PEAR. At 260950H Company B commenced a search and clear of the hamlet, DONG TE at BT 672016. At 261345H Company A encountered and made arrangements for a wounded civilian at BT 659037 to be evacuated to the BAS for medical treatment. At 261445H the 2nd Platoon of Company A conducted a search and clear of a village at BT 663014 with negative results. At 261925H, Company A established blocking positions for the night at BT 659038. At 261345H, Company B destroyed a cave and entrenchments, vicinity of BT 669023. Company B captured a total of nine VCS at BT 6701, BT 6702 and BT 6703 and destroyed them at 261600H. Company B established positions for the night along Phase Line PEAR at 261925H. At 261650H, Company D at OP #1 dispatched a fire team to investigate a reported VC at BT 554992 observing OP #1. The fire team observed and pursued two VC who were armed but darkness fell and they were never caught. Company A was retracted by LVT's and at 271120H they were at an assembly area, BT 575029, ready to assume their original MLR positions. At 271130H, Company B captured six VCS hiding along the sea cliffs at BT 673054. At 271630H, Company B apprehended two VCS who were hiding in a rock pile at BT 678025. At 271930H Company B established its base camp at BT 671027. Company A relieved Company C on the left one-third of the MLR at CHU LAI at 281630H. Company C assumed the center one-third of the MLR and Company D the right one-third. At 280830H a cave was found by Company B that had been reinforced with metal and bamboo stakes at BT 654044. At 281600H, Company B captured a VCS at BT 677012. ~~Company B reported that at BT 663012.~~ Company C reported that at BT 566018, thirty meters to their front, a hand grenade exploded. Illumination was fired and no contacts made. At 291140H, Company B apprehended one VCS, without an ID card, who was hiding in a house at BT 659028. A Company D patrol received sniper fire from six VC at BT 669009. The patrol crossed the river in pursuit but failed to make further contact. At 291755H a Company B patrol received light sniper fire from BT 653022. An investigation of the area turned up one spider trap, four feet by three feet, with a grass and wood cover. Operation HANDBROCK continued on the 30th of September and the 1st of October with negative results. The remainder of the battalion continued its active aggressive patrolling.

(2) 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines.

Company K dispatched a squad size patrol at 251145 to apprehend five VCS; two women, one girl, one man and one boy. They were picked up at BT 523026 and delivered to the POW compound. At 251400H a fire team patrol from Company K apprehended four VCS at BS 513006 who were evacuated to the Regimental POW compound. Patrol "Kianet" a reinforced platoon size ambush from Company K, received small arms fire at BS 556992. At 261845H. Fire was returned with negative results. No friendly casualties were sustained. A platoon size reconnaissance/ambush patrol from Company K received small arms fire from five or six armed men at 270100H dressed in black and wearing straw hats at BS 511973. The patrol returned fire and the VC fled, leaving behind a wallet, an overlay, documents and sandals. At 271000H the platoon from Company L that had been under the operational control of the 1st Battalion was returned to the 3rd Battalion. At 282245H, vicinity of BS 510995, trip flares were set off and one Vietnamese male was sighted. Company I fired at him but he escaped. At 291745H, the ready striking force, Company L, was alerted to stand by to support the 3rd Battalion, Company G, 1st Recon Battalion which had been hit by VC in the RACH. At 1825H one platoon from Company L was helilifted out of the Battalion CP and at 1840H they touched down in the vicinity of BS 477969 where the recon elements were located. At 291850H another platoon of Company L was committed and operational control passed from the Commanding Officer, 7th Marines to the Commanding Officer, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines. The two platoons from Company L and the reconnaissance platoon set up in a perimeter defense in the vicinity of BS 477966. All elements returned to the 3rd Battalion CP at 300715H. There were no friendly casualties. The battalion conducted extensive patrolling during the rest of the reporting period.

**d. Civil Affairs.**

At 251300H a Company C patrol treated a 16 year old Vietnamese girl at BT 612011 for a leg wound inflicted by VC in July 1965 when she tried to warn a Marine patrol from 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marines. She was evacuated to "B" Med for proper treatment. At 261300H Company A found a male civilian at BT 659037, injured during an artillery strike. He had shrapnel in his left buttocks. He was delivered to the BAS by helicopter and will be returned after treatment. On the 29th of September, the 1st Battalion completed the initial liaison with the hamlet chiefs of TRUNG AN (1) and (2) regarding a proposed Civil Affairs program to be conducted in the two villages. The program will include medical care and clothing issues and will commence on 1 October 1965.

