News from the Sacramento Valley.

We are under favor to Palmer & Co's Express for the Sacramento papers of Saturday, also the Marysville Herald of Friday.

RICH VEIN OF GOLD-BEARING QUARTZ -We receive almost daily accounts of the new discovery of rich and extensive gold-bearing quartz veins. We examined vesterday, fa large quantity of quartz rock, at the law office of Davis & Ryerson, on Second street. which had been sent from an extensive quartz mine about sixty miles north of this city. The vein from which it came was originally discovered by a Mr. Lock and Marshall, who brought specimens to this city, which were tested and found to afford a good yield. Captain J. R. Davis then proceeded to the point and made some extended observations, satisfying himself of the entire practicability of engaging in the work. He sent down several specimens which were the poorest he could find for the express purpose knowing decisively the yield, so that he might predicate his estimates thereupon. Not a particle of gold could be seen in the quartz which was submitted to the test. In one of the pieces there proved to be some thirty-eight cents worth of gold to the pound of the rock; whilst in the other pound of quartz there was over fifty cents worth. Yesterday they received about seven hundred pounds of the quartz, and from an examina- Cordage-Duty 25 ? centtion we feel satisfied that the average will be close to one dollar per pound, as gold is visi-ble in almost every piece of the quartz.— Transcript.

HANTOWN DIGGINGS .- A friend who has been at work at Hangtown for some months past, tells us that a new machine has just been put in operation there. by which a greatly increased quantity of earth can be washed in a day. We are told that men have made, in working the earth which had been previously worked, from twelve to twenty dollars a day, upon an average, with the new machine.— Times.

Editorial Correspondence. NO ELECTION OF U. STATES SENATOR. SAN JOSE. Tuesday Morning, February 18. MY DEAR WIMANTS:

There was no election of United States Senator, yesterday. At 1/4 past 11 o'clock, the House of Assembly, in whose chamber the Convention was to meet, took a recess till twelve. During the recess it was busily circulated that the building was insecure, and that the pressure of a crowd would endanger the safety of every person in the Hall, by the liability of the walls to give way. The rear wall had settled considerably, and large cracks were visible—the whole mass of adobe leaning strongly toward the Contra

Many fears were thus engendered; and an invitation was sent from the Senate inviting the Assembly to meet in the Senate Hall. On re-assembling at 12 o'clock, the Assembly entered upon a series of tactics, having for its object a postponement of the Convention-as it was found that one member was absent, and another so seriously ill as to prevent his attendance. A call of the House was ordered, points raised and debated: and all the usual methods of staving off, put in requisition. While the discussion was going on above, the Senate had again assembled, after a recess in which seats had been arranged for the other House, and were patiently waiting for its members, so that the Convention might organize. Evidences of excitement soon began to appear, and motions were made-discussions took placethe excitement increased. The lobbies above and below were densely crowded with spectators. In the body of the Senate were some half a dozen ladies, and several distinguished gentlemen, prominent among whom we observed the Hon. J. C. FREMONT, who sat calmly looking upon the agitated masses around him, confident, as were his friends, that California would not be unmindful of his great services in her behalf.

The hour of half-past one arrived—the Assembly had just reached the question of the acceptance of the Senate's invitation, the vote was being taken, when an Honorable Senator moved an adjournment, stating that several members of the Assembly were absent, one of whom, rumor said, had been drugged, and another could not be found. The excitement deepened; the House was in confusion, the vote had been declared-a reconsideration moved and refused, both votes 17 to 16; the House was taking its last vote to go down stairs, the mass of outsiders were rushing below, when the Senate motion to adjourn prevailed-9 ayes to 6 nays.

And thus ended the first day's attempt to elect a United States Senator.

To-day the contest will be renewed on the question whether the Convention exists the meeting not having taken place as appointthat the Convention does exist. We believe the rule is plainly laid down in the manuals, and if the act of both bodies is not set at defiance by faction, the legislature must continue, till successful, its efforts to meet in Convention, or until one of the Houses rescinds the resolution. Another Rich Quartz Vein.

It would seem as if the mineral deposits of our State are only beginning to be developed. and that a new era in mining operations was about to take place. Rich, nay richer specimens are being almost daily exhibited, for no sooner is one specimen heralded, than another follows, still better.

We were shown some of the most beautiful specimens yesterday of quartz inlaid with gold, which we have ever seen. In fact, in several pieces the gold was in lumps perfectly pure, weighing probably from one to five dollars. These were taken from a vein at Grass Valley, five miles below Nevada City, the proprietors of which are Messrs. Ells-WORTH, KELLY, A. M. THOMPSON and A. De-LANO, of this city. They went to the mountains about three weeks ago, secured their claim and made a preparatory exploration. which resulted in the most complete success. The bed was found on the top of a low mountain, at the depth of about ten feet from the surface. The first rock showed gold richly distributed through it, but continuing the excavation to the depth of thirty feet, it was found to exist to such an extent that twentyfive pounds of rock yielded two hundred dollars by the simple operation of breaking and crushing with a hammer.

Some twenty men were employed, who made an excavation of about four hundred feet in length. These and all expenses were paid from the vein by the process of breaking the rock with a hammer, and washing it without quicksilver. We are told that the proprietors do not intend to make a joint stock company, although they may conclude to admit a few shareholders. One of the proprietors is engaged with men now in quarrying the rock, and has near thirty tons raised. Four crushing machines are about going into operation at Grass Valley, and soveral others are on their way up. We understand that the proprietors of this mine are associated under the name of the "Sicrra Nevada Mining Company."

Interesting from Washington .- Probable Rejection of Mr. King.

We find in the San Jose Argus, a letter from its correspondent at Washington, giving some interesting details of matters connected with California. In relation to the confirmation of Hon. T. BUTLER KING, as Collector at this port, this correspondent

"The nomination of Mr. King to the collectorship has not been sent in yet, and it is said that it will not be. The Cabinet have been advised that it was unsafe to submit his name to the Senate. The ground of opposition is his ineligibility under the Contitution, his appointment having taken place during the term for which he was elected to Congress. Without some change n the sentiments of Senators on this point, his rejection is, I apprehend, certain. To avoid such a result, therefore, the nomination may not be made at all. Whether Mr. King's name be retained, or in case his name be submitted to the Senate and rejected, it is, I understand, the fixed determination of your delegation to oppose every nominee to office in California, who is not at the time a citizen of your State. Your Senators have taken this ground heretofore, but were overruled. Hereafter, their views will be respected by the Senate. The same correspondent says that postage
