IN PRESENTING my fifth catalogue it is with the greatest pleasure that I thank you all for the continued patronage. I have added many new customers to my list and have received an enormous number of letters praising my Cape Cod tubers. My stock has done very fine in all parts of the United States and Canada. My Dahlia business is still on the increase and we dug 25,000 clumps to fill orders for 1930.

The past season was very disappointing to a great many on account of no rain to amount to anything. My Gardens, however, did wonderful because they are situated right on the shore of the salt water on Cape Cod Bay and they had plenty of fog and dew that supplied just enough water for them. I never give them water as we only have enough for household uses. The blooms were very fine this season and we had very few insects. Last season (1928) we were bothered a lot by grasshoppers that ate the blossoms. I picked my first bloom on July 4th, and by September it was hard to walk between the rows there was so much foliage and blossoms and they were all tied up.
My tubers clumped up very fine and were in the ground long enough to ripen or mature in grand condition.
Of satisfied customers I will be pleased to give addresses to any one. Cape Cod tubers are hard to beat as they are grown naturally and in the best of soil. If I have stock that does not do well at my Gardens I destroy it and get some new. I better my stock each year for the benefit of my customers and that is why they stick to me as they are perfectly satisfied. My aim is honesty and square dealings.
Each year I visit the leading shows of the East and add to my collection the outstanding specimens. I have at the present time about 800 varieties.
I send orders all over the United States and Canada and a few abroad. We grow a great many varieties that we have only a few clumps of and if you wish some variety that is not in the catalogue write and we may have it.

I wish to thank all for the wonderful business you gave me last year and all who visited my Gardens. Come any time whether you wish to buy or not. My Gardens are for the pleasure of you all who love the Dahlia and Gladioli.

I hope my 1930 catalogue will be of interest to you and that I may merit your orders. My stock is free from disease and I destroy all stunts and runts and destroy all that do not run true.

# SAGAMORE GARDENS New Introductions for 1930 

ALEPPO. Dec. (Dr. Shattuck.) I believe this to be one of the best yellows on the market on account of its long, stiff stem. 'This Dahlia has good depth and good size. Color a pure glistening picric yellow with fine petals. Flowers are not coarse like a lot of the yellows. Beautiful formation and fine foliage.

ANGELA MIA. Dec. (Dr. Shattuck.) The most popular white in my garden this season because it has depth. Most of the whites are not full enough. This flower is like a large ball with a stiff stem. Very free bloomer with the best of foliage.

BARCELONA. Dec. (Dr. Shattuck.) This seedling is four years old and has improved each year. The color is light carmine, very striking, has to be seen to be appreciated. It has a long rigid stem, twelve to eighteen inches long, holding the eight to ten inch blossom erect and perfect in formation. It has stood the insect test perfectly. Foliage is dark green and leathery. One of the most popular in my garden this season. Stock almost sold out.

MING TOY. Dec. (Dr. Shattuck.) One of the brightest and most striking Dahlias I have seen. A regular oriental color of velvety pomegranite purple. Stiff stem, medium size, fine foliage.

MRS. FANNIE BEALS. Dec. (Dr. Shattuck.) This is a four-year-old seedling and has improved each year. Fine foliage and tall plant. Nothing like it on the market. Stock nearly sold out at my gardens this summer.

Flowers have good depth and are large but must be disbudded as it is a profuse bloomer. I had eighteen blooms on one plant this season. Foliage very fine and insects do not bother it at my gardens. PRINCE OF PILSEN. Dec. (Dr. Shattuck.) One of the most popular Dahlias in my garden. It is a flower of gigantic proportions. Color is rhodamine purple with silver reverse. Petals twist a little showing the silver which adds to its beauty. It has broad overlapping petals with twisted ends and has a fine full center. The stiff stems are from twelve to eighteen inches long holding the flowers way above the foliage. The flower is deep and grows to eleven inches in diameter. Foliage is dark green and leathery and insects have never bothered it. Height of plant six to eight feet. This is a dandy for size and stem and for you who are looking for the big fellows this is one. Tubers all sold.

