How Will You Meet The Rising Food Costs?
Dear Garden and Farm Friend:

Last January I said to you "these be troublous times". I repeat it. They are not only "troublous", but they are getting more "troublous" day by day. Don't think that because all the bombing and shooting is still on the other side of the oceans that you and I and all the rest of us are not being hit. Not by bombs and bullets but by the rising cost of food.

Recent figures from Government sources show a rise of between 13 and 14 per cent in the cost of food items during the past few months, food items used by the average family. This upping of food prices will continue. Prices of food items always rise in war times and we are in war now except the shooting stage and that is liable to come any time.

Growing out of the drafting of our young men for army training an astounding fact has developed. Medical examinations show that one-half or more of the young men are unfit for army service and a large part of these rejections come from the effects of malnutrition. To put it in plainer words, the result of a lack of proper food, both variety and quantity, is responsible.

What is worse is that there are nearly as many white boys and young men turned down for those causes as negroes. It's a lack of a proper variety of food and the greatest lack is vegetable food that could easily be grown in abundance the year round on any Southern farm or in any Southern home back yard.

Through the years I have kept repeating that a large home garden, planted and kept replanted through the year can be made the most valuable piece of ground on the farm, both in money saving and health saving. On 90 per cent of our farms, the garden is the most neglected, the least made full use of, of all the acres. The larger and better tended the home garden, the smaller the store, drug and doctor's bill and an improved condition of health of the whole family that will surprise you.

With the government paying us to protect our farm lands and penalizing us when we do not, it is just plain foolishness to pass up such an opportunity to make our soils more productive with such little labor cost.

Farm acres left idle in winter when our heavy rains come, are literally washed away, carrying not only the easily worked loamy soil but the natural plant food accumulation of centuries within them.

Hardy growing crops such as **Austrian Winter Peas** and **Genuine Hairy Vetch** are recognized as being the very best legume or soil building crops to grow here in the South and we heartily recommend them to you to plant this fall.

Many prominent planters simplify the planting of these winter legumes by drilling one to three drills in each cotton, corn, or other clean row, cultivated crop middle. On good land a single drill in each middle will cover the land by crop maturity the following spring, though two drills will probably give maximum benefits in green manure and nitrogen.

On prepared land both peas and vetch are often planted broadcast and in this manner the maximum tonnage of hay or green manure can be had. 200 pounds of acid phosphate, 1,000 pounds basic slag, per acre or barnyard manure naturally increases growth very noticeably. For satisfactory hay crops, combinations of vetch and oats, wheat, barley or rye, and winter peas and oats, wheat, barley or rye make enormous yields of very fine quality, the grain giving support to the vines. Broadcasting one bushel of grain to 20-30 pounds of peas or vetch per acre is sufficient for a good stand.

"Driv To It By Compellment"

"I never would a' done it in dis world if I hadn't baen jes' driv' to it by compellmant," said an old negro farmer in telling of changas he had made for tha better in his farm methods. The above was containad in an editorial in the July issue of *Prograssiva Farmer*. I am sura Dr. Clarence Poe will not object to my borrowing it for use in this little talk.

The Hastings saed business, now in its 52nd year, has lived through fiva depressions big and littla (hard times periods) and two wars, one littla war (Spanish-American) and a big war, World War No 1. Wa now hava World War No. 2 on our hands regardless of whether wa get into it on a shooting basis or not. It is going to have a profound effect on all of us. It's time to get set to maat its effects. World War No. 1 (1914-1918) affected all of us. It brought avils in farming, business, finance and habits of life that wa had not recovered from when World War No. 2 broke in our facas. It is covering far mora countries, it is dis-locating world trade in a far greater degraa, and bafore it's ended probabilities are for almost universal bankruptcy for all European and Asiatic countries involved.

We hera in the United States are just beginning to feel the effects. These will becoma graeter day by day, weak by weak, month by month. Prospects are for a long drawn out war. Our army and navy and air forces ara preparing for a several yaars war. Our labor conditions are becoming difficult. Everything we buy has already risen in price or will shortly; rise faster than the prices of commodity crops our farmers hava to sell.

In all these depressions, in the diract and after effects of war, our farm folks who survivad, who didn't lose their farms or get head over heals in debt had to change their farm methods or habits and usually to their bettermant. Most did not do it willingly. We wera "driv to it by compellment." The sad part is that so many, once the emergency was over or seamingly so, drifted back into the old ruts because it seamad a little easier when cash crop prices wera high and food prices low.

All through the dapressions and wars there wera some families in almost every community who wera never "distressed." They might not have much money in pocket or bank but they owed no debt, they had food and faed ahaad until next saason. What cotton they mada they owned instaad of owad to marchant or bankar. They wera always safe.

