





FOREWORD








Located near Walnut and Raymond in Pasadena, Throop Polytechnic Institute was founded in 1891 by the Hon. Amos G. Throop. Although offering work of college grade, Caltech's ancestor concentrated on vocational subjects such as Manual Training and Domestic Science.



Twenty years later, led by Dr. George E. Hale and a number of outstanding citizens of Pasadena, Throop Tech moved to the present campus and began to give degrees in Engineering. Throop Hall is shown under construction in 1909 and completed in 1910. They had Hydraulics 11 then too.










This aerial view of the present campus was taken in 1948. In the last forty years Caltech has developed from a trade school to one of the two or three leading technical schools and research centers in the United States.


CARL V. LARSON RICKETTS


MECHANICAL ENGINEERING

DUDLEY W. WAGNER RICKETTS





RICHARD L. BRIDGES



LELAND J. CUFF RICKETTS




RICHARD FULLER THROOP, T2, TBPi


GEORGE B. COOKE


HODGE C. GAINES


STANTON L. EILENBERG RICKETTS


CLINTON LEW THROOP




PETER PAULING FLEMING






JOHN C. PORTER THROOP

DAVID JOHNSTON FLEMING



Through the year, Don Tautz, as House President, tactfully handled an infinite variety of impossible situations such as the one in Upper Hell Alley. Don became the second consecutive Blacker President to serve as Chairman of the Interhouse Committee. Vice President Groner carried on the Associates program in his charming manner. 





Is our new head librarian "Highball Tom" Collins.






FLEMING