SAGAMORE BEAUTY. Dec. (Dr. Shattuck.) A very handsome deep rose pink with a small cream center. A fine cut flower and great keeper. It has a good stiff stem ten to twelve inches in length. The flowers are held up and look right at you. It has good depth and are from six to seven inches in diameter. Foliage dark green and insect proof. Won third prize in the seedlings class at the Boston Show in 1927 in a class of sixteen. Also won first prize at Barnstable County Fair for best decorative basket of five blooms in 1927. The only times it has been shown.

## New and Up-to-Date Dahlias for 1930

ALTA RAY. Oval Dec. (R.) Salmon orange. An eight inch commercial exhibition. One tint darker than Jane Cowl and without the Cowl Bull's eye center. A grand stem with foliage up to the bloom. Scored ninety as the best six three-year-old seedling at the Biltmore, California.

ANNA MARIE. (Wiegand 85.) Six feet. This Dahlia's popularity is due to its attractive coloring of old gold suffused reddish salmon, distinctly tipped white. Flowers of good form on fine stems.

A. O. KENNY. Dec. (Darling.) Large flowers of perfect form and great depth, carried on good stems. Color a rich bronze buff shade of one tone, but with the center tinted with bronze. Never on any Dahlia have we seen more gold dust on the petals than on this variety. Plants grow medium height and are very free flowering, in a class by itself. This Dahlia was placed on the Honor Roll of The American Home Magazine, December, 1928. Tubers, $\$ 10.00$; Plants, $\$ 5.00$
BROCKTON BEAUTY. Dec. (Carver.) A very large flowers which commands attention when seen growing in the garden. A profuse bloomer of great depth and size. Flowers remain large all through the season. Color is a pinkish lavender, shading to creamy white center, with reverse of petals pinkish lavender. A wonderful keeper with a fine stiff stem holding the large flowers well above the foliage.

CITY OF MONTREAL. Dec. Won the Lufkin silver cup as a special prize at the 1929 Boston Show for the second best decorative of New England origin, and was greatly admired by all. The plant is a medium tall grower and extremely robust growing. The foliage is a heavy dark green and very leathery. It is a very profuse bloomer from eary tili late. I have had as many as nine blooms on a single plant at one time, all over nine inches. Stems are perfect and hold the large blooms up at all times. Ridgway color chart gives the color as aster purple, reverse of petals light mallow purple. Blooms are very deep and stand for days when cut.

Tubers, $\$ 10.00$; Plants, $\$ 5.00$
CONQUISTADOR. H. C. Soft creamy yellow shading to a glowing pink at the base of the petals. The pink coloring is very pronounced and gives to the flower the appearance of being illuminated from within. This is a Dahlia built on a massive plan. The plant is extraordinarily tall and the flowers can be cut with four-foot stems. The bloom is in proportion, being regular, rather coarse petaled, broad and deep. Moreover, the texture of the flower is of the same vigorous quality, not being easily soiled by wind, sun or moisture. Beautiful, vigorous, hardy-a "best Dahlia in the show" variety. Stock limited.

DOROTHY DIX. H. C. An immense blossom of silvery pink of distinct formation. Petals roll very evenly. Stem is perfect long and stiff. Plants grow tall and sturdily and produce big flowers early and late. Center is always closed. This is one of the largest hybrid cactus and has every good quality.

DR. JOHN H. CARMAN. A large, deep, broad petaled tyrian rose flower tipped petunia and silver on stiff and heavy stem eleven to twenty-two inches long with neck of equal strength. Flowering habit very good and lasting. A large-leaf variety, crown-out and grow to six canes. Awarded Certificate of Merit, 1928, by the American Dahlia Society at Storrs trial ground.

FRANK MILLER. (R.) Picric yellow. A very large decorative on a straight stem that wins every time it has been shown for two years. "The best 'yellow' decorative in America"-Warren. (Picric yellow is about one tint lighter than a well colored lemon.)

FLORADORA. Dec. Bright apricot. We believe this is a seedling of the well known prize-winner, "Jove", although its habits are considerably different and the flower even larger. The rich coloring makes a special appeal and the formation is interesting in that the petals are unusually long and slightly recurved. It is a loosely formed flower rather than a heavy one and its depth is sufficient to balance its substantial diameter. Free blooming and of medium height.