In recant yaars they hava a naw name for a very old and safe farm practice. The new name is "Subsistanca Farming." I believe in it 100 par cent. But, in both principle and practice I can't see much diffarance between that and what wa all used to call "living at homa and boarding at the same place." It's tha only safe and sana way, more necessary to follow now than any time since the War-Between-the-States.

What Will This War Do to You?

Will it make you or break you?
I am not talking about whether you or mambars of your family will be drawn into activa military service. What I am interested in is whether you ara going to run your affairs

and farm program so you will come out of this war period and the depression that will inevitably follow it, better off than now or whether you will follow the old road to debt and bankruptcy so common after World War No 1.

Fine progress has been made on thousands of our farms in recant yaars, stopping of arosion, soil building with cow-peas, soy beans, lespedaza, etc. in summer; with Austrian Peas and Vetch in winter. Naw permanent pasturas have been made, more and better cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry have been added. The progress wa hava mada is fina, but not naar enough.

In fact, what wa hava dona so far is only a good start toward a farm program and regular farm practice that will make us safe and prosperous and able to hava all the necessities and convaniences we should have. We hava got to learn to travel antirely on our own. These government benefit payments will stop some day. The government can't stand these and enormous dafense and war costs both.

In all war periods, in all periods of "good times" about the first thing to go up in prica is food and faed. They are steadily on the risa now. This is fina for those who hava food and feed to sell, it's hard on all who have to buy food and feed items. Our farm folks of the South are too largely food and feed buyers, too seldom producers and sellers. Your acras should be busy the year round, either growing food and feed or else in soil improvement crops.

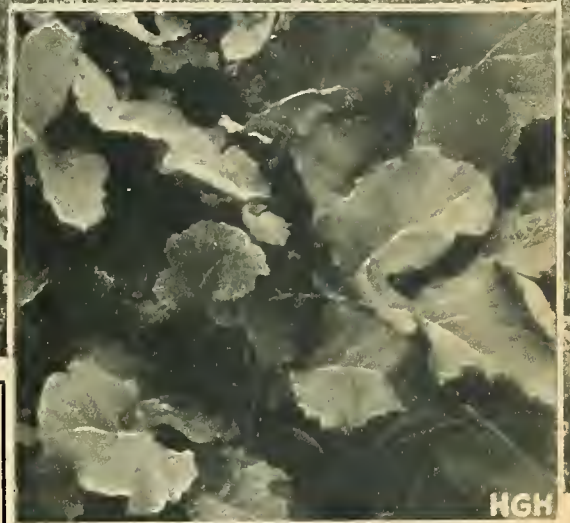
In a faw weeks it will be time to plant the fall grain crops, wheat, oats, barley and rya, both for the grain, winter and spring grazing and to stop winter washing of soil. Also the Austrian Peas and Vetches for soil improvement and to earn government benefits as long as they last. Plant these things to tha limit. Wheat means bread for your table; oats and barley means grain for your live stock. All mean winter grazing and soil saving.

Last, but not least, the fall garden. Not just the usual small turnip patch for greens and maybe a few turnips but a real fall and winter garden. Not too late now to make a last planting of bush snap and bush butter beans; then a good turnip patch both for turnips and salad and beats, carrots, early kinds of cabbaga, collards, kale, lettuce, mustard, onions, radish, tandergreens and spinach. They all belong in fall gardens all over the South. They are money and health savers and vegetables from your garden and farm raised bread and meat pay no merchant a profit, no railroad or truck line a freight charga. It's earning by saving.

Printed in a Georgia papar recently was the following that's well worth your while. Wa quota: "The Lord gave us two ends—one to sit on and tha other to think with. A man's success depends upon which end he uses most. It's a casa of haads you win, or tails you lose. Take your choice."

When to Plant

Our finest lawns are made during cool months. As soon as weather cools off until early spring is time to sow seed. Allow grass to become established without freezing weather if you can. Where there are trees, establish grass before or after leaves fall. Lawn grasses, except Bermuda, may be planted all fall and winter until late spring—the earlier the better. Bermuda Grass will start growth only in warm soil and weather. Plant it from May through August.

Prepare Soil Well

Spade or plow soil 12 in. deep. Remove rocks, roots and litter. Where shady there is frequently moss, showing acid condition. To correct this, apply 100 Lbs. Hydrated Lime per 1,000 square feet, and rake it in 2 or 3 weeks before planting seed.

