AN ACT

I enating public lands to the several States and Servitoris which may provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That there be granted to the several States for the purposes hereinafter mentioned an amount of public land to be apportioned to each State a quantity equal to thirty thousand acres for each Senator and representative in Congress to which the States are respectively entitled by the apportionment under the census of eighteen hundred and sixly: Provided, That no mineral lands shall be selected or purchased under the provisions of this act. Sec. 2 And be it further enacted That the land aforesaid , after being surveyed, shall be apportioned to the several States in sections or subdivisions of sections, not less than one quarter of a section, and whenever there are public lands in a State, subject to sale at private entry at one dollar and twenty-five cents per acre. the quantity to which said State shall be entitled shall be selected from such lands within the limits of such State and the Secretary of the Interior is hereby directed to issue to each of the states in which there is not the quantity of public lands subject to sale at private entry at one dollar and twenty five cents per acre to which said State may be entitled under the provisions of this act, land scrip to the amount in acres for the de--ficiency of its distributive share ; said scrip to be sold by said states and the proceeds there of applied to the uses and purposes prescribed in this act and for no other use or purpose whatever: Provided That in no case shall any State to which land scrip muy thus be issued, be allowed to locate the same within the limits of any other State, orfany Servitory of the United States, but their assignees may thus break said land scrip whon any of the unappropriated lands of the United States subject to sale at printe entry at one dollar and twenty-five cents or less per acre, And provided further, that not more than one million acres shall be located by such assignees in any one of the States, And provided further that no such location shall be made before

me year from the passage of this act. Sec. 3. And he it further inacted, that all the expenses of management, superintendence, and taxes from date of selection of said lands previous to their sales, and all expenses incurred in the manage. ment and disbursement of the moneys which may be received therefrom, shall be , paid by the States to which they may belong out of the Reasury of said. States so that the entire proceeds of the sale of said lands shall be applied without any diminution whatever to the purposes hereinafter mentured. Dec. A. And be it further enacted, That all moneys derived from the sale of the lands aforesaid by the States to which the lands are apportioned, and from the sales of land sonip hereinbelore provided for, shall be invested in stocks of the United States, or of the States, a some other safe stocks, yielding not less than five per centum upon the par value of said stocks, and that the moneys so invested shall constitute a perpetual fund, the capital of which shall remain for ever in - dimenshed (except 20 fac as may be provided in section fifth of this act) and the interest of which shall be inviolably appropriated, by each State which may take and claim the benefit of this act, to the indoument, support, and main tenance of at least one college where the leading object shall be, without ex-- cluding other scientific and classical studies and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts, in such manner as the legislatures of the States may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life, See, 5. And be it firsther inacted. That the grant of land and land scrip here by authorized shall be made on the following conditions, to which, as well as to the provisions hereinbefore contained the previous assent of the second States shall be signified by legislative acts, First, fany portion of the fund invested, as provided by the foregoing section, or any portion of the interest there on shall, by any action or contingency be diminished or last it shall be replaced by the State to which it belongs, so that the capital of the fund shall remain forever undiminished; and the annual interest shall be regularaly applied without diminution to the purposes mentioned in the fourth section of this act, creept that a sum, not creeding ten per centum apon the amount received by any state under the provisions of this act, may be expended for the purchase of lands for sites or experimental farms, whenever

authorized by the respective legislatures of said States. Second . hoportion of said fund, nor the interest thereon, shall be applied, directly or indirectly, under any pretence whatever, to the purchase, erection, preservation, or repair of any building or buildings. Third, Any State which may take and claim the benefit of the provisions of this act shall provide, within five years, at least not less than one college, as described in the fourth section of this act, or the grant to such State shall cease, and said state shall be bound to pay the United States the amount received of any lands previously sold, and that the title to furchasers under the State shall be valid _ Fourth An annual report hall be made regarding the progress of each college, recording any improvements and experiments made, with their cost and results, and such other matters, including State industrial and reconomical statistics as may be supposed useful: me copy of which shall be transmitted by mail free, by each, to all the other colleges which may be endowed under the provisions of this act, and also one copy to the Seculary of the Interior Fifthe when lands shall be selected from those which have been raised to double the minimum price in consequence of railroad grants they shall be computed to the States at the maximum price, and the number of acre proportionally diminished. Sixth. No State while in a condition of rebellion or insurrection against the government of the United States shall be entitled to the bene. fit of this act. Seventh. no State shall be entitled to the benefits of this act unless it shall express its acceptance thereof by its Legislature within two years from the date of its approval by the President. See. 6. And be it further enacted. That land serie is such under the provisions of this act shall not be subject to location until after the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and sirty three. See ". And be it further enacted. That the land officers shall receive the same fies for locating land serie issued under the provisions of this act as is now allowed for the location of Military Bounty Land warrants under existing laws; Provided their maximum compensation shall not be thereby increased. See. S. And be it further enacted. That the Governors of the several States to which serip shall be issued under this act shall be required to report annually to Congress all sales made of such scrip until the whole shall be disposed of the amount received for the same and what appropriation has been made of the proceeds.