FRED W. PATTERSON. H. C. (Kemp.) A seedling from the beautiful Adda Patterson, but a stronger, heavier flower. The color is difficult to accurately describe, and as near as we have been able to work it out, with the aid of Ridgeway's color chart, the color is lavender pink, with deep amaranth pink reverse. A beautiful color combination that instantly attracts and holds the attention. The flower averages ten inches across. The long stiff stem holds the flower high above the foliage. Plant is vigorous, with stem, foliage and habit identical with Adda Patterson. A most excellent garden and exhibition variety. Height 7 feet.

JOVE. Dec. Bronze pink. Pink or salmon is the predominant color with the bronze coloring somewhat accented toward the center. The flower is very large and can be grown as the largest Dahlia in the show, ten-inch blooms being common under ordinary field culture. The stem is the best possible, being long, strong and straight. Has everything to make it a first-class variety.

Tubers, $\$ 3.50$; Plants, $\$ 1.75$
KATHLEEN NORRIS. (F. \& M.) We believe this to be the greatest pink decorative Dahlia in commerce today. Color a true rose pink, later deepening to mallow pink, but paler in the young central petals. A bloom of gigantic proportions; petals broad and overlapping with twisted ends; full, tight center. The first two leaves on the straight, stiff stem are from twelve to fourteen inches from the flower; a great bloomer and an excellent keeper. Has been awarded the highest prizes wherever exhibited the past season, also the Garden and Home Builder Achievement Medal at the exhibition of the Dahlia Society of New Jersey; also at the A. D. S. Show in_New York.

Tubers, $\$ 10.00$; Plants, $\$ 5.00$
KENDAL GLORY. (Kendal, 1930.) A 1926 seedling which performed consistently in our gardens in 1927, 1928 and 1929. In the spring of 1929 it was forwarded to the American Dahlia Society trial ground at Storrs, Connecticut. Under very difficult conditions at these grounds it scored 83 and on one of the judges' cards the significant comment was made "It's good". It is a true cactus variety whose entire bloom is rose red. It lasts about three weeks on the stalk and during the last week a golden sheen develops on the entire bloom, giving it a most gorgeous appearance. It has good long stems. medium heavy in size, with flowers six to eight inches; depth three inches. The plant bushes well and attains a height of four to five feet. It is a free bloomer. The huge spiderty bloom holds a tight full center from early until late season. The coloring is unique in the cactus varieties. It is a $\$ 10.00$ flower, but we price it cheaper as it is our first introduction.

Tubers, $\$ 7.50$ each, net; Plants, $\$ 4.00$ after May 1st
MOTHER MACHREE. Dec. Cream or ivory white with a touch of pink at the center. "Something entirely new," a well known authority on Dahlias said. The color is surely very much out of the ordinary and the great big deep flowers on tall stalks are outstanding in the Dahlia patch.

MRS. ALFRED B. SEAL. Dec. (Seal.) Described by the originator as follows: Undoubtedly the largest and finest pure, rich, glowing, old rose Dahlia ever produced-nothing we have ever seen can even remotely approach it. Such an unusual coloring-the softest, richest shade of pure, glowing, old rose imaginable. The flowers are huge, measuring with Siskiyou, and of great depth and substance, and held proudly erect above a tall, strong bush. It won at Palace Hotel, the Garden and Home Builder Achievement Medal for Best New Dahlia originated west of the Rocky Mountains. New for 1929 and the outstanding Western Dahlia of the year.

Tubers, \$15.00; Plants, \$7.50
ORIENTAL BEAUTY. For sheer beauty and perfection of form, stem and foliage this is the queen of Dahlias. A clear, brilliant rose pink, a tone deeper than delice. Petals roll more than the average hybrid cacus. Just a suggestion of a lighter tint at the tips accentuates the incurved form. Blooms average seven to eight inches but can be grown much larger. Exhibited first in 1927 at the Los Angeles Biltmore it took first for best Dahlia in the show. At the 1928 show it showed itself a consistent winner by winning the Garden and Home Builder (American Home) medal. If we could grow but one Dahlia we would choose Oriental Beauty.

Tubers, $\$ 10.00$; Plants, $\$ 5.00$
PHYLLIS SHAW. Dec. A monstrous flower of apricot orange with reverse of petals jasper red with gold sheen. The blooms are gigantic in size and depth. This is a seedling from Elite Glory and has much the same habits in growth; foliage is very dark green and leathery, the kind the insects do not like. Plant is very robust, and blooms very freely with good full centers all season. Stems are long and stiff as a cane, blooms awe well out at top of plant. This flower was awarded a Dahlia Society of New England Silver Medal at the 1928 Boston Show. Not to be released until 1930 owing to lack of stock.

