## SUMMARY OF RELEVANT POINTS:

War Minister SUGIYAMA. Gen. and Government Committee member HARA explain the organisation of the Manchurian Heavy Industry Company to be founded on the capital of 450,000,000 yen, half of which will be paid by the Manchukuo Government, and the other half by the NISSAN, Japan Industrial Co. Private companies in Manchukuo, dealing with iron, coal, aluminum, motor cars and airplanes will be incorporated under the new national policy company that will control all these industries.

Committee member KAWASKKI enterrupts and questions the minister on why Japan should give up all her right and interest in Manchuria and give them to the Manchukuen Gevernment. We should demand a reward for the sacrifices we have made in establishing the above company. War Minister SUGIYAMA says that Manchukue is our defense line.

SUGIYAMA states that as the establishment of the company is urgently needed, the existing system of the NISSAN is utilized and that the fact that half of the shares is owned by the Manchudo Gevernment is

itself the manifestation of Japan's rights and interests in the new company, because Japan and Manchukue are one; namely, Japan has not given up her rights and interests in Manchukue.

Government Committee member HARA replies that the Japanese and Manchukusan governments will see to it that the company will never be influenced by Fereign steckholders. But he does not say how.