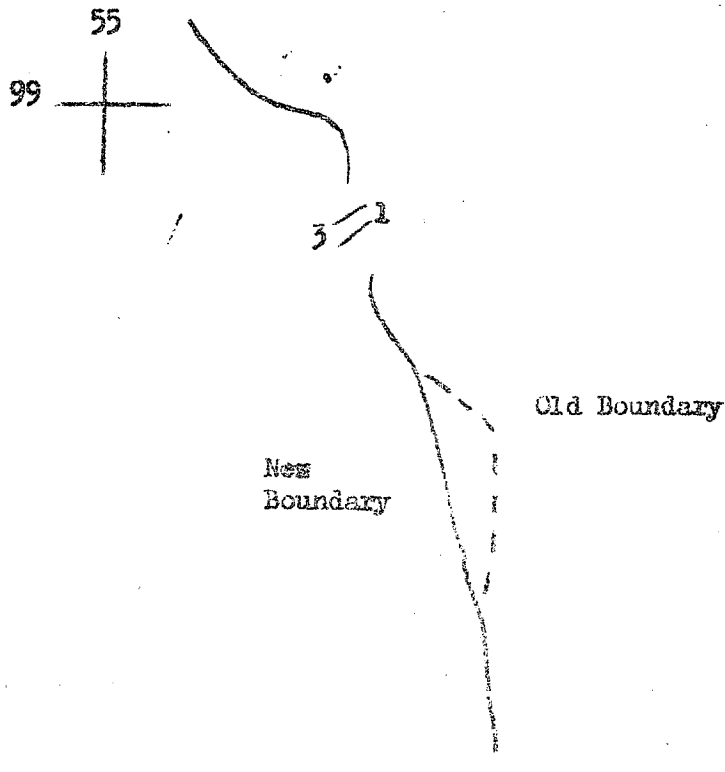



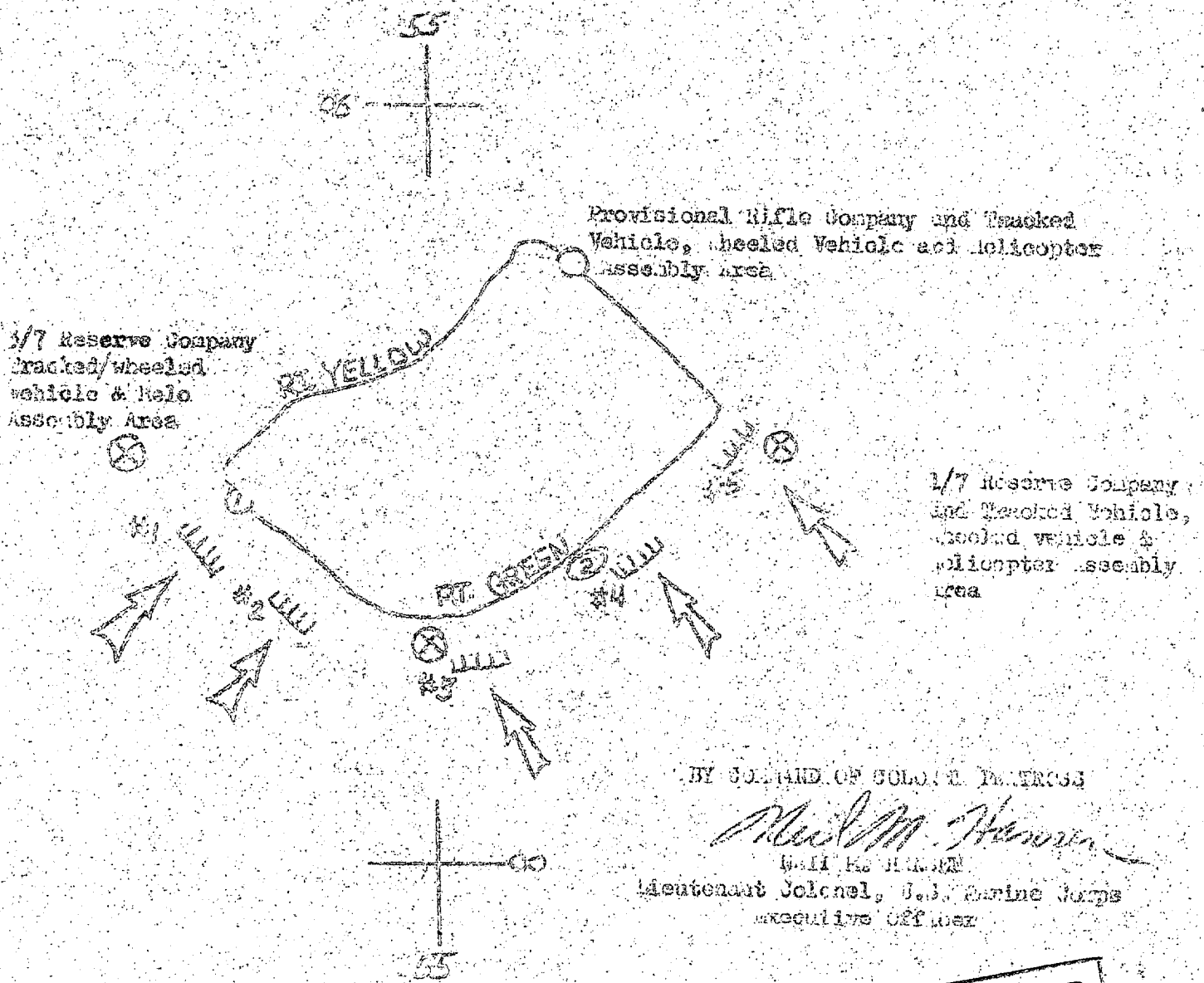