Tubers, $\$ 10.00 ;$ Plants, $\$ 5.00$
RICHELIEU. A new type of decorative Dahlia that resembles a very large rose of deepest red. The petals have a velvety texture new in Dahlias. This beautiful flower grows on top of the stem like a rose. Sturdy bushes and exceptionally strong stems. Will keep for days as a cut flower.

RISING MARS. (Simmons.) A hybrid cactus that for five years has been winning awards at the New England Dahlia Society shows. It has won seven first prizes, two silver medals, and the Darling Cup. In December, 1928, it was placed on the Honor Roll of The American Home Magazine. An abundant bloomer, early and late. Natural flowers with a uniform size of nine inches. Its color given by Ridgeway's chart as pomegranate purple. In the sunlight the blooms have a three tone effect. Never burns in the sun or sheds its petals. Can always be depended upon for blooms and a tight center. The plant stands five feet with dark green leaves and needs no pruning. The strong stems are long and slender. For the first time this five-year-old seedling is offered for sale. The tubers offered are all field grown from tubers.

STARLIGHT. Dec. (Boston.) One of Bessie Boston's best 1928 novelties, described by her as a huge flower of pure unshaded gold, with tall robust bushes always laden with perfect center flowers.

THE WORLD. Dec. (Dahliadel.) This wonderful new Dahlia was selected at the A. D. S. Show in New York, by Mr. J. D. Sullivan, of the New York World. The coloring is unusual-rich deep rosy magenta overlaid garnet with silver shadings on edges of petals. A rich and beautiful combination of colors. Perfect full centers, eight to ten inches across and half as deep. Bush five feet, stems strong and erect. Foliage leahery and repellant to insect injury. This greatly admired Dahlia is sure to please you. Stock limited.

THOMAS HAY. A giant in very truth, of clear lilac color throughout. Flowers deep, full and massive, with broad florets bluntly pointed. The stems carry the huge flowers with ease, and the plants flower with surprising freedom. This variety is almost identical in every way (except for its lilac color) to the now famous "Berengaria". One of the best Dahlias in our garden, 1928.

TREASURE ISLAND. Dec. (Dahliadel.) One of the brightest autumn shade Dahlias we have seen. Color bright apricot with gold and rose suffusion and shadings. Bush growth is strong, branches readily from the ground, giving five feet stems. Flowers are held erect with full centers throughout the season. Grows easily ten inches across and five inches deep. A Dahlia that will score high both early and late in the season. Tubers, \$7.50; Plants, \$3.75

VALENTINO. (One of the most beautiful 1928 novelties of Bessie Boston's.) The name suggests beauty and the flower has great size and attractive formation. It is a rue salmon pink, shading to cream at center and is held erect by long upright stems, and grows out of a bush of medium height. This Dahlia was very beautiful in our garden and we have heard many fine reports of it throughout the country.

VALESKA. Dec. Deep lilac. There is no variation in color unless perhaps the lilac shade slightly deepens at the center. We would like to give a more vivid color picture if we could but are completely at a loss to do so, and can only say we know of no other Dahlia like it. The immense blooms have a deep rose-like formation with petals slightly curled and with a bewitchingly pointed center. The stem is first-class, and the growth of the plant luxuriant in the production of fine blooms.

ADDA PATTERSON. H. C. Flowers are pure white; average eight to nine inches in diameter. Splendid keeper. An all around white Dahlia.

A. D. LIVONI. S. Color a clear, cerise pink. Long stems. $\$ 0.25$ each; $\$ 2.50$ doz.

AIBONITA. Dec. Flowers of immense size, on long, graceful stem: Color, a bright glowing pink shading to a rich golden yellow at the center. The flowers are deep and well formed.

ALICE WHITTIER. H. C. The best yellow to date and winner of the President Cup at Boston, 1924. A strong, robust grower, extra large, nine and ten inches in diameter and five and six inches deep. ALEXANDER POPE. H. C. Giant prize winner. Beautiful crimson face, with magenta reverse, making a lovely combination, due to the unusual twisting of the petals.
