Matters on the Pacific Side.

The assembling of the State Legislature, since the sailing of the last steamer, has naturally attracted the attention generally of the people of the State, and its labors and results are looked to with much interest. During the first session, many laws were enacted which experience has demonstrated were imperfect in their details, or injurious in their general application, and such enactments will now require a careful revision or an entire repeal.

The Legislature assembled on the 6th, and a quorum being present, immediately organized, and appointed its officers. The message of Gov. BURNETT was transmitted the succeeding day, and as a State Paper, does great credit to the head and heart of that gentlemen. It is of the reformatory, progressive order, and makes many judicious and sound recommendations. A few days subsequent to the meeting of the Legislature. Governor BURNETT tendered to that body his resignation, and Lieut. Gov. McDougal was inaugurated as Governor the subsequent day. On an election for President of the Senate, in place of the Lieut. Governor, Hon. D. C. BRODERICK, of this city, a prominent, reliable Democrat, and an able man, was chosen on

The political complexion of the Legislature has not yet been determined by a test vote-a question which involves the election of a U. S. Senator. From satisfactory indications, however, we still feel the same assurance. made stronger by the developments of time, that none other than a Democrat can be elected to that important post. A day for the assembling of the joint convention for the choice of a Senator has not been named, but the vote will probably be taken about the middle of February-four weeks

Business throughout the cities of California, is extremely dull. Goods have been sold at uncommonly low rates, in some instances lower than the first cost in New York. But this state of things cannot last long. The miners, who have been getting out an immense quantity of dirt, but washing none, for a long time, will soon begin to reap the products of their labor, and trade will consequently revive and be as thriving as ever. The want of rain in the mountains, has been a serious drawback upon the labors of the miners. Hon. T. BUTLER KING, the new Collector of the Port, has arrived, and entered upon the duties of his office. He was warmly received by his many personal and political friends, and as an officer, will be very acceptable to Californians generally. The Assessors for the City and County have just completed their labors and made their returns. They put down the value of real estate in the city at \$16,950,915, and in the county, outside of the city, at a little less than half a million dollars. The aggregate of tax in city and county, is \$224,-388 41.

The Indian difficulties and depredations. which have been perpetrated in the upper counties of the State, have subsided, and the tribes generally seem now to be quict. Much is anticipated from the labors of the newly appointed Indian Agents, in securing permanent friendly relations with the Indians.

From our more northern neighbors, in Oregon, we hear of nothing of particular interest. The Territorial Legislature is still in session, and are diligently passing such laws as the wants of the people demand. The population is steadily increasing, and permanent prosperity marks the progress of that growing territory.

The great excitement in our city, for a few days past, has been the reports of the immense richness of the "black sand" found on the coast in the region of the Klamath river. Astonishing estimates have been put on paper, and a company formed for the purpose of collecting the sand, and determining its value. Such has been the excitement, and the general impression in community that there was a fortune for all at "Gold Bluff," the locality referred to, that numberless vessels have been fitted out, some of which have sailed, and others are daily departing. If one-half the estimates are well founded, the head. treasures in the "black sand" of Klamath are sufficient to give each California adventurer a fortune.

"Muzzling the Press."

To judge by the tone of the city press yesterday morning, with a single exception, one would suppose that there was an extended and corrupt conspiracy to awe the editors into silence, and to "muzzle the press," even though accomplished by the 'muzzle" of a pistol. Finally, however, the whole thing dwindles down into an expression on the part of one of "five or six of as," to the effect that personal chastisement should speedily follow the comments of any editor upon themselves or their friends.

Now we have no such silly fears of the thoughtless remarks of half a dozen young men, even though made in earnest, and when our brethren of the press treat it as seriously, and at such length as some of them did yesterday morning, they dignify the matter far more than its importance warrants. We shall not swallow our morning chocolate at Delmonico's any less heartily, because some embryo courtier has seen proper to make threats against the editorial fraternity generally.

We shall say what we please, and whatever the good of the community demands, unawed by any such foolish threats, while at the same time we shall endeavor to avoid reflections upon the official acts of public men. where there is not a shadow of a shade of well-founded suspicion, merely to gratify personal friendship, or render an equivalent for favors. Such a course led to the unpleasant meeting of two strangers on Sunday morning last, the wounding of one, and a legal investigation of the whole affair. It has paved the way for the expression on the part of "five or six of us," that afforded our cotemporaries so prolific a subject yesterday morning, and made several of them quake with fear, see "pistols" where "coffee" was intended, challenges in invitations to champagne dinners, and bloody noses and broken heads mixed with old exchanges throughout the editorial sanctum!

"Muzzle the Press!" All the tyrants of the world cannot accomplish such a purpose. They can deprive the people of their liberty, they can bind them in chains, and cast them in dungeons, but they cannot circumscribe the operations of the great moral | following paragraphs: engine that lights the world with intelligence. Spicide by an Actress. Mrs. HAMBLETON, an actress at the Jenny Lind Theatre, committed suicide last evening, by taking a large quantity of Cyanuret of Potassum, a deadly poison, used for electrotyping. This lamentable act occurred about half-past five o'clock, at "The Bell," in Kearny street, where she and her husband were boarding, and by six o'clock she was a corpse. From the facts which were given in evidence before the Coroner's jury, it appears she lived very unhappily with her husband, and had stated to a female acquaintance, the morning previous, that she was about to part with him; that she hated him; that if she was a single woman she would marry a young actor by the name of COAD, to whom she was much attached, and who boarded in the same house with her; and finally said to her friend, "You must not be surprised to hear that I am dead by night." During the day, Mr. Hambleton, who is an actor at the same theatre, had some difficulty with Coad in regard to his family matters, and Coad had been requested to leave the house in consequence, but which he refused to do.

The evidence of the medical gentlemen who were called to attend Mrs. H., though too late to save her, satisfied the jury that she had voluntarily taken the poison. Dr. COLLYER analysed the remains of the poison, and found it a very strong solution, of which she took at least a tumbler full.

Mrs. Hambleton was an actress of no ordinary merit; was about 25 years of age, and from the Colonies, being an English woman by birth. There was nothing in the evidence that implicated her as having acted dishonorably towards her husband, but that she "loved not wisely, but too well," and hence her death, in the manner above described.

COAD is an actor at the same theatre. After the death of Mrs. H., he left the house. and attempted to poison himself, but failed. Coroner GALLAGHER held an inquest on the body last evening, the verdict of the jury being that she came to her death as above

The mate was engaged in shooting ducks from aboard the ship, and had fired once, forward, and was going aft, when the gun went off, and a heavy load of duck shot entered the forehead of the young man, causing his death in an hour afterwards. The deceased was a native of Liverpool, where he has a mother residing. The verdict of the jury was in accordance with the above facts.

e construed to release the clerk of the Superior Court from the obligations of his official bond. Sec. 5. The act shall take effect from and after the tenth day after its passage.