Grass needs food and water. For soil to hold water and food, there must be plenty of humus or vegetable matter in the soil. For poor, sandy or heavy clay soils we must haul in woods earth or rich garden top-soil or we must add humus to the soil we have. Granulated Peat Moss and Peat Humus are the best and purest forms of humus.

Apply 100 Lbs. of Pulverized Sheep Manure, a bale of Peat Moss

or Humus, 50 Lbs. of Bone Meal and 50 Lbs. of lawn fertilizer to each 1,000 square feet (50x20 ft.) Rake thoroughly, mixing fertilizer with soil and working the surface smooth and level.

Seed Sowing

5 Lbs. of seed will plant 1,000 square ft. (50x20 ft.) of lawn with most grasses. Rye Grass takes 10 Lbs. Plant a plenty of seed to have a thick, velvety lawn. Sow seed carefully so not to skip spots. After broadcasting seed, roll the seeded surface with a roller, or firm the surface in some other convenient way. Grass seed needs only to be pressed into a firm seed bed—not covered with soil.

Bermuda Grass

The best summer grass in the South is Bermuda and it should be seeded in the summer in sunny places. Bermuda grass is brown in winter, so for a year-round green lawn with Bermuda, merely scratch Sheep Manure and Bone Meal into Bermuda sod in the fall or winter and broadcast Evergreen Mixture, Rye Grass or Kentucky Blue Grass over the closely mowed Bermuda sod, scratch it in with a sharp rake and roll it firmly and soak thoroughly. Green grass quickly appears and lasts until summer, when Bermuda crowds out the winter grass.

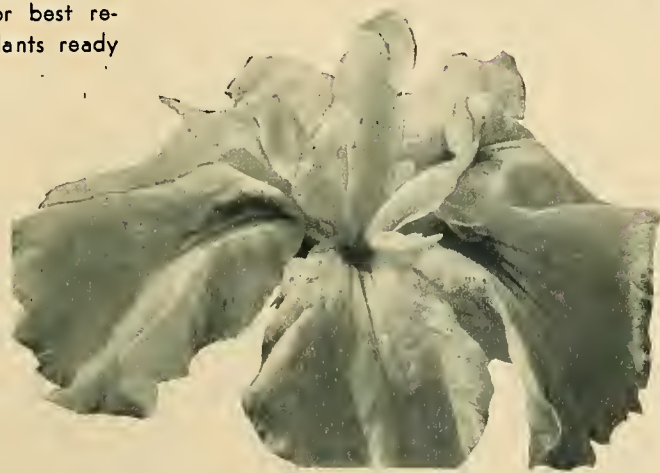

The following information has been released by Dr. H. P. Stuckey and Dr. R. P. Bledsoe of the Georgia Experiment Station under whose direction the variety was originated:

SANFORD WHEAT. A new variety of wheat resistant to leaf rust and adapted to Georgia conditions is now ready for distribution to Georgia farmers. Four-year trials of this wheat have yielded 6.4 bushels more per acre than Gasta (a high-yielding Bluestem selection). Sanford is similar to Bluestem (Purplestraw), except for having somewhat more awns and greater resistance to leaf rust. In years in which leaf rust is prevalent, Sanford matures a few days later than Bluestem, due to its superior resistance to leaf rust.

The yields given in Table 1 were made on soil of fair to average fertility, fertilized with 150 pounds of nitrate of soda. Except in 1937 when the crop was damaged by hail, Sanford has made from 25 to 41 bushels per acre. Similar yields have been obtained from increased fields of this wheat for the past two years.

Due to an error in labeling, the exact parentage of Sanford is not known. One parent was certainly Purplestraw and the rust resistant parent either Kanred or one of two other similar Kansas wheats (PI068 or PI066). This hybrid was selected for resistance to leaf rust and the best selection was backcrossed to Purplestraw. It was necessary to make backcrosses to Purplestraw to improve yield and straw characters, before a desirable type of wheat, resistant to leaf rust, was produced.

Sanford wheat is resistant but not immune to leaf rust. So far, we have found little rust on Sanford up to ten days before harvest, even when it was grown next to susceptible varieties like Purplestraw. Some years Sanford will have considerable rust just before ripening. As early rust does more damage, this late rust is not considered serious.

As far as is known, Sanford is not resistant to other diseases of wheat, such as smut and stem rust. As a general rule, these diseases are not serious under Georgia conditions.

The winter growth, heading date, color of straw, and a number of other morphological characters are very similar to Purplestraw. The heads have a few more and longer apical awns than Purplestraw. There is an occasional bearded head, which appears to be a throw-back to the bearded parent. The kernels are slightly longer and the ripening date slightly later than Purplestraw.
